Two Car Collision Hospitalizes Tishomingo County Sheriff

Tishomingo County Sheriff, Bob Payne, was hospitalized late Wednesday night, March 14, after receiving a serious head injury when his unmarked police car was hit.

According to Chief Deputy, Mike Kemp, Payne was released from Tishomingo County Hospital Friday morning, March 16, after being hospitalized two days with a concussion, head laceration, and minor cuts and bruises.

The collision occurred in the Midway Community shortly after midnight when Payne's car was struck by the driver of a second car.

According to Kemp, he and Payne had been working late on investigating the murders of three Tishomingo County residents and were on their way home when the accident occurred. Upon striking the Sheriff's car, the other car, a 1971 Chevelle, then struck a building just off Highway 25 South, demolishing the front

Clyde Ledbetter Shot At His Home

A Tishomingo County woman is housed in Tishomingo County Jail following the shooting of her cousin, Clyde Ledbetter, age 32.

Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department received the call from Tishomingo County Hospital at approximately 10:35 p.m. Tuesday, March 20, reporting that Mr. Ledbetter had been shot and was suffering a stomach wound to the right side.

The incident occurred at the mobile home of Ledbetter on Mill Creek Road.

According to Chief Deputy Mike Kemp, the weapon used was a small caliber pistol.

Ledbetter has been transferred to a Tupelo hospital where his condition is listed as critical.

Martha Ledbetter Campbell, of Iuka, has been charged with the shooting.

County EMT's To Sponsor Road Block Saturday, March 31

The Tishomingo County EMT's will be holding a road block on Saturday, March 31, in Iuka. The money collected will go toward in-service for the Emergency Medical Technicians.

The law requires EMT licenses renewal every two years, with 48 hours of in-service on topics that are received by the group. Some of this material can be obtained at the hospital, but in order to obtain this material the money must be paid. Not only is the in-service needed, but a 12 hour course in defensive driving, auto extrication or dispatcher training. A 20 hour refresher course from a junior college, plus an annual CPR card from the Red Cross.

Licenses cannot be renewed without the above training. Most people like to know that when an ambulance must be called that qualified people are available to take care of them or their family or friends. For this reason, we are asking for your support in this road block.

Murder Investigation Continues

On January 28, county residents were shocked at the discovery of the brutal murders of Mr. and Mrs. Webb Johnson, of Iuka. Since that time, city, county and state officials have worked hard in an attempt to solve the crime.

The Tishomingo County News has attempted to keep readers accurately informed concerning the investigation. There have been many rumors, but rumors are not fact. The fact is - no arrests have been made and no substantial leads have been released to the press.

Recently an article appeared in a daily newspaper, which indicated that bonds, owned by the Johnsons, were cashed up North. Some of our readers have asked why we did not print this story. The reason is, according to the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department, this information is false and does not concern this case in any way.

We have never and will never print rumors or idle gossip. When valid information is released to us by officials, we will share it with our readers.

Iuka Expands Corporate Limits In Northwest Section

The expansion of Iuka's corporate limits was approved Friday, March 16, with Chancellor Fred P. Wright presiding over the no opposition hearing.

Mayor John H. Biggs, City Clerk Joyce Brumley and Iuka Police Chief Joel Holliman gave the testimony in favor of the addition of approximately 99 acres in the northwest corner of Iuka.

The addition will become effective 10 days after the hearing date at which time the request will then be sent immediately to the U.S. Justice Department for approval.

The annexation area covers the city ball parks, the Iuka Elementary School, 20 acres of the Industrial Park, Briarwood Subdivision, a public housing development, and some other houses, along with the Tennessee River Pulp and Paper Company. According to Mayor Biggs, the expansion area is located in the growth area of the city.

Chief Holliman testified that the area, which affects around 90-100 families, is presently being patrolled by city police in order to protect the school and the facilities of the city park.

According to Mayor Biggs, an identical proposal was

denied three years ago with improvements demanded and that all improvements have been made since that time. He told city attorney, Richard Clark, who questioned the three, that the city already provides utility service and that water, sewer, gas and the addition of fire and police protection could be furnished to the area without any additional cost to the city. This alone would offset any new taxes required by coming inside the city limits, he said. Since Iuka has a Class 8 fire rating, the new area would be offered fire protection that will allow resident's fire insurance to be reduced 35-

40%, Mayor Biggs said. Mrs. Brumley testified that the city would receive a total of around \$4,200 in taxes from the area and that \$3,000 of this would be in lieu of tax from the Housing Authority.

Chief Holliman and Mayor Biggs stated that no additional law enforcement personnel or new city employees would be needed to serve the area.

Mr. Clark agreed that the annexation of the area was necessary in the city's growth, because of the elementary school, part of the industrial park, baseball fields and a youth center were already located there.

TVA Approves Low-Cost Loans To Yellow Creek Area

An estimated 430 private-sector jobs will be created in the three-county impact area of TVA's deferred Yellow Creek Nuclear Plant construction project through loans totalling \$865,000 for expansion of eight businesses.

Loans on seven projects in

the counties of Tishomingo and Alcorn, Mississippi, and Hardin, Tennessee, have been approved. TVA is awaiting restructuring of the financing of one other Hardin County project before closing a loan previously approved.

"TVA made the funds available to local develop-

ment organizations and they, in turn, lend to viable businesses," explained T. Patrick O'Connor, TVA Economic Impact Mitigation Program manager. "By making money available at attractive interest rates, TVA is helping stimulate the creation of jobs that might

not have occurred otherwise."

Projects approved for loans through the Tishomingo County Development Foundation include:

* \$100,000 to Golden Sales, Inc., a furniture manufacturing operation in Golden, Mississippi, for construction of an additional 15,000 square-foot building.

* \$55,000 to Sun Air Projects, Inc., a metal fabricating company in Belmont, Mississippi, for construction of a 6,250 square-foot building.

* \$32,500 to Screw Machine Products, Inc., for relocation to Belmont and expansion of operations.

* \$225,000 to Kaydee Metal Products, Inc., a metal furniture manufacturing firm in Belmont, for equipment and inventory purchases.

Projects approved for loans through the City of Savannah, Tennessee, include:

* \$150,000 to The Wise Company, Inc., a manufacturer of industrial and marine seating, for establishing a new manufacturing facility in the Savannah/Hardin County Industrial Park.

* \$50,000 to Olive Hill Lumber Company of Savannah to help get its sawmill into full operation.

The project approved for a loan through the Corinth, Mississippi Chamber of Commerce Industrial Development Association is:

* \$102,500 to Communication Transportation, Inc., a telecommunications equipment manufacturer in Corinth, for assistance in the development and production of a new cellular communications system.

"The TVA Board approved the mitigation program because it recognized that the decision to defer construction at Yellow Creek would place an undue burden on the communities at a time when the economy was already in the midst of a recession," O'Connor said. Similar mitigation programs were implemented in the impact areas for the deferred Hartsville Nuclear Plant in Hartsville, Tennessee, and the canceled Phipps Bend Nuclear Plant near Kingsport, Tennessee. In all, TVA has committed \$3 million in Power funds for the three areas to create an estimated 1,370 jobs through the mitigation program.

Along with the loan program, TVA has initiated a training program in cooperation with state and local community colleges to prepare dislocated workers for employment in the newly created jobs.

Attorney General Outlines Upcoming Summer Primaries

Mississippi's calendar for the upcoming summer primaries was outlined for the state's circuit clerks Monday by Assistant Attorney General Robert Arentson.

Arentson and Attorney

General Ed Pittman addressed the annual conference of circuit clerks in Jackson. Pittman discussed current legislation that would affect the clerks, including the dual registration bill.

Arentson reminded the county officials of upcoming deadlines and procedures that candidates must meet to qualify for the June 5 primaries.

The conference was sponsored by the Mississippi Judicial College.

The Democratic party precinct caucus was held across the state Saturday, March 17, with county conventions to follow on Saturday, March 31. The congressional district conventions are set for Saturday, April 14, and the state convention on Friday and Saturday, May 4 and 5.

The state's Republican party will hold both precinct caucuses and county conventions on Saturday, March 31, with the state convention scheduled for Saturday, April 14.

Friday, April 6, is the deadline for party candidates to qualify for the primary election. The first primary voting will take place on Tuesday, June 5, and the second primary three weeks later on Tuesday, June 26.

The deadline for independent candidates to qualify for the general election is Friday, September 7. The regular election will be held on Tuesday, November 6.

Sales Tax Collections

December, 1983, city sales tax collections made within the county and reported to the Tax Commission totaled \$60,399.86. The final figure was up \$17,755.04 over the November collections.

Listed separately, the six municipalities were: Belmont, \$14,116.53; Burnsville, \$4,593.39; Golden, \$816.61; Iuka, \$37,709.95; Paden, \$29.93; and Tishomingo, \$3,133.45.

The city sales tax collections contained in this report are based on taxes collected by merchants during December and reported to the Tax Commission in January. Payment was made to the cities on or before February 15, 1984.

Blakney previously served as Tishomingo County tax assessor for eight years and tax assessor and collector for four years.

He and his wife, Barbara, have a daughter, Vickie, who is currently working on her doctorate in computer science at Mississippi State University.

TERMITES

Termite swarming season is just around the corner. Swarming activity usually begins in April, and newspaper and television commercials will be reminding you about termites.

This is an opportune time for the homeowner to be alert for termite activity. Inspect for tubes built by termites and clean up and inspect around the foundation of the house. Remove close growing plants, ivy or other plants that hide the foundation and might provide access for termites. Remove wood scraps, firewood or other wood in contact with the soil to help prevent termite entry into the structure.

Persons remodeling, adding on a room, patio, deck or carport should know the importance of pre-treating for termite control. Pre-treatment is the easiest and cheapest termite protection available compared to treating existing structures. If the structure is under contract with a pest

control company and such additions are made without notifying the company, the contract could be cancelled. Here are some points to consider:

1. Inspect and clean up.
2. Pre-treat if you plan to build or add on to your present structure.
3. Check your contract and notify the company before you start so your termite contract will not be cancelled.

Eating the Moderate Fat & Cholesterol Way

Several factors have been linked to heart disease. Among them are high blood cholesterol levels, high blood pressure, diabetes, family history of heart disease, and obesity. In addition, many scientists believe the following conditions raise the risk of heart disease: smoking, stress, physical inactivity, and excessive consumption of fat, saturated fat, cholesterol, and sodium.

High blood cholesterol levels are believed by some to be associated with a greater risk of heart disease, and low levels with a lower risk. Although blood cholesterol levels vary among people, populations with a high consumption of saturated fat and cholesterol tend to have high blood cholesterol levels. Individuality and heredity permit some people to eat a high-fat, high-cholesterol diet and maintain relatively low levels of blood cholesterol, while others consume less and have relatively high levels.

Debate continues about the desirability of making general recommendations to the entire U.S. population regarding intake of dietary fat and cholesterol. Many scientists, including the Surgeon General of the United States, consider it sensible to consume only moderate amounts of fat and cholesterol. Moderation poses no known health-risk, and may reduce your risk of heart attack. No diet, however, will insure against heart disease.

Here are some ways to moderate your intake of total fat, saturated fat, and cholesterol. Start with a few changes you can live with, then go on to others.

Golden Turkey Stroganoff

- 1 tbsp. chopped onion
- 1/4 cup butter, melted
- 1 can (10 oz.) golden mushroom soup
- 1 cup water
- 1 can (4 oz.) mushrooms, drained
- 2 cups (4 oz.) fine or medium noodles
- 2 cups cooked cubed turkey
- 1 bay leaf
- 1/8 tsp. pepper
- 1/2 cup dairy sour cream

Saute onion in butter. Add soup, water, mushrooms and liquid; bring to a boil. Stir in noodles, turkey, bay leaf and pepper; cover and simmer 20 minutes until noodles are tender. Stir occasionally. Blend in sour cream and heat through. Remove bay leaf.

Peanut Price Support Levels Unchanged

Farmers participating in the 1984 peanut program will be eligible to receive a federal support price of \$550 per ton for quota peanuts and \$185 per ton for additional peanuts, the same as last year, according to Howard R. Bridges, Chairman of the Tishomingo County ASC Committee.

Quota peanuts are those grown on a farm within the farm's poundage quota. Additional peanuts are those grown in excess of the farm's poundage quota, or those grown on a farm without a poundage quota.

USDA estimated that 1983 peanut production cost declined from those of 1983, therefore, no increase in the national support level was necessary. Current law

requires the national support price for 1984 quota peanuts to be the same as the 1983 quota support level, adjusted for any increase in the average cost of production, excluding any rise in the land cost for 1983.

Bridges said price support rates on additional peanuts are set as the Secretary of Agriculture deems appropriate, taking into consideration the demand for peanut oil and meal, the expected prices of other vegetable oils and protein meals and the demand for peanuts in the foreign markets. "This rate must be set at a level estimate to ensure no government loss on additional peanuts."

He said additional peanuts must be either delivered under an approved contract with a handler or be placed under the additional price support loan program. Additional loan collateral peanuts from the 1984 crop will be sold by the Commodity Credit Corporation for export edible use at no less than \$425 per ton.

U.S. peanut production in 1983 totaled 3.27 billion pounds, 5 percent below 1982 and 18 percent less than in 1981.

Approving 1984 Contracts

The 1984 farm program sign-up ended on March 16, 1984. Congress is still considering a bill entitled "The Agricultural Commodity Program Adjustment Act of 1984." The 1984 provisions of the cotton, feed grain and rice programs have now become part of Congress' considerations. You will be informed of future details on the 1984 programs as they are developed and passed by Congress.

Pleasant Hill/Midway Water Association

—NOTICE— CORRECTION

The article, which appeared in last week's issue concerning the Pleasant Hill/Midway Water Association, contained several figures which were incorrect.

The Association will be paying \$11,000 per month (not \$11.00) on a million dollar loan.

We regret any inconvenience that the original information caused. For clarity, we will repeat the article in its entirety for our readers:

The Membership Committee of the Pleasant Hill/Midway Water Association met with Mr. Blaylock, of the Jackson F.H.A. Office; Mr. Hulerston, of the Booneville F.H.A. Office; and Mr. David Moore, representing the C&S Engineers, of Booneville; and the Board of Directors of the Water Association on Thursday night, March 8, to discuss further the possibility of getting our \$11.50 water base reduced. After the committee stated our reason for wanting a base rate lower than the \$11.50 per 3,000 gallons, Mr. Blaylock answered by saying the Water Association owed the F.H.A. a little over one (1)

million dollars to be paid during the next 40 years. Broken down monthly our Association or members will be paying \$11,000 per month, or an average of \$18.00 per member each month to the F.H.A. Mr. Blaylock stated there would be no way to draw up a different or longer contract because of higher interest rates. Also, he felt the \$8.00 and \$9.50 base rate the members had offered the F.H.A. would not bring in the \$11,000 we were required to pay each month.

It was stated that members had failed to pay the \$11,000 this past month (February) because so many members had failed to pay their full bill. A member asked what would happen to these members. Mr. Blaylock and the Board of Directors made it loud and clear that all people with delinquent bills would be cut off from the system. Therefore, because of these statements and threats this committee that presented the

members last month with a petition asking you to pay the old base rate of \$6.00 on your March bill. We must say now our efforts have failed to accomplish a reduced rate, and you are free to do as you wish. Pay your water bill any way you feel would be right.

This committee still thinks this loan or debt is too big for our members or association. It will be impossible for us to pay this price for water for the next 40 years. But the Board of Directors has approved this one million dollar loan and the work which has been done and our Board of Directors are the only ones having the power to change anything, especially our water rates and the work being done on the system. The directors tell this committee there is nothing they can do, but continue on with the project, and we, the members, pay what ever size water bill that we will be receiving. If we don't pay in full we will be delinquent and our meters will be pulled. This was also stated on the back of our February water bill.

This committee wants to thank all members for working with us in our effort even though we have failed in getting our rates lowered. We have asked our Board of Directors to meet with us again in March, hoping we might still come up with something that will help the members pay this one million dollar loan. If we can't find something somewhere that will help us, we can only now say - "May the Good Lord help us."

We also passed two important bills affecting convicted criminals. One changes the

method of execution for those convicted after July 1, 1984, to lethal injection. The other limits the number of appeals a convicted person may make. Those favoring the bill noted that the Jimmy Lee Gray case was reviewed 82 times by 26 judges over seven years at a cost of \$300,000 to the state before Gray was executed.

Regarding health care, we voted to extend the moratorium on construction of new health care facilities for one year. However, the bill allows for nursing homes to add beds up to the 60-bed limit. It is estimated that these beds would not be ready for occupancy for two years.

Other bills passed during the week included:
-- a bill requiring indestructible grave markers.
-- a bill allowing teacher personal leave to be taken for personal or professional purposes.

-- a bill allowing all-weather state flags to be flown 24 hours a day.
-- a bill ratifying the 19th amendment which grants women the right to vote.

-- a bill allowing school districts to provide dental insurance with the funds

already eaten.

We are facing a calendar of bills before us. Some of the bills include:
-- a bill establishing ratios for property taxes.
-- a bill setting a date for all special elections.
-- a bill allowing wills.

-- a bill establishing and penalty for version of TV.
-- a bill authorizing of corporal public schools.
-- a bill increasing allowed counties state offenders jails.

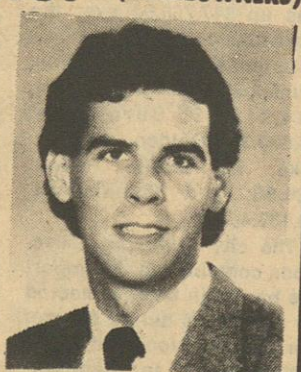

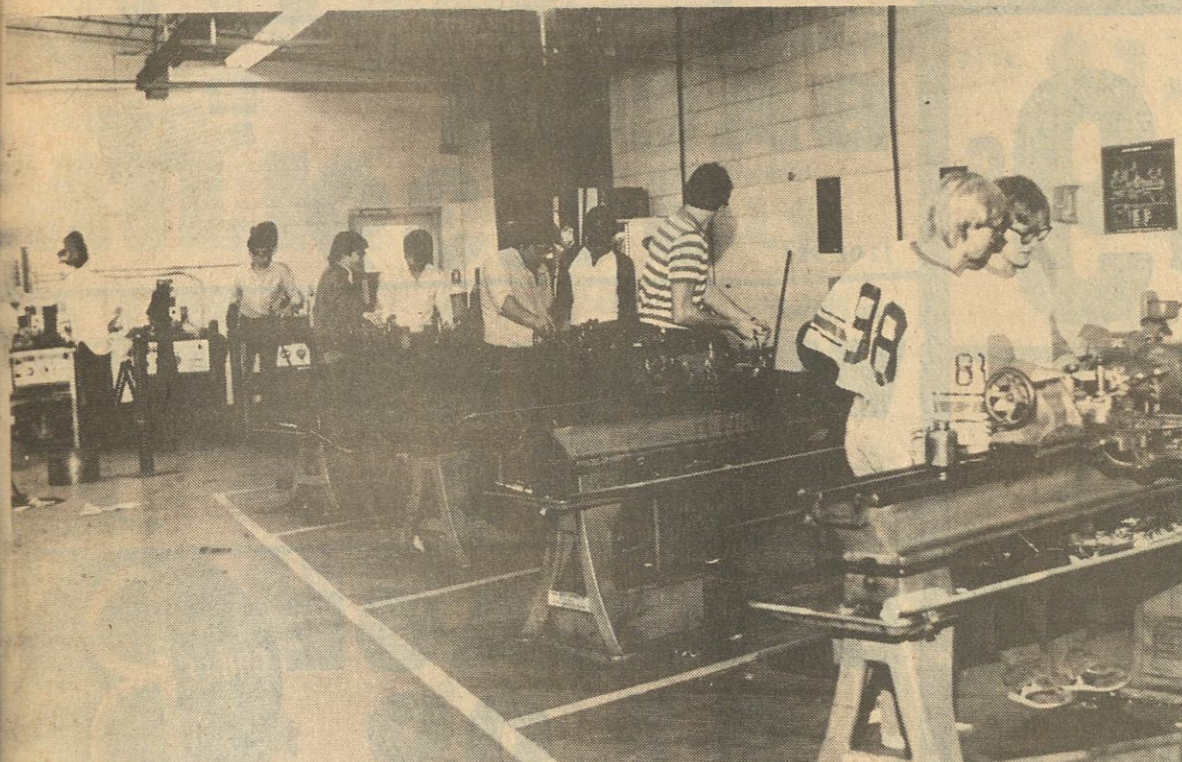
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METAL TRADES DEPARTMENT AT TISHOMINGO COUNTY VO-TECH

Have you wondered if you or your child could receive training in our county to be a Machinist, Welder, Outside Machinist, Pipe Fitter, Drill Press Operator, or Maintenance employee?

We at the Tishomingo County Vo-Tech Center are pleased to say, "YES, we have the equipment and a highly trained instructor who is eager to share his many years' experience with students that want to learn the skills necessary for the job of their choice in the Metal Trades field."

Metal Trades instructor Larry Brown has been in-

involved in this field since 1965. After four years as a machinist apprentice, he worked as a 1st class machinist four years. Then he worked as a shop foreman six years and as a machinist instructor in Tennessee six years. Following this, he was a plant superintendent with KSI Industries. Just before joining the Vo-Tech staff in 1982, he was a machinist with the Ford Corporation in Oklahoma.

Mr. Brown's students are trained to machine parts and to use lathes, mills, drill presses, and surface grinders. They are taught to do

stick, mig, tig, and acetylene welding. They learn to read blueprints and to make precision parts from print specifications. They are taught the proper way to use machine shop equipment by turning, threading, facing, taper turning and knurling, using the proper rpm and feeds. They are given special training in the study of metals, welding beads, and proper heat. To widen students' knowledge of metal trades, sheet metal equipment operation is also taught.

In the District VICA contest in February, Bobby Coker, of Iuka, won 2nd place in Precision Machining and will compete in the State VICA Contest this spring.

In addition to participating in VICA contests, our students compete for a prize given at our annual Awards Banquet in April to the highest-skilled Metal Trades student.

Graduating students receive a certificate showing the number of hours training they have received - 540 hours for 1 year; 1080 hours for 2 years, and 1620 hours for 3 years. With this training, a student has a very good

chance of finding a job in the field or of, at least, entering the job market on an apprentice level.

Poison Prevention Tips

Each year more than 500,000 persons are victims of accidental poisonings; more than half of these are children. The month of March has been declared Poison Prevention Month by the President so that public attention may be focused on this national problem. The following points are presented so that consumers can both prevent and deal effectively with accidental poisonings.

* Choose products with child-resistant closures. Remember that "child-resistant" does not mean child proof. Be sure to properly resecure the closure after use.

* Lock up all medicines

many can be fatal if not properly used. Never tell children that medicine or vitamins are "candy".

* When the illness for which the medicine has been prescribed is over, pour the remaining contents in the sink or flush down the toilet, discard the container.

* Keep household cleaners, insecticides, medicine, furniture polish, etc. out of the reach of children - preferably in locked cabinets, especially any product with a warning label that says, "Keep Out of the Reach of Children".

* Keep poisons in their original containers. Never store dangerous products in a soda bottle or other container that would normally contain food or drink.

* Don't remove warning labels from products. These labels may contain crucial information a Poison Control Center or physician needs to know if your child is poisoned.

* Be aware that common household and garden plants are frequently the cause of poisonings. Know the names of the plants around your house and which may be poisonous.

* Have a 1 oz. bottle of Syrup of Ipecac ready for emergency use. Ipecac is a non-prescription medication that causes vomiting and can be purchased from a pharmacy. ONLY USE IPECAC ON

THE ADVICE OF A POISON CONTROL CENTER OR PHYSICIAN because vomiting may be the wrong treatment for certain poisons.

* Call the State Coordinator in your state or local hospital for the Poison Control Center in your area. Keep the phone number in a readily accessible place in case of an emergency.

Letter To The Editor

In response to the letters from Mr. Rex L. Tuckler appearing in the March 8th and 15th editions of The Tishomingo County News, I wish to agree with him that something must be done to control the large number of stray animals in our area. However, the wide-open, indiscriminate method he mentioned and which has been used in more than one area has invariably ended in the killing or maiming of cherished pets, valuable hunting dogs and near-misses involving human life - Not to mention the court cases and bitterness between once friendly neighbors.

It is a Mississippi law that dogs must be vaccinated against rabies and that the owner be able to prove that if the need arises. It is up to the individual communities to propose, vote on and enforce their own guidelines concerning collaring, tagging and leash laws in their jurisdiction. As the city may be obliged to retain the dog for a specified length of time so that the owner may reclaim the animal and pay a penalty, it can quickly amount to a more costly and time-consuming effort than is first realized.

I mention the above in order to show the readers of the area that whatever measures are finally taken in regard to the stray dog problem, if indeed any are, it is a matter that should be considered by

citizens and city officials alike. It is not something that can be solved by a few letters, telephone calls or pot-shots at miserable, starving strays thrown out by people who are unwilling to be responsible for those animals. The dogs that are tearing up cemeteries, lying squashed on our roadsides and attacking our children are there because PEOPLE put them there, and until PEOPLE are willing to accept their responsibility for control of the dogs PEOPLE will continue to pay the price of protecting their property and lives.

luka is a small town and continues to enjoy the relatively few freedoms left to communities where children and pets can live without a great deal of fear of harm. I personally think that an effort to control the number of unwanted puppies and kittens either through city government or other official organizations is better than an open season on any lost or cast-off animal. I am not trying to protect or justify the type of animal responsible for the death of a seven-year-old child, I am simply suggesting that there is a more logical and more humane way of handling the matter.

Nearly \$52 Million Sought For Public Works In Miss.

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers is seeking almost \$52 million for public works projects in Mississippi during FY 1985.

Senator Thad Cochran, a member of the Senate Appropriations subcommittee on energy and water development, said the \$51,955,000 in various projects was included in the Corps budget request to Congress.

The Senator noted the Appropriations subcommittee would conduct hearings on the budget requests this Spring.

According to the Corps request, the 1985 budget seeks more than \$32.3 million for construction, operation, maintenance and engineering work on projects in the Yazoo Basin.

Over \$19.6 million is being sought for various flood control and navigation projects around the state, the Senator noted. Included are funds totaling over \$11 million for navigation on the Tenn-Tom Waterway in Mississippi and Alabama, over \$3 million for work on the Pascagoula Harbor, \$2 million for flood control efforts on the Tombigbee River and tributaries, and \$813,000 for flood damage prevention work on the Pearl River Basin in Mississippi and Louisiana.

The Corps is asking for \$714,000 for Okatibbee Lake flood control work in the Meridian area, \$509,000 for similar efforts on the East Fork of the Tombigbee River, \$240,000 for navigation work at the Rosedale Harbor, \$185,000 for the Gulfport Harbor, \$190,000 for the Pearl River, and \$105,000 for the

Claiborne County port.

In the Yazoo Basin, over \$15.9 million is being sought for operation and maintenance on various lakes, reservoirs, rivers and streams, while almost \$16.4 million in the budget request is for construction projects in the basin.

The Northeast Mississippi Ag Expo will be held on March 22-23 at the Best Western Trace Inn in Tupelo.

The two-day Expo will include educational sessions on crop and livestock production, exhibits and a farm equipment auction, said Charles Twitty, county agent in Lee County.

Sessions will be held from 9 a.m. to 11:15 a.m. on March 22 and 8:30 a.m. to 11 a.m. on March 23. Topics include beef production, grain sorghum production, doublecropping, soybean production, financial management, home fruit production, and ornamental and house plant production.

Exhibits including farm equipment and supplies, chemicals, and other relating to agriculture will be shown from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. on March 22 and March 23. The equipment auction will be held at 11 a.m. on March 23.

Also held in conjunction with the Expo will be the Northeast Mississippi Beef Evaluation Station bull test sale. The sale will be held at 1 p.m. on March 22.

About 30 performance-tested bulls representing five breeds will be sold.

A youth awards banquet will be held at 11:30 a.m. on March 22 to recognize the achievements of Extension 4-H youth, Future Farmer of America members and other youth.

Unemployment Rate Drops to 10.8 In Mississippi

Mississippi's unemployment rate dropped to 10.8 in February, a decrease of three-tenths of a percentage point compared to January's revised jobless rate of 11.1 percent, according to Mississippi Employment Security Commission Executive Director Cohen Robertson. Last year's February unemployment rate was 14.7 percent.

The 10.8 percent unemployment rate for the state was higher than the 8.4 percent national rate for February. Mississippi Employment Security Commission figures showed 110,500 unemployed and 910,400 employed out of a civilian labor force of 1,020,900. The initial unemployment insurance claims totaled 17,095 in February.

Fifty-four of the state's 82 counties had unemployment rates of 10.0 percent or higher in February. Of that number, six counties had unemployment rates above 20.0 percent.

The counties having the highest unemployment rates in February were Sharkey, with 26.3 percent; Tunica, with 24.7 percent; Jefferson, with 21.8 percent, and Clarke,

with an unemployment rate of 21.6 percent.

Lafayette, DeSoto counties had the lowest jobless rates of 6.0 percent, a rate of 6.3 percent. DeSoto had a unemployment rate of 6.3 percent.

Fifty-eight showed a decrease in unemployment from January to February. Twenty-two counties showed an increase. The employment rate in Adams and Jones changed.

Divorce Proceeding Settlement Be Taxable

If a taxpayer's assets to an ex-spouse as part of a divorce settlement, there may be a tax gain or loss on the transfer. Internal Revenue Service

Generally, the gain or loss is the difference between the adjusted basis of the property and its fair market value at the time of the transfer.

However, a loss is deductible if the property is business or property.

The spouse making the transfer would realize a gain or loss on the transfer. An equal division of property that is co-owned by spouses does not result in a gain or loss, according to IRS.

POINT OF LAW

(Prepared by the Mississippi State Bar. Some rights may vary from locality to locality. Always consult an attorney when in doubt about your legal rights.)

Q: I went to a small claims court where I won a verdict. Now I am having trouble getting the person to pay me as instructed by the court. What can I do?

A: If you are aware of the defendant's place of employment you can obtain a garnishment against the wages of the defendant. An execution may be levied on any non-exempt personal property or real property which is owned by the defendant. This property would then be sold and the proceeds applied to satisfying your judgement.

Q: My husband and I have been having problems, and two weeks ago he moved to another county to live with his brother. Yesterday I got a petition and summons in the mail where he has sued me for divorce in the county in which he now lives. A friend

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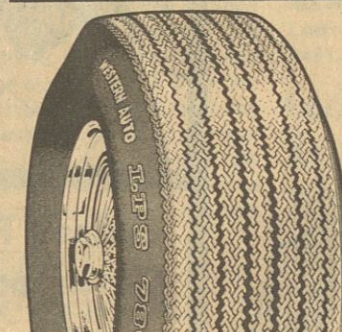

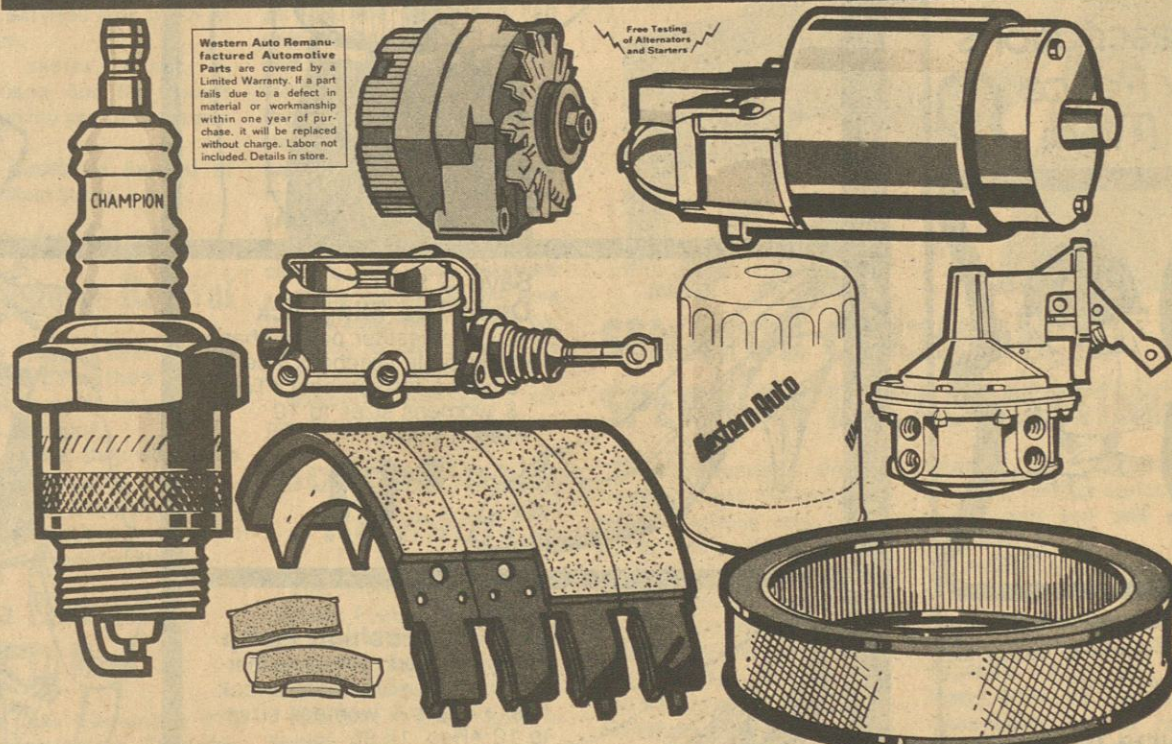

Weekly Legislative Report

When the Senate convened at 2 p.m. last Monday, we had 168 bills on the calendar requiring action before midnight Thursday to keep them alive during the 1983 regular session. Although a number of bills required several hours of debate each, by working late into the night we were able to act on a majority of the bills.

Some of the important bills which caused lengthy discussion included:

GRAVEL ROAD MAINTENANCE: The Senate finally agreed that county boards of supervisors should have the authority to maintain, at their discretion, gravel or shell private driveways which are used as school bus turnarounds. Furthermore, the

supervisors are authorized to call an election to let county voters decide if the county should be allowed to maintain gravel or shell driveways damaged by weather. No construction of new private access roads is allowed and use of concrete or asphalt is not allowed.

VOTER REGISTRATION: The Senate agreed to allow voters to register at one place to be eligible to vote in all elections. Currently, city residents must register at city hall to vote in municipal elections and at the courthouse to be eligible to vote in all other elections.

ETHICS: This bill proposes an amendment to the Constitution. If passed by the House of Representatives, it will be put to the citizens of Mississippi for adoption in the November general election. The bill, in effect, prohibits a public official from being interested in any

contract with the governmental entity of which he is a member and prohibits officials from misusing their official position to obtain any financial benefit for themselves or for any persons or businesses with which they are associated. It also authorizes the Legislature to further regulate conduct by public officials and create a commission composed of members appointed by each branch of government to accomplish this intent.

SOVEREIGN IMMUNITY: Sovereign immunity means that governmental entities cannot be sued. However, the Supreme Court ruled in one case that a city could be sued. This bill continues the doctrine of sovereign immunity for one year, after which it provides for governmental entities to be insured against claims that may be filed in certain instances. Senators favoring the bill

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believe that citizens should have some recourse in cases where damage or injury is caused by cases such as negligence of governmental employees. The bill calls for the Commissioner of Insurance over the next year to develop a plan for purchase of liability insurance by governmental bodies.

Among the other bills passed during the week were:
-- a bill to create a statewide Group Insurance Program for teachers. If enacted into law, it would reduce considerably the monthly amount presently required by teachers now participating in the local district program.

-- a bill increasing teacher sick leave days from seven to eight next year and nine days the next year and increasing allowed accumulation of sick leave days from 30 to 45.

-- a bill allowing family members of persons hospitalized 50 miles from

home and all years and older to vote absentee ballot.

-- a bill providing Living Will which allows sons to authorize will of life-sustaining mechanisms under conditions.
