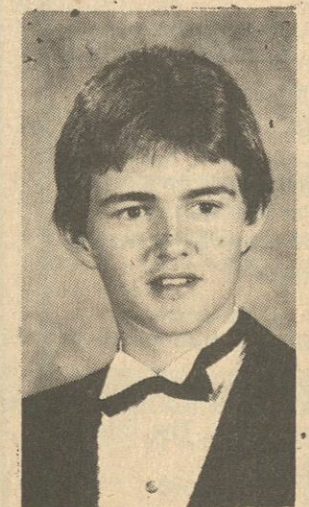

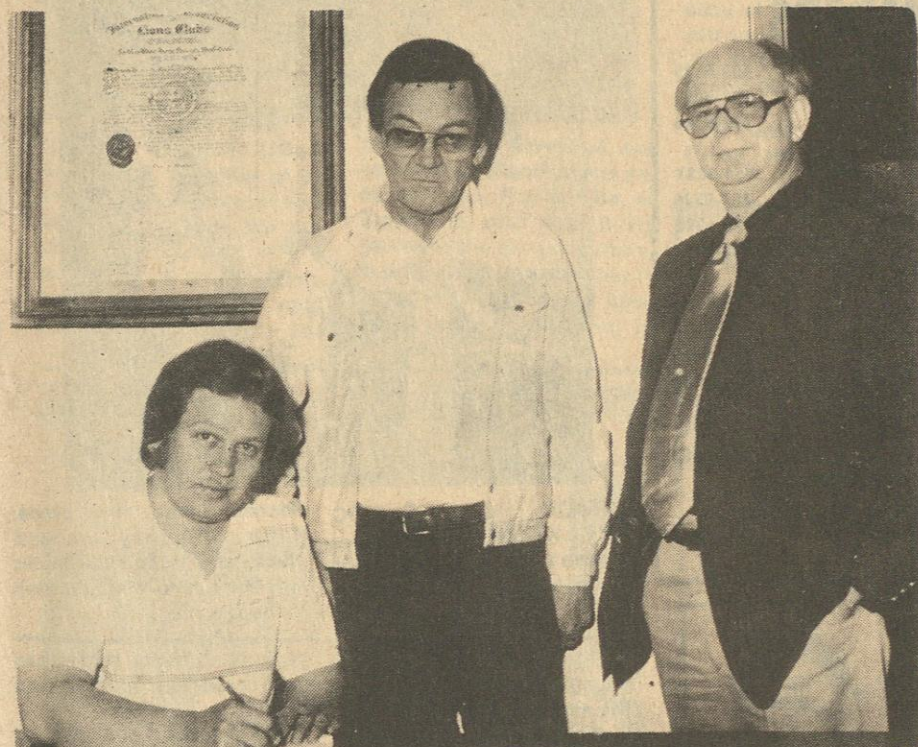

Burnsville Receives Grant

Dixie Sportswear Building. The contract is estimated at \$289,000 and will be used to construct a 30,000 square foot building.

A contract between the Tishomingo County Development Foundation and the City of Burnsville has been approved by the Foundation's directors and will allow Burnsville to construct a 30,000 square foot building to house Dixie Sportswear, Inc. The city will finally be able to build this facility with a \$289,000 Community Development Block Grant, which was awarded to Burnsville last December.

Dixie, which has been in operation since late in 1983, is now located in a 7,000 square foot facility and employs approximately 135 persons from Tishomingo County and Corinth. With this new expansion, Dixie will be able to employ approximately 200 additional persons.

The new building, which will take 3 to 4 months to construct, will be located just off Highway 72 and east of the Winfield Manufacturing Plant. According to Mayor Marlar, bids will be taken and a contract awarded by June 1, 1984, with construction beginning shortly afterward.

City Sales Tax Collections

March, 1984, city sales tax collections made within the county and reported to the Tax Commission totaled \$46,579.98. The final figure was down \$2,615.79 over the February collections.

Listed separately the six municipalities reporting were, with February figures in parentheses: Belmont - \$11,209.79, (\$12,566.53); Burnsville - \$3,859.77, (\$3,987.78); Golden - \$466.91, (\$1,367.00); Iuka - \$28,017.60, (\$27,859.04); Paden - \$27.75, (\$36.80); and Tishomingo - \$2,998.16, (\$3,378.62).

The city sales tax collections contained in this report are based on taxes collected by merchants during March and reported to the Tax Commission in April. Payment was made to the cities on or before April 15, 1984.

Hospital Receives 3 Year Accreditation

The Tishomingo County Hospital was recently awarded an additional three year accreditation by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals. vaco Corporation as a loading site for wood chips. Westvaco is planning to build a facility to chip logs and load the chips on barges for shipment to their pulp mill in Kentucky. The property has been requested by the county and

will be subleased to Westvaco for their site, if the Corps of Engineers releases the land to the county. Approximately 12-15 jobs would be created by the investment of \$2 - 2,500,000 by Westvaco. The site would also be used

LAWN MOWER SAFETY
Spring showers not only bring May flowers, but also grassy lawns. Therefore, many Tishomingo Countians will be cranking lawn mowers in an effort to keep their lawn looking attractive.

Hospital emergency room treatment reports show that lawn mower accidents lead the injury list in the mowing season. Many of these accidents could be prevented with proper use of the mower.

The cutting blade is the main hazard. When you are starting a push mower, brace

it by putting one foot on the mower, with the other foot firmly planted on the ground. Always be on a riding mower before cranking it.

Do not clean a grass-clogged mower while the engine is running. Stop the engine to clean or work on the mower. This will protect you from blades and belts of power mowers. Disconnect the spark plug when turning the blade.

Never pull the mower toward you. Your foot could slip and go under the blade. Before mowing, made sure

the grass is dry to avoid slipping and losing control of the mower.

Don't use a riding mower on steep slopes. The mower could overturn and seriously or fatally injure the driver. Drive up and down slopes on a riding mower to safely mow inclines.

Use a push mower on steep slopes. By pushing across the slope, not up and down, you are less likely to slip and fall near the cutting blade.

Objects picked up and hurled by the blade cause many injuries and even deaths. Clear the lawn of sticks, stones, wire and other debris to prevent such accidents. Stop the blade before crossing rocky driveways.

Make children and pets leave the mowing area so they will be out of range of objects thrown by the mower.

Never leave a mower running and do not let children operate the mower. Store the mower where children can't play with it and disconnect the spark plug as an added precaution.

Never add fuel to a running machine, instead let the motor cool first. Keep gas in an approved safety container to prevent fire and burns. Operate riding mowers only from the driver's seat. Start and stop the engine while in this position. Do not carry passengers and watch for children and pets.

You may not have fun mowing your lawn this season, but by practicing these safety tips, you can enjoy your lawn in the best of health.

DOUBLE CROPPING

Many farmers are considering double cropping to increase income, improve cash flow, spread risk and maximize land use. It also reduces soil erosion by providing ground cover year round.

However, soybean yields are usually 15 to 30 percent lower when planted after a wheat crop, although this may range from no yield reduction up to complete crop failure.

With better planting equipment, herbicides and proper planning, you can keep these potential yield reductions from double crop-

ping much lower today than you could just a few years ago.

No single method of double cropping has proven superior. Therefore, you should evaluate several approaches in keeping with soil type, weed species and planting equipment.

A major reason double cropped soybeans yield less than single cropped beans is generally because of a later planting date and lack of soil moisture. Research has clearly shown that soybean yields decline rapidly when planted after mid-June. Anything that can contribute to early planting of soybeans behind wheat will help the potential yield.

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BOLL WEEVIL THREAT CONTINUES--Local cotton producers will undoubtedly be on the alert for the boll weevil again in 1984 since the insect was so prevalent across the Delta last season. Indicative of last season's problem is the fact that several Mississippi insect consultants reported applying methyl parathion at the cotton plant's pinhead square stage, an application normally not necessary at that time. In intense overwintering areas with a history of pinhead square methyl applications, it was not unusual to make 4 pinhead square applications rather than the usual 2 applications which previously provided control. According to cotton insect experts, the dramatic upsurge of the weevil is a result

of consecutive mild winters prior to 1983. These mild winters allowed the weevil to successfully overwinter and spread. In addition, during recent years, synthetic pyrethroid pesticides have largely been used to control the bollworm/budworm complex. Pyrethroid pesticides, while effective against worms, have no effect on the boll weevil, allowing the weevil to proliferate. Despite early, severe winter weather, weevils that went into protected overwintering quarters are expected to provide a nucleus for infestation in 1984. To get a jump on this possible new generation of weevils, timely applications of methyl parathion are commonly recommended because of its effective, economical control.

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Internal parasites are the greatest single cause of death in horses and are often a cause or factor involved in many respiratory, digestive, and performance problems. Though parasites are a constant problem for horse owners, the severity of the problem can be lessened with a regular deworming program, administered by your veterinarian. Your veterinarian can determine which of the four major parasites your horse has by examining a fecal sample at his/her clinic. Four parasites commonly found in horses are bots, strongyles (bloodworms), ascarids (roundworms), and pinworms. An effective parasite control program involves

each and every animal on the farm being dewormed at regular scheduled intervals. The plan should begin at birth and continue for the life of the animal. To establish an economic, safe, and effective plan suited especially to your animals, consult your veterinarian.

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- Reduce water use with a shower flow restrictor.
- Don't shave or wash dishes with the hot water running.
- Use the dishwasher only when it's full.
- Wash full loads of clothes in the coolest water possible and rinse them in cold water.

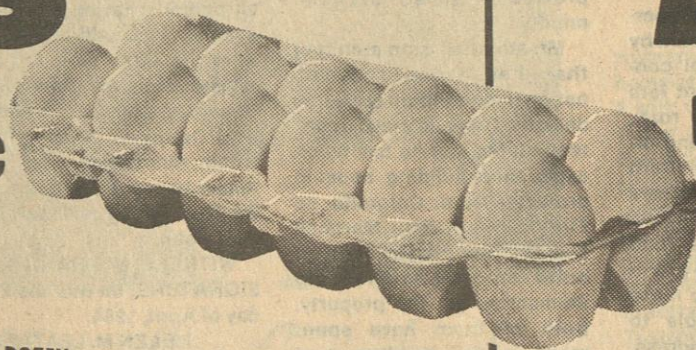

Pickwick Limited Opens Near Mill Creek

Pickwick Limited is a newly formed Mississippi Corporation that has recently opened a development of water front custom home sites for sale in the Bear Creek section of Pickwick Lake. The forty two acre site is located about six miles east of Iuka and about one half mile east of Mill Creek Boat Dock.

Pickwick Limited is owned by O. T. Marshall, a Memphis based architect and Dr. Robin Stevenson a Memphis Plastic Surgeon. The partners won approximately a mile of water frontage of which their corporation is developing the western one-third at this time. Lake front lots will have a minimum of one hundred feet of lake frontage and the price will be thirty thousand dollars and up. Off-shore lots, all of them having a spectacular view of the lake, will sell for fifteen thousand dollars and up. All lots will have public water and electricity. T.V.A., who regulates any construction in the lake itself will allow boat docks and boat houses for individual lot owners.

A new road into the property has just been completed by Isaac Williams, a local contractor. Four water front lots are served by the new road. Two of the lots are being offered for sale through Beth Davis of Long-Davis Realtors of Iuka. Pickwick Limited plans to continue its road construction program through the summer to make additional lots available to the market as sales progress. When the first third of the site is fully developed it will have nine water front lots, six off-shore lots and a three acre plot for future development as condominiums.

The site is divided into three acres by Big Spring Hollow and Null Hollow. The three acres are dramatic with three wooded, sloping hills that give every lot on the property a view of the lake. Much effort has been made to retain the natural beauty of the property. Roads have been routed to dramatize the views. Building lots are in clusters and they are reached by cul-de-sacs type roads that dead ends in each cluster. Main roads are held away

from the clusters to minimize direct traffic by the homes. The clusters of homes will provide a sense of community.

Mr. Marshall is an architect that has twice received national recognition for home designs. He is licensed in sixteen states and he has much experience building housing projects from Colorado to Florida. Both Mr. Marshall and Dr. Stephenson plan to build summer homes for themselves on the property. Both of them have spent many years boating and skiing on Pickwick Lake.

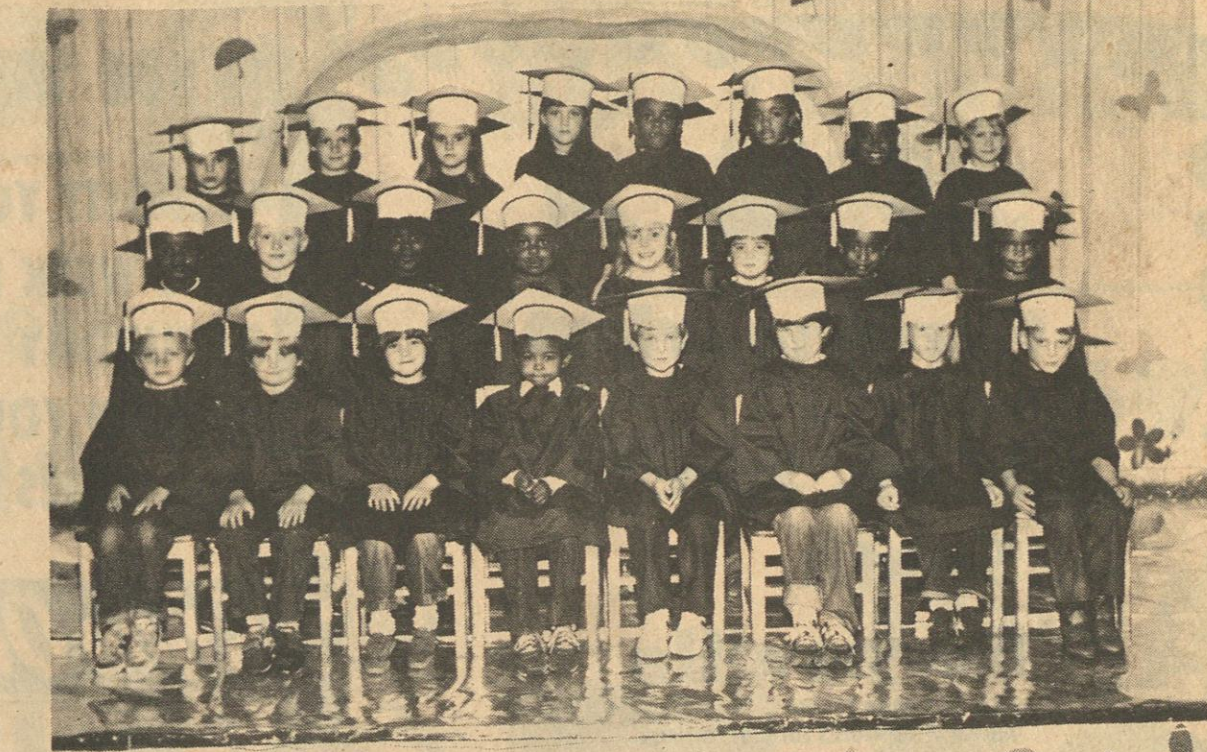
Iuka High Plans Summer Tour For Students

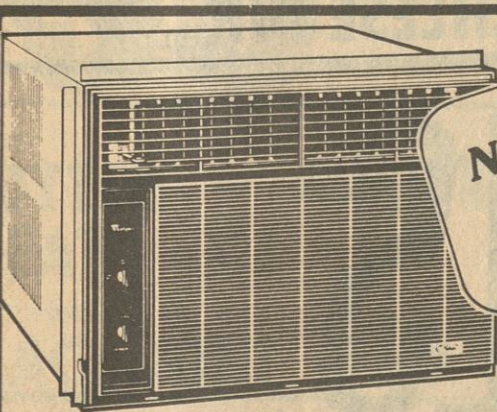

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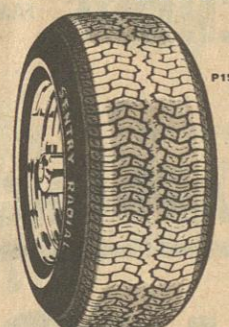

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POISON IVY MEDICINES

There are more than 50 different plants believed to be capable of producing contact dermatitis - the red, blistered, and itching skin with which so many of us are familiar. Poison ivy is often believed to be the culprit when contact dermatitis occurs - and many times it is. But regardless of the plant that causes this skin problem, treatment is usually similar.

Most poison ivy medicines are applied to the skin. The antihistamines are an exception, however. Antihistamines such as diphenhydramine or chlorpheniramine may be taken by mouth to help reduce the itching associated with contact dermatitis. Also, some antihistamines are present in medicines which are intended for application to the skin.

Poison ivy medicines may also contain:

- local anesthetics such as benzocaine and dibucaine to block nerve impulses and reduce itching,
- steroids such as hydrocortisone to reduce redness, swelling, and itching,
- antiseptics such as phenol to help prevent infection, or
- astringents such as the ferric oxide in calamine lotion to dry wet, weeping areas of skin.

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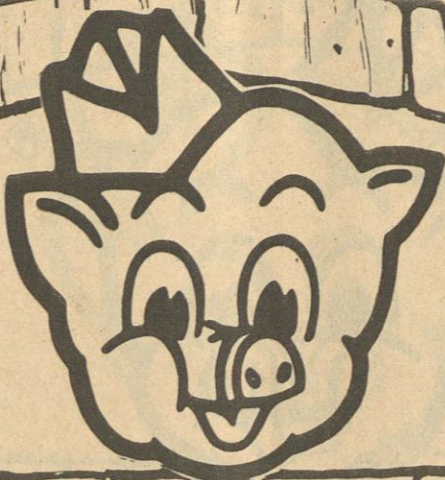
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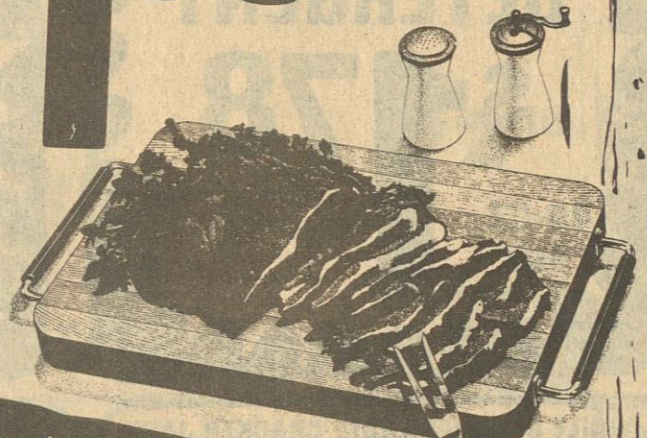
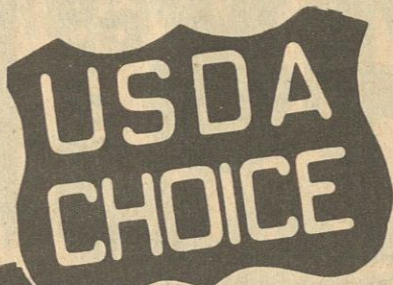
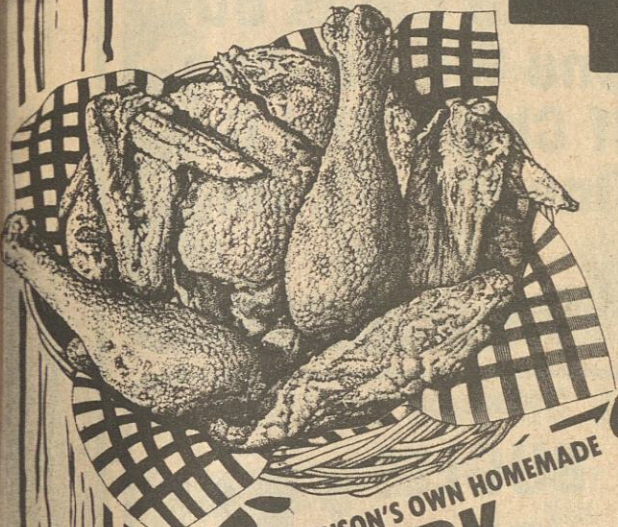

government, the Legislature voted to extend the session with final adjournment targeted for May 18. However, we hope to be in session for only one day during the extension which should not be too costly.

The Mississippi Administrative Reorganization Act of 1984 reorganizes several areas of state government because of a court order requiring legislators to be removed from state boards and commissions. Work on the reorganization proposal has been ongoing steadily since the court order in November. The result is a 349-page bill, the largest we believe to have ever been filed. The extension of the session was felt to be necessary to give proper consideration to all facets of this bill by the Senate, the House and the Governor.

Much of the debate on the reorganization bill centers around who will have responsibility for developing and overseeing the state budget. The bill creates three fiscal agencies - one for the governor, one for the Legislature, and a Fiscal Management Board composed of five executive branch officers which would oversee the budget when the Legislature is not in session.

Last week the Senate and the House came to agreement on a number of bills and sent them to the Governor for signature into law. Some of these are:

HOMESTEAD EXEMPTION: In order to prevent homeowners, farmers and business owners from receiving large increases in ad valorem property taxes due to reappraisal of property, the homestead exemption

for tax years 1985 and 1986 was raised from \$5,000 to \$7,000. In 1987, it will drop to \$7,000; in 1988, it will be \$6,500; and in 1989, it will go to \$6,000. For 1985, counties will be reimbursed for homestead exemption under the present formula. After that, counties will be reimbursed \$100 per homestead exemption applicant with no counties to receive less than the previous year.

DUAL REGISTRATION: When this bill is signed into law and approved by the federal Justice Department under the provisions of the Voting Rights Act of 1965, voters will be eligible to register either at city hall or at the county courthouse and be eligible to vote in ALL elections. Also, the regular polling places in the precincts and any other places approved by the county board of supervisors may be used for voter registration at designated times with notice of such to be given in the newspaper.

INTEREST RATES: This bill which sets maximum interest rates on loans extends the current law for two years. The provision to allow banks to charge a fee for credit cards was not in the final version of the bill.

CHILD-NAPPING: This bill makes it a felony to take a child from the state without consent of the child's legal guardian.

APPROPRIATIONS: Because of no measures to increase taxes, the appropriations for state agencies and programs for the coming fiscal year were set at a "low budget recommendation." In most cases, the funding will be near the current level. Two items

which were not funded were \$60,000 for expenses for Supreme Court Justices and \$4 million for the Institute of Technology Development whose goal is to create 33,000 new jobs in Mississippi by 1995.

CORRECTIONS: The Corrections Department was extended for two years, and provisions were made to hire a superintendent to have full control over the state penitentiary at Parchman. Another bill allows supervised parole to be discontinued after two years with the remainder of the parole to be served unsupervised.

MENTAL HEALTH: A bill was passed to tighten the involuntary commitment to a mental institution procedures. Although the mental health department budget was appropriated at \$9 million less than requested, 179 new positions

at the state hospital at Whitefield were left in the bill.

Bills which have been recently signed into law by the Governor include:

LETHAL INJECTION: This requires all prisoners sentenced to death after this law becomes effective to be executed by lethal injection rather than the gas chamber.

RACKETEERING: The Racketeering Influenced and Corrupt Organization Act allows for the seizure of property such as airplanes and boats used in drug trafficking and other forms of organized crime. Also, businesses financed by illegally acquired money can be confiscated.

TOURISM: Visitors to many Jackson motels and

restaurants will be paying an extra one-half cent sales tax to fund a city convention and visitors bureau which is designed to bring more people in to Jackson. Several other cities in the state have similar taxes to promote tourism efforts.

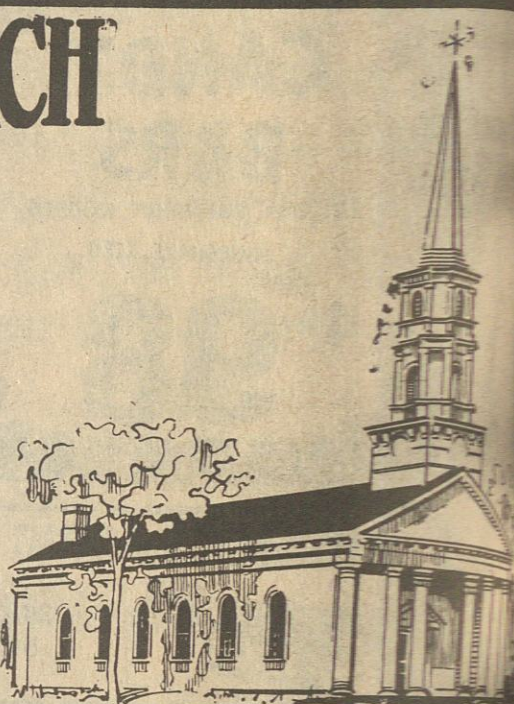

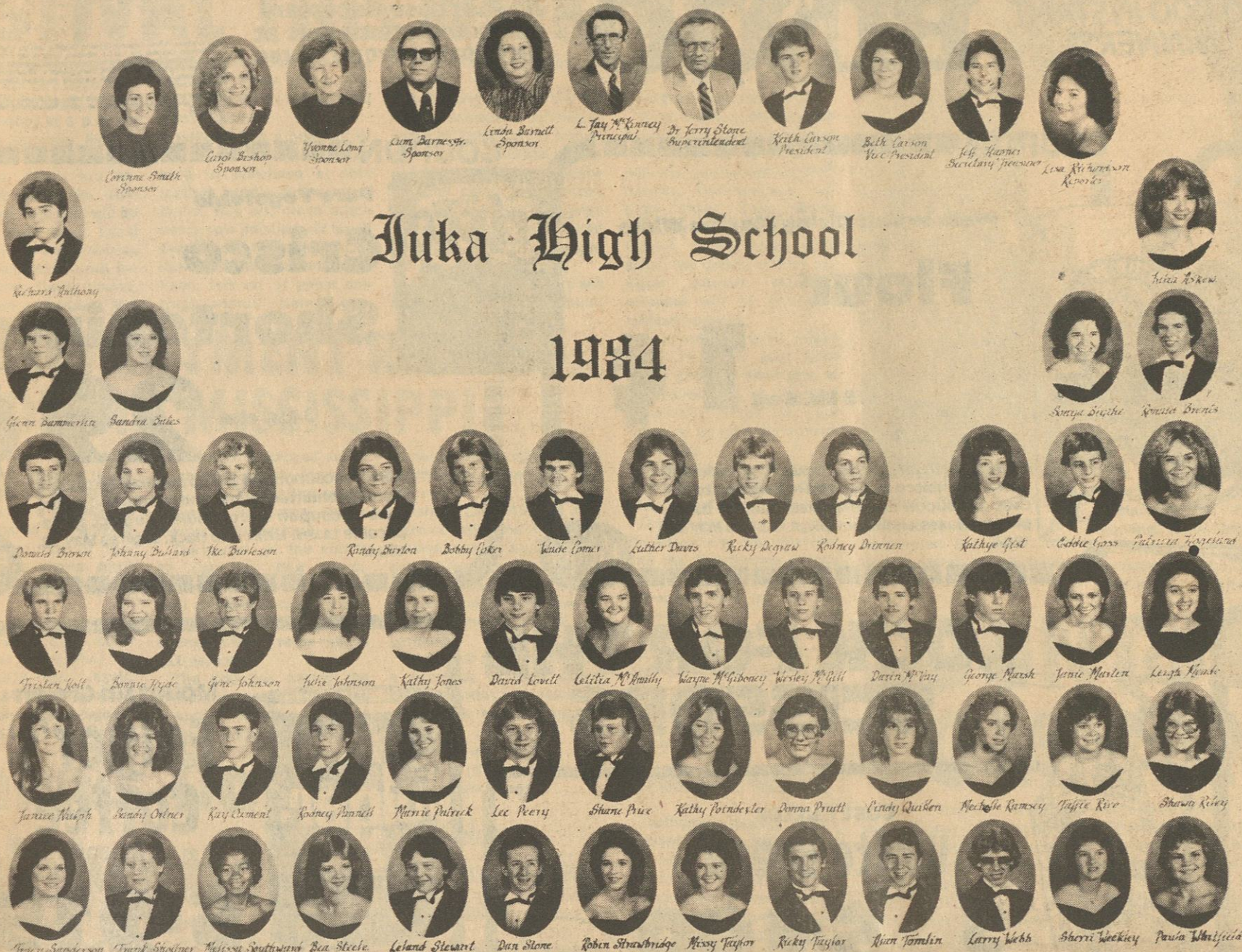
