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

The first commercial barge tow to enter the north end of

the Tenn-Tom Waterway is shown above at Bay Springs Lock and Dam where

unloading had begun. The tug crossed the Divide Section of the Waterway on Monday,

February 27, with five steel stoplogs that were going to Bay Springs.

## FIRST COMMERCIAL TOW PASSES THROUGH CANAL

Monday, February 27, marked a historical event for the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway in Northeast Mississippi as the first commercial tow passed through the Divide Section of the Waterway Monday and Tuesday, February 27 and 28, enroute to Bay Springs Lock and Dam near Belmont. The 6700 acre lake began filling October 3, 1983, with the water releases being made from a control structure at

the relocated Southern Railway Bridge near Burnsville. The lake was completely filled on December 1, 1983.

The 200 foot long barge was being pushed by the 50 foot long tug named "The Bud Mack". "The Bud Mack", with a 400 HP motor, is from the Muscle Shoals Marine Service. The barge was carrying the last 5 steel stoplog panels, weighing approximately 300 tons, to be

used at Bay Springs. The barge and two were being guided by a three-man crew from the Muscle Shoals Marine Service.

The stoplogs on board the barge are big removable gates, which are used to close off the upper gate entrances of a dam during periods of routine maintenance or in case of any emergency situation requiring drainage of a lock. The stoplogs were fabricated

and shipped by Amerifab of Tucker, GA, and were carried by rail to Chattanooga.

The one barge tow arrived as expected late Monday evening at Paden, where Highway 30 crosses the Waterway, and tied up for the evening. Early Tuesday the course was resumed to Bay Springs.

Upon arrival at Bay Springs around 8:00 a.m., a crew began unloading the panels.

According to Iuka Chief of Police, Joel Holliman, a Booneville man was arrested in connection with the theft of two pickup trucks, which were stolen from McNatt Ford Sales, Inc., located on Highway 25 South in Iuka. The trucks, a 1984 F-150 black long wheel base, fully loaded pickup and a 1984 F-150 white Explorer fully loaded pickup, were stolen Friday, February 17, some time after 8:00 p.m.

Chief Holliman stated, "The man was charged with auto theft and is being housed in the Tishomingo County Jail. He is under a \$10,000 bond."

Investigation will continue.

## SEVEN STUDENTS INJURED IN CRASH

Three Iuka students were hospitalized Tuesday afternoon, February 28, following a school bus accident just east of the city limits of Iuka on Highway 72.

According to Bill Bingham, State Trooper, an Iuka school bus and an 18-wheeler loaded with logs collided around 3:15 p.m. during a heavy snowfall. The bus had stopped in front of the home of Sonny Taylor, approximately 1/2 mile east of Iuka, when the accident occurred. The log truck, driven by its owner, Ralph Vandiver, of Route 2, Tishomingo, entered a deep curve behind the bus and apparently lost control on the damp road as he attempted to stop. The bus

was hit from behind by the logs and turned over on its left side. The log truck jackknifed, causing the logs to spill into the highway blocking traffic in both lanes.

Some twenty students were occupying the bus at the time of the accident. On an average school day, the bus normally carries approximately 60 passengers.

Dale Wadkins, a sophomore at Iuka High School, was transferred from Tishomingo County Hospital to Magnolia Hospital in Corinth and then on to Booneville Hospital. Wadkins received a leg injury and is in the intensive care unit at Booneville. He is the son of

Mr. and Mrs. Milford Wadkins. Geoffrey Malone, an eighth grader, suffered a broken hip and was transferred to Baptist Hospital in Memphis where he will undergo surgery later this week. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Malone. Ronnie Gilchrist, an eighth grader, was also hospitalized in the Tishomingo County Hospital for observation. Ronnie is the son of Mr. and Mrs. L.C. Gilchrist.

Corrie Kent, a fourth grader; Faith Arnold, fifth grader; Stephanie Wadkins, fifth grader; Travis Luttrell, fourth grader; and the bus driver, Joe Patrick, were all taken to Tishomingo County Hospital for observation and released. Other students aboard the bus at the time of the accident included: Jimmy Smullins, age 12; Jason Brown, age 13; Bradley Smullins, age 6; Hope Arnold, age 7; Laura Bridges, age 7; Carrie Cain, age 7; Jamie Whit-

field, age 8; Tommy Rogers, age 7; Brian Flanagan, age 10; Regina Luttrell, age 12; Lesa Belue, age 10; Michael Belue, age 7; and Tina Luttrell, age 17.

The Highway Patrol stated that no arrests or charges have been made, but the accident continues under investigation.

## UNEMPLOYMENT RATE RISES TO 22.1 PERCENT

Charles Smith, Manager of the Mississippi State Employment Service, announced today that statistics just released revealed a slight rise in the number unemployed in Tishomingo County at mid-January. The rate of unemployment rose to 22.1 percent, 1.9 percent higher than the December figure, and 3.3 percent above the estimate for January, 1983. The current rate of unemployment represented 2,180 persons unemployed. The county's civilian labor force was estimated to be 9,850 at mid-January, 20 below the previous estimate and 1,560 below the estimate for January, 1983. Approximately 7,670 Tishomingo County residents were employed at mid-January, compared to 7,880 in December and 9,260 in January, 1983.

Overall establishment based employment, consisting of manufacturing and nonmanufacturing employment, in the county totaled 5,440, 30 below the previous estimate and 1,000 below the figure for one year ago. Manufacturing jobs totaled 2,400 at mid-month, approximately the same as that of one month ago but 650

below the estimate for January, 1983. Nonmanufacturing employment totaled 3,050, which was 10 below the December figure but 330 below that of one year ago.

Smith also noted that in the four-county area of Alcorn, Prentiss, Tippah, and Tishomingo the civilian labor force totaled 45,260 at mid-January. This reflects a loss of 350 from the December estimate, and a significant loss of 1,610 from January one year ago. The civilian labor force is a combination of employed and unemployed persons. The number of employed persons fell to 38,640 at mid-January, representing a substantial decline of 1,160 from last month but an upward trend of 590 from January, 1983. The monthly losses were recorded in all categories while the yearly gains was also experienced in all groups. An estimated 6,620 workers were unemployed in the four-county area



**Iuka School Bus Overturned**

During a heavy snowfall on Tuesday, February 28, around 3:15 p.m., the Iuka School Bus

pictured above overturned in a deep curve on Hwy. 72 East, approximately 1/2 mile from the City Limits of Iuka. Twenty

students were passengers on the bus at the time of the mishap. In an attempt to avoid hitting the stopped bus, a loaded 18-wheeler log truck

jackknifed and the logs spilled onto the bus. Seven students aboard the bus were injured with only three being hospitalized.



**Log Truck Jackknifes To Avoid Collision**

Heavy snowfall covered the scene of an Iuka school bus and a log truck accident on Tuesday, which hospitalized

three students. Four other students and the bus driver were transported to Tishomingo County Hospital where they were observed and released. The log truck,

being driven by its owner, Ralph Vandiver, rounded the curve and spotted the stopped bus with a child disembarking. With quick thinking and skill, the truck driver swerved his truck in order to

prevent collision into the rear of the bus. The truck then jackknifed, causing the logs to break loose from the truck and crash into the right rear corner of the bus causing it to flip on the left side.

### GARDENS

Much of the planting of seeds and vegetable plants for late spring and early summer harvests is done in March and April. Spring weather can be tricky, warm

and sunny one day with snow and sleet the next. It is important to get seed and plants of early cool-season vegetables planted early enough to make a crop before the heat of summer, but very little is gained by planting in cold,

### wet soils.

A soil thermometer is a useful piece of garden equipment. Most vegetable seed germinate slowly, if at all, at soil temperatures below 50 degrees. Seed that stay in cold, wet soil are more likely to rot than germinate. Most poor stands can be blamed on poor soil conditions, not poor seed.

Vegetables to plant in March are sweet corn, mustard, turnips, leaf lettuce, onions and radishes. Check the Garden Tabloids, Extension Publication 1091, for recommended planting dates in your part of the state.

Transplants of tomatoes, pepper and eggplant will be stunted and possibly killed if set in cold, wet soils. Provide protection from wind and cold temperatures with milk jugs or plastic cups. Tomato cages lined with clear plastic get young plants off to a good start.

Roll out the black plastic to warm the soil for vegetables like cucumbers, melons, squash, peppers, tomatoes and eggplant. Plastic tunnels made from clear poly and supported by heavy wire hoops help protect tender vegetables from wind and cold temperatures.

For you Good Friday planters, the day is April 20, April 3, 4, 8, 9 and 14 are days for planting above ground crops, and April 16, 17, 20, 21, 22, 25, 26 and 27 are days to plant root crops, according to my almanac. I guess that should work for sweet potatoes and jicama, but I've always heard Good Friday was the day to plant beans.

Sweet potatoes bedded in early March should produce slips for mid-late April planting. The beds must be kept warm. When planting home-grown or purchased sweet potato slips, clip the bottom inch off the plant before planting to help reduce disease problems.

Be sure to apply fertilizers at the proper time and in the correct amounts. Over fertilization and wrong placement prior to planting can injure seeds, young plants and transplants. Too much fertilizer in the spring can cause serious problems in early summer when soils

### begin to dry.

Side-dress early vegetables, such as leafy greens, onions and cabbage, with nitrogen. See the Garden Tabloid for time and amounts of fertilizer for side-dressing all garden vegetables.

If you plan to use a herbicide to control weeds and grasses, remember the best herbicides for gardens should be applied before planting or immediately after planting when no weeds are present. Read the package label before using and follow instructions.

Do not place organic mulches like pine needles and straw around plants in the spring garden. They make the plants more subject to cold injury.

Watch for insects on early vegetables, especially aphids on English peas and leafy greens. Seed corn maggots and cutworms can be especially damaging to early seeds and vegetable plants. Check the Garden Tabloid for recommended controls.

Harden off home-grown and tender transplants before setting them in the garden. Gradually increase exposure to sun and cool temperatures. Wind can be more damaging than cold. Use a starter solution when setting vegetable transplants to encourage rapid root growth and recovery from transplant shock.

Irish potato sprouts that get frosted should recover and go on to make a crop. Side-dress Irish potatoes with nitrogen when the sprouts begin to crack through the soil.

When planting vegetables include some of the savory herbs like dill, basil, sage, anise, borage, summer savory, horseradish, and marjoram. They'll take only a little space, are easily started from seed, and will entice you to try them in different ways.

## Chatting With Your Home Economist

### Color and Clothes

Colors you wear can affect the apparent size of your

body, influence your mood and reveal personality traits. Certain colors flatter you while others are unbecoming. You can create the look you like with the colors you wear by following a few basic principles.

Before you can choose flattering colors for yourself you must first analyze the color of your skin, eyes and hair; your personal coloring.

To determine personal coloring, carefully study your facial skin for your color undertone. Analyze your skin in good light without make-up.

Skin generally will reflect either a cool or warm feeling. Cool skins include pink, blue or violet undertones while warm skins include peach, copper, yellow or red cast. Opaque, white or beige skin and those with a slight greenish tint reflect a cool appearance.

Generally, colors that become your skin will also flatter your hair and eyes, but this may not always be true. You may have to experiment to find colors that coordinate with your personal coloring.

Becoming colors add clearness or flow to the skin and bring out the highlights of the hair and eyes. Unbecoming colors are those which drain color from the skin leaving it shallow and unhealthy in appearance.

People with cool coloring generally appear more attractive when wearing cool colors while people with warm coloring find warm colors more becoming.

An unbecoming color can be made wearable with careful selection of the amount used and the placement of the color. Use small amounts away from the face or use it in combination with a darker accent or add a becoming color or light value near the face.

Build your wardrobe around one or two colors that compliment your personal coloring and your figure. Clothing color affects the apparent body size. Generally

warm, light and bright colors make the figure appear larger while cool, dark and dull colors make the figure appear smaller.

Color contrasts can have dramatic results. The place where different colors meet produces a focal point which draws the eye's attention. For example, a bright or contrasting color worn on or near the head draws the eye vertically and has a slenderizing effect. A contrasting or brightly colored belt draws attention to the waistline, cuts apparent height, and has a broadening effect.

A one color outfit gives the illusion of being taller and slimmer. Dark colored pants or skirts slim heavy hips while dark colored blouses help de-emphasize full busts. Light colored pants or blouses increase apparent size.

Color is probably the most important aspect of your wardrobe. While it cannot be separated from the style, line, texture of the fabric, or design of the garment, color has the dominant role in making an outfit flattering. Determine your best colors and coordinate your wardrobe around them.

### Chicken San Jose

1-1/2 tsps. each garlic salt, celery salt, and paprika  
1/8 tsp. red pepper

A Gift of Life For Those of Tishomingo County

On Monday night, February 20, two people were trapped in an auto that literally wrapped around a tree in Tupelo. A team of rescuers used the "Jaws of Life" in their life-saving efforts. After an hour's work on the mass of twisted metal, both passengers were freed and transported to the hospital.

Rodney Box, the eighteen-year-old, had his legs fractured and pinned under the dash. The only way they could reach him was to take the top of the car off, which is just one of the capabilities of the "jaws". They decided that this was the best route to take Mr. Box from the car to minimize movement to both spine and injured legs. Knowing that one wrong move could cut or pinch the spinal cord or cause more tissue damage to the leg, they had to move with care.

BUT, thanks to the "Jaws of Life" equipment, Mr. Box could be lifted straight out of the car, placed on a spine board with his leg splinted, and rushed on to the hospital for treatment.

What are we going to do in Tishomingo County when someone is trapped in a mass of twisted metal? Will they

have to die, or lose life-saving time, because of their imprisonment? The ambulances now carrying power pac tools, but we have nothing to free those caught in serious accidents. With your help, we hope that this fact will soon change.

Those who will use this equipment will be trained, but first we must get the equipment. We now have, thanks to many of you, a power unit and a double hook-up hose. (This you can see in the emergency room at the hospital.) However, we have no tools to hook-up to it. As of this date, we have collected a total of \$4,950.89. Our goal is \$10,255.00. Will you help in the teamwork here in Tishomingo County to save lives? ## National Nutrition Month

March is National Nutrition Month and a year dominated by the Olympics. The nation's largest group of nutrition professionals warns Americans not to imitate their heroes without properly fueling their bodies.

"There are a lot of armchair athletes who think they can go straight from their living rooms to the gym," says Marilyn B. Haschke, R.D., president of The American Dietetic Association (ADA). "But getting in shape has just as much to do with good nutrition as flexing your muscles."

That's why the 50,000 members of the ADA will be promoting balanced diets for athletic prowess during the 12th annual campaign to improve American eating habits that kicks off March 1.

National Nutrition Month, sponsored by the ADA, is one of the most massive public

education projects of its kind, designed this year to help Americans get in shape sensibly.

"Everybody Wins With Good Nutrition" is the theme that thousands of dietitians and nutritionists will be touting throughout March to show that healthy eating is a major part of fitness.

"So many people get caught up in the excitement of the Olympics and they think they can go out and start running two miles a day," Haschke says. "What they don't realize is that these Olympians have been training for years and good nutrition has a lot to do with their success."

Before starting any exercise program, ADA advises a complete assessment of your cardiovascular health through a stress test - especially if you're over 35, smoke or have high blood pressure. An exercise program should be planned around the results of the

stress test and for most healthy persons, the ADA recommends 15 to 60 minutes of continuous aerobic activity three to five times a week.

The key, Haschke says, is to begin a program realistically and comfortably and work up to a desired goal. ADA also suggests that each exercise session begin with 5 to 10 minutes of warm-up to avoid muscle and joint injury.

Aerobic exercise - jogging, brisk walking, dancing, swimming or cycling - should be strenuous to a point of conditioning muscles and the cardiovascular system without being excessive. A brisk walking program is recommended by ADA for persons of all ages. Jogging, however, is not for everyone and may cause foot, leg and knee injuries.

A balanced diet should be part of the fitness program for persons at all levels of activity, Haschke says, contending that poor eating habits

can detract from the benefits of exercise. Food choices should be made from the four food groups - fruits and vegetables, enriched or whole grain breads and cereals and fish, chicken, beans or meat.

## ASCS Farm News

BLOCK EXTENDS FARM PROGRAM SIGN-UP: Secretary of Agriculture John

R. Block extended the sign-up period for 1984 cotton, feed grain and wheat programs by three weeks through March 16, 1984. Check with the county office before the deadline date on the 1984 farm program.

**FARM PROGRAMS PROTECT AGAINST WEATHER RISKS:** In addition to price support loans, target price protection and other benefits, Howard R. Bridges, Chairman of the Tishomingo County ASCS Committee, says the 1984 acreage reduction programs protect farmers against weather risks.

"If a natural disaster reduces crops, farmers who participate in the program are still eligible for deficiency payments. If favorable weather causes a surplus, program participants can protect their income by using price support loans as marketing tools, in addition to the deficiency payments," Bridges said. Deficiency payments are made when market prices fall below target levels.

To take advantage of this protection, farmers must sign up between now and March 16th and comply with acreage reduction requirements of 30 percent for wheat, 10 percent for feed grains, and 25 percent for upland cotton. The wheat program contains an optional 10 to 20 percent land diversion with a payment-kind equal to 75 percent of the farm's program yield, according to Bridges.

He said unless participation in the wheat

program is relatively high, supplies could reach record levels and wheat prices could decline. USDA officials expect this year's ending stocks of wheat to be about 1.4 billion bushels, down 8 percent from a year earlier but still considerably above a desirable level of 1 billion bushels.

Cropland removed from production by the programs to balance supply with demand will be placed in an acreage conservation reserve.

"We encourage program participants to place their more erosive land in the conservation reserve and take advantage of the 90 percent cost-sharing in the ACP for establishing long-term cover crops or planting trees on these acres," the ASCS of-

ficial said. Farmers should apply for the acreage reduc-

tion programs early to avoid last minute rush.

The plan would be a cooperative effort by the State Parks Department, the Natchez Trace Parkway and Tishomingo County to present visitors to the State with a facility similar to that at Jeff Busby (halfway point) on the Trace. 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



The U.S. Department of Commerce released the results of a survey of businesses which they predicted would show above average growth in 1984. Several of these caught my interest since they relate to Tishomingo County.

Wood products were expected to show a 6% gain due to increased housing construction, price and profit increases in the pulp, paper and board industry as well as increases in exports to Japan and several European nations. A 9.6% increase in pulp and paper products export was predicted, which would be significant to that industry. Of course, Tishomingo County can benefit from this increase since timber is a primary product of the County and surrounding area.

The steel industry was predicted to increase by 14% which would move production to 70% of capacity. With imports being reduced by approximately 4%, this should result in more steel (coils, beams) being shipped through Yellow Creek Port. That means more work for local trucking operators, greater food sales at local restaurants and even some increase in gasoline sales.

Mentioned as showing significant gains were:  
Plastics.....8%  
Retail Sales.....9%  
Mobile Homes.....10%  
Electronic Equipment...17%

We will be aggressively and actively looking for industrial firms in these and the previously mentioned industries, who could benefit by locating a plant in Tishomingo County. Our goal is a "major" plant located at one of our industrial parks in 1984, employing a hundred plus people.

## IRS List Of Audit Items

The Jackson District of the Internal Revenue Service has compiled a list of the items most often disallowed during the examination of tax returns. Taxpayers should give special attention to the following list when preparing their 1983 tax return.

EXEMPTIONS — Taxpayers claiming an exemption for one or more individuals for which they did not provide more than half their total support during the tax year. This is especially true of separated or divorced parents.

EARNED INCOME CREDIT — Numerous individuals claim this credit when they are not the Head of Household and have not provided more than half of the cost of maintaining a household for a dependent child.

HEAD OF HOUSEHOLD FILING STATUS — Many taxpayers claim this filing status when they did not provide

more than half the cost of keeping up a home that was the principal home all year for a child that lived with the taxpayer.

EMPLOYEE BUSINESS EXPENSE — Inadequate records are the most common cause for disallowing employee business expenses.

UNDERSTATEMENT OF INCOME — This includes leaving off wages, salaries, or tips paid to the taxpayer by an employer, as well as interest, dividends, and other compensation by non-employers.

OFFICE IN THE HOME — This item can only be deducted when the area of the house being claimed is used exclusively for business.

BASE RATE FOR TELEPHONE — Even though the employer may occasionally call the taxpayer, this is not an eligible deduction if the telephone is the principally used personal telephone for the family.

EDUCATION EXPENSE — This item cannot be claimed if it qualifies the taxpayer for a new trade or business. It can only be claimed if it is required to maintain or im-

prove the taxpayer's skills in his or her current business or profession.

The Internal Revenue Service has free publications covering these and other subjects. Instructions for ordering the publications are contained in the packages mailed to taxpayers.

The survey can help a homebuyer or developer determine soil-related hazards or limitations that affect homesites. It can help city and county planners determine the suitability of areas for housing or onsite sewage disposal systems.

### SLEEP MEDICINES

Medicines which cause a person to become drowsy and fall asleep are called *hypnotics*. These medicines work by depressing the central nervous system. Most are prescribed for short periods of time (4 to 5 days) because (1) they can become habit-forming, and (2) they can actually disrupt sleep patterns and, with prolonged use, make insomnia worse. Many individuals do not realize that hypnotics do not actually treat the underlying causes of insomnia.

Commonly used hypnotics include *fluazepam*, the *barbiturates*, *chloral hydrate*, *ethchlorvynol*, and *glutethimide*. A number of other medicines which cause drowsiness are not classified as hypnotics. Such medicines include the antihistamines, pain relievers, muscle relaxants, and tranquilizers. Although these latter drugs may produce sleep, they are not routinely prescribed as hypnotics.

All sleep medicines should be used with *extreme care*. With some medicines, drowsiness may linger into the daytime hours and limit one's ability to function. It is best to avoid driving a vehicle or operating dangerous equipment until one finds out the daytime effects of sleep medicines. When used as directed, sleep medicines are relatively safe and beneficial.







### Knowing What To Do After Auto Accident

Knowing what to do if you're involved in an auto accident can help speed the

processing of your insurance claim and may help to avoid entangling you in a needless lawsuit.

The Insurance Information Institute suggests that you put a pad and pencil in your glove compartment so that you will always be able to record details of your accident. You might also want to create a checklist to follow so that you don't skip over anything in the confusion following an accident.

You should always stop if you're involved in an accident, identify yourself, and summon aid for any persons who might be injured.

Tell the basic facts of the accident to the investigating police officer, and record the officer's name, badge number and jurisdiction.

Do not admit to fault under any circumstances. All the facts surrounding the accident may not be immediately apparent.

Obtain the name, home and business address, and home and business phone number of other drivers involved in

the accident. Write down the same information for any witnesses, including passengers in other cars.

Record all circumstances surrounding the accident, including the time of day, location, weather and road conditions, any evidence of law violations, approximate speed of all cars involved and any other relevant facts.

Diagram the scene of the accident as accurately as possible, including the precise placement of cars and people.

Mississippi law requires you to file a written report with the state within five days of all accidents involving at least \$250 in damages.

Your insurance policy requires that you also notify your insurance company as soon as possible about the accident. Be prepared to give the company the information that you've collected about the accident, such as names, addresses and phone numbers of all drivers involved and of all witnesses. Other of your duties include

- \*cooperating with your insurance company in investigating, settling and defending any claims or lawsuits arising from the accident
- \*promptly sending copies of any notices or legal papers to your insurer
- \*submitting to physical exams, paid for by the insurer, as required
- \*submitting a "proof of loss" statement when required by your insurer.

Your policy also obligates you to notify the police promptly when your accident is with a hit-and-run driver or when your car has been stolen.

Finally, take steps to protect your car from further damage. Keep receipts of any necessary expenses for this purpose; these will be reimbursed by your insurance company.

### Help Prevent Fire Loss

With the greater part of the winter season behind us and spring just around the corner, the urge to get outside and

start burning unwanted leaves and grass is a common one. However, this ordinary practice of cleaning up around the place can be the cause of much financial loss and great tragedy if certain precautions are not taken.

During the past few weeks several such fires have gotten out of control requiring the assistance of the Volunteer Fire Departments. Time is of great importance in a situation such as this.

The First District Volunteer Fire Department urges all citizens to keep their Volunteer Fire Department numbers posted near their telephone, so that the number may be dialed at a moment's notice.

The numbers to call for the First District are: Sheriff's Office: 423-6185. (The Volunteer Fire Departments are now equipped with paging systems, and when you call the Sheriff's Office and report a fire, the call goes out immediately to the volunteer firefighters in your district.)

If the Sheriff's number is busy, then call any one of the following First District numbers: 423-9395; 423-6515; or, 423-3162.

Uncontrolled fires are a great threat to our homes and property, to our forests, and to our lives. Let's work together to keep the losses down everywhere.
