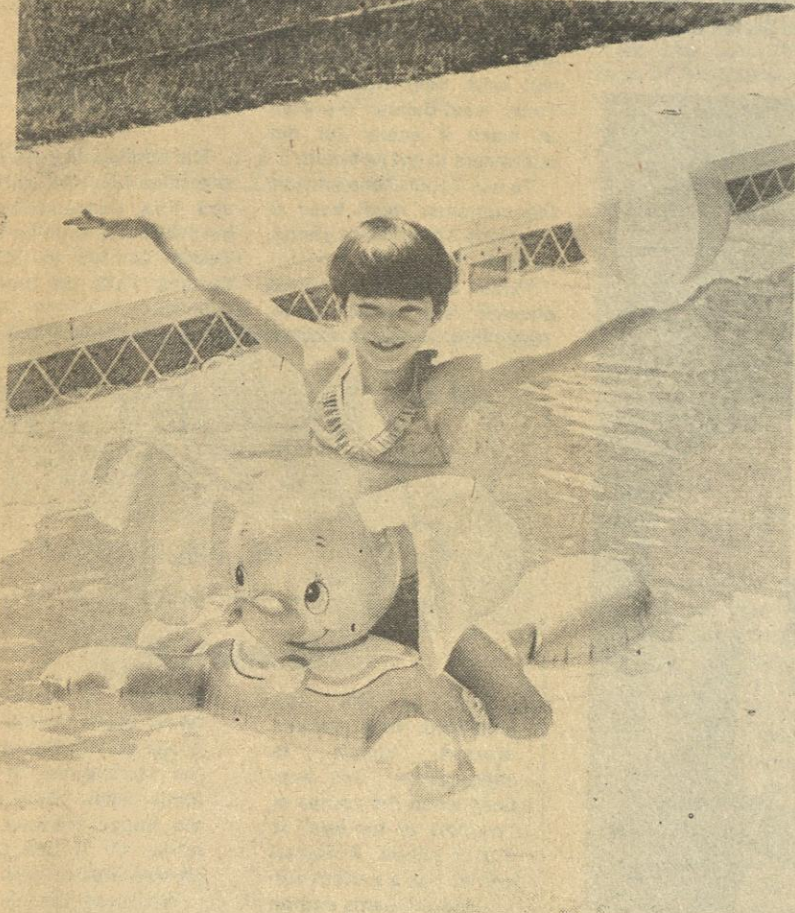

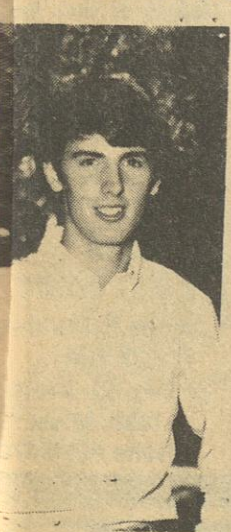

U.S. 72 CONTRACT TO BE AWARDED

A multi-million dollar contract for construction of new four-lane highway on U.S. 72 in Tishomingo County is expected to be awarded by the State Highway Commission at its June 24 meeting, Northern District Highway Commissioner Zack Stewart said.

The project consists of 5.833 miles between Burnsville and Mississippi Highway 25 at Iuka and the estimated cost is \$10 million. Involved will be grading, drainage, culverts, base, asphalt pavement, double bituminous surface treatment, concrete pavement, guard rail, fencing, bridges, box bridges and erosion control.

County School Bus Driver Training School Scheduled

The first School Bus Driver Training School for the Tishomingo County Schools has been scheduled to begin Thursday, June 28-29, 1984, at 8:00 a.m. at the Belmont School.

Under the present regulations each regular and substitute driver must hold a valid bus driver's certificate from the Mississippi State Department of Education to be eligible to drive a school bus for the public schools.

Experienced drivers will be required to complete the first day only for a one year renewal certificate.

Each class will be limited to a maximum of 20 drivers. Each driver must hold a valid driver's license, a renewal receipt, or a permit to enroll in the course.

Anyone may take the course but taking the course does not assure one of a bus route.

YOUNG IUKA MAN DIES IN COLLISION

A quiet, darkened city street was the scene of a tragic accident Sunday morning, June 17, which claimed the life of one of Iuka's most outstanding teenagers.

Stevie Waynell Alsip, 19, son of Mrs. Jean Jourdan, of Iuka, was killed in the one vehicle accident, which transpired around 2:30 a.m. on White House Road in Iuka. According to Iuka Police Chief, Joel Holliman, Alsip was driving a 1984 Nissan pick-up, belonging to Warren Robertson, of Iuka, when he apparently lost control,

traveled off the left-hand side of the road, and skidded approximately 100 yards into a tree.

Chief Holliman stated that he was taken to Tishomingo County Hospital where he was pronounced dead on arrival.

A lifelong resident of Iuka, Stevie will long be remembered by those who knew him for his kind nature, his outgoing personality, his love for others, his warm smile, and his willingness to help others in time of need.

A 1983 graduate of Iuka

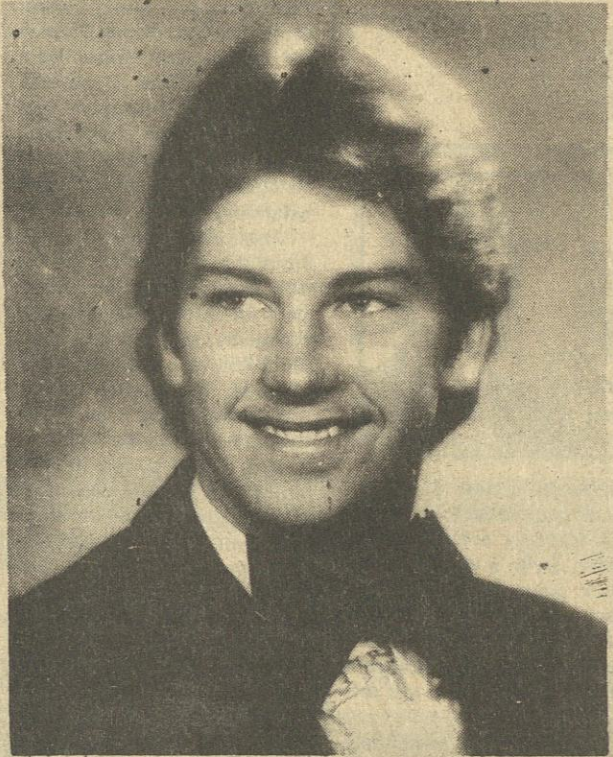
High School, he was a member of the Beta, Decca and Science clubs. He was selected as Most Handsome in his Freshman year and served on the varsity basketball team in his sophomore year. He served in the 1982 and 1983 Homecoming Courts and was a member of Who's Who Among American High School Students.

He was a student at Northeast Mississippi Junior College and was employed at Fairless Hardware in Iuka.

Funeral services were at 3 p.m. Monday, June 18, at Cutshall Funeral Home Chapel with Rev. Perry Murphy officiating. Burial was in Oak Grove Cemetery. Cutshall Funeral Home was in charge of the arrangements.

OFFICIALS TO CHARGE IUKA MAN WITH MURDER

An investigation is being conducted by the Iuka Police Department, the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department and two state investigators into the brutal death of a 30-year-old Iuka resident whose body was found around 12:00 a.m. Monday, June 17, at a residence just off Spring Street in Iuka.

Iuka Police Chief, Joel Holliman, said that law officials received a call around 12:30 a.m. Monday from a young man saying that an ambulance and police officers were needed immediately at the home of Joe Clay in Iuka. Upon arrival at the residence, the officials found the dead body of Andrew B. Dilworth, Jr.

A coroner's inquest was held at the scene, but results are still pending. According to Holliman, Mr. Dilworth apparently died of a gunshot wound to the head from a .38 Special handgun. Holliman said that William Clifton Ragland, of Iuka, apparently fled the scene of the shooting but later turned himself in to

the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department during the time he was being sought by local officials and state investigators. "Murder charges will be filed against Ragland," Holliman stated. Ragland is currently being held at the Tishomingo County Jail and is awaiting action of the Tishomingo County Grand Jury. According to Holliman, a witness in the case indicated that the two men were in an argument over money matters.

Funeral services for Andrew B. Dilworth, Jr. will be held at 2:00 p.m. Saturday, June 23, at the First Baptist Church in Iuka with Rev. Moore officiating. Burial will be in Shady Grove Cemetery.

Grayson Funeral Home of Corinth is in charge of the arrangements.

Survivors include his wife, Mrs. Hattie Dilworth, of Iuka; three daughters, Shawn Dilworth, Miyoshia Dilworth and Lekresha Dilworth, all of the home; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Andrew B. Dilworth, Sr., of Iuka; two sisters, Stella Dilworth and Elsie Dilworth, both of Iuka; and three brothers, Tommy Dilworth, Bobby Lee Dilworth and Greg Dilworth, all of Iuka.

GARDENING

Those of you who were fortunate enough to plant early should have some garden vegetables ready for harvest. The rest of June will be a busy time for gardeners.

If you do have vegetables ready for harvest, harvest on time for peak quality. Then prepare the same space to make room for more vegetables.

Spray or dust sweet corn silks every three or four days to control corn earworms. Sweet corn needs 17 to 21 days from first silk to maturity. Harvest is not so critical with the newer, sweet hybrids.

As soon as corn is harvested, chop the stalks and turn them under to add organic matter to the soil. Prepare the area for planting winter squash and pumpkins in early July, or cauliflower, cabbage and beans in late July and early August.

As Irish potatoes mature, the vines will begin to yellow. Don't mistake leaf disease for maturity. Spray with a fungicide to keep the leaves healthy until they yellow with maturity.

Dig potatoes in the cool part of the day and shade

them from the sun. Don't wash potatoes to be stored unless they are muddy. Let them dry in a well-ventilated, dark place for several days and then store in a cool, dark place. Don't try to keep potatoes in the ground after the vines die. They will rot if not dug.

Tomatoes will continue to need care and attention, including suckering, spraying for worms and diseases and mulching.

Attending from Tishomingo County were: Chris Timbes, Angie Carpenter and Steven Bobo, from Burnsville; Julia Alexander, from Tishomingo; and Rebecca Carson, from Iuka. They were among the 17 delegates from Mississippi attending the conference.

Delegates were chosen from the top 4-H'ers in the 125 Tennessee Valley counties in Alabama, Georgia, Kentucky, Mississippi, North Carolina, Tennessee and Virginia. The theme for the 1984 conference was "If It's To Be, It's Up To Me."

The young people met to study the natural resources of the region and learn about problems affecting resources and how they can help solve them. They discussed career opportunities in natural resources and made new friends.

Touch-Tone Service Charge Waiver

South Central Bell customers who don't have Touch-Tone service can have it installed free if they request the service before July 31.

Under the offer, any residence or business customer ordering Touch-Tone will not have to pay the usual one-time service charge for having it connected, according to Tom Bailey, District Manager.

The usual service charge is \$23.50 per line for residences and \$27.50 for businesses, he said.

To use Touch-Tone service, the customer must have at least one Touch-Tone phone, he said.

ASTIGMATISM

One of the eye problems that causes blurred vision is astigmatism. This happens when the cornea or "window of the eye" is out of shape. A normal cornea has a perfect curve, with the same degree of slope on all sides. Light rays that pass through the cornea come together at a single point on their way to the retina.

But that isn't possible in the astigmatic eye. The rays of light don't come together at the same point. There are two separate images. This doesn't mean that people with astigmatism see double. But it does blur their vision.

There are three kinds of astigmatism, depending on the eye's point of focus. It's "near-

sighted" if it takes place before the image gets to the eye. It's "farsighted" if focus takes place behind the image. Or it's a combination of the two. Whatever the case, it can be corrected with glasses. The images will be clear when they reach the brain.

There are two separate strains of virus causing the disease in this country. One is known as the Western type and the other as the Eastern type. It is known that the Western type affords no immunity against the Eastern type nor will the Eastern type provide protection against the Western type. Modern modes of transportation result in frequent movement of horses from one part of the country to the other and more often than not through areas known to be infected with one or both types of the virus. Since it is known that neither the Eastern nor the Western strain is geographically restricted, as was once thought, it is important that horses be vaccinated with bivalent vaccines which protect against both strains of virus types.

All horses, mules should be vaccinated annually at least 15 to 30 days before the time losses occur. All animals transported across state lines having a history of sickness should be vaccinated at least 15 to 30 days before shipment. Areas having particularly long seasons should have the vaccination every 10 months. Eastern and Western strains of virus are restricted geographically as was once bivalent vaccines protect against virus types as recommended. Through the public service from

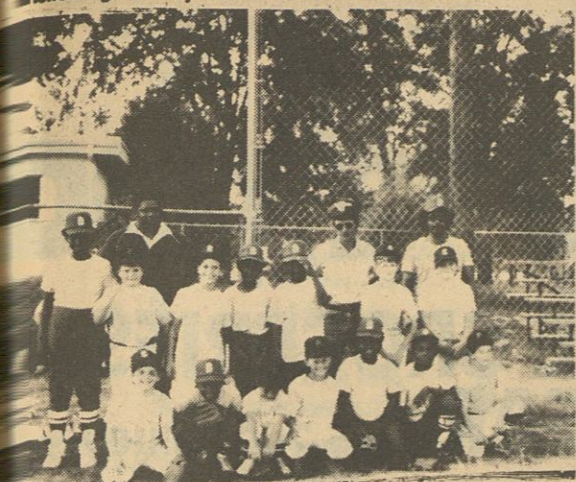
