





Holiday Foods Let me wish you and yours a very Merry Christmas! Looking for nutritious recipes for holiday foods? Here are some ideas that will help to cut down on fat, sugar, salt, and calories while at the same time providing family and friends with good



eating. For holiday meals: The traditional roast turkey is nutritious, lowcalorie, and low-fat. Plan to use leftovers to make it economical as well.



Try vegetable combinations. These can be colorful as well as lower in calories than most casseroles. Examples: Carrots/broccoli, green beans/mushrooms, English peas/celery, Cauliflower/ English peas, mashed tur-

For cornbread dressing, limit the butter or margarine you add. Use homemade chicken broth (unsaited) instead of canned broth. Limit added salt.

* Cranberry sauce and gelatin salads are both high in sugar. If you plan to serve both, serve the gelatin salad as a dessert.

* Luscious, rich desserts seem to be a part of our Southern heritage. While we all have favorites that are often requested at holiday time, try giving diners a choice of the lighter one too. (Their selection may surprise you at the end of a heavy meal!)

Here are some suggestions:

Mixed fruits in a pretty crystal bowl can be a very attractive and welcome addition to the end of a large meal. Choose three or four fruits (preferably fresh) that differ in color, texture, and flavor. Chill and mix together an hour or two before meal. Try a combination from these: Seedless grapes, apple, pear, or banana wedges dipped in lemon juice, orange or tangerine sections, grapefruit





Smoking While Pregnant

I've just learned that I'm pregnant and I'm concerned about my smoking habit. Can smoking harm my unborn child?

Yes, it can. Smoking can affect a child before it is born, during infancy and childhood, and throughout life.

Women who are heavy smokers are more likely than nonsmokers to suffer complications during pregnancy. They are more likely to give birth prematurely, and their babies are apt to be smaller.

Babies born to mothers who smoke tend to weigh about a half a pound less than those born to nonsmoking mothers. This difference in weight may not be significant

if a baby weighs between six and eight pounds, but it can be critical in a child of lower birth weight.

Early infant death - particularly in the first 28 days is also more likely to occur among babies born to smokers. This can be caused by respiratory distress syndrome, or other difficulties.

Children of mothers who smoke during pregnancy lag in their physical growth and often have lower verbal and match scores. The more a mother smoked during pregnancy, the worse the deficiencies are.

How does smoke reach an unborn baby? Gases from the smoke enter the mother's blood and pass through the placenta or afterbirth directly into the baby's bloodstream. These harmful gases can affect blood vessels in the baby and placenta and reduce the amount of oxygen and nourishment carried to the baby.

A pregnant woman who smokes two packs of cigarettes a day may block off a significant amount of the oxygen supply to her baby.

What about just cutting down on smoking during pregnancy?

If you smoke less you may inhale more deeply to make up for it and end up getting just as much nicotine as

IF INFANT "SQUINTS"

Parents are frequently concerned that their young children are 'squinting". The word itself has two meanings: looking out through partially closed eyes, as when the sun is in our faces; and looking with eyes set obliquely or crossed. It is this last meaning to which they most often refer, crossed-eyes (medically known as strabismus). In a new baby,

focusing ability is limited -- if present at all and the eyes tend to twivel around all over the place. This is why a tiny baby will sometimes produce the most disturbing squint. However, as long as this is a temporary thing, it is no cause for concern. As

the baby develops, he or she will gradually learn to move both eyes in harmony.

On the other hand, if it is consistent or persists past the age of six months or so, an optometric assessment would be advisable. The condition itself can be treated either by the use of special glasses and exercises or, in some cases, by surgery to correct the controlling muscles.





1983 CROP WHEAT, BARLEY, OATS PRODUCERS TO RECEIVE DEFICIENCY PAYMENTS: Eligible wheat farmers soon will receive an estimated \$735 to \$765 million in deficiency payments on their 1983 crop, barley farmers will get about \$35 to \$40 million, and oats farmers about \$7 to \$10 million, according to Everett Rank, administrator of the U.S. Deparatment of Agriculture's

Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service. Rank said deficiency payments are required under the 1983 wheat, barley, and oats programs because

average market prices on the national weighted received by farmers during the first five months (June through October) of the marketing year were below established target price levels of \$4.30 per bushel for wheat, \$2.60 for barley, and \$1.60 for oats.

The deficiency payment rate is based on the difference between the established target price and the higher of the national weighted average market price for June

average market price.

Deficiency payments will be made to wheat, barley, and oats farmers who participated in the 1983 acreage reduction programs. Rank said the payment check will be issued through local ASCS offices as soon as possible after Dec. 9.

Producers participating in

the acreage reduction programs were eligible for advance deficiency payments at a rate of 32.5 cents for wheat, 20 cents for barley, and 7.5 cents for oats. Final deficiency payments will be reduced by payments advanced to the producer for the respective crop. A total of \$344 million has been paid in advance deficiency payments

Hams that contain more than 10 percent added moisture weight must be labeled "Imitation."

Traditional hams have bone the full length of the ham. Their meatiness varies from one brand to another. Some have the skin removed and some do not. Their average yield per pound is four servings of about three ounces each.





Star of Bethlehem Has Made Wise Men Wonder For All These Years

"Star of wonder, star of night, star with royal beauty bright . . . "


Ever since the first Christmas, the star that lead the Wise Men to where the Infant Jesus lay has been the object of conjecture and wonder.

Unfortunately, the only reference to the star in Matthew's Gospel offers no explanation for the phenomenon: "And behold, the star that they had

seen in the East went before them, until it came and stood over the place where the child was."

Thus it is that scientists and biblical scholars alike have been free to speculate about various theories, ranging from the supernatural to logical explanations.

star was actually a comet; yet another asserts that the star was probably a super-



There is still another theory that the star was actually a conjunction of planets. According to astronomical studies, there were three conjunctions of Jupiter and Saturn in the year 7 B.C. There were also major conjunctions of planets between 3 and 2 B.C., claim other studies. The 17th-century astronomer Kepler calculated that Mars, Saturn and Jupiter had been in conjunction around the time of Christ's birth.

One supernatural theo-

ry holds that the star was not physically manifested, but rather visible to only those who were privileged to the events of the Nativity. Others believe that God placed the star in the heavens expressly as a sign for a brief period of time. Interestingly enough, this ties in with one scientific possibility: a new star, or a temporary star. Such stars have been observed from time to time; in fact, Hipparchus is believed to have discovered a brilliant star where none had been seen

before in the year 134 B.C. Could this have been the Star of Bethlehem?

Aside from being a beacon to the Magi, the star also fulfills an important prophecy regarding the Messiah. The Book of Numbers foretold "There shall come a Star out of Jacob."

Whatever explanation seems most plausible, Christians have always attached great significance to the star's appearance.

There have been many songs written about the Star of Bethlehem and certainly no Christmas tree would be complete without its star shining atop.





of disgrace. It seems that their father was too poor to provide dowries for them, a requirement for marrying in those days. St. Nicholas is supposed to have thrown bags of money through

the father's window, thus enabling the daughters to marry. He was also said to have miraculously restored three boys to life, thereby becoming associated with both children and gifts.

In Germany, the figure of St. Nicholas gave way during the reformation to the Christ Child, actually a messenger for the Infant Jesus and thought of as a girl.

In time the Christ Child, or Christkindl, became known as Kriss Kringle in the United States, taking on the old Father Christmas aspect that came to us from England.

The Dutch also had a great deal to do with our present concept of Santa Claus. Their version of the St. Nicholas figure was Sante Klaas, and it was this version that was brought by the Dutch settlers to the New World. Like St. Nicholas, Sante Klaas was both benevolent and saintly.

The realistic saintfigure became merged with elf figures from old European lore in the mind of a professor sometime during 1822 and the delightful concept of today's Santa Claus was born in a poem entitled The Visit of St. Nicholas. Dr. Clement Clarke Moore's lively description of St. Nicholas as 'a right jolly old elf" inspired the famed artist, Thomas Nast, to create a small, elfish character with whiskers and beard, and name him Santa Claus.

Colonial Christmas

Although the earliest American Christmases were rather grim due to the fact that the Pilgrims disapproved of celebrating the holiday, Christmas in the colonies in time was generally pretty festive.

There were no Christmas trees, as the German custom was not introduced into this country until the 1880s, but in other ways, Americans made merry.

In Williamsburg, Virginia, for instance, the celebrating began a week before Christmas and lasted until



Now that Santa has, reappeared, it's a perfect time for us

on celebrating Christmas that all Council meetings were called off from December 14 to three weeks after Christmas!

In Maryland, the many Catholic settlers brought holiday customs from their native England to keep a merry Christmas, too.

Food, of course, was an important element in all colonial celebrations, although it varied in ethnicity. The Dutch, for instance, favored dough-

short cakes and ginger cakes, fruit pies, preserves, fried shad, roasted chicken and bowls of milk and cream. Virginians feasted on

roast turkey with grapes, kumquats, roast beef, cranberry mold, spiced crab apples and glazed sweet potato slices.

Christmas Day itself always centered around the tone for the social church services, ranging from morning worship to midnight mass, with churches festively decorated and voices

> raised in praise of the season.

Because colonial settlers were often widely scattered, greetings at Christmastime were likely to be sent by way of musket fire. This custom of firing muskets, as a matter of fact, has evolved into setting off firecrackers in some parts of the south today.

Although the colonial Christmas did not have Santa as we know him, or the tree, or gift-giving to the extent of modern times, it was a time of joy. A poem published in

the Virginia Almanack during Colonial times






