MOTOR VESSEL "MISSISSIPPI" WILL PLAY MAJOR ROLE IN TENN-TOM DEDICATION

CONGRESSMAN JAMIE WHITTEN, GOV. BILL ALLAIN AND GOV. GEORGE WALLACE TO HEADLINE CEREMONIES AT BAY SPRINGS

The 217-foot, diesel-powered towboat Motor Vessel MISSISSIPPI will be serving as a ceremonial showboat during the May 6th dedication of the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway's

Divide Section at the Bay Springs Lock and Dam. The giant craft will be dressed in red, white and blue decorations to transport

guests, speakers and dignitaries to the dedication site on that historic Sunday afternoon. It will actually dock within the chambers of the Bay Springs Lock for the ceremony. As the

MISSISSIPPI begins its cruise downstream from Paden, it will be leading a large flotilla of nearly 100 smaller craft piloted by boaters from miles around the area. The U.S. Coast

Guard Cutter CIMMARON and several other federal and state agencies' boats will also participate in the aquatic parade.

The MISSISSIPPI will actually arrive in the Tenn-Tom area on Friday evening, May 4th, to dock near the Highway 25 bridge overnight. Early the next morning, it will begin a rehearsal trip to the dedication site, stopping at Paden to release a loading barge to be used for boarding and debarking passengers. Members and guests of the Tombigbee River Valley Water Management District and employees of the Nashville District Corps of Engineers will be on board the vessel during the "dry run."

Following the rehearsal, the MISSISSIPPI will return to the Paden site to dock and prepare for a Saturday evening "Open House" for the general public. This special event will provide a unique opportunity for all visitors to take a close look at this classic rivercraft. There will be refreshments on board, and crewmember guides will escort spectators through the ship's facilities. Everyone is invited; however, regulations prohibit children under the age of 16 from boarding. The Motor Vessel MISSISSIPPI's "Open House" will be held at the Highway 30 Bridge on the Waterway near Paden on Saturday, May 5th, from 6:00 to 9:00 p.m. (CDT).

The following morning, the Corps' plans for the dedication ceremony begin to take shape with the arrival of dignitaries, speakers, and special guests at the Paden site. They will board the MISSISSIPPI for a noon departure to the Bay Springs Lock. This cruise should take just under two hours. The actual dedication program will begin at 2:00 p.m. with a met formation flyover by the Mississippi Air National Guard.

Mississippi Congressman Jamie L. Whitten will serve as the Master of Ceremonies and Lieutenant General Joseph K. Bratton, Chief of Engineers, will make the Dedication Address. They will be flying in from the Nation's capitol just before the activities get underway. The two will also board the MISSISSIPPI at Paden for the journey down America's newest Waterway.

Correspondents and other members of the media have been invited to ride on the Motor Vessel for the return trip to Paden following the conclusion of the dedication ceremony. The site of this monumental event will be well-equipped to accommodate a very large crowd, with adequate lock-side seating sections and supplementary seating on the top of the dam. Organized parking arrangements with shuttle bus operation have been planned, and attendants will seat the public as they arrive. Concession stands will offer food and beverages, and portable toilet facilities will be located throughout the site. There is even a 60' x 120' tent set up to provide shelter in case of inclement weather. Audio speakers will be strategically placed to provide professional sound distribution.

Entertainment will begin around 1:00 p.m. and will feature music by Ted Heavner and the Tennessee Flatfooters of Nashville; Hollis Long's Bluegrass Band of Golden, Miss.; and the Tishomingo County High School Bands.

The Tennessee-Tombigbee Corridor Study's Mobile Van will be set up at the Paden site during the open house on Saturday evening to provide continuous demonstrations

and presentations. On Sunday, the van will move to the dedication site to accommodate visitors there.

The program's official activities will take place on the platform of the specially designed barge which will be in place within the lock chamber before the arrival of the MISSISSIPPI. Dignitaries will be seated on the platform as they disembark from the Motor Vessel.

Glover Wilkins, Administrator for the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway Development Authority, will open the ceremony and introduce Congressman Whitten. Mr. Whitten will introduce Mississippi's Governor Bill Allain and Alabama's Governor George C. Wallace for their welcome and remarks.

Following the Dedication Address by General Bratton, he will be joined by Congressman Whitten to trip a ceremonial lever activating the Bay Springs Lock "horn." The MISSISSIPPI will also give out with a horn blast as the crowd witnesses the release of red, white and blue helium-filled balloons from a nearby damsite area. This ceremony will officially open and dedicate the 39-mile Divide Section of the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway... an event that thousands of contract and Corps employees have worked for over the past ten years.

After the ceremony, Congressman Whitten and General Bratton will depart on a flight back to Washington, D.C. The Motor Vessel MISSISSIPPI will return to Paden to prepare for a three-day inspection tour of the Tennessee River from Pickwick Lock to Kentucky Lock near Paducah, Ky.

"MISSISSIPPI"

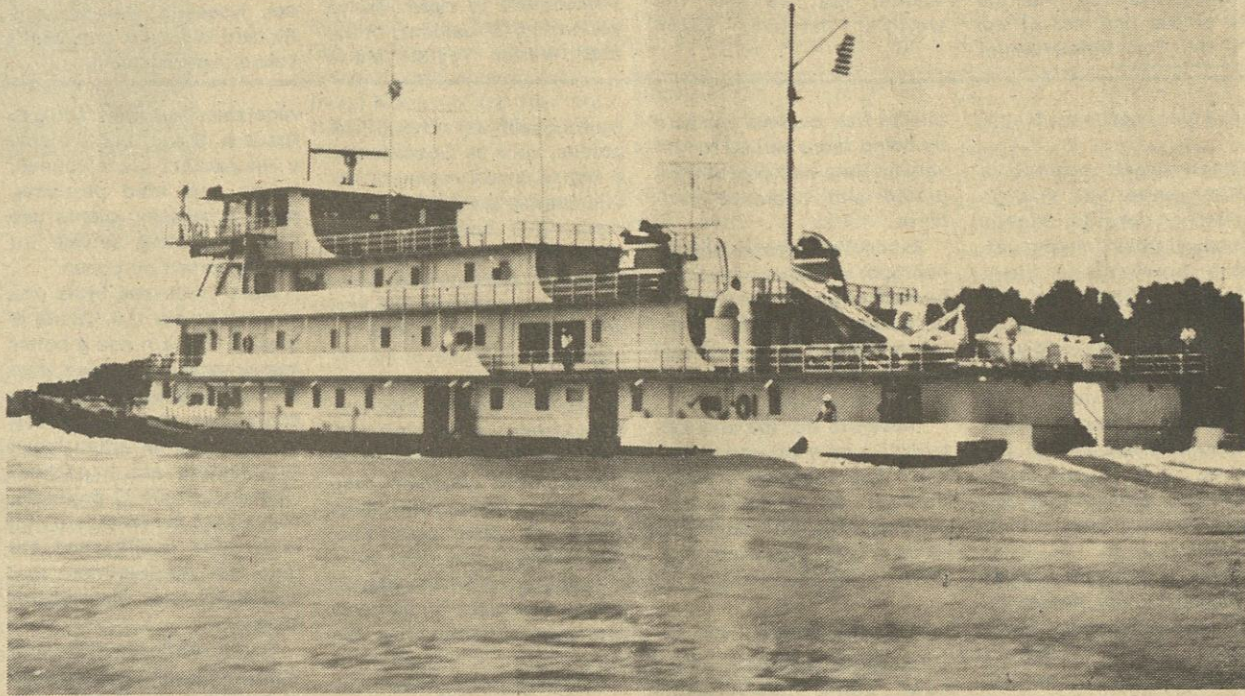
The Motor Vessel MISSISSIPPI was constructed by Ingalls Shipbuilding Corporation in 1960 and went into service on April 19, 1961. With controllable and reversible-pitch propellers, it is uniquely equipped for such varied duties as transporting heavy tows along waterways and serving as a fast-moving inspection vessel. It is operated by the Memphis District of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers for the Mississippi River Commission.

The MISSISSIPPI is required to operate under a wide range of conditions. As a towboat, it is designed and powered to push a tow weighing 15,000 gross tons on 24 barges at a still-water speed of eight miles per hour. Because of the propeller design, a reverse thrust of over 70 percent of forward thrust can be produced. It features two eight-cylinder engines, each capable of producing 1,860 horsepower.

The all-steel superstructure consists of a main deckhouse, a second and third deckhouse, and a pilothouse. There are complete cooking, dining and sleeping facilities on board for crew and passengers.

In addition to performing its more usual duties as a towboat, the MISSISSIPPI is used twice yearly for the high- and low-water inspection tours of the Mississippi River from St. Louis to New Orleans. It is also used for special inspection tours such as the currently planned trip of the Tennessee River for the Nashville District Corps of Engineers.

The MISSISSIPPI's beam is 48 feet wide; the depth of its hull is ten feet, nine inches; the mean draft during operation is eight feet, six inches; and it was built at a cost of \$1.5 million. The craft is skippered by Captain Chuck Keistler and carries a crew of 30.

CENSUS SHOWS DECLINE IN COUNTY FARM ACRES

Preliminary reports of the 1982 Census of Agriculture show that the number of farms in the county decreased from 407 to 364 since the 1978 census. All land in farms totaled 47,697 acres in 1982, an average of 131 acres per farm. The Census Bureau defines a farm as any place from which \$1,000 or more of agricultural products were sold or normally would have been sold.

Land from which crops were harvested decreased to 16,740 acres since 1978.

The county's farmers sold \$3.5 million in agricultural products according to preliminary reports from the 1982 Census of Agriculture. The 1982 sales figure represents an average of \$9,750 for each of the county's farms.

The census reports, that \$1.9 million or 55 percent of total sales were for crops, while \$1.6 million or 45 percent of the total came from the sale of livestock, poultry, and their products.

Preliminary data indicate that expenditures for feed for livestock and poultry were \$644,000; total farm energy costs were \$392,000; fertilizer costs were \$460,000; and seed costs were \$83,000.

Of the total farms in the county, 14 had gross sales of \$40,000 or more; 294 reported sales of less than \$10,000. Farms operated as sole proprietorships represented

93 percent of the total. In 1982, the average age of farm operators was 52.5 years. The proportion of operators reporting farming as their principal occupation remained essentially unchanged at 34 percent since 1978.

Data in the report for 1978 and 1982 are directly comparable for acreages and inventories. Dollar values have not been adjusted for changes in price levels.

NUMBER OF UNEMPLOYED CONTINUES TO DECLINE

The number of unemployed residents in Tishomingo County continued to decline at mid-March. According to Charles Smith, Manager of the Mississippi State Employment Service, the rate of unemployment was estimated to be 19.6 percent, compared to 21.1 percent in February and 19.0 percent in March, one year ago.

The civilian labor force was estimated to be 9,820, 130 less than in February and 1,310 less than in March, 1983. The number of county residents employed rose to 7,900, 50 more than estimated for February but 1,120 less than the figure for March, one year ago.

Employment in the county registered 2,550, only slightly below the previous estimate but 260 below that of one year ago. The number of individuals employed in non-manufacturing jobs remained stable at 3,040; however, a drop of 410 from one year ago was experienced.

Smith also noted that the civilian labor force for the four-county area of Alcorn, Prentiss, Tippah, and Tishomingo totaled 45,150 at mid-March. This reflects an increase of 50 from the February estimate, but a downward trend of 1,600 from the figure reported for March, 1983. Employed and unemployed totals are combined to make the civilian labor force. The number of employed persons rose to 39,560 at mid-March, which represents an increase of 730 from the previous month and 1,160 from the same month one year ago. A total of 5,590 persons were unemployed at mid-March, 680 less than the previous month's estimate and 2,760 below the estimate for one year ago. The unemployment rate for March for the four-county area stood at 12.4 percent, compared to 13.9 percent in February and 17.9 percent in March, 1983.

Employment in manufacturing jobs at mid-March totaled 15,730, an increase of 160 from the February estimate and 1,850 above the estimate for March, one year ago. This large yearly rise was attributed to large increases in several groups. Non-manufacturing industries had an estimated 16,050 persons employed at mid-March, up 190 from the previous month but 70 below the current month one year ago.

Higher Soybean Yields

Farmers who want to increase profits from 1984 soybean crops should start by harvesting higher yields to achieve a lower cost per bushel. Generally yields increase rather slowly as a result of improved planning and implementation of those plans. To maintain a steady improvement in yields it is important to identify and correct factors preventing high yields. Complete records and careful analysis of past performance can be a valuable tool in planning this year's crop. To produce consistently high yields, you should plant soybeans on the best land available. Select deep soils

with good water holding capacity that are neither excessively steep nor poorly drained. Elimination of consistently low yielding fields can help yields by automatically increasing your average and also allowing you more time to concentrate on the better land. Maintain good soil fertility. Soil test recommendations from the Extension Service are designed to help achieve a maximum yield and get the greatest return from fertilizer. It is also important to keep the proper pH balance in the soil. Use soil tests to determine if your soil needs lime added to increase yields. A very important step in achieving higher yields is to plant on time. In north and central Mississippi farmers

should plant soybeans May 1-30.

Timely weed control is another important step in maximizing profits. Weeds reduce yields, hamper efficient harvest and lower grain quality. Start weed control at the proper time to prevent irreversible yield loss. Plant the varieties best suited to your needs and resources. Many high yielding varieties are on the market, but sometimes disease and other factors can prevent their yielding to their potential. Selecting varieties based on disease and nematode resistance can help avoid serious yield limiting situations. Also, look at their tolerance to herbicides and date of maturity. Consult yield trials at locations near your farm on similar soils. When looking at yield data, place more reliability on several years of results. Do not make big changes based on limited information. Both prevention and protection are important in pest management. Collecting soil samples to determine the presence of nematodes allows the selection of varieties or crop rotations to avoid damaging yield losses. Scouting during the season for insects and diseases is the best way to minimize damage and permit timely control. Finally, harvest for a profit. Most farmers can gain from

one to five bushels per acre by being more careful to harvest on time with properly adjusted and operated combines.

Excessive ground speed, improper reel action or other header problems can cause a reduction in yields. With proper adjustments, you can keep combine losses to less than three percent.

These are not the only approaches to improving yields and increasing profits. However, by following this package, you can increase yields and cut your per bushel cost.

Government Grades Help Consumers Shop & Eat Better

You can shop more economically for yourself and your family -- if you know the differences among government food grades. Take beef, for example. Prime, the top U.S. grade, is the ultimate in tenderness, juiciness and flavor. While Prime is best for roasting or broiling, it is likely to cost more than the second grade, USDA Choice, which is slightly less marbled. ("Marbling" means the flecks of fat within the lean that makes meat tender and juicy.) Some stores sell beef that

would qualify for other USDA grades, such as Good, under a house brand name rather than under the USDA grade mark. This beef will likely cost less than Prime or Choice, and it may meet your needs well, particularly if you use slow, moist cooking to make it tender.

In establishing grades for foods like meat, poultry, eggs, fruits, vegetables and dairy products, USDA considers the values that wholesale buyers and sellers place on the products. Generally, products with characteristics of the higher grades are more marketable and bring a better price for the producer.

Labeling of the grade on a product is not required by federal law, even if a food has been officially graded. But a number of food manufacturers and distributors choose to put the official grade on their products, as do many retailers.

USDA grades help establish quality levels of products, and this in turn, can help consumers make choices. As a food shopper, you are most likely to see the USDA grade on beef, veal, lamb, broilers, turkeys, eggs and butter. You also may see it on some cheese, instant nonfat dry milk, preserves, frozen concentrated orange juice and canned and frozen fruits and vegetables. Some fresh produce also is grade labeled, particularly potatoes and apples.

For processed fruits and

vegetables, qualities are U.S. Grade A, B and C. While only a few packers grade canned, frozen and dried products, many processing plants use USDA's grading service for quality control purposes.

Most processed fruits and vegetables are U.S. Grade B quality. Grade A has a better appearance and texture than B. So U.S. Grade A products might be used in special meals or dishes when looks and texture are important. However, Grade C products, which cost the least, are still fairly good quality, and are just as wholesome and nutritious as the higher grades.

For fresh fruits and vegetables, the typical range of grades is U.S. Fancy, U.S. No. 1 and U.S. No. 2. The chief trading grade for most of these products is U.S. No. 1, while U.S. Fancy is a premium quality. Such grades are seen mainly on potatoes and apples, and are generally based on a product's color, shape, maturity and freedom from defects, such as cuts from harvesting equipment.

BRIDGES ADVISES FARMERS TO CONSIDER ACREAGE REDUCTION BENEFITS — Now that the acreage reduction sign-up period is winding down, Howard R. Bridges, Chairman of the Tishomingo ASC Committee, advises farmers to seriously consider program benefits. The sign-up ends May 4.

Bridges said, "The acreage reduction program enables all farmers to work together to help control stocks and improve crop prices by reducing production. At the same time, it protects them from economic disasters."

Farm program participants who reduce their wheat acres by 30 percent will be eligible for target price protection at \$4.38 per bushel, price support loans at \$3.27 per bushel and the option to reduce their acreage an additional 10 to 20 percent for payment-in-kind at 85 percent of their program yield.

Bridges said farmers need to use the acreage reduction program as a safety net, particularly for wheat since supplies still remain above desirable levels. "Strong participation will further reduce stocks and continue to balance supply with demand so that the market will pay a profitable price." The ASCS official said farm price improvements will depend greatly on the willingness of farmers to participate in the programs.

PREVENTION OF HEARTWORMS

Has your dog had its heartworm pill today? Preventing heartworm disease is easier and safer for your dog than trying to cure the problem once it exists. Only a simple blood test before the start of mosquito season, followed by a daily heartworm pill, is required to protect your dog from this destructive parasite.

Unfortunately, some owners either underestimate heartworm disease or aren't aware of its potentially fatal consequences. Heartworm infestation kills thousands of dogs every year.

Visible symptoms (coughing, fatigue, breathing problems and general weakness) of heartworms don't appear

until the disease reaches the advanced stages, so it is vital to have your dog checked yearly with a blood test to catch heartworm early on. Also, be sure that heartworm medicine is not administered before your dog has had the blood test; if the dog is already infected this can cause serious harm.

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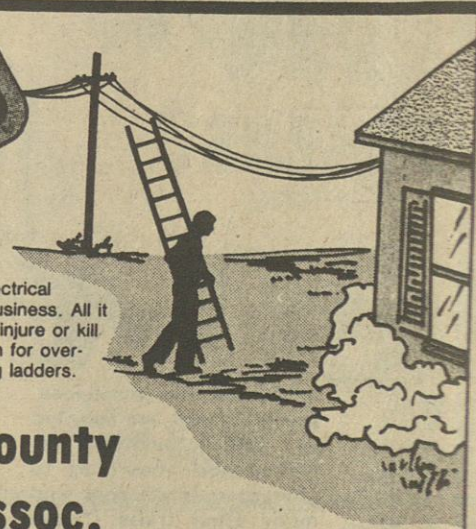
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Miss Kim Carpenter Reveals Plans Of June 9th Wedding

DIAPER RASH

Diaper rash and its cousin, prickly heat, are associated with the presence of urine and waste materials next to the skin. Diaper rash results in varying degrees of inflamed, irritated skin that can cover the entire diaper area. Prickly heat, on the other hand, appears as tiny red "dots" that result from the obstruction of sweat glands.

Prevention of diaper rash and prickly heat is superior to treatment. Plastic pants should be avoided. Diapers should be loose, well ventilated, and changed frequently to keep the skin dry. The skin should be kept clean.

Treatment of existing skin problems involves the preventative measures listed above. Cornstarch as a dusting powder should be avoided - it can be metabolized and support the growth of microorganisms. A protectant cream or ointment may be applied to the clean, dry skin to help prevent urine and waste from reaching the skin (for example, white petrolatum, zinc oxide paste, or any of several commercial products). Prickly heat by itself usually responds well to oatmeal baths and efforts to reduce moisture around the rash. Diaper area problems that do not respond to home remedies require a physician's care and, often, prescription medicines for complications such as fungal, yeast, or bacterial infection.

Letter To The Editor

Dear Editor,

In response to an article in your paper dated April 19, 1984, page 17, by Mr. Orville McNutt, I would like to congratulate Mr. McNutt for being a fine marksman and competitor. However, when the Old Tishomingo County Muzzleloaders unanimously voted to ban the in-line action rifles in competition, it was not directed at the deadly accuracy of his rifle in his hands, but at ALL IN-LINE ACTION RIFLES. The in-line action is not traditional, and due to the fast ignition time, it was felt that it was unfair to traditional flintlock and caplock shooters with slower

ignition to have to compete with non-traditional in-line actions. (Most shooters are traditional.) We were shocked to know that Mr. McNutt is a "former" member, as we had not been informed of this fact. It is the policy of our club (and an American heritage) to promote the right to shoot all guns, especially the traditional flintlock and caplock guns which bought -- at a very high price in lives and hardships -- the freedoms we enjoy today.

I would not compare a score of 50-3X on a 25-yd. target using a large bore .58 cal. in-line action rifle equipped with a micrometer peep rear sight and a Globe front sight shot from a bench rest to a hole in one in golf. Consider the following statistics:

In 1978, using a flintlock with open sights in the 25-yd. offhand position, Mr. J.L. Hargis scored a 50-5X and in 1981 Mr. Elwood Cullers, using a flintlock with open sights in the 25-yd. offhand position fired a 50-5X at a 6-Bull Slug Target.

In 1982 Ms. Sharron Smith in the 25-yd. offhand position fired a score of 49X. In the Junior Match, Gregg Link Hart fired a 50-5X in the offhand position at 25 yards. In 1982, Mr. Don Warner in the 50-yd. Bench Rest position using open sights fired a 50-5X from the 100-yd. Bench Rest position. (They were preceded by 13 consecutive people who fired a 50-5X in the same match.)

In 1959, Mr. Lester Cox, in the 200-yd. bench rest position fired a 100-8X. In 1964, Mr. Robert L. Morris, in the 300-yd. bench rest position fired a score of 100-3X. In the Junior Bench Rest, Brian Warner fired a 50-5X at 50 yards in 1982. Also in the Sub-Junior, Brian fired a 50-5X in 1980 and 1981. The above sampling of scores were fired in competition at the National Muzzleloading Rifle Association Range at Friendship Indiana.

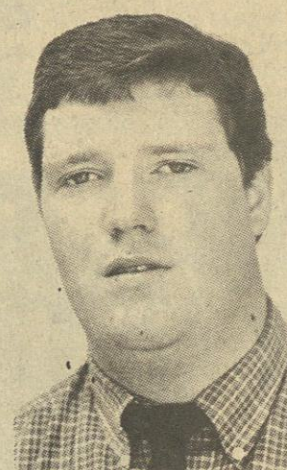

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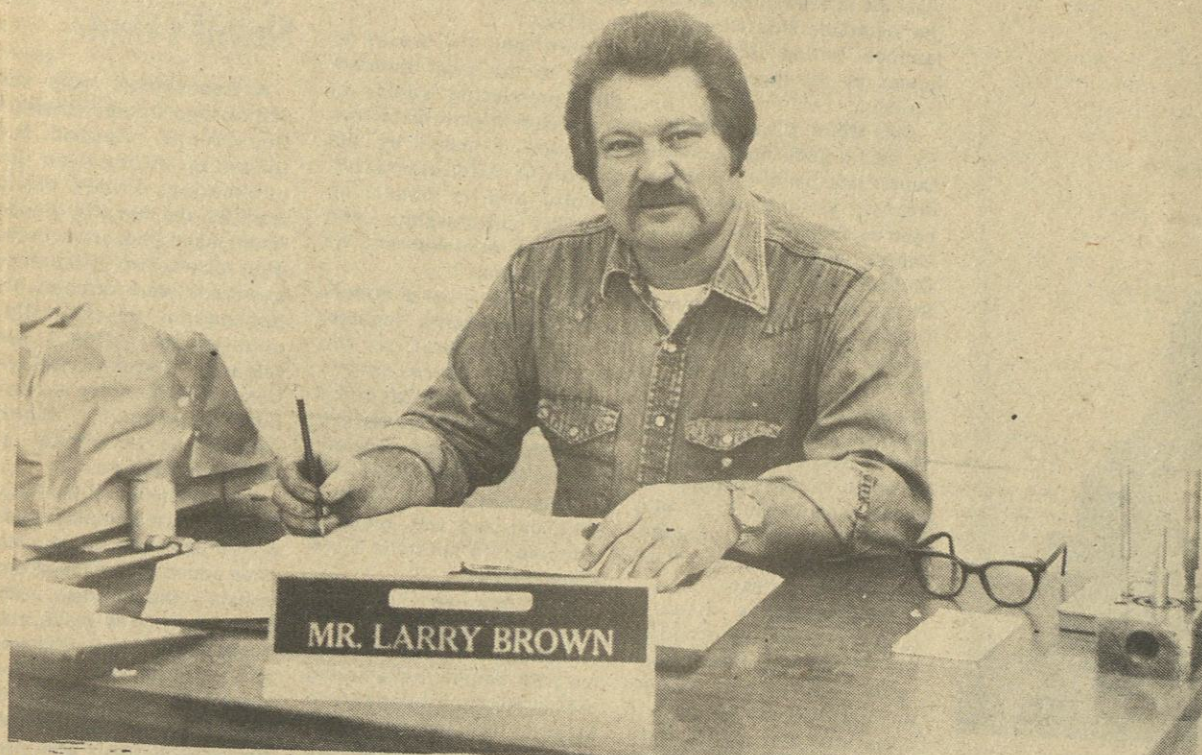
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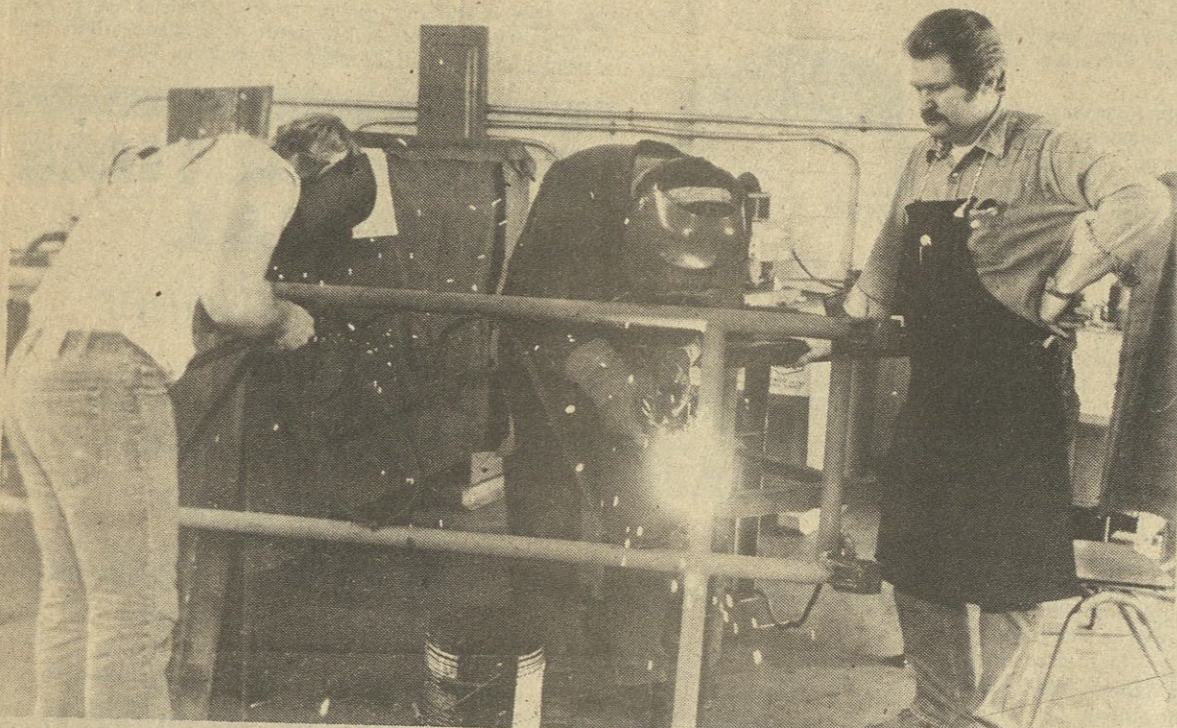

Legislative Report

During the last two weeks of the 1984 Legislative Session, the Senate and House of Representatives will be working on conference committees to iron out com-

promises on well over 100 bills on which the two houses differ. For each bill, there are three Senators and three Representatives who meet to work out a compromise to present back to the Senate and the House. If both houses agree to the conference plan, the bill goes to the Governor for his signature into law.

Probably the most controversial of the bills is the revenue-raising measure. The Senate and the House are far apart in their ideas on how much revenue should be generated for operation of state agencies and programs.

The Senate version, seen as a long-range plan to stabilize the finances of state government, would bring in around \$143 million. Provisions include continuing permanently the 6 percent sales tax; increasing the income tax for those earning over \$15,000 of taxable income; upping the taxes on cigarettes, beer and light wines, and alcoholic beverages; increasing the contractor's tax; and removing the credit of the insurance premium tax against income tax owed by insurance companies.

The House proposal, called a "Band-Aid" measure by many because it provides a temporary solution to the financial problems, would bring in about \$34 million by extending the 6 percent sales tax until January 31, 1985.

Other bills which are now in conference committee include:

-- a bill regarding homestead exemption which is designed to give taxpayers

relief from higher tax bills due to reappraisal of property. The Senate version raises the homestead exemption from \$5,000 to \$8,500.

-- the appropriation for the Mental Health Department. The House took out the Senate provision that gave the state Mental Health Department more control over funds for the regional centers.

-- the appropriation for the Matty Hersee Nursing School. The House cut the funding and put in language which would phase out the school over the next three years.

The following bills have been agreed upon by both houses and signed by the Governor:

-- the bill permitting the withdrawal of life-support systems by unconscious and irreversibly ill patients who have previously signed a "Living Will" requesting this.

-- a bill raising the ceiling on state Medicaid appropriations to \$90 million per year.

-- a bill declaring milk the state beverage.

-- a bill allowing the state flag to be flown at night or in bad weather if an all-weather flag is used.

First Bank Capital Corporation Shareholders Meeting

A crowd of approximately 375 people met Thursday evening, April 19, at the Ramada Inn Convention Center in Tupelo as First Bank Capital Corporation held its first annual shareholders meeting.

First Bank Capital Corporation is the one-bank holding company which owns First Citizens National Bank. First Bank is located in 9 Northwest Mississippi cities spanning a 7-county area. First Bank Chairman of the Board Jack Reed, Sr., Chief Executive Officer Gene Berbette, and President Lewis Whitfield reported on the 62-year-old bank's performance and outlined future plans.

Whitfield cited numerous non-financial events that occurred during the year as vital ingredients in First Bank's success. In February, 1983, Governor William Winter assisted bank officials in the inaugural First Bank Young Citizen Awards, a program designed to honor outstanding area youth in the areas of Leadership, Service, Responsibility, and Achievement Plus. First Bank's commitment to recognizing the accomplishments of young persons led to the bank receiving the prestigious Golden Coin Award, presented by the Bank Marketing Association for excellence in achieving a highest-quality public affairs program. According to Whitfield, First Bank has captured four Gold Coin Awards in the past eight years, making it the only Mississippi bank to have won four awards.

Whitfield further stated the introduction of First Aid, First Bank's automated teller machines, provided additional service to bank customers. First Aid is a member of the Moneybelt and PLUS network of automated machines, which allows First

Bank customers access to obtaining funds from their accounts or checking their account balances at any PLUS machine nationwide. "With its capability," Whitfield said, "you could run short of cash in San Francisco and withdraw funds directly from your checking account in Tupelo."

During 1983, First Bank enjoyed its third merger since 1981, with the addition of the Bank of Starkville, now referred to as First Bank-Starkville. This profit center has completed plans for the construction of a 5,000 square foot facility with an anticipated completion date of late 1984.

The formation of First Bank Capital Corporation was approved by shareholders in September, 1983, providing what Whitfield termed "an opportunity to allow greater corporate flexibility to meet the full financial needs of our market area. (The holding company) gives us the organizational framework for future growth." He concluded his remarks with a report on expected capital expenditures in 1984 for the improvement of facilities in Tupelo, East Columbus, Tishomingo, Starkville, and the expansion of the First Aid system.

Berbette reviewed financial performance and noted a deposit increase of \$15 million. "1983 was by far First Bank's best year for profits," Berbette explained. "Net income after taxes was \$2,106,000. This is an increase of \$660,000 over 1982 and a percentage increase of 46%. A record \$6.00 per share was paid to stockholders with a total dividend payout of \$681,318." Berbette also stated that shareholder equity had increased from the end of fiscal 1979 from \$8 million to \$12.8 million, a 60% increase over a 4-year period. He concluded his remarks by briefly analyzing current market conditions and interest rates.

The annual meeting marked the completion of Jack Reed, Sr.'s first year as Chairman of the Board. He noted during his address that First Bank "has continued to provide high-quality financial services to the people of Northeast Mississippi. We continue to be a leader in area development by contributing more than our fair share of people and dollar resources in community projects."

Both Reed and Whitfield were recognized for their recent installations in statewide organizations. Mr. Reed was recently named Chairman of the Governor's Lay Board of Education as a result of his continuing work for the improvement of education in Mississippi. In April, Mr. Whitfield was named Chairman of the Mississippi Economic Council.
