## SHOOTING FATAL TO ELDERLY B'VILLE MAN

Two Burnsville men (half-brothers) have been released following a 72 hour questioning period by the County Sheriff in connection with the Sunday night shooting death of their elderly father, also of Burnsville.

Sheriff Payne said both men were released Wednesday morning after being instructed by him not to leave the county.

The body of Jefferson Davis Lambert, 76, was found lying on the floor at the Burnsville home of his son, David Wayne Lambert, Sheriff Bob Payne said, following a report to his office of the shooting incident sometime after 9 p.m. Sunday. Payne said David Wayne Lambert, 45, along with his half-brother, Frank Gerald Lambert, 21, were taken into custody. It was noted that the Lambert brothers lived next-door to their father on Jefferson Street in Burnsville.

It was stated by the lawmen that the inquiry made by himself and State Investigator, Joe McFerrin, at the scene the evening of the slaying revealed that the brothers were both either under the influence of drugs or alcohol. David Wayne Lambert was described to have been "passed out" from drunkenness; Frank Gerald Lambert reportedly admitted to the authorities that he had been smoking marijuana earlier that day.

Sheriff Payne said the aged man apparently had died from a gunshot blast, which caused wounds to the left side and chest area of the body. The apparent weapon used in the shooting was reportedly discovered dismantled into three pieces hidden beneath clothes on the couch in the dwelling. The weapon was identified to be a .16 gauge shotgun. A spent shell was said to have been found in the pocket of David

Wayne Lambert.

"During the examining of the victim's body, we found gashes on his head," Sheriff Payne said, "which indicated an earlier beating with a stick that Frank Gerald Lambert told us about. He said his daddy was coming at him with a knife" (during the beating episode).

Both men have denied shooting their father and a motive for the shooting has not been established. However, Sheriff Payne said, "At this time it looks like murder, although no official charges have been made."

Frank Gerald Lambert is scheduled for a polygraph test to be administered in Jackson March 27."

In addition to the apparent murder, authorities said marijuana plants were found in the closet at the scene of the crime. No indication was given of charges having been filed in relation to the possession of the illegal sub-

stance; however, Sheriff Payne said Frank Gerald Lambert acknowledged that they were his.

Jefferson Davis Lambert, 76, died in Burnsville, Sunday night. He was a retired farmer.

Services were held at 11 a.m. Wednesday, March 20, at the Antioch Baptist Church. Rev. Glen Jones officiated. Burial was in Antioch Cemetery. Cutshall Funeral Home was in charge of the arrangements.

Survivors include his wife, Mrs. Delia Lambert, of Burnsville; two daughters, Mrs. Racine Yancey, of California, Mrs. Goldie Phifer, of Anchorage, Alaska; three sons, David Wayne Lambert, of Burnsville, and Frank Gerald Lambert, of Burnsville, Jerry Lane Lambert, of New Orleans; two brothers, Jack Lambert, of Burnsville, and George Lambert, of Iuka; seven grandchildren.

## \$157,000 BLOCK GRANT AWARDED TO CITY OF IUKA

Iuka Mayor, John H. Biggs, announced Tuesday that he had received word of approval from the Governor's Office of Federal State Programs, of a \$157,000.00 Community Development Block Grant to be used in the economic development of Iuka and Tishomingo County.

Funds applied for earlier by

Iuka City Officials have been appropriated through a Community Development Block Grant and are designated for industrial development, thus creating several job opportunities for some of the area's unemployed.

In making the announce-

ment, Mayor Biggs said the funds were originally applied for in late October 1984 and are to be used specifically for the establishment of the Shelton Trucking Terminal.

"This is a 100 percent grant," the Mayor assured, "Not a matching funds grant. The city will not be out any

money in this endeavor."

"This grant money will be used to purchase a five acre site and construct a building for Shelton Trucking Industry," Mayor Biggs advised. "The City of Iuka will hold the mortgage on the site until paid back by Shelton."

This grant will be paid back to the city in payments to be made over a fifteen year period. As this grant money is paid back to the city, it will be used for further industrial development.

According to the Mayor, "This would be a loan to the company from the City of Iuka by C.D.B.G. money provided to the City. A trust fund to be used for future economic growth will be set up with the money as it is paid back to the city."

As the project gets underway, the company will be required to hire an approximate thirty-five people locally if available and qualified.

Shelton Trucking Company, headquartered in Alabama, is presently using the facilities at Yellow Creek Port.

## HOUSE & SENATE OVERRIDE GOVERNOR'S VETO ON RAISE

Mississippi school teachers will receive a \$4,400 pay increase over the next three years.

Both the Mississippi House of Representatives and the Senate voted overwhelmingly and without debate Tuesday to override Governor Bill Allain's veto of the teacher's pay raise-tax bill. The Senate vote was 46-3 in favor of overriding and the House followed suit, 104-16.

It was the first time in six years that a gubernatorial veto was overridden.

The bill, recommended by a House-Senate Conference Committee, calls for an increase of \$2,400 in base salaries in the 1985-86 school year for teachers under the Minimum Foundation Program. In addition, the bill provides an increase of \$235 per teacher unit in payments to local school districts for supportive services.

The bill also includes another increase of \$1,000 for the 1986-87 school year and an additional \$1,000 raise in the 1987-88 school year. The \$1,000 increase in 1987-88 would be based on a performance-based personnel appraisal and compensation plan to be developed by the state Board of Education, and any pay hikes in succeeding years would be based on the appraisal-compensation plan.

Conferees said the education provisions would cost an estimated \$67.5 million next year while the additional \$1,000 increases would require an estimated \$25.9 million in 1986-87 and another \$25.9 million the year thereafter.

The measure included a series of tax increases that would generate about \$77.6 million in the coming year.

Backers said this would be enough to fund the teacher pay raise in the 1985-86 school year as well as \$9 million for state employees and \$1 million for the Chickasaw School Fund, if the Legislature chooses to use the money for these purposes.

The bill also contains a modified version of the no-strike language contained in the initial conference report. As approved, the measure would prohibit strikes by teachers, groups of teachers and teacher organizations against any public school districts. School board members or administrators who approve or consent to teacher strikes would be guilty of a misdemeanor and could be fined from \$100 to \$250 per day as long as the violation continues.

The measure provides for injunctions against striking teachers in the chancery courts, and authorizes penalties for contempt up to \$20,000 per day against teacher organizations. Any teacher who violates an anti-strike injunction would lose employment as a teacher, but may be rehired without further penalty if a court finds a public necessity therefor. The original version of the bill provided that a teacher who is rehired under such conditions would be paid an entry-level salary regardless of years or experience, and would not get a pay raise for two years.

The measure was approved 81-36. It needed a three-fifths majority vote, or 71, votes for adoption. Three earlier proposals were rejected by the House, sending the bill back to the conference committee for further work.

The original conference report called for a 3 percent sales tax on residential utility bills and sale of potable water for residential use. This provision was removed from later versions, however, after coming under attack from several House members.

Most of the debate on the various conference bills revolved around the utility tax proposal in the initial report, the anti-strike provisions, and the omission of health insurance for teachers. Lawmakers also engaged in lengthy debate on whether

the revenue provisions should be sufficient to fund other needs -- such as institutions of higher education and junior colleges -- or be limited primarily to what it would take to finance the teacher pay hikes.

The revenue provisions of the bill included:

Increasing cigarette tax on cigarettes from 18 cents per pack, \$20.2 million; increasing the contractors tax from 2 1/2 to 3 1/2 percent, \$15 million; a 3 percent sales tax on casual sale of automobiles, \$15.3 million; a 27.5 percent mark-up on alcoholic beverages, \$6.2 million; a 6 percent sales tax on computer software, \$3 million; an increase in the sales tax on manufacturing machinery and industrial fuels, \$9.1 million; increase in tax on soft drinks by reducing the credit to retailers by 3 percent; \$6.3 million; and a 10 percent increase in the excise tax on beer, \$2.5 million.

## STATE TO FIGHT DELAY BY BELL IN REFUNDING MONEY

Attorney General Ed Pittman said Friday that his office will fight any delay by South Central Bell Telephone Company in mailing to Mississippi phone users the \$100 million refund ordered by the State Supreme Court.

The Court on Wednesday refused to reconsider an earlier ruling which said that Bell must refund the money collected from 1982 to 1984 for a rate hike which was turned down by the Public Service Commission.

## IUKA POLICE CHIEF SEEKS RE-ELECTION TO POSITION

Incumbent Iuka Chief of Police, Joel Holliman, today officially announced his candidacy for re-election to the position in the May 14, 1985 Primary Election.

Being a fair and upright man, Holliman believes the knowledge that he has gained in serving as Police Chief for the past four years, along with the experiences of dealing with law matters, qualifies him for this important position.

"We've upgraded the Police Department now with the use of four efficient patrol cars," he said, also noting that "The present police for-

ce is made up of good men - men that you can depend on, who are trained by Police Academy Schooling as well as on the job training."

Stating that he would make no promises that he could not hold, Holliman reassured the vow made in his previous campaign. "I promise to do the job the best that I know how if re-elected. I will continue to be the chief 24 hours a day. My home phone will always be open," he said.

"I am asking for your support and vote of confidence, and in return I will strive to maintain the respect and authority this position carries with it," he concluded.

## GOLDEN RESIDENTS ROBBED IN HOME

Three elderly Golden residents were robbed at their homes late Monday. \$450.00 in cash and two gold rings - one wedding band, the other a family birthstone - were taken from two men who entered the homes under false identification. The incident occurred around 4:00 p.m.

According to Chief Deputy Sheriff Kemp, two men, impersonating representatives from the Social Security Office, went to the homes and "asked" their way into the residence of the victims.

One of the robbers, which was described to be older, dressed in jeans and shirt and "hoggin" kept the older man's attention with questions. Kemp said the man, described to be around 21, made an excuse of going outside to the truck, and apparently searched the house and took the money from the ladies purses and the rings. He said the older man was referred to as "Bill".

older people thought the men were there for a good cause and didn't realize they had been robbed until they had left.

The men departed the scene in a late model gray pickup truck.

Details concerning the happening were termed as "sketchy" and will make it more difficult in solving the matter, the deputy said. However, investigation is well underway.

Due to reports in Alabama of a rash of similar burglaries as the above, the County Sheriff's Office and the City Police Departments are urging everyone (young and old) to be extremely cautious in admitting anyone into their homes, regardless of their pretext. ### Poison Prevention Week

This week is national Poison Prevention Week. Ways to avoid accidental poisonings around the farm and in the home is a worthy objective for all of us.

Through awareness and better safety standards, we have been able to reduce childhood poisonings in our country by 80 percent. Between 1982 and 1983, the number of accidental ingestions of household chemicals, cleaning products and medicines among children under age five dropped from 500,000 to 100,000.

That is a good record, but it can only be maintained by continued vigilance. To keep the record and to improve it, we need to emphasize the following themes on the farm and around the home:

--Keep household produc-

ts, agricultural chemicals and medicines out of the reach of children. Lock them up when possible.

--Never let household products, agricultural chemicals or medicines out of sight while they are being used.

--Store medicines separately from household products.

--Leave original labels on all products and read those labels before using them.

--Always have a light on when giving or taking medicines.

--Avoid taking medicines in front of children since they tend to imitate adults.

--Refer to medicine as "medicine" and don't call it "candy".

--Clean out the medicine cabinet periodically and dispose of its unneeded medicines safely. Same ap-

## Chatting With Your Home Economist

### Tooth Decay Is Preventable

Teeth can last a lifetime. But you must take care of them from the beginning.

Even baby teeth must be properly cared for. Premature loss of these primary teeth can lead to shifting of permanent teeth, improper jaw development, and spreading of tooth decay. The following guidelines promote eating habits that will lead to healthy smiles.

#### PREGNANCY

A baby's primary teeth begin forming in the third month of pregnancy. The amount of mineralization with calcium and phosphorus at this stage determines the future ability to resist decay.

During pregnancy, eat a balanced diet, especially one rich in milk products; dark, green leafy vegetables; citrus fruits; vitamin D-fortified milk (or lots of sunshine); and fluoridated drinking water (or a fluoride supplement).

#### INFANCY

A baby's permanent teeth begin forming right after birth. They can be protected by fluorides in drinking water, in baby formula, or as a liquid supplement. Breast milk is

not a good source of fluoride.

A baby should never be given a bottle of anything (except plain water) when being put to bed. The accumulation of fluid - even milk - in the baby's mouth leads to "nursing bottle syndrome" and rampant tooth decay which may take years to detect, but which affects all the teeth except lower front ones protected by the tongue.

Honey should never be put on a pacifier.

Baby's gums should be cleaned with gauze pads twice a day, even before teeth appear.

Once on solid foods, gradually introduce baby foods with texture. Promoting good chewing habits can help prevent decay and misalignment of teeth.

#### CHILDHOOD

Parents should take responsibility for cleaning a child's teeth until age eight, when manual dexterity has improved. Brush gently but thoroughly. Dental floss should be used once molars come in.

Adequate fluoride protection should be ensured. Use of fluoride toothpaste and rinses, a fluoride supplement (indicated if drinking water is not fluoridated) and twice yearly topical fluoride treatments by your dentist are recommended.

Plastic sealants may also be applied by your dentist, once permanent molars come in.

The promotion of good eating habits early in life is essential. Discourage snacking between meals, particularly of sweets. Get children into the habit of eating sweets only at mealtime, as desserts.

Especially avoid sticky foods and liquids, such as caramels, hard candy, honey, syrup, dried fruits, raisins, cookies. Interestingly, cheese and chocolate seem to have decay-inhibiting characteristics that are not totally understood yet.

#### ADULTHOOD

Continue the above eating and tooth care habits.

Whenever it is not possible to brush or floss your teeth after eating, rinse your mouth out well with water.

#### REMEMBER:

Encourage the eating of raw fruits and vegetables. Fiber-rich foods help stimulate the flow of saliva, which aids in preventing tooth decay.

Include foods with protein or a small amount of fat with

snacks. They neutralize acid and help protect teeth.

It is the frequency with which sugar is eaten and the length of time it stays on teeth that is important.

### TACO SALAD

2 pounds ground beef  
1/2 cup catsup  
1/2 cup hot taco sauce  
1 package taco seasoning  
1 large head lettuce  
2 medium tomatoes  
1 medium bell pepper  
Small bunch green onions  
1-1/2 cups sharp cheddar cheese  
Medium sized bag nacho cheese Doritos

Brown ground beef, drain off grease; add catsup, taco sauce, seasonings; simmer for 20 minutes. Wash and cut up lettuce, tomato, bell pepper, and onions. Put this in oval shaped serving dish. Slightly break chips, place over lettuce mixture, and sprinkle grated cheese (1 cup) over this. Pour sauce over this, and sprinkle with remaining cheese.

YIELD: 8 servings  
COST APPROXIMATELY \$1.22 per serving.

### 4-H News

#### Learning Through Experience

The 4-H program uses many teaching methods to help members improve themselves and develop new skills.

Members learn poise by giving a visual presentation or illustrated talk. Preparing and presenting a visual presentation also teaches 4-H members to research a project and explain to others how to do a specific task.

Judging contests are conducted in many project areas. These contests teach members to compare items to a standard and rank them. The 4-Hers also give oral and written reasons to back up their decision.

Workshops are learn-by-doing training meetings. These give 4-H members opportunities for hands-on experiences such as developing film or baking bread.

During tours, 4-Hers not only hear but see things related to their projects. By touring an egg hatchery, for example, members enrolled in the poultry project see how eggs are classified and

graded.

Exhibits are used in 4-H projects to teach responsibilities and skills. Through the 4-H animal projects, members accept the responsibilities of feeding and caring for their animal. They exhibit their animals in livestock shows to display the results of their hard work.

Discussion groups give 4-H members an opportunity to share ideas and express themselves. They learn from others' mistakes and accomplishments.

Many volunteers visit 4-H members in their homes to assist them with project work. This individual attention strengthens the relationship between the 4-H'er and the volunteer as well as accomplishes much work.

Project manuals supplement these training methods. For more information on the 4-H program, contact the County Extension Office.

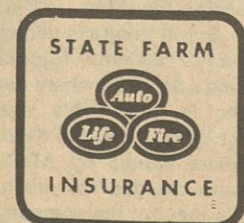

### FIGHTING FLEAS

Many people assume that just because their pets scratch quite a bit that they have fleas. Without further investigation, they go ahead and use one of the many commercial flea-fighting products available on the market.

This is wrong. First of all, you should determine if your pet really has fleas. Checking his coat carefully, you should be able to see the fleas, small as they are, or the black specks known as "flea dirt". Failing to find any evidence of flea you should take the animal to your veterinarian for an examination. There are many other possible causes of scratching besides fleas - none of them good.

If he has fleas, then you should go ahead and use some recommended product - whether

shampoo, spray, or powder - to get rid of them. However, in using these products, watch carefully to see if your pet is sensitive to them and develops a skin irritation. He may be allergic to a particular chemical and be in need of a special prescription.

## Think On These Things

One of the most important things in your life and mine is our home. Now we're not talking about the house we live in, but the family unit we are a part of. What is your home-life like? Is your marriage secure? If there are young ones, are they receiving the love and discipline they need? Is your home just a fueling station where you eat and rest and nothing else? Many questions could be asked about this most important thing in your life. Please don't let the time slip by without this crucial part of your life in place. Remember what is really important and make sure your home is at least in the top three.

John Gipson wrote about "important things" and I know you'll appreciate what he says:

"I can hire men to do everything but two things, think, and do things in the order of their importance," said a noted industrialist. Obviously that's the difference between the man who goes to the top and the fellow who is busy getting nowhere. One

keeps busy just avoiding wrong things; the other utilizes his time with the best.

## Dr. & Mrs. Jerry Swimmer Make Mission Trip To West Indies

Dr. and Mrs. Jerry Swimmer, of Iuka, and Dr. and Mrs. Rick Ingle, of Denton, Texas, have just returned from a mission trip to the Island of St. Kitts in the West Indies.

After flying all day from Memphis-Dallas to Miami, Antiquato St. Kitts we were

grateful for the arrival at our beautiful hotel Ocean Terrace. After a restful night, Sunday came bright and beautiful and we prepared to meet the people of the Antioch Baptist Church in St. Johnston Village. Pastor Dr. Bill Connor, who is a giant of a man, started this church several years ago with 13 children in Sunday School. It now runs several hundred as they have Sunday School on Sunday afternoons in different neighborhoods since transportation is a problem. Dr. Connor is a self taught man. He is a marvelous person, well liked, and respected on the island and in the States. The people gave us a wonderful reception and although they speak the King's English and we do speak a "little bit southern" we could relate to each other. St. Kitts is an all black island and very lovely people live there. We had a good meeting with 28 new Christians now at the church. They have a real need. They have about 1,000 children that come to Bible school and have very little help. We plan to return at Bible School time in a couple of years to help. So many eager people to hear and such a need for a teacher.

Having time to tour the island, we saw real beauty. Even though this is a poor country, they just won their independence in September

of 1983. In 1980, their last census there was 35,104 people on the island. The wind blows all the time off the ocean and the people build their houses with walls all around them. It is always pleasant here - no rainy season and the temperature ranges from 65 to 90. Lush flowers grow everywhere.

Public and private schools are mandatory to children ages 5-14, but they can stay in school until they are 16. Sugar is their main crop and they also have small garment factories. We visited a Caribelle Batik and I fell in love with a couple of things there. It's where they wax part of the material and dye it and

re-wax and re-dye until it is the design they want. The girls that work there sing while they are working. They have electrical plants, beverage plants, government jobs, hotels and stores to give employment to the people. They grow vegetables - coconuts with breadfruit growing wild.

We are looking forward to our next trip, although we did have a time getting back since Pan-Am went on strike just as we started home. We thank all who helped us with their prayers and finance.

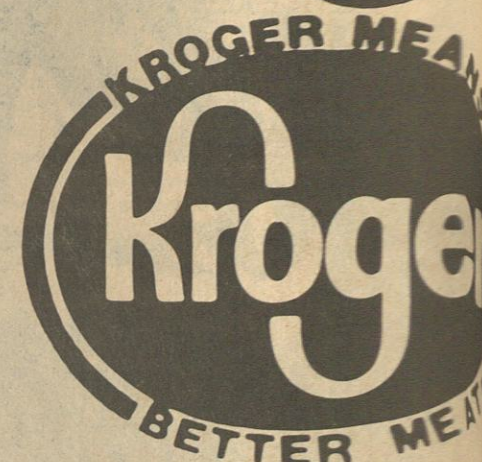
