IUKA COUPLE FOUND MURDERED IN HOME

An Iuka couple was found brutally murdered in their home on Adams Street around 9:30 a.m. Saturday morning, January 28. Webb

Johnson, 62, and his wife, Jewell, 64, were discovered dead by their nephew, Jimmy Johnson, after the young man had seen the bodies through

a window and kicked the back door of the frame house down in order to gain entrance.

Iuka Chief of Police Joel Holliman and Officer Jimmy McVay arrived on the scene

shortly after the discovery and found the front door of the house unlocked and the decomposed bodies of the two in the living room. A thorough investigation by of-

ficials and acting County Coroner Mike Deaton uncovered no murder weapon, although several spent shells from a .22 caliber weapon were found on the living room floor.

Evidence found in the Johnson home indicated that the couple apparently knew their assailant, and were relaxed in their living room, drinking coffee and smoking cigarettes when the shooting occurred. The house did not seem to be ransacked nor was there any evidence of a struggle. Family members reported that a .22 automatic rifle was missing from its storage place in the living room. An autopsy performed Monday in Corinth should indicate if the Johnsons' missing rifle could be the murder weapon.

Mr. and Mrs. Johnson were last seen alive Wednesday afternoon. Relatives reported calling the residence Wednesday evening with no answer.

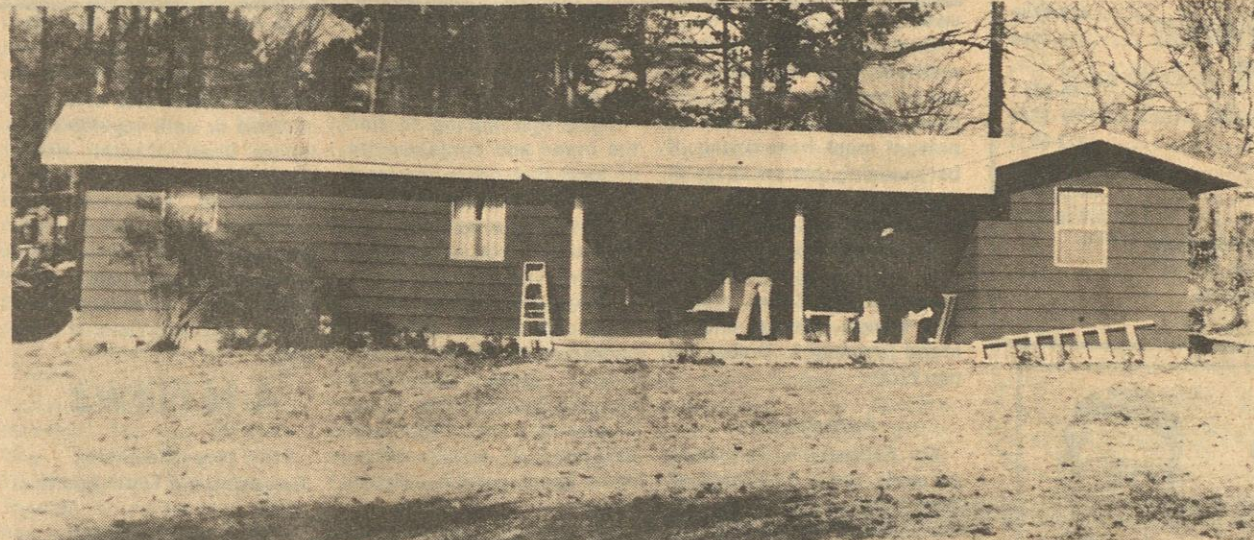
It is hard to comprehend how such a bizarre slaying could occur to two respected citizens of our community. Local law officials are combining efforts with State Investigators to find a motive for the double murder. At press-time Wednesday there were no suspects.

Mr. Johnson was a retired commercial fisherman, and Mrs. Johnson a housewife and a retired employee of the Iuka Shirt Co.

Joint services were at 3:00 p.m. Tuesday at the Cutshall Funeral Home Chapel with Rev. Billy Hobson officiating. Burial was in Oak Grove Cemetery.

Mr. Johnson's survivors include three sisters, Marie Horn, Louise Rice and Corinne Richardson, all of Iuka; and a brother, Billy Johnson, also of Iuka.

Mrs. Johnson is survived by a sister, Burva Green, of Memphis, Tenn.; and a brother, Verlon E. Williams, also of Memphis.

PRE-REGISTRATION AT HEAD START CENTERS

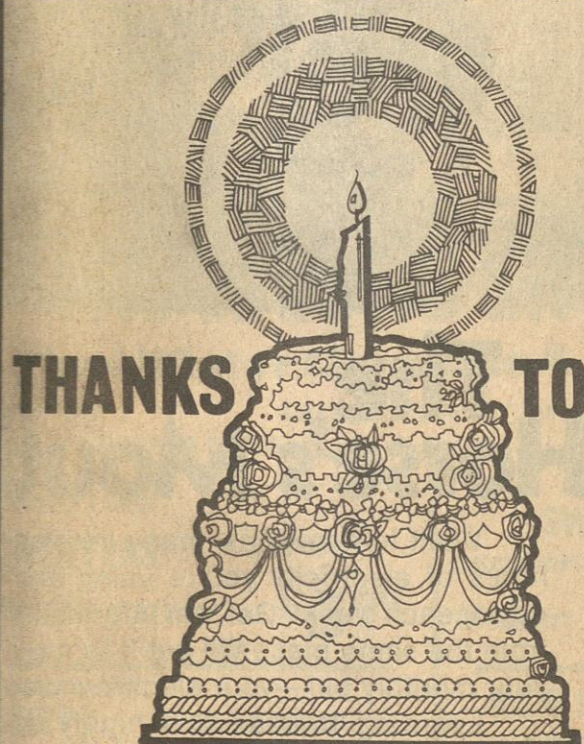
Mississippi Action For Progress, Inc. will pre-register children at your local Head Start Center: February 6 - February 29, 1984, from 7:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m.; March 1-2, 1984, from 7:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. Children registered at this time will be screened by your local county council for recommendation of enrollment when centers re-open in September, 1984.

The eligibility criteria for enrollment are children ages 3, 4 and 5 years with family income below poverty and/or on welfare. Parents of children in this age group with handicapping conditions are encouraged to register their handicapped children. Handicapped children are defined as those who are mentally retarded, hard of

hearing, deaf, speech impaired, visually handicapped, seriously emotionally disturbed, crippled, or other health impaired children who by reason thereof require special education and related services.

Parents desiring to pre-register their children are asked to go to the closest center within their community for registration. Parents are asked to carry a certified copy of their child's birth certificate, Medicaid Card (if on welfare), immunization card and proof of income, such as W-2 Form, or Income Tax Return.

**PRESERVE
WINTER PASTURES**
Extreme cold weather in December and January caused severe damage to winter pastures throughout Mississippi.

The cold damage allowed cattle to catch up with available forage very quickly and begin overgrazing. Cattle should be removed or reduced from closely grazed or cold-damaged fields to allow damaged plants to recover. Giving grazing crops a few days rest will greatly strengthen damaged plants and help maintain a stand.

Trampling damage and internal parasite problems increase as animals regaze the same areas attempting to get a fill.

All winter grazing crops will be under stress until spring, so limit grazing to a maximum of five hours a day for the greatest benefit from available forage. Delay grazing on cold mornings until frost is melted to help

reduce trampling. By alternating days of grazing, a large number of cattle benefit from the green forage. However, it is very important that cattle receive plenty of hay or silage on off-grazing days.

When cattle cannot be removed, continue supplementing pasture with a high energy feed plus hay or silage to reduce grazing pressure. High energy supplements help cattle better utilize low quality forages.

PREPARING VENISON
With the close of deer season, many hunters have stocked their freezers with venison from a successful season.

There are many ways to prepare venison, but remember to remove all fat before cooking. If left on the meat, the fat sticks to the roof of the mouth when eating and is unpleasant. Deerburger can be prepared by grinding fresh fat from beef to 10 pounds of

venison. Cook venison by the same methods used for beef. After the fat has been removed, add suet, pork fat, or bacon to prevent roast from drying. If barbecuing, pin on strips of bacon with toothpicks and baste with barbecue sauce. Marinate steaks or chops in French dressing to make the meat tender. Cover steaks with french dressing and let stand overnight. Drain and pan broil.

Chatting With Your Home Economist

Family's Eating Pattern
Your family's eating probably follows a day-to-day pattern to fit the schedules of family members. For example, if everybody goes to work and school early, your pattern may include an easy-to-fix breakfast and packed lunches, with the main meal in the evening. Afternoon or evening snacks may be a part of your pattern, too.

Any pattern that suits your family is a good one if it...
*Provides for regular meals, including breakfast. The number and size of meals is up to you.

*Allows for a variety of foods.
*Includes some of the less expensive kinds of foods from each of the food groups; for example, chicken instead of sirloin steak, nonfat dry milk instead of fresh milk, green beans instead of asparagus, and bread instead of seeded rolls.

*Smaller servings of meat, poultry, fish, vegetables, and fruit to save the budget and cut calories.
*More servings of dry beans and peas, peanut butter, and breads and cereals.
*More home-prepared foods and fewer ready-to-heat and ready-to-eat foods.

The amounts served to family members will differ according to individual food needs. For example, young children might eat 1/4 cup of vegetable at a meal, while teenagers might eat more than twice that amount. Consider individual needs of family members in planning meals and food choices in the store.

Using a less expensive food plan will help you provide nutritious meals economically. Some of the following tips also may help you economize.

*Check specials in food store advertisements.
*Look at each food critically. Is it costly compared to other foods you might serve? Will your family eat and enjoy it? Do you have the time and skill to prepare it? If it's a convenience item, could you save by preparing it from basic ingredients?
*Learn to estimate accurately the amounts of food needed to feed your family. No eating pleasure or nutrients come from food that is bought and discarded. Keeping a record of the

amount of food you throw away in a week may alert you to ways you can reduce waste.

*Use unit pricing to find the brand and container-size of food that costs the least per pound, ounce, or pint. Even if it's a better buy, select food only if you can store it properly and conveniently and can use it without waste.
*Avoid foods that are packaged as individual servings. Extra packaging usually boosts the price. Examples are individual packages of potato chips, ready-to-eat cereals, raisins, and tea.

*Check the date on a perishable food. Be sure you can use all of it before it spoils.
*Shop for low-cost foods within each food group.
*When buying meat, consider the amount of lean meat in the cut, as well as the price per pound. A relatively high-priced cut with little or no waste may provide more meat for your money than a low-priced cut with a great deal of bone, gristle, or fat. Chicken and turkey are often bargains compared to other meats. Fish is often a good buy, too.

One way to find the best buy is to compare the cost of packages of meat, poultry, or fish that will provide enough for a family meal. You may want to set a top limit on the amount to spend for meat for the main meal of the day, or you may want to set an average amount to spend, allowing for some high-cost and some low-cost items throughout the week.

*Use small servings of meat, poultry, and fish and rely on more economical foods - potatoes, rice, macaroni products, and bread - to fill in meals. For economy and variety, use eggs, dry beans, and peanut butter in place of meat some of the time. These foods provide protein and most other nutrients that meat supplies.
*Try low-priced brands. They may be similar in quality to more expensive ones.

Turnips & Pork
1-1/2 tsp. cornstarch
1 tsp. soy sauce
1/4 tsp. ground black pepper
2 tsp. salt
1/8 tsp. ground ginger
1 lb. fresh lean pork
4 cups (1-quart) turnip strips (1 x 2 x 1/2-inch strips)
Boiling water
2 tsp. salad oil or shortening
1 tsp. sugar
Dash cayenne

Combine cornstarch, soy sauce, black pepper, 3/4 tsp. of the salt and ginger. (This mixture is thick. Do not add water or more soy sauce.) Trim fat from pork and cut it into 1-inch cubes. There should be 1 pound pork after fat has been removed. Add to soy sauce mixture. Mix well. Marinate 1 hour. Place tur-

nips, 3/4 teaspoon of the salt and 1-inch boiling water in a saucepan. Cook, uncovered, 5 minutes. Cover and cook 20 minutes or until vegetable is tender. Drain off water. Heat oil or shortening in a 9 or 10-inch skillet. Add pork and cook 20 to 25 minutes or until browned on all sides. Add turnips, remaining salt, sugar and cayenne. Cover and simmer 5 minutes. Yield: 6 servings.

4-H Poultry Chain
It's Poultry Chain time again, and we encourage all 4-H members to participate. The 4-H Poultry Chain works like this. 1. A participant receives either 25, 50, or 100 chicks. 2. A deposit is received for the chicks. The amount depends upon the number ordered and whether they are straight run (cockerels and pullets) or pullets only. 3. The 4-H member raises the chicks, learning proper feeding and care. 4. After about six months, either six or 12 pullets are brought to the County Fair and auctioned. 5. Participants who bring pullets to the Fair to be auctioned have their deposit check voided. Anyone interested in participating in the Poultry Chain should call the Cooperative Extension

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If you think your pet has been poisoned, quick action is imperative. 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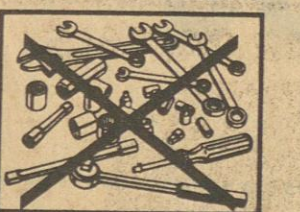
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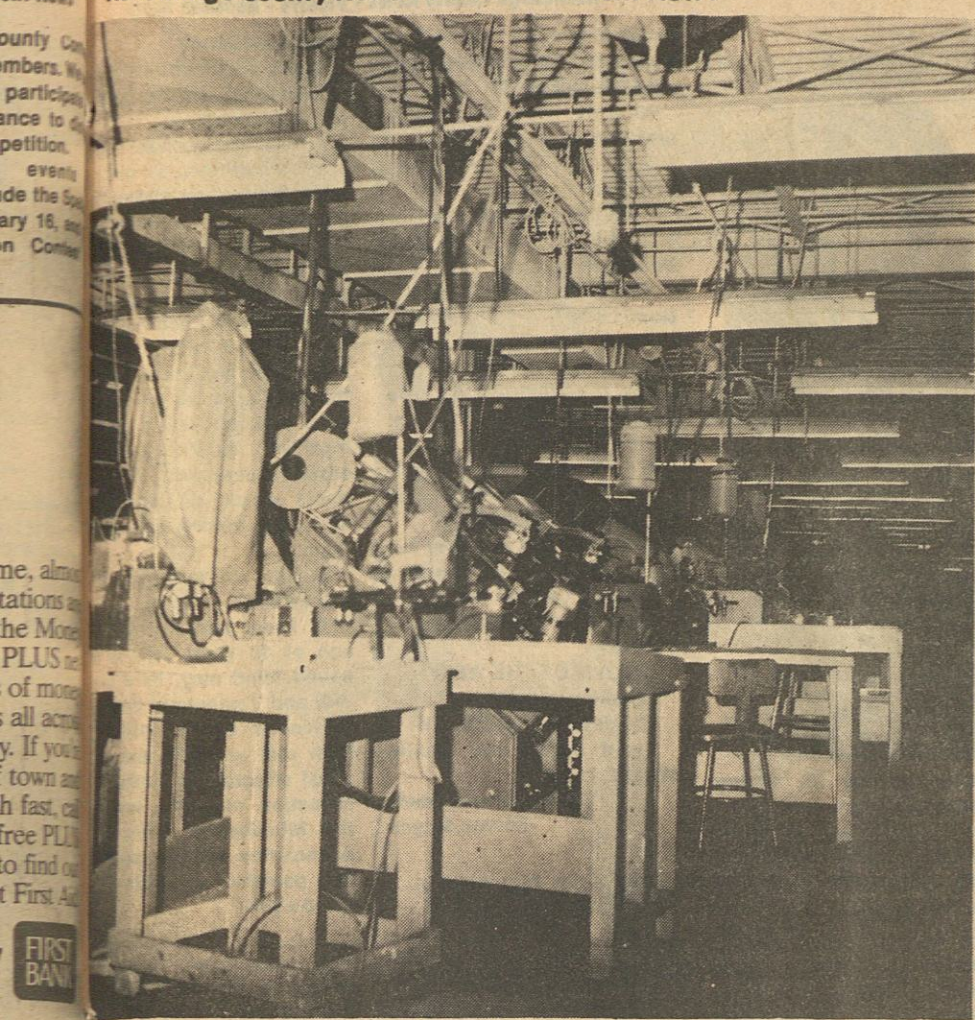

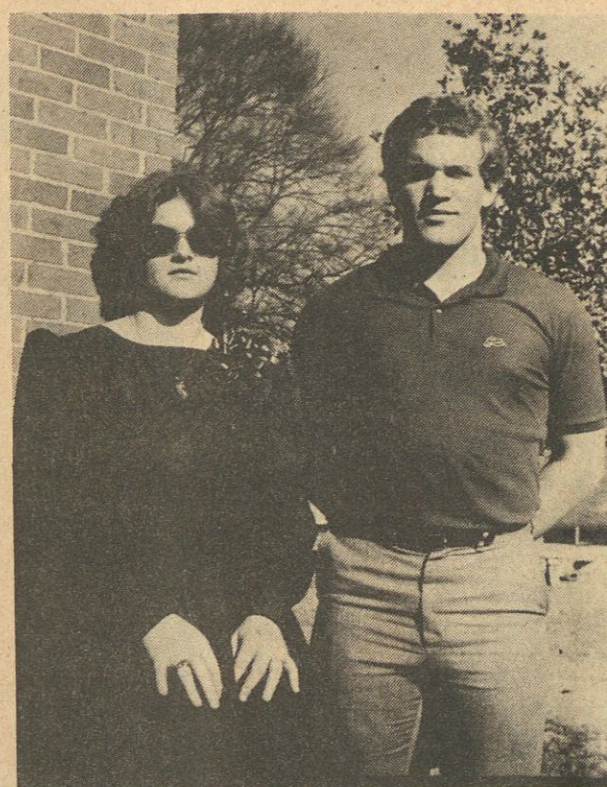

Weekly Legislative Report

January 27, 1984

The state's financial woes occupied the minds of legislators this week. As the first month of the 1984 session came to a close, Senators were asked by an educators' group for substantial pay raises for teachers and heard Governor Bill Allain's proposals for dealing with the financial situation.

Representatives of the Mississippi Association of

budget and the Legislature can review and render final judgment upon it.

Allain called upon state agency heads to reconsider their budget requests for fiscal 1985 and try to reduce them. He wants non-essential services reduced and consolidation of some state agencies considered.

Allain said that he would work to hold the general fund appropriation at \$1.36 billion which is the projected general fund revenue. But, he told legislators, "If we then determine that a budget in excess of \$1,360,000,000 is necessary to fulfill the state's obligation to provide our people with the necessary and essential services, I will not hesitate to carry out my duty as Governor to recommend for your consideration such a budget."

Imported Shoes Damage Local Factory Production

Tishomingo Shoe Company felt the crush of the domestic production of shoes which hit hard in 1983. The number of employees dropped from 700 to 380, an

estimated number of 420. Approximately 75-100 employees are laid off. Their production of shoes per day was 4,800, whereas in the past it stood at an estimated

10,000.

The cause for this tremendous drop in production is imported shoes. 560 million pair of shoes came into the U.S. in 1983, causing an estimated 25,000 people, nationwide, to lose their jobs. The domestic production in 1981 was 372 million pair of shoes in the nation. The numbers decreased to 320 million in 1983, causing a 13% decrease of shoe production in America.

The footwear industry is not asking that the U.S. close its markets to all imported shoes, only that the government take action to assure domestic footwear industry gets its fair share of the market.

Tishomingo Shoe, along with many other shoe plants across the nation, are writing their Congressmen in an all-out effort to restore normal production. Many plants are cutting off the entire toe part of the shoe and sending them to the Congressmen. This toeless shoe represents 64% of U.S.'s market to imports.

Mr. Boyd Rigsby, Plant Manager at Tishomingo Shoe, and Mr. Tom Hollins, Assistant Manager, are encouraging their employees to write to their local Congressmen in hopes that all laid-off employees will be back to work and production will return to normal.

POINT OF LAW

(Prepared by the Mississippi State Bar. Some rights may vary from locality to locality. Always consult an attorney when in doubt about

your legal rights.)
Q: Is a document written by an attorney on the parties?
A: Yes. Any contract, oral, or written, is upon the parties making the contract if it satisfies legal requirements of contracts. Such requirements can be found in the Mississippi Code of Laws. There was satisfaction of an offer, the offer, whether the offer was of sound mind, legal age, as well as other requirements. All contracts should be considered seriously before you sign them.
Q: How old must you be to make a will?
A: Every person over the age of 18 years who is of sound mind may, by a Will and Testament, dispose of his/her estate, including both real property and personal effects. For further information on wills, contact the Mississippi State Association and request a free pamphlet on "Why Need a Will."

IUKA WELCOMES DR. K. A. HASSAN

Mr. Bill Rutledge, our Hospital Administrator, and Dr. K.A. Hassan, our new Obstetrician and Gynecologist, want to see to it that the medical needs of the community are provided right here at Tishomingo County Hospital with the minimum of referrals to neighboring medical centers.

Dr. Hassan elaborates that in the recent years great progress has been made in the fields of Obstetrics and Gynecology.

Dr. Hassan has committed himself to having these advances available to the community. Mr. Rutledge has also committed himself to providing the necessary equipment and facilities to

fulfill that purpose.

What are some of these advances? Dr. Hassan responded that in the field of Obstetrics the most important are in relation to ante-partum and intra-partum fetal assessment. That is the checking on the well-being of the baby during pregnancy as well as during labor. Ultrasoundography and Fetal monitoring, as well as many new laboratory tests, are now available to do just that.

What exactly is ultrasound? The ultrasound is a machine that enables doctors to visualize the baby while still in the uterus in great detail. This is done by sound waves that reflect on a screen just like a television. It

is not like an X-ray and does not give any irritation. The baby can be seen moving and breathing and the heart can be seen beating. The afterbirth can be seen clearly and can be examined in great detail. All the baby's organs can be seen and many measurements can be taken to help doctors determine the baby's age, growth, and well being.

What is fetal monitoring? The fetal monitor is a machine that records the frequency and intensity of the uterine contractions. Changes in the heart beat can be easily detected and recorded. Accelerations as well as decelerations of the heart beat are valuable indicators of the baby's well being, particularly when correlated with fetal movements or with uterine contractions.

What are some of the advances that have been made in the field of Gynecology? In Gynecology great progress has been made in improving surgical techniques in major Gynecological operations. Progress has also been made in the fields of infertility and colposcopy, but most importantly in the field of the preventive medicine, that is in emphasizing the importance of the yearly check-up and pap smear. Eudometrial sampling has become a just as a part of the yearly check-up, particularly for patients above 35 years of age.

Colposcopy and Cryosurgery have greatly contributed to the effective following up of abnormal pap smears.

What is Colposcopy? The colposcope is a high magnification microscope, which when directed to the cervix enables us to see the cervix in great detail and

identify changes of very early pre-malignant lesions. The instrument is very valuable in our efforts to prevent cancer of the cervix.

What is Cryosurgery? Cryosurgery is done by a machine with different size probes that can be applied to the cervix. A very low sub-freezing temperature is then created in these probes that will destroy the areas of abnormal tissue detected.

Dr. Hassan concludes by saying that much more progress can be made, which is beyond the scope of this article, but that progress can only be made if the community truly desires it and actively supports it.

Glover Wilkins Announces Retirement

The man known nationwide as "Mr. Tenn-Tom", Glover Wilkins, has announced his retirement effective July 1, after over 22 years as administrator of the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway Development Authority. Succeeding him as administrator will be Donald G. Waldon, deputy administrator of the Authority, who has served on the staff for the past eight years.

The announcement came at the conclusion of the regular quarterly board meeting held in Mobile, Alabama, Monday, January 23, 1984.

Upon his retirement, Wilkins will officially assume the honorary title of Administrator Emeritus. Wilkins has been associated with the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway since 1947 when, as manager of the Columbus, MS Chamber of Commerce, that organization took up the banner for Tenn-Tom. The Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway Development Authority was formed in 1958 and he was named assistant administrator. In 1962, he was designated administrator.

From the beginning of his association with the waterway, Wilkins has been active in maintaining liaison with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, elected representatives of the U.S. Congress and each of the Presidents of the United States since 1947. His positive influence in the development of the water resources of the nation is legend. He is the former chairman of the National Waterways Conference, Inc., the nation's most prestigious waterway organization. He is also a member and past Vice President of the Water Resources Congress, Trustee-Emeritus and the Ohio Valley Improvement Association and past president of the Water Resources Associates, a national group of professional water resources people.

Even in retirement, Wilkins promises to continue to be active in the field of national water resources development. He and his wife, Frances, plan to divide their time between their homes in Columbus, Mississippi and

As Wilkins' successor, Waldon, too, has an impressive background in national water resource development. Prior to joining the Tenn-Tom staff, he served as Deputy Assistant Secretary for the U.S. Department of the Interior. His duties there included management responsibilities for all land and water resource agencies within the Department of Interior. He previously served as Budget Examiner in the Office of Management and Budget of the Executive Office of the President where he advised White House officials and the President on major budgetary, policy and legislative matters involving natural resources.

Darlene Scogin, a veteran of over 20 years with the Authority, will continue to serve as Assistant Administrator of the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway Development Authority.

In other actions, the Authority board also unanimously re-affirmed its earlier decision that the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway Development Authority will immediately initiate actions to help ensure the development of this major new national transportation artery come to fruition, which will officially open to navigation in mid-1985. At their summer quarterly meeting, the Authority had officially adopted a policy to direct its resources toward assisting the affected states, counties and private interests in preparing for the completion of the waterway. The five-state compact members of the Authority board represent Alabama, Florida, Kentucky, Mississippi and Tennessee.

The information from the return or a copy of the return should be requested on Form 4506, and payment of the fees must be forwarded with the request, Wren said.

In order to avoid the expense and inconvenience of requesting a copy of your tax return, Ms. Wren suggested that copies of tax returns be retained for at least three years from the date the return was due or filed.

FIRE DESTROYS MAINTENANCE SHOP



Fire Destroys Maintenance Shop At Coleman Park

Coleman State Park, located thirteen miles north of Iuka, on the Tennessee River, was the scene of a tragic fire last Wednesday that destroyed the Maintenance Shop and thousands of dollars worth of equipment. Estimated damage has been placed between \$100,000 and \$150,000 dollars. About 11:00 a.m., Park Manager Glenn Ray Harris noticed smoke coming from one of the gutters of the building. He drove over to the Maintenance Shop and opened the door. The south end of the building was smoldering and when the air from the open door reached the area burst into flames. Mr. Harris, who is also a member of the First District Volunteer Fire Department, and park employee, Tim Ryan, rushed to the Fire Station to get the fire truck. In the meantime, Mrs. Dianne

Harris, Park Hostess, called for assistance from the Fire Department volunteers through the Sheriff's office. Back-up assistance was also requested from North Crossroads Volunteer Fire Department to help contain the fire to the Maintenance Building. The Mississippi State Fire Marshall's Office was contacted immediately, and Mr. Mike Ivey, representative of the Fire Marshall's Office, arrived around 4:00 that afternoon. According to Mr. Ivey, the fire was caused by a defective electrical circuit going to the arc welder. The defective wiring was located between the wall and the insulation, making it impossible to detect the fire until it had spread uncontrollably. According to Mr. Harris, the hub of the equipment needed for the maintenance of the park has been destroyed. Lost in the fire was all of the mowing equipment, electrical, plumbing,

painting, and welding equipment, and the maintenance van. According to Tom Minga, Chief of the First District Volunteer Fire Department, quick action on the part of park employees and the

Volunteer Fire Departments, possibly prevented even greater loss, as well as injury to the fire-fighters, since the building also contained oxygen and acetylene bottles, paint, and other explosives.

COLEMAN TO SERVE FEDERAL SENTENCE

George E. Coleman, Jr., who was found guilty of embezzlement in Tishomingo County Circuit Court last week, pleaded guilty Wednesday, January 25, to 18 counts of wire fraud, mail fraud, and interstate transportation before U.S. District Judge L.T. Senter.

Judge Senter sentenced Coleman to nine years in a federal penitentiary, which will be served concurrently with his sentence of nine years, also from Judge Fred Wicker, Circuit Court Judge. Coleman must serve at least 3

years and 4 months before becoming eligible for parole. Judge Senter gave Coleman until February 27 to square away all personal and business matters.

A spokesman for the U.S. Probation Service stated that it would be a matter of weeks before they knew in which penitentiary Coleman would serve.

DOWNWARD TREND CONTINUES FOR UNEMPLOYMENT IN TISH. COUNTY

Statistics released today reveal a continued downward trend in the number unemployed in Tishomingo County, according to Charles Smith, Manager of the Mississippi State Employment Service. At mid-December, 1,950 Tishomingo County residents remained unemployed. This is 100 below the November estimate but 90 above the estimate for one year ago. The current rate

of unemployment was figured to be 18.6 percent of the civilian labor force. The county's civilian labor force, estimated to be 10,480, also experienced a decline of 210 from the November estimate and an even more substantial loss of 2,300 from December, one year ago.

There were 8,530 county residents employed, which is 110 below the previous estimate and 2,390 below the estimate released for December, 1982.

Total jobs in the county was estimated to be 6,000 at mid-month, 60 below the November figure and 1,480 below the December, 1982, figure. Manufacturing employment was estimated to be 2,530, slightly below the previous estimate and 530 below the estimate for one year ago, with the Apparel Industry contributing the

largest yearly loss. Non-manufacturing employment totaled 3,470, only slightly below the previous estimate and 940 below one year ago due to large declines in Construction and Government work.

Smith also noted that the civilian labor force for the four-county area of Alcorn, Prentiss, Tippah, and Tishomingo totaled 44,580 at mid-December. This reflects a drop of 1,080 from the November figure and a continued downward trend of 3,000 from the estimate reported for December, 1982. The number of persons employed decreased to 38,940 at mid-December, 590 below the previous estimate and 1,760 below the figure for one year ago. All categories contributed to these losses. The number of unemployed workers also fell at mid-month to reach 5,640, 490 below the previous estimate and 1,240 below the estimate for one year ago. This number unemployed represents 12.7 percent of the civilian labor force unemployed, compared to 13.4 percent in November

and 14.5 percent in December, one year ago.

There were 15,500 individuals employed in manufacturing jobs in the four-county area at mid-December, down 150 from the November figure but up 920 over the estimate for one year ago. This yearly loss was attributed mainly to the Apparel Industry, while the yearly rise was found in several categories. Nonmanufacturing employment numbered 15,870 at mid-month, only slightly below the estimate of 15,880 for November but a significant loss of 1,040 was experienced from the December, 1982, estimate of 16,910. This large yearly loss was again experienced primarily in Construction and Government.

A 1981 Dodge pickup truck, belonging to Geraldine Loden, of the North Crossroads Community, was found stripped and burned Monday, January 30, around 10:00 a.m. on Indian Creek Road bridge, near Iuka, according to Tishomingo County Sheriff's Deputy Mike Kemp. The truck had been reported stolen to the Sheriff's Department around 5:10 a.m. that morning. The theft occurred sometime Sunday night, January 29th. Investigation continues.

2-1/2 cups roasted peanuts (with red skins on)
Melt chocolate pieces in top of double boiler over hot (not boiling) water. Add peanuts to melted chocolate and stir to coat. Turn out on waxed paper spreading so that peanuts are separated as much as possible. Allow to cool.

Single? Try To Use Form 1040EZ For Federal Return

Sylvia Wren, Director of the Jackson District, Internal Revenue Service says that single taxpayers with no dependents can do their taxes the easy way this year by using the Form 1040EZ.

Ms. Wren estimates that over 18 million taxpayers can take advantage of this simple tax form when filing their 1983 tax return. The Form 1040EZ is only 11 lines long and is specially designed for single taxpayers with no dependents who do not itemize their deductions and whose taxable income is less than \$50,000 a year. Income on the Form 1040EZ must be only from wages, salaries, tips, and interest income (other than All-Savers interest) of \$400 or less.

or older or for blindness and those with dividend income may not use this form. However, the allowable part of the charitable contribution deduction for non-itemizers may be claimed on the Form 1040EZ up to a maximum deduction of \$25.

Step-by-step instructions for completing the Form 1040EZ can be found on the back of the form, but filers must look up their tax in the Tax Tables in the Form 1040EZ and Form 1040A tax package.

Taxpayers Who Itemize Deductions Can Include Increase In Mississippi Sales Tax

Taxpayers who itemize their deductions for 1983 will be able to include the increase in Mississippi sales tax that was effective December 1, 1983. The five

percent rate was in effect 334 days and the six percent rate for 31 days. This makes the effective annual rate 3.5 percent. In order to get the correct rate, the amount shown in the optional sales tax table should be increased by 1.7 percent. For example, if a taxpayer's income was \$20,000 and \$22,000, the tax table shows a deduction of \$370. The amount claimed on Schedule Form 1040 would be \$375.

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"BLOOD THINNERS"

Blood clots are considered to be a contributing factor in several leading causes of death, including heart attacks, strokes, and kidney disease. Medicines that "thin" the blood are being used with increasing frequency in an attempt to reduce the effects of clot formation inside the body.

Anticoagulants - "blood thinners" as they are commonly called - interfere with the formation of fibrin, a complex protein which is a part of clotted blood. These medicines prevent existing clots from getting larger and also prevent the formation of new clots. They do not dissolve existing clots nor do they actually "thin" the blood as their name implies.

A commonly used anticoagulant in hospitals is heparin, a drug that is given by injection. The most commonly prescribed oral anticoagulant is warfarin. It works by interfering with certain clotting factors in the body. Aspirin and a number of other drugs produce an anticoagulating effect by preventing the platelets in the blood from grouping together.

All anticoagulant medicines must be used with extreme care and under the guidance of a physician. Improper use can lead to unnecessary internal and external bleeding and further complications.

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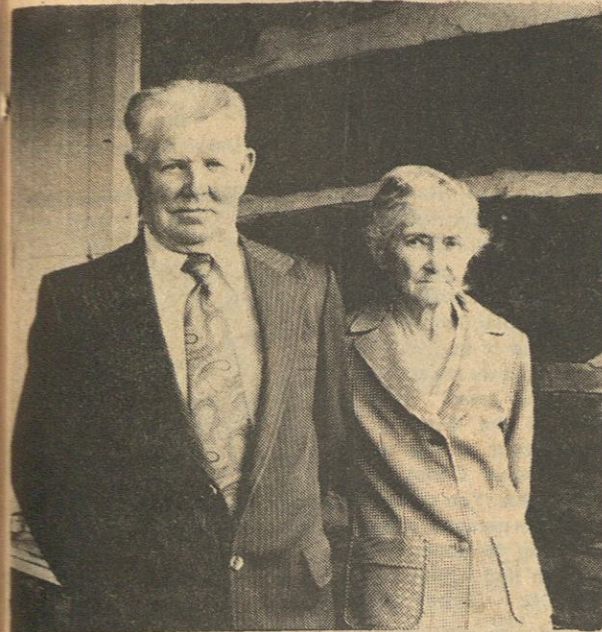

Funny how ten dollars looks so big when you take it to church and so small when you take it to the store!

Funny how big an hour of serving God and His Church looks and how small sixty minutes are when even twice that time is spent playing

golf, bridge, watching television or going fishing! Funny how laborious it is to read a chapter in the Bible and how easy it is to read a few hundred pages of some best seller!

Funny how we look upon reading mail from the church as a real chore and yet pore eagerly over hundreds of pages of news-stand magazines!

Funny how we can't think of anything to say when we pray, but have no difficulty thinking of things to say over the phone to a friend or over the back fence to a neighbor!

Funny how it seems we need two or more weeks to fit an event at church into our schedule, but are able to adjust it for a social invitation at

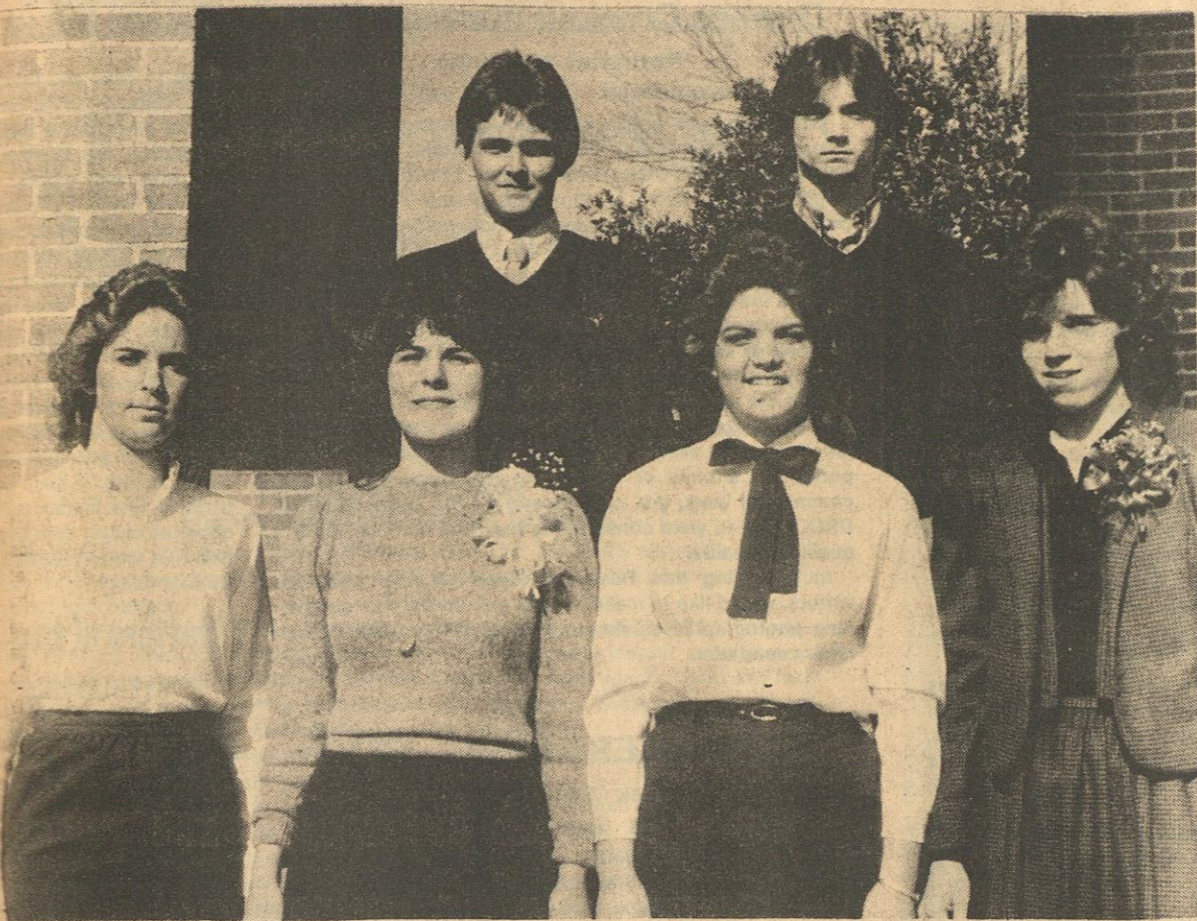

SAVING ENERGY

Reading your meter helps you save

Some people say, "Why should I learn to read my electric meter? The power company decides what to charge me every month." Well, it's true—your power distributor will keep track of your monthly use even if you don't. But learning to read the meter yourself can have some advantages you've probably never thought of.

Reading your own electric meter once a week—or even once a day—will help you anticipate how much your bill will be at the end of the month. And you'll probably find some ways to cut down on the amount of electricity you're using. You'll think about the electric meter, for instance, when you adjust your heating or cooling thermostat. You'll think about it when you use hot water—for bathing, for washing clothes and dishes. And probably you'll start turning off lights when they aren't needed and the TV when no one is watching.

Because the electric meter is one of the most precisely accurate instruments known, few commodities you buy are measured as accurately as your electricity. In much the same way as a service station gas pump measures gallons of gasoline going into your car's tank, the electric meter at your home measures the kilowatt-hours of electricity you use each month.

The very few times an electric meter is in error it is probably turning too slowly because of dust, ants, or rainwater in its delicate gears.

Stop by your power distributor's office for free booklets that will show you how to read your meter and how to cut down on your electricity use. Learn to read your meter and to trust it.

Label Reading Offers Chance For Savings

Labels can help people plan more nutritious and economical meals. By comparing the nutritive values of various brands of foods, people can get more nutrition for the food dollar.

In addition, nutritional labeling helps in selecting food for special diets such as low sodium or low cholesterol and allows calorie counting.

Remember, when reading labels, that all food

processors must list ingredients in the order in which they predominate - in other words, in decreasing order according to their weight present in the product. For instance, a label that lists "Gravy, beef, carrots, salt," contains more gravy than anything else. A label that reads "Water, sugar, orange juice" has orange juice in the least amount. Consumers should read ingredient lists carefully to determine if they're getting what they pay for.

Examine the labels of "new" products and old standbys. Compare prices, new contents, ingredient lists, and, if available, nutrition information panels. The cost for a slightly modified product - the addition of a little seasoning, a sauce, a few onions or

imitation bits, some raisins, dates, or nuts - may be more than the consumer wishes to pay.

For economy, use cereals that need cooking rather than instant or ready-to-eat cereals. Also, unsweetened cereals can be selected. If practical, buy cereals in family-size boxes.

Consider cost and quality of the finished product is deciding whether to buy convenience foods. How much the person enjoys cooking and how much time available for it also will influence the choice. Some foods are easy to prepare, yet inexpensive. 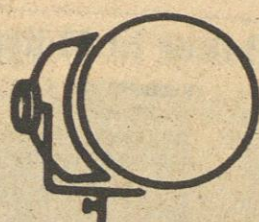

Ground Hog

Just in case you haven't thought of it, Ground Hog Day, a forecasting the weather the next six weeks, theory is that if the chog, or woodchuck, out of his winter quarters this day and sees his shadow, there will be six more of winter, but if the cloudy and he does not see his shadow, he will go to his winter quarters long sleep for the weather will soon give balmy spring. Matters of Health

HYPOTHERMIA

WHAT PRECAUTIONS SHOULD I TAKE TO PREVENT THIS COLD WEATHER? Those most vulnerable to hypothermia - a dangerous drop in body temperature - are the elderly and the infirm. However, everyone should take precautions to stay warm. Even if the temperature is around 30° or 40°, the chill factor may create adverse effects of colder weather.

The best advice is to stay warm. If the body temperature drops even a few degrees, death may result.

Here are a few pointers to keep warm:

- Wear layers of clothing. Layers provide more insulation and warmth than a single thickness.

- Carry blankets in case of emergency. They are taking a trip or have been out at night, a thermal blanket, such as cotton, is a good precaution.

- Wear a hat. As much as 40% of body heat may be lost through the head.

- Protect hands and feet. Wind, especially with moisture, can cause frostbite or exposed skin in seconds. Your nose and face, too, are at risk.

- Stay dry. If you get wet, heat will be lost much more rapidly. Get dry as soon as possible.

- Wear wool rather than cotton if you may be getting wet. Wool retains its heat properties even when wet.

- Avoid alcohol. Alcohol warms the skin, but causes the inner body to lose heat more rapidly.

If someone around you develops hypothermia, call them to a hospital immediately. They may be warmed from the inside, for example, by warm oxygen.

Symptoms of hypothermia include chills, confusion, fatigue, sleepiness. It may cease as body temperature continues to rise. Give the person some warm to drink. Wrap blankets to prevent loss of heat and provide warmth, if possible, to the victim to a hospital immediately and prevent heat loss as far as possible.

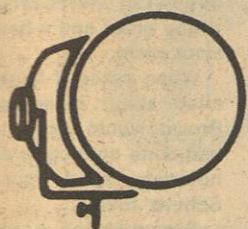
Research studies have shown that those from cold climates, such as Michigan, do not adjust to cold as quickly as those from warm areas. So if you work outdoors, hunt, are elderly or otherwise vulnerable to hypothermia, precautions. Cold can be very dangerous.

ASCS Farm News

BRIDGES ADVISES FARMERS
TO CONSIDER ACREAGE
REDUCTION BENEFITS
Now that the acreage

reduction sign-up period is underway, Howard R. Bridges, Chairman of the Tishomingo County ASC Committee, advises farmers to seriously consider program benefits. The sign-up ends February 24.

Bridges said, "The acreage reduction program enables all

farmers to work together to help control stocks and improve crop prices by reducing production. At the same time, it protects them from economic disasters."

Farm program participants who reduce their wheat acres by 30 percent will be eligible for target price protection at \$4.45 per bushel, price support loans at \$3.30 per bushel and the option to reduce their acreage an additional 10 to 20 percent for payment-in-kind at 75 percent of their program yield.

Target prices act as insurance to keep farmers in business, if prices stay below acceptable levels, Bridges said. "Farmers need money to operate. If they get a loan through our program it will give them time to hold for a better market."

The 10 percent feed grain acreage reduction program offers farmers target prices of \$3.03 per bushel for corn, \$2.88 for grain sorghum, \$2.60 for barley and \$1.60 a bushel for oats. Program participants also will be eligible for loan rates of \$2.55 a bushel for corn, \$2.42 for sorghum, \$2.08 for barley and \$1.31 per bushel for oats.

Farmers who reduce their upland cotton acres by 25 percent are eligible for an 81 cents per pound target price and a 55 cents per pound loan rate. Cotton growers who reduce extra long staple acres by 10 percent will be eligible for target price protection at 99 cents per pound and loans at 82.50 cents per pound.

Benefits of the 25 percent rice acreage reduction program include a target price of \$11.90 per hundred-weight and a loan rate of \$8.00 per hundred weight.

Bridges said farmers need to use the acreage reduction program as a safety net, particularly for wheat since supplies still remain above desirable levels. "Strong participation will further reduce stocks and continue to balance supply with demand so that the market will pay a profitable price." The ASCS official said farm price improvements will depend greatly on the willingness of farmers to participate in the program.

Tishomingo County farmers are urged to consider the acreage reduction program for their farm operations and visit the local ASCS office at their earliest convenience.

eye-appeal may sometimes justify the extra cost.

Generally speaking, all macaroni foods may be used interchangeably. Just substitute them weight for weight. The small shapes are best in soup and the larger varieties have a better appearance with sauce. Some shapes are particularly suited for holding sauce. Others can be stuffed with a meat or cheese mixture.

All of the macaroni products will almost double in volume when cooked. One ounce of uncooked macaroni makes an average serving, but many prefer to cook an ounce and a half per person to allow for "seconds". Families with teenagers should allow about two ounces uncooked macaroni per serving.

Some like macaroni products rather chewy and firm. Others like them quite tender. There is one don't; never overcook to a soft, mushy stage.

Macaroni, spaghetti, or noodles are done when a piece pressed gently with a spoon against the side of the pan cuts cleanly. Follow the general cooking directions on the manufacturer's package. Cooking time varies with the product. Give the budget a boost with macaroni products.

Macaroni foods are fine budget stretchers because they help extend more expensive foods. They are

nutritional "extenders" providing important energy and vegetable protein.

When combined with small amounts of meat, eggs, cheese or fish, they provide appetizing, economical, and nourishing main dishes for a pleasant change after the rich holiday foods.

Best quality macaroni

products, (spaghetti, macaroni, noodles), are made from Durum wheat. This is a spring wheat, grown chiefly in Minnesota, Montana and the Dakotas, and is relatively high in protein and low in starch. When milled, Durum breaks into granules about the size and texture of salt.

This granule substance is called semolina. In making macaroni foods, water is mixed with semolina to make a stiff dough. After all the ingredients are blended, kneaded, and cut or pressed in the desired shapes and lengths - the macaroni foods are dried, not baked.

The amber color of the wheat is reflected in the rich cream color of the finished products, which are hard and brittle.

Noodles are made from the same mixture of semolina and water, but differ from their macaroni cousins in that they contain egg yolks.

Vegetables such as spinach, tomatoes, beets, carrots, or parsley may be added to macaroni products. The name of the vegetable is included in the name of the product. Spinach egg noodles are an example. Most macaroni foods are enriched with iron and B

vitamins. Enriched products must be labeled "enriched" and the nutrients listed on the package.

Spaghetti, macaroni and noodles are made in many wondrous and exciting designs. In fact, these good foods are available in more than 150 different shapes. The supermarket has a large variety of shapes and sizes, and a visit to an Italian delicatessen or grocery store will acquaint you with many more interesting variations.

Macaroni is generally short and tubular. Spaghetti and vermicelli are longer and rod-shaped. Noodles are flat and are usually formed into ribbons.

There are the elbows and rods - and there are shells, bows, stars, alphabets, spirals, corkscrews, little pipes and turbans. There are straight ribbons and curly ribbons, fine noodles, medium noodles and wide noodles.

Lasagne is a popular food these days. It looks somewhat like a broad noodle, but contains no egg. Vermicelli is a thinner version of spaghetti.

Glamorous shapes usually cost a little more than the usual shapes, but the extra
