## UNEMPLOYMENT RATE INCREASES IN MISSISSIPPI

Mississippi's unemployment rate rose to 11.0 percent in November, an increase of four-tenths of a percentage point compared to October's jobless rate of 10.6 percent, according to the U.S. Department of Labor's Bureau of Economic Analysis. Last year's November unemployment rate was 10.2 percent. The 11.0 percent unemployment rate for the state is higher than the 6.9 percent rate for November in Mississippi. Employment Commission figures showed 121,000 unemployed and 978,800 employed out of a civilian labor force of 1,099,800. The initial unemployment insurance claims totalled 23,531 in November.

Fifty-four of the state's 82 counties had unemployment rates of 10.0 percent or higher. ## BEATING VICTIM HOSPITALIZED

An Iuka young man remains hospitalized in Memphis, Tenn., following what has been described as a brutal beating episode early Saturday night. One Iuka man has been jailed and a warrant issued for the arrest of a second Iuka man in connection with the happening.

Sheriff Bob Payne said the arrest of Kelly Lambert came following testimony given by several witnesses to the severe beating of Warren Robertson, 22, of Iuka. Payne said a warrant for the arrest of Jessie Ledbetter, believed to reside on Fulton Street in Iuka, was issued Tuesday and authorities continue the search for him.

It was said the incident took place at a weekend party on Indian Creek, northeast of Iuka. Payne said he had questioned fifteen individuals thus far and evidence obtained from the witnesses indicate that Robertson was at

tacked from behind, knocked down, beaten and kicked violently about the face and head.

The sheriff said he recovered what appeared to be a 4-inch piece of tape wrapped steel pipe from the scene of the beating.

It was not known presently what initiated the attack on Robertson, the lawman said.

According to Jimmy Robertson, father of the victim, Warren underwent extensive facial bone repair surgery Tuesday afternoon.

Sheriff Payne told The News Wednesday morning that he understood from phone conversation to Robertson's doctor in Memphis that Robertson was still in serious condition.

Payne said Lambert faces charges of aggravated assault with further charges pending according to the condition of Robertson.

As for Ledbetter, Payne said he faces similar charges.

## Dreaming of a white Christmas? Read on!

What's red, green and snowy white? The colors of Christmas blended together in a chiffon pie with just a hint of almond flavor.

### Decorative holiday dish

The following recipe for White Christmas Pie from Farm Journal's Best-Ever Pies by Patricia A. Ward (Doubleday & Company, Inc.) adds a decorative touch to any holiday table.

### WHITE CHRISTMAS PIE

- 1 env. unflavored gelatin
  - 1/4 c. cold water
  - 1/2 c. sugar
  - 1/4 tsp. flour
  - 1/2 tsp. salt
  - 1/2 c. milk
  - 1/4 tsp. vanilla
  - 1/4 tsp. almond extract
  - 1/2 c. heavy cream, whipped
  - 3 egg whites
  - 1/4 tsp. cream of tartar
  - 1/2 c. sugar
  - 1 1/2 c. flaked coconut
  - Baked 9" pie shell
  - Sweetened whipped cream
  - Red and green maraschino cherries
- Sprinkle gelatin over cold water to soften.

Combine 1/2 c. sugar, flour and salt in 2-quart saucepan. Gradually add milk, stirring well. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly, until mixture comes to a boil. Cook 1 minute more. Remove from heat. Add softened gelatin, vanilla and almond extract, stirring until gelatin dissolves. Pour into a metal bowl. Cool at room temperature until mixture is partially set.

Fold whipped cream into custard mixture. Beat egg whites and cream of tartar in bowl until foamy, using an electric mixer at high speed. Gradually add 1/2 c. sugar, 1 tsp. at a time, beating well after each addition. Continue beating until stiff, glossy peaks form when beaters are slowly lifted. Fold whipped cream-custard mixture into egg white mixture. Fold in 1 c. of the coconut. Chill in refrigerator until mixture mounds well when spooned. Turn into baked pie shell. Sprinkle with remaining 1/2 c. coconut. Chill in refrigerator until set.

To serve, decorate with puffs of sweetened whipped cream and red and green maraschino cherries. Makes 6 to 8 servings.

realize pecan trees are like any other crop and need fertilizer. If you've neglected to fertilize your trees for a long period, that could be the problem.

It usually takes three to five years of fertilizing and other care to bring neglected trees back into production. So don't expect them to start producing immediately even if you fertilize them this year.

Consider the age of your trees. Many varieties don't start producing nuts until they are 12 to 15 years old, so your tree may not be old enough to bear. Generally speaking, pecan trees don't get too old to produce nuts if they are cared for properly.

The saying "if it rains during the first week of May the pecan crop will be short" has some merit since rain may wash away pollen which is needed to produce the crop.

Sometimes the nut is not filled completely. The reason may be that aphids have sucked the leaves and caused them to fall. If you've ever parked your car under a pecan tree and later noticed a sticky substance on the windshield, the problem is aphids.

Several fungus diseases also may prematurely defoliate pecan trees and keep them from producing. For more information about pecan production, call or drop by the Extension office.

### Celebrate Safely

Inside or out use only lights that have been tested for safety. These are identified by the "UL" label from Underwriter's Laboratories.

Check each set of lights, new or old, for broken or cracked sockets, frayed or bare wires, and loose connections. Discard damaged sets or repair them before using.

Check labels of outside lights to see that lights are weatherproof. Do not use indoor lights outside and vice versa. Fasten outdoor lights securely to trees, house walls, or other firm support to protect from wind damage.

Use no more than three sets of lights per single extension cord. Turn off all lights on trees and other decorations when you go to

bed or leave the house. Lights could short and start a fire.

Never use electric lights on a metallic tree. Although safe when used according to manufacturer's directions, metallic trees can become charged with electricity from faulty lights. Then anyone touching a branch could be electrocuted. To avoid this danger, use colored spotlights above or beside a tree, never fastened on it.

Keep "bubbling" lights away from children. Such lights are hazardous because their bright colors and bubbling movement can tempt curious children to break the candle-shaped glass and try to drink the liquid, which contains a hazardous chemical.

Plan for safety. Remember there is no substitute for common sense. Look for and eliminate potential danger spots near candles, fireplaces, trees, and electrical connections.

### Chewy Fruitcake Bars

- 2 cups Bisquick baking mix
- 2 T. sugar
- 1/4 cup firm oleo or butter
- 1 cup flaked coconut
- 2 cups cut up mixed candied fruit
- 1 cup chopped dates
- 1 cup chopped nuts
- 1 can (14 oz.) sweetened condensed milk

chopped nuts over fruit. Drizzle milk over top. Bake until light golden brown, 25 to 30 minutes. Cool completely. Cut into bars.

### POINT OF LAW

(Prepared by the Mississippi State Bar. Some rights may vary from locality to locality. Always consult an attorney when in doubt about your legal rights.)

Q: I recently applied for a loan at a local bank and was turned down. The bank said that they had received a credit report that I had defaulted on an earlier loan to another bank. This is not true. What can I do about it?

A: Under the Fair Credit Reporting Act, you have the right to be given the name and address of the credit reporting agency, to be told the substance of the information on file and to have inaccurate or unverifiable information deleted from your file. You should contact the credit reporting agency which issued the erroneous report, explain the situation and ask them to correct the error. It is likely that the reporting agency will correct the error upon reexamination of your credit history.

Q: My neighbor used an airplane to spray insecticide on his soybean crop. Some of the spray blew onto my land and killed ten of my cows. Can I recover from my neighbor?

A: Crop-spraying is considered highly dangerous work which imposes liability on the one who engages in such dangerous activity. Therefore, your neighbor would be responsible to you for the death of your cows.

### UNDERSTANDING OPTICAL ERRORS

Millions of people wear corrective lenses. The great majority of them are prescribed to correct the four most common types of optical errors: nearsightedness, farsightedness, astigmatism, and presbyopia. Still, there persists a good deal of confusion and misunderstanding concerning these problems.

To begin with, these are optical errors not eye diseases. Eyes that are nearsighted, farsighted, astigmatic, or presbyopic are not unhealthy, nor are they any more subject to eye disease than eyes without optical error. Since they are not diseased, they do not

have to be cured, merely corrected. The correction for optical errors is corrective lenses -- either glasses or contact lenses -- which will allow perfect or near-perfect vision when in use. There is no reason to be happy about having an optical error requiring correction, but it's certainly no cause for anxiety and self-doubt.

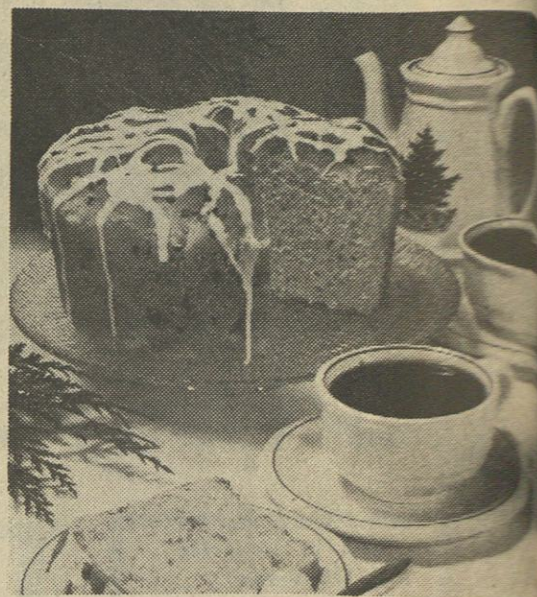
## Bring a great holiday gift: homemade bread for brunch

During the holidays or at any time of year, inviting friends for Sunday brunch is a good way to entertain. Why? Because it's easy on the cook, easy on the budget and easy on busy schedules.

Whether the party is at your house or a friend's, a loaf of fancy homemade bread will make the occasion even more special. The guest who brings along such a treat for a holiday party is assured a return invitation. The hostess who serves a sweet bread with lacy frosting and cups of steamy coffee will never be lacking company.

Although most accomplished cooks already know the recipe secret for moist breads, it may come as a surprise to others that condensed soup is the key ingredient.

Only the cook need know that a convenience soup from the cupboard is responsible for the fresh feeling and light texture of two breads that are good enough to become a tradition.



ALMOND RING BREAD, with condensed soup as ingredient for moistness and texture, is an irresistible addition to the brunch table at home or for a friend's day party.

### FROSTY TWIST BREAD

- 6 to 6 1/2 cups all-purpose flour
- 2 packages active dry yeast
- 3 tablespoons sugar
- 1 can (10% ounces) condensed cream of potato soup
- 1/4 cup water
- 1/2 cup butter or margarine
- 3 eggs, well beaten
- 1 1/2 cups chopped candied fruit
- Confectioner's sugar frosting

In large bowl of electric mixer, combine 2 cups flour, yeast and sugar.

In saucepan, heat soup, water and butter until warm (120° F.).

Add to flour mixture. Beat

at medium speed 2 minutes. Add eggs and 3/4 cup flour. Beat 2 minutes at high speed, scraping bottom and sides of bowl often.

Stir in fruit and enough flour to make a stiff dough. Knead on lightly floured board until smooth, adding additional flour as needed.

Place in greased bowl, turning once.

Cover; let rise in warm place 1 hour or until doubled in bulk.

Punch down. To make loaves, divide in half.

Roll out each half to 14-inch circle on lightly greased baking sheet.

Place glass in center. Cut into quarters up to glass.

Cut each quarter into 5 equal strips, making 20 strips.

Twist 2 strips together; repeat making 10 twists.

Cut off one twist; remove glass.

Coil twist and place in center.

Bring ends of remaining 9 twists to center to form daisy. Repeat with remaining half of dough.

Cover; let rise 45 minutes or until doubled.

Bake at 375° F. for 20 minutes or until done; cool on wire rack.

Drizzle with frosting. Makes 2 loaves.

### ALMOND RING BREAD

- 5 1/2 to 6 cups all-purpose flour
- 1/4 cup packed light

- brown sugar
- 1 package active dry yeast
- 1 can (10% ounces) condensed cream of chicken soup
- 2 tablespoons lemon juice
- 2 tablespoons water
- 1/2 cup butter or margarine
- 3 eggs, well beaten
- 2 tablespoons grated lemon rind
- 3/4 cup finely chopped toasted almonds
- 1/2 teaspoon almond extract
- Confectioner's sugar glaze

In large bowl of electric mixer, combine 1 1/2 cups flour, sugar and yeast.

In saucepan, heat soup, juice, water and butter until warm (120° F.). Add to flour mixture.

Beat at medium speed 2 minutes. Add eggs and 3/4 cup flour. Beat 2 minutes at high speed, scraping bottom and sides of bowl often.

### HEALTHY HOLIDAYS

How about a super-nutrition Thanksgiving -- not MORE food, but HEALTHIER food? And you don't have to sacrifice tradition.

For instance, most of the cholesterol and fat in turkeys and chickens is in the skin, which of course you leave on for roasting. And many of the birds are injected with more fat for tenderizing. Much of the total fat, however, is rendered out in the drippings. Refrigerate or freeze these drippings and remove all fat before making your gravy. It's delicious.

Make high-fiber stuffing with whole-grain corn meal, whole wheat bread, or brown rice. Add fiber-rich celery, onions, or chestnuts. Serve whole wheat rolls or biscuits. Sweet potatoes are sweet and hearty without being candied.

Steam vegetables just until crisp and preserve their vitamins. Grind fresh cranberries and whole oranges together with a little honey for a relish high in C and other vitamins. Instead of rich desserts, or as a dessert-alternative, serve traditional "Ambrosia," made with seeded and skinned orange and grapefruit sections, pineapple chunks, a few miniature marshmallows, and a little grated coconut. Serious dieters will bless your name.

strations was in our county on the Tullon McKee Farm. People from the Soil Testing Department and I took a very thorough sample from a small field. We then obtained the routine soil testing results from the laboratory located at MSU. In one small area of the field no fertilizer or lime was applied. In another small area, double rates were applied. The farmer treated the entire field the same throughout the season.

In all cases yields were increased where the recommended amount of fertilizer and lime was applied. In some cases, a slight yield increase was seen with the double rate, but this increase would not pay for the additional fertilizer and lime.

The object of these demonstrations were to confirm that the routine soil test recommendations are the most economical. Further confirmation demonstrations are planned for future years.

Engineers, builders of the \$2 billion waterway, said the new system including its 10 locks and dams is expected to be open to commercial navigation early next year.

though the last major excavation has been finished and all ten locks and dams on the waterway completed, additional minor work and testing would be required before commercial barges and pleasure craft can be permitted to transit the entire waterway. The additional work is expected to continue for about six weeks.

Dedication ceremonies for the project are scheduled for June 1, 1985, at Columbus, Miss., and Mobile Ala., as well as at other sites along its route.

The \$2 billion waterway is the largest civil works project ever undertaken by the Corps.

By connecting the Tennessee River in Mississippi and the Black Warrior River in Alabama it will provide a direct water route from the Tennessee to the Gulf of Mexico at Mobile. From some points in the Eastern U.S., it will reduce travel distances to the Gulf of Mexico by as much as 800 miles.

Construction of the project began in 1972. The February opening date is 17 months ahead of the original schedule for completion of the project.

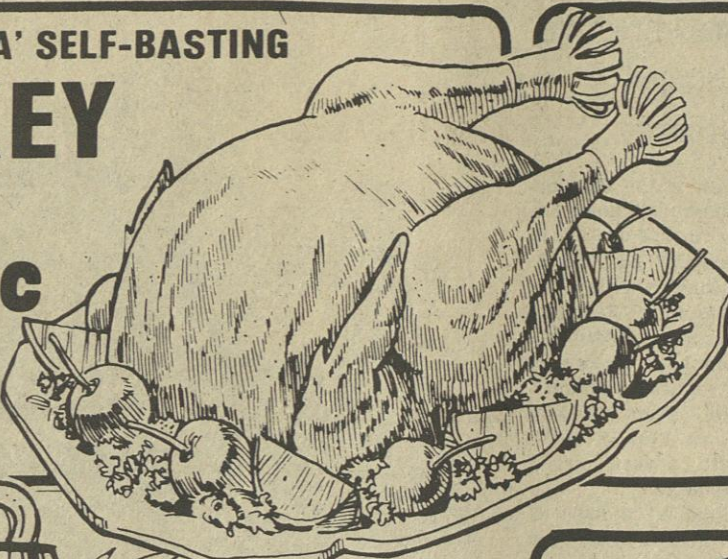

### DRY MOUTH AND DRUGS

Dry mouth or xerostomia, as it is termed medically, is a common side effect of many prescription and nonprescription medicines including antihistamines, certain antidepressants, some ulcer medicines, and some medicines for high blood pressure. For most persons dry mouth may be annoying but is of little consequence.

When medicines must be dissolved under the tongue, such as sublingual nitroglycerin tablets, dry mouth can create a significant problem. The tablets fail to dissolve quickly, and relief of an angina attack is not as immediate as it might be if the mouth was not dry. A solution to this problem, as reported by Henry Everett, M.D., writing in *The New England Journal of Medicine*, is the administration of bethanechol chloride—a prescription medicine that may restore the normal flow of saliva. Dr. Everett cautions that bethanechol should not be taken by persons having asthma or peptic ulcer.

A solution that does not require use of drugs is the use of any of several nonprescription mouth sprays that fit conveniently in pocket or purse. The spray could be used just prior to taking nitroglycerin or when the mouth feels dry.

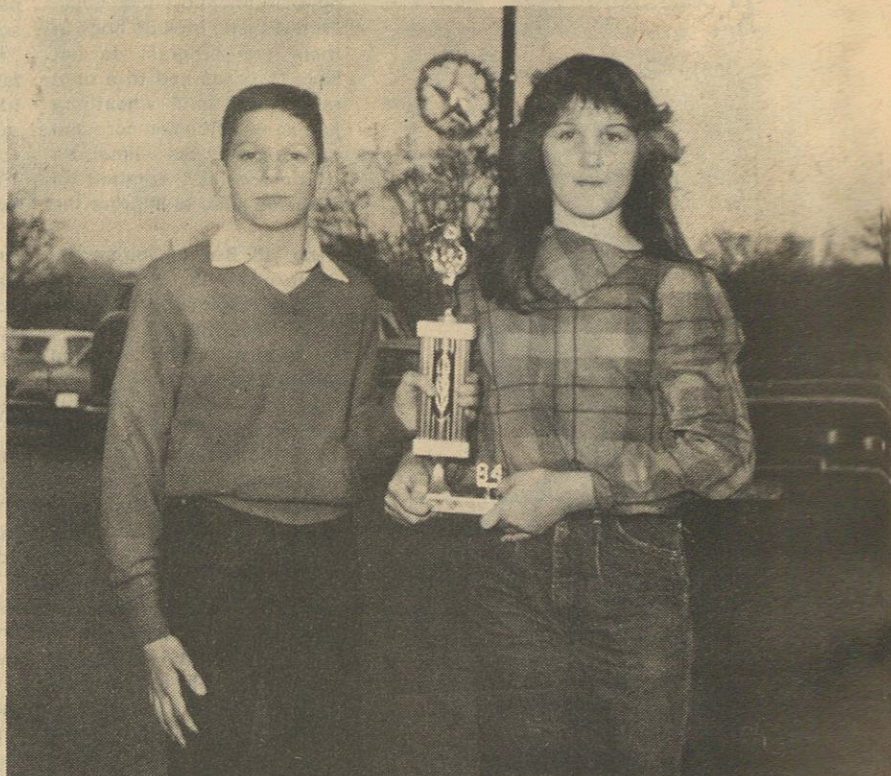

### POINT OF LAW

Q: I am thinking about going into business for myself. It has been suggested to me that I form a corporation to operate my business. If I do so, what advantages would this ownership give me?

A: If you organize a corporation to conduct business, the corporation itself will be the legal owner of the business. As a stockholder of the corporation, you will own a share of the corporation itself. There are three basic advantages to this arrangement. The first is that as a stockholder, you have limited liability for the corporation's obligations. This would mean, for example, that you would not be personally liable for a debt of the corporation unless you personally guaranteed it. Second, the corporation has a life of its own, and will continue to exist even if you die. Finally, should you decide to sell the business, you can sell your stock to another party. This is a simpler procedure than selling the assets of the business to you own as an individual.

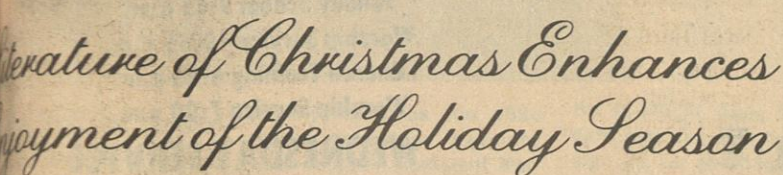

## Think On These Things

Are American homes growing stronger or weaker? Are marriages lasting longer or getting shorter? Well, it depends on whose homes and whose marriages you're talking about. It's not hard to notice the break-up of homes because they happen quite often. Maybe we fail to recognize the strong marriages that are around us. It's kind of like the "News" - it often focuses on the tragedies, etc. that are happening. Notice the following article by Buddy Baker, of Savannah, Tenn., and see that your home and marriage remains secure.

Someone has said that it is a lot easier to get married than to stay married! And, that is a wise statement.

To stay happily married requires daily effort. The marriage relationship is always changing because people are always changing. Here are some suggestions that will help you keep your marriage together:

1. Commit yourself to your partner for life. Don't let anyone or anything come between you and your spouse.

2. Find a compatible Christian couple with whom you both can share problems and joys and with whom you can seek advice.

3. Reserve at least one night every week to stay home alone, away from all friends and associates.

If your marriage grows happier instead of becoming a divorce statistic, it will require daily effort.

## Joyous History

The birth of Jesus: this momentous event in history is so important to us that we measure all other events in time in relation to that date.

God could have come to us in any way He chose. Why did He choose to be born to a humble Judean couple in a lowly stable?

stable?

The Gospel according to St. Matthew tells us, "Now the birth of Jesus Christ was on this wise: When as his mother Mary was espoused to Joseph, before they came together she was found with child of the Holy Ghost."

"Then Joseph her husband, being a just man, and not willing to make her a public example, was minded to put her away privily."

"But while he thought on these things, behold, the angel of the Lord appeared unto him in a dream saying, Joseph, thou son of David, fear not to take unto thee Mary thy wife: for that which is conceived in her is of the Holy Ghost."

"And she shall bring forth a son, and thou shalt call his name Jesus: for he shall save his people from their sins."

"Now all this was done, that it might be fulfilled which was spoken of the Lord by the prophet, saying,

"Behold, a virgin shall be with child, and shall bring forth a son, and they shall call his name Emmanuel, which being interpreted is, God with us."

The prophet referred to by Matthew is Isaiah, who prophesied around 700 years before the birth of Christ. "There-

fore the Lord himself shall give you a sign: Behold, a virgin shall conceive, and bear a son, and shall call his name Emmanuel."

St. Luke tells us, "And it came to pass in those days, that there went out a decree from Caesar Augustus, that all the world should be taxed...And all went to be taxed, every one into his own city."

"And Joseph also went up from Galilee, out of the city of Nazareth, into Judea, unto the city of David, which is called Bethlehem: because he was of the house of lineage of David."

"To be taxed with Mary his espoused wife, being great with child."

It was part of God's plan that His Son should be born to the wife of Joseph, a son

of Abraham.

For the birth of Jesus fulfilled a promise by God to Abraham, who was called to be the father of many nations.

It was to Abraham that the One God first revealed himself. It was Abraham who was willing to leave his home and family to journey to a strange land in obedience to the Lord.

Because of Abraham's great faith, God rewarded him with a promise: "...I will bless thee, and in multiplying I will multiply thy seed as the stars of the heaven, and as the sand which is upon the sea shore..."

God also included other nations in his promise to Abraham: "And in thy seed shall all the nations of the earth be blessed; because thou hast obeyed my voice."

God kept his promise to Abraham: despite his old age, the patriarch begat a son, Isaac, who in turn begat Jacob. Jacob in turn begat twelve sons, the ancestors of the twelve tribes of Israel. One of these twelve, Judah, was destined to be the ancestor of David, the King. David in turn, became the ancestor of Joseph, the husband of Mary, who was to be the mother of Jesus.

The prophet Isaiah foretold that the Messiah was to come from the line of David, the son of Jesse: "And there shall come forth a rod out of the stem of Jesse, and a branch shall grow out of his roots:

"And the spirit of the Lord shall rest upon him, the spirit of wisdom and understanding, the spirit of counsel and might, the spirit of knowledge and of the fear of the Lord..."

"And in that day there shall be a root of Jesse, which shall stand for an ensign of the people: to it shall the Gentiles seek; and his rest shall be glorious."

It was because he was of the house of David that Joseph had to journey to Bethle-

hem while Mary was with child. In journeying to Bethlehem, Mary and Joseph were fulfilling the prophecy of Micah: "But thou Bethlehem Ephrathah, though thou be little among the thousands of Judah, yet out of thee shall he come forth unto me that is to be ruler in Israel: whose goings forth have been from of old, from everlasting."

Studying the history of the nation shows us

that the birth of Jesus to the young spouse of a descendant of Abraham recalls God's promise to one man who

was faithful in answering God's call.

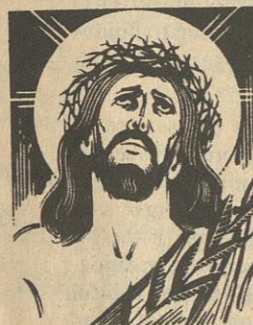

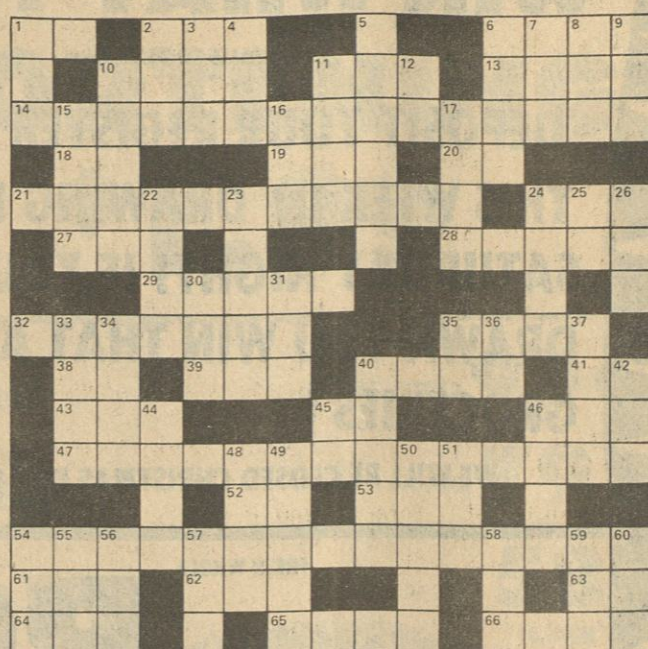

Prepare cookies first. Cream butter and sugars together in a large bowl. Beat in eggs, vanilla and pumpkin. In separate bowl, combine flour, baking powder, baking soda, salt, cinnamon, nutmeg, ginger, cloves and allspice. Add dry mixture gradually to creamed mixture until thoroughly mixed. Stir in diced prunes. Drop from large tablespoon (each drop should contain about 1 1/2 tablespoons of dough) onto greased baking sheet, placing drops 1 1/2 inches apart. The cookies will not spread as they bake. Bake at 375° F. for 18 to 20 minutes. While cookies are baking, prepare glaze. Combine all glaze ingredients in small bowl. Beat until smooth. Mixture should be the consistency of a thick glaze. When done, remove from oven and place on cooling racks. Waxed paper placed underneath. Drizzle hot cookies generously with glaze. Glaze will dry when cookies are cool. Makes 22 large cookies.

# Kathleen Norris Says:

## Our Third War Christmas

There was a Sunday school tree for poor children, always a wonderful spiritual uplift for the luckier children who wrapped and distributed packages.

Now that Christmas is so close some of us who are getting on in years are remembering other Christmases. It rather sobers me to realize that my Christmas recollections go back more than half a century - say to Christmas in 1893.

We lived in the country then; father, mother, unmarried aunt - almost every family was supplied with one of these, and six children. My father was a bank manager on

a salary of six thousand a year, which was considered wealth. We had a horse and a surrey, two cows, chickens, a cook and an upstairs maid. The cook did all the washing in a day when ladies and little girls revelled in white starched petticoats and embroidered muslin nighties; she did all the cooking and put up 400 jars of fruit every year. The maid helped with ironing, made the beds, swept the rooms, and acted

as nurse about half the time. These girls were paid \$22 and \$17 a month, respectively. Beef was 10 to 16 cents a pound, "soup vegetables came for nothing; bread was five cents a loaf; children's "pebble-goat" shoes cost less than two dollars a pair.

We children had plenty of jobs; we had no sense of sitting back and being waited upon. My older brother had full responsibility for the cows, horse and chickens; my sister and I had to dust rooms, to fill 17 lamps every day, to set and clear the dining table, to sweep porches, to run errands for the grown-ups. When the semi-annual sewing orgy was on, and Miss Wilde came, we had

to clear the sewing room every night, a job I think of even now and with loathing. Scraps and threads and paper patterns -

### CHURCH IMPORTANT AT CHRISTMAS

Christmas was a great time. Preparations had to go on about four fronts. Church was one important item. There must be special music, which meant night rehearsing with all its thrills of walks in the swinging lantern light; there must be special decorations. There was a Sunday School tree for poor children, always a wonderful spiritual uplift for the luckier children who wrapped and distributed packages.

Then there were presents to make and - more rarely - to buy. There was a tree to find, and fell, and trim. There was a kitchen excitement of seeding raisins and chopping citron, with all the grown-ups buzzing about. And finally, there were family arrivals, cousins, aunts, Grandma, coming in cold and beaming, and being welcomed by roaring fires and dancing children; dinner all ready, beds carefully assigned, red berries on the table and fragrant wreaths at the windows. And the solemn ceremony of stocking-hanging for the last thing Christmas Eve.

There was no war then, no talk of war. There had been a Civil war not too many years earlier, but as the family had

been sharply divided between Boston and Richmond, it was never mentioned. What was going on in the Balkans, in Ladysmith or Manchuria concerned us not at all. That the machines that men were even then inventing would one day grow into such hideous power that whole cities would fall in ashes beneath them; that war would reach out across the wide oceans and engulf us, never occurred for one instant to the ladies who sat rocking before the great wood fire. Telephones were new and considered a somewhat fearful power. No mention of automobiles, radio, movies as yet. No wireless; no planes. Without all these the world was a

safer-feeling place, whatever great good they may bring to mankind in the wiser years to come.

### EMPTY CHAIR THIS YEAR

There will be no Christmas like that old Christmas this year; not anywhere in the whole world. Not anywhere - father, mother, children, kinsfolk sitting down together to turkey and oyster soup and mince pie. There is an empty chair this year beside Mother, and Aunt Emily is very quiet in her new black. The smallest baby gets his rattle and his new blankets, but he doesn't get a kiss from his Daddy. Daddy has been a prisoner of war for long and weary months.

Everyone is resolutely cheerful, but the old gaiety is laid aside for awhile. The women's voices aren't murmuring about sage in the dressing or the ridiculous cost of doll buggies. No, this year it's "Still missing, Grandma. But Jim was a wonderful swimmer, and we hope -" "They heard last week; he may have leave in February." "They got the boxes off way back in October, but of course we don't know that they got there." "He's a lieutenant now, Uncle George - in Italy, we think." And so on and on until the roll call of every beloved name - and the Brown boy, and the Smith boy, and Mary Jones' husband, and Helen's father, is complete.

Oh, I hope the boys know it, know how our hearts are with them, how we pray for them and think of them and thank them, on all the battlefronts - in the long dull days of marking time in our camps, in the dreadful lonely white Aleutians, on the blazing roaring red lines of war, their mothers and wives and sisters are with them, every hour of the day.

### SPIRIT OF DAY MUST NOT SUFFER

And at home we must do what we can to keep Christmas still Christmas. If the turkey has turned itself into a lamb stew or a fish chowder; if the ice cream is only a rather weak frozen custard; if the presents are only what was left after the boys' boxes were shipped away, the spirit of Christmas need not suffer. There may still be wreaths in the windows and candlelight on the tree; the children may still arrange their tableaux and charades; the cousins and aunts may still come trooping in out of the cold to the welcoming fire.

"I hope you were in church, praying for me at the exact moment, Mother," wrote a boy from Sicily last July. "I thought of you all, Ellen and the kids and Dad and Betsey, and where you might be. I placed them all at home - well, say getting ready for Sunday supper on the porch. But I placed you in church, thinking of me and praying for me. Somebody must be,

for I seem to lead a charmed life. Don't stop."

### SPREAD JOY ON CHRISTMAS

Kathleen Norris reminisces about the Christmas of her childhood. Everyone in the family was kept busy. Most presents were not merely bought. They were created by the giver. Church affairs occupied most of the younger celebrants' time with rehearsals of carols and Christmas dramas. Out of all this activity blossomed the Christmas spirit which found its way into the hearts of the whole family. Today it may be difficult to find the glowing warmth of Christmas. But those who look forward to a better world realize the necessity of singing the eternal message: "Glory to God in the highest, and on Earth, peace to men of good will."

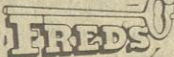

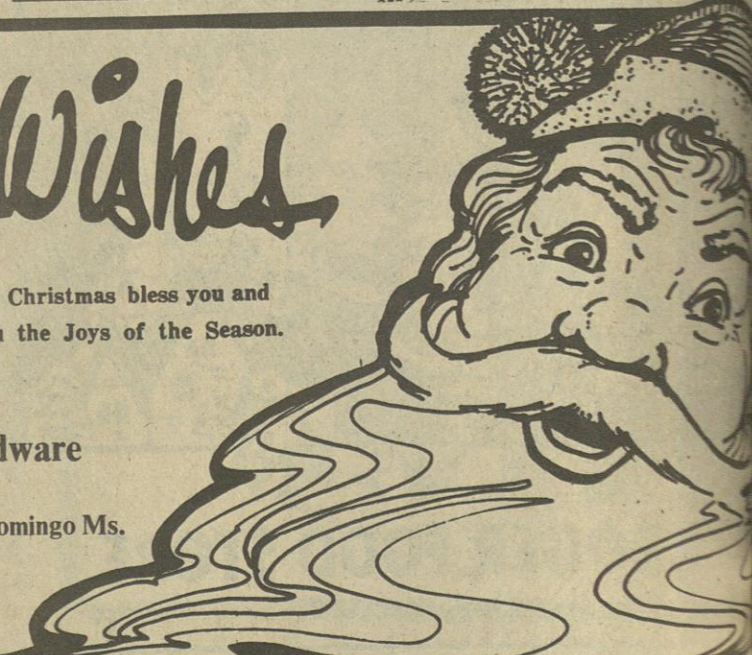

# Peace on Earth

## Star of Bethlehem Has Made Wise Men Wonder For All These Years

"Star of wonder, star of night, star with royal beauty bright..."

Ever since the first Christmas, the star that led the Wise Men to where the Infant Jesus lay has been the object of conjecture and wonder.

Unfortunately, the only reference to the star in Matthew's Gospel offers no explanation for the phenomenon: "And behold, the star that they had seen in the East went before them, until it came and stood over the place where the child was."

Thus it is that scientists and biblical scholars alike have been free to speculate about various theories, ranging from the supernatural to logical explanations.

One theory is that the star was actually a comet; another asserts that the star was probably a supernova, a star that suddenly blazes on spectacular brilliance.

There is still another theory that the star was actually a conjunction of planets. According to astronomical studies, there were three conjunctions of Jupiter and Saturn in the year 7 B.C. There were also major conjunctions of planets between 3 and 2 B.C., claim other studies. The 17th-century astronomer Kepler calculated that Mars, Saturn and Jupiter had been in conjunction around the time of Christ's birth.

One supernatural theory holds that the star was not physically manifested, but rather visible to only those who were privileged to the events of the Nativity. Others believe that God placed the star in the heavens expressly as a sign for a brief period of time. Interesting enough, this ties in with one scientific possibility: a new star, or a temporary star. Such stars have been observed from time to time; in fact, Hipparchus



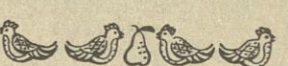
is believed to have discovered a brilliant star where none had been seen before in the year 134 B.C. Could this have been the Star of Bethlehem?

Aside from being a beacon to the Magi, the star also fulfills an important prophecy regarding the Messiah. The Book of Numbers foretold "There shall come a Star out of Jacob."

"Whatever explanation seems most plausible, Christians have always attached great significance to the star's appearance."

There have been many songs written about the Star of Bethlehem and certainly no Christmas tree would be complete without its star shining atop.

The Star of Bethlehem is a wondrous part of the still more wondrous Nativity story; its brilliance has come to symbolize for us the miracle that is Christmas: the birth of Jesus, the Light of the World.



## Nutcracker Ballet Now A Tradition

For many, the holiday season would not be complete without enjoying a performance of the *Nutcracker Suite*.

This popular ballet has come to be synonymous with Christmas, due to its holiday setting and beautiful music. Based on a story by E.T.A. Hoffmann, the ballet is probably Peter Ilyich Tchaikovsky's most beloved work. Each holi-

day season finds ballet groups, both amateur and professional, presenting it anew for the delight of youngsters and adults alike.

The story is a simple, yet fanciful one; a little girl is presented with a nutcracker at Christmas time. She dreams that the nutcracker comes to life in the person of a handsome prince who leads the toys to battle against an army of mice.

He then takes the girl off to Arabia, where she is entertained with dances by the Sugarplum Fairy and a delightful assortment of characters.

There are exotic Arabian dancers, quaint Chinese performers, and exciting Russian dancers among others, all in colorful attire.

Finally, there is a spectacular dance by lovely flowers, known as the "Waltz of the Flowers." As the flowers dance to the familiar, lilting music for the entranced young heroine and her handsome prince, it is easy to see that this ballet has truly captured the wonder and fancy of childhood for all to enjoy, regardless of age.

The *Nutcracker Suite* was first performed in 1892, and it has been delighting generations of ballet-lovers, young and old, ever since.

Tchaikovsky wrote many symphonies, concertos and overtures, but probably no single work of his is as popular as this Christmas classic.

Amidst the many lovely Christmas decorations that might be seen this season, perhaps the most unusual is a many-pointed star, shining either on the porch of a home or within a church.

This is the Moravian star, unusual in that it can have as many as 24 or 26

points. The star is a tradition of the Moravian church, founded here in America by settlers from Germany in 1741.

It is not known who invented the Moravian star but it is believed that the first many-pointed star originated in Germany during the 1800s.

The stars, preserved year after year by Moravians, are rich in symbolism. Beside being a reminder of the star followed by the three wise men, it recalls the scripture passage, "A star shall come out of Jacob," and the words of Jesus, "I am the root and offspring of David, and the bright and morning star."

The beautiful stars are often placed in homes on the first Sunday of Advent and usually remain there until the feast of the Epiphany in January.

In Bethlehem, Pennsylvania, the sizeable Moravian community will celebrate Christmas with this many-pointed star, as well as other old traditions. Among these customs is the making and decorating of beeswax candles, and the community putz.

The putz is an elaborate Christmas story, lovingly decorated and staged by families of the community.

## St. Francis said to have assembled 1st crib scene

Much is made of the Nativity Scene in Christian homes at Christmas-time. Over the centuries worshippers have expressed their devotion by creating the figures of Joseph, the Virgin Mary, the Christ-Child in His rudely fashioned crib, and the beasts of the field which according to legend surrounded the Holy Birth inside the manger.

Great artists have carved the figures from fine woods, sculpted them of precious metal and other materials, which have become treasured works for the world to admire.

St. Francis of Assisi had much to do with our modern Christmas traditions.

For one thing he is said to have assembled, in AD 1224, the first Nativity scene, using live people, live oxen and live donkeys. Franciscan churches still continue to make of this an illuminating seasonal custom.

**SALLY LUNN**  
2 packages active dry yeast  
1/2 cup warm water (105 to 115°)  
1 1/2 cups lukewarm milk (scalded then cooled)  
2 tablespoons sugar  
1 1/2 teaspoons salt  
2 eggs  
1/4 cup shortening  
5 1/2 cups Gold Medal® all-purpose flour\*

Dissolve yeast in warm water in large mixing bowl. Stir in remaining ingredients. Beat until smooth. Cover; let rise in warm place until double, about 1 hour. Stir down batter by beating about 25 strokes. Spread in greased tube pan, 10x4 inches. Let rise to within 1 inch of top of pan, about 45 minutes.

Heat oven to 350°. Bake until loaf is golden brown and crusty, 45 to 50 minutes. Remove from pan; serve warm. 16 servings.

## choice of date of the Child's birth was a happy augury

The earliest source regarding the exact date of the birth of Jesus:

The Christian era was

calculated by the monk Dionysius Exiguus in the 6th century after Christ. He placed Jesus' birth on Dec. 25 in the year 753 of Rome, and decided 754 should be the first year of the Christian era. However, Biblical scholars find error in his calculations and place the birth of Jesus at 4 B.C. or earlier.

In AD 274 the emperor Aurelian chose December 25 because it is just after the winter solstice, or the shortest day of the year, and light once more starts to strengthen and gradually flood more of the world for longer periods each day.

Besides, that date already was a great holiday for the pagan Romans, and Christian leaders thought it proper to move in and take over an accepted occasion.

What's more, no one knew the actual birth date of Jesus, since neither Scripture nor any contemporary legend gave any precise information on it.

At some point before AD 336 the church at Rome accepted December 25 as the day for commemorating His birth, and so it has been ever since, although because of a difference in calendars, the Eastern church celebration and that of Western churches rarely coincide.

In ancient Persia, December 25th was celebrated as the birthdate of the sun god, Mithras, who was believed to emerge from a rock three days after the winter solstice. A star seen by shepherds and Magi foretold his birth.

The music of carols fills the air, ringing in the brisk December afternoon. The sun, setting early, touches innumerable shaggy evergreens and buildings decked for Christmas with its pinkening glow, endowing them with a misty, almost mystical appearance. On Christmas eve, and stores are bustling with last-minute shoppers, searching yet for the perfect present for the special people in their lives.

Back at home, a sense of merriment prevails as fireplaces are lit with garlands of greenery, and Christmas trees adorned with a variety of dazzling ornaments — family heirlooms, glistening metallic balls, candy canes stripped of their plastic wrappings.

Upstairs, in a secret place, mom and dad play Santa Claus, and put the final wrappings on the presents. Later, after the children are asleep, they will file silently downstairs, arms overflowing with brightly decorated packages and a multitude of items meant to fill the row of stockings hanging from the mantel.

These are the elements of the contemporary American Christmas, a time of merriment for all and more crucially a time of joy, celebrating the birth of Jesus Christ. Some people believe that the true importance of the holiday is disguised by the glitter and the pageantry of its manifestations. Virtually every country on the globe has a different way of celebrating this important holiday, and all of them — merry or serious — are reflections of its joyfulness.

In Italy, the *presepio*, or *creche*, is the focus of much care and devotion, as elaborate manger scenes are constructed by eager hands. Everything is put in place on Christmas eve — the manger itself, the animals, the angels, the shepherds, Joseph and Mary. But, it is not till Christmas morning that the tiny figure of the infant Jesus is placed in the manger.

Jesus is placed lovingly in the crib, traditionally by the mother of the house.

In Germany, the country that gave the world the Christmas tree, the tree is the natural center of activity. The mother of the house is responsible for trimming it, and absolute secrecy prevails till she has completed her task.

For weeks prior to Christmas, she has been baking a vast assortment of cookies in decorative shapes — some are used as ornaments for the tree; more are eaten by the happy household.

In Poland, the Star of Bethlehem shines its rays over the Christmas festivities, a sign of the end of the Advent fast and the beginning of Christmas feasting. A Star Man and Star Boys pay each household a visit after supper has ended. Garbed in elaborate costumes, they orchestrate the Christmas eve activities, with the Star Man quizzing the children on the catechism, and giving them small gifts as reward for good performance, while the Star Boys regale the household with carols.

In Mexico, the poinsettias add brilliance to the Christmas festivities; its bright red and green leaves contribute to Mexicans' sense of it as the "flower of the holy night." Besides the poinsettia, the other uniquely Mexican contribution to Christmas celebrations is the *piñata*, a hollow vessel shaped like an animal or person, often fantastical, which is filled with a multitude of toys and candy. The children of the house are each blindfolded in turn, and given a stick with which to break the *piñata*. When one of them succeeds, they all share the favors that come tumbling out of it.

In Syria, a quieter tradition of Christmas celebrations prevails. The youngest son of each household reads out loud the story of the Nativity from the Bible, surrounded by his family, who sit quiet and attentive in a courtyard lit by a myriad of flickering candles. The gates of each home are locked — a sobering reminder of past years when religious persecution resulted in all worship

being conducted in secrecy.

While the child reads from the Gospel, the father of the family lights a pile of wood which has been readied. The blaze is watched closely, for tradition states that the way in which it burns will reflect the family's fortune in the new year. While waiting for the fire to burn itself out, the family sings psalms; when it is burned to embers, a wish is made, and each member of the family leaps over the fire's smoldering remains. A very different way of celebrating the Christmas holiday, indeed.

It remains a fact that, the world over, the Christmas spirit makes itself felt in a multitude of ways. And, every one, as it should be, is an expression of joy.

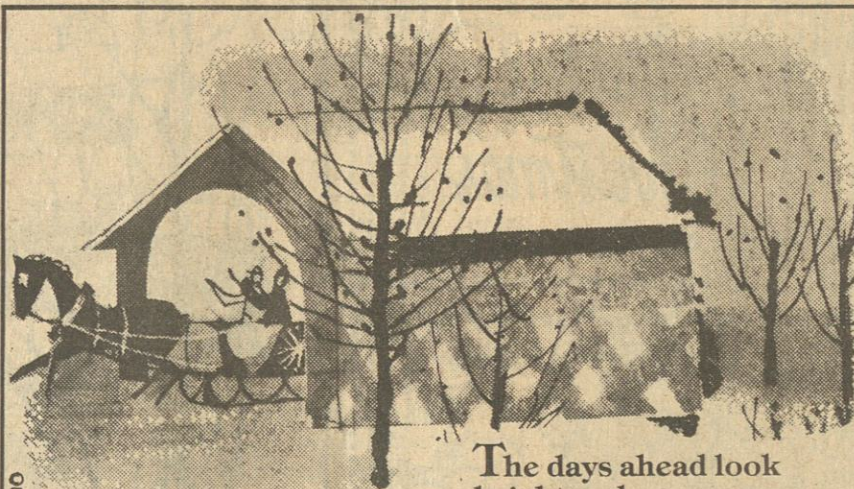

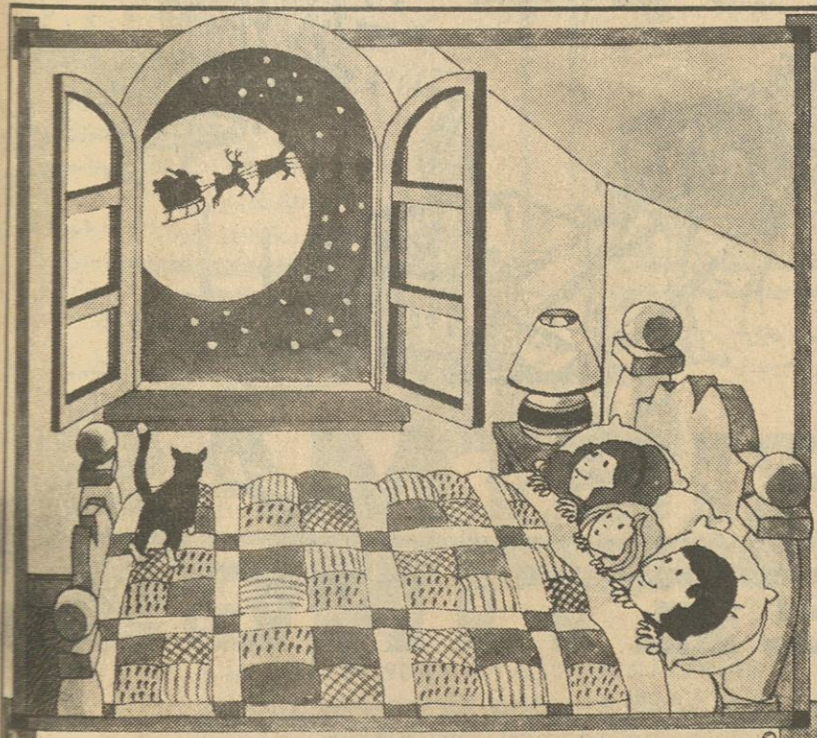

## Santa's A Beloved Symbol of Season

The jovial, genial figure of Santa Claus has had many names, and many origins throughout history. For over 1,700 years a Santa-figure has been said to visit in most regions of the globe and certainly no Christmas would be complete without the tradition of this cheery gift-giver.

The American Santa has his origin in the person of Saint Nicholas, Bishop of Myra in Lycia, Asia Minor. Nicholas lived in the early part of the Fourth century and was known for his good deeds and gifts for the needy. After his death, he became the symbol of goodness in Christian history.

Numerous trades and professions took the kindly bishop as their patron and soon his role expanded to that of gift-giver. When Dutch settlers brought the legend of Saint Nicholas to America, the name "San Nicholas" then became

Two centuries later, Clement Moore's poem, "A Visit From Saint Nicholas," made Santa's popularity soar, and changed his appearance. Originally thought to resemble the gaunt Saint Nicholas, Moore's work describes Santa as the small and stocky character we know today — a bearded man with sleigh and reindeer, bringing gifts and good cheer to all.

What about the reindeer? It is thought that Saint Nicholas traveled through the cold, northern regions on the wings of the rapid North Wind. In these colder, sparser areas, reindeer are the sole means of transportation. Hence, Santa's association with sleigh and his eight antlered friends.

Today, the legend of Santa remains alive as children place treats and stockings out on Christmas Eve with

the belief that Santa will reward them if they have been good during the preceding year.

## SNOWFLAKES AROUSE AWE, ADMIRATION

Among the many delights of Christmastime are those wondrous bits of crystal we call snowflakes. Is there any pastime more pleasant than watching the first snowfall of the season?

While scientists may describe snowflakes as water vapor in the air that has crystallized into geometrical forms, most snowflake fanciers prefer a term such as "snow blossoms". Although two snowflakes are rarely alike, they do fall into two distinct categories, columnar and tabular. Most of them are transparent, with brilliant facets that reflect light, giving them a white appearance when

massed.

Included in the columnar form of snowflakes are hexagonal columns and long, slender, needle-like columns.

Tabular forms are the most varied and beautiful snow crystals, assuming delicate, starry, branching forms. It is these crystals that have drawn the awe and admiration of scientists and lay persons alike for centuries.



Naturalists have attempted to draw these fragile patterns in earlier times and more recently

have made photo-micrographs of the crystals. Perhaps part of the fascination of snowflakes is their fleeting nature, enhancing the ethereal quality of their beauty.

Although we understand the process through which snowflakes are formed, thanks to science, we can never lose that sense of wonder and admiration at the first snowfall.

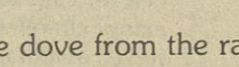

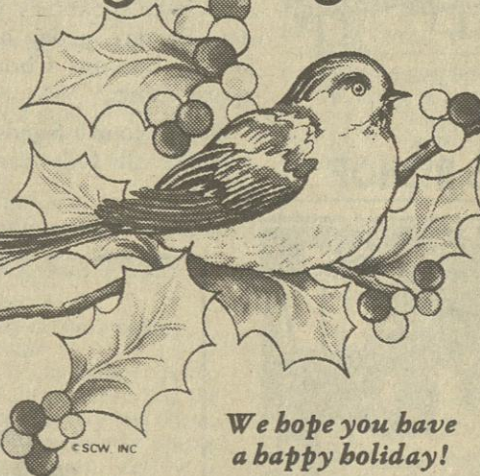

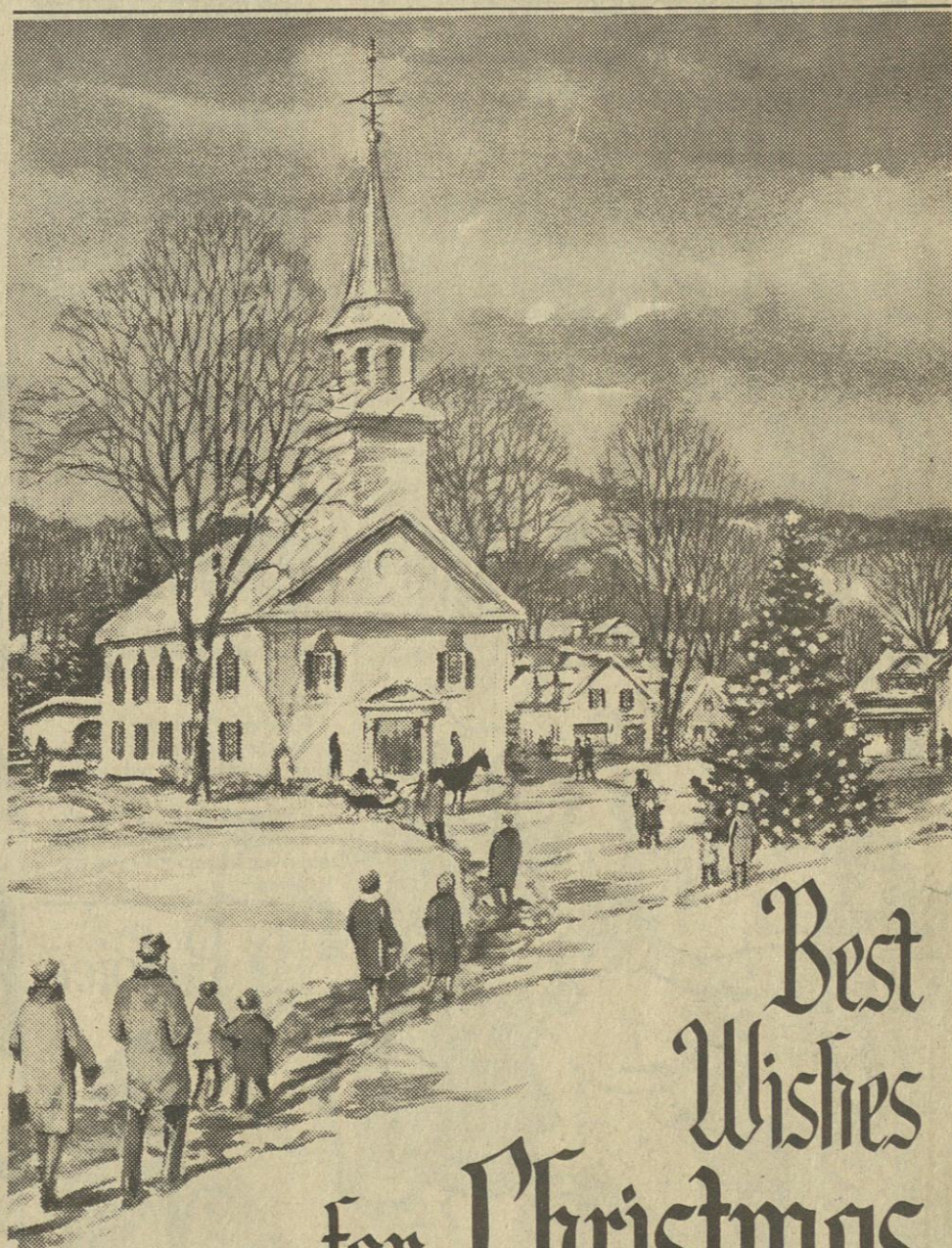

## Advent Prepares Faithful for Coming Christmas Season

Advent is that period that begins four Sundays before Christmas, and in many churches it is observed as a time of preparation for the coming holiday.

In some homes, an Advent wreath is prominently displayed as a reminder of the coming event. It can be just a circular frame, entwined with fir branches or other greenery, but it always has four candles placed upon it. During the Advent season, three of these candles are violet and one is rose. The violet color symbolizes repentance and the rose symbolizes joy. Often matching ribbons are tied around each candle.

On the first Sunday in Advent, only one candle is lit, one of the violet ones. Families may pray together during this lighting ceremony. In some homes, the father offers this prayer after the candle is lit:

"God our Father, we pray that this wreath will be for us a sign that you are always with us and that you never leave us. We want to always be in your presence and never leave you because of selfishness or hate. Let your blessing be on us and may this wreath point out to us that you bless us every day."

On the second Sunday of Advent, two violet candles are lit. On the third Sunday, two violet candles and the rose candle are lit. This Third Sunday is known in church calendars as *Gaudete Sunday*, a day of rejoicing because Christ is approaching.

On the fourth Sunday of Advent, all four candles are lit.

There is much symbolism

involved in the custom of the Advent wreath, which serves as a reminder to the faithful that Christ, the light of the world, dispels the darkness of sin, ignorance, and hate.

1/4 cup orange juice  
1 cup sugar  
2 cups pecan halves

Combine sugar and orange juice in a 2-quart (12 x 7) glass baking dish and mix well. Stir in pecans.

Microwave for 6 minutes at MEDIUM HIGH. Stir and continue cooking for 8 minutes or until syrup crystallizes.

Spread, separate, and cool glazed nuts on buttered cookie sheet.

Store in tightly covered container.

1/4 tsp. green food coloring  
6 cups corn flakes  
Red cinnamon candies

In a 3-quart glass mixing bowl, melt butter and marshmallows at HIGH for 3 minutes or until marshmallows are melted.

Add food coloring and mix well. Add corn flakes and mix until all flakes are coated with syrup.

With hands, form cookies into a ball the size of a golf ball, and then shape into a wreath.

Place on wax paper. While cookies are still warm decorate with red cinnamon candies.

If mixture cools before all wreaths are made, put back into oven and microwave for 30 seconds.

# St. Lucy's Day: "Festival of lights" brightens Swedish Advent

Swedish has traditionally celebrated the festival of light over darkness. The well-known of these "Festivals of light" is the Jewish holiday of Hanukkah, which usually falls in the month of December and lasts for eight days. This holiday is chiefly observed in Sweden, where most households have their Lucia Queen.

St. Lucy is impersonated by a young girl, usually blond, who is garbed in the customary flowing white gown, which is sashed in red and decorated with stars. On her head, the Lucia Queen wears a crown of bilberries, in which lighted candles have been arranged.

In the early hours of the morning of December 13th, before sunrise has begun to light the sky, the Lucia Queen proceeds slowly throughout her home, singing the traditional "Lucia song."

She awakens the household, bringing them hot coffee and special buns, known as *lussekatter*, which are flavored with either saffron or cardamom, and formed

into braids, twists or, sometimes, cats. After she has finished this task, she goes out to the barn, bringing food and coffee to the farmhands and special food for the animals.

Later in the day, there is a church ceremony, during which a young girl attired as Lucia, candles burning in her crown, brings light into a darkened church. She is frequently followed by young boys garbed as "star-boys." These "star-boys" carry staffs crowned with stars and wear star-studded caps.

How did St. Lucy's Day become a "Festival of Lights?" Lucy, a Christian martyr, who lived in Syracuse in Sicily in the third century AD, and who herself was cruelly blinded, is the saint who restores sight to the blind — bringing light to darkness.

St. Lucy is frequently represented in paintings carrying a lamp or torch, reinforcing her position as the bringer of light.

Additionally, according to the Old Style calendar, St. Lucy's Day, December 13th, is the shortest day of the year, and thus the darkest — the ideal time to celebrate the yearly victory of light over darkness.

How the celebration of St. Lucy's Day made its way from Sicily to Sweden is something of a mystery. The first celebration of St. Lucy's Day in Sweden would seem to have occurred in the 18th century, but it wasn't until the 19th century that the custom of nominating a young girl to take the part of St. Lucy seems to have taken hold, and then only in rural areas.

And, it was only toward the end of the 1920s that the holiday was popularized in Stockholm, where the Lucia Queen would lead processions through the city streets.

The joyous acceptance of the St. Lucy's Day festivities in Stockholm was immediate, ensuring the holiday a permanent place in the Advent calendar, and in the hearts of Swedes.

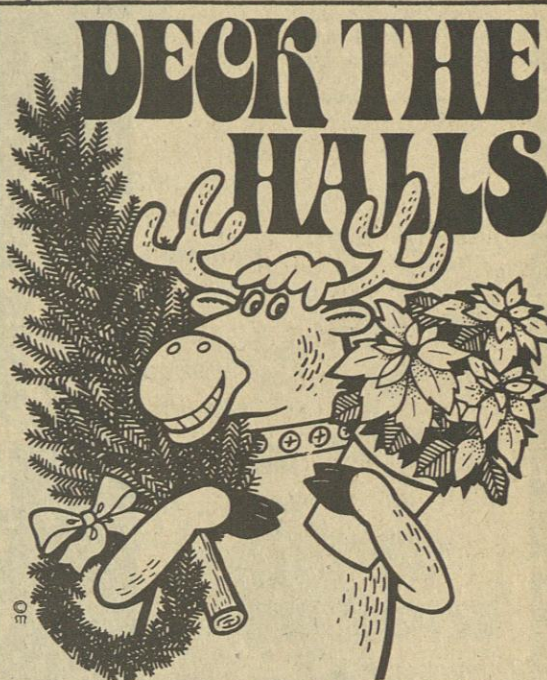

Joyfully, Manuelito plucked the flower and carried it inside, to lay before the altar.

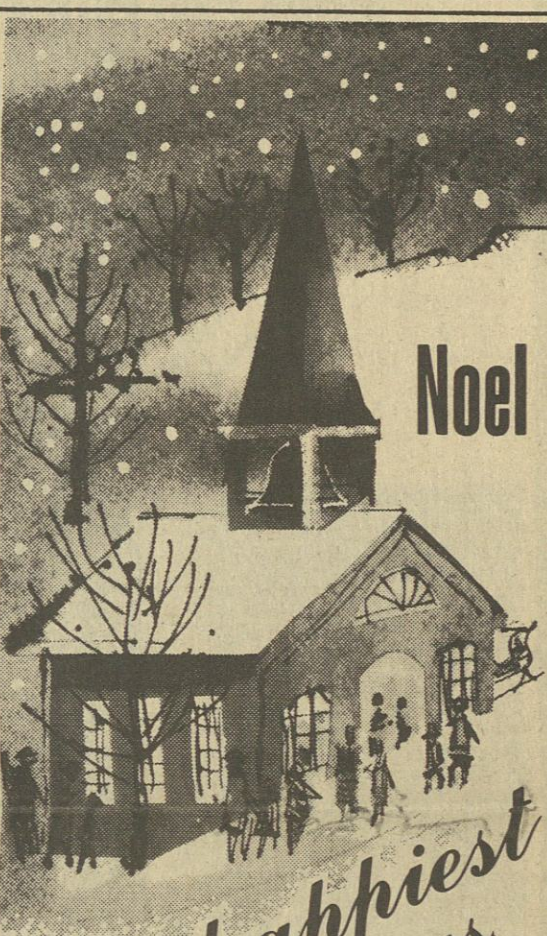

## Homemade candy—terrific way to sweeten the season

Candy is a perennial favorite, and the homemade variety is best of all. If you've never played confectioner before you'll want an authoritative book to turn to, one that supplies not only the recipes (that's only one of it), but which also gives you a background on candy-making.

One such book is *Candy Recipes and Other Confections* by May B. Van Arsdale, published by Parrish Casa Emel-

los. The book outlines cooking temperatures for various confection types, as well as giving an overview of different candy categories, the necessary equipment and basic ingredients.

Recipe chapters tempt the potential confectioner with Fondant; Fudge; Penuche; Operas; Divinity and Nougat; Maple Candies; and Popcorn Candies, to name a few.

Reprinted below, from *Candy Recipes and Other Confections* are recipes for

two sweet treats. Molasses Pop Corn Balls and Caramel Walnut Squares, both perfect offerings for Christmas get-togethers.

### MOLASSES POP CORN BALLS

#### LARGE RECIPE

- 1 cup light molasses
- 1 cup dark corn syrup
- 1 tablespoon vinegar
- 3 tablespoons butter
- 3 quarts popped corn
- 1/2 teaspoon salt

#### SMALL RECIPE

- 1/2 cup light molasses
- 1/2 cup dark corn syrup
- 1/2 tablespoon vinegar
- 1 1/2 tablespoons butter
- 1 1/2 quarts popped corn
- 1/4 teaspoon salt

Mix molasses, syrup, and vinegar in a saucepan and cook, stirring occasionally to prevent burning, until the temperature 270°F. is reached. After 240°F. is reached, constant stirring will be necessary. When done add butter and stir only enough to mix. Slowly pour the cooked syrup over the salted popped corn and mix well.

Form into balls with the hands, using as little pressure as possible.

Two drops of oil of lemon may be added to the syrup.

Cold water test when syrup reaches 270°F.: slightly brittle.

Yield (large recipe): number of balls — twenty (two and one-half inches in diameter).

### CARAMEL WALNUT SQUARES

- 2 tablespoons butter
- 3 tablespoons dark caramel syrup
- 2 tablespoons condensed milk
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1/8 teaspoon salt
- 1 pound confectioners' sugar
- 1/4 cup chopped walnuts

Melt the butter, add the caramel syrup, condensed milk and vanilla. Mix and add the salt and sugar. Knead in the chopped nuts. Press into a lightly buttered pan, cool, remove from pan and cut into squares.

Yield: weight about 1 1/4 pounds.

### CARAMEL SYRUP

- 1 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup or more boiling water

In a frying pan or a heavy aluminum saucepan heat the sugar over a very low flame, stirring constantly with a wooden spoon, until it is melted to a syrup. Remove

from the flame and add the water slowly while stirring. Return to flame and allow it to simmer until it is a thin syrup. If there are any lumps add a little more water and boil it until the lumps dissolve.

Caramel syrup may be used for waffles or griddle cakes either as it is or mixed with an equal amount of corn syrup. One-fourth teaspoon of vanilla may be added if desired. If it is to be used for this purpose the water must be added to the melted sugar when it is a very light golden brown. It is also used as a flavoring in candies, frostings, custards, ice cream and other desserts. If it is to be used as a flavoring material the sugar must be heated until it is a deep golden brown before adding the water in order to develop a strong caramel flavor.

When the boiling is finished the product must be a thin syrup. If not to be used immediately, keep it in a covered jar.

Yield: About 1/2 cup.

### LIBBY'S FAMOUS PUMPKIN PIE

- 2 eggs, slightly beaten
- 1 can (16-oz.) LIBBY'S Solid Pack Pumpkin
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon ground ginger

- 1/4 teaspoon ground cloves
- 1 1/2 cups (13 fluid oz.) evaporated milk or light cream
- 1 9-inch unbaked pie shell with high fluted edge

Preheat oven to 425°F. Mix filling ingredients in order given.

Pour into pie shell. Bake at 425°F. for 15 minutes.

Reduce heat to 350°F. and continue baking for 45 minutes or until knife inserted near center of pie filling comes out clean.

Cool completely on wire rack.

Garnish suggestions: Shivers of crystallized ginger, whipped cream or topping, walnut halves, slivered almonds, crushed peanut brittle.

## Mistletoe lore, traditions

Kissing beneath the mistletoe — a charming custom that virtually all of us have indulged in at one time or another.

As the Christmas season rolls around, fellows vie to hang the sprig of mistletoe from doorways, somewhat hidden from view, only to surprise an unsuspecting young lady with a kiss when she steps through the door and under the mistletoe.

Like many other Christmas traditions observed in this country, kissing under the mistletoe would seem to have originated in England. Numerous variations of the custom existed there.

One instructed young men to pluck a berry from the mistletoe bough each time they kissed a young lady. When all the berries were gone, the kissing was over.

In many parts of England, the Kissing Bunch was popular. This was an extremely elaborate arrangement of greenery such as holly and ivy on a pair of hoops looped inside each other. Also part of the Kissing Bunch were colored ribbons, apples, oranges and paper roses, and three dolls, representing Jesus Christ, Mary and Joseph, which were hung from inside the hoops or, on occasion, arranged in a manger scene. From the bottom of the Kissing Bunch depended a sprig of mistletoe.

The Kissing Bunch would be hung in the center of a room, and all who passed under it would earn the right to seize a kiss.

A related custom is practiced in Austria and the Alpine region on New Year's Eve. There, the local inn is decked out in greenery, and the main room decorated with a pine wreath hanging from the roof beams.

In one corner of the room, a masked man lurks. He is known as "Sylvester," appears old and hideous, and wears a wreath of mistletoe. Whenever a young man or woman passes under the pine wreath, it is Sylvester's privilege to leap out and plant a rough kiss on the individual's cheek. However, his reign is short-lived for at midnight he is chased away — a grotesque figure of the year which is now gone.

Why all this fuss about mistletoe? What legends, hid in the mists of time, have impressed upon this parasitic evergreen which lives upon non-evergreens, and particularly the oak, an importance of this sort?

Many pre-Christian cultures have revered the mistletoe. It was probably Sir James Frazer's "golden bough," a central metaphor in classical mythology.

In Norse mythology, too, it is of central importance, for it was with an arrow made from mistletoe that the Scandinavian hero Balder was killed.

His mother, the goddess Frigga, cried passionately and, so the legend says, every one of her tears became the mistletoe's white berries.

In order to console Frigga for her son's

death, the other Norse gods decreed that mistletoe should no longer be an independent plant, but become a parasite and, instead of being the cause of woe, should bring about good will — thus was born the custom of kissing underneath it.

The Druids, the Celtic priests of pre-Christian Britain, revered the holy mistletoe, which grew entwined on their sacred oak, and which they believed to contain the soul of the living oak tree.

According to Druidic legend the mistletoe, which grew out of the air itself, clung to the oak tree for support.

At the New Year, the Druids engaged in an elaborate ceremony which centered on the mistletoe. One Druid, garbed in white, would climb an oak tree and cut down a bough of mistletoe with a golden sickle.

Below the tree, to catch the mistletoe as it fell, was a white cloth, for the Druids believed that the mistletoe must never touch the ground lest it be sullied. Once this part of the ceremony was complete, two white bulls would be sacrificed, and prayers were intoned.

The Druids believed that the mistletoe had great curative powers, and called it the "all-healer." Applied to barren animals, it would make them bear young, and it was efficacious against poisons, epilepsy, consumption and the like. It was generally hung above doorways or over the fireplace.

Christian legend has it that the mistletoe, originally a free-standing tree, was the wood used for the Cross. However, because of the evil purpose it served it suffered the fate of becoming a parasite, never again to live independently but always to live on another plant.

Another related legend states the mistletoe, after being used for the Cross, shrank to its lowly, shriveled state — a fit punishment for the use to which it was put.

However, it is its role as a tool of evil for the eventual attainment of good that gives mistletoe its place in myth and legend, and reinforces its importance in the celebration of Christmas.

### APRICOT RICE APPEALS

Looking for a quick and easy side dish you can serve with pride during the busy holiday season?

Golden Apricot Rice Dressing, made with American grown rice, fits the bill.



### GOLDEN APRICOT RICE DRESSING

- 1/2 cup chopped onions
- 2 tablespoons butter or margarine
- 1 cup sliced celery
- 1/2 cup green pepper strips
- 1 cup uncooked rice
- 2 cups chicken broth
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/8 teaspoon ground white pepper
- 1/4 cup snipped dried apricots
- 2 tablespoons sugar

Cook onions in butter until soft but not brown. Add celery, green pepper, rice, broth, salt, and white pepper. Bring to a boil; stir. Reduce heat, cover, and simmer 15 minutes or until rice is tender and liquid is absorbed. Stir in apricots and sugar. Replace cover and let stand 5 to 10 minutes. Toss lightly before serving. Makes 6 servings.

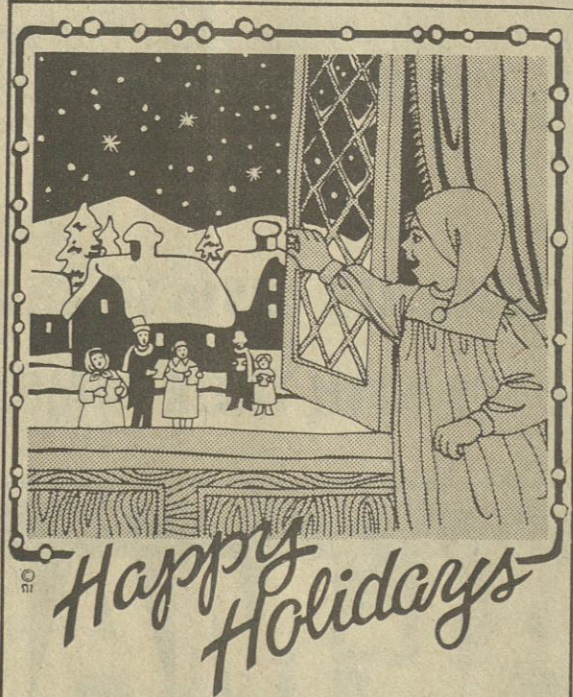

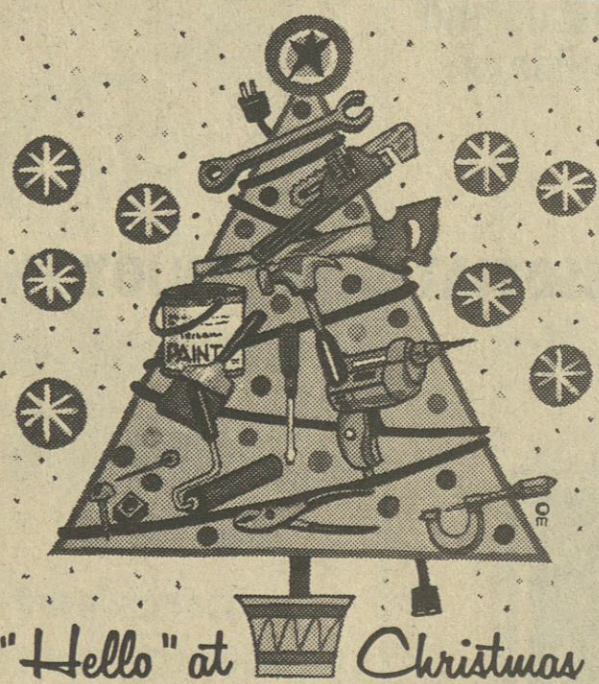

## How much do you know about the Twelve Days of Christmas?

The Twelve Days of Christmas are the most important time of the year for many people, chiefly as the *raison d'être* of a fabulous gift-giving season. The gifts are swans, geese, dancing ladies and the impenetrable in its pear tree, star of the Christmas cards.

Of course, knows Christmas (which, depending on which calendar is using, is either the first of the Twelve Days or just prior to them), as Epiphany, January 6, the Twelfth Day, which signifies the close of the Christmas season. But how many people know the Holy Days which fall between the two?

Concept of the Twelve Days probably originated as a Teutonic, pre-Christian custom which was seized upon by the church as a convenient link between Christmas and Epiphany, and only a few days are traditionally celebrated.

St. Stephen's Day (December 26), St. John's Day (December 27) and St. Innocent's Day, also known as St. Stephen's Day (December 28).

St. Stephen's Day honors the first martyr of the Christian church, who died a death by stoning in 33 A.D.

Because St. Stephen is the patron saint of horses, the day was considered propitious for such activities as sweating and bleeding horses.

In Sweden, where the holiday was most extensively observed, it was traditional for peasants to travel — sometimes a great distance — to neighboring farms to care for each other's horses on St. Stephen's Day.

Also in Sweden, St. Stephen's Day was customarily celebrated with horse racing, presumably a throwback to pagan purification rituals which were centered around horseback riding and races.

St. John's Day is associated chiefly with the tradition of drinking wine which has been blessed, and which was believed to render the imbiber safe from the effects of poison throughout the coming year.

This custom commemorates a cup of poisoned wine which St. John the Apostle drank when challenged by a pagan priestess to do so as a test of God's power. Miraculously, St. John drank the wine without ill effects, having first made the sign of the cross over it.

Variations on the theme in regions of Europe have believers drinking consecrated wine to protect them from a wide assortment of ills: not only poison, but

lightning, ill health, a poor harvest and spoiled wine.

This has caused speculation among scholars that the drinking — sometimes to excess! — of wine on St. John's Day arose as a holdover from a pagan wine sacrifice.

At any rate, wine drinking on December 27th was so widespread that certain 17th century German scholars wittily suggested that *Weihnacht* — the German name for Christmas — might well be changed to *Weihnacht*, wine night.

Childermas, the last in this triad of holy days, marks Herod's massacre of the innocents, by which means he hoped to kill the infant Jesus.

It is, according to tradition, a particularly unlucky date. No one, if he could help it, would begin something on that day. King Edward IV of England went so far as to postpone his coronation, originally scheduled for Holy Innocents Day, and King Louis XI of France categorically refused to transact business on that date.

Leaving matters of state aside, housewives in Cornwall in Southern England refused to scrub their abodes on Childermas, and their counterparts in Northamptonshire eschewed doing the wash.

## Tips for Fire Safety

Don't let your Christmas go up in smoke. Protect your family by following these tips, which are part of the Burger King Fire Safety Program.

- Buy only a fresh Christmas tree—one whose needles are moist and soft. Stand it in a water-filled container to keep it from drying out.

- If you buy an artificial tree, be sure it is certified as flame retardant.


- Place the tree in a cool area, NEVER near a heater or the fireplace.

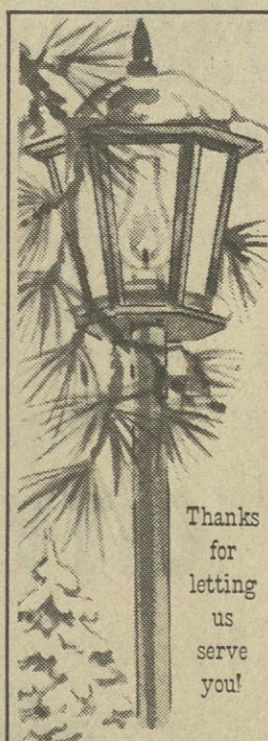

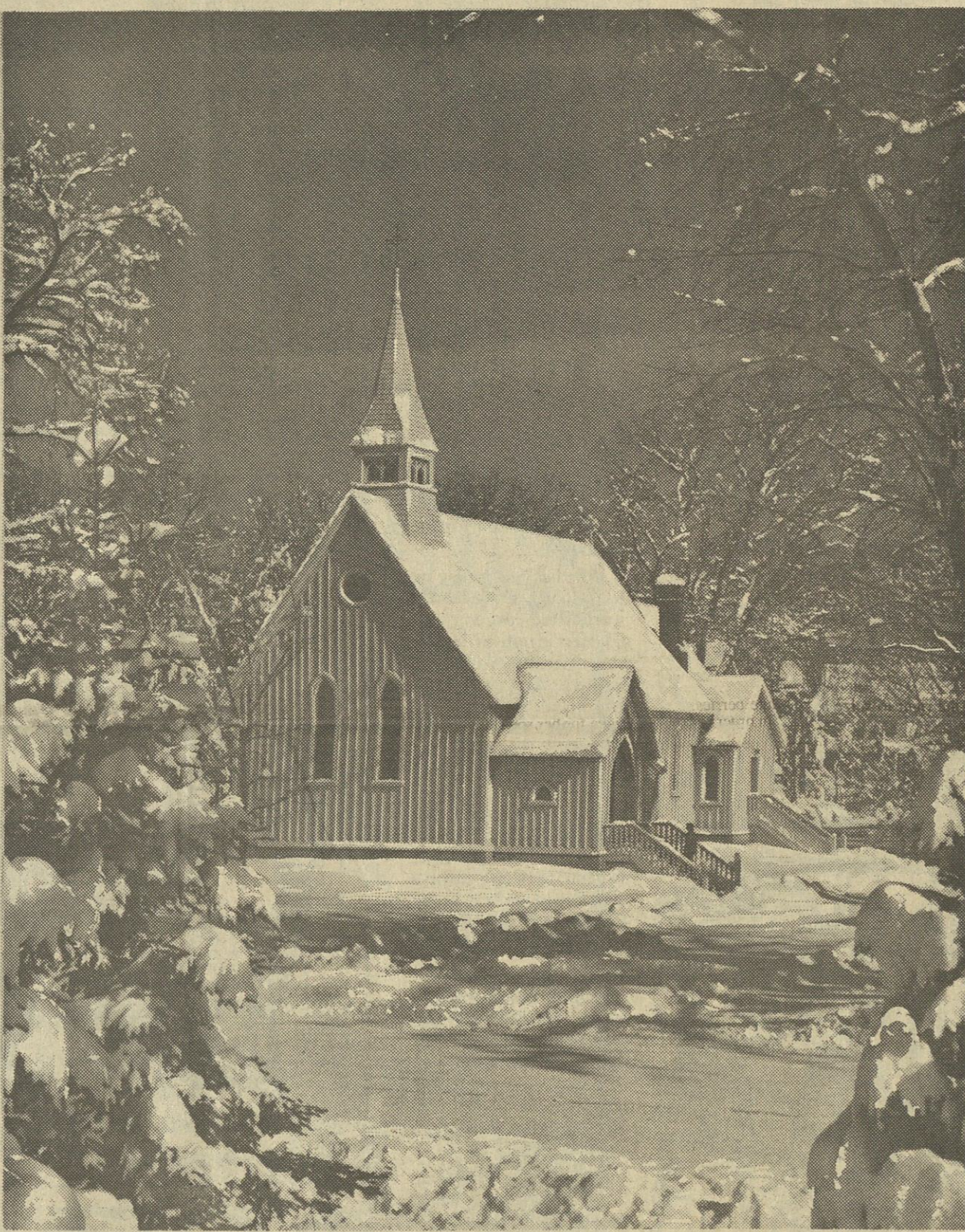

good night!"

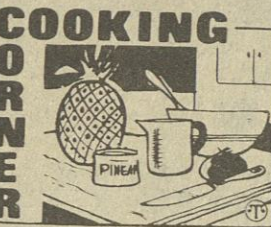

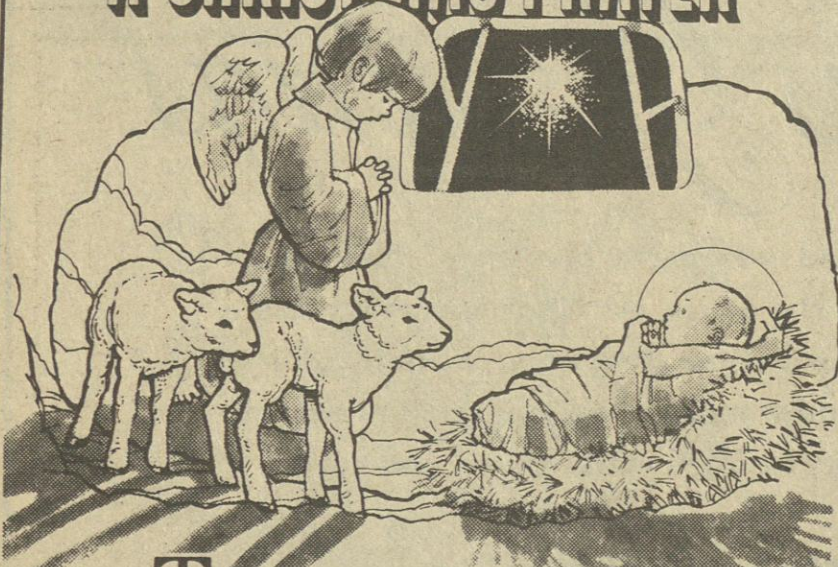

# Tracing the spicy history of mincemeat, a favorite wuletide dessert, from the Middle Ages through today

and pulled out a plum, and said, "What a good boy am I!"

Today, in England, Jack Horner Pie is a popular Christmas gift. It is not a food-stuff, however, but a package in the shape of a pie which contains an assortment of small presents.

Mince pie is, of course, still popular in England, though its ingredients have changed markedly over the centuries. In the 17th century, one recipe for mincemeat called for lamb, suet, currants, raisins, prunes and a handful of spices — caraway seeds, mace, nutmeg, cloves, black pepper and salt.

By the 19th century the recipe had been considerably elaborated. For instance, one Victorian "receipt" book called for mincemeat to be made with the following ingredients: beef suet, apples, currants, raisins, sugar, citron, candied lemon and orange peel, roast beef, nutmeg, salt, ginger, coriander seed, allspice, cloves, lemon juice, brandy and sweet wine. (The liquors, one assumes, took over some of the preservative function of the spices.)

Eliza Acton, one of the grand dames of 19th century cooking, included a recipe in her cookbook for Mince Pies Royal which, instead of being covered by a top crust, were crowned instead by a great puff of meringue, baked till golden.

In Victorian times, the mincemeat filling itself was usually made weeks or even months in advance and, lacking refrigeration, was preserved by being packaged in small jars which were tightly covered by a paper soaked in brandy or other spirit.

Today, unfortunately, there has been a further change in the preparation of mincemeat, and the ingredient often lacking is the one for which it was named — the meat, itself.

If you'd like to try mincemeat the way it was made in Queen Victoria's day, the following recipe, adapted from Eliza Acton's original by Lorna Sass for her unique volume, *Christmas Feasts from History* (Irena Chalmers Cookbooks, Inc.) is a good place to start.

Included from Sass' volume is the recipe for Superlative Mincemeat and the one for Mince Pies Royal.

## SUPERLATIVE MINCEMEAT

Makes 1½ quarts or 2¾ pounds

- 2 large lemons
- 2 small tart apples, pared, cored and grated
- 2 cups raisins
- 2 cups dried currants
- Generous ¼ cup coarsely chopped citron
- Generous ¼ cup coarsely chopped candied orange peel
- 2 cups (½ pound) loosely packed grated beef kidney suet
- 1 tablespoon freshly grated nutmeg
- ½ teaspoon mace
- ¾ teaspoon ground ginger
- 1 teaspoon salt
- ½ cup of brandy
- ¼ pound lean round beef, ground (optional; see note)

Preheat oven to 350 degrees.

In a small saucepan, cover the lemons with water. Bring to a boil and simmer for 20 minutes. Remove the lemons, cut them in half and remove the pits. Chop the lemons finely.

In a bowl, combine the remaining ingredients together and mix them very well.

Press the mincemeat into large sterile jars with tight-fitting lids and store them in a cool place until needed. Should the mincemeat at any time seem dry and

crumbly, perk it up by stirring in more brandy.

NOTE: This recipe makes enough for 2 8-inch covered pies or about 3 dozen Mince Pies Royal (see following recipe). If you plan to bake the mincemeat in pies or tarts, you will find that adding the meat at the last minute enriches the flavor. If

you do this, do not plan on storing the mincemeat for more than a few days in the refrigerator.

## MINCE PIES ROYAL

Makes 12 3½-inch tartlets

- 1 pound Superlative Mincemeat (see preceding recipe)
- 10 tablespoons sugar
- ¼ cup lemon juice
- Grated rind of 2 lemons
- ¼ cup clarified butter
- 8 egg yolks
- 3 egg whites

## FOR THE SHORT CRUST:

- 2 tablespoons sugar
- Scant 2 cups flour
- 1½ sticks (6 ounces) chilled butter, cut into bits
- 2 tablespoons ice water

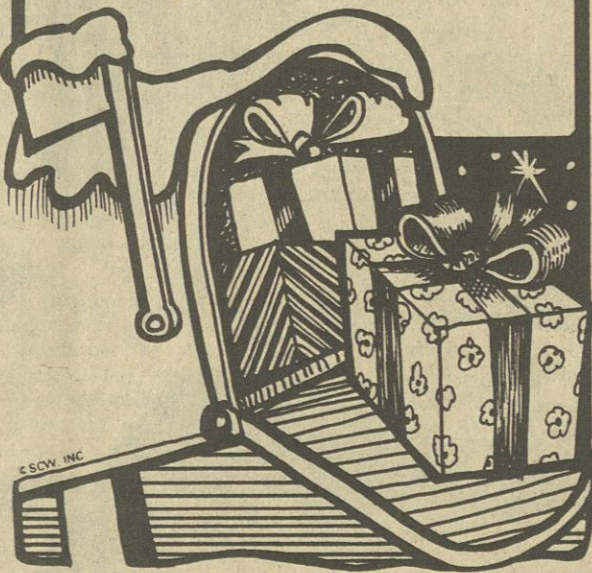

During the American Revolution, many brides did not wear white wedding gowns; they wore red as a symbol of rebellion.

In a bowl, combine Superlative Mincemeat with 6 tablespoons of sugar, the lemon juice, lemon rind, clarified butter and egg yolks. Blend well and set aside.

To prepare the crust, combine the flour with the sugar in a bowl or in a food processor. Cut the butter into the flour until the mixture resembles oatmeal. Rapidly blend the ice water into the flour and knead briefly.

Lightly grease 12 tartlet shells. On a lightly floured board, roll out the dough until it is about ¼ inch thick. (You may fold the dough a few times, envelope fashion, as for puff pastry, but this instruction in the original recipe does not seem worth the effort.) Cut out circles and press them into the tartlet shells, making sure to patch up any holes.

Spoon some mincemeat into each shell and bake for 20 minutes. When the filling

is set, beat the egg whites with the remaining 4 tablespoons of sugar until stiff. Spread this meringue over each tartlet and bake for 25 minutes longer. Remove the tartlets from the oven and cool them on a rack for about 10 minutes. To remove them from the tins, run a knife along the edges and gently pry them out.

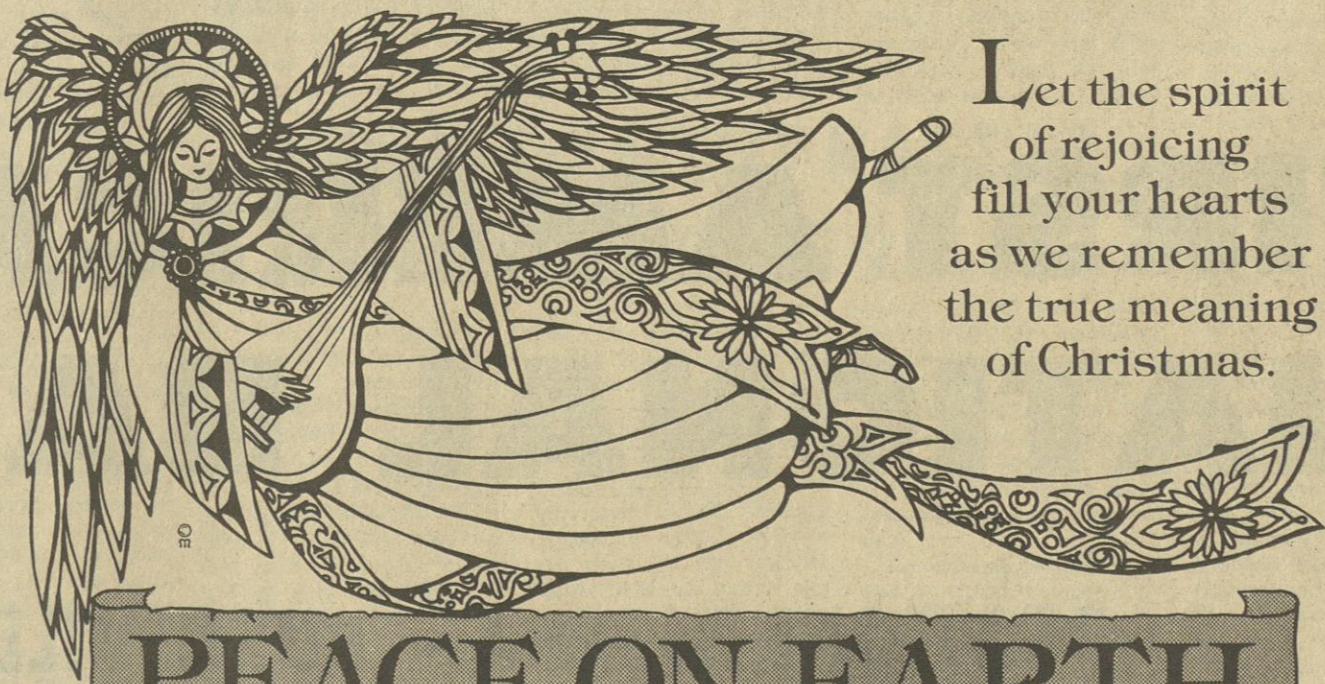

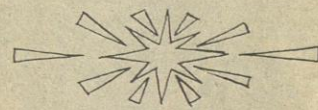
