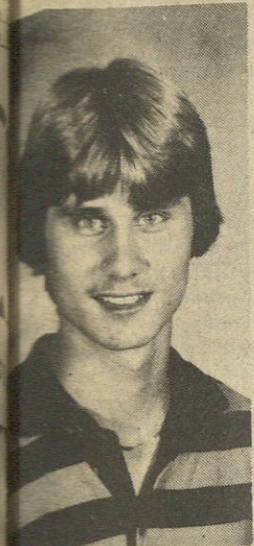

YOUNG IUKA MAN KILLED IN COLLISION



for the Alabama State Troopers, Richard Allen (Ricky) Degraw, 18, son of Mr.

and Mrs. Charles Degraw, of Iuka, was pronounced dead at the scene by the Colbert County Coroner. Degraw, owner of the 1969 Z-28 Camaro, is believed to have died instantly in the crash. Rodney E. Drinnen, 18, son of Mrs. Barbara Young, of Iuka, and Mr. Gene Drinnen, of Memphis, Tenn., was transported by the Cherokee Rescue Squad to Helen Keller Memorial Hospital in Sheffield, Ala. He was later transferred to Eliza Coffee Memorial Hospital in Florence, Ala., where he is listed in critical condition and remains in the Intensive Care Unit. He sustained a head injury, a broken jaw, and multiple cuts and bruises.

The State Trooper's report showed the two were apparently headed back to Iuka when the accident happened. The spokesman said both young men were thrown from the automobile when it veered off the road and

crashed into a power pole. No charges were filed in the accident, although it is still under investigation by the Alabama State Troopers.

Ricky, a lifelong resident of Iuka, will long be remembered by all those who knew him for his warm smile, his kind words, and his loving ways. He was a 1984 graduate of Iuka High School, and played basketball in his freshman year.

Funeral services for Ricky were held at 1:00 p.m. Monday, October 29, at the Airport Mission Baptist Church with Revs. Allen Hapner and Perry Murphy officiating. Burial was in Providence Cemetery. Cutshall Funeral Home was in charge of the arrangements.

Other than his parents, survivors include four brothers, Tommy Degraw, Ronnie Degraw, Bobby Degraw and Tony Degraw; and his grandmother, Mrs. Mary Lambert, all of Iuka.

Pallbearers were: Keith Carson, Lee Peery, Allen Williams, Luther Davis,

Hubert Davenport and Ricky Taylor.

3-Year Old Injured In Accident

No charges have been filed in connection with the Sunday afternoon carchild accident in Iuka.

Three-year-old Seth Gowen, son of Michael and Carolyn Gowen, of Iuka, reportedly ran into the street while playing in the yard with relatives, and was struck by a car, driven by Betty Branson Turner, 52, of Madison, Ala.

Investigating officer, Jimmy McVay, said witnesses to the accident related the car was traveling at an estimated 15-20 m.p.h. on Mill St. when the accident occurred. He said the child was knocked down by the car during the happening.

Seth suffered facial and hand abrasions and was taken to the local hospital for treatment and kept overnight for observation. He was released Monday.

Officer McVay stated the accident was unavoidable.

Former Supervisor Hospitalized Following Accident

Former 3rd District Supervisor, A.C. Ryan, remains in the Baptist Hospital in Memphis, Tennessee, following an unusual happening in the parking lot at Q-Mart in Iuka, Friday afternoon.

Ryan received internal injuries from being pinned between a van and a pick-up truck during the late afternoon accident.

City Police Officer, Jimmy McVay, said a 1984 Ford pickup, driven by Johnny Nunley, of Iuka, pulled into the convenience store's parking lot and stopped directly behind a parked 1979 Dodge van. Ryan was said to have been standing on the driver's side of the truck talking to Nunley when the driver of the van backed into Ryan, pinning him between the vehicles.

The van was registered to Wayne Franzen and was driven by Elizabeth A. Bussey, of New York. Ms. Bussey is associated with the Franzen Circus, which has a show scheduled in Iuka, November 5th.

Mr. Ryan was transported via ambulance to Tishomingo County Hospital and later transferred to the Baptist Hospital in Memphis.

City Police Officers, Jimmy McVay, and Wheeler Carson worked the accident.

PICKUP STOLEN AT IUKA HOMECOMING GAME

A 1980 C10 red over tan Chevrolet Silverado pickup truck belonging to Jimmy Marlin, of Iuka, was stolen Friday night during the homecoming game at the Chieftain Stadium.

Marlin had parked his truck about two blocks east of the stadium on Meigs Street in Iuka while he and his family were attending the football game. He said he left the game around the end of the third quarter, which, according to him, was about 9:25.

Marlin said the truck could not have been taken more than fifteen minutes prior to his return to the parking place. He based this on the fact that Officer Jim McVay was patrolling the area between 9:00 and 9:15 that night

and had seen the parked truck then.

The owner had recently customized the vehicle for a planned hunting trip and had added a special designed tool box, complete with a refrigerator, for the venture. The tool box contained his fishing equipment and other items of sentiment including a valued Colt Cobra .38 handgun. Marlin said a metal aluminum dog box sent to him from Lexington, KY, was also on the truck. The truck's value was estimated to be an approximate \$8,500.

A description of the vehicle has been given to the Mississippi Highway Patrol and a bulletin issued nationwide through the N.C.I.C machine.

BOAT MOTORS STOLEN FROM EASTPORT MARINA

Ten outboard motors with estimated value placed between eight and nine thousand dollars were stolen from the Eastport Marina sometime Saturday night, according to Mike Kemp, Chief Deputy of Tishomingo County.

Kemp said a 15 ft. aluminum boat, belonging to G.P. James, of Iuka, which was stored at the marina, was apparently used to haul the motors away, but later abandoned by the thief. James' boat was found stripped of its motor about 2 miles up river from the marina, floating in Indian Creek Sunday morning.

The motors, which were listed as either Evinrude or Johnson motors, ranged in size from 7 1/2 - 18 hp., and all belonged to local individuals except one which showed

Tennessee ownership. The motors were kept at the local marine shop, some for storage and others for repairs.

Mr. J.E. "Ted" Booker is the owner of the marina and has been in business for an approximate 15 years.

Mrs. Booker said Mr. James discovered his boat missing Sunday morning when coming out to run fishing lines. She said at first she thought it just to be a Halloween prank since nothing of this nature had ever occurred to them before. However, after a diligent search of the area for the missing items, she finally accepted it to be the work of thieves and called law enforcement officers.

Deputy Kemp said investigation continues into the case.

Northeast Mississippi Swine Symposium

There will be a Northeast Mississippi Swine Symposium on November 8, 1984, at the Hilton Inn in Tupelo, Miss. There will be a \$10.00 registration fee. The seminar is designed to: (1) explore the impact of lower grain costs on swine production; (2) look at the potential for expanded grain production and the implications this will have on swine production in Northeast Mississippi; (3) provide information on the production of grain and hogs and the long-run outlook for both commodities; and (4) view the impact of the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway on the availability of grain.

Fall Wheat

Tishomingo County farmers

interested in fall wheat should examine the wheat program to help determine crop acreage.

The 20 percent reduction in acreage with 10 percent paid diversion entitles farmers to a \$3.30 loan rate plus \$1.08 per bushel deficiency payment. Base acreage is an average of 1983 and 1984 wheat acreage.

Wet weather has put wheat planting on hold. With a break in the weather, farmers should be able to complete planting on time.

Seeding with a grain drill is preferable because seeding rates and depth of planting can be more uniform. Because of variation in seed size among varieties, pounds per acre of seed will range from 60 pounds to more than 100 pounds.

If broadcasting seed, seeding rates should be increased by 50 percent. Planting depth will vary considerably and not as many

seedlings will survive.

Apply potassium, phosphorous, and lime according to soil test results. Preplant nitrogen is not needed after a good crop of soybeans. Use 20 pounds of nitrogen after cotton and 40 pounds after grain sorghum.

Before planting, seed with a fungicide or combination of fungicides. Vitavax should be included if smut has been a problem. Fungicides increase seedling survival by as much as 15 percent and ensure establishment.

New Sodium Labeling Rule

On July 1, 1985, new sodium labeling requirements will go into effect. That will benefit consumers who wish to limit sodium in their diet. As a result the sodium content must be included on nutrition labels of packaged foods.

The distinction between "salt" and "sodium" is important. Salt is 40 percent sodium and a teaspoon of salt contains about 2,000

milligrams (mg) of sodium.

Sodium is of special importance to the many Americans with high blood pressure, which can lead to stroke and heart attack. Although high blood pressure is associated with numerous factors, many individuals can lower their blood pressure by sodium restriction and weight reduction.

The National Academy of Sciences/National Research Council estimates a daily sodium intake of 1,100 mg to 3,300 mg as safe and adequate for adults. However, many adults consume 5,000 to 7,000 mg daily.

Surveys by the Food and Drug Administration show that the number of consumers trying to avoid excessive salt and sodium has increased threefold since 1978.

The following are the standards to be required for various labeling claims:

- Sodium free -- less than 5 mg per serving

- Very low sodium -- 35 mg or less per serving

- Low sodium -- 150 mg or less per serving

- Reduced sodium -- processed to reduce the usual level of sodium by 75 percent

- Unsalted -- processed without salt when the food normally is processed with salt

Products will also have to list the amount of sodium in milligrams per serving on the nutrition label, if present, or by itself. This is particularly important for "unsalted" claims because many other common additives such as baking soda, sodium bicarbonate and MSG, monosodium glutamate, also contain sodium.

One-Bowl

Pumpkin Dessert

1-1/2 cups sifted flour

1-1/2 cups sugar
1/4 teaspoon baking powder
1 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1/4 teaspoon ginger
1/2 cup soft shortening
1 cup cooked, mashed pumpkin
1/2 cup water
1 egg
2/3 cup raisins
1/2 cup nuts

Sift dry ingredients together into mixing bowl; add shortening, pumpkin and water. Beat 2 minutes on medium speed of electric mixer or until ingredients are mixed well. Add egg, beat 2 more minutes. Stir in raisins and nuts.

Pour into a 1-1/2 quart ring or Turk's head mold that has been well greased and lightly dusted with fine, dry bread crumbs. Bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees) for about 45 minutes, or until cake tests done. Serves 8.

Bake this moist, easy-to-make cake/pudding the week before Thanksgiving, freeze it, then reheat in foil on the big day. Serve warm with lemon sauce or whipped cream.

CHILDREN'S VISION SYMPTOMS

There are a number of symptoms which may indicate that your child is having visual problems. An observant parent will generally detect these in the course of normal daily interaction with the child.

Some common signs to look for are: rubbing the eyes, headaches, especially after reading; covering or closing one eye; squinting when looking at a distant object; tilting the head to one side; holding reading material very close; moving the head instead of the eyes while reading; persistent letter or word reversal after the second grade; confusing similar words; frequently leaving out words; persistent motion (car)

sickness, awkwardness, complaints about blurred vision, and loss of place while reading.

A typical school screening test will readily detect many of these symptoms. If you have any reason to be concerned about your child's eyesight, a complete vision examination might be in order.

How would you like to see the Sheriff behind bars? Or your dentist or the Chief of Police or your tax assessor? Well, here's your chance, while helping to fight cancer at the same time.

The Tishomingo County Unit of the American Cancer Society is sponsoring a "Jail-A-Thon" to be held in front of Piggly-Wiggly in Iuka, Saturday, November 10, 1984, from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. This exciting, fun-filled event will be a major fund-raising activity for the 1984-85 Crusade.

For a \$20.00 tax-deductible contribution to the American Cancer Society, you can arrange a warrant, arrest and confinement behind bars. The "jailed" individual will be given a mock trial at which all will be set. He then will be responsible for raising his

bail money by soliciting pledges over the telephone while in jail. All money goes to the 1984 Cancer Crusade.

Bosses, employees, husbands, wives, students, teachers, and anyone can request the arrest of an individual. Arrest warrants must be accompanied by a \$20.00 (minimum, non-refundable) donation to the American Cancer Society. On the time specified in the warrant, the person named will be "arrested" by a uniformed officer (volunteers from the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Department and the Iuka City Police), handcuffed and brought to the ACS "jail" located in front of Piggly-Wiggly. Letter To The Editor

Just this week, my husband and I spent a night and day at the Tishomingo County Hospital in Iuka. Our youngest child, almost three years old, was involved in a tragic accident and was hospitalized overnight for treatment and observation.

Upon arriving at the emergency room where our son was, I was allowed to be close to him and participate in everything that was going on. I accompanied him to X-ray and observed the pictures, along with the physician on duty. As soon as the X-rays were examined and clear, I picked my child up and held him as a nurse wheeled us both back to ER.

There, because of his fright and annoyance with people in white, my sisters and I were given the materials to clean his wounds.

In the room, when the vital signs were taken (over & over), I was given the courtesy to point out the bruised and tender skin and the nurses acknowledged this and were very gentle. When the blood work was done in the lab, I accompanied the technician and was explained to exactly how the tests were administered and read and I knew the results as soon as they came. I truly felt like I was treated like the concerned mother that I was. The ER physician pulled no punches. He was direct and honest. The nurses were very understanding, gentle and efficient. The head dietician came to the room personally to observe the bland diet and very soon after finding out my child could eat solid food, another lunch came consisting of a regular diet that I tasted, and the food was good.

Now, I had often heard negative remarks about the

hospital and maybe I had even agreed with some. It could be possible that our facility may not be equipped with some instruments or equipment one might find in a larger hospital, but I feel our hospital and staff should be commended for their services.

We were treated with much respect and felt no information was held back from us. Also, it was a pleasure to see people working there we had known most of our lives. I believe we should consider just what our hospital is and what it would mean to all of us if we no longer had it or if some "big-wigs" came in and dictated and changed everything. We might reconsider some of our remarks and give some credit where it is due and support our hospital while we have one.

Fall Festival At Iuka High

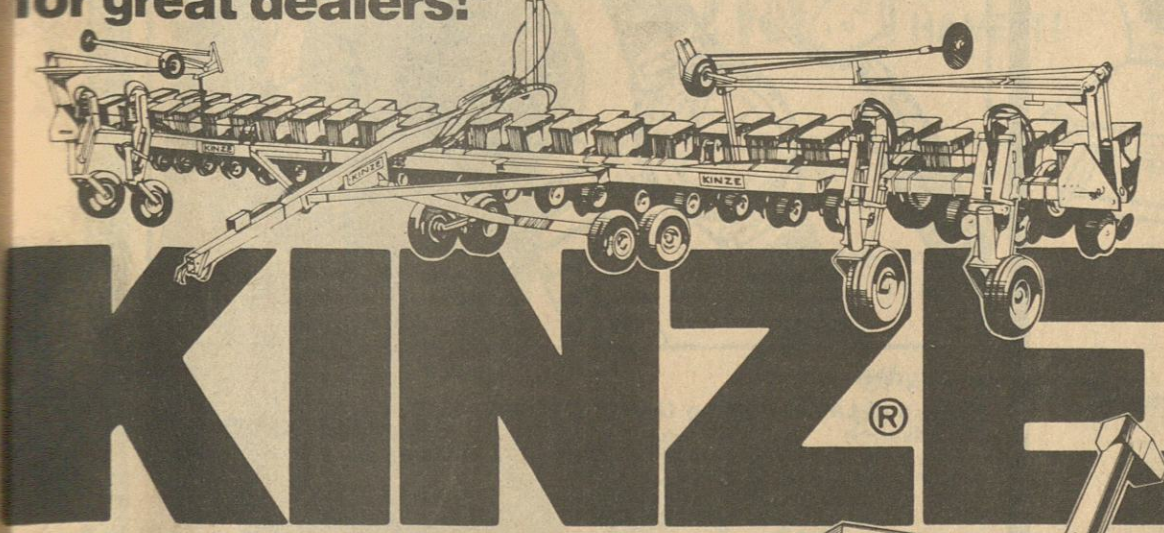

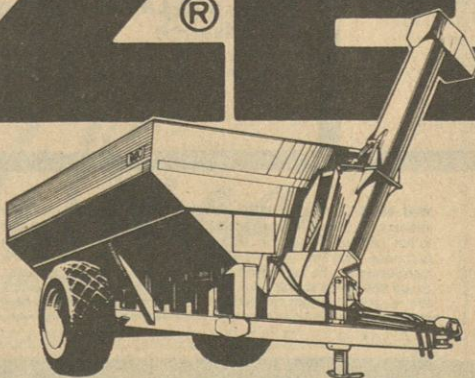

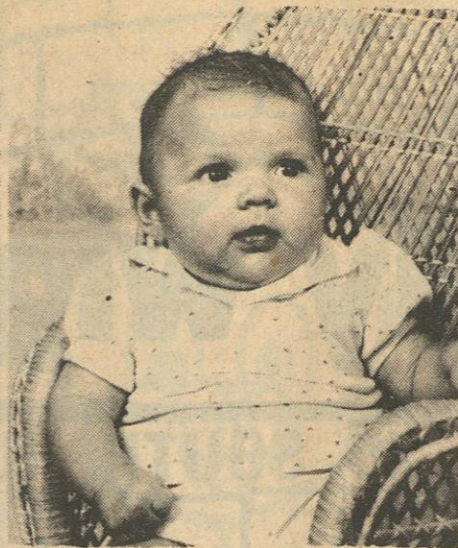

The Home Economics Department will be preparing and serving the luncheon for the contestants and judges.

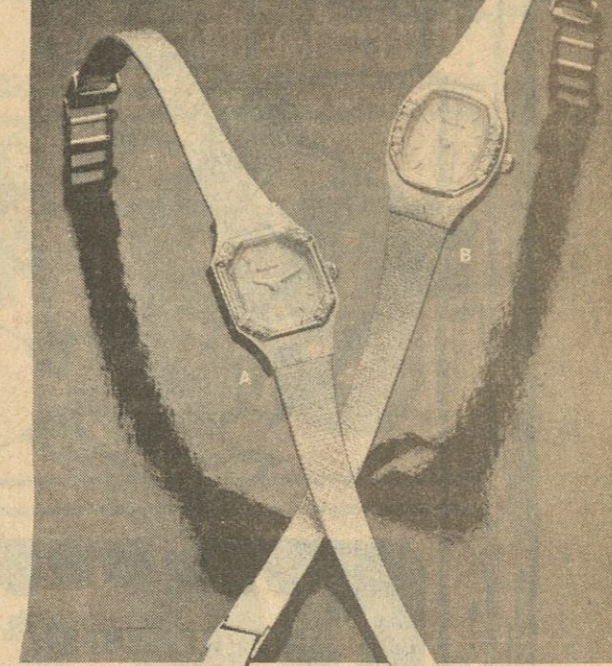
