Holiday School Closings

Area school students will be dismissed from classes Wednesday, December 19, in observance of the Holiday Season. Regular classes will resume Wednesday, January 2.

County Superintendent Alvia Blakney said students at Burnsville, Tishomingo and Belmont Schools will be given half-day semester exams Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, December 17, 18 & 19.

According to Dr. Jerry Stone, Superintendent of Iuka Separate Schools, the elementary school will dismiss students at 9:30 Wednesday, December 19, and high school students will be dismissed at 9:45. Classroom holiday parties will be held Wednesday morning at the elementary. It was noted the roll will not be checked at the high school that day.

Both the County and Iuka School Systems will resume normal school day sessions on Tuesday, January 2nd.

HERITAGE ANNOUNCES EXPANDED SCHEDULE

Five new channels are being added to the cablevision line-up in Iuka, according to Tal Crosby, General Manager for Heritage Cablevision. In addition to the five new channels, Crosby

said, "Heritage is especially pleased to be able to bring back WHBQ. We've had a number of requests and are always happy to be able to serve our subscribers by offering the programming and

channels they want."

In addition to WHBQ, Heritage is adding the following channels on January 1, 1985: The Nashville Network, featuring country music; The Weather Channel, with 24-hour national, regional and local weather customized for Iuka; Nickelodeon, a full day of programming for kids; New York Superstation WOR, a variety channel; and Christian Broadcasting Network, offering religious and inspirational programming.

Crosby added, "We now have a total of 18 channels available in Iuka." Basic cablevision includes 16 channels for \$11.95 per month. Cinemax will join HBO as the premium channels.

According to Crosby, Heritage will promote the new channel additions with a special installation offer, a newspaper campaign and a "Discover Cable Day" to be January 5 at the Iuka Civic Center. "We're going to invite the community to stop in and watch these great new channels," said Crosby.

The expanded line-up

makes a converter necessary and converters will be available. "That way, new subscribers will be able to enjoy cablevision right away," said Crosby. In addition to seeing the new channels and picking up a converter, there will be prizes and refreshments.

Heritage Cablevision is a subsidiary of Heritage Communications, Inc. (NYSE:HCI) and serves over 425,000 subscribers in 15 states.

"A NEW BEGINNING"

Recently our community was faced with what looked to be the end of an era. The 111 year old structure of the Episcopal Church of Our Savior was to be torn down and moved to Water Valley. The tornado that had struck Water Valley was now striking Iuka in the guise of movers who began hauling off religious artifacts and ripping out the ceiling, walls and flooring - the very heart of the church building. Hundred year old boards with square nails were thrown out the windows to rot in winter rains.

At this dark hour, a gleam of hope came when concerned community members met with the contractor who was moving the church, Mr. Lealon Harris. He agreed to stop demolition for a few days to give Iuka one final effort to buy the building from the Episcopal Diocese of Mississippi. Mr. Harris then asked the architect for the project, Girault Jones, to come from Grenada to look at the condition of the structure and carry Iuka's offer to the Bishop Duncan Gray, who presides over the Episcopal Diocese of Mississippi. While the architect was in Iuka, Mr. Harris told him, "If you can come to some sort of settlement, I'll just walk off and give you my crews time so far... The way I see it, I'll be the first contributor towards saving this church."

Things went well after this. Citizens of the community pledged some \$18,000 toward the purchase of the structure and made an offer of \$20,000 to the Episcopal Diocese. While this offer was being considered, Mr. Kenneth P. Pool, director of the division of Historic Preservation of the Mississippi Department of Archives and History, wrote an impressive letter to Bishop Gray pleading:

"As preservationists, we are concerned about your proposal to move and relocate the building primarily because such a move will put unnecessary and dangerous stress upon the church. We are concerned that this move might irreparably damage the historic fabric of the church and cause the structure to lose its architectural integrity and appearance."

The diocese agreed to return all artifacts and sell the church building and its contents to the citizens of Iuka. IUKA HERITAGE.

So what appeared to be a foretelling of doom, has brought... A NEW BEGINNING. It should be pointed out that saving this historic landmark has not been the work of any church group but rather an effort of concerned citizens pledging time and money to preserve Iuka's heritage. It is in fact a task that is now at hand. The community must raise money to repair the extensive damage done to the interior of the little church before demolition was stopped. To do this, the community is forming a non-profit organization, IUKA HERITAGE, INC. This corporation is applying for tax exempt status so that any contributions made to IUKA HERITAGE, INC. will be tax deductible. It is a unique building that Mr. P'Pool of the Department of Archives and History says is eligible for nomination to the National Register of Historic Places. "To be nominated to the National Register is a singular honor," Mr. P'Pool writes, "and to be candid, the majority of historic churches in Mississippi are not eligible for this honor."

The Architect, Mr. Girault Jones, said that our town is

Reducing Wintergrazing Costs

The mild winter weather we've had recently has tempted many Tishomingo County cattlemen to open the gates to wintergrazing and not bother to limit grazing.

However, the most efficient use of expensive wintergrazing is to allow brood cows to graze a limited period of time each day.

Cost per animal unit is one of the main considerations when wintering brood cows on grazing. For full-time grazing a mature cow with a calf needs about one acre. High quality winter pastures contain 20 percent or higher protein and as much as 70 percent total digestible nutrients.

Well-fertilized winter

pastures produce high quality forage that satisfactorily meets a cow's energy and protein needs.

In fact, cows grazing full-time receive nearly twice their protein needs and 60 percent to 80 percent more energy than is required.

Limit grazing provides a management tool that can help assure the most efficient use of wintergrazing crops at the lowest cost per cow unit.

A cow with a young calf can be wintered on one fill or about four hours of grazing each day. This should be supplemented by a partial feeding of fair quality hay or silage. No additional protein supplements are recommended.

Cows grazing pastures that have been highly nitrated should not be fed supplements

As you become skilled in the art of dairy cattle judging, you will be able to select superior animals...ones that excel in both production and functional conformation.

Dairy judging experiences provide opportunities for you to compare your judgment with that of more experienced leaders and judges. Selecting good animals is the art of buying and selling. The 4-H dairy judging program teaches you to discipline yourself. You have four animals that have to be placed in order of most desirable to least desirable. Then after the placing, you

Sugarless Date Cookies

½ cup butter or margarine
1 egg
2 teaspoons vanilla
1 cup flour
1 teaspoon baking powder
¼ teaspoon salt
1 cup pitted dates, chopped
1 cup shredded coconut
1 cup chopped walnuts

Cream butter, egg and vanilla. Mix dry ingredients. Blend both mixtures thoroughly. Mix dates, coconut and walnuts until blended. Form dough into two 1½-inch rolls and wrap in waxed paper or foil; chill in freezer 2 hours or up to 1 month. Slice with sharp knife into 3/8-inch slices. Place on lightly greased cookie sheet and bake at 350 degrees for 12 minutes. Cool on rack. Yield: 5 dozen.

ANTIBIOTICS WITHOUT PRESCRIPTION?

Many persons think of the antibiotics as prescription medicines which can be obtained only after visiting a physician or dentist. Not so. Several antibiotics are available in nonprescription ointments and creams intended for application to the skin.

Combining two or more of certain antibiotics in one product tends to increase infection-fighting effectiveness. One of the most popular preparations contains three different antibiotics and is sold under several trade names (known by pharmacists as triple antibiotic ointment). Antibiotics often used in combination include gramicidin, neomycin, bacitracin, and polymyxin-B. If the type of bacteria that is producing an infection is known (Gram negative or positive), use of only one antibiotic may be effective. Furthermore, there is usually less chance of skin reaction if only one antibiotic is applied to the skin. Because tetracycline and chlortetracycline are effective against several different bacteria, these antibiotics are not usually used in combination with others.

COUNTY CONVENTION — The annual Tishomingo County ASCS County Convention will be held Thursday, December 13, 1984, at 10:00 a.m. in the conference room of the Tishomingo County ASCS Office. The convention is open to the public. The purpose of this meeting is to elect a member to the Tishomingo County ASC Committee.

1984-CROP WHEAT, BARLEY PRODUCERS TO RECEIVE DEFICIENCY PAYMENTS — Eligible wheat farmers will receive approximately \$1.1 billion and barley producers about \$50 million in deficiency payments on their 1984 crop, according to Everett Rank, administrator of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's

Agricultural Stabilization Conservation Service.

Rank said deficiency payments are required for the 1984 wheat and programs because market prices received by farmers during the first months (June through October) of the marketing year were below established target price levels of \$4.38 per bushel for wheat and \$1.60 per bushel for barley. The average farm price for the first five months above the \$1.60 per bushel target price so producers not eligible for deficiency payments.

The deficiency payment rate is based on the difference between the established target price and the actual price, either (1) the weighted average price for June through October or (2) the established loan rate.

National weighted average market prices for the first months of the marketing year are \$3.38 per bushel of wheat, \$2.34 for barley, \$1.70 for oats. Eligible producers will be paid deficiency payment rate \$1.00 per bushel for their crop, based on the difference between the \$4.38 target price and the \$2.34 market price.

Rank said payments will be issued through local ASCS offices as soon as possible after December 10.

SPOTS IN FRONT OF THE EYES

Many people complain of seeing spots in front of their eyes. Though it may not interfere with their vision, it is nonetheless a disconcerting symptom.

Most likely the spots are "floaters". These are due to tiny specks of dead tissue -- no more than a few cells -- which come away from the lining of the eyeball and float about in the fluid with which it is filled. These appear to the person who has them as flecks, or motes of dust. Generally speaking, they are of no significance at all, though they can be annoying.

On the other hand, if they increase greatly over a short period of time, they should be

checked. They may be a sign of inflammation at the back of the eye, or just possibly a threatened detachment of the retina.

In a few cases, people with high blood pressure get this sort of vision disturbance as well. An excessive use of alcohol or use of certain medicines can cause spots.

Holiday Christmas Seals Celebrate Health & Hope

Mississippians traditionally decorate Christmas card envelopes and gift packages with Christmas Seals and participate in the Mississippi Lung Association crusade to prevent and control lung diseases. But few realize that the history of Christmas Seals is a story of happenings that brought about many miracles.

The Christmas Seal story

began in America shortly before the turn of the century when a young doctor was told he had tuberculosis. Dr. Edward Trudeau decided to live his few remaining years in a simple cottage in the Adirondack Mountains. After it became apparent that his condition was gradually improving, Dr. Trudeau studied the relationship between his symptoms and rest and then converted his mountain cottage into a small hospital to help other TB victims recover with the new method.

The good news spread and other physicians opened small TB "sanitariums" with more miraculous recoveries. In 1904, these physicians, friends and patients formed what is now the American Lung Association, the first voluntary health organization established to fight a specific disease.

Meanwhile the same year, hospitals in Denmark tried the new American "rest-cure" method to help children with tuberculosis. To help fund the new work, a postal worker thought of the sale of stamps . . . and so a worldwide crusade was set in motion.

The first American Christmas Seals were designed by Emily Bissell in 1907 to raise funds to save a small TB hospital in Delaware. A Philadelphia newspaper and its editor helped print and distribute the Christmas Seal stamps, the little hospital was saved . . . and another miracle for lung health had happened.

The Mississippi State Sanatorium for treatment of TB patients was founded in 1916 through efforts of leaders Dr. Henry Bowell and Dr. W.H. Rowan. The Mississippi Tuberculosis Association was located there and the annual Christmas Seal sale provided much needed educational programs and information for patients and their families. The Mississippi institution was recognized nationally for its outstanding work in TB treatment.

Today, modern medicines have replaced rest as a treatment, and Christmas Seal supported programs still lead the battle for lung health. Ironically, the decline of tuberculosis in the U.S. has been accompanied by a rise in other lung diseases which are equally as dangerous and difficult to control. Physicians, volunteer workers and educational efforts, the same resources that combined so successfully to fight TB, now help the Mississippi Lung Association wage a continuing fight against more than 30 other lung diseases as well as tuberculosis.

Each year Christmas Seals feature a new design. The 1984 Christmas Seals feature 36 seals and 6 matching gift tags. Christmas Seals in Mississippi support vital programs of patient services, education and medical research. Each service is a matter of "life and breath". Participate Problems Now Baby Boom

Large life expectancy in our country has moved from fifty years to more than seventy just this century. Infants have better than a 50-50 chance of living than the Biblical three and ten. Baby boomers of the 1944 period will continue to place stress in our lives. This will become critical after the turn of the century. By 2030 there will be more than 50 million baby boomers, which will be about the number there is now. We will be able to finance our boom generation. Assuming we have a life span of twenty-five years with twenty years of retirement and twenty years of education and training, we will have forty years of work purposes. Our society has jobs for the group moves toward

old age? Are we evolving into a society that needs fewer people in the conventional work force? If so, how will people build up reserves for retirement? Will automation dictate our options for financing the later years?

These questions must be considered if we are to effectively reduce the risks for the baby boom group and their children. If people are interested in what corporations are doing to, at least in part, deal with employment-financial issues, they should read "Young Programs for Older Workers," published by the Work in America Institute in 1980.

Surveys show that many retirees want to work, that many workers in their fifties intend to extend their working careers, and that business recognition of older worker productivity is increasing.

We certainly have our work cut out for us if we are to provide options in employment and retirement for older workers.

Robert W. Feagles of the Traveler's Insurance Co., which eliminated mandatory

retirement three years ago, points out that our society has built a system allowing more people to enjoy retirement, but at the same time limits their choices. "Most people over 65, whatever they may wish to do, face two stark alternatives: either full time work or full time retirement with few options in between," he said.

ticipates a claim should notify his or her Crop Insurance agent immediately.

Under the terms of the policy, any acreage which harvest will not be completed must be left intact until an inspection is made. Any claim for indemnity may be rejected if these loss reporting requirements are not met," Mr. Gillespie stated.

Point of Law

(Prepared by the Mississippi State Bar. Some legal rights may vary from locality to locality. Always consult an attorney when in doubt about your rights.)

Q: What steps must a landlord take to evict a tenant who has not paid his rent?

A: A landlord certainly has the legal right to remove a tenant who has failed to make rental payments. The law requires that a landlord, in order to remove such a tenant, must give the tenant three days notice, in writing, stating that the tenant must either pay his rent or move from the premises. Three days after the notice is given to the tenant, the landlord may file an eviction action in court to have the tenant removed.

Q: Can a tenant who is current in his rental payments be removed by a landlord?

A: Whether a tenant who is current in rental payments can be removed will depend upon the type of rental

agreement between the tenant and the landlord. If the tenant and landlord have agreed that the lease will last for a certain period of time, then the landlord cannot remove the tenant during that period if the tenant is paying rent and has not violated the lease in some way. If, for example, the tenant has a six-month lease, he may not be removed arbitrarily during the six-month period. On the other hand, if the tenant and landlord have not agreed upon any specified length of time for the lease, the landlord may terminate the tenancy at any time by giving the tenant the proper amount of notice.

If the tenant is renting an apartment or house on a monthly rental basis, the landlord must give the tenant seven days written notice that the tenancy is terminated. If the tenant has not moved by the end of seven days, the landlord can file an eviction action to remove the tenant. However, the landlord cannot remove a monthly tenant in the middle of the month for which the tenant has already paid. If the seven-day notice is given during the middle of a month, it will not become effective until the end of the period for which the tenant has paid.

Reform Package County Ability Finance Services

Two major provisions of
the Treasury Department's
plan for tax reform will
limit the ability of
government to finance
operations that must be
financed by the state, said
President Phil Elstrom
in response to the tax
reform plan announced
yesterday by Treasury
Secretary Donald T. Regan.
Local governments will be
hit by the elimination of
tax breaks for state and local
bonds and especially the
municipal bond tax. The loss of tax
breaks for many state and
local bonds will further
reduce the ability to finance
government," he con-
tinued.
"We cannot continue to be
responsible for the
increased services and
the ability to pay for them.
We need the flexibility to give
citizens the services they

require," he said.

The loss of the ability to
deduct property taxes will, in
effect, mean an automatic tax
increase in local taxes paid
by the individual taxpayer.
"The increase," Elstrom
said, "will amount to taxation
without representation at the
local level, since it will have
been imposed without the
consent of the local govern-
ing boards or the local
voters."

This increase in turn will
restrict the flexibility for
counties to raise local taxes
when absolutely necessary to
provide needed or mandated
services.
"Without the ability to
generate necessary revenues,
counties run the risk of either
delaying or simply reducing
services to citizens," said
Matthew B. Coffey, NACo
executive director.
"As a county official, it
concerns me to think that this
plan may inhibit local tax-
payers in their support for
local efforts to raise revenue
for needed services," said
Elstrom, who also is a Kane
County, Ill., board member.
"Raising local revenue is
already very difficult," he
said.

Counties rely on property
taxes alone for over 30 per-
cent of their revenues, with
another 35 percent coming
from revenues collected by
the state.

Counties also use tax
exempt bonds to finance
most major public facilities,
many of which are privately
owned. This includes many
airports, pollution control
facilities, and wastewater
treatment plants or utilities.
The tax exemption in this
area is vital to local govern-
ment since it lowers the
cost of financing these
projects which in turn lowers

costs to each taxpayer. But
the Treasury Department
proposal would eliminate
exemptions for interest on
these investments unless the
facility is owned and
operated by the government.
"While the National
Association of Counties sup-
ports comprehensive tax
reform, we are concerned
about the implications to
local government," Coffey
said. "We will be reviewing
this proposal in detail during
the coming weeks and
meeting with county officials
from around the country to
study that issue."

Energy Answers

Q: We have floor-to-ceiling
glass windows and sliding
doors across the west side of
our home. It seemed a good
idea at the time we built our
house because the view was
so beautiful, but in the sum-
mer the heat that radiates
from all that glass really
raises our air-conditioning
bills. The worst part is that
our thermostat is located in
the same room. Do you have
any suggestions about how
to limit the solar gain on the
west side of our house?

Q: The late solar heat gain
on the west is best controlled
by landscaping or perhaps a
roof extension such as a
patio cover. Another option
for shading on the east or
west could be the use of ex-
ternal bamboo or canvas drop
shades or awnings of some
type.

If external shades are not
feasible, internal drapes or
blinds may be used to limit
solar heat gain at the ap-
propriate time, although they
are not as effective. It should
be noted here that internal
drapes and blinds drawn
during dark and cold periods
help in limiting heat loss
through windows in the win-
ter.

It is generally helpful to
open drapes in cold weather
during any period when direct
sunlight falls on the window.

Q: I am reading a lot of
energy conservation material,
much of it technically orien-
ted. The term thermal mass
comes up quite often in
discussions of selecting ap-
propriate building materials.
Can you explain, in simple
terms, this concept?

A: The thermal mass has to
do with the density and
behavioral characteristics of
various building materials as
they respond to temperature.
For example, a building with
massive walls, made of a
material such as adobe, will
behave quite differently from
one with frame walls because
mass influences a building
component's ability to store
energy by changing its tem-
perature.

The change in stored
energy can be expressed by
the following equation:
Energy stored equals mass
x specific heat x temperature
change.

Mass can be an advantage
or a disadvantage, depending
on climatic conditions.
Massive construction is
usually an advantage in dry,
inland areas that have a large
variation between daytime
and nighttime temperatures.

Don't think of garnishes as
extras. Whether using a gar-
nish as simple as hard-
cooked egg slices on top of a
casserole or as elaborate as
piped whipped cream over a
chocolate mousse, these at-
tractive details are essential
when it comes to adding
sparkle to meals.

That's especially important
during the holiday season.
People looking for some
ideas for garnishes should try
the following:

-Frosted cranberries. Serve
the holiday turkey
surrounded with mounds of
frosted cranberries. Just dip
fresh cranberries into beaten
egg white, and roll them in
granulated sugar. Place the
berries on a wire rack (mesh
type), and let dry in a cool
place. Don't refrigerate them
because the moisture will
make the sugar melt.

-Notched citrus cups.
Lemons, limes, oranges, and
grapefruit make a colorful
garnish for seafood and
vegetables or for use as a
decorative container for a
multitude of foods.

To make notched cups, first
cut a thin slice from each
end of the fruit so the halves
will sit level. Insert the blade
of a small knife at a down-
ward angle into the middle of
the fruit; remove the blade.
Insert knife again at an up-
ward angle to make a zigzag
pattern. Continue cutting in
this fashion completely
around the fruit. Separate the
halves by twisting slightly
and carefully pulling them
apart. Accent the notches, if
desired, by dipping the tips
into paprika, cinnamon or
chopped parsley.

If the fruit will be used as a
container for salads,
vegetables, or desserts, sim-
ply scoop out the pulp (reser-
ve for another use) and fill the
shell.

-Fluted mushrooms. Use
raw, fluted mushrooms as a
garnish for salads,
casseroles, or for adding in-
terest to the dinner plate.

sugar. Beat in egg, milk,
vanilla and almond ex-
tract until well mixed, oc-
casionally scraping bowl.
Stir in flour, baking pow-
der and salt until well
mixed. Cover with plastic
wrap; chill several hours
or overnight.

Preheat oven to 375°F.
On lightly floured surface,
with floured rolling pin,
roll chilled dough 1/8 inch
to 1/4 inch thick. With
floured 2 1/2-inch cookie
cutters, cut dough into de-
sired shapes. Sprinkle
with sugar. Roll trim-
mings and cut more cook-
ies. Place cookies 1 inch
apart on cookie sheets.
Bake 8 to 10 minutes
until cookies are lightly
browned. Immediately re-
move cookies to wire
racks; cool.
Tip: Shape dough into 1
1/2-inch balls instead of
rolling it out. Using a flat-
bottomed glass dipped in
sugar, flatten balls on
cookie sheets.
36 Cookies

are especially attractive for
garnishing steaks or roast
beef.

Begin with fresh, medium
to large, firm mushrooms.
Rub the entire mushroom
with lemon juice to prevent
browning. Make several slits
at even intervals around the
mushroom cap, cutting from
the center of the cap to the
edge and using a carving
motion with the knife. Make
another set of slits parallel to
the first slits, allowing about
one sixteenth inch between.
Remove the thin strip of
mushroom between the slits
and discard.

-Lemon roses. Use lemon
roses to brighten up a serving
bowl filled with broccoli or
other vegetables or to spruce
up a luncheon or dinner plate.

Using a sharp knife, peel a
one-half inch wide strip of
rind in a continuous spiral
from top to bottom of the
lemon. Then with flesh side
inward, coil the strip tightly at
first to form the center of the
rose; gradually let it loosen to
form the outer petals.
(Tomato roses can be made
using the same procedure.)

-Hard-cooked eggs. This
colorful, nutritious garnish
can be used in several ways.
Overlap thin slices in a circle
to top a casserole, vegetable
or salad; then fill the center of
the circle with sprigs of par-
sley. Or cut the egg into
squares and arrange the
wedges in pinwheel fashion.

Sieved egg yolk makes an
appealing topping for
asparagus, broccoli, or
spinach because of the
distinct color contrast. Press
only the yolk through a sieve
and lightly sprinkle it over the
vegetable. Finely chopped
egg is another option for
vegetables or salads.

-Piped garnishes. Using a
decorator bag, pipe stiffly
beaten whipped cream on top
or around the base of des-
serts. Add a finishing touch
by sprinkling the mounds of
cream with finely chopped
nuts or chocolate shavings.

Pipe mayonnaise or soft-
ened cream cheese on
aspics or other congealed
salads. Stuff celery quickly by
piping cream cheese or other
fillings through a large
decorator tip. Stuffed eggs
look even better when the
filling is piped in. Mashed
potatoes serve as both gar-
nish and side dish when
piped around meats, such as
roast beef or lamb.

-Vegetable and fruit gar-
nishes. Red and green pepper

Mix coconut with cereal, brown sugar, prunes, apricots and sesame seed
in large bowl. Combine oil and honey in saucepan and bring to a boil over
medium heat. Pour over cereal mixture and mix to coat well. Spread evenly
in 13x9-inch pan. Bake at 325° for 20 minutes, stirring several times to toast
evenly. Sprinkle with raisins and spread out on a tray to cool. Break into
small pieces and store in airtight container. Makes 7 cups.

Coconutty Butter Balls

- 1/2 cup butter or
margarine
- 2 tablespoons confectioners
sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 cup all-purpose flour
- 1-1/3 cups (about) Baker's
Angel Flake coconut

Cream butter. Add sugar and vanilla; beat until light and fluffy. Add flour
all at once, and blend well. Mix in 2/3 cup of the coconut. Chill 15 minutes;
then shape into 1-inch balls. Roll in remaining coconut and bake on ungreased
baking sheets at 350° for 15 minutes or until lightly browned. Cool on racks.
Makes 3 dozen cookies.

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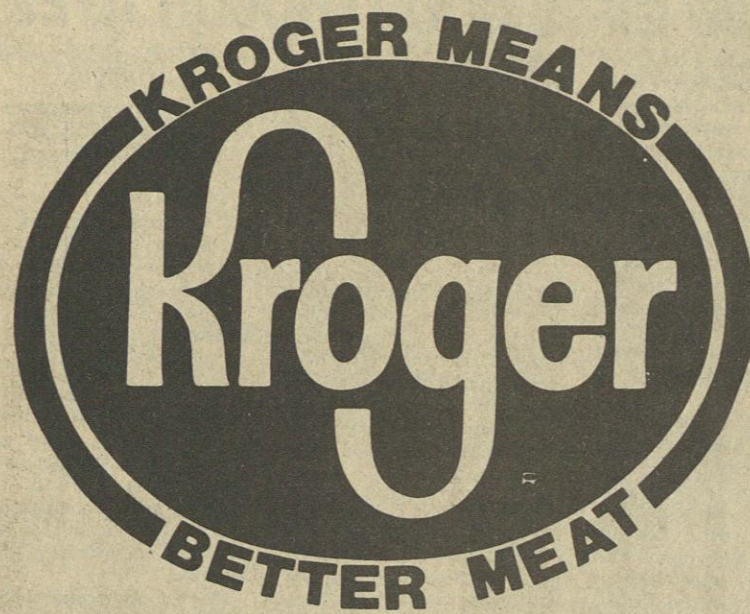
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
