BELL FILES PLANS TO RECOVER DOLLARS

South Central Bell has filed with the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) in Washington, D.C., its plans for recovering, through

flat charges to all customers, dollars it will lose in January 1984 because traditional long distance subsidies are being phased out.

If approved by the FCC, the

charges would begin on January 1, 1984.

J. N. McGowen, vice president of South Central Bell's Mississippi operations, said for many customers the increased charges will be offset by decreases in state-to-state long distance rates. AT&T announced on Monday that it had filed tariffs proposing a \$1.75 billion decrease in interstate long-distance service rates.

South Central also joined in an industry filing proposing charges to long distance carriers for the use of the company's lines and switching equipment in providing long distance services. These charges will continue to include some subsidy to local rates. And the company filed proposed charges to long distance carriers for billing and collection services.

McGowen said the company was concerned about attempts by Congress to delay the implementation of the new charging plan. "This is a complicated matter," he said. "The FCC has spent several years designing a solution to competition in long distance, and just about any individual or group with an interest in the subject has been involved. Now Congress

wants to rush in with a quick change. We think the FCC plan deserves a chance to work. If a change is indicated after the plan has gone into effect, then Congress could consider making the changes."

"Long distance has become highly competitive," he said. "That's obvious from the many advertisements in newspapers and on television. Under these conditions, federal regulators have recognized we can't continue the practice of relying on long distance revenue to help pay the difference between rates for local service and its actual cost."

"These first year charges replace only some of the long distance subsidies," said McGowen. "The amounts will gradually increase until 1990, when customers will pay the bigger part of these costs. Until then, the remainder of these costs will be paid by long distance carriers."

In Mississippi, charges to one-party residential customers would increase \$2 per line per month. Single-party business customers in Mississippi would pay an additional \$6.00 per line per month. Charges for party-line customers would be less.

COUNTY RECEIVES \$18,794 IN FUNDS

Tishomingo County has received \$18,794 in federal funds for "payments in lieu of taxes" for fiscal year 1983, Congressman Jamie Whitten has announced.

The Department of Interior funds, which are distributed to local governments to help offset the loss of income from non-taxable federal property such as National

Forests, are payment for 26,593 acres of federal land located within the County.

Congressman Whitten, Chairman of the House Appropriations Committee which provides funds for the program, said that the payment helps the local governments make up for the loss of revenues that tax-exempt federal property causes.

House Speaker C. B. "Buddie" Newman called for the deferral because he said he wants the port authority board "to come down here and discuss why they will not hire a port director."

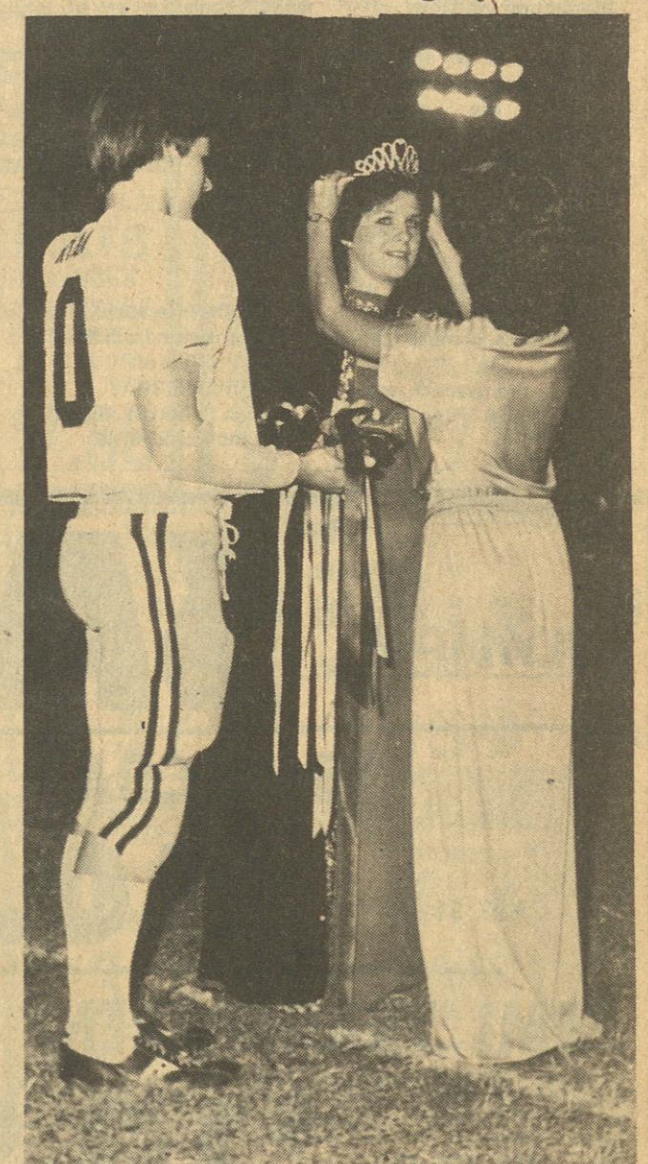
Newman said the Board of Economic Development, of

Chatting With Your Home Economist

Control Portions, Control Cost

Meat, poultry, fish and other protein sources are usually the most expensive foods. Cut your food costs by using moderate sized portions of these items. Compare the amount of lean meat, poultry and fish servings you

get per pound instead of just the cost per pound. If cuts have a lot of bone, skin and fat, you may save in buying boneless cuts even at a higher price per pound.

Prepared stews, spaghetti sauce and casseroles are convenient but you usually save money by making your own and freezing some for quick meals.

Special seasoning packages are expensive. Save money by seasoning your food at home.

Combine dried beans, peas, or lentils with chicken, fish or leftover meat. Addition of these animal-source proteins will give the dish the

best mixture for satisfying your body's protein needs. Use beans for filling, high protein appetizers, salads or in soups.

When substituting dried beans and peas for meat, remember pre-seasoned dried beans are more expensive.

Lean stew beef and lean chuck roast are good choices for ground meat. Buy "good" or "standard" grades of beef. They are the leanest and contain more protein and less fat than "prime" or "choice" grades.

Extend meat flavor and cut cost by serving meat with noodles and vegetables or other pasta or rice.

Self-basting turkeys may weigh more, but you pay for the basting fluid at the same rate as the turkey. In addition, most basting fats are highly saturated.

The larger the turkey or chicken, the more meat in relation to the bone and the more servings per pound.

Use turkey and chicken carcasses and bits of meat for soups.

Buy a whole chicken and cut it up yourself rather than buying chicken parts.

Use less expensive chicken parts in recipes that call for chicken breasts.

Bone your own chicken breasts.

Chicken, turkey and fish often cost less than beef or pork, and they have less fat and fewer calories. Fish fat is polyunsaturated.

Frozen fish often costs less than fresh.

Buy fish fillets and bread and fry them yourself to save money and assure the right kind of fat. Coatings on prepared fish sticks add to their weight, thus their cost.

Canned mackerel is less expensive than salmon or tuna and can be used in casserole dishes.

Use less expensive forms of tuna, such as flaked, in sandwiches and mixed dishes when appearance is not important. Flaked tuna costs less than chunks.

Buy pink and chum canned salmon. Sockeye and king salmon are more expensive.

Chicken Chow Bake

2 cups diced cooked chicken
1 (10 1/2 oz.) can condensed cream of mushroom soup
1 8-3/4 oz. can (1 cup) pineapple tidbits, drained
1 teaspoon soy sauce
1 cup thinly sliced celery
2 tbsp. chopped green pepper
2 tbsp. chopped green onion
1 (3-oz.) can (2 1/2 cups) chow mein noodles

Combine chicken, soup,

pineapple, soy sauce, celery and onion; mix well. Gently fold in 1 cup of the noodles. Turn into 1 1/2-quart casserole. Sprinkle with remaining noodles. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees) for 45 minutes or till bubbly. If desired, pass additional soy sauce. Makes 4 to 6 servings.

County Agent's Notes

GARDENS

Weatherwise, October is one of the best gardening months of the year. The peak summer temperatures have normally passed, thunderstorms with strong, damaging winds are less frequent, and the days are usually clear and bright. Of course, this is still hurricane season, so there are still chances for bad weather.

Winter squash and pumpkins should be ready for harvest by mid-October. Cut the fruits from the vines to prevent breaking off the stems; store them in a cool place, but do not stack them.

As the nights become cooler, warm-season vegetables take longer to mature. October brings the chance for first frost in north Mississippi. Be prepared to provide frost protection by covering.

Dig sweet potatoes when the soil is fairly dry. Do not let the freshly dug potatoes stay in the sun or get chilled in the night air.

Cut broccoli before the buds open into yellow flowers. Center heads on well grown plants should be at least 5 to 6 inches in diameter. Side sprouts that develop after the center heads are cut provide additional weeks of fresh broccoli.

Now is a good time to have your garden soil tested for lime requirements. Fall is also the best time to test for nematodes if you suspect a problem. Your county Extension office can provide information on these two tests. Do not allow late season weeds to go to seed. This year's seeds make next year's weeds.

Add all non-diseased garden plants to the compost pile. Compost is an excellent way to add organic matter to the garden soil and at the same time recycle plant nutrients. For information on making compost and other timely garden items see the Garden Tabloid available at your county Extension office.

HOUSEPLANTS

If your houseplants have been outdoors this summer, inspect them carefully for insects and disease before bringing them indoors. It is much easier to spray outdoors. Remember that some lower leaves will turn yellow and drop when they are brought back indoors. This is a natural response to the lower light level indoors.

Place the houseplants where they can receive sunny light during the winter months. Southern windows are ideal spots. East and west windows are second best for direct light during the winter.

ASCS REQUIRES FARMERS TO OBTAIN LOANS ON 1983 COTTON FOR PIK

Cotton Producers in Tishomingo County who are eligible to receive their payment-in-kind from Commodity Credit Corporation stocks will have to obtain price support loans on their 1983 production to satisfy 40 percent of their PIK needs, according to Howard R. Bridges, Chairperson of the Tishomingo County ASC Committee. The other 60 percent will come from cotton already in CCC's inventory.

Bridges said the loans will then be redeemed and sold to the CCC for PIK. Producers who have no 1983-crop cotton for harvest or those who had insufficient cotton for harvest to satisfy their PIK needs will receive their PIK from CCC stocks.

Tishomingo County's cotton producers need about 50 bales of their 1983 cotton crop to use as collateral which can be redeemed and sold to the CCC for PIK pur-



CARING FOR YOUR PET

ASCARIDS AND PINWORMS

Ascarids are large roundworms which affect young horses more than mature ones. The 6- to 12- inch long worms can number in the hundreds in the horse's small intestine, interfering with nutrition. Colic, coughing, and diarrhea may also result from ascarid infection. Infection is the result of the foal's eating hay, grass, or water contaminated with eggs which have been passed in the feces of other horses.

Foals should be first treated 8 weeks of age, then every 6 to 8 weeks later until they become yearlings, to adequately control ascarids.

Though less dangerous than other intestinal worms, pinworms are annoying to the horse because they cause severe anal itching. Adult worms crawl part way out if the anus to deposit eggs on the surface. This parasite is taken into the animal through contaminated water, hay, grain, or grass.

A characteristic of pinworm infection is rubbing of the tail and anal region - causing broken tail hairs and bare patches around the tail (rat tail).

Pinworms can be treated successfully with the drugs used for roundworm and strongyle infections. Brought to you as a public service from:



The daily bag limit on squirrels is eight and the possession limit is 16, but no possession limit on opening day. Hunting hours are one-half hour before sunrise until one-half hour after sunset.

Saturday, Oct. 15 is the opening day of the state's second dove season. It ends Nov. 6. Shooters must have their guns plugged and incapable of holding more than three shells at any one loading. Dove shooting hours one one-half hour before sunrise until sunset.

Rabbit season also opens Oct. 15 and will continue through Feb. 28.

Spina Bifida What Is It???

Each hour, new parents are informed that their baby has been born with Spina Bifida, the number onecrippler of newborns that is seven times more common than Muscular Dystrophy. Despite its frequency of occurrence, most people have never heard of this serious birth defect.

Spina Bifida is a defect of

the Spinal Column resulting from the failure of the spine to close properly during prenatal development. In severe cases, the spinal cord protrudes from the back. The condition results in varying degrees of paralysis, loss of sensation in the lower limbs and in bowel and bladder complications. Frequently Hydrocephalus is present at birth or occurs following surgical closure of the back, a condition which requires shunting. The cause of Spina

Bifida is not known.

Recent medical advances in the treatment of Spina Bifida have greatly improved the lives of babies born with the defect. Revolutionary surgical techniques and mechanical aids developed within the Past two decades now make it possible for the majority of children born with the condition to grow to adulthood and live happy, productive lives. Whereas 30 years ago, 80 percent of children born with the con-

dition died, 80 to 90 percent survive today.

The Chicago-Based Spina Bifida Association of America is a National network of over 100 local chapters dedicated to bringing the problems and needs of individuals persons with the defect, their families, friends and professionals who are involved in treating the condition. The goals of the SBAA are to provide information on progress in the areas of Medicine, Education, Legislation and financial support, to help fund research and medical facilities and to encourage the training of professionals involved in treatment.

Local SBAA Chapter Seeks Support

Spina Bifida-Hydrocephalus Association of North Mississippi is now a provisional chapter of SBAA. Ann Young of Booneville is acting president of the local chapter and mother of a 14-month-old son who is victim of this crippling birth defect.

Mrs. Young, a nurse by profession, states that the goals of this organization are: support and service for persons with Spina Bifida and their families; education of the public about Spina Bifida; and fund-raising activities for support of research into causes and treatments for Spina Bifida.

The local chapter is seeking persons--medical, professional, or any concerned citizen--who might be interested in joining the group. Dues are \$16 for local and national membership, including local and national newsletters. They are also looking for groups or persons who might make a donation; groups who would be willing to help with a fund-raising project, and any group or individual who would be willing to help make the public aware of the existence and effects of Spina Bifida.

Will We Stand Up For Decency?

The morals of our land seem to gradually be falling. They do not necessarily fall overnight, but over a few years, a gradual decline produces a drastic change. Our ability to become alarmed at gross immorality and indecencies also has diminished. People who used to get upset at sin now laugh at it. The Bible says that fools make a mock at sin (Proverbs 14:9). The television industry is one of the biggest culprits and their interest or often lack of interest in decency is determined by the dollar. It has become evident that the only way to clean up television is to put pressure on the companies who advertise and pay for the shows. They take our money and pay enormous amounts for indecent shows that are offensive to the majority of the public. This is an injustice to you and me.

The National Federation for Decency or the N.F.D. is headed up by Donald Wildmon, a Methodist minister who used to preach in this area. His paper will keep in-

terested people informed so that they can stand up and be heard for the sake of decency. This paper has done a tremendous amount of good in fighting filth on television. If you would like to subscribe to this informative although alarming paper, please check with me or your own minister.

Notice the following brief article on violence -- something of which we're all concerned. These quotes were made by Dr. Victor Cline, Ph.D., University of Utah, Dept. of Psychology, and published in the N.F.D., Sept. 1983, p. 11.

"Violence No. 1 Health Problem"

Violence is the nation's number one health problem -- So states Dr. Everett Koop in an address to the American Academy of Pediatrics. There are more homicides on just the island of Manhattan than all of England, Scotland and troubled Ireland combined. National Institute of Mental Health, May, 1982 reported that there is "overwhelming evidence of a causal relationship between violence on television and later aggressive behavior." Chances of a woman getting sexually attacked are seven times greater now than in 1933.
