

Two male subjects were arrested and each placed under \$5,000 bond following an early Sunday morning shooting at a local apartment.

Perry Glen Cutshall, 24, of Tishomingo County, and Gary Walker, 25, current address listed as Alcorn County, were picked up by law officers following the shoot-in at the Pickwick Circle Apartment, occupied by James Moore in luka.

luka Police Chief Joel Holliman said two firearms. one a shotgun, the other described to be a .45 magnum, were discharged into the dwelling. He said the shots struck the house just under the front bedroom window where Moore was at the time. Moore escaped injury during the incident. The Chief said Moore's private vehicle. which was parked in the driveway, was also shot into. City Policemen, Bobby



The 20 percent reduction in acreage with 10 percent paid diversion entitles farmers to a \$3.30 loan rate plus \$1.08 per bushel deficiency payment. Base acreage is an average of 1983 and 1984 wheat acreage.

Wet weather has put wheat planting on hold. With a break in the weather, farmers should be able to complete planting on time.

Seeding with a grain drill is preferable because seeding rates and depth of planting can be more uniform. per acre of seed will range from 60 pounds to more than 100 pounds.

If broadcasting seed, seeding rates should be increased by 50 percent. Planting depth will vary considerably and not as many

potassium, phosphorous, and lime according to soil test results. Preplant nitrogen is not needed after a good crop of soybeans. Use 20 pounds of nitrogen after cotton and 40 pounds after grain sorghum.

Before planting, seed with a fungicide or combination of fungicides. Vitivax should be included if smut has been a problem. Fungicides increase seedling survival by as much as 15 percent and ensure establishment.

Women during the childbearing years need twice as much as men because of monthly blood losses. However, blood loss from any cause — hemorrhage, injuries, blood donation — can increase iron

There are two kinds of iron. Heme iron in meat, poultry, and fish is more easily absorbed than the non-heme iron found in these same foods and in fruits, vegetables, grains, and eggs. Iron cook pots can add significant amounts of iron to food, especially when used for acid foods like tomatoes that dissolve the iron.

Taking iron with vitamin C enhances absorption. Antacids, tea, coffee, and dietary fiber reduce absorption. Bran fiber and iron should be taken at different times

Few foods are rich in iron except for liver, which is also high in cholesterol. Once iron deficiency develops, it is difficult to rebuild iron stores with diet alone. A supplement is usually needed until laboratory tests indicate normal stores or if there is continuing tendency to

Just this week, my husband and I spent a night and day at the Tishomingo County Hospital in luka. Our youngest child, almost three years old, was involved in a tragic accident and was hospitalized overnight for treatment and observation. Upon arriving at the

emergency room where our son was, I was allowed to be close to him and participate in everything that was going on. I accompanied him to Xray and observed the pictures, along with the physician on duty. As soon as the X-rays were examined and clear, I picked my child up and held him as a nurse wheeled us both back to ER. There, because of his fright and annoyance with people in white, my sisters and I were given the materials to clean his wounds.

In the room, when the vital signs were taken (over & over), I was given the courtesy to point out the bruise and tender skin and the nurses acknowledged this and were very gentle. When the blood work was done in the lab, I accompanied the technician and was explained to exactly how the tests were administered and read and I knew the results as soon as they came. I truly felt like I was treated like the concerned mother that I was. The ER physician pulled no punches. He was direct and honest. The nurses were very understanding, gentle and efficient. The head dietician came to the room personally to observe the bland diet and very soon after finding out my child could eat solid food, another lunch came consisting of a regular diet that I tasted, and the food was good.





Plant Containers Make A Difference

Preparing house plants for the cool weather to come

takes time and planning. Many plant lovers forget how important containers are to a plant's health.

Containers should be in proportion to the plant they contain. Select containers which will allow root growth. Do not use too large a container, the soil is liable to remain wet (as opposed to moist), thereby encouraging root rot. Too small a container may cause the plant to become "potbound", forcing roots to grow around the soil ball or out the drainage holes in the bottom of the con-

most commonly available containers are clay and plastic. Clay pots are more attractive than plastic containers, and they provide a healthier growing environment. However, clay pots are also heavier, more fragile and more expensive than plastic containers.

Plastic pots lack decorative appeal but this can be camouflaged with growing cascading plants that conceal the container or by placing the plants inside more interesting outer containers.

Because clay is a porous material which allows rapid evaporation of soil moisture through the walls, plants in clay containers need to be watered more frequently than those in plastic or glazed containers.

The best material for wooden plant containers are redwood and cypress

because they resist decay better than most other woods. Decay can be prevented, however, if the inside of the container is treated with a wood preservative before soil is added. Do not use creosote; it is toxic to plants. A reliable, nontoxic wood preservative is copper

naphthenate.

Ceramic containers are excellent for plants as long as drainage outlets are provided. Available in a wide range of sizes, ceramic containers often blend well with the decorating scheme of modern and contemporary homes. Because their glazed surfaces impede the escape of soil moisture through the walls, plants in ceramic containers require less watering,

Letter To The Editor

Dear Editor:

Please allow us to use your newspaper to inform the people of Mississippi of the necessity of the adoption of the constitutional amendment that will appear on the November ballot.

Unless this amendment is adopted, an individual generally will be prohibited from serving in any official capacity, that is, member of the Board of Supervisors, member of the municipal government, school board, Legislature, and so forth, if he or she, or his or her spouse, is a school teacher or employee of the local school; a professor or employee of any university or junior college; a doctor, nurse, or employee of any hsopital which receives

Medicaid reimbursement funds; an employee of any state agency or department; an owner or employee of a business receiving any payments from the state or local government of which the individual or spouse serves; any member of a legal, medical, engineering, architectural, or any other professional firm contracting with the state or local government of which the individual or spouse serves; and an owner or employee of any health care facility or business of any type which receives any Medicaid reim-

bursement funds. You can see from the above that unless this amendment is adopted by the people, many capable and publicspirited individuals will be barred from serving our people in an official capacity unless he or she is economically elite or is a fulltime employee of the state or local government without any other income that would be prohibited as detailed above.

This amendment is offered to the people with the firm conviction that its adoption will protect the public from corruption, but not prevent honorable individuals from serving in government.

We urge you to vote for this constitutional amendment.
