BEAR CREEK FESTIVAL PLANNED FOR SATURDAY

Fun and excitement is promised for everyone at the annual Bear Creek Festival and Belmont Collector's Car Show, which is scheduled for Saturday, September 8, in Belmont. This event is sponsored by the Belmont Promotional Association, the Bear Creek Collector's Club, and the Tishomingo County Development Foundation.

The festival's activities will begin at 8 a.m. with the 3 mile car show. Also, beginning at 10 a.m., the presentation of the annual Arts and Crafts Fair in Belmont City Park, and also the 8th Annual Collector's Car Show on the city's square.

The highlight of the day's events will be the newest attraction for this year's festival, a riverboat cruise on the beautiful Bay Springs Lake. The sternwheeler, Belle of the Lake, will cruise the lake on the Tenn-Tom.

State Highway 25, just outside the Iuka City Limits. An Iuka fire truck was at the scene to wash away the oil spill from the roadway and to spray the larger truck with

water in an effort to prevent flaming. Bins of bolts and gravel scattered about the scene during the impact of the two laden vehicles. Both drivers, who were identified

as Odem E. Blackman, of Iuka, and Rubel G. Heath, of Michie, Tenn., received injuries. They were reported to have been the only passengers traveling in the vehicles.

HIGHWAY 25 CRASH LEAVES TWO INJURED

State Highway 25 South was the scene of a two-truck collision early Tuesday afternoon, which involved Odem E. Blackman, 70, of Route 3, Iuka; and Rubel G. Heath, 33,

of Michie, Tenn. Investigating State Trooper, Jerry Boyd, related the accident occurred at 1:45 p.m. at the intersection of Business 25 and State High-

way 25 just outside the Iuka City Limits. Boyd identified Blackman to be the owner and driver of the 1972 GMC two-ton truck, which was traveling south on

Business 25 when the accident occurred. The officer said Blackman apparently pulled into the path of the northbound 18-wheeler, operated by Heath.

In an effort to avoid colliding, Boyd said Heath, driver of the gravel laden tractor-trailer, overturned and spilled the load of small rocks onto the highway. The smaller vehicle was also loaded at the time of impact and bins containing bolts were strewn onto the highway. It was reported that Brenda Redmond, of Michie, Tenn., was the owner of the vehicle driven by Heath.

Blackman was transferred via ambulance to Tishomingo County Hospital where he was treated for head injuries and later transferred to Eliza Coffee Memorial Hospital in Florence, Ala., according to Mr. Bill Rutledge, T.C.H. Administrator. Rutledge said Heath was also treated at the hospital and released to the care of his local physician.

County and city law officials were present at the scene directing traffic and clean-up measures during the accident. An Iuka fire truck was dispatched to the wreckage in order to wash away gasoline and oil spillage from the traffic area.

Trooper Boyd stated that several accidents have transpired at this particular location since the opening of this section of the four-lane highway.

TVA DIRECTORS VOTE TO CANCEL YELLOW CREEK

The Tennessee Valley Authority Directors were unanimous with their votes last Wednesday, August 30, to abrogate four unfinished nuclear reactors, two of which are located at the Yellow Creek Nuclear Plant here in Tishomingo County.

The reactors were put on postponement in 1982 when the TVA began panning back its nuclear program. At that time, four other units had also been repealed.

According to a spokesman for the TVA, the Authority is writing off over 4 billion dollars in nuclear construc-

tion costs; therefore, electricity rates will be approximately 2% higher than average in the next eleven years.

When construction began in 1978 until deferral, approximately 1.1 billion dollars was spent on the construction of the first reactor. The construction on Reactor No. 2, was only 3% near completion when it was delayed in May of 1979. After the delay, the Authority laid off more than 2,000 workers.

Many Tishomingo Countians are in hopes that the TVA will one day build a

generating, or some other type facility, at the 1,000 acre location.

According to a spokesman for the TCDF, resolutions have been made to issue to the local Board of Supervisors, as well as the Supervisors in Alcorn and Prentiss Counties. The resolution asks that the Authority appoint the Yellow Creek Site as the No. 1 priority for a future generating site.

Silage Harvest Safety

Tishomingo County farmers are harvesting silage this month and will face

numerous safety hazards in the process. Deaths and disabling accidents happen yearly at harvest time as a result of silage

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cutter entanglements, power take-off accidents and silo gas.

Using common sense and following a few basic safety guidelines can save lives and stop such costly accidents.

When servicing a silage cutter or unclogging the intake, be sure to stop the engine of the tractor. An electrical switch or hydraulic P.T.O. control may accidentally vibrate on and catch a hand or clothing.

Many accidents are caused when a farmer grabs a stalk that is clogging the machinery and the running cutter pulls him into the machine.

Power take-off shafts on unloaders and wagons should be guarded. Don't work by them or step over them while the power is running. Don't get on the blower or work on P.T.O. - driven equipment or in unloading silage wagons unless the tractor is cut off with the key out.

Be careful when starting equipment. An accidental start could kill someone in contact with the equipment.

If you must enter an unventilated silo or manure pit, use some kind of supplied air or self-contained breathing equipment. Always use a safety rope so you can be rescued.

Farmers working in or around silos should take precautions against fatal poisoning by gases which may collect after filling.

Don't enter the silo at least a week after filling. Ventilate the silo for two weeks after filling.

When entering the silo, run the blower 15 to 20 minutes before and while inside. If you encounter silo gases, use a self-contained breathing apparatus while using fans to ventilate inside the silo.

Use a dust mask when harvesting and handling dusty feeds and forages as protection from immediate sickness or long-term illness.

Rain Benefits Cattle Farmers

Cattle producers in Tishomingo County are welcoming the recent unusual rainy weather. The rainfall could improve hay yields and help establish fall pastures.

Dry weather in June and July slowed growth in pasture and hay crops, but producers can take advantage of the rainy weather to make up for the earlier loss in production.

Hay harvesting has run below normal levels this year because of the dry summer. This, in turn, will cause a shortage in hay supplies that producers rely on to feed cattle in the winter.

The recent rains should also help calves make up for lower weight gains recorded in the early summer months because pasture quality will improve with the moisture.

Producers should cut hay at the mature stage and then fertilize the pasture to get another cutting this year.

What To Do Before A Burglar Arrives

Burglars are beginning to take advantage of country hospitality. They have figured out that the isolation and the trusting nature of rural people makes the country a great place to increase their income. Therefore, both town and country residents should know what can be done to avoid playing host to these uninvited guests.

Drastic measures, such as high walls or iron gates, are not needed to secure the grounds. Good lighting and simple landscaping will discourage the burglar from approaching your home.

Outdoor security lamps which are resistant to vandalism are now available. Direct such light away from the house to light up the surrounding areas rather than putting a house in a spotlight. Keep a powerful flashlight handy to check the parts of your property that are hidden in shadows.

While lighting can reveal an intruder, high bushes can hide one. Keep shrubbery near the house trimmed, making sure no windows are concealed by bushes.

A hedge or fence along the perimeter of your yard can serve as a property barrier to keep someone from snooping around. Remember, a fence that is high enough to cut off the view of the house from the road is more to a thief's advantage than yours.

Burglars look for homes that appear to be unoccupied - shades down, lights off, car gone - all "welcome burglar" signs. If you plan to leave your home even for a short time, lock all doors, including garage doors.

Remove valuables which are movable out of sight from

windows. Leave drapes and shades in the normal position.

Turn on a radio to add to the illusion of people at home.

Take the phone off the hook if you expect to be gone only briefly. Burglars will often telephone a potential target. A busy signal throws a wet blanket on their plans.

Keep your dog inside the house at night and when you're away. Even a small dog's fierce barking will give a burglar second thoughts. If the dog is left outside, he can be silenced with violence or merely with a piece of meat.

If going on a vacation, don't advertise your vacation plans. Tell only a few trusted friends or neighbors who will keep an eye on things for you while you're away.

Cancel newspaper and mail deliveries.

Move garbage pails inside, or better yet, ask nearby neighbors to fill them with some of their trash to keep a burglar guessing.

Do not leave a recorded message on the telephone stating that you're not at home or telling when you will return. Turn down the phone bell so unanswered calls won't be detected from outside the house, or have calls forwarded to the phone number where you will be.

Buy an automatic timer that switches on lights and radio at varied intervals.

Arrange to have your lawn mown and leave a second car in the driveway.

Finally, remove all expensive valuables to a safe deposit box.

Make it a habit to lock all your exterior doors with a sturdy deadbolt lock. Windows and garage doors should be locked as well.

A good way to secure a garage door is with a hardened steel padlock through the roller track. Disconnect electric garage doors when going on a trip.

Never hide your house keys outside the house. Burglars know all the obvious places to look and some that are not so obvious. Instead, leave the keys with a trusted neighbor.

Prize Winning Meat Loaf

1½ lbs. ground beef
¾ cup Quaker oats (quick or old fashioned)

¼ cup chopped onion
1½ teaspoons salt
¼ teaspoon pepper
1 cup tomato juice
1 egg, beaten

Combine all ingredients. Pack firmly into an ungreased (8½ x 4½ x 2½-inch) loaf pan. Bake in preheated moderate oven (350 degrees) about 1 hour and 15 minutes. Let stand for 5 minutes before slicing. Makes 8 servings.

Understanding Beef Carcass Aids Best Choice of Cuts

Beef cattle are the largest

meat animals. They are marketed when they are at least eight months old, although the average age is between twelve and twenty-two months.

The bright, cherry-red color of beef makes it easy to identify. Streaks or flecks of fat intermingled throughout the lean (marbling) contribute to flavor and tenderness. There may be less fat or marbling in beef from young cattle than in meat from more mature animals, but young beef is usually more tender because of its age.

A beef carcass is divided into halves, called sides, for ease in handling. Each side is divided into a forequarter and a hindquarter. The quarters are further broken down into the wholesale or primal cuts.

Beef is finally divided into the retail cuts available at the meat counter. There are seven basic groupings of retail beef cuts including blade cuts and arm cuts (both from the chuck), rib cuts, loin cuts, sirloin cuts, round cuts, and breast cuts (brisket and plate).

The location of wholesale cuts gives you a clue to the tenderness of the retail cuts. The most tender cuts are from the lightly used muscles of the rib and short loin. The more active muscles of the

chuck and round are less tender cuts because of their abundance, are lower on the cooking method determines the final tenderness of the meat. This is so important to the proper cooking method, particularly for the economical, less tender cuts. Knowing the whole cut, the consumer is able to evaluate the tenderness of the retail cut and choose proper cooking methods. Tender cuts should be cooked dry heat. The less tender cuts, unless they have pretendered, must be cooked by moist heat.

In recent years, it has become possible to reshape the cornea through the programmed application of a series of special contact lenses. DERMATITIS IN CATS

Dermatitis is a disorder which frequently affects the skin of cats. It appears, most commonly, as tiny red eruptions which ooze fluid and then scab over. It is apparently itchy, and the cat's licking, biting, and scratching only aggravate the inflammation and may cause considerable loss of hair.

Often, the condition seems to be associated with flea infestation, but there are other causes. It could be an allergy to a certain food - such as fish, horse meat, or milk - and you might try varying your cat's diet. It could also be contact dermatitis which results from your cat's coming into contact with a certain plant or animal.

However, if your cat is scratching a lot and seems to be suffering, a prompt visit to the

veterinarian is in order. While he or she is checking out the cause, the dermatitis medication can be administered to relieve your cat's symptoms. BEWARE of spa shampoos, prescribed. Some contain ingredients which may be poisonous to cats.

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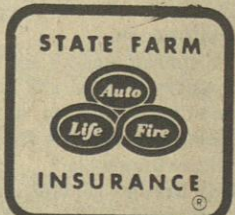
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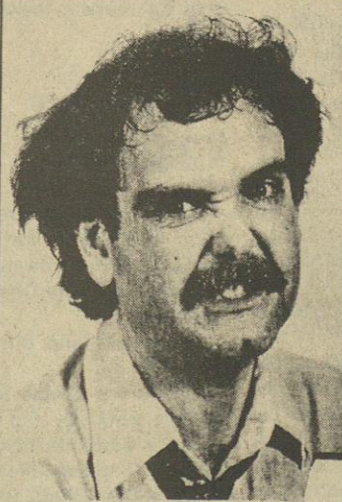
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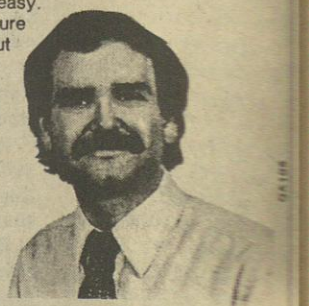
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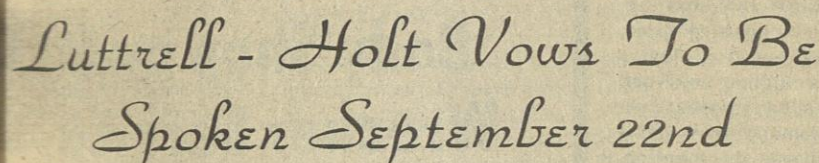

What are the purposes

of Workmen's Compensation?
A: Workmen's Compensation helps to prevent injuries or occupational diseases to workers. In the event injuries occur, Workmen's Compensation helps in rehabilitation and restoration of vocational opportunities. Workmen's Compensation helps to relieve society of the burden of supporting children left without support by the death of wage-earners.

Q: Who is covered by Workmen's Compensation?

A: Every private employer with five or more employees in regular employment is covered by the Workmen's Compensation Act. The employer is covered even if the number of employees temporarily falls below the minimum of five employees. A contractor is responsible for the employees of his subcontractor, unless the subcontractor has benefit payments for his employees. The state, its agencies and subdivisions, non-profit charitable and fraternal, cultural and religious associations are exempt from paying Workmen's Compensation insurance, but they may elect to do so. The employer bears the full cost of the workmen's compensation insurance. It is a misdemeanor for an employer to deduct the cost of workmen's compensation insurance from the pay of an employee.

Q: What are some examples of disabilities covered?

A: Any injury that arises where there is a direct causal connection between the work and the injury is covered by workmen's compensation. A pre-existing disease or handicap that is aggravated, accelerated, contributed to or precipitated by an employee's work to cause disability is also covered. An injury caused by an Act of God, such as a tornado or hurricane, can be compensable if the employee's work required him to be where he was injured. Mental or emotional stress on the job may be compensable. In some cases, an injury to an employee resulting from "horseplay" can be covered by workmen's compensation since the work brought the employees together.

Mississippi Native Executive Director

The new executive director of the Belmont-Harrison-Monroe County Drug and Alcohol Council feels lucky to have secured his position in the Ohio Valley.

However, the agency should be proud to have at its helm Dr. Howard M. McLeskey, a Mississippi native, and most recently a South Carolina resident.

His background includes: a bachelor's degree in political science and history from Memphis State University; a master's degree in sociology from Mississippi State University; and a doctorate in counseling and psychology from South Eastern University in New Orleans.

The 41-year old executive director is a clinical member of the American Association for Marriage and Family Therapy and he is an affiliate member of the American Association of ministers and of those who have an interest in the role the church plays in the community in drug and alcohol counseling.

About four years ago, Dr. McLeskey and his wife Elaine moved from the area to the sunbelt coastal area of South Carolina thinking they would enjoy the climate. It did not agree with us too well and we disliked it.

This list is available in the Tishomingo County ASCS Office. It includes the name and address of each such producer, county in which he/she lives, his/her telephone number, the type of hay or other roughage, the amount available, and the approximate price. Persons who

have a need to purchase hay and who do not have a readily available source are encouraged to come by the Tishomingo County ASCS Office and inspect the listing of producers that have hay for sale within the state.

A VITAMIN FAMILY

Deficiencies in the B group of vitamins may not be immediately recognizable.

B1 (thiamine): Low levels can cause heart swelling, leg cramps, muscle weakness, and mental confusion. Seventy to 80 percent of alcoholics suffer from malabsorption of B1.

B2 (riboflavin): Deficiencies cause vision blurring and oversensitivity to light, cracks at corners of the mouth, sore tongue, and skin disturbances. One study showed that women in a jogging program needed almost twice the U.S. Recommended Daily Allowance of B2.

B3 (niacin): Lack can cause skin disorders, mental disturbances, and diarrhea. Niacin is often used to treat high blood cholesterol levels and mental disorders.

B6 (pyridoxine): Deficiency symptoms are skin problems, mouth cracks, nausea, dizziness, and anemia. Women on the pill have lower levels of B6, often leading to depression.

B12: Lack causes anemia, weakness, bowel disorders, depression, and mental dulling. B12 is found only in meat and other animal products.

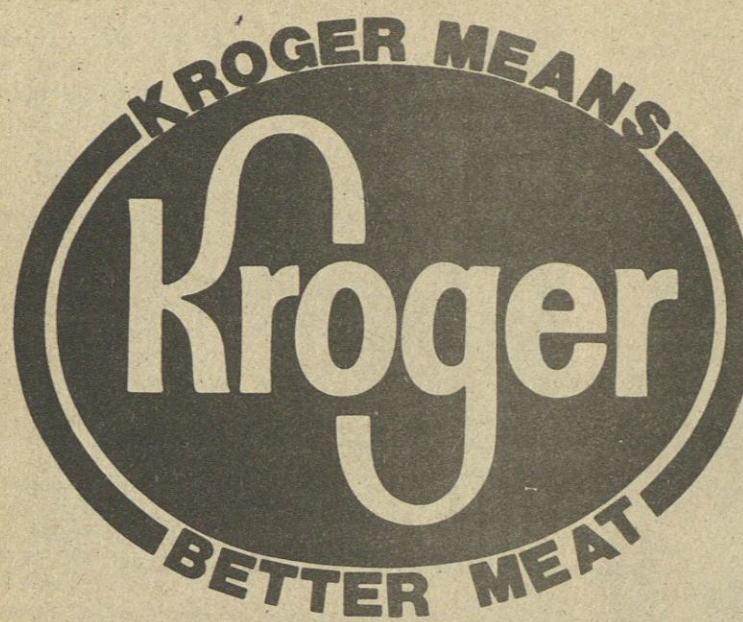
