COUNTY TO ISSUE \$125,000 NOTE

In the September 4 meeting of the Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors, it was determined that it has become necessary to raise money for the purpose of purchasing medical equipment for the Tishomingo County Hospital. An estimated cost of the needed equipment was given at \$125,000.

The above specified amount is not available in the treasury of Tishomingo County to provide for the expenditure. Therefore, the Board is authorized to issue Promissory Notes for this

The Board of Supervisors

has declared its intention to issue its Promissory Note in the amount of \$125,000 to raise money for the purpose of purchasing the medical equipment.

The Promissory Note in the amount of \$125,000 will be issued Friday, September 28, at 10:00 a.m. during a meeting of the Board of Supervisors.

If 20% of the qualified voters of the county file a written protest against the issuance of the Promissory Note, an election must be held to approve the note.

TVA DIRECTORS VOTE TO **CANCEL YELLOW CREEK**

The Tennessee Valley Authority Directors were unanimous with their votes last Wednesday, August 30, to abrogate four unfinished nuclear reactors, two of which are located at the Yellow Creek Nuclear Plant here in Tishomingo County.

The reactors were put on postponement in 1982 when the TVA began panning back its nuclear program. At that time, four other units had also been repealed.

According to a spokesman for the TVA, the Authority is writing off over 4 billion dollars in nuclear construc-

Power take-off shafts on unloaders and wagons should be guarded. Don't work by them or step over them while the power is running. Don't get on the blower or work on P.T.O. · driven equipment or in unloading silage wagons unless the tractor is cut off with the key

Be careful when starting equipment. An accidental start could kill someone in contact with the equipment.

If you must enter an unventilated silo or manure pit, use some kind of supplied air or self-contained breathing equipment. Always use a safety rope so you can be rescued.

Farmers working in or around silos should take precautions against fatal poisoning by gases which may collect after filling.

Don't enter the silo at least a week after filling. Ventilate the silo for two weeks after

When entering the silo, run the blower 15 to 20 minutes before and while inside. If you encounter silo gases, use a self-contained breathing apparatus while using fans to ventilate inside the silo.

Use a dust mask when harvesting and handling dusty feeds and forages as protection from immediate sickness or long-term illness.

> Rain Benefits Cattle Farmers

Cattle producers in Tishomingo County are welcoming the recent unusual rainy weather. The rainfall could improve hay yields and help establish fall pastures.

Dry weather in June and July slowed growth in pasture and hay crops, but producers can take advantage of the rainy weather to make up for the earlier loss in production.


Hay harvesting has run below normal levels this year because of the dry summer. This, in turn, will cause a shortage in hay supplies that producers rely on to feed cattle in the winter.

The recent rains should also help calves make up for lower weight gains recorded in the early summer months because pasture quality will

improve with the moisture. Producers should cut hay at the mature stage and then fertilize the pasture to get another cutting this year.

Deficiencies in the B group of vitamins may not be immediately recognizable.

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B2 (riboflavin): Deficiencies cause vision blurring and oversensitivity to light, cracks at corners of the mouth, sore tongue, and skin disturbances. One study showed that women in a jogging program needed almost twice the U.S. Recommended Daily Allowance of B2.

B3 (niacin): Lack can cause skin disorders, mental disturbances, and diarrhea. Niacin is often used to treat high blood cholesterol levels and mental disorders.

B6 (pyridoxine): Deficiency symptoms are skin problems, mouth cracks, nausea, dizziness, and anemia. Women on the pill have lower levels of B6, often leading to depression.

B12: Lack causes anemia, weakness, bowel disorders, depression, and mental dulling. B12 is found only in meat and other animal products
