T.C.E.P.A. DIRECTORS ELECTION SATURDAY

An election will be held Saturday, September 15, 1984, to elect five (5) members for positions on the Board of Directors of the Tishomingo County Electric Power Association. One director is to be elected for a three (3) year term for each of the following supervisor's districts: 1st District, 2nd District, and 3rd District, and one Area-At-Large. One director will be elected from the

4th Supervisor's District for a one (1) year term to complete an unexpired term. Members of the Association may vote for one person for each position on the ballot.

The polling places will be open from 8 a.m. until 6 p.m. so that members may vote. Members may vote at any poll regardless of their place of residence. The polls are as follows: Belmont City Hall, Burnsville City Hall, Iuka Courthouse, Midway School Building and Tishomingo City Hall.

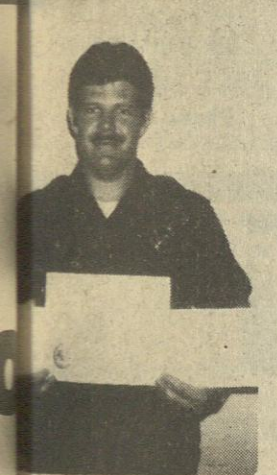
Benefit Singing

Memorial To Civil War Dead

The Battle of Iuka occurred 122 years ago on September 19. During the bloody confrontation, the Confederate casualties numbered 263 including Commander Gen. Henry Little. The dead were buried in a trench located at the north end of Shady Grove Cemetery.

A monument was erected by the United Daughters of the Confederacy in 1904. It was relocated from the cemetery to the Old Tishomingo County Courthouse yard during the 30's and there remains.

The 144 Federal soldiers killed in battle were buried in the vicinity of Battleground Heights and later transferred to the National Cemetery in Corinth.

As we view the ravishment of Civil Wars around the world today, let us remember Lincoln's words: "A house divided cannot stand," and pray that our country never again experiences such disaster.

May ALL the Civil War dead REST IN PEACE.

FREE Anemia Check Friday

There will be a free anemia screening at the Pickwick Medical Center, TN, Hwy. 57 S., on Friday, September 14, from 8:30 a.m. - 11:30 a.m. The center will perform a hemoglobin test on the blood which will only involve a "finger prick" and a few minutes and the results will be available immediately.

Iron deficiency anemia occurs when there is not enough iron in the body and it is common in infants, adolescents and elderly. Common symptoms are tiredness or lack of energy, paleness, and in some cases, dizziness.

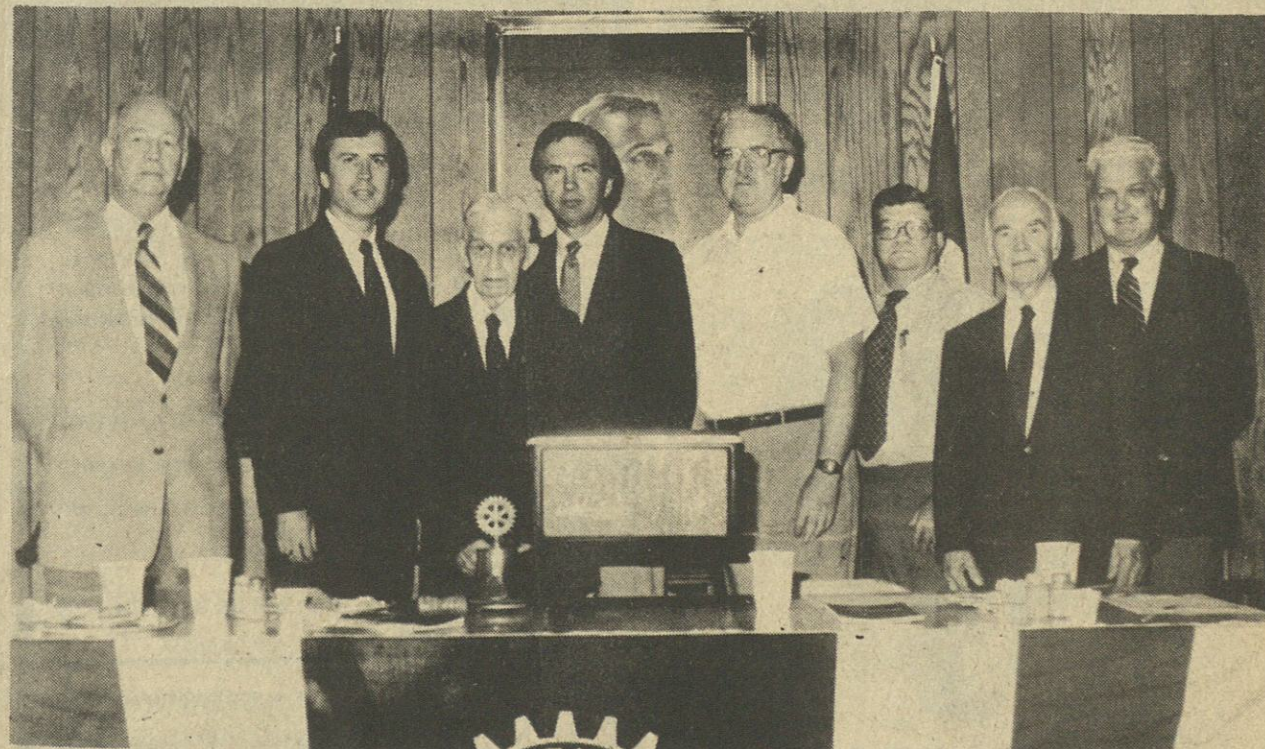
Puppet Show At Old Pleasant Hill

Soybean Harvest Near

Soybean harvest is just around the corner in Tishomingo County. Farmers should continue to use the cultural practices needed to increase chances of high yields.

Farmers are encouraged to check soybean fields for late season insects, especially stink bugs and podworms. Late plantings are more vulnerable to insects because of late maturity.

Farmers with irrigation should make sure soils have plenty of water to complete pod filling. This may mean irrigating into late September

for late varieties if the weather is dry.

If the soil has plenty of moisture by the time the green seed are touching each other inside the pods, this should be enough moisture to complete the crop.

On some farms, yields can be increased by several bushels per acre by properly adjusting and operating combines. When harvest starts, check losses in front and behind the combines to see where and how much loss is occurring.

Some fields of early varieties that have green weeds may need to be treated with a chemical to dry out the

weeds after the soybeans are mature. Remember that these materials are not recommended to speed up soybean maturity, but to kill and dry weeds.

Make application of the chemical after soybeans are mature and have dropped about half of their leaves naturally. If treatment is made too early, yields will be reduced.

Large weeds may take up to two weeks to dry enough for combining. Small weeds should dry in a few days after treatment.

Our tour will include stops which will emphasize and demonstrate no-till soybeans, sod seeding permanent pastures, and a soil fertility demonstration. One of the highlights of the tour will feature a session on the county no-till drill.

Specialists from the Soil Conservation Service and the Cooperative Extension Service will be on hand to assist with the tour and answer questions that arise. A chemical company representative will present a short presentation of interest to no-till producers.

How To Remove Musty Odors

Musty odors indicating mold growth may create a problem for Mississippi residents, especially if there has been damp weather conducive to mildew growth.

Odors seem most noticeable in basements, shower stalls, upholstered furniture, rugs and carpets, mattresses, books and under bed or any damp, warm, poorly-ventilated and poorly-lighted place.

Take special precaution to get rid of musty odors as soon as possible, not only to rid the house of offensive odors but also to prevent

damaging mold growth.

Sometimes musty odors will disappear if the area is well heated and dried, or if it can be cleaned, aired and fumigated. If it will not harm the article, dry it in the sun.

On concrete floors, tiled walls and floors, and bathrooms, get rid of mustiness by scrubbing with a diluted solution of chlorine bleach containing sodium hypochlorite.

Use 1/2 to 1 cup of liquid household bleach to a gallon of water. Rinse with clean water and wipe as dry as possible. Keep doors open until walls and floors are thoroughly dried.

Be sure to wear waterproof gloves to protect your skin when cleaning.

Wash quickly and carefully on plastic and asphalt tile to avoid spotting the surface.

In crawl spaces under the house, use chlorinated lime to remove musty odors.

Sprinkle a light coating of this chemical over the ground. Let it stay until all mustiness disappears. In using this chemical, wear gloves to protect your hands. Avoid getting the powder in your eyes and avoid breathing the fumes.

Quaternary ammonium compounds may also be used on floors and walls. Use as directed on the container's label.

Excellent commercial products are available for removing and inhibiting mildew growth. There are also products on the market for cleaning and sanitizing areas.

Household products that are effective in absorbing odors are baking soda, talcum powder, silica gel and charcoal. Using vinegar rinse

water in cleaning or washing articles is also effective in controlling odor.

Other products to use are disinfectants, bleaching powders, washing soda, rubbing or denatured alcohol and moth crystals.

Boiling vinegar and water, then permitting the fumes to spread throughout the house will help camouflage the odors. Household ammonia can also be used, however, caution should be used to keep it out of reach of children or pets.

For musty furniture, first vacuum the furniture, especially the drawers. Fresh air and ventilation may remove some of the musty smell.

If the odor was caused by smoke, it may be necessary to seal in the odor. Once it is in the grain of wood it is difficult to remove.

Sometimes it helps to sand the drawers lightly, then vacuum and apply a thin coat of varnish or other finish. There are commercial products such as oil and wintergreen that some people use to help camouflage the odor.

One of the best remedies for getting rid of odor caused by dampness is to use hot, sudsy water followed by a rinse solution of household

bleach and water. Repeat scrubbing and rinsing necessary, until the odor is gone.

If possible, place outside and let the sunshine and fresh air remove the odors.

Cranberry Apple

1 pkg. lemon flavored
1 cup boiling water
3/4 cup cold water
1 can whole berry
sauce
2 oranges
1/4 cup mayonnaise
1 container (4 oz.)
whipped topping
1 diced, unpeeled apple

Dissolve gelatin in water. Add cold measure 3/4 cup aside. Chill remaining sauce; pour into 5 mold. Chill until set firm. Meanwhile, grate teaspoon orange peel and dice orange rind to measured gelatin until slightly thick. Blend in mayonnaise, whipped topping, oranges and apple; spread to mold. Chill until least four hours or overnight. Unmold. Makes about 10 servings.

SUNGLASSES AND NIGHT VISION

Exposure to ordinary sunlight has been found to produce both temporary and cumulative effects on night vision. Daily exposure to bright sun without the protection of sunglasses has been proven to cause some deterioration in visual acuity at night.

Persons engaged in tasks where night vision is critical should wear sunglasses when in bright sunlight. Boat and plane pilots, truck and auto drivers, can all benefit from protecting the night vision mechanism from too much sun during the day. When very dark lenses are used, the improvement may be as much as tenfold.

But care should be

taken when choosing sunglasses. An array of numbers of sunglasses are on the market and it is always easy to tell the difference. While and standard will probably not your eyesight - you rely on them to absorb harmful rays - are risks. They distort vision, promote eyestrain, thereby diminishing visual acuity and disorienting your safety.

ANEMIA IN DOGS

There are times when your dog may be ill but not show any obvious or spectacular symptoms.

Anemia is such a condition. It is characterized by loss of energy. Usually the dog becomes listless, sleeps a lot and loses appetite. After a time, he may lose a good deal of weight and become emaciated and dehydrated. It's up to the dog owner to notice such symptoms early and take the dog to the veterinarian before things become serious.

Anemia is actually nothing more than a reduction of hemoglobin in the blood. There are a variety of causes, including hookworms, whipworms, certain types of poisons, a prolonged illness, or an accident. Regardless of the cause, your veterinarian can make a positive diagnosis and

take immediate steps.

The treatment may be nothing more than change of diet, to include quantities of red and red meats, with supplements vitamins, iron and minerals. But be on the look-out. It can become serious enough to warrant blood transfusions.

Junk Candy & Colas For Nutritious Foods

School bells are ringing for the youth in Tishomingo County as a hint of fall fills the air. This time of year young people are thinking of football games, harvest dances, making new friends, and of course, food. Teenagers often have an uncontrollable appetite, but they also are very weight conscious.

All of these important activities involve eating, so how can a teenager handle these occasions without gaining extra weight? Moderation is one way. Enjoy light snacks and do not indulge in calorie laden treats. Plan snack foods into daily meals and do not forget the 4-4-2 plan - four servings of fruits and vegetables, four servings of breads and cereals, four servings of milk and two servings of meat or meat substitutes.

Do not forget to eat a good breakfast, especially on those busy days when you need extra energy. If breakfast time is rushed, make a sandwich and get a glass of milk or juice and a piece of fruit and eat it on the way to

school.

Parties can be a real problem for a weight conscious teen. Set the trend in your community and host a party where good nutritious treats are served instead of the usual sweets and colas. The 4-H food and nutrition project offers many suggestions of nutritious, but good party foods. Try this menu for that after-the-game get-together at your house:

Taco Salad
Tortilla Chips
Can Orange Cooler

This is an easy menu for teen parties since it can be prepared ahead of time by the teenager. Just chop or shred lots of lettuce, tomato, cheese and onion and store in containers in the refrigerator until party time. Mix up equal parts of cranberry juice and orange juice and place in the freezer until slushy, about four to six hours. Just before the guests arrive, heat up the chili (use canned chili with beans or make your own and refrigerate). Put out the salad ingredients, chips, chili and punch and let everyone build their own salad.

This is a nutritious but filling menu idea that can be low in calories depending on portion sizes. Go light on the cheese and chili and pile up the lettuce and tomato. Enjoy the food and fellowship.

NEMJC English Teachers Publish Travel Guide

Down in the Mississippi Delta, a traveler can sway to the gutsy lyrics of a blues ballad while munching on dill pickles.

Up in the last foothills of Appalachia, he can hear the wailing whine of a hand-made dulcimer and sink his teeth into some steaming fish freshly caught from the Tennessee River.

But first, he must know exactly where to go.

This summer two NEMJC English instructors published 'Traipsin', a travel guide to North Mississippi filled with information and a great deal more. Mrs. Nancy (Brock) Zacharias and Ms. Nancy Brewer said they wrote the book to give the area a positive image. By flipping through its 88 pages, both tourists and local inhabitants can discover the diversity, history and culture this region offers.

A weary traveler in an unfamiliar setting can financially benefit from the book's many helpful facts. He can learn where the beds are, the food is cheap and the night times fun. 'Traipsin' provides information on an establishment's menu, business hours, credit card policy, address and phone number.

Census Survey Here Seeks Data On Employment Status

The U.S. Bureau of the Census will conduct its regular survey on employment and unemployment in this area during the week of September 17-22, according to John E. Reeder, Jr., Director of the Bureau's Regional Office in Dallas.

In September, additional survey questions will provide information on incidence of and immunization against certain, primarily childhood, diseases.

The survey is conducted for the U.S. Department of Labor in a scientifically designed sample of approximately 71,000 households throughout the United States. Employment and unemployment statistics based on results of this survey are used to provide a continuing measure of the economic health of the nation.

For example, in July 1984 the survey indicated that of the 113.9 million men and women in the civilian labor force, 105.4 million were employed. The nation's unemployment rate rose to 7.5 percent.

Information supplied by individuals participating in the survey is kept strictly confidential by law and the

results are used only to compile statistical totals.

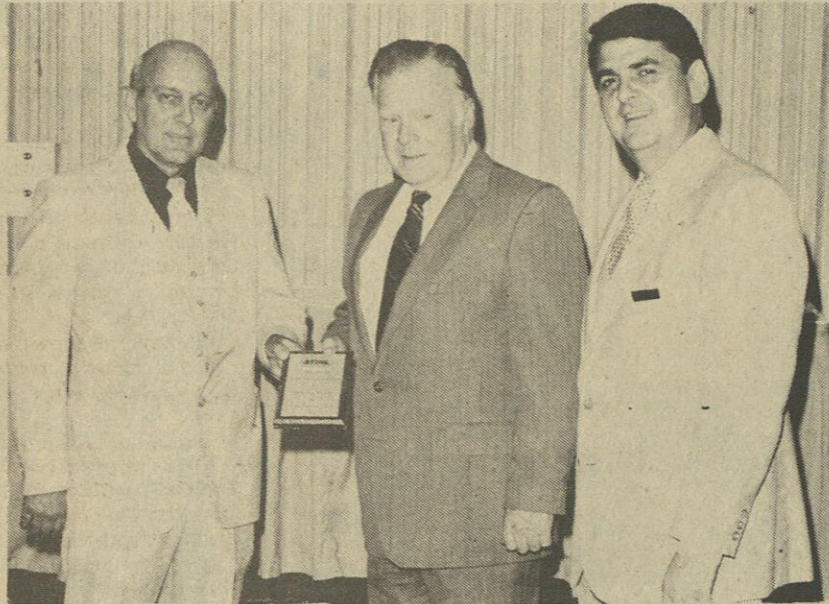

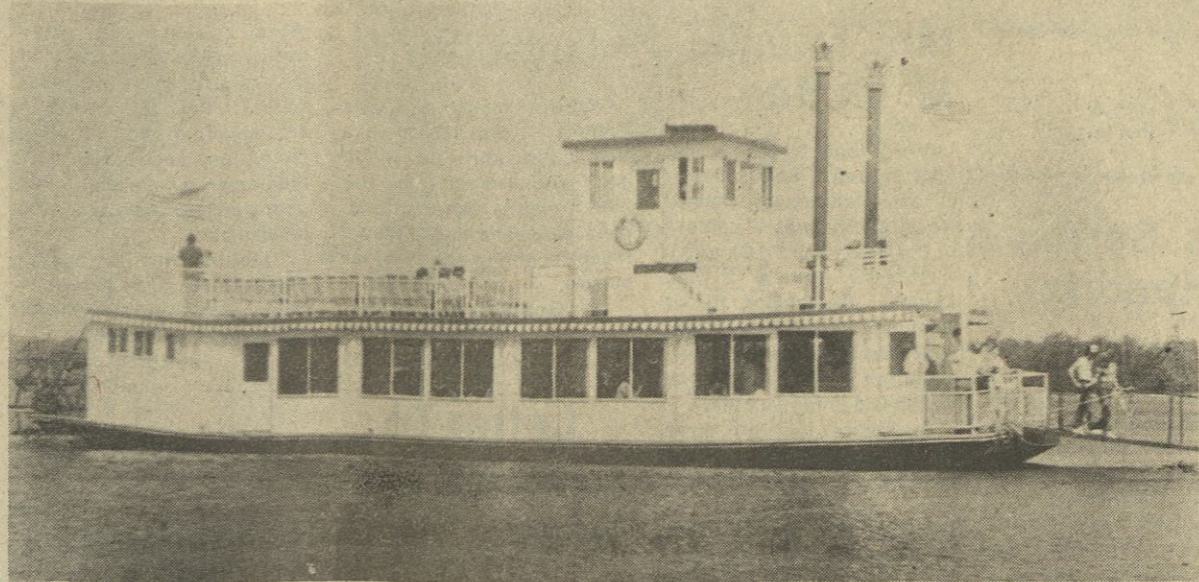

Dear Editor,

Recently, an article was brought to my attention concerning Walter Mondale. Until that time, I thought him to be a God-fearing moral candidate for president.

(HUMANIST MANIFESTO updated in 1973 from original HUMANIST MANIFESTO I published in 1933.)

During the Carter-Mondale pre-election period Madalyn Murray O'Hair said she would have been happier had the choice (for president) been vice-president Mondale whom she described as "an undercover atheist." (National Catholic News Service, "CATHOLIC BULLETIN FOR ST. PAUL MINNEAPOLIS DIOCESE, 1976.) Walter Mondale's stand on
