County School Bus Driver Training

The last School Bus Driver
Training School for the
Tishomingo County School
System has been scheduled
to begin Monday, August 6
and 7, 1984, at 8:00 a.m. at the
Burnsville High School.

Under the present
regulations, each regular and
substitute driver must hold a
valid bus driver's certificate
from the Mississippi State
Department of Education to
be eligible to drive a school
bus for the public schools.

Experienced drivers will be
required to complete the first
day only for a one year
renewal certificate.

Each class will be limited
to a maximum of 20 drivers.
Each driver must hold a valid
driver's license, a renewal
receipt, or a permit to enroll
in the course.

Anyone may take the course
but taking the course does
not assure one of a bus route.

JOBLESS RATE IN COUNTY EDGES UP

The jobless rate in
Tishomingo County edged up
slightly at mid-June. Charles
Smith, Manager of the
Mississippi State Em-
ployment Service, announced
today that the rate of unem-
ployment for the county was
estimated to be 17.3 percent
of the civilian labor force, or
1,750 individuals. This rate

compared to 16.7 percent last
month and 21.1 percent, one
year ago. The number of
county residents employed
was estimated to be 9,550,
only 10 above the previous
estimate but 1,000 above the
estimate for June, 1983. The
civilian labor force rose to
10,100 at mid-month, 280
above the previous estimate

but dropped 740 below the
figure for one year ago.

Manufacturing em-
ployment in the county at
2,600, remained steady over
the month but rose 130 over
the estimate for June, one
year ago. Those employed in
nonmanufacturing jobs were
estimated to be 3,060, the
same as the estimate for May
but 280 below the June, 1983,

figure.

Smith also noted that the
civilian labor force for the
Corinth Area, which now in-
cludes Alcorn, Benton, Mar-
shall, Prentiss, Tippah and
Tishomingo counties, totaled
61,550 persons. This reflects
an increase of 550 over the
previous month but a down-
ward trend of 210 from the
estimate for one year ago.
There were 51,870 persons
employed in the six-county
area at mid-June, down 1,340
from the previous month but
360 over the estimate for one
year ago. The majority of this
monthly loss was experien-
ced in the Non-agricultural
Wage and Salaried group,
with Agricultural employment
also experiencing a loss. The
yearly rise was also noted in
the Non-agricultural Wage
and Salaried group. A total of
9,680 people were unem-
ployed in June. This is 1,890
more than the preceding
month but 570 below the
current month one year ago.
The unemployment rate for
June was calculated to be
15.7 percent, compared to
12.8 percent in May and 16.6
percent in June, 1983. This
large increase in area unem-
ployment was due primarily
to one of the larger industries
in the area having a one-week
layoff.

Total employment in
manufacturing industries in
the six-county area registered
15,770 at mid-June. This
represents a loss of 1,830
from the previous month and
700 below the figure for June,
one year ago. Although some
gains were experienced, they
were offset by a large loss in
the Electrical Machinery
group. This loss was caused
by the one-week layoff as
stated before. Non-
manufacturing employment,
estimated to be 20,630, also
experienced a loss of 670
from the May estimate but
remained stable compared to
one year ago. The monthly
decline was experienced
primarily in Service and
Miscellaneous.

CONSTRUCTION UNDERWAY ON MISSISSIPPI HIGHWAY 30

A level and seal project for
4.8 miles on Mississippi
Highway 30 between
Mississippi Highway 25 to
near the end of the Natchez
Trace Parkway will get un-
derway during the week of
July 30 and August 2.

During the next several
days, while work is going on
and the materials are setting
up, motorists are encouraged
to travel with care in the area.

The purpose of this project
is to smooth out uneven
spots in the pavement and to
repair cracks to the existing
pavement.

Highway Department of-
ficials described the work as

the use of a mixture of liquid
asphalt and crushed stone
which will seal the cracks and
prevent additional damage to
the roadbed.

For a couple of weeks there
may be some loose gravel on
the road and motorists
should be careful. However,
after the material has had
time to set up, the highway
will be smoother and safer.

"We regret any incon-
venience which may be ex-
perienced by the traveling
public during this time,
however, it is a necessary act
in maintaining our high-
ways," explained L.G. Sum-

merford, District Engineer.

Economics require the
highway department to use
this procedure over other
popular measures. It was
pointed out. Asphalt costs
run approximately \$30 per ton
while the crushed stone used
can be obtained at a cost of
approximately \$3.50 per ton.

"We wish that we could
provide the more popular
overlying method but the
Highway Department simply
does not have the funds
which such contracts would
require," Mr. Summerford
stated. "In addition, these
projects can be handled by
Highway Department per-
sonnel without requiring an
outside contract be let."

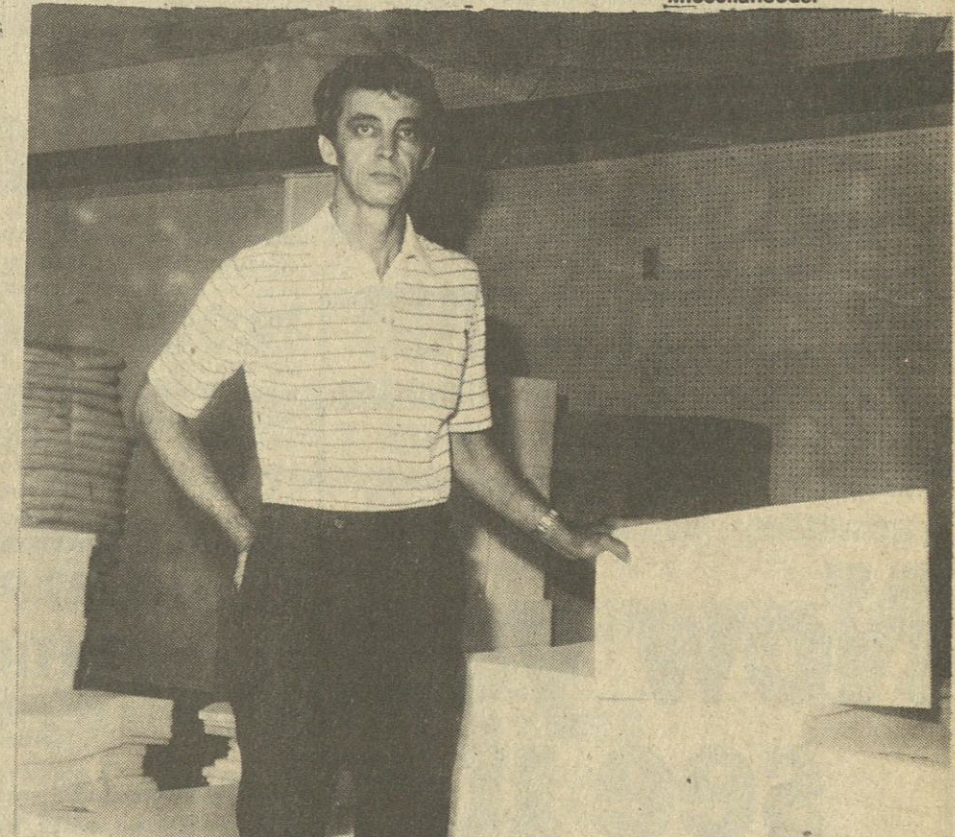

Sorghum Midge Detection

The adult sorghum midge is a reddish, gnat-like insect that is extremely hard to see. However, county farmers should become familiar with the life cycle of the sorghum midge since control measures are directed to the adult midge.

These tiny insects are most active during mid-morning. Fields should be scouted daily during the bloom period for midge infestations. Scout fields during the morning between 10 a.m. and 2 p.m. when activity is at its peak.

Insecticide treatment is necessary when an average of one adult midge is found per head after 20 percent to 30 percent of the heads are blooming.

If windy weather conditions exist midges will be more difficult to locate and sample accurately.

A second and third application may be needed after the previous one, especially if staggered plantings are involved.

An adult female sorghum midge lays 30 to 100 eggs during its lifetime of one day. It takes only two days for eggs to hatch into larvae. The larvae are tiny pink to

orange maggots that feed inside the developing seed.

A complete generation occurs in about 12 to 16 days. There may be four to eight generations per year.

Damage from this pest often goes unnoticed by farmers until it has seriously damaged yields. For more information about detecting and treating the sorghum midge, contact the local Extension office.

Prevent Tractor Runaways

Trying to boost a tractor with a dead or weak battery can have tragic consequences if precautions aren't followed.

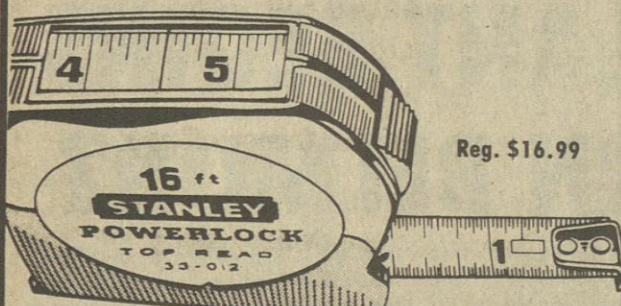
Starting a stalled tractor while the operator is on the ground can result in the person being run over if the tractor starts up in gear. This is possible if the neutral safety switch is by-passed.

To start a tractor safely, connect the auxiliary battery to the tractor's battery terminal (+ side) and to the tractor's frame (- side). Don't connect the auxiliary battery to the starter terminals.

Start the tractor only from the operator's seat, when any chance of tractor runaway can be prevented.

Controlling Mattress Wear

Rotation of mattress and box spring foundations can prolong the life of bedding by at least 25 percent. To be fully effective, however, rotation must be made in the correct sequence.

There are two basic benefits from the rotation of innerspring mattresses. The first is to provide comfort by preventing or minimizing lumps. Do this by turning the mattress over so the irregularly compressed layers

of padding along the surface may regain their uniformity.

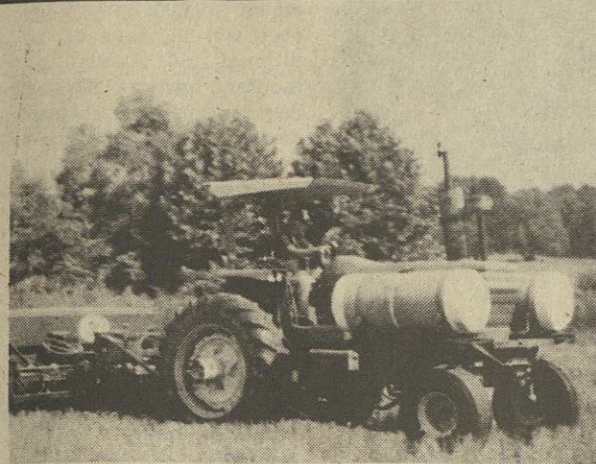
Rotation also extends the life of the mattress and box springs. To prevent premature breakdown, wear should be distributed evenly. To do this, the mattress should be turned over left to right one time, then head to foot the next time. The cycle should be repeated.

This is the only sequence of rotation that will assure maximum comfort and uniform wear.

A slip of paper as a model mattress will demonstrate the wear pattern. Mark its first position to indicate head and foot. The orientation is now reversed. After two more similar rotations, the marks reappear in their original position.

This simple experiment illustrates two important points. First, that during the four step cycle each portion of the mattress receives equal exposure to wear. Next, the sequence must be followed to extend the potential life or comfort of the bedding. These points show the need for a consistent program of rotation.

Box spring foundations should also be rotated for many of the same reasons. Although they are not intended to be turned over, their head and foot positions should be exchanged periodically. Check the bed

frame to be sure it fits correctly and is providing adequate support for the foundation.

Bedding use should determine how often rotations are made. In hospitals and nursing homes, beds may be occupied almost continuously. They are also subject to concentrated loads and bending in the same area. Such mattresses should be rotated monthly.

In hotels and motels, where service is less severe, it is usually sufficient to rotate every three months. The box springs should be turned on alternate rotations.

Hot Squash Relish

4 lbs. (7 pts.) diced squash
2 cups green bell peppers, diced
1 large bunch (1 qt. celery), diced
1 cup onion, diced
4 cups vinegar
1½ cups sugar
2 tbsp. salt
2 tsp. celery seed
3-4 hot peppers, medium size*
2 tbsp. powdered mustard
1 tsp. turmeric

* You may substitute ¼ to ½ teaspoon crushed red pepper to each pint of vegetables for hot peppers; start with ¼ teaspoon and add as desired.

Prepare vegetables, discarding leaves from celery.

Combine peppers, celery, and onion with vinegar, sugar, salt, celery seed and 3 pods of hot pepper. Heat mixture to boiling; boil 5 minutes. Stir in squash, mustard, and turmeric; return to boiling and boil 5 minutes.

Spoon into clean pint jars; adjust lids. Process 15 minutes in boiling waterbath canner. Begin counting time as soon as all jars are in boiling waterbath.

Add 2 pods of hot pepper; heat mixture; taste for hotness, and add the third pod of pepper if desired.

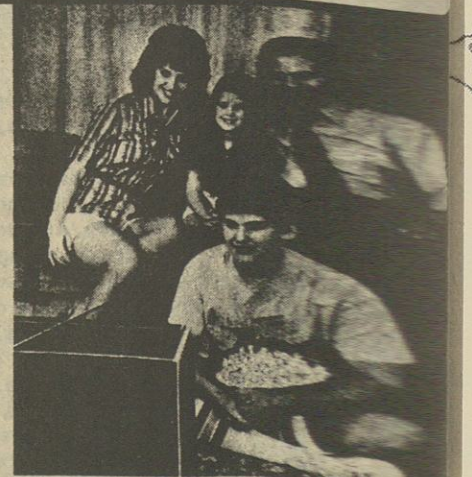

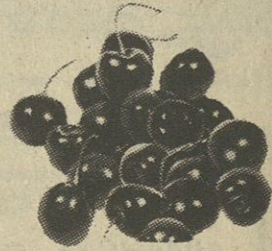

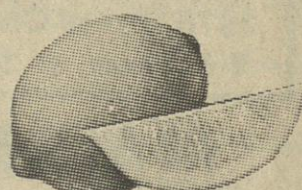

SELENIUM AGAINST CANCER

Animal studies have indicated that the element selenium is an anti-cancer agent. Now a study of 10,840 human subjects reveals that those who developed cancer within ten years had lower selenium levels at the start of the study in 1973.

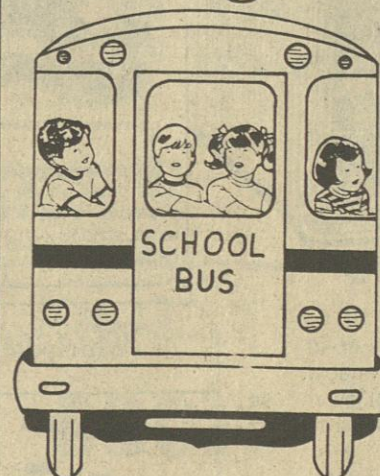
Scientists explain that selenium protects against naturally-occurring compounds in the body called free radicals. Unopposed, these free radicals can damage cell structures and make them more vulnerable to cancer-causing substances in the diet and the environment.

Animals and humans require selenium for survival, but plants do not. If soil contains no selenium, plants will still thrive, but humans and animals will not get enough. Many areas of the nation have selenium-poor soil. The selenium content of onions, therefore, can vary by a factor of one thousand.

For this reason, some researchers suggest supplements for everyone. Only tiny trace amounts of selenium are needed. A moderate supplement—up to 100 micrograms (mcg) a day could be good insurance. This amount, added to selenium likely to be in food, should keep most people close to the 200 mcg level designated as both safe and adequate.

The Farmers Home Administration announced today that it has postponed indefinitely the moving of its district offices from Greenville and Clarksdale.

growth rate."

Since October 1, 1983, FmHA has poured more than 130 million dollars into Mississippi's housing industry, and is continuing to obligate funds at a rate of over one million dollars per day.

DOWN WITH CHOLESTEROL

Earlier this year, the results of a seven year study of approximately 3,800 men with elevated blood cholesterol levels were announced. The study was called the Lipid Research Clinics Coronary Primary Prevention Trial. It produced findings which will hopefully assist in the continuing fight against heart attacks and other problems associated with high blood levels of lipids such as cholesterol.

One group in the study received *cholestyramine*, a drug which lowers cholesterol. This group experienced better than a 12 percent drop in total blood cholesterol. Scientists determined that the treatment group had an almost 20 percent reduction in the risk of developing heart attacks.

High cholesterol levels are generally thought to be the result of heredity, certain illnesses, and dietary habits. A first step in correcting the dietary problems associated with cholesterol is to simply restrict the intake of fats. Exercise has also been shown to be beneficial. Now, an additional approach appears to be beneficial. Lipid-lowering agents include *cholestyramine*, *clofibrate*, *niacin*, *colestipol*, and *probucol*. Those individuals who will benefit the most from their use is yet to be determined.

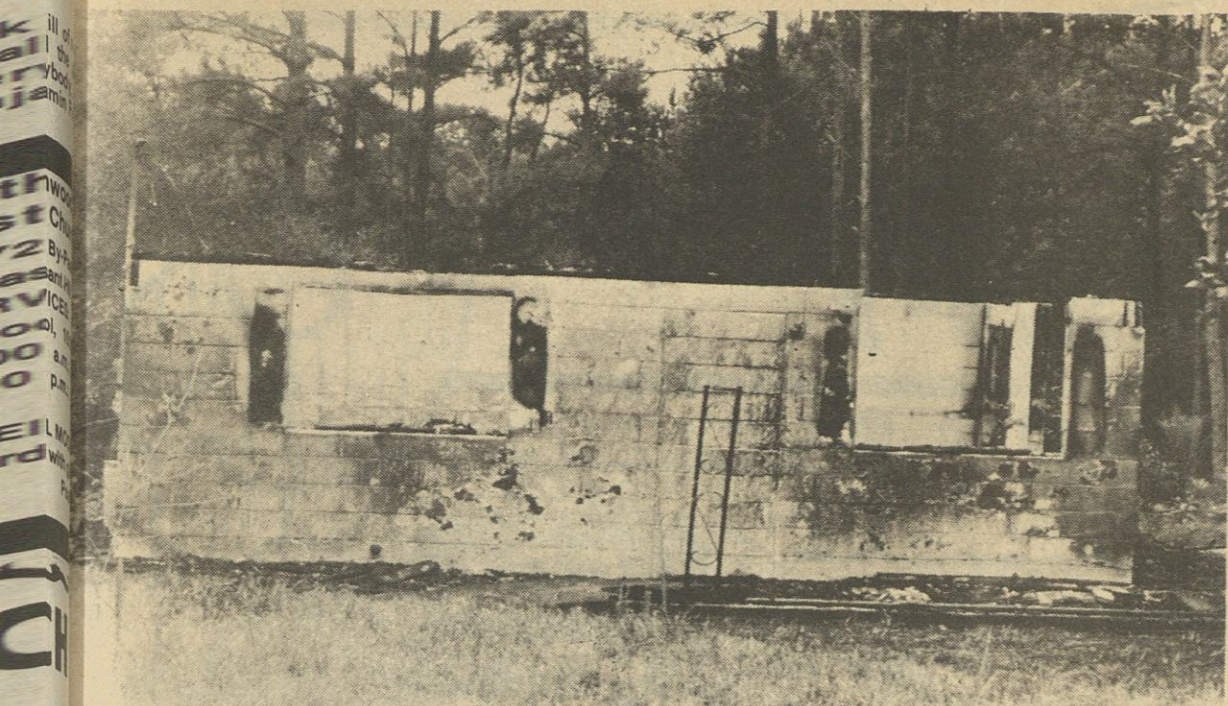

Reminiscence Important Exercise For Elderly

People of all ages look forward toward the future and recollect their past experiences. A time reference which encompasses past, present, and future is the hallmark of a uniquely human existence since man is the only living creature who "looks before and after."

Although experiences from early life leave an indelible imprint on the human psyche, the development of personality and identity continues through the entire life cycle.

At every age, the individual uses reminiscence of people, events, thoughts, and feelings in order to illuminate problems of the present.

Reminiscence is one of the primary tools individuals use to create a sense of who we are and what our existence means.

"Hamlet," along with many other Shakespearean plays, reflect three things besides the narrative: a problem, its solution, and the consequent moral or lesson. The problem seems to be a form of evil in Shakespeare's plays. His solutions depend on goodness in some form and the moral is that goodness finally and inevitably triumphs over this evil.

Reminiscence, especially in older adults serves the same purpose as these three things do in Shakespearean plays. Reminiscence aids the older adult in "seeing" a problem or problems more clearly; it helps him determine what "goodness" can

help him cope with or overcome the problem; and, provides him hope that problems inevitably are overcome.

Eleanor Adams of the Center for Studies on Aging at North Texas University, says the major functions of reminiscence in the intrapersonal dimension are (1) serving as a coping mechanism to manage stress and loss; (2) maintaining and enhancing a sense of personal identity and self worth; and, (3) evaluating the meaning of life, reconciling past conflict and failures in preparation for death.

Professionals who work daily with the older adults as individuals or in groups place a special importance on the process of reminiscence. In fact, researchers say with assurance that there is a significant correlation between the mental health of the elderly and the availability of a confidant or empathic listener who knows how to use reminiscence.

One of the most important services a person can offer an elderly friend or family member is to learn to be an effective listener as the older adult remembers or reviews life.

Adams gives some suggestions on ways we can better use reminiscence in older persons. They are the following:

-- overtly express a desire to listen when a person talks about the past

-- use attentive body posture (lean forward to the talker), maintain eye contact, and use an unhurried tone of voice

-- touch the talker, especially those older persons who suffer from sensory loss

-- ask relevant questions at important points in the story, but do not interrupt the speaker's line of thought

These suggestions are

relatively simple ones, but they can have a profound effect on an older adult. By following these suggestions, we may have an opportunity to help increase the older person's self esteem and reduce a sense of uselessness.

A shared exploration of a person's past can lead to a reassessment of present circumstances and may motivate the person to invest maximum effort toward the present.

POINT OF LAW

Q: Please explain how a lawyer can represent a person charged with a crime when the lawyer knows or is convinced that the person is guilty.

A: The United States Constitution requires the state to prove beyond a reasonable doubt that a criminal defendant is guilty of the crime charged. Until the state can make such proof, the defendant is presumed to be innocent. One of the highest legal, ethical and moral responsibilities of a lawyer is to ensure that this fundamental right is preserved. The lawyer's own personal judgment about the guilt or innocence of the client does not affect the presumption of innocence. The lawyer's duty is to defend the client zealously, within the bounds of the law, and to see that the client has his day in court. It is true that this presumption of innocence has shielded some notorious criminals, but it also protects all citizens, including you and me.

Q: I borrowed money from the bank six months ago and now the loan has come "due". I do not have the money, what can I do?

A: You are liable to pay

back the face value of the note, plus interest. But you may renew the loan for another six months, if you pay the interest on the loan.

Bananas are one of our
most popular fruits. They're
easy on the budget and
available in markets year
round. Nature has portion-
controlled them in individual
servings complete with
biodegradable packaging!

Bananas are perfect for
patio parties, barbecues,
card-playing casuals, easy-
going meals, baseball and
football stadium snacks, fon-
due fun, biking, hiking, pic-
nicking and many other uses.

Bananas are nutritious.
They have about the same
number of calories as other
fruits -- 85 calories in a three
and one half ounce (about a 6-
inch) banana. Having almost
no fat and containing natural
sugars giving quick energy,
they're a fairly good source of
vitamins C and A, contain a
fair amount of calcium and
phosphorus. They're an ex-
cellent source of potassium.

Because of their mild
flavor, easy chewing and
digestibility, bananas are par-
ticularly useful in the diets of
infants, and older people who
may have dentures or delicate
digestion.

Because of their smooth

non-irritating texture,

bananas are one of the few

fruits that can be eaten raw

by ulcer patients.

Bananas must be picked

when green. If allowed to

ripen on the plant they split

open and are tasteless.

Therefore, they are cut while

still green, shipped under

carefully controlled tem-

peratures to keep them green,

then ripened in specially

designed ripening rooms in

the United States. Both the

temperature and the humidity

of the ripening room are

carefully controlled.

Many fruits are best eaten

soon after purchase, but

bananas can have a more

leisurely ripening process at

home. Smaller families often

find it very convenient to buy

green bananas and let them

ripen gradually.

Select bananas plump, un-

blemished and bright in ap-

pearance. A dull-looking

banana often will not ripen

properly. Let the stage of

ripeness dictate the use of

the banana. For many

cooking purposes, it is best

to have the banana firm to the

touch, golden but still tinged

with green.

When the banana becomes

fully ripe it is flecked with

brown and is sweet and

mellow. This is the stage

many people prefer for eating

raw. Over-ripe bananas, often

Make some and freeze for

later use.

At home, keep bananas at

room temperature until they

reach the desired stage of

ripeness. If you aren't ready

bag in the refrigerator. The

days. The banana peeling will
darken but the fruit inside
remains good.

Serve bananas any way that
suits your fancy. Invite a
banana to breakfast. Bananas
are instant-quick. Peel and
eat. They slice without mess
or fuss. Children like
banana's mild flavor. Adults

Use bananas as a topping
with syrup for French toast or
