ONE INJURED IN TWO VEHICLE COLLISION

An Iuka resident was hospitalized Monday, April 9, following a late afternoon crash which involved two vehicles. The accident oc-

curred on Mississippi Highway 25 at Midway.

According to Mississippi Highway Patrolman Jerry Boyd, the two vehicles in-

volved in the impact were a 1963 Ford pickup, driven by Felix A. Cox, of Iuka, and a 1973 White truck, driven by Kenneth Holland, of Red Bay,

Ala. According to Boyd, the collision occurred around 3:30 p.m. when the south-bound pickup, driven by Mr. Cox was attempting to make a left hand turn off Hwy. 25 onto Midway Road.

The Ford was struck in the right side and was dragged by the loaded log truck approximately 50 feet before coming to a skidded stop just off the right side of the highway.

Mr. Cox was transferred to the Tishomingo County Hospital where he received treatment for a broken rib and a laceration of the right leg.

The Highway Patrol stated that no arrests or charges have been made, but the accident continues under investigation.

Stolen Car Recovered

Two male subjects are currently being housed in the Franklin County, Ala. jail following the early morning theft of a 1980 Mercury Cougar from an apartment dwelling in Red Bay, Ala., Sunday, April 8.

Sheriff Bob Payne said Michael Harrison, a resident of Tishomingo County, along with an unnamed juvenile, from Red Bay, were apprehended following a two-hour high speed chase, which originated in Franklin County and ended with the arrest of the pair near Tishomingo State Park. According to Payne, the two were evidently taken into custody around 6:00 a.m. as they attempted to flee the abandoned vehicle.

The owner of the vehicle apparently notified Franklin County authorities around 4:00 a.m. Sunday. Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department and the Tishomingo and Belmont Police Departments were subsequently alerted. Also participating in the chase and instrumental in the recovery of the stolen vehicle was Tishomingo Neighborhood Watch #4.

Sorghum or Corn?

Tishomingo County farmers may have difficulty choosing between planting sorghum and corn for silage use this year. Examining some facts about each crop should help you make the best choice for your needs.

Pound for pound, corn silage has more total digestible nutrients and is higher in net energy than any other silage. Sorghum silage of comparable quality has about 90 percent of the feed value of corn silage.

Under Mississippi conditions without irrigation, corn will produce 10 to 16 tons of silage per acre. You may make higher yields on highly fertile soils.

Silage type sorghums will produce more tons of forage per acre than corn. From intermediate or tall growing grain-type sorghums you can expect 12 to 18 tons per acre and from grain or combine-type sorghum, six to nine tons per acre.

Soils that are deep, well drained and not subject to drought stress can be planted in March or early April. These soils will produce more high quality feed planted in corn.

Sorghum is adapted to a wider range of soil types than corn. Shallow soils and heavier clay loam or clay soils are subject to some drought stress. Other soils that are not well drained cannot be planted until late April or

Getting Your Money's Worth

Are you getting the most for your shopping dollar? Are there occasions when you wonder whether you are really getting your money's worth? Knowing what to buy, when to buy, where to buy, and how much to spend can help you make choices that will help you get your money's worth when you shop.

Planning is an important part of buying. With buying comes the responsibility of meeting personal and family needs and making the most of your income. Planning can help you meet the most important and the greatest number of needs while staying within the limits of your income.

Learning as much as you can about the items you want to buy before you go to the store will help you plan. It will help you know what to expect to pay, what the reasonable price is, where you can find the product, and what features are important to you.

For example, if you need a washing machine, do you want a three-speed or will a two-speed do? Remember, extra features can be very expensive. You may not need a deluxe model; the standard may do the job at a much more reasonable price.

There are various sources of information you can use to find out more about the item you want. Ask friends and relatives about the particular products they have chosen. Are they satisfied? You also can look in magazines, catalogs, and newspapers for current prices and products available. Consumer publications such as, CHANGING TIMES, CONSUMER REPORTS, and CONSUMER RESEARCH, may give information to make product comparisons. Your Extension Home Economist is a good source of assistance.

Shopping with a list can help in several ways. It helps you remember the things you do need. It helps you avoid buying things you don't need. And it may help you save time by avoiding extra trips.

Where Should I Buy It?
Each time you buy

something there are several places you might find it. Informed consumers know that each store or place to buy will have different prices and service. There is no one best place to shop. It is important to choose the place which gives you what you want at a fair price. It is also important to buy from sellers you know you can trust.

Golden Broiled Chicken

1 cup cider vinegar
¾ cup cooking oil
4 ½ teaspoons salt
1 tsp. poultry seasoning
½ tsp. white pepper
1 egg, beaten
½ cup sliced onion
2 (3 lb.) broiler-fryers, quartered

Combine vinegar, oil, salt, poultry seasoning, pepper, egg and onion in a 2-quart saucepan. Stirring constantly, bring mixture to a boil. Pour over chicken and let stand at room temperature for 1 hour. Place chicken, skin side down on broiler pan. Place pan in broiler, 7 to 9 inches from heat. Broil for 30 minutes, basting frequently with marinade. Turn chicken over and broil. Broil another 15 minutes or until chicken is tender and golden. Makes 4 to 8 servings.

USDA REPORTS APRIL CCC LOAN INTEREST RATE OF 10.375 PERCENT: Commodity and farm storage loans disbursed in April by the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Commodity Credit Corporation will carry a 10.375 percent interest rate, said CCC Vice President C. Hoke Leggett.

TIFY FALL-SEEDED CROPS: Farmers have until May 1 to report the sizes and intended uses of their wheat, oats, barley, rye and other fall-seeded small grains to the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

Fall-seeded crops which are not certified by the deadline will be ineligible for program benefits.

Howard R. Bridges, Chairman of the Tishomingo County ASC Committee said some farmers reported their small grains when they signed up for the 1984 acreage reduction programs and some reported spring-seeded crops.

ASCS randomly checks farms to verify that the acreage reports are accurate and also provides aerial photographs for farmers to identify their fields. "The acreage reports will be used to determine compliance with

farm programs and serve as a basis for program base acreage," Bridges said. To be eligible for support loans, farm and other program farmers who participate in 1984 programs are required to report the actual acreage on a field basis. "Farmers who sign up for the program could benefit also by identifying their plants because the 1984 acreage base will be used to establish crop base," the ASC said.

Tishomingo County farmers who have not reported their fall-seeded crops are urged to do so by May 1. Local ASCS office is from 8:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Friday. Office is located at 200 Port Street in Iuka.

Legislative Report

This week the Senate will continue to focus mainly on Appropriations and Revenue bills as we face a deadline of Thursday, March 29, for floor action on these bills originating in the Senate. Also, the committees are active considering bills passed by the House of Representatives, looking toward a Tuesday, April 3, deadline for committee action on these bills.

Last week the Senate agreed to set up two committees to work over the summer and fall on two important and complicated issues. One panel will make a comprehensive study of taxation in Mississippi, looking at the need for and plans for tax reform. The committee is to be composed of six members of the Senate, two from each Supreme Court district to be appointed by the Lieutenant Governor; six members of the House of Representatives, two from each Supreme Court

district to be appointed by the Speaker; and 12 members of the general public to be appointed by the Governor. The report, which is due no later than January 15, 1985, is to address at least the following four areas: compilation of existing taxes of state and local governments; comparison of Mississippi's tax structure to that of other states; proposals for changes in taxation; and the cumulative effect of the taxes imposed and their allocations to the state, county or city. The other committee is to

study the Mississippi Workmen's Compensation Law and make recommendations to reform of it to the Senate no later than December 1, 1984. The committee is to be composed of nine Senators to be appointed by the Lieutenant Governor.

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Legislative Report

By: Sen. Irb Benjamin

This week the Senate continued to consider bills which have been passed by the

House of Representatives just as the House will be taking action on Senate-passed bills. Thursday, April 12, is the deadline for floor action on these bills.

Several bills which the

Senate passed were killed in inaction of House committees. Some of these include: -- the proposal to raise the legal drinking age in Mississippi from 18 to 19. However, there has been some talk of introducing a resolution to allow special consideration of a bill to stiffen the penalties for violation of the existing law.

-- the proposal to establish uniform school districts to replace the current five different types of districts throughout the state.

-- the proposal to allow county boards of supervisors to dig graves for county residents for a fee.

The House did pass the proposal setting assessment ratios for ad valorem taxes at 15 percent for real and per-

sonal property and 30 percent for automobiles and utilities. However, the House did not agree to the Senate proposal to grant a 40 percent exemption of real and personal property for taxation.

The Senate Constitution Committee did not report out the House-proposed amendment to the Constitution which would create a state lottery.

Proposals which the House and Senate have agreed upon are raising the Medicaid spending ceiling to \$90 million for this year to prevent the program from running out of funds and a proposed amendment to the Constitution regarding ethics of public officials.

Agricultural Programs Adjustment Act of 1984. The Act re-opens the sign-up period for the 1984 Wheat Program ONLY. Acreage Conservation Reserve (ACR) devoted to wheat before January 12, 1984, may be designated as ACR and may be hayed or grazed at the option of the Mississippi State ASC Committee. The new sign-up period for wheat begins April 16, 1984 and ends on May 4, 1984.

Diversion payments will be made and will equal to the diverted acreage (10 percent of the base), times the farm yield, times \$2.70 a bushel. Advance payment will equal to 50 percent of the total payment. Operators of all farms with a wheat base who did not sign: (1) An ASCS-477 for wheat before close of business (COB) March 16, 1984 may now sign an ASCS-477 for wheat only and CCC-477 (2) A CCC-477 before COB March 16, 1984 may now sign it if the ASCS-477 for the farm for wheat has already been signed.

The final crop reporting date and disposal deadline is May 4, 1984 for wheat and oats. If you have a 1984 wheat base, you should check with the county office about changes in the 1984 wheat program.

Hwy. Commissioner Speaks To Iuka Rotary Club

Northern District Highway Commissioner Zack Stewart Wednesday told members of the Iuka Rotary Club that good highways serving the Tenn-Tom Waterway region will make the area more attractive to prospective industries.

"We hear a lot about the advantages of water transportation the waterway will offer, but people drive to work, shop and visit on our highways," the highway official said.

He reported to the club members on two highways with improvement projects underway now. He said that a stretch of new four-lane on

U.S. 72 from Iuka to the Alabama State Line will be open in late summer.

Another seven-mile segment of the highway from Iuka to Burnsville will be placed under contract in June at an estimated cost of approximately \$10.6 million.

Mississippi Highway 25 has an overlay program underway from the Iuka interchange to Tishomingo.

Other projects on U.S. 72 are moving forward under a pilot federally funded program under the "Jobs Bill" and will eventually provide four-lane accommodation for motorists from Corinth to the Alabama-Mississippi Line.
