BLUE BELL PLANTS PLAN SHUT-DOWN

Five manufacturing and sewing facilities of the Blue Bell Wrangler Boy's Wear Division are scheduled to close down operations and begin temporary lay-offs around November 1st, according to a written statement prepared by Gary Voss, Vice-President of Manufacturing for the division.

The Blue Bell plants in Tishomingo, Fulton and Booneville, as well as the

sewing operations in Belmont and Tupelo, will close for a 90 day period, causing some 700 people to become unemployed. The lay-off became necessary because of a "decline in production

demand and a need to manage inventories more effectively," Voss stated.

According to Kim Lassiter, Personnel Manager for the division, not everyone in the plants will be affected by the lay-offs. "Others may work longer because many of the facilities are making garments that do need to be finished. For instance, the cutting room in the Belmont plant will still employ part of their workers due to the fact that they make jackets and shirts as well as jeans."

The Belmont and Tishomingo facilities, which were established in the early and mid 1950's, employ some 390 local persons, some of whom will not be affected during the close down.

The Blue Bell Boy's Wear Division, which manufacture boy's jeans and casual slacks, also has Red Kap Divisions in Tupelo and Amory where they make work clothes. There is also a Men's Wear Division in Hackelburg, Ala.

Lassiter stated, "A possibility of future operations would be to attach these plants to other divisions and have them produce a different product other than what they are making now. But, this does not mean that this will take place - it's just a possibility."

The temporary shut down of the plants are tentatively scheduled to resume operations at the end of January in 1985, if all goes well.

SHOPLIFTING SPREE ENDS IN IUKA

Quick response by Tishomingo County Chief Deputy Mike Kemp to an all points bulletin, issued to area

law agencies from Alcorn County, resulted in the apprehension of an Alabama woman following a shoplift-

ing incident on Friday, October 19, at Gibson Discount Center in Corinth.

Deputy Kemp was traveling west on Hwy. 72 when the bulletin was given and remembered meeting the described eastbound vehicle. He returned to Iuka and spotted the alleged suspect making a call from a phone booth at the intersection of Hwys. 72 and 25.

Kemp said he and Deputy Ricky Cornelson took the woman, who was identified as Shirley Robinson, 25, of Birmingham, Ala., into custody after they found an approximate 38 bottles of expensive perfumes, several cartons of cigarettes and various miscellaneous items in the trunk of her car, along with a small amount of marijuana and some controlled substances.

Lawmen from Alcorn County came to the county jail to transport Ms. Robinson back to Corinth, and after searching the car again discovered nine credit cards hidden in the auto's carburetor breather. These too were believed to be stolen.

Ms. Robinson was transported to Alcorn County and was being held Tuesday without bond in the county jail there. It is likely she will be charged with possession of stolen merchandise and grand larceny. Alcorn authorities and State Investigator David Huggins continue investigation into the case. It is believed the accused and a companion may have been in the Corinth area for several days prior to the arrest.

Officer Kemp said Ms. Robinson still faces charges of possession of marijuana and controlled substances here in Tishomingo County.

Soybean Profit Outlook Bleak

Soybean producers in Tishomingo County will have a tough time realizing a profit on this fall's crop.

Soybeans are an important crop in Tishomingo County, with 14,000 plus acres available for harvest. But a typical soybean grower has to get \$6.50 to \$7 a bushel to make a profit.

Several factors have caused soybean prices to drop this fall and reduce profit for farmers. Soybean prices on the futures market have been below \$6 a bushel this fall.

The U.S. soybean crop is estimated at more than 2 billion bushels. This large

crop has caused soybean prices to tumble.

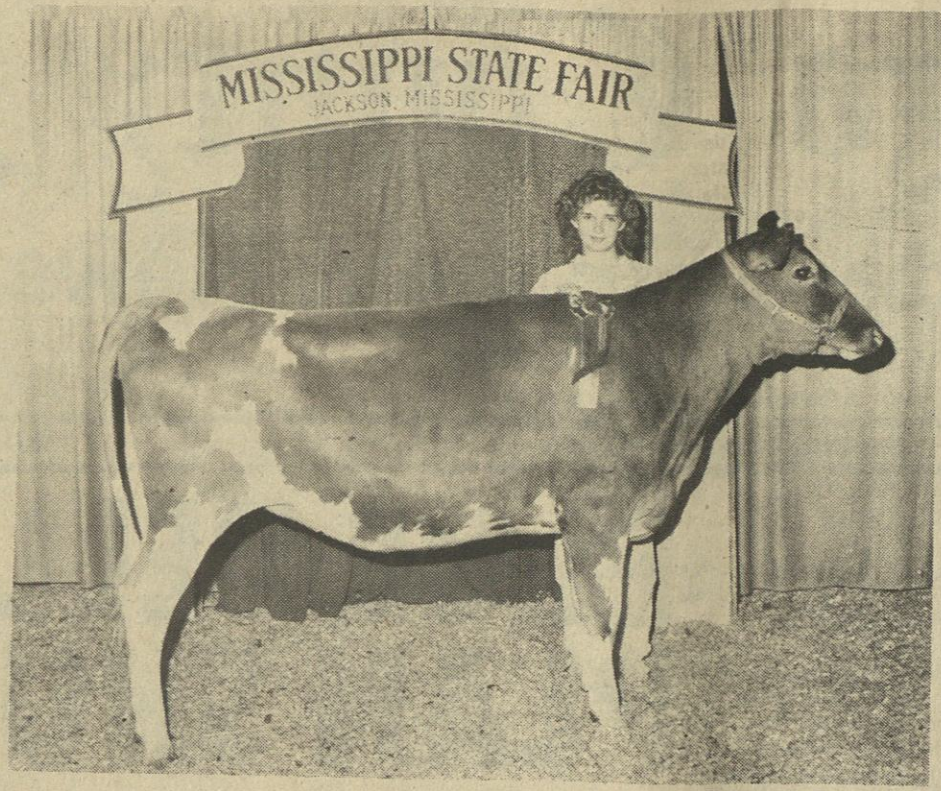
Soybean stocks for the marketing year that ended on September 1, have been estimated at 175 million bushels. This is sharply above expectations and has also led to lower soybean prices.

Lack of rainfall in September is expected to make yields fall short of earlier projections, which would be a double blow to farmers in Tishomingo County.

All of this adds up to prospects of a poor profit year for our soybean farmers.

Save Leaves For Mulch

Save leaves and pine straw for winter mulch. Much of the winter-kill problems last win-

ter could have been prevented by proper mulching.

Keep a four to six inch layer of mulch on all planted areas. This layer acts as a blanket to keep delicate roots from freezing in the winter or getting too hot in the summer.

Our office has more information on applying materials for winter mulch.

Integrated Pest Management

Cash gains for farmers, savings for consumers and a better environment for all may be the results of a new approach to pest management called integrated pest management, or IPM.

IPM is a system that revolves around scouts who examine crops and predict the number of plant pests in a farmer's field. Insect populations are always determined in scouting, but other pests, such as weeds, nematodes and diseases, can be included.

The program is tailored to each individual farmer. Consultants advise the farmer on how to use the least possible amount of pesticides required to control the pests in his crop. They also will suggest other management practices to minimize crop losses from pests.

IPM means dollar savings for the farmer in buying pesticides and lower costs for the labor, equipment and fuel to apply them. For consumers, IPM could lead to lower food costs as farmers' savings are passed along.

Implied Warranties

Before you make a major purchase, find out if it has a warranty. A warranty is the manufacturer's or seller's promise to stand behind the product. Warranties vary in the amount of coverage they provide and also in form. Basically there are two types of warranties, written and im-

plied. Although written warranties are not required by law, implied warranties are. Implied warranties are created by state law and all states have them. Almost every purchase you make is covered by an implied warranty.

The most common type of implied warranty is called a "warranty of merchantability". This means that the seller promises that the product will do what it is supposed to do. For example, a car will run and a toaster will toast.

Another type of implied warranty is the "warranty of fitness for a particular purpose". This applies when you buy a product on the seller's advice that it is suitable for a particular use. For example, a seller who suggests that you buy a certain sleeping bag for zero degree weather warrants that the sleeping bag will be suitable for that weather.

If your purchase does not come with a written warranty, it is still covered by implied warranties. If problems arise that are not covered by the written warranty, you should investigate the protection given by your implied warranty.

Refrigerator Bran Muffins

15 oz. box raisin bran
3 cups sugar
5 cups flour
5 teaspoons soda
2 teaspoons salt
1 teaspoon each - cloves, nutmeg, cinnamon

4 eggs, beaten
1 cup oil
1 quart buttermilk
2 teaspoons vanilla
1 cup chopped pecans (optional)

Mix bran, sugar, flour, soda, salt, spices in extra large bowl. Add eggs, oil, milk and vanilla. Mix well. Store in refrigerator in covered container. Grease muffin tins. Bake 15 minutes at 400 degrees. Will keep for weeks in refrigerator and be ready to bake and serve hot as desired.

4-H'ers And Community Pride

Besides providing learning experiences for individual members, 4-H clubs should also become involved in community service projects.

While youth in 4-H clubs learn skills from project work, they are also responsible for teaching the community more about 4-H. One of the most effective ways of making 4-H more visible is through the 4-H Community Involvement Program, Community Pride.

Chevron U.S.A. provides recognition for clubs that do outstanding work in each county, and funds for nine grants to assist clubs in carrying out needed community projects are also provided.

Some examples of projects that have been completed in our county are building a park, painting trash cans at a local park, planting shrubs in a park, and other projects that help improve our communities.

Help can also be secured for construction of buildings and ponds and cleaning land. Fund raising efforts can be supplemented with a Community Pride Grant.

Clubs may request \$50 to \$250 with all, part, or more being funded. The final report then must be completed by July 17, 1985.

Any clubs interested in participating in the Community Pride Program must have proposals in the County Extension Office before November 12.

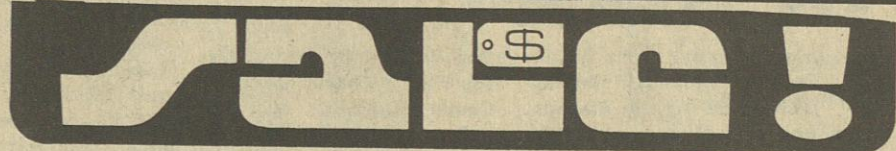

If you have sunglasses and think you are protected, you may be mistaken. There is no way for you to tell by either their color or darkness whether they actually filter out these

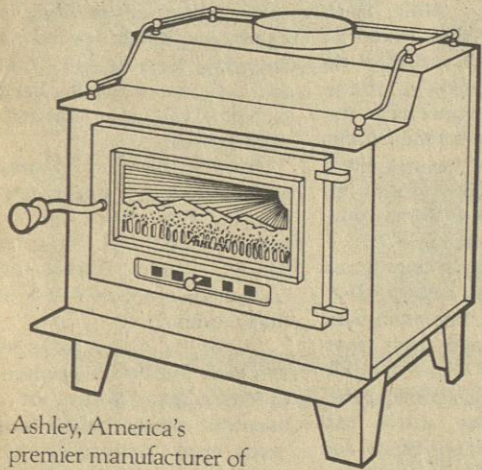

BETTER THAN BICARB

The occasional use of sodium bicarbonate for indigestion, for most individuals, provides rapid relief and no harm. It's chronic use (day after day) may, however, be harmful to some persons.

One problem is that sodium bicarbonate contains sodium. When the material combines with the acid of the stomach, sodium chloride (salt) is formed. Persons who are on low sodium diets or whose feet tend to swell will certainly want to avoid this source of unnecessary sodium.

Unlike many antacids, sodium bicarbonate can be easily absorbed into the bloodstream. If sodium bicarbonate is taken with milk or calcium-containing antacids, a condition known as milk-alkali syndrome may result. Symptoms and signs of this syndrome include nausea, vomiting, headache, mental confusion, and loss of appetite.

Many of the commercially prepared antacid products are free of sodium and available in liquid and chewable tablet forms. The taste of these products is usually thought to be superior to that of sodium bicarbonate in water. When an antacid must be taken frequently, the commercial antacids offer many advantages over sodium bicarbonate.

SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 548

Chapter No. 655

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO SECTION 109, MISSISSIPPI CONSTITUTION OF 1890, TO PROHIBIT A PUBLIC OFFICIAL OR PUBLIC EMPLOYEE FROM BEING INTERESTED IN ANY CONTRACT WITH THE GOVERNMENTAL ENTITY OF WHICH HE OR SHE IS A MEMBER AND TO PROHIBIT A PUBLIC OFFICIAL OR PUBLIC EMPLOYEE FROM MISUSING HIS OR HER OFFICIAL POSITION TO OBTAIN ANY PECUNIARY BENEFIT FOR HIMSELF OR HERSELF OR FOR ANY PERSON OR BUSINESS WITH WHICH HE OR SHE IS ASSOCIATED; TO PROVIDE THAT THE LEGISLATURE MAY FURTHER REGULATE CONDUCT BY PUBLIC OFFICIALS AND PUBLIC EMPLOYEES AND MAY CREATE A COMMISSION COMPOSED OF MEMBERS APPOINTED BY EACH DEPARTMENT OF GOVERNMENT TO ACCOMPLISH THE INTENT OF SECTION 109, MISSISSIPPI CONSTITUTION OF 1890, TO REPEAL SECTION 107, MISSISSIPPI CONSTITUTION OF 1890, WHICH PROVIDES THAT ALL STATIONERY, PRINTING, PAPER AND FUEL USED BY THE LEGISLATURE AND OTHER DEPARTMENTS OF THE GOVERNMENT SHALL BE FURNISHED UNDER CONTRACT AND THAT NO MEMBER OF THE LEGISLATURE OR OFFICER OF ANY DEPARTMENT SHALL BE IN ANY WAY INTERESTED IN ANY SUCH CONTRACT; AND TO REPEAL SECTION 210, MISSISSIPPI CONSTITUTION OF 1890, WHICH PROVIDES THAT NO PUBLIC OFFICER OF THE STATE OR ANY DISTRICT, COUNTY, CITY OR TOWN THEREOF, NOR ANY TEACHER OR TRUSTEE OF ANY PUBLIC SCHOOL, SHALL BE INTERESTED IN THE SALE OR PROFIT OF ANY BOOKS, APPARATUS OR FURNITURE TO BE USED IN ANY PUBLIC SCHOOL.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI, TWO-THIRDS OF THE SENATE AND HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES CONCURRING THEREIN, WHICH TWO-THIRDS CONSISTS OF NOT LESS THAN A MAJORITY OF THE MEMBERS ELECTED TO EACH HOUSE, That the following amendments to the Mississippi Constitution of 1890 be submitted to the qualified electors of the state for ratification or rejection at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday of November, 1984:

Amend Section 109, Mississippi Constitution of 1890, to read as follows:

Section 109. No public official or public employee shall be interested in any contract with the governmental entity of which he or she is a member. The term "entity" shall mean any governmental body vested with the authority to contract.

No public official or public employee shall misuse his or her official position to obtain any pecuniary benefit for himself or herself or for any person or business with which he or she is associated.

The Legislature may further regulate conduct by public officials and public employees and may create a commission composed of members appointed by each department of government to accomplish the intent of this section.

Repeal Section 107, Mississippi Constitution of 1890, which reads as follows:

Section 107. All stationery, printing, paper and fuel, used by the Legislature and its committees, shall be performed under contract, to be given to the lowest responsible bidder, below such maximum and under such regulations as may be prescribed by law. No member of the Legislature or officer of any department shall be in any way interested in such contract, and all such contracts shall be subject to the approval of the Governor and State Treasurer.

Repeal Section 210, Mississippi Constitution of 1890, which reads as follows:

Section 210. No public officer of this state, or any district, county, city, or town thereof, nor any teacher or trustee of any public school, shall be interested in the sale, proceeds, or profits of any books, apparatus, or furniture to be used in any public school in this state. Penalties shall be provided by law for the violation of this section.

Work began Monday, October 22, on the project and Iuka folks remain distressed finding it difficult to believe that the decision made by the Episcopal diocese is actually taking place.

DIOCESSE INITIATES CHURCH REMOVAL

Employees of Harris Construction Company from Corinth began the initial tearing down and moving of the Episcopal Church building in Iuka Monday, October 22. The building will be

taken down, hauled to Water Valley, Miss., and put back together there, according to the company owner.

Lealon Harris said his company received the contract from Mississippi Bishop Duncan Gray about three weeks prior to his signing it Friday, October 19. Harris said his crew will be involved with the project for approximately 3 months. It was still undetermined if his company would do the actual reconstruction of the building once getting it moved to Water Valley at the new proposed location.

Harris met with an architect in Water Valley about a month ago and plans for the building included keeping the outside structure the same. He said

sheet rock would be used to replace the inside boarded walls and that new window panes would be installed. Harris said it was safe to say the expense incurred by his company in tearing down and moving the building from Iuka to Water Valley would be near \$20,000. This figure did not include the re-building plans at the Water Valley site.

FmHA To Review For Possible Debt Restructuring

Reviews will begin in the near future of Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) loan accounts to see which farmers in Tishomingo County need and will qualify for a one-time set aside of part of their loan, Billy D. McClure, County Supervisor, said today.

FmHA has been authorized to set aside up to 25 percent -- to a maximum of \$200,000 -- of the debt owed the agency for farmers who are experiencing severe financial difficulty. If the set aside will help achieve a positive cash flow for the borrower.

"We will begin scheduling appointments for our borrowers to review their accounts, determine if they need special assistance and see if we can make that assistance available," McClure said.

"Not every borrower will qualify for the set aside, but there might be some other way to help, such as consolidation or rescheduling of existing loans. We will look at all alternatives."

McClure said all accounts will be reviewed. There are some exceptions, such as accounts in bankruptcy or foreclosure or those determined able to graduate to other sources of credit.

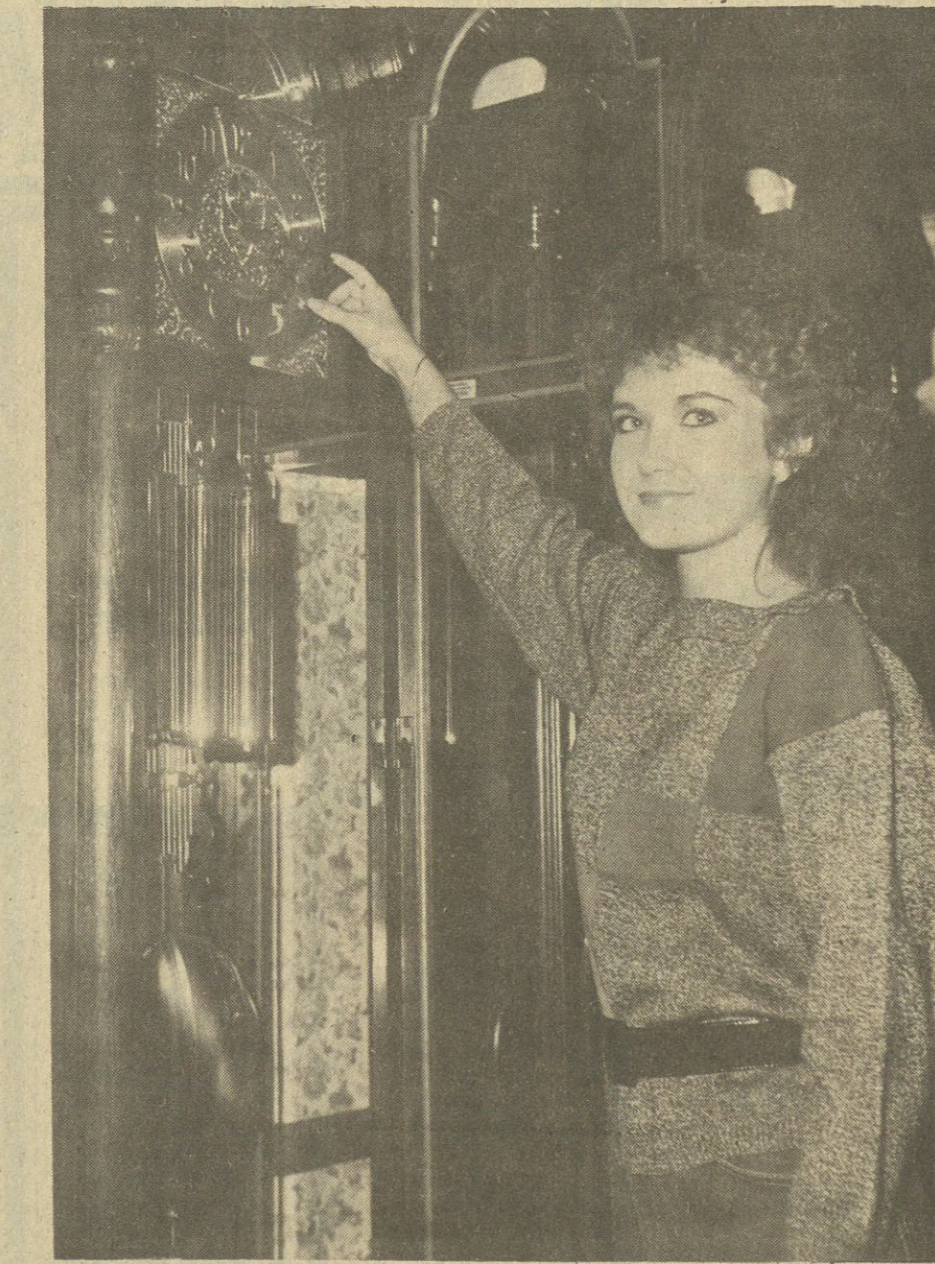

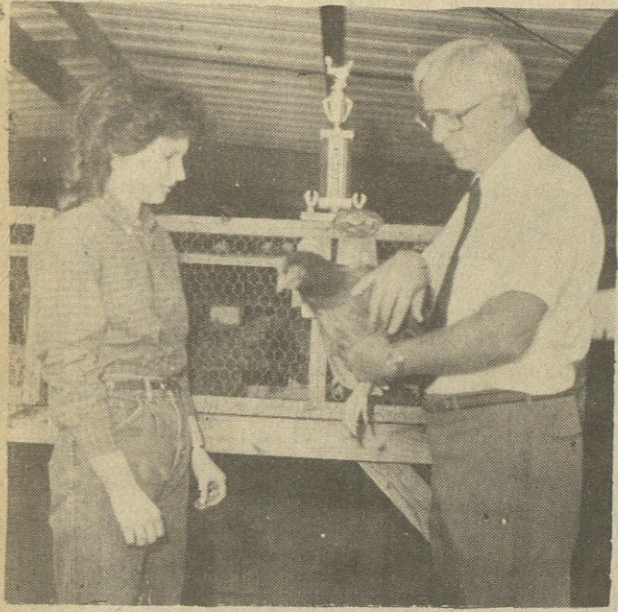

ASCS Farm News

FARM PROGRAMS OFFER ADVANCE PAYMENTS — To provide farmers with additional cash flow, Howard R. Bridges, chairperson of the Tishomingo County ASC Committee, said advance payments are being offered during the sign up for the 1985 wheat, feed grain, upland cotton and rice acreage reduction programs. Advance payments represent 50 percent of the projected deficiency payments and 50 percent of the land diversion payments in those programs where land diversion payments are provided.

Deficiency payments are made to farm program participants when the average market price falls below the established target price for a

crop. Bridges said target prices for 1985 are \$3.03 per bushel for corn, \$2.88 for sorghum, \$2.60 for barley, \$1.80 for oats, and \$4.38 per bushel for wheat. The target price is 81 cents a pound for upland cotton and \$11.90 per hundredweight for rice.

"The advance deficiency payments equal one-half the projected deficiency payment rate, times the farm program yield, times the indicated acreage to be planted, not to exceed the permitted acreage of the crop."

In addition to deficiency payments, farmers who sign up for the 1985 wheat, upland cotton and rice programs will be eligible for land diversion payments. Payment rates are \$2.70 a bushel for wheat, \$30 per pound for upland cotton and \$3.50 per hundredweight for rice. Half of the diversion payments will be available at sign up. "These payments compensate farmers for taking land out of production in addition to the acreage

reduction requirement," said Bridges.

A farmer who accepts an advance payment, but who later does not comply with program provisions, must refund the amount of the advance payment with interest plus liquidated damages, the ASCS official said.

For 1985 feed grains and extra long staple cotton, a 10 percent acreage reduction program is in effect. For wheat and upland cotton, the total reduction is 30 percent, including a 10 percent paid land diversion requirement.

For 1985 rice program participants, the total reduction is 35 percent, including a 15 percent paid land diversion.

Applications for the 1985 programs may be filed from October 15th through March 1st.

Halloween Night Can Be Dangerous

Halloween night, one of the favorite nights of the year for children, also can be one of the most dangerous, according to the Governor's Highway Safety Program.

"Children, caught up in the excitement of this night, often become careless when crossing highways, streets or roads," said Roy Thigpen, the governor's representative for highway safety and director of the Governor's Office of Criminal Justice Planning.

He suggested that children have reflective tape on their costumes to help ensure that approaching drivers can see the children and that their costumes allow them to walk without tripping.

Thigpen also suggested that children remove their masks when crossing roadways. "A mask that even slightly impairs the child's ability to see oncoming vehicles could lead to the child's death or injury," he

said. "Teenagers and others who drive motor vehicles should never use these vehicles in Halloween pranks of any kind," Thigpen said. "Operating a motor vehicle is a very serious act, and using it for an 'innocent prank' could result in a tragic accident."

He also cautioned adults who drink at Halloween parties never to drive if you've been doing a lot of drinking. Hosts should be sure that guests do not drive if they show any indication of being drunk. Alternative transportation, such as taxicabs or the use of designated drivers, could save a person's life. As most of us know, a person who's drunk often resists attempts to provide the individual with alternative transportation. Taking keys to a vehicle away from this person certainly is unpleasant, but it's far better to take away the keys than to let this person have a chance to take away

the individual's life or the life of another person on the highway.

"The host might also consider giving the drunk person a ride home or inviting the individual to 'sleep it off' at the host's home," Thigpen said.

"So often, what was intended to be an evening of fun, turns into an evening of tragedy because either a child or an adult was careless," he noted. "A happy Halloween must be a safe Halloween."
