According to the plant official, he was gone after a load of lumber when the 6:45 a.m. blaze occured. Mr. Massey said plant foreman, Vance Watson, was the first to report for work and Watson, along with one other employee, had entered the facility and turned on the electrical switch used to energize the equipment just a few minutes before the fire ignited. He said, "Vance Watson reported hearing a crackling sound as he turned walking toward the front of the building. When he turned to look, the whole spraying

Fire fighting equipment arriving on the scene included units from Golden, Tishomingo, Belmont, and the Banner Community truck. 

Here in Tishomingo County there have been no reports of death or serious injury from fire ant bites, but many tributed to the Imported Fire parents remain concerned Ant except one, according to about fire ant nests in their yards or in the children's play areas.

Brook recommends pouring an approved chemical directly onto the fire ant nest and allowing it to soak in. Warning children to stay away from the ant nests is also a good idea.

Sometimes just knocking down a small nest with the spray from a garden hose will be enough to force a colony of ants to move somewhere County

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grazing, they seem to crave some rough fiber material. Most crop residues suitable for cattle are usually high in fiber, but low in protein and energy. So, the cattle may need a feed supplement with minerals and other high quality feed. The feed value of the residue drops fairly rapidly as it stays in the field.

Cattle producers also can use "frosted" grass as feed for cattle. Cattle will eat lots of the frosted grass if it is available in late fall or early winter.

Caution is needed when cattle are fed frosted sorohum and other crops. Frost bursts the plant cells, releasing an acid which may cause cyanide poisoning in cattle. The poisoning potential varies among forages. Grain sorghum has the most potential followed by johnsongrass, sorghum-sudan and sudangrass.

The frosted plants can be fed safely if they are fermented as silage or cured as hay. They also are safe for cattle to graze after the plants have dried.

Protect Plants

Every year, homeowners lose young landscape plants to freezing weather. By fertilizing and mulching, you can protect plants from winter damage.

Use a fertilizer containing a 0-20-20 ratio of nutrients. This mixture contains no nitrogen, but does have phosphorus and potassium. The phosphorus encourages root growth while the potassium acts as antifreeze for the plant by lowering the freezing point of plant tissue.

Use the fertilizer at the rate of one pound per 100 square feet of planting area. Broadcast and spread the material evenly in the shrub bed or around young trees. Don't apply the fertilizer in a thick ring around the plant. This may damage the roots. Water the plants thoroughly after fertilizing.

Mulching is another way to protect plants from the winter's cold. Save leaves and pine straw as mulch. Mulch the planting beds and young trees with a four-to six-inch laver for winter protection.



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STRONGLYES Strongyles or "bloodworms" are dangerous

intestinal parasites of horses. This danger stems from the migration of the immature worms through the blood vessels of the intestine which causes inlammation and colic. The adult female lays eggs into the intestinal tract and they pass out these parasites and with the manure and should be decided upon thus infect pastures. following consultation

They change into larvae which stays on the grass until eaten by a horse. The young worms then migrate through the arteries and organs and eventually reach the intestine to begin a new life cycle.

Even though feeding may be good, horses with strongyles may loose condition, weaken. and have diarrhea. They

may become anemic from the parasites' sucking blood. Horses with large numbers of


larvae may appear to be in good condition. He may have an aneurysm or widenong of the blood vessel which can rupture and cause sudden death. Your veterinarian can check your horse for strongyles by looking at the feces under a microscope. Frequent deworming treatments are recommended to reduce the risk of serious problems from

Everyone recognizes the golden liquid honey displayed in bottles on market shelves. BUT HONEY COMES PACKAGED IN MANY OTHER WAYS, TOO.

Creamed honey is stocked on grocers shelves and honey butters are kept in the refrigerator section. Also available are attractive plastic squeeze bottles filled with liquid honey-just the thing for serving at the table. Economical 5-lb. containers of honey conveniently refill the squeeze bottles and are handy for other uses.

Comb honey is comb sections with honey. Chunk honey is pieces of comb in a container with liquid honey. Honey doesn't spoil. It

requires no refrigeration. Keep it handy on the kitchen shelf.

It is natural for liquid honey to crystallize. When it does, use the crystals as a spread or an ingredient in cooking and baking. But if you prefer the honey in liquid form, stand the container in a pan of moderately hot (not boiling) water until the honey crystals dissolve.

Honey may be used, measure for measure, in place of sugar in prepared puddings, custards, pie fillings, baked apples, candied and "sweet-sour" vegetables, salad dressings, and cinnamon toasts. Brushed or drizzled on ham during the last half hour of baking, honey adds flavor and gives a golden glaze.

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

Colds are spread by contact-not through the airaccording to Ernst Zander, M.D., Vice President, Medical Affairs of Lehn & Fink, a division of Sterling Drug Inc. "It is becoming more accepted that hand to hand contact, or hand to con-

taminated surface contact, and then rubbing the eyes or probing the nose is one principal mode of cold virus transmission.

Interruption of rhinovirus transmission by contact can be accomplished by frequent hand washing, keeping fingers out of eyes and nose, and disinfection of contaminated surfaces.

Treating contaminated surfaces with disinfectant should help reduce the chance of catching cold. Says Dr. Pascal J.

Imperato, Chairman of the Department of Preventive Medicine and Community Health, State University of New York: "Lysol disinfectant spray is effective in significantly reducing rhinovirus contamination on environmental surfaces.' This disinfectant spray

has been shown to kill most of the rhinovirus on contact when it is applied to contaminated hard surfaces.

Members were asked to bring a dish to contribute to the meal. After eating and socializing, the ceremony began.



The best way to avoid dangerous chimney fires this winter is to clean your chimney regularly, according to TVA and independent wood heater experts. Chimney sweeps recommend a good brushing at least once a season or when your chimney has a quarter-inch buildup of creosote.

'Chimneys, stovepipes, and even the inside of a wood heater must be cleaned when creosote builds up. It's a messy job but for the do-ityourselfer it's not hard to do with the proper tools," said Joan Wood, Tennessee Valley Authority (TVA) wood heater specialist.

"Professional chimney sweeps can also do the job for you. With the increasing popularity of wood heating, the chimney sweep is no longer a fanciful, antiquated character from the movies. You may see a modern-day chimney sweep on top of your neighbor's roof this season." Wood said.

"If you decide to hire a chimney sweep instead of tackling the job yourself, try to get at least two estimates," Wood said. Damage from chimney fires

costs American homeowners at least \$23 million a year. Many of the more than 40,000 fires that caused this damage resulted from creosote buildup which could have been prevented by routine chimney cleaning.

In addition to regular chimney cleaning, chimney sweeps and fire prevention


notifying the Youth Court. The jail has been provided with forms from the Youth Court to process individuals. The forms are filled out by the officers or the complaining party, forwarded to the Youth Court counselor who places them on the docket and forwards it to the prosecuting attorney, who in turn files a complaint with the Youth Court. Youth Court is held once a month on a regular basis on the fourth Tuesday of each month in the Tishomingo County Courthouse. Additional days of Court are held as needed. The **Tishomingo County Youth** Court averages six to ten cases per month. An additional function of the Youth Court will be to enforce the new school attendance law passed by the Mississippi legislature during the special session in December of 1982. Mr. Dewitt Bean has been hired as the School Attendance counselor and beginning immediately, the Youth Court will work very closely with him in his function as Tishomingo County School Attendance Counselor.
