### Miss Ladye Love Long To Participate In Pageant



The 27th Annual Miss Mississippi Pageant will be in Vicksburg during the week of July 18 through July 22. The Miss Mississippi Pageant selects the state's representative to the America Pageant held each year in Atlantic City, New Jersey. Miss Ladye Love Long, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Julian Long, of luka, who was selected as Miss Pre-pagant, will participate in the pageant. Ladye is a 1982 graduate of luka High School, elected as Miss Imperial in 1979, and was Beautiful at luka High

School in 1980. The Miss Mississippi Pageant has been produced and directed by the Vicksburg Jaycees since 1958. Each year since that time the reigning Miss Mississippi has enjoyed tremendous success at the Miss America Pageant where three of them have been selected as Miss America: Mary Ann Mobley in 1959; Lynda Lee Mead in 1960; and Cheryl Prewitt in 1980. The primary purpose of the pageant is to provide scholarships to young ladies. This year scholarships awarded to young ladies from

across the State of Mississippi will be in excess of \$27,000.00, with an opportunity for the winner to compete in the Miss America Pageant where the total scholarships will exceed \$2,500,000.00 in 1984 alone. The Mississippi scholarships are made possible through donations from the Gold Patron Program and from the Miss Mississippi Pageant Scholarship Foundation. ### COUNTY UNEMPLOYMENT CONTINUES TO DROP

A number of unemployed in Tishomingo County noted to drop at mid-May, according to Charles Smith, manager of the Mississippi Employment Service. The rate of unemployment is estimated to be 16.7 percent compared to 17.5 percent in April and 21.5 percent in May of 1983. This is the lowest rate for Tishomingo since November, 1983, with construction employment declining 890 from last month to 180 from last month. The number of residents employed is 8,180, 230 above the estimate for April but 230 below the estimate for May, 1983.

This large yearly drop was noted in all categories, with the exception of Agriculture. There were 2,590 individuals employed in manufacturing jobs at mid-May, compared to 2,540 in April and 2,440 in May, one year ago. Nonmanufacturing employment was estimated to be 3,060, 20 above the estimate for April and 290 below the estimate for May, 1983, with construction experiencing the largest yearly drop. Smith also noted that the civilian labor force for the four-county area of Alcorn, Prentiss, Tippah, and

Tishomingo was estimated to be 46,120 at mid-May. This denotes an upward trend of 1,080 from the previous month's figure, but a significant loss of 1,370 from the estimate of one year ago. There were 40,870 workers employed in the four-county area at mid-May, up approximately 850 from April and 1,630 above the estimate for May, 1983. The number of unemployed people rose to 5,250 at mid-month, an increase of 230 from last month but a sharp drop of 3,000 from the same month last year. The unemployment rate was calculated to be 11.4 percent, compared to 11.1 percent in April and 17.4 percent in May, 1983.

Total nonagricultural wage and salaried employment for the Corinth Area rose 120 above the April figure and 1,590 above the estimate for one year ago. Manufacturing employment, estimated to be 7,630, rose slightly from last month but experienced a significant rise from the 13,990 estimate for one year ago. This large yearly increase was experienced in several groups including Furniture and Fixtures, Machinery, Apparel, and Miscellaneous Plastics. Nonmanufacturing employment totaled 16,260, 80 above the April estimate but 140 below the estimate for one year ago.

### ONE ARRESTED IN FATAL SHOOTING

Butch Miller, age 26, of luka, has been charged with murder, following the shooting death of his wife, Mary Ann Miller, 21, of luka, on Friday night, June 22.

According to luka Police Chief, Joel Holliman, the incident occurred at the Little Creek Motel, located at 702 South Main Street, luka. Local officials received a call at approximately 11:20 p.m. from one of the motel's residents, who asked that police and an ambulance be dispatched to the motel. Upon arrival at the scene, the officials found Mrs. Miller on the couch of the one room apartment. According to Tishomingo County Coroner, Dale White, she was transported to Tishomingo County Hospital where she was pronounced dead at approximately 12:15 p.m.

A coroner's inquest was held at the scene of the crime, and results indicated that Mrs. Miller apparently died of one gunshot wound to the head. According to Chief Holliman, the weapon, believed to be a .38 Special handgun, had not been

recovered at press-time.

According to Holliman, Butch Miller, apparently fled the scene of the shooting, but was later arrested by luka Policeman, Johnny Nunley, at a friend's house in Burnsville. Miller was placed in Tishomingo County Jail to await results of a hearing which was held Monday, June 25. According to Holliman, a witness in the case indicated that the Millers were having an argument at the time of the shooting.

Services for Mary Ann Miller were held at 2:00 p.m. Monday, June 25, at Cutshall Funeral Home Chapel with Rev. Perry Murphy officiating. Burial was in Allsboro Cemetery.

Mrs. Miller was the mother of four children, Lorie Ruth Farris, Teresa Diane Farris, Amanda C. Miller and David Lee Miller. Other survivors include her mother, Mrs. Mary Ruth Linder, of McRae, Ark.; two sisters, Linda Brown, of Cabot, Ark., and Betty Jean Farris, of McRae; grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Odie Farris, of Cherokee, Ala., Mrs. Grifflie Dexter, of luka, and Fletcher Crosby, of Cherokee, Ala.

"Hopefully, this event will conclude our major fund raising for 1984," states Greg Quinn, Crusade Committee Chairman. "Our goal for 1984 was \$4,902.00. So far the Crusade Committee has collected \$3,291.77 in donations and memorials. We're still \$1,610.23 away from where we want to be, but if our July 21 fund raiser goes well and we get the county participation we expect, we

should reach or exceed our goal."

"We've got a fantastic event planned for July 21. We call it 'The Crusade For Cancer Fair', and hope it turns out to be an annual event," explains Quinn. "So far, our plans include a large Arts and Crafts Fair, Gospel Singing, and an old-time cookout that everyone should enjoy. I believe that this event will provide our community with the much needed information on cancer, as well as raise the funds necessary for Cancer research, treatment, and prevention. "Also," adds Quinn, "it will be a lot of fun."

### Cannery In Burnsville

**GARDEN CARE**

Many Tishomingo Counties are watering gardens to supplement scarce summer showers.

Early vegetables become bitter and tough if allowed to wilt in dry soils and late vegetables will not be productive without sufficient moisture.

Although rain is important, proper handling and management of your garden can also improve yields.

Onions should be planted four inches apart. Keep the soil moist as the bulbs grow and do not break the tops as they begin to yellow. Breaking the tops can lead to neck rot.

All garden tomato plants should be staked or caged to keep the plants and fruit off the ground. Call the Extension office to find out different ways to support tomato plants.

Sidedress corn plants with nitrogen when plants are about 10 inches high and again when about knee high. Watch for chinch bugs

feeding at the base of the stalk.

Check squash, cucumber and melon plants for squash bugs. On young plants the bugs may hide in the soil and feed at the base of the stem where it enters the soil.

Control bean leaf beetle on young snap beans, lima beans and Southern peas. Recommended pesticides and rates of application are available at the local Extension office.

Follow a regular spray program with a recommended fungicide to prevent disease problems. This is especially important for tomatoes, lima beans and snap beans.

If you haven't mulched your tomato plants do that this month. This will help keep the soil moist and prevent soil and fungi from splashing onto the plants.

Apply additional fertilizer as a sidedress when necessary. Proper timing and application rate information can be obtained from the Extension office.

Continue to plant lima beans and Southern peas as

**Food For  
Special Occasions**

Bridal shower, graduation, anniversary or informal wedding - these special events call for special food, served well, in an appropriate setting. Especially now, planning is the first important consideration for a successful affair without significantly disfiguring the budget.

Keep the food basically simple, whatever the occasion. Rely on special touches to give dishes character and style. You can use a colorful garnish such as a lemon twist, parsley sprig, carrot curl, or an interesting relish.

Let the occasion, time of day and number of people determine what's to be served. A five o'clock cocktail party calls for foods that are easy to handle and not overly fussy. Recipe books offer lots of interesting and nutritious spreads that you can prepare ahead to serve hot or cold. Then all you need to do is put it out with your favorite assortment of crackers and other dishes as you prefer.

For a weekend brunch, plan food that's filling and interesting. Crepes are an excellent choice. You can have the pastry made ahead and in the freezer. The filling of your choice might also be prepared ahead and frozen. So you have a minimum of last minute preparation to do to serve a really elegant brunch dish. Don't forget a hearty pot of soup, chili or whatever speciality you may have that makes a complete maindish meal for a quick casual get-together.

Always be sure to plan for a contrast of flavor, textures

and shapes. A crispy, green salad on a brunch menu will complement crepes or quiche. Add a broiled tomato and fresh fruit dessert compote for color and crunch and you're all set.

For your special occasion, decide how you'll serve and set up accordingly. Serve yourself buffets are especially nice for large groups, encouraging your guests to mingle. Besides, guests can help themselves to whatever size portions they desire and return for seconds without fuss. Whatever style, sit down or buffet, dishes, tableware and glasses can be set out in advance. When serving buffet style, stack plates and roll utensils in napkins so that guests can pick them up with ease. Keep coffee cups, sauces and beverage on a side table.

Even the simplest decorations help create a festive party mood and help make less costly foods take on more appeal. An inexpensive bouquet, a cluster of small houseplants you already have, a bowl of fresh fruits and vegetables, or a collection of seashells can dress up a buffet setting. Try colorful placemats and napkins, a basket filled with dried flowers, a few blossoms floating in a water filled glass

bowl, some small candles. For special occasions a mirror in the center of the table reflecting flowers and candlelight, a favorite china platter, or silver serving piece, will help to make the meal an elegant one, regardless of what food you choose to serve.

Put your plans on paper well ahead of the special occasion. You'll find it easier to organize and carry out all the things that add up to gracious hospitality. Check each menu item listing ingredients and the dish you'll use to serve it in. Make a shopping list of things you need to buy, after checking what you have on hand. Take advantage of seasonal foods for whatever occasion you may be planning.

Avoid last minute preparations by choosing foods you can prepare in advance and store in the freezer. Pay attention to seasonings and taste and appearance of dishes you serve. They should be tasty and attractive.

Make sure your cooking facilities are adequate for the menu you've planned. Use appliances that will make preparation or serving easier for you, like warming trays, insulated servers, or an electric knife.

There's no set rule for entertaining - just do your own thing. Careful planning can make the event successful and save the budget as well.

**Blueberry Muffin**

2-1/2 cups sifted flour  
2-1/2 teaspoons double-acting baking powder  
1/2 cup sugar  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1 egg yolk, slightly beaten  
1 cup milk  
4 tablespoons melted butter  
1 egg white, stiffly beaten  
1 cup fresh blueberries

Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder, sugar and salt; sift again. Combine egg yolk and milk. Add to flour mixture, add shortening, then mix only enough to dampen flour. Fold in egg white and blueberries. Bake in greased muffin pans in hot oven (425°) for 25 minutes. Makes 12 large muffins.

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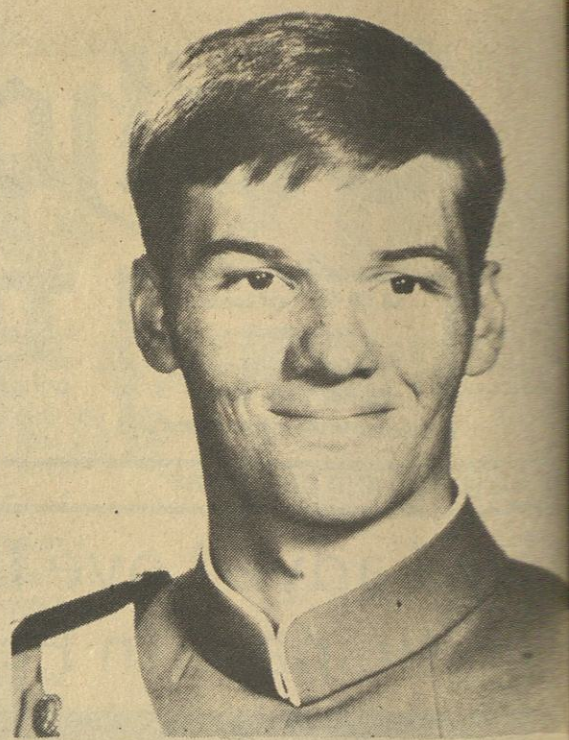

**SQUINTING**

People who squint a lot probably need glasses. This is often a sign of nearsightedness. Nearsighted people who don't have glasses will squint to sharpen their focus when looking at something. It may solve the problem temporarily, but it can also cause eyestrain and headaches. And squinting doesn't do much for your personal appearance.

Some adolescents tend to squint when they're growing up. By the time they are 20 or 21 many of them will realize that their nearsightedness is a problem that needs help.

In some cases the nearsightedness will improve by then.

Sometimes it progressively worsens for most people. The degree of nearsightedness has reached a plateau by the time they're fully grown. The problem may affect one eye or in both. Only an eye examination can determine the cause. With the proper glasses, "squinters" will have normal vision again. They will no longer have to strain their eyes to see clearly.

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Rabies is a viral disease of man and animals. The rabies virus attacks the central nervous system and if the disease is not prevented, causes the death of its victim. Rabies is transmitted from animals to man by a bite from the rabid animal. Usually the signs of rabies develop within 2 weeks to 3 months after the bite has been incurred. However, if the bite has been on the head or face and is of a severe nature, signs of disease may be seen in as few as 10 days. There are two types of rabies "dumb" and "furious". Furious rabies in a dog, for example, can be recognized by certain specific signs. At first the dog will act strangely. There will be a departure from normal habits. Either the animal will be unnaturally withdrawn or abnormally affectionate. Following this stage, which lasts about 2 days, the dog usually wanders far afield. And it is then

that the most dangerous time he is "mad" dog will bite on its path. It is also period that the animal appears to be from the mouth. Actually is caused by the saliva of the animal. When the animal is in the process of dying, the animal differs from a "mad" period. Usually of the first sign. This soon to the limbs and organs, resulting in death. 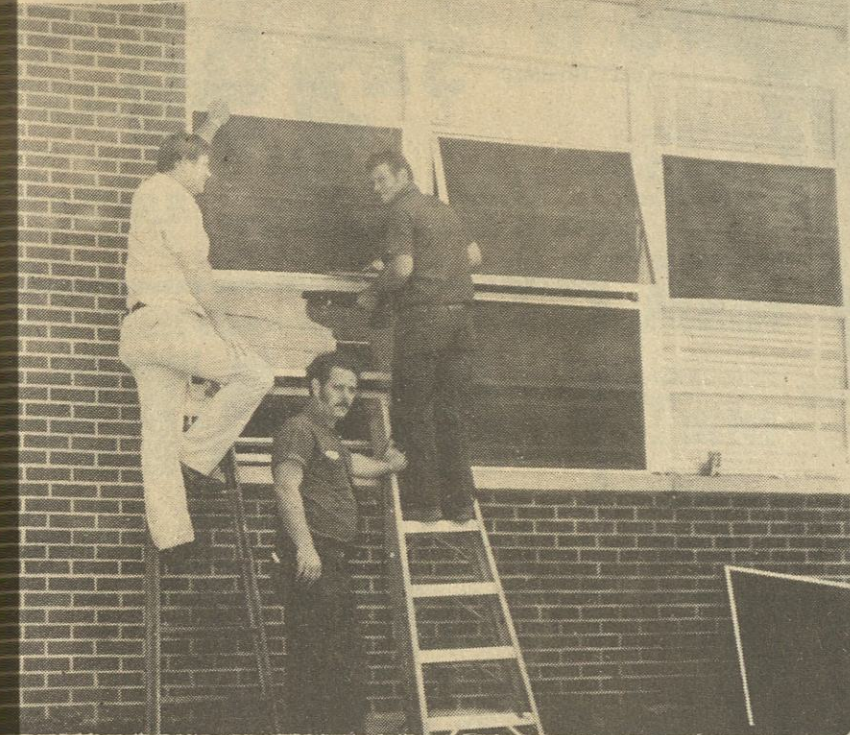


Sunscreens — Patrick, left, Ora Lee, right, Dr. Jerry

## Sunscreen Workshop Feature

Approximately 15 persons attended a one day sunscreen workshop here Monday at Iuka High School.

Sponsored by TVA and Tishomingo County Electric Association, the workshop was held in an effort to train local persons in installation and to educate that sunscreens can be beneficial to schools or throughout the United States.

Workers and teachers at Iuka High School participated in the energy-saving workshop, which are used in the form of regular screens. In addition, one person representing the Iuka School participated in the workshop.

The sunscreens will be installed outside of the glass panes. They still permit a view to the outside and

and during the last days of school in May and June.

According to Solar Information Specialist Herb Stonebrook, the sunscreens built at the workshop were placed on south and west facing windows of the school.

Sunscreens are shading devices that work like regular screens, except they are made of tightly woven fiberglass material that can block up to 70 percent of sunlight. They reduce the heat entering through east and west facing windows, thereby reducing air-conditioning loads in summer. However, Dr. Jerry Stone, Superintendent of Iuka Schools, expects those being installed at the school to add comfort to rooms when air conditioners are not in use.

To be effective, they must be installed outside of the glass panes. They still permit a view to the outside and

allow daylight to enter rooms. Mounted in wood and metal frames, they are easily removable for the winter when sunlight is desirable. Sunscreen materials cost for an average window approximately \$10-15, if you build it yourself. They can be purchased readymade from building supply and storm window firms.

## Area Teachers Join Computer Age In Recertification

Teachers who may have earlier felt threatened by the idea of computers in the classroom went away feeling better and more knowledgeable about the computer's role in education after completing a 45-hour class offered by Northeast Junior College.

The class was set up by

languages. BASIC is a universal language in micro-computers, while PILOT is strictly designed for educational uses. LOGO specializes even further in that pre-school and elementary students reap most of the benefits of the language.

"We believe in hands-on training with computers," Melvin said. "The more comfortable they become with the computer, the more productive they can be with one."

"After becoming familiar with their computers, the teachers learned about educational applications of the computer, computer assisted instruction and computer management instruction."

Computer assisted instruction simply shows what the computer can do to help the student, while computer management demonstrated how the computer could make the teachers' preparation for class easier.

"I think this group of teachers were concerned by the projection that by 1990, 65 percent of all jobs will involve using computers in some way. They wanted to prepare their students for that time," Melvin said.

"As far as what the participants got out of the class, I felt they got a lot of practical knowledge that will aid them and their students when they get computers. After all, if teachers have no training, computers are just used to pass the time. In that case, they are usually just very expensive toys."

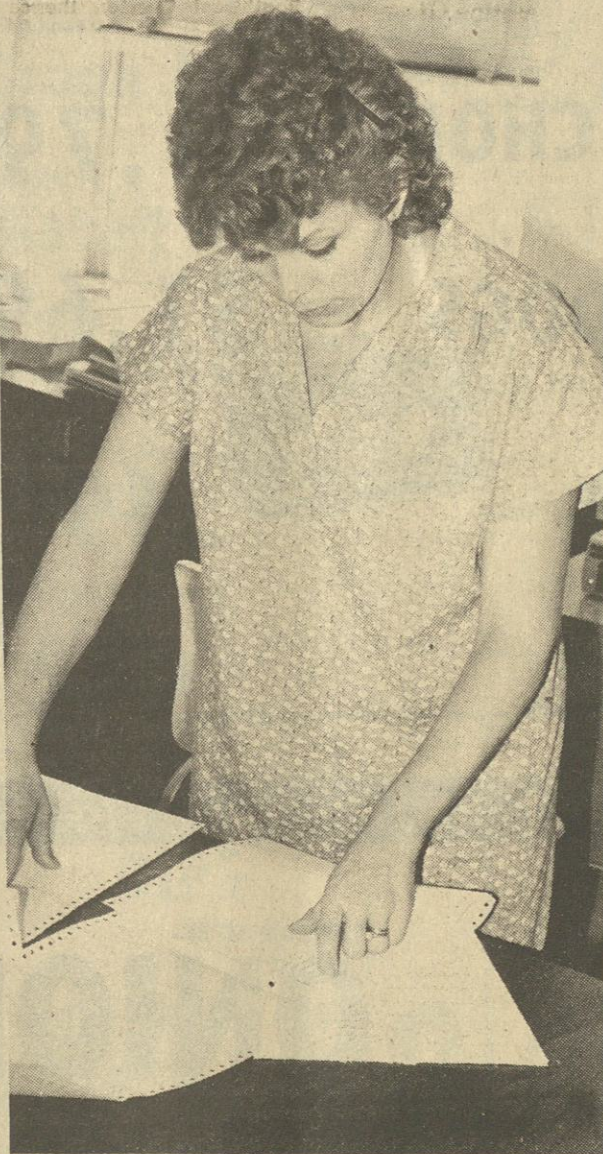
## County School Bus Driver Training School Scheduled

### ASCS Farm News

#### USDA Requests Comments on 1985 Feed Grain Program

The U.S. Department of Agriculture is seeking public comment on some aspects of the 1985 feed grain program prior to making a decision on the program, a USDA official said today.

Everett Rank, administrator of USDA's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, said USDA will study the public's recommendations along with current data on U.S. and world crop conditions and crop supply and demand before announcing the 1985 program.

Specifically, Rank said, USDA would like to receive comments on:

- the loan and purchase level;
- the established target price;
- the national program acreage;

-- whether there should be a voluntary reduction percentage and, if so, what percentage;

-- whether there should be an acreage reduction program and, if so, what percentage and how to establish the acreage bases for the acreage reduction program;

-- whether there should be a land diversion program and, if so, the extent of such diversion and the level of payment;

-- whether barley should be eligible for payment purposes under the feed grain program;

-- whether malting barley should be exempt from any acreage reduction program;

-- if an acreage reduction or set-aside program is necessary, whether to allow haying and grazing of acreage conservation reserve acreage;

-- provisions of the farmer-owned reserve;

-- whether to require offsetting compliance if an acreage reduction program is established;

-- whether non-resource loans and purchases should be made available to producers who cut their corn crop for silage; and

-- whether contracts that producers sign to participate in the program should be binding after the sign-up period.

Rank said current law stipulates that if USDA estimates the quantity of corn on hand in the United States on Sept. 30, 1985 will exceed 1.1 billion bushels, a cash land diversion program of not less than 5 percent must be provided and an acreage reduction program

may be provided.

If a combination cash land diversion and acreage reduction program is offered, the total reduction may not exceed 20 percent, Rank said.

Any required reduction in excess of 15 percent must be equally apportioned between a cash land diversion program and an acreage reduction program.

The payment rate for any cash land diversion for corn cannot be less than \$1.50 per bushel.

Details of program options USDA is considering are scheduled to appear in the June 6 Federal Register.

Comments should be sent to director, Analysis Division, Room 3741-S ascs-USDA P.O. Box 2415, Washington, D.C. 20013. The comments, which must be received no later than August 6, will be available for public inspection in that room during regular business hours.

### I CAN COPE Series Planned For Cancer Patients

An education program unique for its focus on cancer patients' role in their own health care is the American Cancer Society's "I Can Cope" program. It has grown from a single effort in one state to a program national in scope. I Can Cope is an 8-session course taught by health professionals. Each class has a guest instructor and usually includes a basic format of introduction, review, lectures, discussions and/or audiovisual materials. All sessions are free.

The course offers a sequence of information on cancer and its treatment, daily health problems, nutrition, exercise, feelings and fears related to cancer, sexuality and available community resources.

Physicians, nurses, dietitians, counselors, and social workers are all involved to provide professional guidance and information to the patients and families who attend.

The Tishomingo County "I Can Cope" program will be starting July 10, 1984, at 6:00 p.m. This program will be held at the Iuka Library and will be taught for 8 consecutive weeks, ending August 28, 1984. The instructor will be Nelda O'Briant, R.N., and

Elaine Wynn, R.N. This program is sponsored by the American Cancer Society.

I Can Cope helps people regain control of their lives and offers them hope for the future, stated Elaine Wynn, Chairman of the Service and Rehabilitation Committee of the Tishomingo County Unit of the American Cancer Society. "Through an informal classroom environment, cancer patients and families get information and support that will help them through difficult times."

Participation in the I Can Cope program is open to cancer patients and their families from anywhere in the community.

#### TVA Statistics Show Regional Economy Is Getting Stronger

Monthly TVA figures continue to show a strengthening economic recovery in the Tennessee Valley, according to the agency's Chief Economist, Allan Pulsipher. "Our overall regional composite index of economic activity has been increasing

steadily, and retail sales, as well as electricity use by industrial and commercial customers served by distributors of TVA power, are at all-time record-high levels," Pulsipher said. "Total employment is very close to its all-time high and is expected to exceed that level sometime this summer."

The total regional labor force, however, has grown about 5 percent since the previous 1979 peak. "Just getting back to prerecession levels is not a complete recovery," Pulsipher said.

Some components of the index show weaknesses, according to Pulsipher. Employment in manufacturing is still about 7 percent below its previous peak, and electricity sales to the very large industrial customers that are served directly by TVA are about a third less than their previous peak.

"Electricity use by these large industries has been recovering rapidly," Pulsipher said, "but several of them in the primary metals and chemicals industries retired old equipment and improved the energy efficiency of other equipment during the recession. So their use of electricity may not break records for quite some time, but the improvements will help them stay profitable over the longer term."

A similar index for the whole Nation surpassed its previous peak in January, and

in April it was about 10 percent higher. "Because the Nation by the recession," Pulsipher said, "the composite index was percent below its peak. The national index needs to remain stable to accelerate for the regional recovery to recover fully from recession."

The evidence of recovery provided by TVA's supported by survey of consumer confidence by the Consumer Center of the Commerce Board.

Pulsipher said the consumer confidence in the Tennessee, Alabama, Mississippi, and Kentucky region has risen dramatically since the last quarter. "Moreover," he said, "consumer expectations for a future economy in the region are now as bright as other region in the Nation."

## New Charges For Multi-line Business Phone Customers

Effective with June 5 bills, South Central Bell began billing multi-line business customers a \$6.00 end user common line charge. The Federal Communications Commission ordered businesses with more than one access line to pay the monthly per line charge.

"The charge will not apply to single-line business or residence customers," explained Tom Bailey, District Manager. The FCC has delayed the charges for these customers until June 1985.

If a customer has more than one business telephone line in South Central Bell's service area in Mississippi, he is considered a multi-line

customer, and the \$6.00 charge will apply to each line.

"The charges we are applying will help replace some of the subsidies to local telephone service that currently flow from long distance revenues," said Bailey. "The federal regulators have recognized that these subsidies are no longer practical because of growing competition in the long distance markets."
