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

Distribution At County Welfare Department

The Tishomingo County Welfare Department will distribute cheese, butter and NFD milk on Thursday, May 17, 1984, at the Tishomingo County Welfare Office, beginning at 8:00 a.m.

As in the previous distribution, the voucher system will be used. The vouchers will be given to those eligible beginning May 1, and should be picked up in the Food Stamp Office, Food Stamp recipients, who receive their food stamps by mail, will receive a voucher in their May Food Stamp mail issuance. No duplicate vouchers will be issued.

In addition to food stamp recipients, other low income households may be eligible. Eligibility is based on income, which is self-declared. These people must come to the Welfare Office to make application or have their current application updated and to


receive a voucher.

Distribution will be on a first come - first served basis. Those receiving the food are asked to bring a paper sack for their convenience in carrying the items.

Pre-Registration At Iuka Elementary

Pre-school registration for new first grade students attending Iuka Elementary School for the 1984-85 school year will be held Friday, May 4, at the elementary school from 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. Students presently enrolled in the first grade will not attend school on this day.

According to state law, a child must be six years of age on or before September 1 to enroll in school.

Each child entering school this fall must have a certified copy of his or her birth certificate and a blue form, known as a certificate of immunization, which can be obtained from the Health Department or local physician. Parents do not need these two certificates to pre-register their children; however, the forms must be submitted to the school before the child can begin in the fall. The school nurse will be present to answer questions.

If, for any reason, a child cannot be registered at the given time, parents are asked to contact the elementary school office at 423-9290.

KILLER TORNADOS DAMAGE COUNTY

Easter morning's bright sunshine revealed clear skies in Mississippi, as residents awoke only hours after a number of tornados swept through the northern part of the state with a driving force of 40-50 miles per hour killing 15 and injuring more than 100. Property loss was heavy in

Burnsville due to the funnel cloud which raged throughout North Mississippi. According to Burnsville Mayor, A.T. Marlar, Jr., no serious injuries were reported as a result of the sharp winds which raked the town around 6:15 p.m. on Saturday evening, April 21. "A car

wash, owned by Chip Timbes, was demolished and nearby houses damaged," Marlar said. Northview Apartments received roof damages and Gann Brothers Furniture and Appliance was heavily damaged with the windows of the establishment broken by high winds. Mayor Marlar estimated the property damage to be approximately \$150,000. He said that he is uncertain whether the town will seek state aid to repair damages.

Charles Boothe, a Burnsville resident, is one who does not like tornados. Mr. Boothe was outside his home checking for damage the morning after the turbulent clouds passed over when he found a cancelled check near his chicken coop. The date of the check was 1973 and was written on an account at the Mechanic's Bank of Water Valley, MS. According to Mrs. Boothe, the check was soaking wet and after drying it off it became legible. "The check belonged to Ruby Burden, one of the death victims in the Water Valley tragedy. It was unusual how it came this far, Water Valley is about 100 miles from here," she said.

Damage was massive to the residence of William Davis, of the New Salem Community. The tornado uprooted approximately 90 cedar trees and left them strewn in the yard and around the house. The tin roof, which covered the house was stripped off and an outside shed was completely destroyed. Mr. Davis was not at home at the time of the storm.

Mississippi Governor, Bill Allain, spent Saturday night in a highway patrol cruiser touring the devastated areas of Mississippi. Allain returned to Jackson late Sunday evening, declaring a state of emergency in ten counties - Yalobusha, Union, Tallahatchie, Leflore, Tippah, Alcorn, Benton, Lafayette, Sunflower and Tishomingo.

On Monday, April 23, Allain cautioned victims of weekend twisters in north Mississippi to beware of fire in hiring contractors for repair work.

"During the weekend I toured some of the affected areas and talked with victims first hand. I was made aware of the vast amount of repair work necessary in the area and the lack of contractors to conduct this work. As a result, there is a good possibility that out-of-town and even out-of-state contractors could do a large amount of this repair work. While most of these business people are reputable, honest concerns, the possibility of encountering 'fly-by-night' contractors exists," said Gov. Allain. "To prevent any more loss by the victims, I urge

them to contact local merchants and contractors, local insurance companies, the State Better Business Bureau, or the State Consumer Protection Division, before hiring contractors you do not know personally. In addition, any of the victims of the storms should obtain written contracts outlining work to be done and the cost before commissioning the contractors. No job should be completely paid for, prior to its completion," he stated.

According to a spokesman for the National Weather Service Office in Tupelo, a survey team has been formed to determine some facts about the tornados. Exact locations, the width, the length, the fatalities of the twister will be compiled and placed in the Weather Service Office, in order to help give more reliable percentages for forecasts of tornados. This will also aid in the warnings of Mississippi residents to find shelter in case of severe weather.

Residents of Water Valley, Mississippi, are in desperate need of blankets, sheets, pillows, pillow cases and canned goods.

Northeast Miss. To Receive Assistance From FmHA

The Farmers Home Administration today threw its resources into the rebuilding efforts in tornado ravaged North Mississippi.

"FmHA is not required to wait on a disaster declaration," Barrett said. "We have millions of dollars available under our present programs and those people need help right now."

Barrett said that any low-income victims could qualify for low interest loans to repair or replace damaged housing and that FmHA's highest priority would be the processing of these housing loans.

FmHA will also send a team of Construction Inspectors into the stricken areas to help its borrowers with insurance claims and will turn over 25 houses owned by FmHA to relief officials for temporary shelter in these counties.

Barrett urged victims to contact their local County FmHA Office for assistance.

Supplemental Funds To Serve County Unemployed

According to information received from Rep. Mack L. Wadkins (D) Iuka, a request for supplemental funds to serve the unemployed in Tishomingo County was made to Region IV Division of Health Services in Atlanta, Ga. A grant in the amount of \$35,000 was approved last year to provide medical services for the unemployed who had no means of paying for needed medical services.

Contracted arrangements to provide the health services were established with six physicians in Tishomingo County and with the Tishomingo County Hospital. Wadkins stated that several of the physicians have expressed their satisfaction with the present arrangement.

Wadkins also stated that a request for an additional \$35,000 has been filed by the

Shiloh-Pickwick Health Services, Inc. at Pickwick Dam, Tenn.

Region IV Community Health Center's appropriations for fiscal year 1984 will be about \$1.66 million. The region includes Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee and Mississippi. A tentative allocation in the amount of \$174,153 has been designated for the State of Mississippi.

Wadkins says that he thinks the funds have an excellent chance of being approved because of the continued high unemployment rate and the need for services. The unemployment rate at the time the application was filed was 21.1%. This unemployment rate is among the highest in the state, Wadkins said.

Tishomingo To Hold Special Election

A special election for filling the position of Alderman in Tishomingo will be held Tuesday, May 1, at the Tishomingo City Hall.

Purpose for the election will be to fill the unexpired term of James Wade, former Alderman, who is now Mayor of Tishomingo.

Two Tishomingo residents have qualified for the office: Timothy Wright and Bertha Tidwell.

The polls will be open from 7:00 a.m. until 6:00 p.m. All residents are urged to vote.

Seed Maggots Hinder Gardeners

Home gardeners often plant early to get rapid seed germination and growth, but instead may get seed maggots.

These insects become a pest when seed is planted too early in soil that is high in organic matter.

The adult of this particular pest is a small fly that deposits eggs on the soil surface on seed or seedlings. After hatching, the yellowish-white maggots burrow into the seed or seedling destroying germination and growth potential.

Vegetables attacked by this pest usually fail to germinate or if they do sprout, plants are weak and sickly. If these symptoms appear, examine seed and seedlings for the presence of fly larvae.

Replanting is often necessary by the time this pest is discovered because of

extensive stand damage. Planting on a well prepared seedbed when conditions are right for germination and growth can help prevent problems with this insect.

For information on insecticide recommendations in control of seed maggots, contact the Extension Office.

Many varieties are well adapted to Mississippi growing conditions. Although no single variety should be considered superior to all others, in some situations there are varieties that are better suited than others.

BUYING & USING A PRESSURE CANNER

Proper canning procedures are essential for preserving low-acid foods.

Meat, fish, poultry, and all vegetables except tomatoes must be processed in a pressure canner. It takes temperatures higher than boiling to kill bacteria which cause botulism. These bacteria are in the soil and may be on the food. Unless they are destroyed, they can grow in the food and produce a deadly poison.

There are two basic types of pressure canners on the market. One has a dial gauge that registers pressure. The other has a weighted gauge which jiggles when the desired pressure is reached. Each type of canner works well. It's a matter of personal preference and availability as to which one is used.

When using a pressure canner, it's important to read the directions. If the canner has a dial gauge, it should be

tested at least once a year for accuracy. Contact the local Extension Home Economist for information on testing pressure canners.

Auctions or garage sales may not be the best places to buy a pressure canner. Before purchasing a used canner, be sure it has an instruction book. Examine the rubber gasket. It should be flexible; not brittle or cracked. Be sure it is a canner for which replacement parts are available.

A canner which does not operate properly will not be safe for home canning. The canner must reach the right pressure and hold the pressure constant during the processing time to assure a safe canned product.

Before the canning season starts, it is recommended that water be put into the canner and brought to pressure in the usual way to see that it is working properly. Do this well in advance of the canning season to allow time for any repairs.

Pressure canners come in many sizes. The large canners hold more jars. Some are tall enough for two layers of pint jars. The size chosen depends on the amount of low-acid foods to be canned.

A pressure saucepan can be used for canning small quantities if it has a weighted gauge or dial to control pressure. When using a pressure saucepan, add 20 minutes to the processing time for the canned food. This compensates for the faster heating and cooling.

A pressure canner also can double as a water bath canner. When used this way, do not tighten the lid or put on a weighted gauge. The taller models are appropriate for processing quart jars since there is enough head space to have two inches of water over the top of the jars without the fear of water boiling over the top of the kettle.

A pressure canner is a big investment, but necessary for safely home-canned, low-acid

Bill Flynn Is Scholarship Recipient

Conservation Notes

Today's farmers are in a tough spot. Prices for many of their products are down, while cost for fuel, labor and equipment are up. Equally upsetting is the fact that this price-cost squeeze is not likely to improve soon.

The farmer's best bet to improve profits is to cut overhead. Here in Tishomingo County several of our farmers are trying to do just that by planting soybeans using the no-till method.

There are several advan-

tages to no-till farming compared to conventional planting. One advantage is that no-till saves water and soil. With no-tillage, you can expect 70% to 80% less runoff of water and an even greater reduction in soil erosion. Plus, you will get less direct evaporation losses from your fields with no-till.

Another important advantage is no-till can reduce the number of field operations, along with labor and machinery requirements. Instead of making a half dozen trips across your field, you may make as few as two or three with no-till just planting, spraying and harvesting.

A third reason no-till looks good as a future cropping system is the reduction in the amount of fuel used. With only approximately one gallon of fuel it is possible to plant one acre of soybeans using the no-till method. Compared to conventional planting this is quite a savings in itself.

In Tishomingo County we have several hundred acres of wheat. Of course, wheat is used as a second crop in a double cropping system with soybeans in most cases. Here is another example of where no-till really shines. Planting can begin as soon as the wheat crop is combined, this extra two or three weeks can mean extra bushels of beans at harvest time.

No-tillage farming is an opportunity that we need to explore. No-till offers many advantages but this type of system requires a high level of management at critical times to be successful. No-tillage is certainly not a shortcut to improved soybean production and cannot be substituted for good management.

DRUG LAB IN SPACE

In recent years many drug manufacturers have turned their attention to various biologicals which promise to be helpful in certain disease states. These substances include enzymes, hormones, and proteins - often the exact same materials produced naturally in small quantities by the human body. An obstacle to testing these substances has been the inability to produce them in large quantities.

The process known as electrophoresis is used in production of biologicals that are currently under study. The force of the earth's gravity hinders this process. This is one reason why Sally Ride, the first American woman in space, conducted an electrophoresis experiment aboard the space shuttle Challenger during its June, 1983 flight.

According to the FDA Consumer, laboratories in space may offer advantages over earth-bound laboratories. A major advantage is the lack of gravity which speeds up and enhances the electrophoresis process. Larger amounts of drugs may thus be produced.

In a space mission scheduled for 1985, scientists working with at least one drug company hope to produce enough biological to begin clinical tests. Some day we may be able to use drugs that are literally "out of this world."

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CARING FOR YOUR PET



The adult heartworm lives in the right side of an infected dog's heart, causing insidious and severe damage. It also produces immature worms which circulate in the dog's bloodstream. These can only develop further with the help of a mosquito, so they remain circulating in the blood until the dog is bitten.

Once ingested by a mosquito, the tiny worms develop to the infective larval stage in about two weeks. The mosquito then bites an uninfected dog, passing the heartworm larvae into its bloodstream. The larvae remain in the tissues for about three months before migrating to the heart. In three more months, when the heartworm has reached the adult stage, reproduction begins and

the life cycle repeats itself.

Treatment for heartworm infestation involves six injections over a three day period to kill the adult heartworms. Complications can occur, and if heartworm infestation reaches an advanced stage before it is diagnosed, a cure may be impossible. Severe heartworm infestation can cause congestive heart failure syndrome and an early death.

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




