County Receives Federal Funds

Tishomingo County has received \$19,028 in federal funds for "payments in lieu of taxes" for fiscal year 1984, Congressman Jamie Whitten has announced.

The Department of Interior funds, which are distributed to local governments to help offset the loss of income from non-taxable federal property such as National Forests, are payment for 26,478 acres of federal land located within the County.

Congressman Whitten, Chairman of the House Appropriations Committee which provides funds for the program, said that the payment helps the local governments make up for the loss of revenues that tax-exempt federal property causes.

Christmas Parade Set For Dec. 1st

Iuka's 1984 Christmas Parade has been scheduled for 2 p.m. on Saturday, December 1st.

The theme for this year's parade is "Christmas Is A Time For Sharing", according to M.E. "Whitey" Weimer, President of the Iuka Lion's Club, one of the three sponsors of the event. Mr. Weimer said the Chamber of Commerce and the Iuka Rotary Club will also assist with this year's production.

Anyone wishing to enter a float or have a part in the parade should start preparations and notify "Whitey" Weimer at 423-6411.

Dr. Jerry Stone, Superintendent of the Iuka School District, announces that the school is participating in a community interest survey to make a more accurate determination of those parents interested in enrolling their five-year-old child in kindergarten during the 1985-86 school year.

Parents of children who will be five years old prior to September 1, 1985, are requested to complete a survey form if they are interested in enrolling their child in kindergarten next year. Forms may be obtained in the elementary school office and in the superintendent's office. The deadline for completing this survey is November 9th.

GRANT TO ESTABLISH TRUCKING INDUSTRY

Shelton Trucking Company, which has headquarters in Alabama, could soon establish a truck terminal facility in Tishomingo County if funds, which have been applied for by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of Iuka,

are approved.

In regular session, October 2nd, 1984, Iuka Mayor, John H. Biggs, and the Board of Aldermen expressed support for a Small City Community Development Block Grant of up to \$160,000.00 to be used

in the economic development of Iuka and Tishomingo County.

The resolution, which was adopted by the Board by unanimous vote, will be sent to the Governor's Office of Federal State Programs. The

State of Mississippi has been allocated approximately \$30 million that will be made available to cities and counties on a competitive basis to undertake eligible activities. These funds must be used for one of the following purposes: (1) To benefit low and moderate income persons; or (2) To aid in the prevention or elimination of slums or blight; or (3) To meet other community development needs having a particular urgency because existing conditions pose a serious and immediate threat to the health or welfare of the community where other financial resources are not available to meet such needs.

The activities for which these funds may be used are in the area of housing, public facilities and services, and economic development.

If approved, the C.D.B.G. will be used for the establishing of the truck facility in Tishomingo County.

Shelton Trucking Company of Alabama is presently using the facilities at the Yellow Creek Port. It is believed the trucking company will employ approximately 20 drivers with five terminal employees.

COUNTY UNEMPLOYMENT RATE RISES TO 18.5 %

Area labor statistics released today by the Mississippi State Employment Service revealed that the rate of unemployment in Tishomingo County rose to 18.5 percent at mid-August. This compared with 17.1 percent in July and 20.6 percent in August, one

year ago. According to Charles Smith, Manager of the Employment Service, the civilian labor force was estimated to be 9,980, 100 below the previous estimate and 340 below the estimate for August of last year. The number of Tishomingo County residents employed was

estimated to be 9,130, compared to 8,360 in July and 8,190 in August, 1983.

Manufacturing employment in the county dropped to 2,490 at mid-month, 90 below the July estimate but 90 above the estimate for August, one year ago. Non-manufacturing employment at 2,940 dropped by 100 over the month and by 230 from one year ago.

Smith also noted that the civilian labor force for the Corinth Area, which consists of Alcorn, Benton, Marshall, Prentiss, Tippah, and Tishomingo counties, rose to 62,540 during the month of August, 1984. This shows a rise of 150 from the month of July and a rise of 1,510 from August of last year. The number of persons employed in the area stood at 53,760, compared to 53,650 in July and 51,920 in August, 1983.

The number of unemployed persons rose slightly to 8,780. This shows a rise of 40 from last month but a decrease of 330 from August of last year. The rate of unemployment remained at 14.0 percent over the month but dropped nine-tenths of a percent from August, one year ago.

A total of 37,870 persons were employed in nonagricultural jobs in the Corinth Area at mid-August. This is 170 below the July figure but 340 above the estimate for August, 1983. The number of persons employed in manufacturing jobs rose to 17,590, compared to 17,350 in July and 17,430 in August, 1983. The number of nonmanufacturing jobs dropped to 20,280, 410 below the previous estimate but 180 above the estimate for one year ago.

Special Hours For Driver License Station

The Mississippi Highway Patrol has announced special hours for operation of its local driver license station.

Mississippi residents who wish to renew a license or to obtain a new one may do so between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 5:30 p.m. on Tuesday at the Iuka City Hall.

Driver license testing stations are established around the state based on the volume of transactions in each geographical area.

Hours of operation for each station usually allow citizens to take care of their driver licensing needs before or after normal working hours in each community.

No driving test will be given when the streets are wet or slippery, or after dark.

City Sales Tax Collections

City Sales Tax Collections reports from area merchants in August, 1984, totaled \$52,246.88. The latest figure from the Mississippi Tax Commission revealed an \$11,330.20 decrease as compared to the July, 1984 total of \$63,577.08.

Separate county municipal returns include: Belmont, \$10,740.40; Burnsville, \$5,238.66; Golden, \$674.01; Iuka, \$32,406.99; Paden, \$10.62; and Tishomingo, \$3,176.20.

The City Sales Tax Collections contained in this report are based on taxes collected by merchants during July and reported to the Tax Commission in August. Payment was made to the cities on or before September 15, 1984.

Iuka Couple Charged In Prentiss County Drug Bust

An Iuka couple were among thirty-six people who were charged in Booneville Wednesday, October 10, for illegal drug trafficking.

Among the arrests made were listed Danny Stevenson, 32, sale of marijuana, two counts; and Sherry Stevenson, 24, sale of marijuana. Both were shown as having an Iuka address.

Although many of the arrests were for the sale of marijuana, the investigation was centered on ridding Prentiss County of its unusually high amount of hydromorphone or Dilaudid. The tablets of synthetic morphine sell for as high as \$50 each and are highly addictive.

Law officials from Prentiss County, along with officers from the Mississippi Bureau of Narcotics and the Mississippi Highway Patrol began the operation early Wednesday morning.

Four of the 36 arrested were juveniles.

The Narcotics Bureau North Mississippi Commander, Charlie Spillers, said Wednesday's arrests put a substantial dent in the illicit business, since law enforcement officials believe the main suppliers who had been receiving shipments from out of the state were arrested.

Frost Poses Threat To Cattle

Tishomingo County farmers should be aware of the effects cool weather will have on forage crops for cattle.

Frost on grain sorghum regrowth and on other crops can kill cattle feeding on the crops. As the plant begins regrowth, it produces prussic acid, a cyanide type gas potentially deadly to cattle.

After a frost there are high levels of these very volatile gases in the plants. Animals feeding on the plants get a large dose of these gases quickly.

The cyanide compounds enter the animal's bloodstream and the animal suffocates from lack of oxygen

in the tissues.

It is difficult to save an infected animal since the compound acts rapidly and often the first sign of the problem is the death of the animal.

The best way to prevent prussic acid poisoning in cattle is to take the animals off grazing before a frost occurs.

Cattle should be kept off frost-damaged plants for at least three days after a frost to give the gases time to dissipate from the plants.

Grain sorghum, sorghum-sudan hybrid grasses, johnsongrass and other sudan grasses are most likely to develop problems with prussic acid poisoning. It is often more severe in crops that have been drought-stressed or heavily fertilized

with nitrogen.

While grazing frost-bitten crops may be dangerous, the regrowth may be harvested and fed to cattle as hay with no danger of prussic acid poisoning.

Fall Bulbs For Spring Flowers

Homeowners in the county can start beautifying their home for next spring right now. By planting tulip, daffodil, Dutch iris and hyacinth bulbs throughout November, homeowners can expect colorful spring flowers with the first signs of warmer weather.

It is important to select and purchase the bulbs soon. Choose a flower bulb that is free of bruises, blemishes and disease.

Choose the largest bulbs available since the flower bud is already formed in the bulb. Large bulbs produce larger flowers.

One common planning mistake is poor site selection. Flowering bulbs perform best in full sun and well-drained soil. Don't plant bulbs in a wet area that is poorly drained. Bulbs planted in the shade will not bloom properly.

There are many varieties, sizes and colors of spring flowers. To find out which variety would best suit your homesite, contact the Extension office.

Information on planting times and proper care of the bulbs also is available.

Tips To Make Halloween Less Scary For Parents

Halloween can be scarier for parents than for children. It's not the fear of masked devils or hobgoblins suddenly dropping out of the sky that sends chills down the spine; it's the safety of the children when exposed to the human factor that frightens.

Unless proper precautions are taken the "trick or treat" evening could turn into a nightmare. Follow these safety tips to protect children and ensure a safe Halloween.

Tell your children to bring home any candy and other edibles collected from strangers. If it is of questionable appearance or odor, throw it away. Pre-teenage children

should be accompanied by an adult.

Warn youngsters out on their own to avoid deserted and poorly lighted streets. Tell them they must not accompany strangers no matter what "treat" is promised.

Make sure costumes are flame-proof. Brightly colored ones are more easily seen by drivers at night, and visibility is enhanced if the youngsters use flashlights.

eyes of many people on what quality work our 4-H'ers can do.

Handcrafted items are becoming increasingly popular and with the special skills youth are learning in 4-H, they are able to make many creative crafts -- from hand-knit sweaters, leather belts, and wood carvings, to purses, hats, pottery, and furniture.

If 4-H'ers can make a large number of items and think people are interested in the crafts, they should market their hobby. Arts and crafts shows occur frequently. These draw huge crowds and offer an opportunity to meet people with similar interests.

A booth must be reserved far in advance. Contact the manager of the show to obtain a booth. If you are unable to find out who sponsors the show, check with the Chamber of Commerce. A booth will usually cost from \$7 to \$25 for the one- or two-day show.

The biggest drawback to the crafts show is the large amount of items required. Unless you can share a booth with a friend, you will need 30 to 40 pieces of work. There will need to be several items in different colors and styles. Everyone likes to feel the item they bought has something unique about it.

No matter what you make, have pride in it: If the articles are made of yarn get them blocked first for a more professional look. If your wares are sewn, trim all loose threads. Secure tables and racks to display your work.

If you have the time and determination it takes to produce this large volume of work, shows can be a good outlet for selling.

Do not overlook other

possibilities. Town bulletin boards are good places to leave a picture of the item, giving all necessary details.

Word of mouth is also a good way to sell. If you knit or crochet, it would be possible to make a hat or shawl in school colors. By wearing this to sporting events and to school, your work draws attention and eventually orders

for you to fill.

No matter how 4-H'ers choose to sell their crafts, they can make money through hobbies. Taking is a little know-how

AMBLYOPIA--"LAZY EYE"

The word "amblyopia" comes from the Greek, meaning dull vision. In common usage, it refers to a particular condition in which the two eyes are feeding different information to the brain. Since the sense of vision is so vital and since the brain is so dependent on it, the two different inputs will not be tolerated. The brain will gladly sacrifice the benefits of stereoscopic vision to avoid the confusion of double vision. It simply learns to ignore the input from one eye--hence the name "lazy eye".

Over a period of time, the pattern becomes so ingrained that a normal binocular pattern may be lost. Then, even if the

original cause of the problem was removed, the brain could not reestablish binocular vision by itself. It would need help.

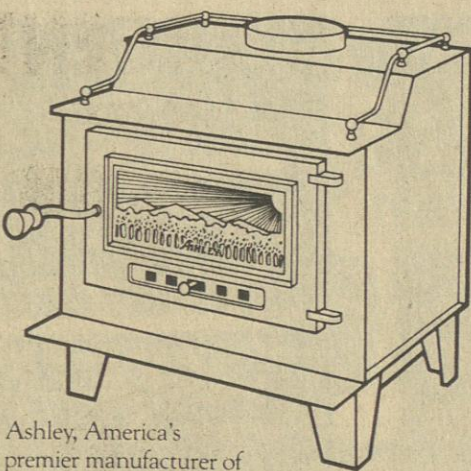

The need for calcium in the diet is often emphasized, but less is said about magnesium, which combines with calcium and phosphorus in the bones. Phosphorus deficiency is rare in typical U.S. diets, but magnesium deficiency may be fairly widespread.

The need for magnesium is about half the need for calcium. If supplements of one are taken, the other should be taken also, in proper proportion, since excess of one mineral can cause a relative deficiency of the other.

Magnesium is most abundant in vegetables, particularly leafy ones. Roots and beans, nuts and grains come next, but refining removes most of the magnesium from many breads and other grain products. High intakes of calcium, protein, or alcohol cause the body to lose magnesium and increase requirements for the mineral, as do diuretic drugs. Too much sugar in the diet can interfere with magnesium absorption.

Bone health, muscle function, and the circulatory system are at risk in magnesium deficiency. Recent work relates the condition to high blood pressure.
