SHOOTING FATAL TO

brothers) have been released following a 72 hour questioning period by the County Sheriff in connection with the Sunday night shooting death of their elderly father, also of Bur-

Sheriff Payne said both men were released Wednesday morning after being instructed by him not to leave the county. The body of Jefferson

Davis Lambert, 76, was found lying on the floor at the Burnsville home of his son. David Wayne Lambert, Sheriff Bob Payne said, following a report to his office of the shooting incident sometime after 9 p.m. Sunday. Payne said David Wayne Lambert, 45, along with his half-brother, Frank Gerald Lambert, 21, were taken into custody. It was noted that the Lambert brothers lived next-door to their father on Jefferson

lawmen that the inquiry made by himself and State Investigator, Joe McFerrin, at the scene the evening of the slaying revealed that the brothers were both either under the influence of drugs or alcohol. David Wayne Lambert was described to have been "passed out" from drunkness; Frank Gerald Lambert reportedly admitted to the authorities that he had been smoking marijuana earlier that day.

Sheriff Payne said the aged man apparently had died from a gunshot blast, which caused wounds to the left side and chest area of the body. The apparent weapon used in the shooting was reportedly discovered dismantled into three pieces hidden beneath clothes on the couch in the dwelling. The weapon was identified to be a .16 gauge shotgun. A spent found in the pocket of David

"During the examining of the victim's body, we found gashes on his head," Sheriff Payne said, "which indicated an earlier beating with a stick that Frank Gerald Lambert told us about. He said his daddy was coming at him with a knife" (during the beating episode).

Both men have denied shooting their father and a motive for the shooting has not been established. However, Sheriff Payne said, "At this time it looks like murder, although no official charges have been made.

Frank Gerald Lambert is scheduled for a polygraph test to be administered in Jackson March 27."

In addition to the apparent murder, authorities said marijuana plants were found in the closet at the scene of the crime. No indication was given of charges having been filed in relation to the Payne said Frank Gerald Lambert acknowledged that they were his.

"This is a 100 percent grant," the Mayor assured, "Not a matching funds grant. The city will not be out any

"This grant money will be used to purchase a five acre site and construct a building for Shelton Trucking In-

dustry," Mayor Biggs ad-

vised. "The City of luka will

hold the mortgage on the site

until paid back by Shelton." This grant will be paid back to the city in payments to be made over a fifteen year period. As this grant money is paid back to the city, it will be used for further industrial

development. According to the Mayor. "This would be a loan to the company from the City of luka by C.D.B.G. money provided to the city. A trust fund to be used for future economic growth will be set

up with the money as it is paid back to the city." As the project gets underway, the company will be required to hire an approximate thirty-five people locally if available and

Customers who had telephone service during the 22 months the rate increase was in effect should receive an average refund of between \$150 and \$200. The Attorney General said the State would receive a refund of approximately \$800,000 which will go back into the general

South Central Bell announced after the ruling that it will anneal the decision to the U.S. Supreme Court and will ask the State Court for a delay in enforcement of the refund order pending the ap-

Pittman said the U.S. Supreme Court usually does not take up state utility rate cases and called the telephone company's decision to appeal a "long

"Frankly," he said, "I hope South Central Bell will think better of it and decide not to appeal."

The Attorney General said the decision recognized that Mississippi customers have been paying too much for telephone service. "Bell South, South Central's parent company, released figures showing a \$4.28 per share net earning in 1984. This was almost three times the \$1.25 per share earned by AT&T. We were charged too much, and it's time for the company to refund the excess charge."

Pittman said that Mississippi, through the Attorney General's Office and through the Public Service Commission, is becoming more and more consumer conscious. "A \$200 million refund is good news for every telephone subscriber," he

The Attorney General commended the Public Service Commission for the "courage of its original order" denying the rate hike to South Central Bell. He also complimented the staff of the Public Interest Advocacy Division of the Attorney General's Office, especially division head Frank Spencer. who successfully argued the case to the State Supreme Court.

Mississippi teachers will receive a \$4,400 pay increase over the next three years.

Both the Mississippi House of Representatives and the Senate voted overwhelmingly and without debate Tuesday to override Governor Bill Allain's veto of the teacher's pay raise-tax bill. The Senate vote was 46-3 in favor of overriding and the

House followed suit, 104-16. It was the first time in six vears that a gubernatorial veto was overridden.

The bill, recommended by a House-Senate Conference Committee, calls for an increase of \$2,400 in base salaries in the 1985-86 school year for teachers under the Minimum Foundation Program. In addition, the bill provides an increase of \$235 per teacher unit in payments to local school districts for

supportive services. The bill also includes another increase of \$1,000 for the 1986-87 school year and an additional \$1,000 raise in the 1987-88 school year. The \$1,000 increase in 1987-88 would be based on a performance-based personnel appraisal and compensation plan to be developed by the state Board of Education, and any pay hikes in succeeding vears would be based on the

appraisal-compensation plan. Conferees said the education provisions would cost an estimated \$67.5 million next year while the additional \$1,000 increases would require an estimated \$25.9 million in 1986-87 and another \$25.9 million the year thereafter.

The bill also contains a modified version of the nostrike language contained in the initial conference report. As approved, the measure would prohibit strikes by teachers, groups of teachers and teacher organizations against any public school districts. School board members or administrators who approve or consent to teacher strikes would be guilty of a misdemeanor and could be fined from \$100 to \$250 per day as long as the violation continues.

The measure provides for

injunctions against striking teachers in the chancery courts, and authorizes penalties for contempt up to \$20,000 per day against teacher organizations. Any teacher who violates an antistrike injunction would lose employment as a teacher, but may be rehired without further penalty if a court finds a public necessity therefor. The original version of the bill provided that a teacher who is rehired under such conditions would be paid an entry-level salary regardless of years or experience, and would not get a pay raise for two years...

The measure was approved 81-36. It needed a three-fifths majority vote, or 71, votes for adoption. Three earlier proposals were rejected by the House, sending the bill back to the conference committee for further work.

The original conference report called for a 3 percent sales tax on residential utility bills and sale of potable water for residential use. This provision was removed from later versions, however, after coming under attach from several House members.

Most of the debate on the various conference bills revolved around the utility tax proposal in the initial report. the anti-strike provisions, and the omission of health insurance for teachers. the Legislature chooses to Lawmakers also engaged in use the money for these pur- lengthy debate on whether

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

This week is national Poison Prevention Week. Ways to avoid accidental poisonings around the farm and in the home is a worthy objective for all of us.

Through awareness and better safety standards, we have been able to reduce childhood poisonings in our country by 80 percent. Between 1982 and 1983, the number of accidental ingestions of household chemicals, cleaning products and medicines among children under age five dropped from 500,000 to 100,000.

That is a good record, but it can only be maintained by continued vigilance. To keep the record and to improve it, we need to emphasize the following themes on the farm and arund the home:

-- Keep household produc-

ts, agricultural chemicals and medicines out of the reach of children. Lock them up when possible.

-Never let household products, agricultural chemicals or medicines out of sight while they are being

-- Store medicines separately from household products. -Leave original labels on

all products and read those labels before using them. -- Always have a light on

when giving or taking -- Avoid taking medicines in front of children since they

-- Refer to medicine as "medicine" and don't call it

Chatting With Your Home Economist

> Tooth Decay Is Preventable

Teeth can last a lifetime. But you must take care of them from the beginning.

Even baby teeth must be properly cared for. Premature loss of these primary teeth can lead to shifting of permanent teeth, improper jaw development, and spreading of tooth decay. The following guidelines promote eating habits that will lead to healthy smiles. PREGNANCY

·A baby's primary teeth begin forming in the third month of pregnancy. The amount of mineralization with calcium and phosporus at this stage determines the future ability to resist decay.

During pregnancy, eat a balanced diet, especially one rich in milk products; dark, green leafy vegetables; citrus fruits; vitamin D-fortified milk (or lots of sunshine); and fluoridated drinking water (or a flouride supplement).

INFANCY ·A baby's permanent teeth begin forming right after birth. They can be protected by fluorides in drinking water, in dispose of its unneeded baby formula, or as a liquid supplement. Breast milk is

The Farmers Home Administration will hire 42 additional temporary employees to help process farm loan applications in Mississippi, FmHA State Director Don Barrett said today.

"We will begin hiring the extra staff immediately,' Barrett said. "The new employees will be temporary. They will serve for four months to help with the seasonal loan peak and to process applications for hundreds of farmers who have requested a review of their debt situation to see if they qualify for the new debt restructuring program."

Under the new program, farmers who are having trouble meeting their FmHA payments may have their loans rescheduled or have up to 25 percent of their loans. up to \$200,000, set aside for five years with no interest. 

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

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

After flying all day from Memphis-Dallas to Miami, Antiquiato St. Kitts we were

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

He is a marvelous person, well liked, and respected on the Island and in the States The people gave us a wonderful reception and although they speak the King's English and we do speak a "little bit southern" we could relate to each other. St. Kitts is an all black Island and very lovely people live there. We had a good meeting with 28 new Christians now at the church. They have a real need. They have about 1,000 children that come to Bible school and have very little help. We plan to return at Bible School time in a couple of years to help. So many eager people to hear and such a need for a teacher. Having time to btour the

Island, we saw real beauty. Even though this is a poor country, they just won their independence in September

of 1983. In 1980, their last census there was 35,104 people on the Island. The wind blows all the time off the ocean and the people build their houses with walls all around them. It is always pleasant here - no rainy season and the temperature ranges from 65 to 90. Lush flowers grow everywhere.

Public and private schools are mandatory to children ages 5-14, but they can stay in school until they are 16. Sugar is their main crop and they also have small garment factories. We visited a Caribelle Batik and I fell in love with a couple of things there. It's where they wax part of the material and dye it and

re-wax and re-dye until it is the design they want. The girls that work there sing while they are working. They have electrical plants, beverage plants, government jobs, hotels and stores to give employment to the people. They grow vegetables coconuts with breadfruit growing wild.

We are looking forward to our next trip, although we did have a time getting back since Pan-Am went on strike just as we started home. We thank all who helped us with their prayers and finance.



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
