Three Northeast Mississippi Counties **Disaster Loans**

Farmers in three Northeast Mississippi counties are eligible to seek emergency loans due to losses suffered this month from ice and snow, U.S. Senator Thad Cochran (R-Miss.) said.

Senator Cochran said the Farmers Home Administration in Washington notified him it was declaring Itawamba, Monroe and Tishomingo counties eligible for disaster declarations.

The agency said the designation came after farmers and poultry producers in the area suffered heavy losses and property damage during ice and snow storms which occurred Feb. 1.7.

Farmers Home said farmers in those counties had until Oct. 14 this year to apply for emergency loans at the agency's local offices in those counties.

Senator Cochran said Farmers Home informed him the disaster declaration for Itawamba, Monroe and **Tishomingo was effective**

this area, according to Cecil Brown, Manager of Tishomingo County Electric Power Association. "Electric bills for most customers with electric heat

are much higher than last month," Brown stated. "Most bills will also be higher than for the same period last year," he added.

This is due almost entirely to the colder weather and not to higher rates. Brown ex- coincide with the calendar

only 38 cents over last year due to rate changes. Weather bureau records in Tupelo show this January had 1018 degree days. December was much warmer than nor-

mal with only 363 degree days. This means that almost three times as much heat was required during January as compared with December. It also means that this January was 37 percent colder than normal and 15 percent colder

month. But the above information can give customers an indication of what to expect in bills reflecting heating costs. Mr. Brown advises customers to plan their current budgets in anticipation of higher heating

bills "Brown also urges customers who have not done so to request a free home energy survey. This can be done by calling the Power Association office. A trained energy advisor will make an on-site survey of your home and make recommendations cost effective for weatherization improvements

needed. Electric heating and cooling customers will probably be eligible for interest-free weatherization loans. Measures eligible for financing include insulation, storm windows, weatherstripping, and caulking.

Electric heating customers should also ask about the Heat Pump Finance Plan. This is a program for providing surveys, recommendations and low-cost loans for approved heat pump installations. "The heat pump is much more efficient and uses less electricity than ordinary electric furnaces," Brown added





New Vegetable Varieties For 1985

Another Cold Weather Tip

The extreme cold weather of recent weeks has forced battery's positive terminal. Now attach the other end to the positive terminal of the booster battery.

Clamp one end of the second cable (black) to the negative terminal of the booster battery and the other end to the dead vehicle's engine block or an attached, unpainted component such as the alternator bracket. This last connection

should be made at least a foot from the battery. Make sure connections are secure and that battery terminals and iumper cable clamps are free of corrosion.

Feed Grain Program

Allows 90% Planting Howard R. Bridges, Chairman of the Tishomingo County ASC Committee, said farmers may plant and harvest 90% of their feed grain acreage base and be eligible for benefits under the 1985 feed grain program. Ten percent of the farm's feed grain base would be removed from production to keep corn supplies in line with demand.

"All farmers with an established acreage base are eligible to participate in the voluntary program," Bridges said. The 1985 acreage base is the average of the acres planted and considered planted to feed grains in 1983 and 1984. The program authorizes two bases -- one for corn and sorghum, and one for barley and oats.

Farmers who plant no more than 90 percent of their feed grain base will be eligible for federal target price guarantees of \$3.03 per bushel for corn, \$2.88 for grain sorghum, \$2.60 for barley and \$1.60 per bushel for oats. "When farmers apply for the program, they may request 50 percent of their projected deficiency payments," Bridges said. USDA estimates that per bushel deficiency payment rates will be 47 cents for corn, 46 for sorghum and 44 cents for barley. Advance deficiency payments to eligible farmers will be half these rates.

Something Old

VALENTINE How did it start and how did we ever call February 14,

Valentine? A Christian Martyrs, St. Valentine, is responsible for the tradition of sending Valentines. He was jailed because he subscribed to the Christian faith and before he was put to death he restored the sight of a blind girl who was the daughter of his jailer. He left a farewell message to the child and signed it, "From Your Valentine," which phrase has been used a great deal in modern times on Valentine's Day. The tradition of giving Valentines by no means goes back in an unbroken line to the time of the Martyred Saint. St. Valentine was buried at St. Proxed's Church in Rome. The feast day of this church fell on February 14, which had earlier been the date of a festival in honor of the Roman Goddess, Juno Regent.

The date is fortunate, because it comes at a time of year we can easily appreciate an expression of the warmth of someone's affections.

The tradition of giving Valentines in America was presented to someone's love in 1710. At first only one Valentine was given by a person which was to his current sweetheart. Valentine makers found great help from "Valentine Writers" who filled a book of gushy verses for the Valentine Makers to select their cards by. The earliest of these books was brought to America from England about 1723.

Often early handmade Valentines were very elaborate and beautiful. Sometimes elaborate designs were worked out in pin pricks, with cutouts and silhouettes with a love message in rebus, cryptogram or acrostic.

Commercial concerns soon began to produce them. One of the first companies was George C. Whitney & Co. Whitney's cards are collectables today, because they were signed. Some signed only a "W".

The Whitney family, all during the 1800's, produced a massive amount of exquisite Valentines. They bought lace paper and embossed paper and envelopes from Germany. In 1874 they bought machinery to use which made him an independent of both England and Germany
