ALLAIN ELECTED TO GOVERNOR'S OFFICE

BRAD DYE RE-ELECTED AS LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR

The unofficial returns from
the 41 Tishomingo County
precincts of Tuesday's
general election reveal that
area voters joined forces
state-wide in sending
Democratic nominee Bill
Allain to the state capital.

Allain handily won the
governor's race over
Republican nominee Leon
Bramlett with Tishomingo
County voters returning 2951
to Allain and 1253 to
Bramlett.

Independent candidates
vying for the governor's
office on the ballot included
Charles Evers, who received
45 votes; Billy Taylor, who
tallied 57 votes; and Helen
McMullen Williams, who
received 42 votes, locally.

In the Lieutenant Governor's
race, Democrat Brad
Dye easily defeated Independent
Gil Carmichael. County
voters approved 3346 ballots
for Dye, returning him to office;
while giving opposing
Independent candidate Carmichael
1077 votes.

Democrat Dick Molpus
scored a solid victory
Tuesday over Republican

Jerry Gilbreath in Mississippi's
General Election race for
Secretary of State. Within the
county, Molpus received 3455
votes; Gilbreath, 583 votes.

Democrat Ed Pittman
scored an easy victory over
Republican Roger Googe in
the race for Attorney General.
County voters returned 3596
votes to Pittman with 526
votes going to Googe.

Incumbent Northern
District Public Service
Commissioner D.W. Snyder won
re-election Tuesday.
Tishomingo County voters
approved Democrat Snyder
giving him an unofficial county
total of 3302. Independent
Ron Shapiro received 311
local votes in his bid for the
office.

In the Tishomingo County
Third District Supervisor's
race, Democrat nominee,
Lloye Yow was elected to office
with an unofficial 298
vote margin over Independent
candidate Tommy Lomenick.
Yow scored 754 votes,
whereas Lomenick received
456 votes.

voters; a total of 445 votes
were cast against the amendment.

amendment.

Controlling The **Urge To Splurge**

If you plan ahead, parties, special dinners, and holiday meals won't set your diet back. Get a head start by cutting down on calories before a big occasion. Then, adapt your diet to the situation.

Be wary of snacks, such as peanuts, pretzels, and chips, that are often served at parties. Either stay away from the snack tables or go easy and keep a check on how

much you eat. At a party in your own home, try having unbuttered popcorn or vegetable sticks with bean or cottage cheese dip. If drinks are included in your party plans, a good bet for fewer calories is a wine cooler made with sparkling water. Steer clear of dessert wines and mixed drinks, especially those made with sweetened mixers.

For special dinners, many low-calorie foods are elegant as well as fashionable. For example, start your dinner by serving fresh vegetables in a light vinegar-oil marinade. Feature an entree delicately seasoned with herbs or spices and served on a bed of whole-grain pilaf. Accompany the entree with a fresh, cooked vegetable, mixed salad greens drizzled with

fresh lemon juice, whole-grain bread, and fresh fruit cup for dessert.

With a little determination, you can endure Thanksgiving dinner without gaining weight. Just remember to eat everything in moderation and avoid second helpings. If you are the cook, you have extra control over the calories you'll be eating. So, use this power wisely. Remember to consider temptations before and after the meal as well as during it. For example, don't stop too early, don't spend days preparing the food, and don't devour the leftovers before getting them to the refrigerator.

Here are some ways to be festive with fewer calories:

-- Have a plain rather than a prebasted turkey so you can control the amount of fat used for basting.

-- Try flavoring mashed sweetpotatoes with orange juice instead of serving the typical rich sweetpotato casserole topped with marshmallows.

-- Moistened bread stuffing with turkey broth rather than butter or margarine. For extra flavor, try adding tart apples in addition to celery and onions.

-- In place of mincemeat or pumpkin pie, try a steamed pudding, such as cranberry or carrot.

Sweet Potatoes & Pork
8 pork chops, 1 to 1-1/2 inches thick
2 tablespoons cornstarch
1/2 cup brown sugar, packed
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 cups orange juice
2 tablespoons grated orange rind
4 medium sweet potatoes, sliced in half

Brown chops on both sides in skillet; transfer to baking dish. Cover and bake in moderate oven at 350° F. for 1 hour. Mix cornstarch, sugar and salt. Add to drippings in skillet. Gradually add orange juice and rind. Stir over medium heat until sauce boils and thickens. Place one potato on each chop. Pour sauce over the chops. Continue baking uncovered 30 minutes, basting frequently. Makes 8 servings.

USDA Announces
1984 Upland Cotton
Program

John R. Block announces a 25 percent acreage reduction program for the 1984 crop of upland cotton, with a program sign-up period from January 16 - February 24, 1984, the same as for the wheat and feed grains programs.

Block said an acreage reduction program for upland cotton is needed to prevent ending stocks from rising to excessive levels. "With the payment-in-kind program, we have made excellent progress in bringing cotton supplies into line with demand," Block said. "We urge farmers to cooperate once more in an effort to avoid burdensome production and low prices."

To be eligible for price support benefits, producers must agree to limit upland cotton planted acreage to not more than 75 percent of their cotton acreage base. An acreage of cropland equal to 33.33 percent of the cotton planted acreage must be devoted to approved uses.

Upland cotton price support provisions include a base loan rate for Strict Low Middling 1-1/16 inch cotton, micronaire 3.5-4.9, of 55 cents per pound and the minimum target price allowed by law. The current statutory minimum target price for the 1984 crop is 81 cents per pound. Other 1984 upland cotton program provisions include:

--The 1984 acreage base will be the average of the acres planted and considered planted to upland cotton in 1982 and 1983.

-- Land designated for conservation use must have been devoted to row crops or small grains in two of the last three years, except for a summer fallow farm. In the case of summer fallow, conservation use acreage must be land that would have been planted to small grains or row crops in 1984 in the absence of the 1984 upland cotton program. The land must be protected from wind and water erosion throughout the year.

-- Offsetting and cross compliance will not apply to the 1984 program.

-- No advance deficiency payments.

-- Recourse loans will be available for seed cotton in 1984. The loan rate for seed cotton will be the same as the loan rate applicable to lint cotton adjusted to a lint basis. Recourse means that the borrower must repay the full dollar amount of the loan plus accrued interest.

-- Contracts signed by program participants will be considered as binding and

Soil Testing Necessary

Now is the time to test your soil. Collect the samples throughout November, December and January to get faster service and have the results of the soil tests in time to serve as a guide for buying and applying fertilizer.

Soil testing is important because it indicates the amount of lime and fertilizer needed on each field. Proper use of fertilizer and lime helps insure high yields and greater returns from each acre.

The soil is tested for pH level, nitrogen, phosphorous, potash, calcium, magnesium, zinc, manganese, organic matter and total soluble salt content.

Also, because they can stay in the eye longer, they do not have to be cleaned as often. One does not remove contact lenses to clean them; one cleans them because one has had to remove them. A soft contact lens that remains in place on the eye is simply not exposed to most contaminants.

"Think On These Things"

Our homes and families mean a great deal to all of us. The homes we've come from or the homes we are a part of

for the presence or absence of love, happiness, and Christ. It takes hard work to have a good home. I found an interesting article written by Dick Marcear that we all need to read.

Don't Divorce! Work Harder!!

You would expect this kind of advice from a preacher, right? But this is not the advice of some religious fanatic, but from couples who divorced and then wish they hadn't.

In the September 1982 issue of FAMILY LIFE TODAY magazine there was an interesting report from Dr. Mavis Hetherington, professor of psychology at the University of Virginia. In a study of divorce involving 144 couples who had been divorced for one year, most men and women said they felt they should have worked harder at their marriage.

The figures were these: 63% of the men and 73% of the women felt they had made a mistake, and could have worked out their

problems. How tragic that these marriages could have been saved if the people involved had only worked harder.

Two Observations:
1. ALL MARRIAGES HAVE PROBLEMS. Do not think that you are the only couple who have ever had troubles. Commit yourself to working through the problem.

2. NEVER CONSIDER DIVORCE AN OPTION:

When you took your wedding vows you promised, "... for better or for worse ... till death do us part." Just because people of the world are divorcing every time some problem arises does not mean it's right. The couples in the survey mentioned above overwhelmingly wished they had worked it out rather than divorce. God set up the family for you to stay married. Jesus said, "... what God has joined together, let man not separate" (Matthew 19:6).

A RESOLUTION DECLARING THE INTENTION OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF TISHOMINGO COUNTY, MISSISSIPPI TO ISSUE A PROMISSORY NOTE ON BEHALF OF THE TISHOMINGO COUNTY SCHOOL DISTRICT TO RAISE MONEY FOR THE PURPOSE OF REFUNDING A PORTION OF A PRIOR PROMISSORY NOTE ISSUE AND FOR THE FURTHER PURPOSE OF MAKING REPAIRS, ALTERATIONS AND ADDITIONS TO SCHOOL BUILDINGS OF SAID SCHOOL DISTRICT AND DIRECTING PUBLICATION OF NOTICE OF SUCH INTENTION.

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of the Tishomingo County School District, by resolution, has requested this Board of Supervisors to issue a Promissory Note in the principal sum of \$132,000 for and on behalf of said School District, to raise money for the purpose of refunding the outstanding balance of a Promissory Note previously issued on behalf of said School District and for the further purpose of making repairs, alterations and additions to school buildings of said School District, at an estimated cost of \$132,000; and

WHEREAS, the amount above specified is not now available in the treasury of said School District to provide for the aforesaid expenditures; and

WHEREAS, this Board of Supervisors is authorized by the provisions of §37-59-101 through §37-59-115, Mississippi Code, 1972, Annotated, to issue a Promissory Note for the aforesaid purpose; and

WHEREAS, it appears that said Board has previously issued on behalf of said School District and now has outstanding, only one Promissory Note under the provisions of the aforesaid law and that the same was dated September 1, 1980, in the original principal sum of \$160,000 upon which there is an unpaid balance to principal and interest of \$80,146.06 and that it further appears that a lower interest rate will be secured on the note previously issued and outstanding and that it is necessary to refund that portion outstanding with a portion of the proceeds of the issue herein to be authorized; and

WHEREAS, this Board does further find and determine that it is necessary and in the public interest that said Promissory Note, on behalf of said School District, be issued as hereinafter set forth.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF TISHOMINGO COUNTY, MISSISSIPPI, as follows:

SECTION 1. That the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, hereby declares its intention to issue a Promissory Note on behalf of the Tishomingo County

School District in the amount of \$132,000 to raise money for the purpose of refunding a portion of a previous and outstanding Promissory Note issue and for the further purpose of making repairs, alterations and additions to school buildings of said School District.

SECTION 2. That the said Promissory Note, in the amount and for the purpose aforesaid, will be issued at a meeting of said Board of Supervisors to be held at 10 o'clock A.M. on Monday the 28th day of November, 1983. If, twenty percentum (20%) of

the qualified electors of the Tishomingo County School District shall file a written protest against the issuance of said Note for the aforesaid purpose on or before the aforesaid date and hour, then an election on the question of the issuance of said Note shall be called and held as provided by law. If no such protest be filed, then said Note shall be issued without an election on the question of the issuance thereof.

SECTION 3. That this resolution shall be published one each week for two consecutive weeks in the "Tishomingo County News," a newspaper published and of general circulation in Tishomingo County, and which is a qualified newspaper under the provisions of §13-3-31, Mississippi Code, 1972, Annotated. The first publication of this resolution shall be made not less than fifteen (15) days prior to the aforesaid date.

SECTION 4. That the Clerk of this Board shall be and is hereby directed to procure from the publishers of the aforesaid newspaper the customary Proof of Publication of this resolution and to have the same before this Board on the date specified in Section 2 of this resolution.

purchased from the shop by the Auxiliary and offered to the public, not at a price, but for a contribution... a few cents to say America remembers.

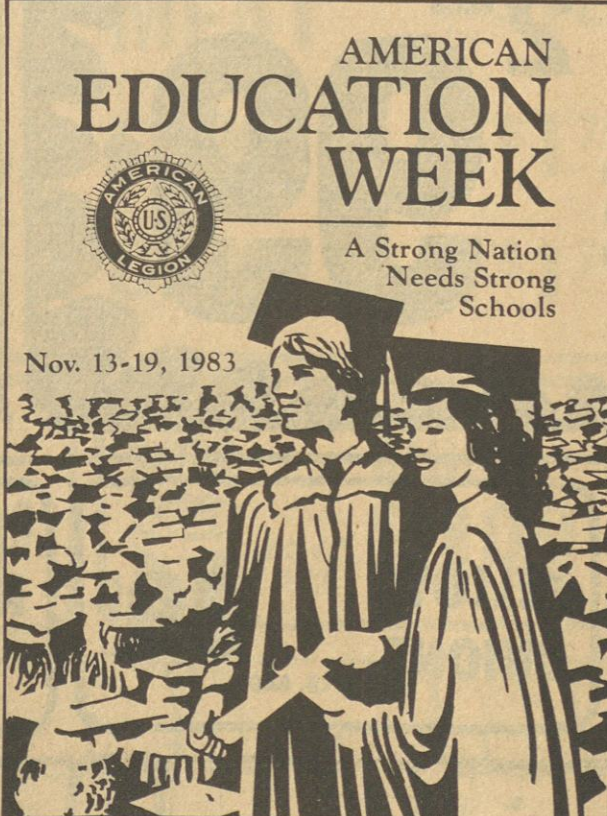
All contributions made on Poppy Day are channeled directly into rehabilitation and welfare work to aid needy veterans and their families.

AMERICAN EDUCATION WEEK, NOVEMBER 13-19 IN IUKA SCHOOLS

American Education Week was initiated after World War I draft boards discovered that about 25 percent of the draftees were illiterate and about 29 percent were physically unfit. In 1917, the American Legion, the National Education Association, and the U.S. Office of Education discussed launching an educational campaign to correct such deficiencies. As a result a series of conferences began on a regular basis in 1919, leading to a plan for an annual nationwide observance of American Education Week and to the first AEW observance in 1921.

Early AEW programs featured daily topics based on fundamental concepts of educational purposes and objectives. From 1929 through 1968 representatives of the sponsoring organizations chose a general theme with supporting daily topics. Beginning in 1969, the co-sponsors chose a general theme of national concern for each year. This year's theme is "A Strong Nation Needs Strong Public Schools."

Hunting Laws On Divide Section

The Mississippi Depart-
ment of Wildlife Conser-
vation, Bureau of Fisheries
and Wildlife announces the
following hunting seasons for
Tishomingo and Prentiss
Counties in the Divide Sec-
tion Wildlife Management
Area.

Deer - No Season; Turkey -
No Season; Squirrel - Oct. 15 -
Jan. 15; daily bag limit - 8,
possession - 16; rabbit - Oct.
15 - Feb. 28, daily bag limit - 8,
possession - 16; quail - Nov.
24 - Feb. 28, daily bag limit -
12, possession, 24; raccoon,
opossum - Nov. 5 - Dec. 2,
daily bag limit - 1 per day, 2
per party, 2 in possession;
bobcat - Dec. 3 - Feb. 12, no
limit; trapping, Dec. 3 - Feb.
12, no limit, must have permit
from Area Manager.

Special instructions are as
follows: Checking Stations:
All hunters must check in and
out daily. Open one hour
before sunrise to one hour after
sunset; Guns: No shot
larger than No. 4 shall be
allowed on the area, or rifles
over rimfire. 22 caliber; Dogs:
Dogs will not be allowed on
the area during closed
seasons.

Other reservations and
restrictions: Raccoon hunters
must obtain permit from area
manager before each hunt.
No live trees shall be cut. No
nails, spikes or wire will be
allowed in constructing tree
stands. Roads closed by
gates and signs will be open
to foot traffic only unless
otherwise authorized. Season
listings: No other seasons
shall be open and no other
animals shall be hunted or
molested without written
permission from area
manager. All hunters must
obtain a daily hunting permit
at one of the self-service
stations. This permit must be
filled out and displayed on
the dash of the vehicle so that
the name and address side is
visible from outside. (Before
leaving the area, hunters
must record the number of

game harvested and deposit
the permit in the drop box at
one of the self-service
stations. No camping is
allowed.

Basic regulations are as
follows:

Safety Precautions: Rules
of gun safety shall be ob-
served and hunters will not ob-
struct roads. Target shooting
prohibited and NO hunting or
shooting within 200 yards of
any buildings. No firearms
shall be permitted on
management areas during the
closed season on game birds
and animals. Firearms with
ammunition in the barrel or
magazine or clip shall not be
carried on public roads or
transported in vehicles. Public
roads are any roads main-
tained by state or federal
funds and no hunting is
allowed from these roads. It
is illegal to hunt from any
vehicle in motion. Hunter
orange is required in all open
gun seasons on deer.

Forfeiture of Hunting
Privileges: No alcoholic
beverages allowed. Persons
intoxicated or careless with
firearms shall be expelled
from hunts immediately. Any
person violating any rules or
regulation adopted by the
Commission may be required
by the area manager to forfeit
the privilege of hunting for
the remainder of the license
year, or by the Commission
for a period of one year and
shall be liable for and subject
to prosecution and fines as
provided by law.

Any dogs on area during
closed seasons will be
caught and impounded.
Violation of dog regulations
can result in forfeiture of hun-
ting privileges.

Shooting hours for all
upland game except raccoon
and opossum shall be from
thirty (30) minutes before
sunrise to thirty (30) minutes
after sunset.

The above regulations are
in addition to State Law and
special restrictions on each
area.

cup plus 2 tablespoons and
buttermilk to 2/3 cup;
reduce baking powder to
1/2 teaspoon.

Coffee Whipped Topping.
Dissolve 2 teaspoons instant
quality or decaffeinated cof-
fee in 2 tablespoons water.
Fold into one 4-oz. contain-
er (2 cups) frozen whipped
topping, thawed.

Midway R.C.D.C.

The Midway R.C.D.C. met at the Community Center on October 24, at 7:30 p.m. The Club President Edward Wynn called the meeting to order. Mrs. Francis Goldsmith gave the devotion taken from I Cor. 13:5. Mrs. Myrtle McKee, leader for the month, introduced special guest speaker, Tommy Purvis.

Mr. Purvis made an interesting talk and showed informative slides on the basic tips for rooting azalea and Rhododendrons. Among the tips were the right tools needed, the size, preparation and planting the cuttings, also the kind of rooting medium to use. He gave three mixtures that could be used to root the cuttings: (1) 1/2 sand, 1/2 peat moss; (2) 1/2 Vermiculite, 1/2 sand, 1/2 peat moss; (3) 1/2 sand, 1/2 peat moss and 1/2 perlite. Put the mixture of your choice into a wood box, wood frame or large pots. Mr. Purvis said take the cuttings of the azalea in May or June. The cuttings should be four or five inches long taken from new growth that will snap like a green bean. Dip the cut in rooting hormone, make a hole

in the rooting medium with a stick, insert cutting and firm the soil. Be sure the soil is damp, cover the frame or box with plastic. The cuttings should root in about six to eight weeks, and ready to pot in September or you may wait until spring. Mr. Purvis said Rhododendrons can be rooted in July and August using the same method as the azalea except the leaves need to be cut back to 1/2 or more. One inch strip of bark should be removed from the end of the cutting before dipping in the rooting hormone. Label all cuttings when planting. When the cuttings are rooted, open the plastic for hardening, and gradually expose to the light.

A question and answer session followed the slide presentation.

Refreshments were served at the conclusion of the program. The next meeting will be the annual Harvest Supper to be held at the Community Center on November 28th at 6 p.m. Members are asked to bring a well-filled basket of food. Visitors are always welcome.

Do my physicians and pharmacist now know that I am currently using the medicine?

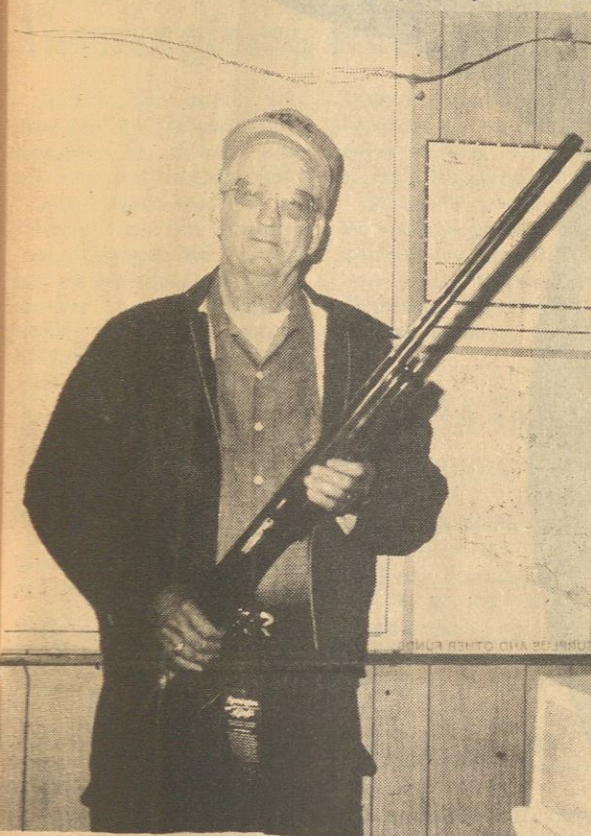
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Fish Tales

POINT OF LAW

(Prepared by the

Mississippi State Bar. Some legal rights may vary from locality to locality. Always consult an attorney when in doubt about your rights.)

Q: I was granted custody of our daughters after my husband and I were divorced. When he and his new wife picked them up for a weekend recently, I told him I wanted them returned at a specific time two days later. Am I entitled to make such a demand and must he abide by my wishes?

A: If your divorce decree sets forth specific times for him to visit with the children, then such times are binding. If your divorce decree specified visitation at reasonable times, you may make such a request, but if your ex-husband refuses to abide by it, you may have to ask the court to modify the visitation schedule to provide for set times.

Q: I have been living with my boyfriend for two years. We consider ourselves husband and wife and tell everyone we are married, but as far as tax reports are concerned, should partners of a common-law marriage be filing as married or singles?

A: In Mississippi, common-law marriages are not recognized, and have not been recognized by law since 1956. Under Mississippi law, each of you is considered a single person.
