SOUTH CENTRAL BELL NEW RATE SCHEDULE

New rates for in-state long distance telephone calls have been approved by the Mississippi Public Service Commission and went into effect Thursday, August 25.

South Central Bell will not receive any additional net revenues as a result of the new rates.

"The new tariffs encourage Calling Card calls by establishing a 50 cent charge for operator assistance with the actual conversation time billed at direct-dialed rates," said J.N. McGowen, vice president of South Central

Bell's Mississippi operations.

"Furthermore, those operator-assisted calls which require more operator work time now carry uniform flat rates to offset the cost of this service. These rates range from 50 cents for a station-to-station, Calling Card call to \$2.25 for operator-handled, person-to-person calls. Direct-dialed rates apply for actual 'talk' time," McGowen added.

Other major changes include:

- Rate period specific billing. With rate period

specific billing, if a weekday call is placed at 4:55 p.m., for example, and continues until 5:05, the first five minutes would be billed at the full weekday rate. The second five minutes, from 5:00 until 5:05 p.m., would be billed the discounted, evening rate.

- A new one-minute initial period for operator-assisted calls;

- Time-of-day discounts for the entire conversation period (including the initial one minute period) on all calls;

- No holiday discount when the legal holiday is not on the same date - for example, if New Year's Day is on a Saturday and the legal holiday was the Friday before, no discount will be in effect on Friday; and

- Modest increases in

charges for short-distance calls and modest decreases in charges for longer-distance calls.

Under the old rates, a four-minute direct-dialed call from Jackson to Tupelo, for example, would cost \$2.13 if placed between 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. on a weekday. With the new rates, the same call costs \$2.10. A four-minute station-to-station Calling Card call placed between 11:00 p.m. and 8:00 a.m. on a weekday would have cost \$2.58 under the old rates and now costs \$1.34.

"The new tariffs should encourage our customers to use the least costly method of calling while our company will benefit through increased network efficiency," McGowen said.

YELLOW CREEK, 2ND PRIORITY

If TVA ever decides to resume construction on any of four mothballed atomic reactors, the Hartsville Nuclear Plant near Nashville would likely get the nod over the Yellow Creek facility in Tishomingo County, agency officials said Tuesday.

TVA Chairman Charles Dean said a decision won't be made on the plants' future for at least three years, but if a decision were made today Hartsville would have the edge because construction on it is further along.

George Kimmons, TVA construction chief, said the agency plans to spend \$26.8 million in fiscal 1984 to maintain equipment and structures at Hartsville reactors A1 and A2 so work could resume on the plant if necessary.

TVA would spend \$5.8 million on the twin-reactor Yellow Creek plant near Iuka, and is not maintaining structures at the facility so construction could quickly be resumed, Kimmons said.

"We are still carrying Hartsville A on a status where work could start back up. We are maintaining the equipment and structures. At Yellow Creek we are maintaining the equipment but not the structures. We decided we could go back in there later, cut the steel off and replace it (if a decision was made to resume construction)," he said.

Kimmons was questioned about the deferred reactors during a lengthy board meeting to approve \$1.74 billion in construction projects.

Local health officials are preparing to combat the upcoming flu season by administering influenza immunizations at the Iuka and Belmont Health Department on October 6th. The vaccine

provides protection from the current prevalent strains of influenza: A/Brazil/78, A/Philippines/82, and B/Singapore/79. Citizens are reminded that immunizations will be given on a first-come, first-served basis. Iuka Health Department personnel who

FLU VACCINATIONS TO BE OFFERED OCTOBER 6

County health departments throughout Mississippi are getting ready to battle a serious, sometimes fatal, disease which most often occurs from October through April.

Beginning October 6, county health departments will administer influenza immunizations. Again this year, vaccine recipients must pay to help cover the cost of the vaccine and its administration; the cost per recipient is \$4.

Tishomingo County health officials will administer immunizations on a first-come, first-served basis at the two locations in the county. Doses of flu vaccine will be given at the Iuka Health Department on Thursday, October 6, between the hours of 8:00 - 12:00 and 1:00 - 4:30. Belmont patients will be seen between 9:00 - 12:00 and 1:00 - 3:00.

Health officials recommend that readers who are unable to attend the scheduled sessions should telephone the County Health Department to schedule a day and time to get the flu shot, provided vaccine is available. Some citizens may choose to contact their private

physician for protection against influenza.

Vaccine will be available to all Mississippians, but State Health Officer Dr. Alton B. Cobb emphasizes the special need for the "high risk" to take advantage of this disease prevention opportunity.

"Vaccination has proved to be the most effective method of protecting those people at greatest risk," Dr. Cobb said. "High risk groups include those 65 years of age and older and people of any age who have such chronic illness as heart, lung, or kidney disease, severe chronic anemia, or diabetes."

This year, some 50,000 doses of flu vaccine will again be available through the county health departments. The vaccine provides protection from the current prevalent strains of influenza: A/Brazil/78, A/Philippines/82, and B/Singapore/79.

"Even though we offered a similar protection program last year, Mississippi reported some 561 cases of influenza," Dr. Cobb mentioned. "In 1982, death certificates showed influenza the cause of death for 11 people, of whom seven were

over 65 years of age and two were in the 55 - 64 year old group.

"We do not yet have a projection from the Centers for Disease Control about the number of flu cases expected this season," the State Health Officer added. "But we want to prevent as much flu as possible."

Influenza is an acute disease of the respiratory tract characterized by fever, chills, headache, muscle pain, tiredness, mild sore throat, and inflammation of the nasal passages. Cough is often severe and long-lasting. Most patients recover on their own in two to seven days.

The disease spreads by direct people-to-people contact through droplet infection; it is probably airborne among crowded populations in enclosed spaces. The incubation period is short, usually only 24 to 72 hours.

Day To Participate In Training Program

A young Tishomingo business executive has been selected to participate in a five-month training program designed to assist Mississippi's emerging young leaders.

The program is part of the Mississippi Economic Council's Leadership Mississippi Program. Now in its tenth year, Leadership Mississippi helps identify the state's young leaders and encourage their participation in public affairs.

The MEC program is under the chairmanship of Dr. Milton Baxter, director of the Teaching Learning Resource Center at the University of Southern Mississippi, and offers leadership skill development, research in public issue problems, and training in problem-solving activities.

The 30 participants in the 1983-84 program were selected from some 200 nominees from throughout the state. The 30 represent various segments of Mississippi's economy and geographic areas.

Thomas E. Day, vice president of First Citizens National Bank in Tishomingo, attended Mississippi State University. He is a past president of East Heights Civitan Club and Northeast Mississippi Chapter of Bank Administration Institute, and

is a director of Tishomingo Housing Corporation and a past chairman of Tishomingo County Development Foundation. Day is a member of Mississippi Young Bankers, Tishomingo County Development Foundation, and Tishomingo Housing Corporation.

Dean of the seminar for the fourth year will be Dr. Donald Mosley, professor of management, College of Business and Management Studies at the University of South Alabama in Mobile. The seminar, scheduled for October 12-14 in Jackson, will include intensified instruction in skills development and leadership training.

"This program has been extremely successful as many former participants have taken active roles in community and statewide affairs," Dr. Baxter said. "An essential element in the continuing growth and economic development of Mississippi is leadership - strong, active, informed, and committed leaders."

Maximum age for participation is 35. The schedule calls for the seminar, field research in specific problem areas by delegate teams in each congressional district, and development of action plans for problem solving based on the research.

Buying Back-To-School Clothes

To make the right selection, careful thought and planning should be given by both parties when buying back-to-school clothes.

SHOULD GLASSES BE CHANGED?

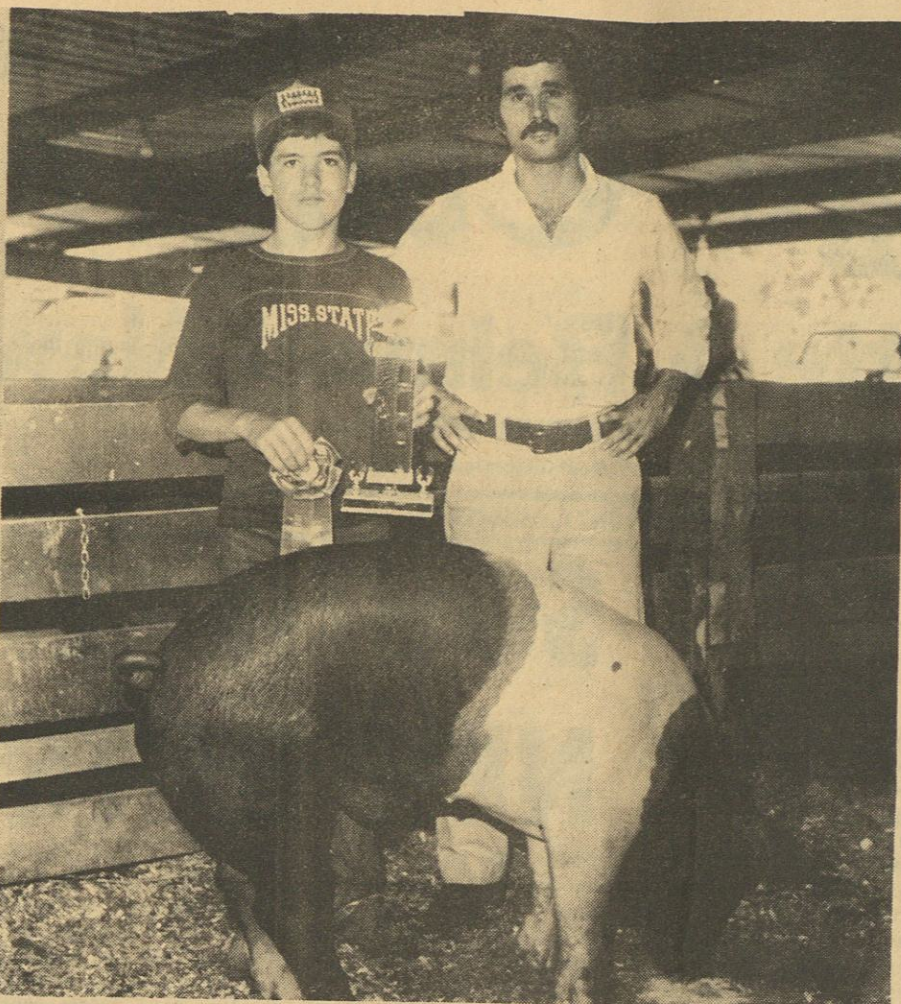
If you've just started wearing glasses, you may not need to change them again for two or more years. Much depends on your age and the condition of your eyes.

By the time most people reach middle-age, for example, they need glasses to see clearly when reading. The reason for this is that their near-focusing muscles are not as strong as they used to be. This is a natural process, common to most people at that time of life. From middle-age on, it is usually recommended that you have your eyes examined once a year. Often, this will bring a change in prescription and new glasses to adjust to the

changing condition of your eyes.

There are other reasons for having annual eye examinations, especially for middle-aged and older people. This is to look for any signs of glaucoma or cataract and other eye problems that may impair vision unless treated in time. But no matter what your age, you should have regular eye examinations to protect your health as well as your eyes.

fabrics, clothes that are comfortable and do not restrict movement or scratch the skin, and animal or toy fabric designs and decorative details. Older children are usually more concerned with conformity -- or dressing in the same manner as their friends.

On the other hand, parents consider durability, cost, comfort and care the more important considerations when selecting children's clothing.

Here are a few tips to keep in mind when buying back-to-school clothes:

- *Before shopping decide how much money is available in the budget. Discuss this with the child. This will help avoid overspending.
- *Read the care labels. Make certain the garment is easy to care for. Point out to children why clothes would or would not be easy to care for.
- *Spend the most money on

clothing that is worn often, receives the hardest wear and is laundered frequently.

*Look for garments that can be mixed and matched together and with other items already in the wardrobe. Help the child learn the concept of mixing and matching clothes at the time of purchase.

*Take advantage of sales but purchase only sale items really needed.

It is possible to combine the preferences of both parent and child when shopping for those back-to-school clothes. It may not always be the "perfect" outfit in everyone's estimation, but if shopping is done together and if each person is aware of the other's wants and needs, a little give and take can produce a wardrobe satisfactory to all.

Butternut Squash Casserole

2 cups cooked, mashed butternut squash
3 eggs, slightly beaten
6 tablespoons butter or margarine, melted
1 cup milk

1 cup sugar
½ tsp. ground ginger
½ cup flaked coconut
½ cup chopped pecans
½ cup buttered cracker crumbs

Combine all ingredients except cracker crumbs; mix thoroughly. Spoon into a lightly greased 2-quart casserole. Bake at 350 degrees for 55 minutes. Sprinkle with cracker crumbs and bake an additional 5 minutes. Yield: 8 servings.

Insects Damage Grain Quality

Insects may cause costly damage to grain stored on the farm. Although on-farm storage facilities give the producer some advantage in marketing grain crops, insect

control is critical.

When the grain is marketed, top prices will be based on clean, dry, wholesome grain. Any factor that lowers the quality of the grain will also lower the prices.

A major factor in maintaining high quality grain is insect control. Insects cause heating in the grain, lower germination of seed, poor food value, reduced grain weight and lower grade.

To protect stored grains from insects, clean and sanitize storage bins and protect the grain with the correct insecticide treatments. Maintaining correct temperature and humidity throughout the storage period is also important.

If stored grain becomes infested with insects, fumigation will be the only way to control the pests.

Stored seed also needs the same treatment and management if it is to maintain a high level of germination.

Timber Taxed Too Much?

As a timber owner, you may be paying the federal government too much income taxes.

A recent study showed that only 11 percent of 150 landowners surveyed were taking advantage of tax benefits involving capital gains and depletion allowances.

This study confirms the results of other studies showing that most timber owners pay too much federal income tax because they don't know about all the tax breaks available to them.

ASCS Farm News

TISHOMINGO COUNTY APPROVED FOR SPECIAL HAYING — Severe drought conditions in Tishomingo County prompted USDA's Agricultural Stabilization and

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Conservation Service to give farm program participants special permission to harvest hay or forage from their conservation use acres to feed their livestock. Farmers previously had received approval to graze their livestock on these acres.

Howard R. Bridges, Chairman of the Tishomingo County ASC Committee, says the special conservation use acreage haying and grazing will benefit about 20 farmers in Tishomingo County. Conservation use acreage includes diverted acreage for which payment is made, the unpaid acreage reduction acres and acres removed from production through the payment-in-kind program. "We restricted the use of harvested hay and forage to the individual farmer's own livestock to minimize the adverse economic impact on commercial hay producers," said Bridges, "but it will provide some relief to livestock producers who are participating in our acreage reduction and payment-in-kind programs."

The program participants are not allowed to let other farmers use their conservation use acreage. The emergency provisions apply only to their own livestock on their own land, the ASCS official said.

Farmers interested in conservation use acreage haying and grazing should notify the county ASCS office. Producers who have registered to graze their conservation use acreage must also sign a register to harvest those acres.

Internal parasites are the greatest single cause of death in horses and are often a cause or factor involved in many respiratory, digestive, and performance problems. Though parasites are a constant problem for horse owners, the severity of the problem can be lessened with a regular deworming program, administered by your veterinarian. Your veterinarian can determine which of the four major parasites your horse has by examining a fecal sample at his/her clinic. Four parasites commonly found in horses are bots, strongyles (bloodworms), ascarids (roundworms), and pinworms.

An effective parasite control program involves each and every animal on the farm being dewormed at regularly scheduled intervals. This plan should begin at birth and continue for the life of the animals. To establish an economic, safe, and effective plan suited especially to your animals, consult your veterinarian.

VOLUNTEERS IN 4-H

Volunteers are essential to the successful delivery of 4-H programs to youth. Last year, 619,404 4-H Volunteer leaders worked directly and indirectly with youth. 489,392 - 4-H adult leaders and 130,012 - 4-H junior and teen leaders.

4-H volunteer leaders assist youth in 4-H educational projects and activities. Many serve on local 4-H advisory committees, state or district planning groups. Many states are expanding roles of volunteer leaders to include middle management responsibilities, including recruiting and training other volunteers.

4-H volunteers are supported by the equivalent of 4,372 professional staff members and 1,225 paraprofessionals. However, all of the approximately 16,300 extension workers give some time to 4-H.

The average 4-H volunteer donates 220 hours per year in preparing for and teaching youth -- thus for each hour the salaried staff member spends in 4-H, a volunteer spends 12 hours. He or she drives 300 to 400 miles for 4-H in a personally-owned car and spends \$50 to \$60 on teaching materials. Estimated value of the total time volunteers devote to 4-H plus their out-of-pocket expenses is about \$1 billion annually.

There is also substantial involvement and assistance to 4-H programs by resource people, business, industry, agricultural and civic groups, most of which is not included in the volunteer leadership listed above.

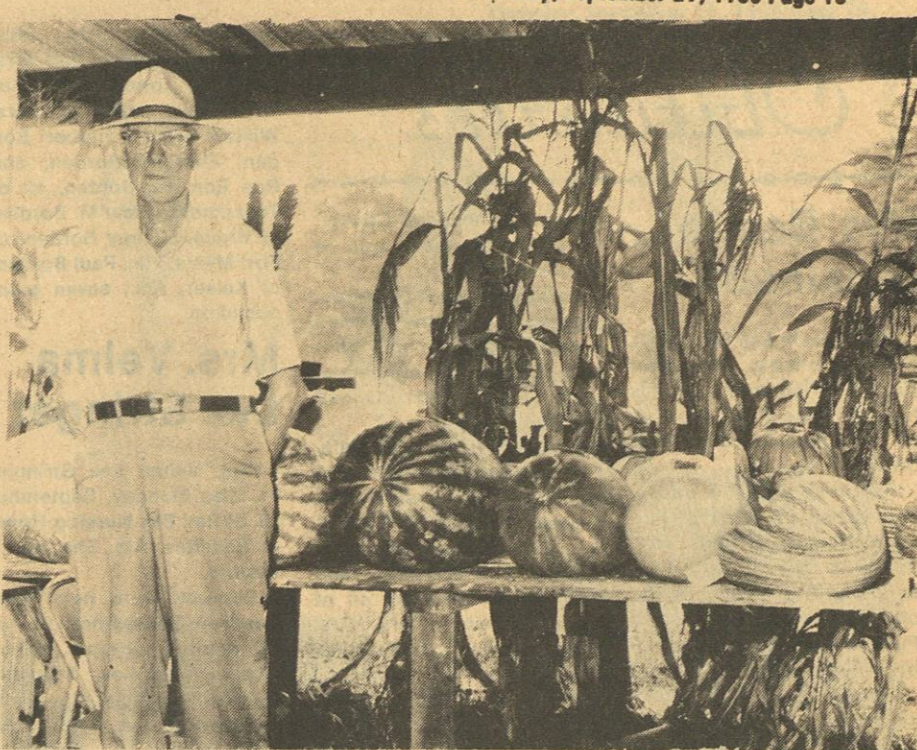
