U.S. 72 CONTRACT

A multi-million dollar contract for construction of new four-lane highway on U.S. 72 in Tishomingo County is expected to be awarded by the State Highway Commission at its June 24 meeting, Northern District Highway Commissioner Zack Stewart said.

The project consists of 5.833 miles between Burnsville and Mississippi Highway 25 at luka and the estimated cost is \$10 million. Involved will be grading, drainage, culverts, base, asphalt pavement, double bituminous surface treatment, concrete pavement, guard rail, fencing, bridges, box bridges and erosion con-

County School Bus **Driver Training School Scheduled**

The first School Bus Driver Training School for the **Tishomingo County Schools** has been scheduled to begin Thursday, June 28-29, 1984, at 8:00 a.m. at the Belmont

Under the present regulations each regular and substitute driver must hold a valid bus driver's certificate from the Mississippi State Department of Education to be eligible to drive a school bus for the public schools.

Experienced drivers will be required to complete the first day only for a one year renewal certificate.

Each class will be limited to a maximum of 20 drivers. Each driver must hold a valid driver's license, a renewal receipt, or a permit to enroll in the course.

Anyone wishing to enroll in the course but unable to attend this class may attend one of the other schools to be announced at a later date.

Anyone may take the course but taking the course does not assure one of a bus route. Any further information needed may be obtained by calling the County Superintendent of Education Office at 423-6061 or 423-6062.

FINAL PLANTING DATE FOR INSURED CROPS

July 5 is the final planting date for insured grain sorghum and soybeans in Tishomingo County. "Farmers unable to plant by the final planting date because of adverse weather conditions may sign a 20-day Late Planting Agreement, which permits insurance coverage, but provides for a lower guarantee due to the late planting," said Ralph Gillespie, Acting Supervisor for the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation

"Acres of insured grain sorghum and soybeans planted by July 5 must be reported by July 15, said Gillespie. Acreage planted after July 5

must be reported by July 15, said Gillespie. Acreage planted after July 5 should also be reported on the July 15 acreage report (in the "remarks" section). Farmers must sign the Late Planting Agreement within 10 days following July 5.

"The FCIC has expanded the terms of the Late Planting Agreement to include adverse weather conditions. Previously, late planting was allowed only because of excessive moisture," Gillespie



GARDENING

Those of you who were fortunate enough to plant early should have some garden vegetables ready for harvest. The rest of June will be a busy time for gardeners.

If you do have vegetables ready for harvest, harvest on time for peak quality. Then prepare the same space to make room for more vegetables.

Spray or dust sweet corn silks every three or four days to control corn earworms. Sweet corn needs 17 to 21 days from first silk to maturity. Harvest is not so critical with the newer, sweet hybrids.

As soon as corn is harvested, chop the stalks and turn them under to add organic matter to the soil. Prepare the area for planting winter squash and pumpkins in early July, or cauliflower, cabbage and beans in late July and early August.

As Irish potatoes mature, the vines will begin to yellow. Don't mistake leaf disease for maturity. Spray with a fungicide to keep the leaves healthy until they yellow with maturity.

Dig potatoes in the cool part of the day and shade

them from the sun. Don't wash potatoes to be stored unless they are muddy. Let them dry in a well-ventilated. dark place for several days and then store in a cool, dark place. Don't try to keep potatoes in the ground after the vines die. They will rot if not dug.

Tomatoes will continue to need care and attention, including suckering, spraying for worms and diseases and mulching.



ASTIGMATISM

One of the eve problems that causes blurred vision is astigmatism. This happens when the cornea or "window of the eve" is out of shape. A normal cornea has a perfect curve, with the same degree of slope on all sides. Light rays that pass through the cornea come together at a single point on their way to the retina. But that isn't possible

in the astigmatic eye. The rays of light don't come together at the same point. There are two separate images. This doesn't mean that people with astigmatism see double. But it does blur their vision.

There are two separate strains of virus causing the disease in this country. One is known as the Western type and the other as the Eastern type. It is known that the Western type affords no immunity against the Eastern type nor will the Eastern type provide protection against the Western type. Modern modes of transportation result in frequent movement of horses from one part of the country to the other and more often than not through areas known to be infected with one or both types of the virus. Since it is known that neither the Eastern nor the Western strain is geographically restricted, as was once thought, it is important that horses be vaccinated with bivalent vaccines which protect against both strains of virus types.

The medical name for the condition is otitis externa. It is most frequently referred to, however, as swimmers' ear. The external ear canal becomes inflamed (red) and, sometimes, infected

A common cause of otitis externa is water which remains in the ear after swimming or bathing. One need not be a swimmer to have this condition. The accumulation of wax in the ear can contribute to the problem.

Some experts suggest that swimming should be avoided by individuals prone to develop otitis externa. Others suggest that swimmers use ear plugs and that they place an alcohol preparation in their ears after swimming to remove water.

Treatment may be as simple as placing a few drops of mineral oil in the ear to ease inflammation. Burrow's solution, acetic acid solution, or hydrogen peroxide are also popular remedies. Your pharmacist can recommend products that appear good for prevention and treatment of swimmers' ear. If an infection is present, he will probably recommend a physician visit. Prescription antibiotic ear drops or an oral antibiotic may be needed.


