REAGAN ENTERS 2nd TERM WITH LANDSLIDE VICTORY

WHITTEN AND COCHRAN REGAIN SEATS IN WASHINGTON



Ronald Wilson Reagan, 73, won a landslide victory over Democratic challenger Vice-President, Walter Mondale, in Tuesday's election. Reagan, the 40th President of the United States, received an unofficial 59% of the votes nationwide and indications that he would come very close to the 50-state sweep was his campaign's goal. Mondale received an unofficial 41% of nationwide votes and appeared a viable winner only in his home state, Minnesota, and District of Columbia. Reagan won 49 states with

525 electoral votes. Mondale carried 1 state and the District of Columbia and tallied 13 electoral votes.

The former Governor of California and oldest man ever to win a second term as President of the United States will again take the oath of office on the Capitol steps in January of 1985.

In the Mississippi Senatorial race, Thad Cochran received an easy re-election win over former Governor, William Winter.

Cochran had an unofficial 61% of state-wide votes, and Winter received an unofficial 39% of the votes state-wide.

Veteran Mississippi House of Representative, Jamie

Whitten, easily defeated his Independent challenger, John Hargett, in Tuesday's General Election.

Whitten, Chairman of the Appropriations Committee, received an unofficial 88% of the First Congressional District votes, and Hargett got an unofficial 12% of the votes.

According to Lamar Rutherford, Circuit Court Clerk, Tishomingo County has approximately 13,000 registered voters, and the unofficial figures showed that approximately 7,000 or 54% of the Tishomingo County registered voters cast their ballots in Tuesday's election.

Unofficial figures released by the Circuit Clerk's Office indicated voting within the county was: Presidential Election - Democratic Party, Walter F. Mondale 2879; Republican Party, Ronald Reagan 3524; Libertarian Party, David Bergland 4; Independent Candidates, Larry Holmes 4; Lyndon H. La Rouché, Jr. 7; Mel Mason 3; Bob Richards 4; Dennis Surrence 0.

United States Senator, Democratic Party, William Winter 3308; Thad Cochran 3428.

For United States House of Representatives, First Congressional District, Democratic Party, Jamie L. Whitten 5432; Independent, John Hargett 506.

Supreme Court Judge, Third (Northern) District Position No. 1, Democratic Party, James L. Robertson, running unopposed, received 4012 votes.

For Supreme Court Judge,

Third (Northern) District, Position No. 2, Democratic Party, unopposed, Lenore L. Prather, 3067.

In the race of County Board of Election Commissioners, all five incumbents ran unopposed and were reinstated. Total figure of ballots were unavailable at press-time. Commissioners are: First District, Londee Kent; Second District, Mrs. W.A. Holland; Third District, Barbara Price; Fourth District, Lester Hopkins; and Fifth District, Vera Bostick.

County Board of Education, District 2, Larry Bonds was the winner with 972 votes to Earl Strickland's 290 votes. Bonds was appointed by the County School Board to fill the vacancy left by the resignation of Bobby Strickland. The term extends through January 1987.

Incumbent Claude Stacy, of County Board of Education, District 5, held the lead against his four opponents. Stacy polled 462; Ronald B. Deaton, 236; William F. (Floyd) Henry, 432; and Garry D. Pharr, 206.

Tishomingo County voters rejected the ethics amendment, Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 548 sending it back to the legislative drawing board. The vote was 2,439 against the amendment over 1,641 for the state constitutional change. State figures showed 331,463 votes cast against the amendment and 240,505 votes of approval. With 79 of the 82 counties reporting Wednesday morning, indications were that 66 counties voted against the amendment and 13 counties voted for it.

3 KILLED IN TWO CAR CRASH NEAR CORINTH

Hearts have been touched throughout the county at the tragic and untimely deaths of two of our most beloved young people, the serious injuries of three other youth and one adult from our area, and the death of a Corinth teenager.

Lauriann Herbert, 17, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. David Herbert, of Tishomingo; and Kimberly Brooke Whitlock, nine-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. P.D. Whitlock, also of Tishomingo, died as a result of a two-car accident Friday night in Alcorn County.

Lauriann, who was a student at Tishomingo High School and co-captain of the school's cheerleading squad; and Kimberly had attended the Tishomingo-Alcorn Central football game and were enroute to a Corinth restaurant following the event when the accident occurred. Kimberly, along with her younger sister, Amy Whitlock, age 4; Linda Herbert, 40, mother of Lauriann; Stacy Herbert, age 10; and Holly Herbert, age 4, sisters of Lauriann, were all passengers in the car driven by the teenager.

A Corinth youth, Peter Richard Teuber, 15, driver of

the second vehicle involved in the accident, died Saturday morning at Elvis Presley Trauma Center in Memphis, Tennessee, as a result of injuries sustained in the mishap.

According to investigating State Trooper, Harold Holder, the collision occurred approximately 1.2 miles east of Corinth on U.S. 72 around 10:10 p.m. Friday.

The report indicated that Teuber was eastbound on 72 when he apparently lost control of his 1972 Chevrolet Chevelle and skidded into the path of the westbound 1983 Mercury Zephyr, driven by Miss Herbert. Holder's report stated that the Teuber vehicle went into a slide and skidded for a distance of 95 yards, crossed the lane and was struck in the center of the passenger side by the Herbert automobile. The accident transpired in the westbound lane just off the four-lane, east of Corinth.

Following the accident, the victims were transported to Magnolia Hospital in Corinth.

Lauriann Herbert was pronounced dead on arrival at Magnolia. Her mother, Linda Herbert, and her two sisters, Holly and Stacy, were admitted.

Kimberly and Amy Whitlock were taken to the Corinth Hospital, also, but were later transferred to LeBonheur Children's Medical Center in Memphis.

Kimberly Whitlock died around noon Sunday at the LeBonheur Children's Hospital.

Teuber was admitted to Magnolia also, but was later transported by helicopter to the Elvis Presley Trauma Center in Memphis where he died.

Mrs. Herbert is the wife of Tishomingo football coach, David Herbert.

The State Trooper said Coach Herbert, who was driving a bus loaded with Tishomingo students, arrived at the scene of the wreck minutes after it occurred. His young son, Dave Herbert, was on the bus with him.

Phyllis Whitlock, mother of the two young girls, was traveling directly behind the Herbert vehicle, the officer said.

A spokesman for the Magnolia Hospital said Holly Herbert was discharged from the Magnolia Hospital Monday. Mrs. Linda Herbert was moved from the ICU Unit Tuesday and was listed in stable condition. Stacy Herbert remained in the Magnolia

Survivors include her parents, Mr. and Mrs. David Herbert; a brother, Dave Herbert; two sisters, Stacy and Holly Herbert, all of Tishomingo; her grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. John Staton and Mrs. Minnie Herbert and the late C.L. Herbert, all of Carrollton.

Kimberly Whitlock was a student at Tishomingo Elementary School, and was most popular among her classmates and a favorite of her teachers. She was known throughout the county for her beauty and poise, having been involved in and winning many pageants. She attended the Tishomingo Baptist Church and was a member of the Youth Choir.

Services for Kimberly Brooke Whitlock were at 1 p.m. Tuesday, November 6, at the Tishomingo Baptist Church with the Revs. Randy Bostick and Bill Burcham officiating. Burial was in the Tishomingo City Cemetery. Deaton Funeral Home of Belmont was in charge of the arrangements.

Survivors include her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Paul Whitlock; a sister, Amy Whitlock; grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Dwight Kennedy, all of Tishomingo; and Mr. and Mrs. H.K. Whitlock, of Iuka.

Services for Peter Richard Teuber were at 11 a.m. Wednesday at McPeters Funeral Home Chapel with Rev. Pat Lydium and Dr. Roy McAllilly officiating. Burial was in Henry Cemetery.

Survivors include his parents, Mr. and Mrs. William F. Teuber III; a sister, Janine Teuber; a brother, Nichole Teuber, all of Corinth;

Memphis, Tennessee was charged with kidnapping, possession of a handgun, possession of a concealed weapon, and possession of a white controlled substance, believed to be cocaine, following his arrest Wednesday night, October

Third District Constable, Floyd Whitaker, recently found several items which are believed to have been removed from the City of Iuka pickup, which was reportedly stolen from the City's Gas and Water Plant on August 14, 1984.

Constable Whitaker Makes Find

According to Whitaker, he was working on an anonymous tip and was searching for marijuana at the time of his find.

Whitaker received the tip and traveled to the Snowdown Community, east of Iuka, Monday, October 29, in search of the marijuana plants. Upon arrival at his destination he found no marijuana, but instead found several City of Iuka inspection books, two decals, which read "City of Iuka", and several personal items of a city employee. Whitaker believed that the decals were peeled off the pickup and the contents of the truck were emptied there.

The case is still under investigation by local authorities.

THEFT ATTEMPT AT McNATT FORD CEASED

One Fulton resident has been arrested by the Iuka Police and a warrant has been issued for the arrest of another in connection with the attempted theft of a F150 pickup truck from the lot of McNatt Ford, Hwy. 25 South in Iuka.

Sharon Wood, 27, of Fulton, was found hiding in a car by police officers who responded to the alert around 4 a.m. Monday.

A warrant for the arrest of Tony Wood, also of Fulton, has been issued by local authorities. Iuka Chief of Police, Joel Holliman, said Wood jumped out of the truck

and escaped into a wooded area behind the Ford business when officers arrived. Wood remained at large at press-time.

According to E.L. McNatt, owner of the Ford dealership, the lock on the door of the truck was broken, the sliding window was pried open and the ignition lock busted during the crime. He estimated repair cost would run around \$100.00.

Chief Holliman said a 1976 Rally Sport Camaro, registered to Wayne Robinson, of Dennis, has been impounded by the law officials in connection with the incident.

Sharon Wood was released Monday from the Tishomingo County Jail and was placed under a \$5,000 bond. She now awaits action of the Grand Jury.

Police officers, Bobby James and Randal Taylor, were in charge of the case.

Pork Association Meeting

Make plans to support your Northeast Pork Producers Association at their quarterly meeting on November 12, at 8:00 p.m., in the Corinth Courthouse. Dr. Clyde Taylor, Extension Veterinary Medicine Specialist, will be the guest speaker. We need your help in supporting the local swine industry by becoming a member and attending these organizational programs. I plan to attend.

Soil Testing Necessary

Fall is a good time to test your soil for lime and fertilizer needs. Collect the samples throughout November, December and January to get

faster service and have the results of the soil tests in time to serve as a guide for buying and applying fertilizer.

Soil testing is important because it shows the amount of lime and fertilizer needed on each field. Proper use of fertilizer and lime helps ensure high yields and greater returns from each acre.

Soil is tested for pH level and nutrients, including nitrogen, phosphorus, potash, calcium, magnesium, zinc, manganese and organic matter. Total soluble salt content also is tested.

The pH value shows whether the soil is acid or basic. If the soil is acidic, a test is made to find out how

if a small amount of meat is frozen at one time. To freeze only a few cuts of meat, place them in direct contact with the quick-freezing area of sides of a home freezer. To give your meat further protection from drying out, buy turkey-size plastic bags from your locker plant and fill large bags with the wrapped cuts before storing them in your home freezer.

Crispy Oven Chicken

1/4 cup margarine or butter
2 1/2 to 3 1/2 lb. broiler fryer chicken, cup up
Savory Cereal Topping (Recipe Follows)
Heat oven to 350 degrees. Melt margarine in rectangular pan, 13x9x2-inches, in oven. Dip chicken in margarine and roll in Savory Cereal Topping. Place chicken, skin sides up, in pan; spoon margarine in pan over chicken. Bake until done, about 1 1/2 hours. Immediately remove from pan. 4 to 6 servings.

CRISPY OVEN FISH: Decrease oven temperature to 325 degrees. Substitute 1 lb. fish filets for the chicken. Bake until light brown and fish flakes easily with fork, 25 to 30 minutes.

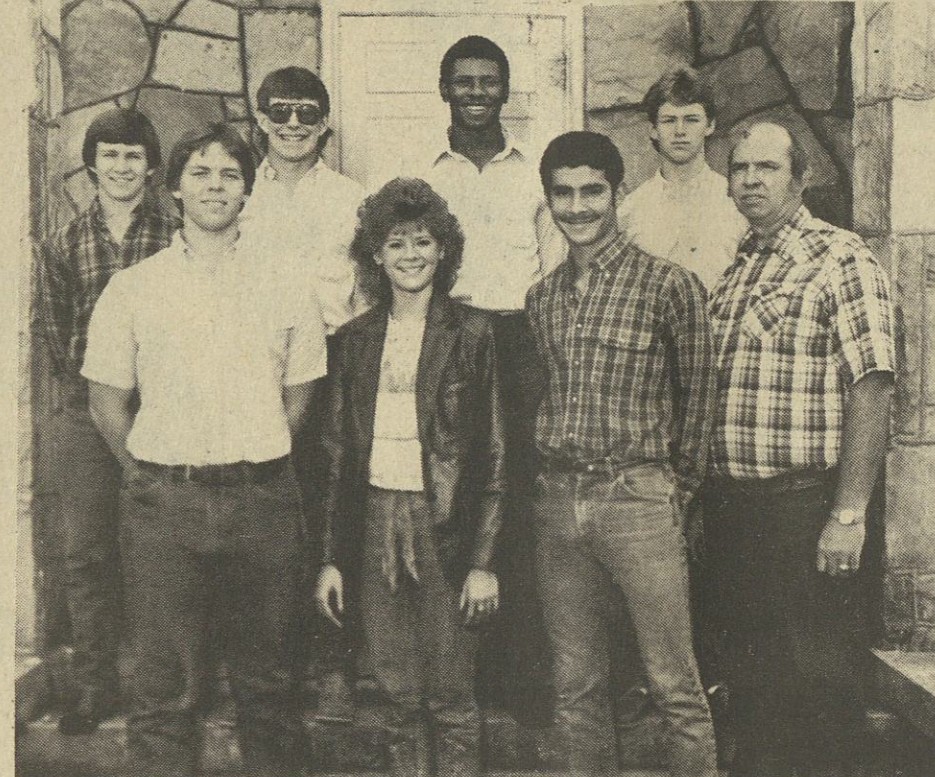
Savory Cereal Topping
3/4 cup crushed cereal (about 2 cups uncrushed)
1 tablespoon instant minced onion
1 tablespoon grated Parmesan cheese
3/4 teaspoon garlic salt
4 tablespoons Italian seasoning

1/8 teaspoon pepper
Mix all ingredients.

tender. Tender, flavorful home frozen meat can keep all these good qualities through home freezer storage if it is packaged well, frozen quickly, kept at or near 0 degrees F and used within a reasonable period of time. A reasonable time for beef is up to 12 months for roasts and steaks or two to three months for ground beef.

Meats that are not properly wrapped for freezer storage lose moisture and develop off-flavors more quickly than those that are sealed in moisture-vapor resistant materials.

Aluminum foil and plastic freezer bags provide the moisture-vapor resistance materials.

Aluminum foil and plastic freezer bags provide the moisture-vapor resistance required to retain meat quality in home freezers. Waxed paper, newspaper, butcher paper and some freezer papers do not protect meat from quality loss.

The plastic wrap in which meat cuts are displayed in grocery counters does not give meat the protection it needs in home freezers. Although the plastic film used by butchers looks like the material from which freezer bags are made, the two plastics are different.

Plastic butcher wrap allows passage of air through the film, which is ideal for refrigerated fresh meats. When a cut is placed in the freezer without removing it from the retail display package it should be sealed in a freezer bag.

Rapid freezing can be accomplished in a home freezer

much ground limestone must be used to produce top yields. The soil is also tested for the mineral content to determine which minerals should be added to the soil to increase yields. The percentage of organic matter in the soil is used in Mississippi primarily to estimate herbicide application rates. Excess salts in the soil may cause poor crop performance or death of crop plants. For best results, soil samples should be taken every two or three years. If the land use or production goals are changed, new samples should be taken for revised fertilizer recommendations. Samples should be taken when the ground is dry enough to work readily. Take samples from at least 15 to 20 different places in a five-acre area. Sample each field and each distinctly different kind of soil within a field or garden. Collect your soil samples this month to avoid the rush reason as planting season approaches. Information sheets, soil samples boxes and mailing containers are available the Extension office.

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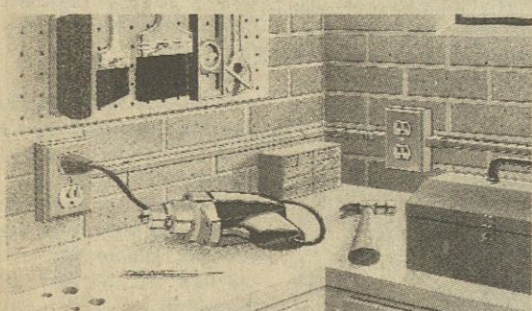

State Regent To Visit Iuka

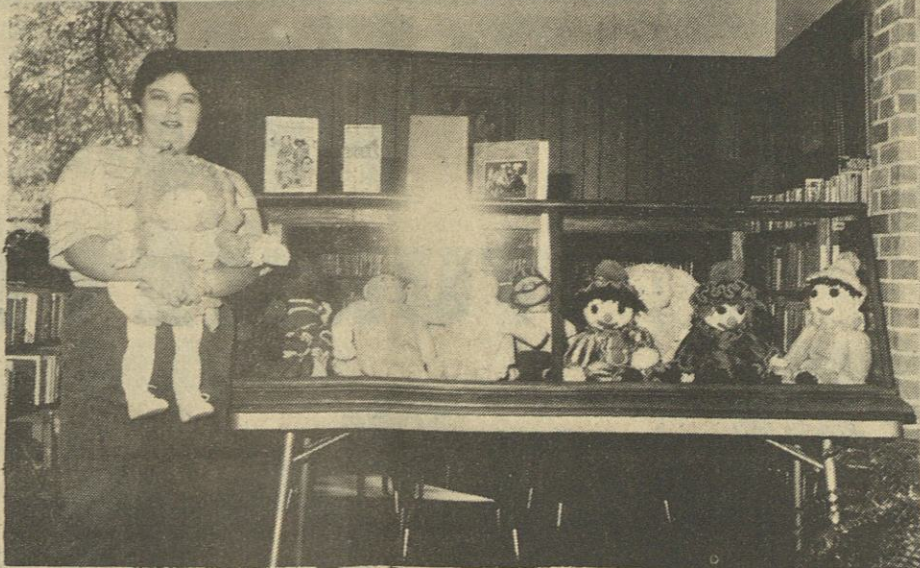

Record-Breaking Dry Spell Wraps Up Fiscal Year For TVA

August and September set two dry-weather records in the Tennessee Valley, TVA reported today. But at the start of October, most TVA lakes in the region were still at or above long-range average levels for that date because of earlier rains.

September saw an average of about half an inch of rain

across the Valley -- the lowest in 95 years of record. The long-term average for the month is 3.36 inches.

During August and September, rainfall averaged 2.62 inches. That is about an inch less than the previous record low set in 1897 for this 2-month period, and is only about a third of the long-term average of 7.46 inches for the two months.

The last 12 months saw rainfall average about 50 inches in the Valley, just a couple of inches below normal. But it fell in unusual patterns -- heavier than normal last November and December, less than average during January through April, in flood-producing torrents in early May, dry again in June and wet in July.

Water runoff during the wet periods filled TVA reservoirs and sustained them early in the summer, and gave TVA around 20 billion kilowat-

hours of hydro generation for the 12-month period. That is about 3 billion more than during an average year.

ASCS Reviews Procedure For Appealing Crop Yields

Cotton and feed grain producers in Tishomingo County recently received notification of their 1985 base acreage and crop yields, and had 15 days from the receipt of the notice to appeal the decision made by the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

"Since proving crop yields often requires a considerable amount of time, we encourage farmers who elect to appeal our decision, to begin this procedure so that it may be completed prior to

program sign-up," ASCS official Howard R. Bridges said. The sign-up period for the 1985 cotton and feed grain programs began October 15th and ends March 1st, 1985.

To request a proven yield for a particular crop, farmers are required to collect data for all farms on which the crop was grown, and to keep all production evidence separate for each year and each farm. Proven yield information must include a minimum of two year production evidence.

"We will measure the production, or farmers may submit commercial or warehouse receipts, sales or elevator receipts, warehouse ledger or summary sheets, settlement sheets or CCC warehouse-stored loan documents," Bridges said. If the quantity has been determined by farm measurement,

farm-stored loan documents may be used.

He said farmers may furnish scale tickets or weight slips, instead of the quantity determined by measurement only if the scale tickets or weight slips show farm identification, the commodity, date weighed, and the weigher's signature or initials, and the farm's name. "Weight slips and scale tickets can be used only in conjunction with our measurements or commercial disposition records," said Bridges, "they are not sufficient evidence alone."

Farmers are required to make a reasonable attempt to separate production from different farms by having the crops measured before coming or by furnishing the final settlement amount with the landlord. If production is not recorded before commingling between years, ASCS will not credit any of the production to the farm.

ASCS Says All Farmers Eligible For Soybean Loans

The price support loan rate for 1984 soybeans produced in Tishomingo County is \$5.08 per bushel, the same as the 1983 rate.

Howard R. Bridges, Chairman of the Tishomingo County ASCS Committee, explained that the loan rate is based on the national average loan level of \$5.02 per bushel and

applies to number 2 soybeans.

Since USDA does not require participation in production adjustment programs as a condition of eligibility for soybean farmers, Bridges says all producers will be eligible for price support loans on their soybean crop.

Mississippi farmers expect to produce 87,750,000 bushels of soybeans this year, compared to 56,425,000 bushels last year. Farm prices for the crop could average between \$5.75 and \$7.25 a bushel.

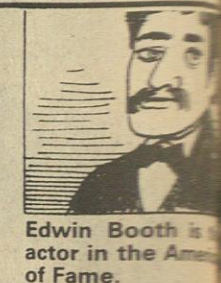

cough and, perhaps, a mild fever.

If you have body aches and chills, and a fever of more than one or two degrees above normal, you probably have the flu, not a common cold. What is frequently referred to as a chest "cold" is really bronchitis or pneumonia which is less common. A severe sore throat, especially with a fever, is often a sign of strep throat, for which you should seek medical attention.

If your symptoms are only those of a common cold, there are several remedies on the market that may provide varying degrees of relief. However, it is important to examine the ingredients of the cold remedy carefully. Many contain more ingredients than needed. Multiple decongestants, for example, in any one remedy are no more effective than a single decongestant. Or, the remedy may contain ingredients, whose properties nullify the effectiveness of other ingredients.

Decongestants, such as pseudoephedrine or phenylpropanolamine, are the most effective for treating the symptoms of colds. These are best administered by a nasal spray, because as cold tablets or liquids they are more likely to affect the entire body system and have been associated with elevated blood pressure, loss of sleep and irritability. A cough suppressant, such as dextromethorphan may also be beneficial if you have a cold. However, the widely marketed expectorants have no proven efficacy in the common cold. Antihistamines have a limited effectiveness, though they may decrease sneezing and nasal discharge, they can often cause drowsiness.

If all else fails, scientific evidence supports the use of chicken soup as a cold remedy. Sipping the hot liquid and inhaling the steam may reduce the length of the cold by accelerating mucous flow as does adequate fluid intake. However, the best medicine is prevention. That's best accomplished by careful hand washing and disposal of used tissues. Unfortunately, even the best of these efforts may be in vain. Since there are so many cold viruses it is possible to get a different virus every year and never have them all during the course of a lifetime.

This easy-to-make coffee ring features a "treasure" of maple syrup, nuts and raisins hidden in rich, flaky biscuits.

MAPLE AND RAISIN PULL APART

- 1/2 cup raisins
- 1/4 cup chopped walnuts
- 1 tablespoon sugar
- 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1 tablespoon maple syrup
- 1/2 teaspoon grated lemon peel
- 2 (10-oz.) cans Hungry Jack refrigerated flaky biscuits
- 2 tablespoons margarine, melted

Glaze

- 1/3 cup maple syrup
- 1 teaspoon lemon juice
- 2 tablespoons chopped walnuts

Heat oven to 350°F. Grease 12-cup fluted tube pan or 2 1/2-quart ring mold. In small bowl, combine raisins, walnuts, sugar, cinnamon, 1 tablespoon syrup and lemon peel. Separate dough into 20 biscuits; separate each biscuit into 2 layers. Spoon about 1 teaspoonful raisin mixture onto center of 20 biscuit pieces. Top with remaining biscuit pieces; pinch edges to seal. Stand filled biscuits on edge, slightly overlapping, in prepared pan. Drizzle with margarine.

Bake at 350°F. for 25 to 35 minutes or until deep golden brown. Cool upright in pan 5 minutes. In small bowl, combine 1/3 cup syrup and lemon juice; brush about 1/3 over coffee cake. Invert onto serving plate. Stir 2 tablespoons walnuts into remaining glaze mixture; spoon over warm coffee cake. 20 servings.

The Common Cold

THE COLD WEATHER SEASON WILL SOON BE UPON US AND I WONDER WHAT I COULD DO TO PREVENT GETTING A COLD THIS COMING WINTER. WHAT ARE THE BEST WAYS TO ALLEVIATE COLD SYMPTOMS?

Contrary to popular beliefs about the common cold, the weather actually has little to do with whether or not you will get a cold. Most colds are spread by hand-to-hand contact of nasal discharge and are not caused by cold or dampness or a combination of both. In fact, sneezing and coughing do not spread colds as effectively as hand-to-hand contact. If you think you might be coming down with a cold, take extra care when washing your hands and immediately dispose of used tissues.

Some of the reasons why people seem to be more susceptible to colds in the winter are that schools are open during the winter months, making it easier for the germs to spread; the air inside tends to be dryer and warmer, which in turn dries the nasal mucosa making it easier for the cold-causing virus to take hold, and because people tend to be crowded together indoors. In tropical climates, where there is no cold weather per se, more people get colds during the rainy season when they are compelled to live indoors.

Ninety percent of all colds are caused by viruses. Unfortunately for those who seek a cure to the common cold, there are hundreds of different types of viruses. One third to one half of these are rhino (related to the nose) viruses, of which there are more than 100 immunologically distinct types. Further complicating the problem is the fact that the

viruses causing another third of all colds have not even been identified.

While most people agree that colds are seldom life-threatening illnesses, they are the most common cause of absenteeism from school and work, accounting for 60 percent of all school days lost and 33 percent of lost work time. The annual cost to the economy is estimated at five billion dollars.

Most colds have a duration of three to five days but some can linger on for as long as two weeks. The symptoms of a cold are nasal discharge, nasal blockage, sneezes, mild sore throat, hoarseness, a

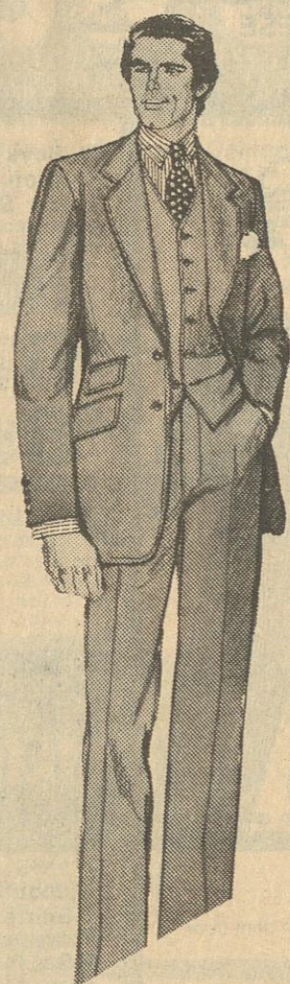

What's Going Down In Price?

AT&T Long Distance Rates.

An order issued today by the Mississippi Public Service Commission allows AT&T Communications to lower rates on long distance calls within the state by three to five percent.

AT&T Communications spokesman, Dan Daugherty, said the PSC's order will help bring the benefits of competition in the state's long distance market to consumers.

"Finally, consumers are beginning to enjoy some of the advantages that were intended by the breakup of the Bell System," Daugherty said. "A major reason for the breakup was that there is competition in the industry. Today the commission has taken a major step forward by allowing AT&T to set intrastate long distance rate closer to cost. The net result is a reduction in our long distance rates within the state."

Daugherty said the PSC order also provides for a

"branded rates" concept that will allow AT&T to continue to set rates at competitive levels within guidelines approved by the commission.

"Back when AT&T operated in a monopoly environment, long distance rates were set artificially high to offset other costs," Daugherty said. "Now that my company is strictly in the long distance business we want to bring those rates down so we'll be able to compete on prices as well as quality."

Today's order is a significant step toward giving us the flexibility we need to compete.

Daugherty pointed out that AT&T was granted a 6.1 percent reduction in interstate long distance rates by the Federal Communications Commission in May.

"Both orders, the FCC order and the recent PSC order, reflect a trend in the industry toward lower long distance rates," Daugherty said.

Farm Credit Initiatives Set To Go Into Operations

Regulations for implementing President Reagan's Farm Credit Initiatives have been completed and are being distributed to Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) field offices, Charles W. Shuman said.

The regulations provide for a one-time debt set-aside program for FmHA borrowers and loan guarantees for non-FmHA borrowers. In addition, Shuman has developed guidelines which County Supervisors will use in signing contracts with local non-Government lenders and farm management specialists. These specialists will provide additional advice and assistance to financially distressed farm borrowers.

In both cases, the action will restore farmers to a positive cash flow position. "With field office training underway, we will have

everything in place for the successful launching of the program," Shuman said.

Under the plan announced recently by the President for farmers experiencing serious financial difficulty, FmHA can set aside up to 25 percent, to a maximum of \$200,000, of a

borrower's debt for five years without interest.

For non-FmHA borrowers, the agency can guarantee up to 90 percent of a loan if the lender is willing to write off a minimum of 10 percent of the debt.

C AND THE CERVIX

Studies have found higher rates of cancer of the cervix — the opening to the womb — related to lower levels of vitamin C in the diet and in blood samples.

In a Bronx cancer-screening clinic, women consuming less than 30 mg of vitamin C a day had seven times the risk for cervical dysplasia — cell changes that precede cancer — as those with intakes above 30 mg. Blood levels of vitamin C were lower in women with cervical dysplasia or cancer than in healthy women.

Previously identified risk factors for cancer of the cervix are intercourse beginning at an early age, a variety of sexual partners, and a sexual partner who himself has a variety of sexual contacts. These factors are thought to put women at risk for various infections that cause cellular changes in the cervix.

Vitamin C is sometimes called the healing factor. It promotes a healthy immune system, able to fight microbial invaders and disease processes.

Recommended Dietary Allowance for vitamin C is 60 mg. Surveys show that one-third of U.S. women age 25-44 consume less than 30 mg a day.

UNEMPLOYMENT RATE REMAINS STEADY

The rate of unemployment in Tishomingo County remained at 18.8 percent at mid-September, according to Charles Smith, Manager of the Mississippi State Employment Service. However, this represents a drop of 2.0 percent from one year ago. The civilian labor force for the county climbed to 10,020, compared to 9,960 in August and 10,100 in September, 1983. The number of individuals employed also rose mid-month to 8,140, 50 above the previous estimate and 140 above the estimate one year ago. Establishment based employment in the county rose to 8,490, an increase of 80 from last month and a minimal decline of 10 from one year ago. Manufacturing employment, estimated to be 4,000, rose only a slight 30 from one month ago but 110 from one year ago. Non-manufacturing employment increased from last month to reach 2,980, approximately 40 above the previous estimate; however, a loss of 130 was experienced in September, 1983. Smith noted that the civilian labor force for the six-county area of Alcorn, Ben-Harmon, Prentiss, Tippah and Tishomingo stood at 21,100. This represents an increase of approximately 1,780 from the estimate for August and 2,740 over the estimate for the same period one year ago. The number of employed persons rose substantially to approximately 54,630. This represents a healthy rise of 1.5 percent from the estimate of August and an even more substantial increase of 1,310 from the September, 1983,

estimate. Non-agricultural Wage and Salaried workers registered monthly and yearly growth while other Non-agricultural workers experienced losses over both periods. Agricultural workers rose over the previous month but experienced a minimal decline from one year ago. The estimated rate of unemployment for the six-county area for September was 14.9 percent of the civilian labor force, up 1.0 percent from August and up 1.6 percent from September, one year ago. The number of individuals unemployed also rose, reaching 9,580 at mid-September. Manufacturing employment in the six-county area, estimated to be 17,400, reflected an over the month decrease from the 17,700 estimated in August and a continued decrease from the 17,860 reported for the current month one year ago. Non-manufacturing employment rose to 21,260 in September, 970 more than last month and 360 more than September, 1983. Contributing to the monthly growth was school related workers returning to their duties.

Mississippi's Unemployment Rate Drops

Mississippi's unemployment rate dropped to 10.7 percent in September, a decrease of five-tenths of a percentage point compared to August's revised jobless rate of 11.2 percent, according to Mississippi Em-

ployment Security Commission Executive Director Cohen Robertson. Last year's September unemployment rate was 10.9 percent. The 10.7 percent unemployment rate for the state was higher than the 7.1 percent national rate for September. Mississippi Em-

ployment Security Commission figures showed 117,900 unemployed and 987,100 employed out of a civilian labor force of 1,105,000. The initial unemployment insurance claims totalled 15,992 in September.

Fifty-one of the state's 82 counties had unemployment rates of 10.0 percent or higher in September. Of that number, three counties had unemployment rates in excess of 20.0 percent.

The counties having the highest unemployment rates in September were George, with an unemployment rate of 22.4 percent; Greene, with 20.8 percent; and Kemper, with 20.8 percent.

Rankin, Oktibbeha, and Desoto counties had the lowest jobless rates in September. Rankin had a rate of 4.9 percent; Oktibbeha, 6.3 percent; and DeSoto, 6.7 percent.

Twenty-two counties showed an increase in their unemployment rates from August to September, while fifty-six counties reported decreases. The unemployment rate in four counties was unchanged.

FmHA Assists Farmers In County

The Farmers Home Administration assisted farmers and ranchers in Tishomingo County during fiscal year 1984 which ended September 30, 1984, in the amount of \$665,890, County Supervisor, Billy D. McClure, reported today.

These loans were made under programs to assist with farm ownership and operation, natural disaster, economic emergencies and soil and water projects, McClure said.

"Most farmers have it easy, but this has never been a particularly difficult year for them," McClure said. "The loan programs of the Farmers Home Administration make it possible for many farmers who cannot get credit elsewhere to continue operating."

For the 12 months ending September 30, 1984, the breakdown of loans in the county is as follows: Operating loans, 15 - totaling \$204,480; Farm Ownership, 1 - Totaling 26,700; and Emergency Loans, 13 - Totaling 434,710.

Nationally, preliminary figures show FmHA provided 110,425 farm loans totaling \$4.4 billion during the fiscal year.

FmHA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It provides loan assistance to Farmers and ranchers who need credit but cannot obtain it from private lenders. All loans must be repaid in full, plus interest.

generally, the money has been well used.

The problem today is that state aid road money is still being distributed to the counties under the formula adopted forty years ago. The Legislature has ignored, to this point, population shifts and changing economic patterns among the counties. The result is that some counties with small populations are receiving more state aid dollars than are the growing counties with expanding populations.

For example, Greene County, with a population of less than 10,000, receives just about the same amount of state aid road money as Hinds County with a population of more than 250,000; an Greene County receives more state aid money than go Harrison and Jackson Counties, the state's second and third largest counties.

Fairness, and best use of tax dollars, demands a revision in the distribution formula. Hopefully, we will see that change in the 1985 legislative session.

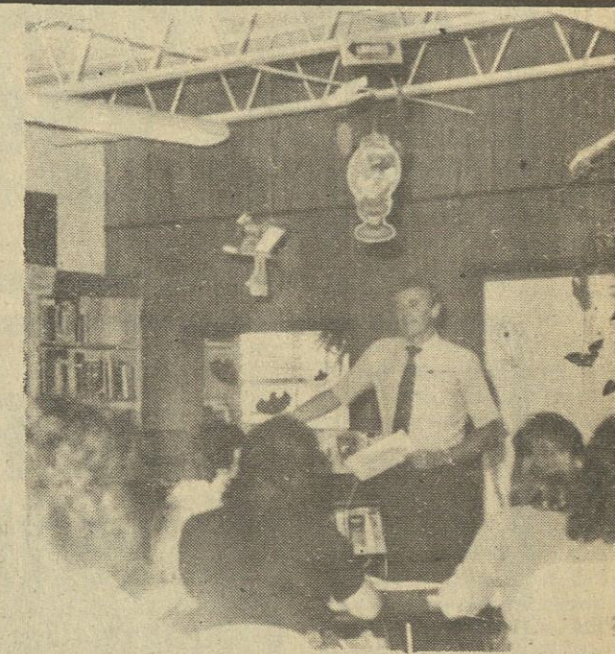

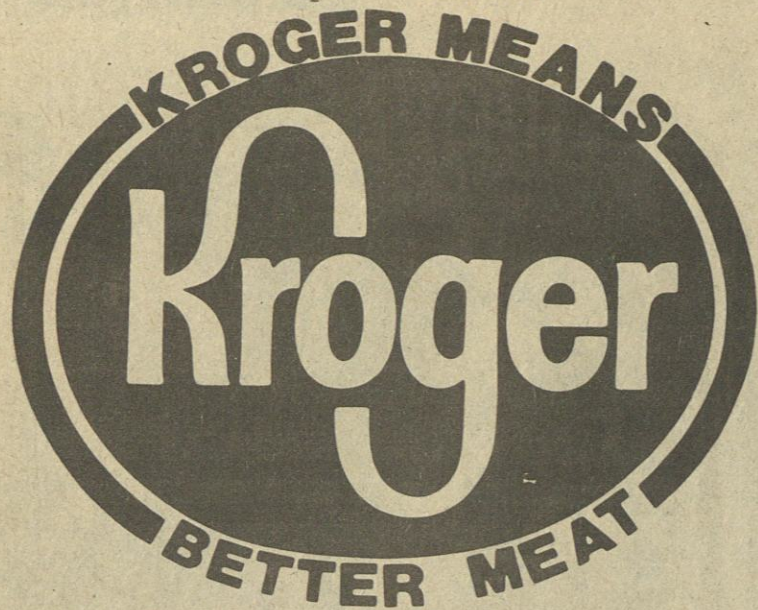
