Break-In At Heritage Jewelers

Heritage Jewelers, Elm Shopping Center, Luka, was the scene of a break-in early Wednesday morning, March 13th.

According to Luka Patrolman, Jimmy McVay, city officers received notification at 1:00 that the alarm system at the jewelry store had been activated. McVay, Patrolman Red Taylor, County Deputies, Donald Reno and Marcus Ivy, and Auxiliary Deputy, William Lambert, arrived at the scene approximately three minutes after receiving the call. They found the front window of the establishment broken out by a concrete block and a smaller window crashed by a chunk of concrete. An undetermined amount of watches, chains and rings had been taken from several showcases and the front window case.

It is believed that the robbers made a hasty exit and fled on foot. The case remains under investigation by State Investigators and local officials.

PRIMARY ELECTION DATES SCHEDULED

General Elections will be held June 4, 1985 in the six incorporated municipalities within Tishomingo County.

The office of Mayor, along with the selection of five aldermen, will be decided during the elections in Belmont, Burnsville, Golden, Luka, Paden and Tishomingo.

Luka will also elect a police chief. The other five municipalities fill this

position by appointment. Burnsville and Luka have set primary election dates for May 14, with the second primary scheduled one week later, May 21. The towns of Belmont, Golden, Paden and Tishomingo are planning no primary elections in 1985.

Qualifying deadline for candidates is April 13. Independent candidates must qualify by April 5.

ARE YOU POISONING YOUR VEGETABLES?

The new soil test recommendations offered by the Extension Soil Testing and Plant Analysis Laboratory, include over fourteen crop categories for commercial vegetable growers. These include beans and green peas, field tomatoes, Irish potatoes, okra, hot peppers, sweet peppers, pimientos, strawberries, southern peas, spinach, sweet corn, radishes, rutabagas, turnips, squash and melon crops. These recommendations are a result of the collaborative

efforts of Extension and MSU Research specialists, and represents the most current information we have on crop response to fertilizers for truck crops.

Most field vegetables grown in Mississippi are sensitive to acidic soil pH. Although most micronutrients are more available at lower pH values, the availability of manganese and aluminum are increased on low pH soils such that toxicities can occur. Once a toxicity is diagnosed in an established planted field, there is little that can be done to salvage the crop. Foliar nutrient

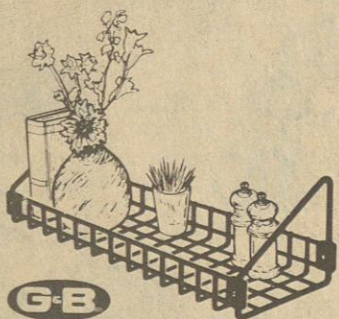

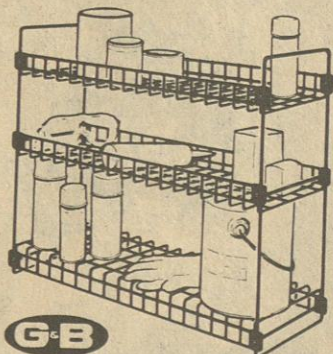

CONSERVATION NOTES

Terraces are a combination of channel and levee constructed across the slope on sloping cropland and are designed to reduce the length of slope which reduces the amount of erosion taking place. Terraces are one of the best erosion control measures that can be applied to sloping cropland. They catch runoff water and divert it to a safe outlet at a nonerosive velocity. The outlet may be a grassed waterway or a vegetated area at the edge of a field.

Terraces have been used to control erosion on cropland in the southern states since the eighteenth century; therefore, terraces are not new to most farmers. However, there are some new concepts in terracing that have been used with good

results. On uniformly sloping land, terraces can be constructed parallel to each other with an equal number of rows between them. This means an even number of trips across the field and elimination of point rows to save time and labor.

Another new concept is eliminating the waterway and using plastic pipe underground to dispose of runoff water. The principal involved in using pipe is to increase the levee height of the terrace across small draws in the field. This forms a storage basin for the runoff water which completely drains through the underground pipe in 24 hours or less. This detention time allows sediment to settle out resulting in keeping soil on the field where it belongs and out of drainage ways.

sprays are both ineffective and inappropriate. Manganese toxicity is manifested visually in the plant as "crinkle-leaf" or severely stunted growth.

While manganese toxicity usually affects primarily top growth, aluminum toxicity affects root growth. Typically, root growth is stunted and weak compared to growth of roots occurring in better soil. The remedy to the problem is simple-application of lime or slag based upon a pre-plant soil test. A soil test after problems develop is little more than a post-mortem for which we can offer little hope for the current crop. Early soil testing pays off!

TEST FOR NEMATODES BEFORE PLANTING

Nematodes are a potential threat to almost any vegetable crop, particularly in the light-textured soils. If growers have not already had their soil tested for nematodes, they should do so before planting. Nematodes are very difficult and expensive to control in commercial vegetables. It is important to know whether a damaging type of nematode is present, before it has a chance to build up. The Extension Plant Pathology Department will test soil samples for nematodes free of charge.

BLACK PLASTIC MULCH

There are claims that black plastic mulch can promote earliness, improve yields and help control weeds. As you might expect, anything that can do all that is going to cost money! Black plastic mulch comes in various lengths (100 ft., 2400 ft. and 4000 ft.), various widths (2-6 ft.) and various thicknesses (1.1-1.25 mil). The cost is roughly 1/2 cent per square foot. You can buy a mulch film layer for \$1000 but if you want equipment to remove it, it will cost

whole season and counteract the beneficial effects of the mulch.

Lay the plastic mulch with as few wrinkles as possible. Anchor the edges by covering with soil. Sow or transplant through the plastic making a round hole so that the plastic will not rear so easily from the cut.

Do not use black plastic mulch where nutsedge is a problem.

CONTROL SCALE

Growers of apples, pears, peaches and plums in Mississippi should examine their trees closely now to detect scale insects. The scale type called San Jose may attack any of these varieties. White peach scale also can attack peach and plum trees in our area.

The most effective control of these pests is the application of a dormant oil during the colder months of the year and before buds swell in the spring.

DEVELOPING A SAVINGS/INVESTMENT PROGRAM

In times past, those who put money into passbook accounts and government savings bonds were considered savers, and those who purchased stocks, bonds, and mutual funds were investors. Saving was considered risk-free; investing was regarded as speculative. Buy in today's world with its competitive interest rates and variety of financial products, the terms "saving" and "investing" can be used almost interchangeably.

Why is it important to save? Individuals with an adequate savings program based on current needs and income can:

- reach financial goals,
- cover emergency expenses,
- plan for major purchases,

-provide retirement income, -provide an estate for dependents.

Naturally no two savings plans will be exactly the same. Each of us has different needs, wants, and resources. Our tolerance for risk also varies. However, every plan should meet certain criteria. A good basic savings program should include:

- a specific amount set aside on a regular basis, such as weekly or monthly;
- an emergency fund equal to at least two to three months' net income;
- adequate insurance coverage;
- sufficient income for maintaining a home; and
- income remaining for other investments.

To make savings a habit, it should be a fixed expense in your financial plan. Do not wait until the end of the month to place whatever remains into a savings program. In most cases, you will find that there is nothing left. Instead, pay yourself first as you would pay your rent or mortgage, utilities, or car payment.

BEEF AND RICE SUPREME

1½ pounds lean ground beef
2 to 3 tablespoons fat or salad oil
1 teaspoon salt
½ teaspoon pepper
2 medium-sizes onions, ground
3 carrots, ground
1 green pepper, ground
2 stalks celery, diced
2 bouillon cubes
2 cups hot water
1 cup uncooked rice

Brown meat in hot fat or oil in a large skillet. Season. Add remaining ingredients. Cover and cook over low heat for about 45 minutes. Serve crisp, tender brussels sprouts and buttered wax beans with the meat dish. For dessert, fresh pears and blue cheese.

YOUTH MAY SELECT BETTER HOMESITE THAN ADULTS

Many youth may know more than their parents when it comes to selecting a homesite location.

Youth involved in the 4-H land judging program are learning which soil factors make favorable locations for home and which factors will cause problems in the future.

A soil that has a fine texture may contain too much clay for a building foundation. The shrink-swell potential increases with too much clay which can result in a foundation shifting and cracking over time. Fine textured soils will feel sticky or plastic when wet.

A coarse texture indicates a high sand content in the

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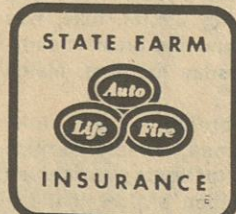

soil. Foundations in sandy soils are sometimes unstable and need more soil. Coarse textured soil feels extremely gritty when rubbed between the fingers.

Shallow soil may cause foundation problems since excess water may be held in the upper part of the soil.

Slope and erosion affect foundations only during construction. The foundation will be more difficult to construct as the slope increases and the erosion is more severe.

When selecting the placement of the septic tank, choose a nearly level to moderately sloping area. Also make sure the soil has a high

sand content so liquid will filter through rapidly. A soil too sticky will cause liquids to move fast. Shallow soils containing too much water may cause slow movement, resulting in an overfilled tank.

The evaluation skills members learn in the judging program will help them as adults when selecting their homesite. Youth interested in forming a county land judging team to compete in the district or state should call the County Extension Office at 423-3666.

EXTENDED WEAR LENSES

Our modern life-style is often hectic and fast-paced. Frequently, we don't have time for the things we MUST do, much less those things we WANT to do. Contact lenses which require daily insertion and removal also require daily care. "Extended wear" contacts, on the other hand, are designed to be worn continuously for up to two weeks—depending on the individual and his or her prescribed schedule.

There are also many more people today who are traveling, camping, and spending their leisure time in ways which make daily care of conventional contacts particularly impractical. Extended-wear contacts may be the answer for

them. But it is important to stress that not all soft contact lenses can be used in this way. Only a soft contact which has met the criteria of the U.S. Food and Drug Administration can be worn for prolonged periods. Also, prescribing these contacts depends on such factors as the health of your eyes, your tear chemistry, and the way you work and relax.

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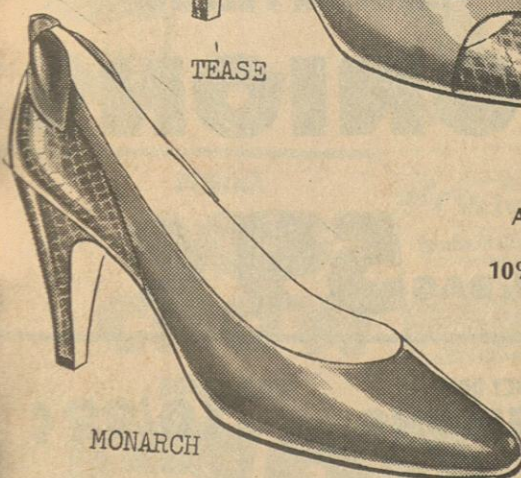

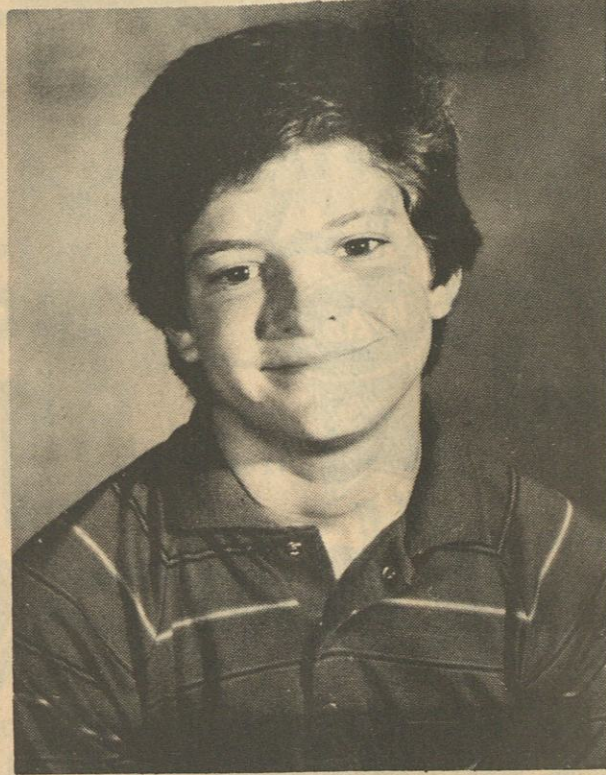

Barrett Boosts Teacher Merit Pay; Opposes Strike In Visit Here

Conservative Democratic leader Richard Barrett said during a visit here that he favors "merit pay for teachers, coupled with strict competency testing" as a means to upgrade teacher pay and quality education. Barrett was in Tishomingo

County visiting friends, autographing his new book and examining the unemployment situation first hand.

Barrett condemned the wildcat teachers strike, saying it was instigated by the "leftwing, radical National Education Association (NEA), which is on record as favoring integration over education and as promoting incompetency over competency." He stressed that giving in to NEA demands would "feed the tiger that will surely devour quality education."

The Learned, Mississippi lawyer expressed his support for teachers. "Hill folks are hardworking, dedicated and underpaid," he frowned, "but we cannot let the anchor of predominately black, welfare-minded areas of the state drag the hardworking people down." He said the radical demands of those who "put pay before pupils" is tarnishing the image of good teachers who "put pupils before pay."

Barrett, a 1979 candidate for Governor of Mississippi, noted that he received 5% of the vote that year. In 1984, he received 30% of the vote for Congress in the Mississippi Delta. "I owe a great debt to my people. So long as we are losing our freedom and so long as working people are oppressed, I will continue the fight," he resolved.

The outspoken conservative referred to his new book, "The Commission," which, he said, is a takeoff

from the Biblical Great Commission. "Just as the Lord commanded to spread the Gospel, my personal commission, is to spread Americanism," he said. The book, which is available at the local library, recounts his experiences fighting for freedom in Vietnam and in politics.

Barrett fondly recalled his many visits to Tishomingo County, particularly when he spoke to the students here in 1969 at Iuka High School and attended ballgames here over the years. Calling the names of students and teachers he met then, he said, "Northeast Mississippians believe in the work ethic." "In your name, I say to industry, come to Northeast Mississippi, because we give you a day's work for a day's pay."

Exposing the myths about IRA's.

Myth #1

You need at least \$2,000 to take advantage of Uncle Sam's tax loophole.

Wrong. You can open an IRA at First Bank with as little as \$25. Nothing says you have to wait until you've saved up \$2,000. That's simply the limit of how much you can deduct from your income taxes. As a single person, you can put aside \$2,000 a year in an IRA. Or up to \$4,000 if you are married and both of you work. The sooner you start stashing away money into an IRA the better.

Myth #2

You can't play the stock market with IRA money.

Wrong. The government allows you to invest your IRA money in stocks, bonds, futures and all sorts of funds. But such investments are not insured by F.D.I.C. like First Bank IRA's and you could lose your principal.

Myth #3

You must contribute to your IRA before you file your income tax for the year.

Wrong. Say you file your income tax for 1984 on January 31, '85 and take a \$2,000 IRA deduction even though you have not yet made a contribution. That's okay, but you must buy your IRA by April 15. In the meantime because of using this deduction, you may get a refund that you wouldn't have otherwise received. Then you can use the refund to help pay for the IRA before the April 15 deadline.

Myth #4

If you're married and only one of you works, you are limited to a \$2,000 contribution.

Wrong. You may put as much as \$2,250 into two IRA's. And you can split the money any way you like as long as neither of you gets more than \$2,000.

Myth #5

You can't open an IRA if you're already under a retirement plan where you work.

Wrong. It used to be that way. But no more. If you're a working man or woman, you can have your own tax-free retirement plan in addition to any program your employer may have set up for you. And you don't have to pay taxes on it or on the interest it earns. Until you retire.

Myth #6

You must have made your 1984 IRA deposit within the year to deduct it from '84 income taxes.

Wrong. You have until April 15, 1985. (An extension for filing does not apply to IRA's.) And, you don't have to deposit the whole allowable amount at one time. Any deposits you made during 1984 plus any you make before April 15, 1985 can be declared on your 1984 tax return.

Myth #7

Your employer is not permitted to contribute to your IRA.

Wrong. Your employer can even use this as a supplemental retirement plan. He can put in, say, \$1,000 and you the other \$1,000. In both cases the money is considered income that is tax-deferred.

Myth #8

It doesn't make sense to borrow money for an IRA.

Wrong. It can make a lot of sense. Look at it this way. Say you're 35 years old and you borrow \$2,000 at 13%. You deposit it in an IRA earning 9%. At the end of one year you pay back \$2,260, but your IRA is now worth \$2,180 and, assuming you're in a 35% tax bracket, you saved \$700 in income tax. You are \$620 ahead!

Myth #9

You have to be 25 years old or older to open an IRA.

Wrong. Anyone under age 70½ can participate as long as they earn their money. This includes children and teenagers. By 59½ you may start withdrawing your money, and by 70½ it's mandatory.

Myth #10

Once you start an IRA with one institution, you can't move it to another.

Wrong. As long as you transfer your money directly from institution to institution, you can shift it around as often as you like. But if you move it from one trustee to you and

then to another trustee, you may do this only once a year. And you must not hold it for more than 60 days to avoid penalties. Within 60 days, however, you might use the money for emergency or to make a quick investment.

Myth #11

If you need your IRA money before you reach age 59½, you can't get it.

Wrong. You can get it, but IRA's were set up to help fund retirement, so what you take out is hit with a 10% penalty in addition to any income tax owed on that amount. Even so, the penalty of withdrawing a few thousand in case of emergency is probably less than what you'd pay in taxes with an investment not tax-free.

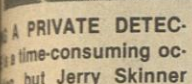

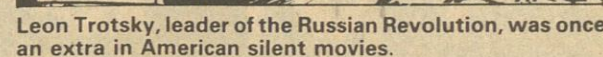

Jerry has been in the investigation for approximately 10 years (being licensed in Mississippi and Tennessee) and during that time helped countless number of people with problems they could take to no one else. When you meet Jerry you will be put at ease by his broken tone and his con-

After watching all of the detective shows on television and movies, one would imagine that all cases handled by private investigators turn out solved completely with every item falling perfectly into place, but according to Jerry, this is not always the case. "One misconception that most people have is that private investigators deal almost exclusively with criminal cases (such as murders, robberies, etc. . .), but in reality these type cases compose only a very small portion

pose only a very small portion of my total number of cases," Jerry stated. "About 80% of the cases I deal with are domestic in nature (such as divorce evidence, child custody, missing persons, etc. . .)." Another misconception that people have is that this is an occupation that is glamorous and that every moment is filled with excitement and adventure, but this too, is misleading. Jerry says that there are many hours spent just sitting and waiting or doing research on a person. It requires a lot of time and you must have a great deal of patience.

Another disadvantage is that you never know who your client may be and what their motive really is. "You just don't have any way of knowing if you are really on the right side," remarked Jerry. "The only time I will ever turn down a case is if I do some checking on my client and I feel like I am on the wrong side of the case."

Being a private investigator also has its advantages, one being that sometimes you will be working on a case that may lead you to another state or even another country. "I have traveled a lot," said Jerry, "I've been to such places as the Virgin Islands, Colorado, etc..."

A private investigator also provides a great service to people. A mistake that many people make is to spend a lot of money on a prestigious lawyer when any young

lawyer, just out of law school, can present your evidence just as well. The courts only consider the evidence presented and not the law firm, so many people would be much better off by hiring a private detective to gather their evidence and hire a lawyer, who's prices are more reasonable, to present the evidence for them. The lawyers at many large firms do not have enough time to spend preparing for your case like a lawyer with less clients would.

What makes a good detective? Jerry commented that he feels that a person should have an inborn quality to be a detective. You have to have a special talent. "I have a lot of people who come to me who want to become a detective and I always help them if I can, but I have seen a lot of them come and go. The average life of most detective agencies is about six months," Jerry remarked. "It takes more than just a license and a little formal training to become a detective. You need to be a relatively good businessman."

"To me, the best detective is not Sherlock Holmes or Ellery Queen, but the Prophet Solomon, because he was so wise. It is not a business for fools! You can really get yourself into a lot of trouble if you don't know what you are doing," Jerry reminded. The thing that really makes a good detective is understanding human nature; being able to put yourself in the other person's shoes and ask yourself, "What would I do if I were them?" Another key fac-

FIDA REQUIREMENT STILL IN EFFECT, BRIDGES SAYS

The Agricultural Foreign Investment Disclosure Act requires all foreign owners of U. S. agricultural land to report their holdings, acquisitions, dispositions, leases of 10 years or more, and land-use changes to the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

"This reporting requirement is still in effect," said Howard R. Bridges, Chairperson of the Tishomingo County-ASC Committee, "and foreigners who have bought or sold agricultural land in the county are reminded to report the transactions to our office within 90 days."

ASCS offices across the Nation are charged with the responsibility of keeping track of how much agricultural land is owned or controlled by foreign individuals or interests. Foreign investors have reported owning about 13.7 million acres of agricultural land in the United States, and about 6,364 acres in Tishomingo County.

For reporting purposes, agricultural land is defined as any tract of more than 10 acres now in agricultural, forestry, or timber production.

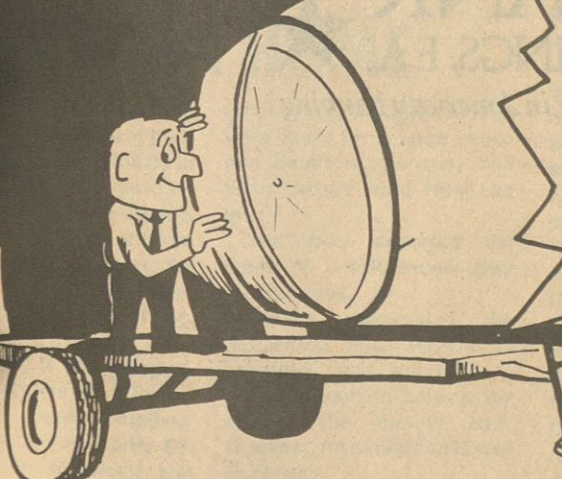
