Eastside Grocery Guttled By Fire

A \$10,000 reward is being offered by the State Fire Marshall's Office to anyone having information pertaining to the fire, according to State Fire Marshall Deputy Mike

shall's Office to persons having any information concerning the fire believed to be the vicious act of an arsonist, which destroyed Eastside Superette in Iuka early Thursday.

Fire Chief Floyd Whitaker stated the front glass was blown out and the structure of the building was completely encompassed with flames when he and

Fireman Danny McVay arrived. Deputy State Fire Marshall Mike Ivy is assisting the Police Department and Sheriff's Office in the investigation.

EASTSIDE SUPERETTE DESTROYED BY FIRE

Investigations into the mid-week fire destruction of Eastside Superette are being conducted by local authorities, assisted by State Fire Marshall's, who agree that evidence collected in the area points to arson.

The local grocery store, including inventory was completely destroyed by flames Thursday morning, December 29.

A \$10,000 reward is being offered by the State Fire Marshall's Office to anyone having information pertaining to the fire, according to State Fire Marshall Deputy Mike

Ivy. Persons having any knowledge in regard to the suspicious burning of the store will be kept confidential, Ivy said, with the informant being assured that identity would remain anonymous. Ivy also pointed out that anyone giving such information would not have to testify in court.

City Policeman Bobby James was notified via phone call of the 4:00 a.m. fire and alerted the Iuka Fire Department. Fireman Danny McVay recalled the front glass of the building was blown out and the structure to be completely engulfed in flames at their arrival. He

stated the fire was so intense that their efforts to extinguish it were futile.

The State Fire Marshall Deputy said samples from the ash ruins have been sent to the State Crime Laboratory and noted that results of some of the evidence may take 3-4 weeks. He said it was being investigated as an arson fire.

Eastside Superette had been under new management since August, serving the area with grocery items and bait and fish supplies. Prior to the blaze a grand opening ceremony was planned for the subsequent weekend with a variety of advertised

specials.

A figure of the estimated loss of the building and contents was said to be well over \$100,000.

T.V.A. Plans Public Meeting

In order to discuss plans for a fleet area at the junction of the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway and the Tennessee River, representatives from TVA have scheduled a public information meeting for 7 p.m. (CST), Thursday, December 6, at the J.P. Coleman State Park Lodge.

A fleet area, or "parking lot for barges," is necessary to coordinate waterway tow traffic. The meeting is designed to inform local residents and others with recreation and towing interests about the importance of fleet area on the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway scheduled to open in June of next year.

TENN-TOM WATERWAY TO OPEN IN EARLY 1985

The 234 mile-long, man-made inland water route, known as the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway, is scheduled for opening to through traffic early next year.

The estimated \$1.992 billion Waterway has been under construction by the U.S. Corps of Engineers since 1972, and the opening of this water route, which provides a link between two existing navigation waterways in the Southeastern United States, will permit barge and recreational traffic from the Tennessee and connecting rivers to travel directly to the Gulf of Mexico via the deep water harbor at Mobile, Ala.

At its southern end, the waterway follows the Tombigbee River for 149 miles and connects at Demopolis, Ala., with the Black Warrior River, which flows into the Gulf of Mexico at Mobile, Ala. Above the river section is a 46 mile-long chain of lakes canal section, and the northern terminus of the Waterway is a 39 mile-long cut through the geographic divide between the Tennessee and Tombigbee River Valleys with the common borders of Mississippi, Alabama and Tennessee.

The Tenn-Tom connects some 16,000 miles of inland waterways and provides a new route to the Gulf of Mexico for commerce between the interior of the United States and the deep water port at Mobile, as well as other ports on the Gulf.

To maintain year-round navigation the waterway, which has a 300' wide by 9' deep channel, has five locks and dams and five separate locks which impound 44,000 surface acres of water. From south to north, the five locks

and dams include: Gainesville L&D; Aliceville L&D; Columbus L&D; Aberdeen L&D; and Bay Springs L&D, which is located in Tishomingo County. The five locks include: Lock A & B, near Amory, Ms.; Lock C, near Fulton; and Locks E & D, near Bay Springs. Each lock is 110 feet wide by 600 feet long and they have an average lift of 28 feet, with the exception of Bay Springs, which has an 84 foot lift.

The engineers are now closing gates at five dams and locks in the Canal Section and the water basins above them are being filled to assure barge depth in the channel. The Divide Section north of the Canal Section is complete, and the River Section south of the canal lakes has been open to traffic for some time.

In late February of this year, the first commercial tow passed through the Divide Section of the Waterway, enroute to the Bay Springs Lock and Dam. According to Jerry Rainer, a representative of the Nashville District of the Corps of Engineers, "The opening of this section will allow barges and other water traffic to travel farther south on the Tenn-Tom. Before, barges could go no farther south than Bay Springs because Locks D and E were not finished. The opening of the entire Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway will make a historical event for Mississippi, Alabama and Tennessee."

We are very much looking forward to the February 1, scheduled opening," Rainer explained. The Waterway is also designed to provide extensive recreational benefits in the form of water sports, lakeside camping, picnicking and hunting of both waterfowl and

upland game. Some 125,000 acres of land bordering the Tenn-Tom have been set aside for recreational purposes and additional land may be acquired for wildlife habitat.

After the pools are filled

and a 9-foot-deep barge canal is assured throughout the 234 miles connecting the Tennessee and Tombigbee Rivers, only the removal of some grade level railroad crossings stand in the way of cargo movement on the important new Waterway.

HARDIN COUNTY JURY FINDS IUKA MAN GUILTY

A Tishomingo County man was found guilty of voluntary manslaughter Tuesday in Hardin County, Tenn.

Clyde Ledbetter, 32, of Route 5, Iuka, was found guilty following two days of testimony in the Circuit Court session held in Savannah, Tenn. Ledbetter remains under a \$10,000 cash bond.

The case was heard by Judge James L. England, of the 24th Judicial District of Tennessee. Sentencing of Ledbetter is set for February 1, 1985.

Ledbetter was involved in the shooting death of his first cousin, Bobby Joe Ledbetter,

31, also of Iuka, which occurred February 11, 1984. The incident took place at a nightspot known as "Danny's Place" located on U.S. Highway 57 South, near the Mississippi/Tennessee State Line.

The victim died as a result of gunshot wounds to the head and shoulder. The weapon used in the shooting was identified as a .22 magnum rifle.

Ledbetter was represented by Ron E. Harmon, of Savannah. The case is expected to be appealed, Ledbetter said, following the February sentencing.

B'VILLE RECEIVES SEWER GRANT OF \$105,524

On Friday, November 30, 1984, Beverly Hogan, Director of CDBG, called Mayor A.T. Marlar, Jr., and informed him that the Town of Burnsville would receive \$105,524.00 of CDBG monies. This completes three years of work by Mayor Marlar to build a lagoon system. This type of system will enable the Town of Burnsville to replace the mechanical treatment plant that has cost thousands of dollars in operating costs.

The new lagoon system will cost approximately \$300.00 per month to operate, compared to \$2400.00 per month for the mechanical treatment plant. The CDBG monies is in addition to \$189,956.00 funded by EPA and \$12,663.00 funded by ARC. Total project cost \$308,143.00.

Mayor Marlar will begin advertisement for bids in late December with construction set to begin in late February of 1985.



Observing Ribbon Cutting

RIBBON CUTTING CEREMONY HELD TO OPEN HWY. 72 FOUR LANE

Northern District Highway Commissioner Zack Stewart cut the ribbon Friday, November 30, tentatively opening the new U.S. 72 four-lane near Iuka connecting Mississippi 25 with the Alabama State Line.

The paving project of this new four-lane was constructed by the Columbus Company of Columbus, Ga., on a contract of \$5.6 million. The project was let May 24, 1983.

"This paving contract was the first job to utilize "Job Bill" money secured by

Congressman Jamie Whitten," Commissioner Stewart pointed out.

This project is unique in that it is the first of its type to be used in the state in modern time. This particular project was constructed with plain concrete without continuous steel reinforcement bars. This process uses limestone as the aggregate.

At the load transfer points, dowel pins were used to strengthen the concrete. This type of pavement has been used nationwide and has

proven to be an effective method for highway use, Stewart said.

Following the ribbon cutting ceremonies, a reception was hosted by the County Supervisors and the Tishomingo County Development Foundation in the annex of First Citizens National Bank in the Town of Tishomingo.

Stewart told those present at the reception that the four-laning of U.S. 72 to Corinth should be completed in about three years.

The Commissioner said the contract on a 3.8 mile segment between Iuka and Burnsville was let in June. Completion date for this \$9.8 million contract is set for December of 1986 with Hill Brothers Construction Company, of Falkner, contractors.

The remaining 13 mile section between Burnsville and Corinth is expected to be let by mid-1985, Stewart said. The cost of this project was estimated to be near \$20 million and take up to three years to complete.

Forage Testing

Producers who grow and store their own forages should have these feeds tested to maximize the nutritional value.

The first key to a sound nutrition program is putting up the best quality forage possible. The second key is determining the actual quality of the forage and supplementing properly.

Beef and dairy producers can reduce reproductive failures and increase profits through forage testing.

Supplementing a poor quality forage properly can be very expensive, but failure to do so will result in reduced conception rates, lowered weaning weights and fewer calves weaned.

A good feeding program can determine the survival rate in a cow-calf operation or the amount of milk produced by a dairy herd.

A producer who feeds

based on average forage nutrient values could be wasting money on unnecessary supplements and probably overfeeding some cows if his forages are above average.

On the other hand, if the forage is below average, cows are underfed and money is lost due to reduced production.

A cow's nutritional needs should be met as closely as possible in order to maximize yields and enhance profits.

A good feeding program is based on a high-quality forage that will increase the daily feed intake, stimulate milk production and keep cows healthier. It will also reduce feed costs because less grain and protein supplements must be purchased.

The Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service provides a forage testing service free of charge. A producer can have five sam-

ples tested or a total of \$100 worth of free forage tests between April 1 and March 31 annual.

Last year only 897 samples were tested. Many of these samples were from the same operation. Since there are about 38,000 farm operations in Mississippi with cattle, there is a strong potential for most forage tests.

Tishomingo County farmers should take advantage of this service in order to better manage their herd's nutrition.

Storing & Cooking Venison

During the next few weeks, you may be among the many Mississippi families who have a little or a lot of venison available with which to vary your menus.

Storage and cooking methods are important to flavor and tenderness. Experienced hunters know how important it is to protect natural goodness of wild deer meat immediately after slaughter. If a deer is bled, dressed and cooled immediately after slaughter, there's a good chance that its flavor will be desirable after it is cooked. If this is not done, later care and cooking skills are of little value to the flavor and tenderness of the meat.

Hunters need to know how they will care for their kill when they bring it home. Most hunters have access to a frozen food locker or custom meat plant where wild meat is processed. However, policies vary as to the type of processing done within a plant and times at which wild meat is accepted.

Even hunters who can cut up a deer carcass are likely to need the services of a meat plant. Aging for three to 10 days at 38 to 40 degrees F. improves the flavor of deer meat. Quick freezing services are also needed by hunters who plan to store a quantity

of meat.

To store more than 15 to 20 pounds of unfrozen meat in a home freezer involves two risks: (1) spoilage of deer cuts before they freeze; and (2) quality loss of the frozen food that is already in the home freezer. Adding unfrozen food to a freezer introduces warm air which temporarily increases the inside temperature of the freezer. Until the freezer stabilizes at the colder temperature again, frozen food may thaw slightly and decrease in quality.

Adequate wrapping, so necessary for quality retention in all frozen foods, is of even greater importance when freezing deer. To prevent any drying of meat surfaces, freezer wrapping paper should be implemented by sealing wrapped cuts in freezer-type plastic bags. Possibly because of its low fat content, deer cuts keep excellent quality in a good home freezer for a year or longer. Ground venison should be used within six months after freezing.

After deer cuts reach the kitchen, practicing its cookery secrets helps to assure desirable flavor and tenderness. Some venison is fairly tender, but much is not. Even tender venison is dry. Moist heat cookery, such as braising (cooking with liquid in a covered pan), is a safe method for all deer, though loin cuts from young animals may broil or roast well.

The Tishomingo County Soil and Water Conservation District Commissioners would like to thank the Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors who provided financial support for our District's programs; the Soil Conservation Service for providing technical assistance to landowners for installation of conservation practices; the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service for providing cost-share assistance to install conservation practices; the Cooperative Extension Service for conducting an information and education program that keeps our farmers up to date on new agricultural activities; the Mississippi Forestry Commission for providing valuable assistance to our woodland landowners in the form of fire protection, tree planting and forestry management; many other activities were made possible by assistance from Tishomingo County Vocational Center, Tennessee Valley Authority, Monsanto Chemical Company, Tennessee River Pulp and Paper Company and Coca-Cola Company. Finally, we would like to thank the people of Tishomingo County who have worked and cooperated with us to promote the conservation and wise use of our natural resources.

The District Commissioners sponsored many activities during the fiscal year 1984. Among the most significant accomplishments were:

1. Developed and carried out a work plan for fiscal year 1984.

2. Sponsored "Tree Planting Week" February 6-10 in which 12,000 trees were given away that week. Approximately 1500 Tishomingo County school children received trees to plant.

3. Conducted annual membership drive in the Mississippi Association of Conservation Districts.

4. Sponsored Upland Game Management Seminar November 1983.

5. Sponsored Beaver Trapping Seminar December 1983.

6. Co-sponsored with the Mississippi Forestry Commission and Tennessee River Pulp and Paper Co. a Forestry Field Day held March 1984.

7. Co-sponsored with Monsanto Chemical Company a No-Till Seminar April 1984.

8. Co-sponsored with Extension Service a Conservation Farm Tour that was held September 18, 1984. Emphasis was placed on No-Till Farming and Pasture Improvement.

9. The District purchased a TIE 10' No-Till Drill to promote, educate and demonstrate no-till farming techniques among county farmers. Financial aid was provided by the Tennessee Valley Authority of the amount of \$3,000.

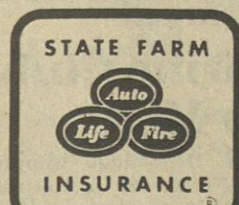
10. Cooperated with the Soil Conservation Service to provide technical assistance to 378 cooperators, assisted 232 cooperators apply one or more conservation practices, and developed soil and water conservation plans for 3,077 acres.

11. Worked with the ASCS County Committee to develop county agricultural cost-share program. The Soil Conservation Service cooperated

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In the program by providing technical assistance to landowners who signed up for conservation practices such as ponds, terraces, diversions, no-till, critical area planting, pasture establishment and improvement. In 1984 SCS serviced referrals for 175 practices.

12. 20 Bluebird boxes were distributed and erected throughout the county in March.

13. The District provided a half scholarship for one local school teacher to attend the "Teachers Environmental Education Workshop" at the Tupelo Branch of the University of Mississippi. The workshop was held in June.

14. The Soil Conservation Service cooperating with the District published 19 news articles and 23 radio programs on conservation topics throughout the year.

15. W.R. Wimbish received Outstanding Commissioner Award for Area IV in fiscal year 1984.

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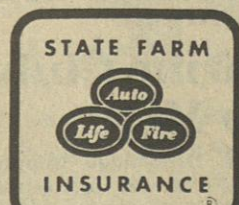
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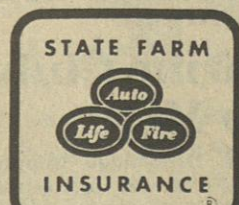


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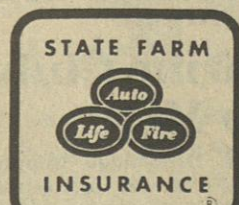


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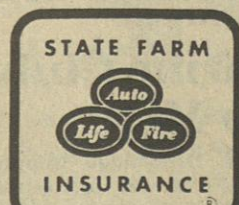


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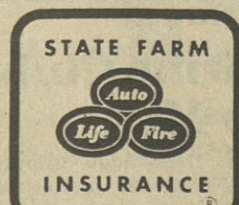


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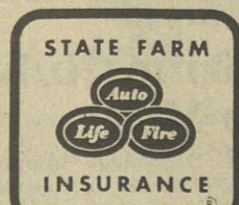


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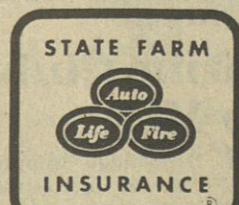


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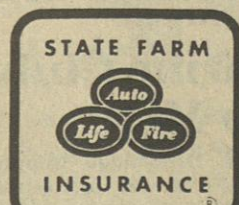


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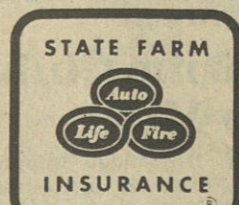


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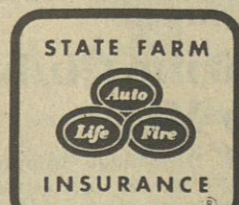

Mathenys Depart To Brazil

Randy, Vicki, and Micah Matheny, of Paragould, Ark., departed for Belo Horizonte, Brazil, on November 27, as a part of a team effort to establish a church in that state capitol of four million people. Vicki is the daughter of Bob and Jean Lambert, of Route 1, Iuka, and is a 1976 graduate of Tishomingo High School. storage to their farms.

Since the program opened in December, 1983 it has enabled farmers in the county to purchase about 597 bushels of lower grade, government-owned corn for their livestock and poultry. The ASCS official said farmers need to show evidence that their feed production and feed on hand is inadequate to maintain their foundation livestock and poultry during the 90-day feeding period, which begins when they apply for the program.

Cabin Reservations At Miss. State Parks

Reservations for vacation cabins at Mississippi state parks for 1985 will be accepted beginning January 2, 1985 at 8 a.m. Reservations may be made by contacting the individual park office during regular business hours, 8 a.m. - 5 p.m. Cabin reservations are not required but are strongly recommended.

Aubrey Rozzell, director of the Bureau of Recreation and Parks, has listed the rules that apply to cabin reservations:

1. One person may not make reservations for more than five cabins for one date, unless special approval is given by the district manager to accommodate family reunions, etc.
2. Reservations can be made for only one set of dates at a time.
3. First priority will be given to in-person requests, followed by telephone requests, and letters postmarked after January 1, 1985.

Minimum stay for the heavy use season - Memorial Day weekend through Labor Day weekend - is three nights. There is a two night minimum during other times of the year. Maximum stay during the heavy use season is 14 days.

A real estate broker with specialized experience in this field will be helpful.

POINT OF LAW

(Prepared by the Mississippi State Bar. Some rights may vary from locality to locality. Always consult an attorney when in doubt about your legal rights.)

Q: I'm 69 years old and very active in my own business. Since I retired from a corporate job four years ago, I've received monthly pension checks of \$215. I don't need the money now, and it irks me to pay taxes on it. Is there anything I can do to defer the tax?

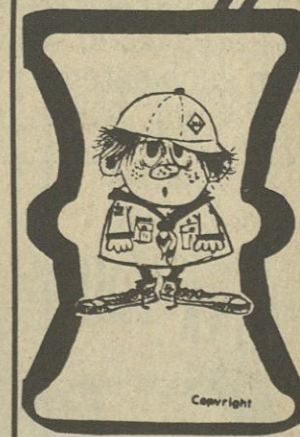
A: No, unfortunately. Once you start receiving a pension,

the money is taxable as ordinary income. Most companies require you to take your pension when you retire. Your only tax-deferral option would be to take some of the money you earn from your business and put into a Keogh Plan or an IRA (individual retirement account).

Q: My husband and I own 100 acres of idle farmland. Because we've held the property for 34 years, our capital-gains taxes would be severe if we sold it. How can we arrange a tax-free exchange of our property for other real estate?

A: Generally speaking, you must swap your investment property for other investment or income-producing property to postpone the capital-gains tax. In your case, the Internal Revenue Service considers unproductive land owned by individuals as being held for future profit, so it qualifies as

CHILDREN'S DIET

Child and adult nutrition differ in important ways. While adults need food for maintenance, youngsters must have additional nutrients for growth as well. Also, food patterns are hard to change in adulthood, but healthy habits in early life can carry over into maturity.

So it matters very much what children learn about eating and what attitudes they pick up from parents. Children should know they're not allowed to replace balanced vitamin and fiber-rich meals with sugary, fatty snacks. They should be used to milk and fruit juices instead of cola and other soft drinks that have no vitamins or calcium and may contain enough caffeine to make them nervous and jittery. Cereals should not be the pre-sweetened kind.

The ideal vitamin and mineral-rich diet for children includes mostly lean meats that are not smoked or cured, raw and lightly-cooked fresh vegetables, fresh fruits, and whole-grain breads. If you are not sure what your child is eating away from home, you may also want to add a vitamin-mineral formula for insurance. Your pediatrician or pharmacist can recommend a good supplement for children.

4-H NEWS

Hints For The Holiday Season
The days between the time the stockings are hung and the night Santa Claus finally comes sometimes seem agonizingly long for a child. Make the days seem shorter with a stocking counter.

Hang the stockings Dec. 1. Cut 24 pieces of ribbon 30 inches long. Tie one end of each 23 ribbons around a piece of wrapped candy. Sandwich the other end of each ribbon between gummed labels available from most gift shops. Number the labels from one to 23.

Label the 24th ribbon and tie it to an unbreakable ornament for the Christmas tree. Place the ornament and candy-laden ends of the ribbon streamers inside the stocking, beginning with the larger numbers and allowing the smaller numbers to rest on top to avoid tangles.

The child will only be able to see the streamers and the numbered labels. Each day the child can remove the numbered ribbon that corresponds with the date. When the ornament is taken from the stocking and placed on the tree, it will be Christmas Eve. The stocking will be empty just in time for Santa's full attention.

Gumdrop Wreath
As Christmas gets closer so do children's anticipation and excitement. Let children help decorate for the holidays to keep them from getting bored. A gumdrop wreath is an easy project that they can do in one afternoon.

Sort four (nine-ounce) packages of soft gumdrops by color. This will help the children to remember to use

all the colors all around the wreath.

Wrap a wire to make a loop for hanging and push in the back of a 12-inch Styrofoam wreath. Break round wooden toothpicks in half and push into the wreath. Press a gumdrop on the toothpick. Add more gumdrops. Place the gumdrops close enough together so they touch. Cover the wreath with gumdrops.

For a festive touch wrap wire around a fabric or ribbon bow and push into the wreath.

Children will need some supervision when breaking the toothpick and wrapping the wire.

Hang the wreath low enough for the children to reach. Do not be surprised to find bits of it missing during the holidays.

The Mississippi State Highway Department has scheduled a Public Hearing at Glen School, which is approximately seven miles east of Corinth on U.S. Highway 72, at 7:00 p.m. on Thursday, December 13, 1984, to discuss the proposed location and design of U.S. Highway 72 between Corinth and Burnsville.

The proposed projects would provide for improvements to existing U.S.

Highway 72 and would make a four-lane facility with partial control of access between the existing four-lane sections east of Corinth in Alcorn County and west of Burnsville in Tishomingo County, a distance of 10 miles. The improvements would consist of construction as follows: from the west terminus, east for 1.2 miles - a five-lane section by adding width to either side of the existing two lanes; for the next mile, add two lanes 88 feet south of the existing two lanes; construct the next 0.7 mile on new location providing four new lanes, divided over the railroad at Strickland; construct two new lanes north of the existing two-lanes for the next 5.6 miles at distances of 125 feet and 150 feet with appropriate transitions; construct four-lanes, divided on new location for the next 0.4 mile; construct two new lanes 64 feet south of the existing lanes for the remaining 1.1 miles to the eastern terminus of the project.

The exact location of the additional proposed work would differ some from that presented and approved during the location phase of project development. The reason for the changes was to reduce the impacts, primarily on additional housing units constructed in the area since the initial

study and approval in 1975.

During the public hearing, the Mississippi State Highway Department will discuss the proposed location and design, a schedule for right-of-way acquisition, the Department's Relocation Assistance Program, and the Draft Environmental Impact Statement.

The Preliminary Location and Design Study Report and Environmental Reevaluation will be available at the Mississippi State Highway Department's District Office, Tupelo, Miss.; the Mississippi State Highway Department's Project Office, Corinth, Miss.; the office of Mayor A.T. Marlar, Jr., Burnsville, Miss.; the office of Mayor John D. Mercier, Corinth, Miss.; the Northeast Mississippi Planning and Development District, Booneville, Miss.; the Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors, Iuka, Miss.; and the Alcorn County Board of Supervisors, Corinth, Miss.

Mississippi Drunk & Drugged Driving Awareness Week

Gov. Bill Allain has proclaimed Dec. 9-15 as Mississippi Drunk and Drugged Driving Awareness Week.

The proclamation corresponds with a joint congressional resolution designating the week as National Drunk and Drugged Driving Awareness Week. "Drunk and drugged

driving is Mississippi's most serious highway safety problem," said Roy Thigpen, the governor's representative for highway safety and director of the Governor's Office of Criminal Justice Planning. "It is particularly important to focus our attention upon responsible, safe driving during the holiday season when our citizens travel throughout the state to visit families and friends. The most important step is not to mix drinking and drugs when driving, but it's also important to drive defensively in avoiding crashes caused by another driver who is driving under the influence of alcohol and drugs."

The Governor's Highway Safety Program estimates that drunk and drugged driving have roles in 62 percent of Mississippi's fatal highway crashes.

"Citizens across the state can do much to combat the needless death and injuries that result from drunk and drugged driving," Thigpen noted. He recommended that: --All occupants of vehicles use safety belts.

--Any observation of suspicious driving be reported to the police. This includes weaving, straying off the road and erratic braking.

--Hosts not be overly generous with alcoholic beverages, provide plenty of hearty food, stop serving drinks early and offer to drive tipsy individuals home or invite them to spend the night.

--Individuals be careful about mixing alcohol and drugs. Taking one antihistamine with one drink, for example, doubles the impairment effect of both.

--Persons in commercial establishments where drinks are served urge bartenders to send over-imbibers home by alternative transportation, such as dial-a-ride, designated drivers and taxicabs.

"Each holiday season, families are saddened by the loss of loved ones because of drunk and drugged driving," Thigpen noted. "You're not being kind to a person by permitting the individual to drive after drinking alcoholic beverages or taking drugs, and you're not being kind by failing to report suspected drunk or drugged driving to the police. Those who 'look the other way' in these situations could contribute to the death or serious injury of the drunk or drugged driver

and the driver's victims.

"Drunk and Drugged Driving Awareness Week is a time for Mississippians to take steps," he said, "to prevent the tragedies that result from this most serious of our highway safety problems."

CHOKING:

What To Do In An Emergency

Last night at dinner, my husband choked on a piece of meat. He coughed it up and was okay, but I would like to know what to do if that should happen again.

Choking a major cause of accidental death in this country, occurs when food or some other foreign object blocks the windpipe or air passages to the lungs. Large, poorly chewed pieces of food can cause choking. In adults, the food is usually meat; in children, it may be food or any object small enough to fit in the mouth.

If you see someone choking, ask the person to try to speak. Any sound, even strangled choking noises or hoarse coughing, means the airway is only partially blocked. In this case, don't interfere. Coughing is the body's natural defense against choking, and it may clear away whatever is blocking the windpipe.

However, if you see any evidence of difficulty in breathing and the person is unable to make any sounds, the airway is totally blocked and no oxygen is reaching the lungs.

In this case, you must act immediately. Every second counts. A person cannot live without oxygen for more than four to six minutes. If time

allows, call your fire department rescue squad, but don't stand around waiting for them to come. If you have been unable to dislodge the object from the person's throat by the time the fire department arrives, its trained personnel can take over.

Meanwhile, you can help. Several firm blows to the back of a choking person is often effective in clearing an obstructed airway. If this does not work, the next step should be the Heimlich maneuver. Developed by Dr. Henry Heimlich, this maneuver is recognized by many in the health care field today as an effective way to assist a choking person.

Stand behind the person and use both hands to press a closed fist into the abdomen, slightly below the lower end of the breast bone, thumb side against the abdomen. An inward and upward thrust forces a flow of air from the lungs, which in turn expels the object from the airway. You may find it necessary to repeat the Heimlich maneuver several times before you are successful.

If the person is seated, kneel behind his chair and reach around the back of the chair to perform this maneuver. If the person has fallen unconscious to the floor, place him on his back, face upward and then kneel astride his thighs, facing him. Place one hand on top of the other with the heel of your bottom hand slightly above the navel and below the rib cage. Press inward and upward on the abdomen with a quick thrust as many times as is necessary to dislodge the object.

This latter method should also be used if you cannot reach around the victim's waist.

If you are alone and you are choking, you can place a fist on your abdomen, grasp it with the other hand and press into your abdomen with a series of thrusts until you have expelled the object.

The Heimlich maneuver should never be practiced on a nonchoking person because of the potential for damage to the ribs and underlying organs.

There are several simple ways to reduce your risks of choking. Cut your food into small pieces and chew slowly and thoroughly. Avoid laughing and talking while chewing and swallowing foods. This is especially important to teach children who tend to be active at the dinner table. Avoid excessive intake of alcohol before and during meals. Don't let children run and play with food, candy or other small objects in their mouths. And keep small objects out of the reach of small children and infants.

Tenn-Tom Pools Being Filled

The Army Corps of Engineers has scheduled raising the pools behind three additional locks on the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway, leaving only two remaining to be raised before all pools on the 234-mile-long waterway are at their

operational level.

Commencement of filling was set for this week for the pools at Locks C, D, and E at the upper end of the waterway's canal section. All three locks are in northeastern Mississippi.

There are a total of 10 locks and dams on the waterway's navigation channel. All are expected to be in operation and Tenn-Tom open to through navigation by February 1, 1985.

Raising the upper pools in the canal will leave only the pools at Locks A and B at the lower end to be brought to their full level and complete the raising of all pools on the waterway. This is expected to be accomplished in December.

When filled the pool at Lock C will cover 1,630 surface acres. Lock D pool will cover 1,980 acres and Lock E pool, 855 acres.

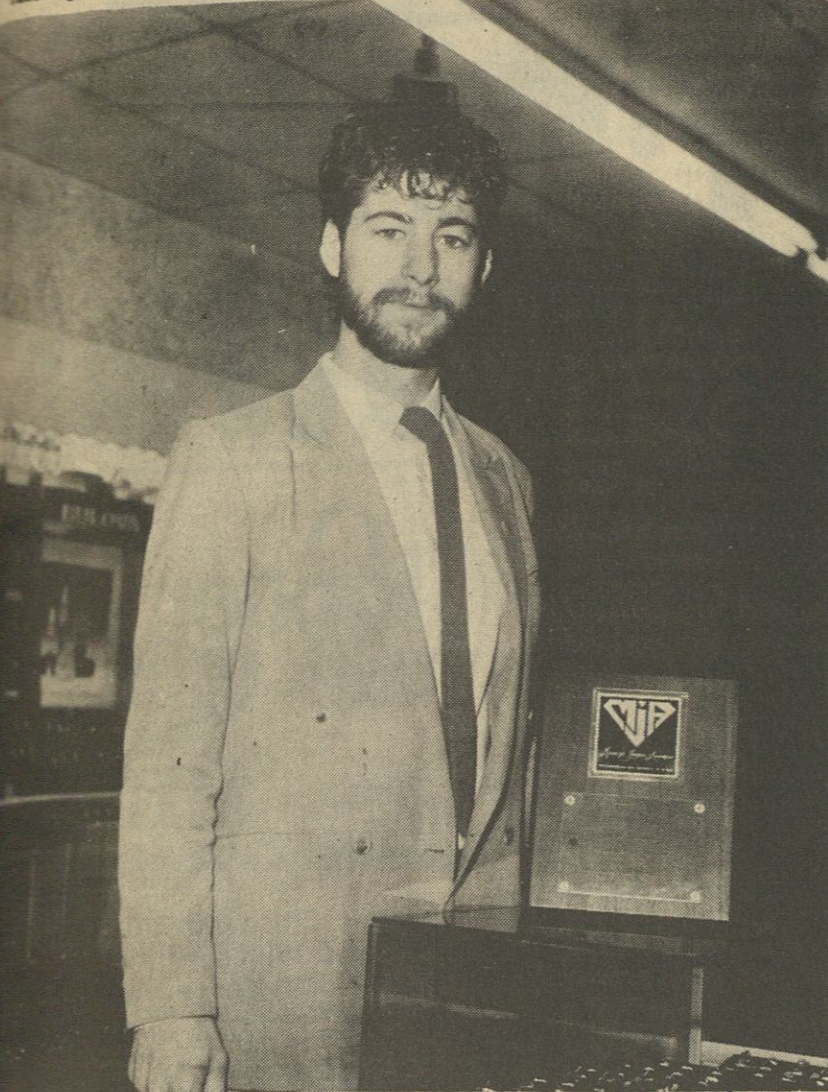

A wonderful Christmas gift for youngsters is a poster featuring members of the cast of the TV show "Fame" along with the legend, "You can't fly if you're high" and the slogan, "Don't let your lungs go to pot." The reverse of the poster is a Fame fan magazine that includes interviews of cast members explaining why achievers don't do drugs.

Also available is a parent's newsmagazine that tells how to bring up the subject of marijuana to children without evoking hostility. Both of these items and other information is available from the Mississippi Lung

Development of the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway, the most ambitious waterway project in the nation's history, affords new economic opportunities for Mississippi. But there is a danger that the state will miss some of those opportunities because of a lack of proper planning.

That is the conclusion of the Mississippi Economic Council after a study of the potential economic impact of the project.

The \$2 billion, 232-mile-long waterway will soon be open after 10 years' construction, but it appears that Mississippi isn't ready for it. In its report, just published, the Council said "fragmented coordination of the project at state and regional levels could be detrimental to the development of the waterway and its adjacent lands."

What the Council found was a good effort on the part of local communities in the Tenn-Tom region in preparing for the use of the waterway, but it found little concrete planning and coordination at the state level, and it found

little encouragement of local communities from regional or state levels.

The Council has outlined five steps as essential to the realization of the full potential of the waterway for Mississippi. It begins with the designation of a single agency -- perhaps the State Board of Economic Development -- as the agency responsible for identifying potential industrial sites along the waterway and developing a marketing plan for those sites.

Other steps include development of a master plan for development of the region, assistance to local communities in the area, development of recreational facilities, and encouragement for the development of an export trading company for the promotion of goods produced

in the region.

It is recognized that most of the benefits from the Tennessee-Tombigbee project will be long-range in scope; the good news is that, despite the late start, Mississippi still has time to take the actions necessary to assure maximum economic advantage from the nation's largest waterway development.

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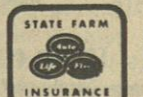
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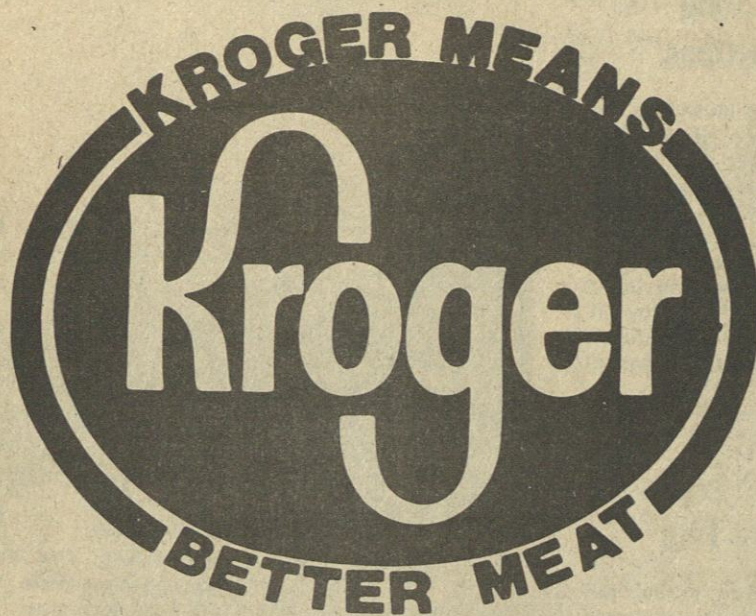
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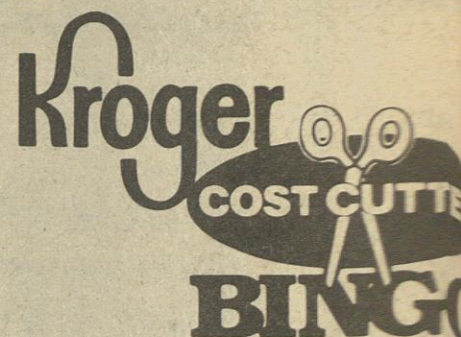
