### **Memorial** To **Civil War Dead**

The Battle of luka occured 122 years ago on September 19. During the bloody confrontation, the Confederate casualties numbered 263 including Commander Gen. Henry Little. The dead were buried in a trench located at the north end of Shady Grove Cemetery.

A monument was erected by the United Daughters of the Confederacy in 1904. It was relocated from the cemetery to the Old Tishomingo County Courthouse yard during the 30's and there remains.

The 144 Federal soldiers killed in battle were buried in the vicinity of Battleground Heights and later transferred to the National Cemetery in Corinth.

As we view the ravishment of Civil Wars around the world today, let us remember Lincoln's words: "A house divided cannot stand." and pray that our country never again experiences such disaster.

May ALL the Civil War dead Federal and State Juvenile REST IN PEACE.



#### Sovbean Harvest Near

Soybean harvest is just around the corner in Tishomingo County. Farmers should continue to use the cultural practices needed to increase chances of high yields.

Farmers are encouraged to check soybean fields for late vulnerable to insects because of late maturity.

Farmers with irrigation should make sure soils have plenty of water to complete pod filling. This may mean rrigating into late September

for late varieties if the weather is dry.

If the soil has plenty of moisture by the time the green seed are touching each other inside the pods, this should be enough moisture to complete the crop.

On some farms, yields can be increased by several bushels per acre by properly season insects, especially, adjusting and operating stink bugs and podworms, combines. Some fields of early varieties that have green weeds may need to be treated with a chemical to dry out the

weeds after the soybeans are mature. Remember that these materials are not recommended to speed up soybean maturity, but to kill and dry weeds.

Make application of the chemical after soybeans are mature and have dropped about half of their leaves naturally. If treatment is made too early, yields will be reduced.

Large weeds may take up to two weeks to dry enough for combining. Small weeds should dry in a few days after treatment.

#### Farm Tour

### Chatting With Your Home Economist

How To Remove Musty Odors

Musty odors indicating mold growth may create a problem for Mississippi residents, especially if there has been damp weather conducive to mildew growth.

Odors seem most noticeable in basements, shower stalls, upholstered furniture, rugs and carpets, mattresses, books and under bed or any damp, warm,

damaging mold growth.

Sometimes musty odors will disappear if the area is well heated and dried, or if it can be cleaned, aired and fumigated. If it will not harm the article, dry it in the sun.

On concrete floors, tiled walls and floors, and bathrooms, get rid of mustiness by scrubbing with a diluted solution of chlorine bleach containing sodium hypochlorite.

Use 1/2 to 1 cup of liquid household bleach to a gallon of water. Rinse with clean water and wipe as dry as possible. Keep doors open until walls and floors are thoroughly dried.

Be sure to wear waterproof gloves to protect your skin when cleaning.

Wash quickly and carefully on plastic and asphalt tile to avoid spotting the surface.

In crawl spaces under the house, use chlorinated lime to remove musty odors. Sprinkle a light coating of this chemical over the ground. Let it stay until all mustiness disappears. In using this chemical, wear gloves to protect your hands. Avoid getting the powder in your eyes and avoid breathing the fumes.

Quarternary ammonium compounds may also be used on floors and walls. Use as directed on the container's label

Other products to use are disinfectants, bleaching powders, washing soda, rubbing or denatured alcohol and moth crystals.


Boiling vinegar and water, then permitting the fumes to spread throughout the house will help camouflage the odors. Household ammonia can also be used, however, caution should be used to keep it out of reach of children or pets.

For musty furniture, first vacuum the furniture, especially the drawers. Fresh air and ventilation may remove some of the musty smell.

If the odor was caused by smoke, it may be necessary to seal in the odor. Once it is in the grain of wood it is difficult to remove.

Sometimes it helps to sand the drawers lightly, then vacuum and apply a thin coat of varnish or other finish. There are commercial products such as oil and wintergreen that some people use to help camouflage the odor.

#### **Junk Candy & Colas For Nutritious Foods**

School bells are ringing for the youth in Tishomingo County as a hint of fall fills the air. Teenagers often have an uncontrollable appetite, but they also are very weight conscious.

All of these important activities involve eating, so how can a teenager handle these occasions without gaining extra weight? Moderation is one way. Enjoy light snacks and do not indulge in calorie laden treats. Plan snack foods into daily meals and do not forget the 4-4-4-2 plan . four servings of fruits and vegetables, four servings of breads and cereals, four servings of milk and two servings of meat or meat substitutes.

Do not forget to eat a good breakfast, especially on those busy days when you need extra energy. If breakfast time is rushed, make a sandwich and get a glass of milk or juice and a piece of fruit and eat it on the way to



The U.S. Bureau of the Census will conduct its regular survey on employment and unemployment in this area during the week of September 17-22, according to John E. Reeder, Jr., Director of the Bureau's Regional Office in Dallas.

In September, additional survey questions will provide information on incidence of and immunization against certain, primarily childhood, diseases.

The survey is conducted for the U.S. Department of Labor in a scientifically designed sample of approximately 71,000 households throughout the United States. Employment and unemployment statistics based on results of this survev are used to provide a continuing measure of the economic health of the nation.

#### **AN ORDINANCE**

There came on to be considered by the Board of Mayor and Aldermen of the Town of Tishomingo, Mississippi, the following ordinance, to-wit:

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE VACCINATION AGAINST RABIES FOR ALL DOGS WITHIN THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE TOWN OF TISHOMINGO, MISSISSIPPI; PROHIBITING DOGS FROM RUNNING AT LARGE WITHIN THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE TOWN OF TISHOMINGO. MISSISSIPPI, DURING CERTAIN PERIODS AND UNDER CER-TAIN CONDITIONS; AND AUTHORIZING THE IMPOUNDING AND DESTRUCTION OF DOGS UNDER CERTAIN CONDITIONS; AND PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION HEREOF, ALL AS PARTICULARLY HEREINAFTER SET FORTH.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Town of Tishomingo, Mississippi:

SECTION 1. That for the purpose of this ordinance, the following definitions shall apply when used herein.

(a) The word "dog" shall include both the male and female sex of the canine species.

(b) The word "owner" shall include any person, firm or corporation owning, possessing, harboring or keeping a dog.

(c) The words "at large" shall mean off the enclosed premises of the owner and not under the control of the owner or other persons by leash, cord, chain or other physical means to restraint sufficient in strength to control such dog.

(d) The word "Town" shall mean the Town of Tishomingo, Mississippi, and any and every place within the corporate limits of the Town of Tishomingo, Mississippi.

SECTION 2. Every person in the Town of Tishomingo, Mississippi, who owns or has in his or her possession or who keeps or harbors any dog within the corporate limits of said Town, shall have and keep such dog inoculated (vaccinated) against rabies, as provided by the laws of the State of Mississippi, and as provided by the rules and regulations prescribed and promulgated by the Mississippi State Board of Health, and it shall be unlawful for any person to own, possess, keep or harbor any dog within the corporate limits of said Town unless such dog has been so inoculated against rabies.





### **OVERINDULGENCE**

North Americans, on the average, consume about an ounce of *pure* alcohol every day. Because many adults drink *no* alcoholic beverages, this means that other adults must have an alcohol consumption that is much higher than one ounce. It is not surprising, therefore, that hangover is a common problem. Drug companies have developed a few products for relief of the pain and discomfort associated with alcohol overindulgence.

A pain reliever such as acetaminophen or aspirin is almost always included. Because aspirin may be upsetting to an already upset stomach, acetaminophen may be preferred.

Any of several antacids may be present to help neutralize excess stomach acids. Products that "fizz" tend to contain sodium bicarbonate and citric acid. The sodium in such preparations is large in quantity - these preparations should be avoided by individuals on low sodium diets.

Caffeine may also be present in a hangover-relief product. This central nervous system stimulant is, of course, also present in strong, black coffee that many persons rely on to get them going after a night of overindulgence.


