## **County Students Included In** Who's Who

A total of 97 students from this area have been included in the 17th annual edition of WHO'S WHO AMONG AMERICAN HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS, 1982-83.

was the scene of a tragic accident Thursday afternoon, December 1, which claimed the life of one of Tishomingo County's outstanding and well-loved citizens.

Samuel Lamar Umfress, 61. of Burnsville, was killed in the early afternoon mishap that occurred around 1 p.m. when his car collided with an 18wheeler truck. Umfress was Vice-President of the First American National Bank in luka, and the manager of the Burnsville Branch.

According to investigating Mississippi Highway Patrol Trooper, Ralph Montgomery, Umfress was traveling south when he attempted to make a left turn onto the Mt. Gilead Road, James McDuffie, 43, of Lafayette, LA., could not stop his 18-wheeler truck in time to avoid Umfress' vehicle, he

McDuffie was uninjured. Montgomery said.

Umfress was a member of the Clausel Hill Methodist Church and a lifelong resident of Tishomingo County. He was a member of the Burnsville Lion's Club.

Services were conducted Saturday at the Cutshall Funeral Home Chapel with Rev. W.E. Sharp officiating. Burial was in New Lebanon

Survivors include his wife, Mrs. Ollie Umfress, of Burnsville; two daughters, Mrs. Sandra Wadkins of Burnsville, and Mrs. Teresa Dawson, of Cleveland, Tenn.; two sons, Sherrell Umfress and Samuel Ray Umfress. both of Burnsville: two sisters, Mrs. Maxine Wade, of luka, and Mrs. Mae Sims, of Florence, Ala.; and four grandchildren.

## 19 YEAR OLD CHARGED WITH DEATH OF FATHER

Carolyn Nunley, 19, of luka, has been arrested and charged with murder following the shooting death of her father, Furnie Nunley, 49, also of luka. Ms. Nunley was released from the county jail following the posting of a \$25,000 bond.

According to police officers, the incident took place early Saturday night. Officer Terry Sherron said that Ms. Nunley had contacted the Department about 8:15 p.m. that night and indicated there was trouble at her home. City police officers

responded to the call, assisted by county law officials, and found the victim lying face down on the couch in his daughter's apartment, located at 8A Riverside Apartments. Nunley was bleeding from apparent gunshot wounds and having difficulty breathing.

He was transported by ambulance to Tishomingo County Hospital and later transferred to the Magnolia Hospital in Corinth, where he died early Sunday morning.

Nunley was reportedly wounded in the head and both arms with a .25 caliber

Police Chief Joel Holliman said Ms. Nunley issued a statement to officers about the incident.

Investigations continue into the case; however, the spokesman said Ms. Nunley has been charged with murder, released on \$25,000 bond and now awaits action of the grand jury.

Funeral services for Furnie Nolan Nunley, Jr. were conducted Tuesday, December 6, at Cutshall Funeral Home Chapel with Rev. S.A. Bonds officiating. Burial was in Providence Cemetery.

Stretch Your Food Dollar By Preparing Your Own Mixes

Master Baking Mix 8 cups unsifted all-purpose

1/3 cup double-acting baking powder

2 tablespoons sugar 1 2/3 cups nonfat dry milk

1 tablespoon salt

1 2/3 cups lard (or 2 cups vegetable shortening)

Spoon flour into measuring cup. Level off at the one cup mark but don't shake or pack the flour. If you do, you'll get too much flour, and anything made from the mix will be dry and heavy. Measure the baking powder, salt, sugar, and nonfat dry milk and add to the measured flour. Stir and sift these dry ingredients together until well mixed. Measure the lard or shor-

we live in a prosperous land which just happens to be the greatest food producing nation on earth. We also love our dogs dearly. Unfortunately when we put the two together you wind up with an alarming number of overweight animals.

The sad part is that obesity presents the same disadvantages and dangers for dogs as it does for humans. Veterinarians recognize it as a very serious health problem. Everyday they advise their clients on ways to get their dogs back into trim -- without overdoing

MASTER MIX BISCUITS 2 cups Master Mix 1/2 to 3/4 cup water or milk

Dip out 2 cups of the Master Mix and put into bowl. Add about 1/2 cup water or milk. Stir with a fork. Add more water or milk until the dough is just wet enough to leave the sides of the bowl and form a ball. Turn dough out onto a floured surface (a dough board, a clean towel, counter, or table top). Shape into ball with hands. Smooth up ball of dough with hands in this way. Pick up the far side of the dough and fold over top of ball. Press down with palm of hand. Turn dough a quarter turn. Pick up far side of dough, fold over, press down, and turn dough. Repeat these steps 10 times. Flatten dough until it is a little less than one-half inch thick. You can use a rolling pin, a clean bottle, or hands to flatten the dough. Cut out biscuits with a biscuit cutter or the top of a glass . . . or cut with a knife to make square biscuits. Place on an ungreased pan and bake at 450 degrees F. for 12 to 15 minutes or until lightly browned. Makes 10-12 biscuits. Note: For variation prepare cheese biscuits by adding one cup of grated cheese to the two cups of Master Mix

MASTER MIX YELLOW CAKE 1 1/2 cups Master Mix 1/2 cup sugar

1/2 cup water or milk

1 egg 1/2 teaspoon vanilla

Add sugar to mix. Beat egg slightly and combine with water or milk. Add one-half of liquid to dry ingredients and beat 2 minutes on medium speed of electric mixer or 300 strokes by hand. Add remaining liquid and beat for minute. Pour into greased and floured 8 x 9 inch pan. Bake at 375 degrees F. for about 25 minutes.

## **Duck Days** Dec. 10, 11

Mississippi's first waterfowl season will get off the ground next weekend, even though it will be a short one. The season opens Saturday, Dec. 10 and extends through Dec. 11, according to the Department of Wildlife Con-

At the same time there will two-day nunting season on Canada Geese within the Sardis Reservoir Zone only in north Mississippi. The dates are Dec. 10 and

The second duck season opens Dec. 15, and the second goose season in the Sardis Zone opens Dec. 14.

Mississippi duck hunters will be harvesting waterfowl this year using the point system. This allows hunters a legal daily limit of birds worth 100 points. The limit is reached when the last bird taken and added to the birds in the bag, reaches or exceds 100 points. The possession limit is two legal daily limits, except on opening day.

Birds this year worth 100 points are: black duck and canvasback. Ducks valued at 70 points are: female mallard. redhead, wood duck, hooded merganser.

Waterfowl worth 25 points are: male mallard, mottled duck, ring-necked duck, all

The following are 10 point ducks: pintail, gadwall, teal, shoveler, scaup, mergansers (except hooded), widgeon.

Shooting hours for water fowl are one-half hour before sunrise until sunset. Various state waterfowl shooting areas and inland reservoirs have varying hours

State enforcement authorities are reminding hunters that they should have their shotguns plugged and incapable of holding more than three shells at one loading.

Hunters 16 years of age and over are required to purchase a \$7.50 federal duck stamp. In addition, hunters between 16 and 65 must have a \$2 state duck stamp.

Of course a valid hunting license is also necessary. Resident hunters will find that they can hunt ducks and geese with either the \$25 sportsman's license, the \$13 all game hunting and fishing license, the \$9 small game hunting and fishing license, or the \$6 small game license.

State conservation officials are asking hunters this year to be especially careful. The black duck is a 100 point bird.

According to the Department of Wildlife Conservation the black duck has been declining in population for more than 20 years. The duck, which looks much like the female mallard, is often found together in large concentrations of mallards.

## **Limit Graze For Best Results**

With good grazing conditions, it's tempting to turn brood cows on good grass full-time and not be concerned with limit grazing. Fields that are growing well can be grazed off quickly with the onset of poor growing conditions.

If cattle are turned into pasture full-time, there is a good chance that total forage between now and spring will be greatly reduced. The best use of expensive winter pasture is to allow brood cows to graze only a limited

A cow with a young calf can be wintered on one fill of two to four hours' grazing a day along with a partial feeding of good quality hay. When cattle graze only long enough to get a fill, there also is less trampling damage.

## How To Read The Wrapping Paper

For The Real Message **Behind A Gift** 

Gift giving is one of mankind's most powerfully significant gestures. History and literature are filled with tales of gifts that have changed the lives of men and women.

The expression, "Beware of Greeks bearing gifts," stems from the ironic conclusion of the Trojan War --Greek soldiers stowed away in the body of a large wooden horse delivered to the gates of Troy as an apparent token of surrender. In THE NEW TESTAMENT, wise men brought gold, frankincense, and myrrh to a Baby in a Bethlehem stable. The Dutch West India Company gave trinkets and beads to the Manhattan Indians in exchange for an obscure island. Impressionist Vincent Van Gogh literally lent an ear to the lady he loved. And the French gave Lady Liberty to the American people.

"People in all cultures give gifts," observed well-known psychologist Dr. Tom Cottle during an interview on NBC-TODAY SHOW. Speaking on the psychology of giving and receiving gifts, he noted, "We're either complimenting somebody or we're reciprocating. But it's a very elaborate set of issues. Ultimately, we give gifts to make an attachment, a bond, an exchange, or to create a coming together of people."

"Sometimes we can't help placing deep psychological meaning on gifts. They can leave one feeling delighted or disappointed, loved and understood, or insulted and embarrassed," added Dr. Cottle. "On the other hand, it's unfair to deny the giver the pleasure he or she derives in making the gesture."

"People invariably select inappropriate gifts because they're often in too great a


## FOWLER'S **USED PARTS**



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**COSMETIC AND TINTED LENSES** 

There is some general confusion concerning cosmetic and tinted lenses. Actually, they are two quite distinct entities. Purely cosmetic contact lenses are used to change eye color.

Larger than standard lenses, cosmetic lenses cover almost the entire cornea in order to mask the natural iris color. The hard plastic lens is opaquely painted -- with almost any color or pattern desired -- and a clear central pupil is left through which one sees. Aside from fashion, there are a number of medical-cosmetic applications for these lenses. They can be used, for example, to cover a disfigured cornea that

opaque. In such cases, the lens is painted to match the undamaged

## ASCS Farm News

USDA To Sell Corn To Drought-Affected **Farmers** 

Deputy Secretary of Agriculture, Richard E. Long, announced on November 30 an emergency feed assistance program to distribute Commodity Credit Corporation-owned lower grade corn to livestock producers whose feed harvest suffered because of drought, hot weather or related disaster. To be eligible to buy corn, livestock producers must be located in a county designated by the U.S. Department of Agriculture as a disaster area due to drought and must have received an emergency Farmers Home Administration loan or be eligible to receive one.

There are approximately 27 million bushels of U.S. No. 4, U.S. No. 5 and Sample grade corn that will be sold to eligible livestock producers. The bulk of this corn is located in Texas, Iowa, Minnesota, Nebraska and Illinois.

The cost to eligible producers will be 75 percent of the current basic county loan rate for the average quality of available corn in the county where the corn is stored. Producers are responsible for transportation costs to move the corn to their farms.

Producers also need to show that their feed production is inadequate to maintain toundation livestock and poultry during the remainder of the current 90-day feeding period, which begins the day





## **luka School Dist.** Participates In Child Find Project

Personnel within the luka Special Municipal Separate School District are again involved in the state-wide Child Find Project to identify, locate and evaluate children through the age of 20 who are physically, mentally, communicately or emotionally handicapped. Dr. Jerry Stone serves as the school district's Child Find Director and with the assistance of the service agencies in our area he locates and identifies children out of school and in school who may be in need of special education services. ice a referral is made, it is the responsibility of the Child Find Director to insure that

the Referral-to-Placement procedures are followed and the school age children are placed in an appropriate program. The director willalso counsel with parents of pre-school children and begin planning for the education of these children.

Information gained from this project will be used to determine special education program needs as progress is made toward providing a free and appropriate publication education to all handicapped children in compliance with Public Law 94-142.

Those parents who have a child or who know of a child between the ages of 6 and 20 who is physically and/or mentally handicapped that is not enrolled in a public school program are asked to help school officials locate and plan for such children.

Parents are guaranteed the right to inspect any information about their child and to challenge its accuracy. Information which could identify an individual child will be maintained by the school district and will be provided to other agencies in accord with the Family Rights and Privacy Act.

Parents of school age handicapped children who should be enrolled in the luka Public Schools but who are not presently enrolled may contact Dr. Jerry Stone, Child Find Director, at 423-3206.


