#### County Students Included In Who's Who

A total of 97 students from this area have been included in the 17th annual edition of WHO'S WHO AMONG AMERICAN HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS, 1982-83.

WHO'S WHO, published by Educational Communications, Inc., Lake Forest, Ill., is the largest high school recognition publication in the country. Students are selected by high school principals and guidance counselors, national youth groups, churches or by the publishing company based upon students' performance in scholarship award contests or extracurricular activities.

Final selection is determined on the basis of criteria, which include high achievement in academics and leadership in school activities, athletics or community service. Traditionally, 99% of WHO'S WHO students have a grade point average of "B" or better and 97% are college bound.

The 17th edition of WHO'S WHO, published in nine regional volumes, features 375,000 students, or 5% of the nation's 6,500,000 high school juniors and seniors. They represent 18,000 of the 22,000 public, private and parochial high schools in the country.

WHO'S WHO students also compete for over \$50,000 in scholarship awards and participate in the publication's annual opinion poll of teen attitudes.

## 2 VEHICLE CRASH CLAIMS LIFE OF LEADING CITIZEN



LAMAR UMFRESS

Mississippi Highway 365 was the scene of a tragic accident Thursday afternoon, December 1, which claimed the life of one of Tishomingo County's outstanding and well-loved citizens.

Samuel Lamar Umfress, 61, of Burnsville, was killed in the early afternoon mishap that occurred around 1 p.m. when his car collided with an 18-wheeler truck. Umfress was Vice-President of the First American National Bank in Iuka, and the manager of the Burnsville Branch.

According to investigating Mississippi Highway Patrol Trooper, Ralph Montgomery, Umfress was traveling south when he attempted to make a left turn onto the Mt. Gilead Road. James McDuffie, 43, of Lafayette, La., could not stop his 18-wheeler truck in time to avoid Umfress' vehicle, he

said. McDuffie was uninjured, Montgomery said.

Umfress was a member of the Clausel Hill Methodist Church and a lifelong resident of Tishomingo County. He was a member of the Burnsville Lion's Club.

Services were conducted Saturday at the Cutshall Funeral Home Chapel with Rev. W.E. Sharp officiating. Burial was in New Lebanon Cemetery.

Survivors include his wife, Mrs. Ollie Umfress, of Burnsville; two daughters, Mrs. Sandra Wadkins of Burnsville, and Mrs. Teresa Dawson, of Cleveland, Tenn.; two sons, Sherrell Umfress and Samuel Ray Umfress, both of Burnsville; two sisters, Mrs. Maxine Wade, of Iuka, and Mrs. Mae Sims, of Florence, Ala.; and four grandchildren.

## 19 YEAR OLD CHARGED WITH DEATH OF FATHER

Carolyn Nunley, 19, of Iuka, has been arrested and charged with murder following the shooting death of her father, Furnie Nunley, 49, also of Iuka. Ms. Nunley was released from the county jail following the posting of a \$25,000 bond.

According to police officers, the incident took place early Saturday night. Officer Terry Sherron said that Ms. Nunley had contacted the Department about 8:15 p.m. that night and indicated there was trouble at her home.

City police officers responded to the call, assisted by county law officials, and found the victim lying face down on the couch in his daughter's apartment, located at 8A Riverside Apartments. Nunley was bleeding from apparent gunshot wounds and having difficulty breathing.

He was transported by ambulance to Tishomingo County Hospital and later transferred to the Magnolia Hospital in Corinth, where he died early Sunday morning.

Nunley was reportedly wounded in the head and both arms with a .25 caliber pistol.

Police Chief Joel Holliman said Ms. Nunley issued a statement to officers about the incident.

Investigations continue in the case; however, the spokesman said Ms. Nunley has been charged with murder, released on \$25,000 bond and now awaits action of the grand jury.

Funeral services for Furnie Nunley, Jr. were conducted Tuesday, December 6, at Cutshall Funeral Home Chapel with Rev. S.A. Bonds officiating. Burial was in Providence Cemetery.

Survivors include three daughters, Cathy Barber, of San Antonio, Texas, Carolyn Nunley, of Iuka, and Crystal

Nunley, of Iuka; two sons, Chris Nunley and Corey Nunley, of Iuka; four sisters, Audie Crowell, of Iuka, Evelyn Little, of Colorado, Rebecca Gentry, of Iuka, and Barbara Puckett, of Iuka; five brothers, Earl Nunley, Olan Nunley, J.B. Nunley, Tommy Nunley, Johnny Nunley, all of Iuka; his step-mother, Maudie Nunley, of Iuka; and one grandchild.

## Chatting With Your Home Economist

Stretch Your Food Dollar  
By Preparing Your  
Own Mixes

Master Baking Mix  
8 cups unsifted all-purpose  
flour  
1/2 cup double-acting baking  
powder

1 tablespoon salt  
2 tablespoons sugar  
1 1/2 cups nonfat dry milk  
1 3/4 cups lard (or 2 cups  
vegetable shortening)

Spoon flour into measuring  
cup. Level off at the one cup  
mark but don't shake or pack  
the flour. If you do, you'll get  
too much flour, and anything  
made from the mix will be dry  
and heavy. Measure the  
baking powder, salt, sugar,  
and nonfat dry milk and add  
to the measured flour. Stir  
and sift these dry ingredients  
together until well mixed.  
Measure the lard or shortening

tening and add to the dry  
ingredients. Cut in the lard or  
shortening until the fat is so  
finely blended you can't tell it  
from the flour. Store in a cool  
dry place in a large covered  
jar or can. Makes 12 cups of  
mix.

### MASTER MIX BISCUITS

2 cups Master Mix  
1/2 to 3/4 cup water or milk

Dip out 2 cups of the  
Master Mix and put into bowl.  
Add about 1/2 cup water or  
milk. Stir with a fork. Add  
more water or milk until the  
dough is just wet enough to  
leave the sides of the bowl  
and form a ball. Turn dough  
out onto a floured surface (a  
dough board, a clean towel,  
counter, or table top). Shape  
into ball with hands. Smooth  
up ball of dough with hands  
in this way. Pick up the far  
side of the dough and fold  
over top of ball. Press down  
with palm of hand. Turn  
dough a quarter turn. Pick up  
far side of dough, fold over,  
press down, and turn dough.  
Repeat these steps 10 times.  
Flatten dough until it is a little  
less than one-half inch  
thick. You can use a rolling  
pin, a clean bottle, or hands  
to flatten the dough. Cut out  
biscuits with a biscuit cutter  
or the top of a glass... or cut  
with a knife to make square  
biscuits. Place on an  
ungreased pan and bake at  
450 degrees F. for 12 to 15  
minutes or until lightly  
browned. Makes 10-12  
biscuits. Note: For variation  
prepare cheese biscuits by  
adding one cup of grated  
cheese to the two cups of  
Master Mix.

### MASTER MIX YELLOW CAKE

1 1/2 cups Master Mix  
1/2 cup sugar  
1/2 cup water or milk  
1 egg  
1/2 teaspoon vanilla

Add sugar to mix. Beat egg  
slightly and combine with  
water or milk. Add one-half of  
liquid to dry ingredients and  
beat 2 minutes on medium  
speed of electric mixer or 300  
strokes by hand. Add  
remaining liquid and beat for  
1 minute. Pour into greased  
and floured 8 x 9 inch pan.  
Bake at 375 degrees F. for  
about 25 minutes.

## Duck Days Dec. 10, 11

Mississippi's first water-  
fowl season will get off the  
ground next weekend, even  
though it will be a short one.  
The season opens Saturday,  
Dec. 10 and extends through  
Dec. 11, according to the  
Department of Wildlife Con-  
servation.

At the same time there will  
be a brief two-day hunting  
season on Canada Geese  
within the Sardis Reservoir  
Zone only in north Mississippi.  
The dates are Dec. 10 and  
11.

The second duck season  
opens Dec. 15, and the  
second goose season in the  
Sardis Zone opens Dec. 14.

Mississippi duck hunters  
will be harvesting waterfowl  
this year using the point  
system. This allows hunters a  
legal daily limit of birds worth  
100 points. The limit is  
reached when the last bird  
taken and added to the birds  
in the bag, reaches or exceeds  
100 points. The possession  
limit is two legal daily limits,  
except on opening day.

Birds this year worth 100  
points are: black duck and  
canvasback. Ducks valued at  
70 points are: female mallard,  
redhead, wood duck, hooded  
merganser.

Waterfowl worth 25 points  
are: male mallard, mottled  
duck, ring-necked duck, all



THE NESTING SEASON for  
woodducks is almost here.  
You can help these beautiful  
waterfowl by placing artificial  
nesting boxes along ponds,  
creeks, sloughs, and beaver

ponds. For more information  
on building and erecting  
these nesting boxes contact

ducks not specifically listed  
here.

The following are 10 point  
ducks: pintail, gadwall, teal,  
shoveler, scaup, mergansers  
(except hooded), widgeon.

Shooting hours for water-  
fowl are one-half hour before  
sunrise until sunset. Various  
state waterfowl shooting  
areas and inland reservoirs  
have varying hours.

State enforcement  
authorities are reminding  
hunters that they should have  
their shotguns plugged and  
incapable of holding more  
than three shells at one  
loading.

Hunters 16 years of age  
and over are required to pur-  
chase a \$7.50 federal duck  
stamp. In addition, hunters  
between 16 and 65 must have  
a \$2 state duck stamp.

Of course a valid hunting  
license is also necessary.  
Resident hunters will find  
that they can hunt ducks and  
geese with either the \$25  
sportsman's license, the \$13  
all game hunting and fishing  
license, the \$9 small game  
hunting and fishing license,  
or the \$6 small game license.

State conservation officials  
are asking hunters this year  
to be especially careful. The  
black duck is a 100 point bird.

According to the Depart-  
ment of Wildlife Conserva-  
tion the black duck has  
been declining in population  
for more than 20 years. The  
duck, which looks much like  
the female mallard, is often  
found together in large con-  
centrations of mallards.

### Protect Children

Tractors and children don't  
mix. Every year small children  
are killed as a result of falling  
from the tractor.

Keep small children away  
from tractors and other  
dangerous equipment. Trac-  
tors are designed to carry  
only one person - the driver.

The chances of a child  
being seriously injured are  
just as great when they are  
allowed to ride on trailing  
equipment.

### Limit Graze For Best Results

With good grazing condi-  
tions, it's tempting to turn  
brood cows on good grass  
full-time and not be concern-  
ed with limit grazing. Fields  
that are growing well can be  
grazed off quickly with the  
onset of poor growing con-  
ditions.

If cattle are turned into  
pasture full-time, there is a  
good chance that total forage  
between now and spring will  
be greatly reduced. The best  
use of expensive winter  
pasture is to allow brood  
cows to graze only a limited

## How To Read The Wrapping Paper

For The Real Message  
Behind A Gift

Gift giving is one of  
mankind's most powerfully  
significant gestures. History  
and literature are filled with  
tales of gifts that have  
changed the lives of men and  
women.

The expression, "Beware  
of Greeks bearing gifts,"  
stems from the ironic con-  
clusion of the Trojan War --  
Greek soldiers stowed away  
in the body of a large wooden  
horse delivered to the gates  
of Troy as an apparent token  
of surrender. In THE NEW  
TESTAMENT, wise men  
brought gold, frankincense,  
and myrrh to a Baby in a  
Bethlehem stable. The Dutch  
West India Company gave  
trinkets and beads to the  
Manhattan Indians in ex-  
change for an obscure island.  
Impressionist Vincent Van  
Gogh literally lent an ear to  
the lady he loved. And the  
French gave Lady Liberty to  
the American people.

"People in all cultures give  
gifts," observed well-known  
psychologist Dr. Tom Cottle  
during an interview on NBC-  
TV's TODAY SHOW. Speak-  
ing on the psychology of  
giving and receiving gifts,  
he noted, "We're either com-  
plimenting somebody or  
we're reciprocating. But it's a  
very elaborate set of issues.  
Ultimately, we give gifts to  
make an attachment, a bond,  
an exchange, or to create a  
coming together of people."

"Sometimes we can't help  
placing deep psychological  
meaning on gifts. They can  
leave one feeling delighted or  
disappointed, loved and un-  
derstood, or insulted and em-  
barrassed," added Dr. Cottle.  
"On the other hand, it's unfair  
to deny the giver the pleasure  
he or she derives in making  
the gesture."

"People invariably select  
inappropriate gifts because  
they're often in too great a

rush to think carefully about  
who they're really shopping  
for," says Robert McKay,  
Regional Public Affairs  
Manager for The Sperry and  
Hutchinson Company, Inc.  
"Some department stores  
actually hire psychologists  
who train their sales staff to  
counsel customers during the  
Christmas rush and steer  
them away from buying gifts  
that will only result in time-  
consuming returns or ex-  
changes," adds McKay.

Below are some hints to  
giving presents that might  
best reflect what you mean to  
say this holiday season:

\* Give a gift that says "You  
are special to me" -- don't  
look at gift giving out of a  
sense of etiquette or duty.

\* Show an awareness of  
the sensitivity to a friend's or  
a loved one's individual  
tastes -- too often we give  
what we would personally like  
to receive rather than taking  
time to find out what that  
person really likes or enjoys.

\* Set a realistic budget  
before you start and stick to  
it. Christmas is for sharing  
warm thoughts and good  
feelings -- not for going into  
debt.

\* Give with no strings at-  
tached. Don't use a gift as a  
bribe or a payment that will  
impose gratitude or future  
obligation on the recipient.

\* Don't be afraid to express

## INSIGHT INTO EYESIGHT

### COSMETIC AND TINTED LENSES

There is some general  
confusion concerning  
cosmetic and tinted len-  
ses. Actually, they are  
two quite distinct en-  
tities. Purely cosmetic  
contact lenses are used  
to change eye color.

Larger than standard  
lenses, cosmetic lenses  
cover almost the entire  
cornea in order to mask  
the natural iris color. The  
hard plastic lens is  
opaquely painted -- with  
almost any color or pat-  
tern desired -- and a clear  
central pupil is left  
through which one sees.  
Aside from fashion,  
there are a number of  
medical-cosmetic ap-  
plications for these len-  
ses. They can be used,  
for example, to cover a  
disfigured cornea that  
has become scarred or

opaque. In such cases,  
the lens is painted to  
match the undamaged  
eye.

Tinted lenses, on the  
other hand, are usually  
not chosen for color  
change but to reduce  
glare and to make the  
lens more visible when it  
is out of the eye. They  
are lightly tinted, trans-  
lucent, and have no  
clear central pupil.

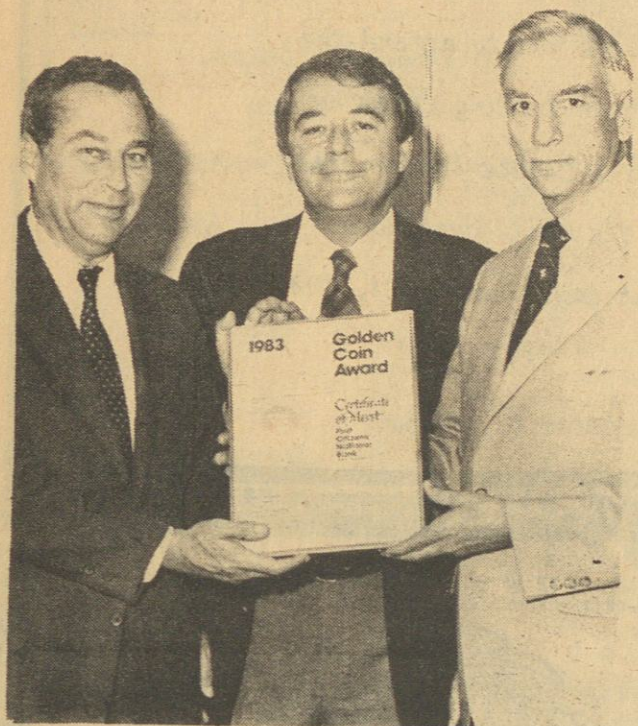

Young Citizen Awards program which honors outstanding young people in Northeast Mississippi.

The bank's youth recognition program was one of only ten entries selected for an award in this year's Golden Coin competition and one of only two entries selected in the community affairs category. Awards are given annually by the Bank Marketing Association to member banks whose community affairs or marketing programs demonstrate outstanding professionalism. ### More Accidents On Local Roads

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration has reported that a large number of highway accidents actually occur on local roads. The

national local roads carry only 13.1 percent of all highway traffic, but account for 25.1 percent of all accidents.

According to the National Accident Sampling System, on rural roads with a speed limit of 55 mph, the accident

rate is 141 per 100 vehicle miles traveled; fatality rate is 3.8. For roadways with limits of 25 mph or less, the accident rate is 3.25 million vehicle miles and the fatality rate is 1.2.

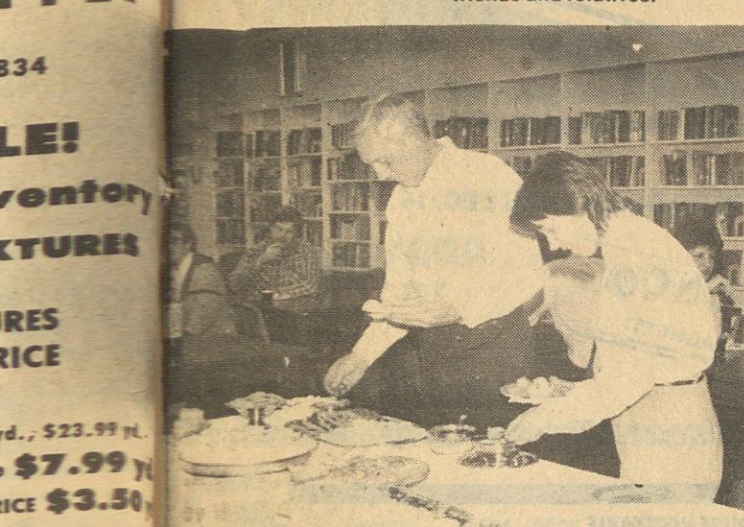

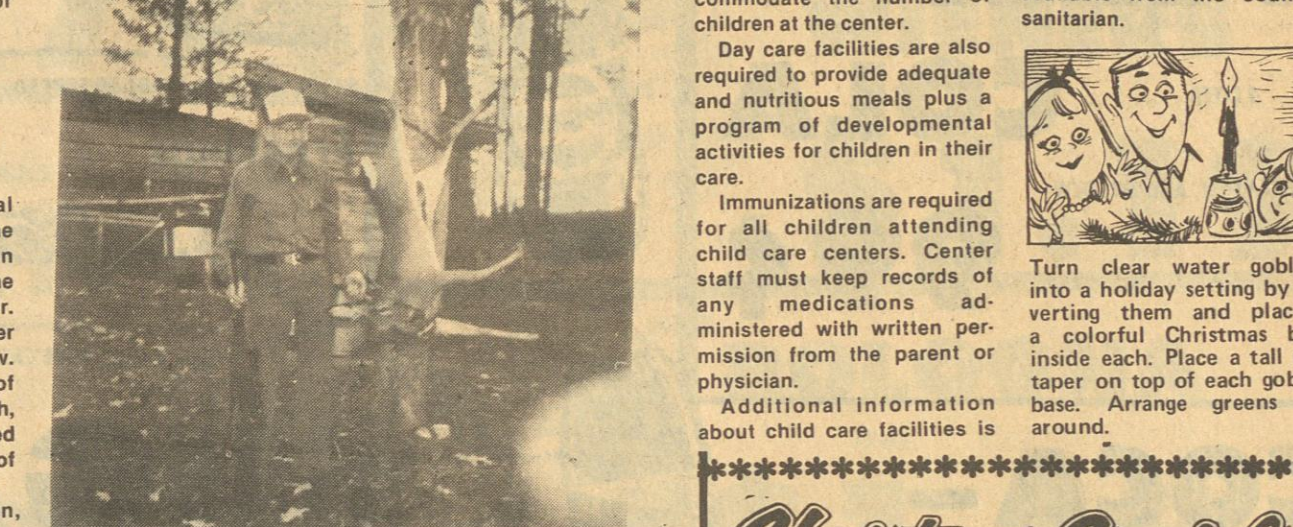

"The standard - the Mississippi Child Care Licensing Act of 1972 - requires that centers measure up or be closed."

## USDA To Sell Corn To Drought-Affected Farmers

Deputy Secretary of Agriculture, Richard E. Long, announced on November 30 an emergency feed assistance program to distribute Commodity Credit Corporation-owned lower grade corn to livestock producers whose feed harvest suffered because of drought, hot weather or related disaster.

To be eligible to buy corn,

livestock producers must be located in a county designated by the U.S. Department of Agriculture as a disaster area due to drought and must have received an emergency Farmers Home Administration loan or be eligible to receive one.

There are approximately 27 million bushels of U.S. No. 4, U.S. No. 5 and Sample grade corn that will be sold to eligible livestock producers. The bulk of this corn is located in Texas, Iowa, Minnesota, Nebraska and Illinois. The cost to eligible producers will be 75 percent of the current basic county loan rate for the average quality of available corn in the county where the corn is stored. Producers are responsible for transportation costs to move the corn to their farms.

Producers also need to show that their feed production is inadequate to maintain foundation livestock and poultry during the remainder of the current 90-day feeding period, which begins the day

a farmer applies for assistance.

A signup period will be held from Dec. 6 through Dec. 14 at the Tishomingo Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, which also will provide producers a list of counties where they may choose to pick up their grain.

Producers should contact ASCS offices for program details and applications for assistance, beginning Dec. 6.

#### UNIVERSAL PROBLEM

Each year Americans spend an astonishing \$750 million to prevent or reduce the consequences of a universal problem - underarm odor and wetness. With this many dollars being spent, it is little wonder that magazine advertisements and television commercials tout a variety of creams, sprays, roll-ons, and soaps. Each product is often presented as being uniquely superior to all others.

Yet there are essentially only two types of ingredients occurring in all of these products, antiperspirants and deodorants. Antiperspirants reduce the amount of perspiration that is formed. The exact way in which this occurs is not known. It is known, however, that the lotions and roll-ons are the most effective of the antiperspirant formulations. Aluminum compounds, especially aluminum chlorhydrate, are the most popular antiperspirant ingredients.

Deodorants work by either covering up odor (as with perfumes and colognes) or by antibacterial action. The aluminum salts are antibacterial and, therefore, serve as both deodorants and antiperspirants. The antibacterial agents triclosan and trichlorocarbanilide are included in some deodorant soaps. Hexachlorophene was once popular but has been removed from nonprescription products due to its toxicity.

### Cabin Reservations For MS. State Parks

Reservations for vacation cabins at Mississippi state parks for 1984 will be accepted beginning January 2, 1984 at 8:00 a.m. Reservations may be made by contacting the individual park office during regular business hours, 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Cabin reservations are not required but are strongly recommended.

Aubrey Rozzell, Director Bureau of Recreation and Parks, said the following rules apply to cabin reservations:

1. One person may not make reservations for more than five cabins for one date, unless special approval is given by the district manager to accommodate family reunions, etc.
2. Reservations can be made for only one set of dates at a time.
3. First priority will be given to in-person requests, followed by telephone requests, and letters, postmarked after Jan. 1, 1984.

Minimum stay for the heavy use season (May 1 - Sept. 15) is three nights. There is a two night minimum during other times of the year. Maximum stay during the heavy use season is 14 days.

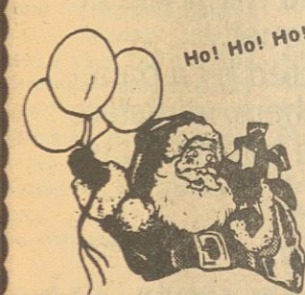
