mingham, Ala., had parked in  
the Q-Mart convenience store while Walker  
was in for a cup of coffee.  
Walker said apparently the  
brakes leaked down on  
the vehicle, causing it to run  
downgrade.

gallons of JP5 aviation fuel.  
He recalled leaving Bir-  
mingham around 9:00 p.m.  
and said he and another  
trucker had pulled over and  
gone inside Q-Mart for a cup  
of coffee when the outside  
commotion attracted their at-  
tention. Walker, obviously  
still shaken by the freak ac-  
cident, said he couldn't  
believe it when he actually  
saw the damage done by the  
truck, which he had been  
driving. A trucker by  
profession, he said he had  
been employed by the Bir-  
mingham based Fleet Trans-  
port Company, Inc., since  
1976.

Phil Mauney has been in  
business in Iuka at this  
location for about eight months.  
The damage incurred to  
his building was undeter-  
mined, but as for the flashing  
arrow sign and trailer, he  
noted they were quite expen-  
sive. Mauney estimated the  
damage done to the satellite  
dish and equipment to be  
near \$800-\$900. Mauney, who  
owns his own building and  
property, also owns the ad-  
joining lot where Odom Car  
Sales conducts business.

A detailed list of damage to  
the six separate vehicles,  
which were a part of Jack  
Odom's Auto Sales inventory,  
included: 1979 Dodge Van,  
1980 Ford pickup, 1978 4/WD  
Chevrolet, 1979 Pontiac For-  
mula, 1979 Monte Carlo, and a  
1980 Ford Mustang.

Odom had been in  
business at this location since  
July. He stated an  
estimated figure of \$26,000 as  
a rough amount of damaged

property.  
City Policemen, Bobby  
James and Robert Till, re-  
ported no charges in the incident  
and termed the event as  
bizarre and unavoidable.

## COMMODITIES AVAILABLE TO COUNTY RESIDENTS

The Tishomingo County  
Welfare Department announ-  
ced today that U.S. Depart-  
ment of Agriculture surplus  
commodities including  
cheese, butter and rice will be  
distributed to eligible area  
residents on Wednesday,  
December 5, 1984. The foods  
will be distributed in the  
basement of the Tishomingo  
County Courthouse begin-  
ning at 8:00 a.m. Distribution  
is on a first come - first served  
basis and, as in previous  
distributions, the voucher  
system is being used.

All households receiving  
food stamps are eligible to  
receive USDA foods. Those  
households who receive food  
stamps by mail will have the  
voucher enclosed with their  
Nov. stamps. All other  
vouchers for food stamp  
households may be picked up  
in the food stamp office.

Any self-declared  
household whose gross in-  
come is below maximum level  
according to agency policy  
may complete or update an  
application and pick up a  
voucher for the surplus foods  
in the Welfare Office during  
normal working hours.

Misrepresentation of need,  
or sale or exchange of USDA  
commodities is prohibited  
and could result in a fine, im-  
prisonment, or both. USDA's  
Emergency Food Assistance

Program is available to all  
eligible recipients regardless  
of race, color, national origin,  
age, sex, or handicap.

Those receiving foods are  
asked to bring a paper sack  
for their convenience in  
carrying the items.

### Nichols' Home Burglarized Iuka Man Arrested

James Southward, 25, of  
Iuka, has been arrested and  
charged with the November  
13 break-in and entering of  
the home of Leonard Nichols,  
of the Harmony Road Com-  
munity.

Sheriff Bob Payne said  
Southward's arrest came  
following information given  
by a family member in regard  
to him (Southward) being in  
the area and asking direc-  
tions of a family member the  
day of the theft at the home  
was reported. It was said that  
Southward gained entry to  
the Nichols home by breaking  
a window in the back of the  
house.

Payne said a railroad  
pocket watch with a gold  
chain and a .20 gauge  
shotgun, which belonged to  
Mr. Nichols were taken and  
had already been sold by  
Southward to an Alabama  
man, but the items were  
recovered the same day and  
have been returned to the  
owner.

Southward remained  
housed in the Tishomingo  
County Jail at press-time, and  
according to Payne, a hearing  
will be held later this week.

It was stated by the sheriff  
that Southward was on parole  
at the time of his arrest as a  
result of earlier similar  
charges.

## NATCHEZ TRACE BRIDGE OFFICIALLY DEDICATED

Spirits were not dampened  
by the heavy rain, which fell  
Sunday, November 18, as ap-  
proximately 150 persons sat  
in their cars at the Natchez  
Trace Bridge and observed  
the ribbon-cutting ceremony  
of the final section of the  
Natchez Trace Parkway in  
Northeast Mississippi.

The dedication ceremony  
marked the opening of a two-  
mile section of the Parkway,  
located at the Bay Springs  
Community in Tishomingo  
County, west of Mississippi  
Highway 25. The ceremony,  
which was scheduled to be  
held at the Natchez Trace  
Bridge over the Tennessee-  
Tombigbee Waterway, was  
moved to the Stennis Center  
in Tupelo due to the rain. The  
section will fill the last gap in  
the area, allowing the Trace  
Parkway to extend a full 305  
miles as an interregional  
parkway serving three states.  
It will reach from Jackson,  
Mississippi, to Jackson Falls,  
Tennessee, approximately 16  
miles west of Columbia.

When completed, the Nat-  
chez Trace will extend from  
Nashville to Natchez, an  
estimated distance of 449  
miles.

The ceremony marked one  
of the most important events  
in the Natchez Trace Park-  
way's history and gave it the  
appearance of a national  
parkway for the first time, ac-  
cording to Jim Bainbridge,  
Natchez Trace Parkway  
Superintendent.

The Parkway bridge was  
named in honor of United  
States Representative, Jamie  
L. Whitten, who for years  
fought for funds in Congress  
to complete the Natchez  
Trace Parkway and the Ten-

nessee-Tombigbee Water-  
way. Rep. Whitten attended  
the historic event and was  
given a plaque for his un-  
ceasing 44 years of service to  
the Natchez Trace Parkway.  
Whitten's visit helped mark  
this historic landmark the in-  
tersection of two great  
avenues of transportation,  
road and waterways, one  
past, one present, both for  
the future.

During the ceremony, an  
introduction of guests was  
given by Tom Green, Past  
President of Natchez Trace  
Parkway Tennessee  
Association. Attending were  
Jim Bainbridge, Superinten-  
dent of the Natchez Trace  
Parkway; Russell Dickenson,  
Director of the National Park  
Service; Bob Baker, Director  
of the Southeast Region of  
the Park Service; and Mrs.  
Jean Ratliff, President of the  
Natchez Trace Parkway  
Association, along with  
others who spoke on behalf  
of the Parkway.

According to P.O. Beard,  
Vice-President of the Natchez  
Trace Parkway Mississippi  
Association, several persons  
from Tishomingo County at-  
tended the ceremony at  
Tupelo. Along with Mr. Beard  
and his wife, Nancy, were  
Tishomingo County  
Development Foundation  
Director, Bill Flynn; and Mr.  
Hollis Long with his Boy  
Scout Troop #72, all of whom  
enjoyed the joyous occasion.  
The Scout Troop was in  
charge of posting the Colors  
at the beginning of the  
ceremony. The Belmont High  
School Band, under the direc-  
tion of Greg Tyson, was  
unable to attend the  
ceremony due to the heavy

rain.  
Tishomingo County  
Development Foundation  
Director, Bill Flynn, stated  
that the completion of the  
Natchez Trace Parkway will  
allow visitors and tourists to  
enter Mississippi at  
Tishomingo County and  
provide economic benefits to  
the area. As he welcomed  
Russell Dickenson, Director  
of the National Park Service,  
he expressed appreciation  
from the people of  
Tishomingo County to the In-  
terior Department and the  
Natchez Trace Parkway for  
their work in building the  
Parkway with its resulting  
tourism attracted for the  
county. "We look forward to  
continuing development of  
the Parkway and its  
promotion through the nation  
in the coming years," Flynn  
explained.

P.O. Beard, Vice-President  
of the Natchez Trace Parkway  
Mississippi Association, par-  
ticipated in the ceremony and  
spoke to the crowd of ap-  
proximately 90 people who  
attended. "The ceremony  
marked a historic event and I  
praise Jamie Whitten for the  
fine job he's done in getting  
this section of the Parkway  
opened," Beard said.

According to Jim Bain-  
bridge, the Parkway was  
designated as part of the  
National Park System in 1938,  
and there's already been ap-  
proximately \$229 million  
spent on it, with an estimated  
\$85 million to go.

The opening of this section  
will leave less than 50 miles  
remaining to be completed on  
the Parkway. A 23-mile sec-  
tion, south of Nashville, is  
next in priority for com-  
pletion.

Groundbreaking for a sec-  
tion of the Parkway between  
Jackson Falls and Tennessee  
Highway #50 is tentatively  
scheduled for November 28 at  
Duck River.

According to Bainbridge,  
funds have been provided to  
extend the Parkway to the  
Williamson County Line, north  
of Tennessee 50, in fiscal  
year 1986.

### Safe Home Heating

Cold weather has arrived! Many Tishomingo County families have already built their first fire or turned on their electric heaters. It is especially important to be careful when heating a home.

To assure safety, reliability and efficiency, use and maintain heating equipment properly.

Check all heating equipment, such as a furnace, fireplace, stove or portable heater, before using it. Perform recommended servicing and repairs to avoid unnecessary fire risk and excessive energy consumption.

Clean flues and chimneys to prevent smoke and combustion gases from collecting in them. If you burn wood, the chimney will need cleaning more often to avoid creosote build-up.

Make sure a wood-burning stove is installed according

to safety standards. This information available at the Extension office or the fire department.

When using an LP-gas, kerosene or oil-burning portable heater, make sure there is adequate ventilation. If there is not good ventilation, oxygen depletion and accumulated combustion products could be a hazard.

Set portable heaters away from combustible objects and away from traffic. Use only heavy-duty extension cords with electric heaters.

Protect your family by teaching and practicing safety with fire. Young children should not be allowed to play near fireplaces without a protective screen or near stoves and electric heaters where they could be burned.

whole cottonseed as an affordable alternative feed source to supplement commercial concentrates.

Whole cottonseed is a good source of fiber, protein, energy and fat that can stimulate butterfat production in dairy herds.

But, it is important to store and handle whole cottonseed properly to maintain its

quality as a feed supplement.

For storage, a simple bin with plywood sides, concrete floor and a roof is adequate. Seed may be handled with a scoop-type shovel or a front-end auger, but it will not flow through an auger.

Feed cottonseed whole, not ground, since the lint from the seed will clog the screen on most grinders.

Although whole cottonseed is an attractive feed source, there may be problems for some farmers.

Adequate facilities for feeding outside are needed. Cows generally will not consume whole cottonseed alone, so it has to be mixed with other feeds.

Contact the Extension office for more information about whole cottonseed as a feed source in dairy herds.

## Chatting With Your Home Economist

### Be A Thoughtful Holiday Guest

The holiday season is a time for friends and relatives to share each other's company, often for two or three days. But, it is important to be a considerate guest when staying in someone else's home.

When friends know each other well enough to spend a few days together, they know each other well enough to share the chores of meal preparation, setting the table and cleaning up after the meal.

If sharing is appropriate with close friends, it is especially appropriate with relatives.

Offer your help sincerely, but not so insistently that your host or hostess feels rushed or that you think they cannot manage without you.

A good hostess plans ahead for meals with guests so there is time to share the visit. Light breakfasts are ideal since they require little preparation. If the midday meal is a heavy one, a light evening meal will be appreciated by most guests.

If fruits, nuts, and candies are available on a self-serve basis, adult guests should establish firm rules with their own children about the quantity, timing and cleanliness associated with eating between meals. Candy wrappers, nutshells, and fruit peels left carelessly about can spoil the pleasantness for everyone.

Remember the Golden Rule of the kitchen: The host or hostess directs all the kitchen and dining activities.

Parents should establish firm rules for their own children's behavior. Loud voices and vigorous physical activity should be discouraged inside the home. Leaving the bathroom clean and making bathroom visits brief under crowded circumstances are other helpful hints.

Adult guests staying overnight should make their own beds and those of their small children. They should supervise older children who may be given responsibility for making a bed or removing temporary bedding.

Visiting children should

not be afforded privileges forbidden the children of the host family and vice versa.

Adult guests should exercise close supervision over the children's use of toys and equipment and access to dangerous power tools and weapons in the home they visit.

Children often have conflicts with siblings or children of relatives or friends over a period of even a few days. Here again firm rules and prompt supervision from adult guests are needed even when house rules are enforced by the host or the hostess.

Plan ahead for some enjoyable activity a child can do alone when too much togetherness becomes a problem. Separation of children for brief periods can help relieve holiday stress when strained situations occur.

Preschool children should have a quiet time for a nap. Plenty of rest can relieve or prevent tension and irritable behavior.

### Pumpkin Pie

Pastry for 10-inch pie shell  
3 cups cooked or canned pumpkin, mashed  
1 cup sugar  
1 cup brown sugar  
1 teaspoon salt  
1 teaspoon ground cinnamon  
1 teaspoon ground nutmeg  
1 teaspoon ground ginger  
1/4 teaspoon ground cloves  
1/4 teaspoon ground allspice  
4 eggs, slightly beaten  
1/4 cup butter or margarine, melted

Mix together the mashed pumpkin, sugar, brown sugar, salt, cinnamon, nutmeg, ginger, cloves and allspice. Add the slightly beaten eggs and the melted butter. Mix well and pour into prepared pie shell. Bake at 450 degrees F. for 10 minutes, then reduce heat to 325 degrees F. and cook until the center is set.

### Consider 1985 Feed Grain Program, Farmers Advised

Corn production is expected to total 7.50 billion bushels this year, 80 percent more than last year and 9 percent below the record high 1982 crop, according to USDA's October crop production report. Current projections for corn carryover stocks, however, are less than 1.1 billion bushels.

Howard R. Bridges, chairperson of the Tishomingo County ASCS Committee, said to keep corn supplies in line with demand, strong participation in the 10 percent acreage reduction program for feed grains is needed. "Although the program does

not contain paid land diversion, it offers farmers both price and income protection." Farmers who decide to enroll in the feed grain program may request 50 percent of their projected deficiency payments in advance. "These payments provide program participants with a cash flow for their fall land preparation and other expenses," Bridges said. Deficiency payments are made to farm program participants when the national average market price falls below the government-established target price for the crop during the first five months of the marketing year.

Farmers who plant no more than 90 percent of their feed grain base will be eligible for federal target price guarantees of \$3.03 per bushel for corn, \$2.88 for grain sorghum, \$2.60 for barley and \$1.60 a bushel for oats. They are also eligible for price support loans at \$2.55 per bushel for corn, \$2.42 for sorghum, \$2.08 for barley and \$1.31 per bushel for oats.

"We encourage feed grain producers to consider the program benefits in relation to their farm operations and take advantage of the opportunity to control carryover stocks by placing 10 percent of their feed grain base in the acreage conservation reserve," the ASCS official said.

Signup for the 1985 acreage reduction programs

began on October 3, 1984.

### TOBACCO BLINDNESS

If you or some member of your family uses tobacco to excess, this can sometimes have an adverse effect on vision because of circulation problems. In extreme cases, it may even cause tobacco blindness. This is a form of amblyopia in which the central vision becomes impaired or even destroyed, resulting in loss of ability to read or discern detail. In less extreme cases, heavy smoking may cause a blurring of vision along with numbness or tingling of the fingers.

The nicotine and other chemicals in tobacco are believed to interfere with the normal circulation of the blood throughout the body, including the tiny blood vessels in the

eyes. This is a more serious condition than the heavy smoke believed to be prone to cause heart and lung cancer. Cutting down on use of tobacco, number of cigarettes smoked and length of time of the cigarette smoked, often has beneficial effects on circulation problems. Also consider a change in diet, likelihood of disease and lung problems as well as problems caused by poor circulation.

## Her Dream - 1st Teacher On Shuttle

Hendersonville science teacher, Sue McPherson, wants to be the school teacher President Reagan has offered to send into outer space on the Space Shuttle.

"This has sort of been a dream for me that I would be able to go into space," McPherson said.

"I would love to convey the real excitement of what it would be like to go in the Space Shuttle, and I feel I could do that."

McPherson, 38, who stands four feet, 10 inches tall, teaches chemistry and physics at Hawkins Junior High School.

She paid \$250 to spend a weekend last month at the National Space and Aeronautics Administration Center in Huntsville, Ala., to learn about space suits and models of the shuttle. NASA

offers the program to people interested in the shuttle.

And McPherson's already notified NASA officials in Washington of her interest.

At the Huntsville meeting, NASA officials said the chosen teacher will have to endure some physical training and some studying and be willing to meet with press and talk about it all.

The first shuttle flight carrying a civilian will probably be in 1986.

"I feel I can do it," McPherson said. "I have the initiative. And being a teacher is not exciting all of the time."

McPherson said she is pleased that a teacher will be the first civilian in outer space - rather than a journalist or artist, people also considered - because "I think teachers can communicate to the public how outer space can help benefit society."

Outer space is valuable because medical and industrial compounds difficult to achieve on earth could be manufactured there, she said. Establishing a space station or having manned missions to Mars could increase human understanding of outer space, she added.

NASA officials in Huntsville told her that apparently two teachers will be trained, and one will actually go into space.

In space, the teacher will probably assist the crew with assignments.

McPherson, the mother of two boys, was born in Alabama and lived in Mississippi before coming to Nashville to attend David Lipscomb College. Her husband, Roman, is an insurance salesman.

Q: I entered into an agreement with an acquaintance to buy his house for \$50,000. I paid him \$10,000 earnest money. He has informed me that he has changed his mind and refuses to complete the sale. He has also refused to return my earnest money. Can he refuse to return my earnest money?

A: Contracts for the sale of real estate, including a down payment and lot, must generally be in writing to be enforceable. Unless your seller has signed some written memorandum setting forth the basic terms of your agreement, you are not bound by the contract. You can, however, sue him for return of your earnest money.

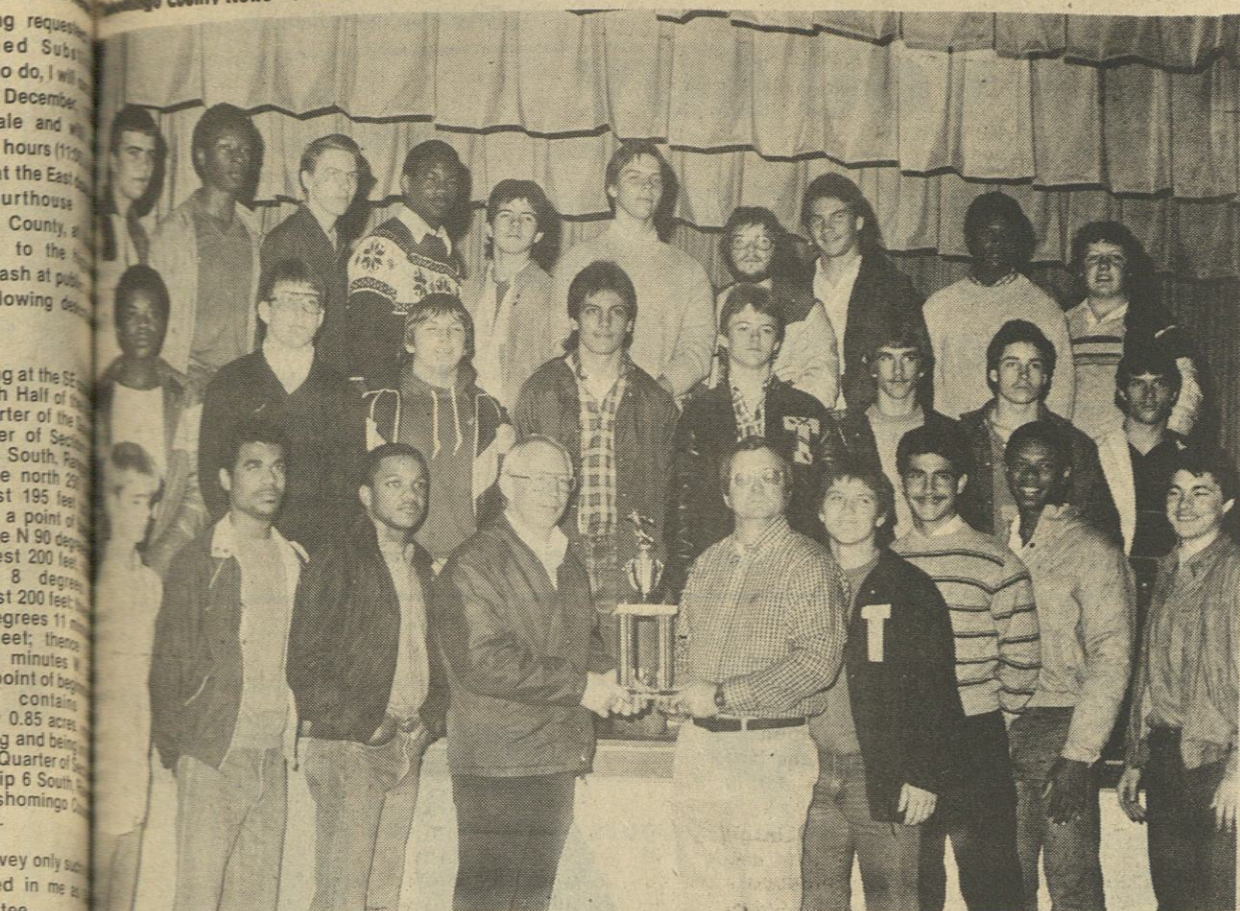

### Holiday Highway Safety

Many families will be traveling and becoming reunited over the upcoming holidays, but the potential for losing loved ones in highway accidents is particularly great during this period, according to the Governor's Highway

### Safety Program (GHSP).

"One of the best ways to avoid death or serious injury if a crash occurs," said Carolyn Evans, GHSP state occupant protection coordinator, "is to have the entire family buckled up with safety belts and, if there are young children with child restraint systems. By making this a 'family affair,' you will be taking a big step toward ensuring that your family celebrations are not marred by the death or serious injury of a loved one."

Ms. Evans noted that "drunk driving increases substantially over the holidays. Buckling up is one of your best defenses against those who are driving under the influence of alcohol or drugs. "It's the 'second collision,' when occupants of a vehicle who are not wearing safety belts or child restraints are thrown into the vehicle's windshield, steering wheel, doors, dashboard or other interior surfaces, that usually

kills or seriously injures," she said. "Also, when the driver is thrown away from the vehicle's steering wheel and brakes, there's no chance of controlling the vehicle after a crash or when it slips on wet or icy pavement."

"Some people think it's safer to be thrown clear of the vehicle during a crash," Ms. Evans noted, "but, to get clear, you might crash through the windshield, fly through a door into a roadside object or be scraped along the pavement. Then, the vehicle you were in could roll on top of you or another vehicle drive over you. Your chances of being killed are 25 times greater if you are thrown from the vehicle."

She also dispelled the popular myth that high speed is involved in most accidents. "Statistics indicate that more than 80 percent of all accidents occur at speeds of less than 40 miles per hour, and most accidents occur within 25 miles of your home."

Ms. Evans also emphasized the importance of using safety belts and child restraints correctly. "Be sure you know how to use them to gain the most benefits," she said, "and take the time to use the safety belt or child restraint system as it was intended to be used."

Noting that some families don't use child restraint devices because they believe they are too costly, Ms. Evans said that "many hospitals, service clubs and other organizations have child restraint systems to loan for a very low fee or without charge. It's not a case of not being able to afford a child restraint system. If you have small children, you can't afford not to have this important protection."

Even with the widespread availability of child restraint systems, she indicated that "we still need organizations to take on child restraint system loaner programs. It's an ideal lifesaving project."

A: Ordinarily, there is no duty on the part of the landowner to protect a trespasser from dangers on his property. Intruders who come without permission have no right to demand that the owner provide them with

a safe place to trespass. When trespassers enter, they must assume the risk of what they encounter. So, you would probably not be responsible.

## Letter To The Editor

Dear Editor:

Clay County completed tax appraisal in 1979 and has updated the rolls each year since. When I received my 1984 tax bill, I could not understand why the taxes on my house and 4 acre lot for 1984 was up 53% over 1983. Especially since the Board of Supervisors set the millage rate to bring in the same ad valorem tax as 1983.

After a bit of investigation, I found that the tax burden, due to action taken in the Mississippi Legislature in Jackson, has been shifted to the homeowners of the county. While the taxes on homes have been increasing at an alarming rate the taxes paid by public utilities have been falling at a very fast clip.

The following table will show how the tax burden has shifted.

These figures are from Clay County, Mississippi. How does this compare with your county?

The above figures show who is getting big tax breaks and who is making up the difference. (I know that public utilities are supposed to pass on savings to customers. How can a railroad pass any savings to a homeowner in the county? How can Mississippi Valley Gas pass on savings to homeowners when the area is not served?) This uneven tax burden has been put upon the homeowner by the actions of the State Legislature. Laws passed by this body have permitted the utilities to shift the tax burden to homeowners of the state.

First, according to Bill Minor in the Clarion Ledger on October 14, 1984, "House Speaker Buddy Newman appeared before the State Tax Commission in behalf of reducing the assessment of Southern Natural Gas Company on whose payroll he remains. Newman has done this for years." This has enabled this class of property to receive favorable treatment in this body. Reliable estimates place the savings in taxes to this group at \$60,000,000 (million) in 1984 alone. Homeowners in the counties of the state have been forced to shoulder this additional burden. Second, the public utilities are permitted to depreciate their property while the homeowner is appraised at current market value. This appraisal is done by professional appraisers. If I had been able to depreciate my home as the utilities are permitted to do. The appraisal on my home would be \$10,000 instead of \$50,000. The homeowner is faced with continuing increase in appraisal while the utilities are permitted to decrease their appraisal. I am sure this could be corrected to some degree if the homeowner was permitted to make his own appraisal.

This is a very complex situation that I do not understand. But, since our state senators and representatives debated and voted on the issue maybe they could schedule public meetings to explain why the homeowner

of the state should pick up the tab for the public utilities.

## IRS Has 746 Undelivered Refund Checks For 1983 & Prior Years

Undelivered refund checks for last year and prior years are waiting to be claimed by 746 Mississippians.

IRS District Director Sylvia Wren today issued a list of names of Mississippi taxpayers to whom refund checks were mailed but were returned to the IRS as undeliverable.

Wren said, "These refunds total \$267,575 and range from \$1.00 to \$15,103.00 with the average being \$358.68."

The director stated that it is not necessary for anyone whose name appears on the list to consult or engage the service of a "locating" or "searching" service or for anyone else to obtain information with respect to their refund check. "One need only establish his or her identity and right to receive the check" Wren added. Calling the IRS toll-free telephone number (1-800-424-1040) or addressing a letter to the Internal Revenue Service; Refund Inquiry Unit; 100 West

Capitol Street, Suite 504; Jackson, Mississippi 39269, which includes the following information:

1. Your name and address exactly as shown on the tax return;
  2. Your present name and address if different from that shown on the return;
  3. The tax year for which the refund is believed due;
  4. The amount of refund claimed and any other pertinent information needed to verify the claim; and
  5. Your signature (do not print). If it is a joint return, both spouses must sign.
- Wren added that some Mississippians don't receive their refunds for various

reasons such as moving, leaving no forwarding address, errors on tax return, or death of the taxpayer.

## STATE UNEMPLOYMENT RATE DROPS SLIGHTLY

Mississippi's unemployment rate dropped slightly to 10.6 percent in October, a decrease of one-tenth of a percentage point compared to September's revised jobless rate of 10.7 percent, according to Mississippi Employment Security Commission Executive Director Cohen Robertson. Last year's October unemployment rate was 10.4 percent.

The 10.6 percent unemployment rate for the state was higher than the 7.0 percent national rate for October. Mississippi Employment Security Commission figures showed 118,100 unemployed and 993,400 employed out of a civilian labor force of 1,111,500. The initial unemployment insurance claims totaled 22,855 in October.

Fifty-six of the state's 82 counties had unemployment

rates of 10.0 percent or higher in October. Of that number, three counties had unemployment rates in excess of 20.0 percent.

The counties having the highest unemployment rates in October were Kemper, with an unemployment rate of 24.3 percent; George, with 20.9 percent; and Greene, with 20.0 percent.

Rankin, DeSoto, and Pontotoc counties had the lowest jobless rates in October. Rankin had a rate of 5.1 percent; DeSoto, 6.4 percent; and Pontotoc, 7.0 percent.

Thirty-seven counties showed an increase in their unemployment rates from September to October, while forty-three counties reported decreases. The unemployment rate in two counties was unchanged.

disabled or dying Americans to receive health and social services in the comfort and privacy of their own homes.

The home health industry, which is currently serving the needs of 28,000 Mississippians, is a direct result of a nationwide movement to find less expensive and more humane ways to provide health care to our growing elderly population.

"Congress and Federal-State health planning agencies are finally discovering what we have known all along - home care supports the dignity and independence of our most vulnerable by keeping them out of hospitals and nursing homes for as long as possible," said Elaine M. Burchfield, President of the Mississippi Home Health Association.

"It keeps families together and offers a compassionate and low cost way to care for our loved ones," she reported in conjunction with National Home Care Week, November 25 - December 1.

The Mississippi Legislature, under severe budgetary pressures, is presently seeking alternatives to traditional high cost health care delivery systems, and home health care appears to be a viable cost-cutter, Mrs. Burchfield reported.

"In an era of skyrocketing

health care costs, home care offers an excellent alternative to institutional care both because it is less expensive and because it encourages the self-reliance and cooperative effort upon which this nation is founded," she said.

### Firearms Safety

Each year, primary care physicians in Mississippi and around the nation have the unfortunate experience of caring for victims of accidental firearms injuries. In most cases, adherence to basic rules of firearms safety would have prevented the injury or saved a life.

First and foremost, every gun must be handled AT ALL TIMES as if it were loaded and ready to fire. NEVER take the word of another person on this point.

Hunting accidents in which the victim is mistaken for game are never excusable. No game animal can be a legitimate target unless it can be clearly distinguished as to species. Obviously, the practice of shooting at an object moving in heavy cover before it can be identified is never justified.

Current laws which require the wearing of blaze orange during big game seasons have almost eliminated accidents in which hunters are mistaken for game animals. Many experts favor extending these laws to cover all firearms seasons.

Younger shooters should have a rigid course of instruction in safe firearms handling. If parents cannot provide this

training, they should call on other individuals and organizations to see that this is done. Local sports organizations can frequently help with safety instruction.

The practice of keeping LOADED guns in automobiles or homes for protection has, in the opinion of most experts, cost many more lives than it has saved. All firearms should be unloaded and kept out of the reach of children, preferably under lock and key.

Almost every shooting "accident" victim brought to emergency is the result of the disregard of one or more of the above rules for safe firearms handling.

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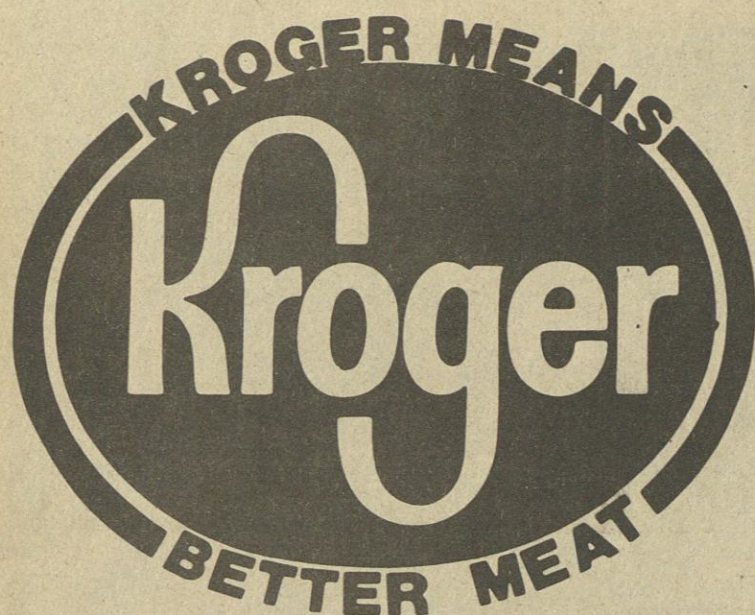

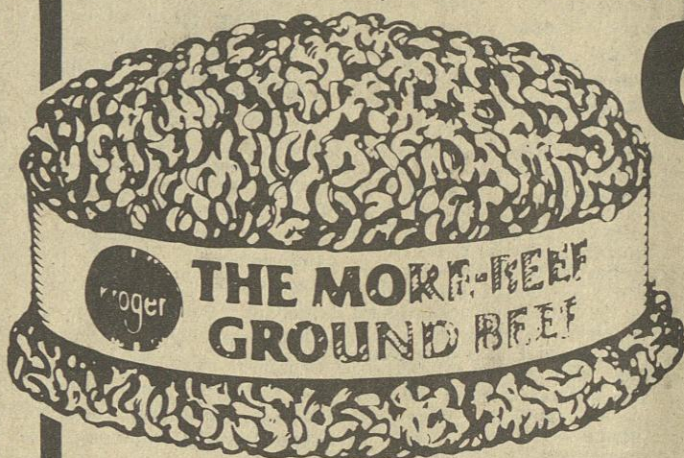
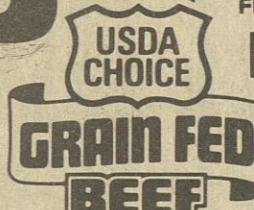
