### B'Ville Man Charged With Murder

Tishomingo County law officials have arrested an 18 year old Burnsville man for the March 17 murder of his father.

Sheriff Bob Payne said he arrested Frank Lambert around 11 a.m. Wednesday, April 3, at the home of his mother on MS 365 South.

Payne said Lambert is charged with the shotgun slaying of his father, 76 year old Jefferson Davis Lambert, also of Burnsville. The shooting incident took place at the home of the victim's other son, Wayne Lambert, who lived next-door to his father. Frank Lambert was living with Wayne, his older half-brother.

The sheriff named State Investigator, Joe McFerrin and Burnsville Police Chief, Roger Hilburn, as working together with himself in bringing the case together.

Frank Lambert was released from the Tishomingo County Jail following the posting of a \$35,000 property bond Saturday, April 6, according to Sheriff Payne.

## YELLOW CREEK CONSIDERED FOR NUCLEAR WASTE SITE

Late in the afternoon of Thursday, March 21, a member of the news media informed the Nuclear Waste Division staff that Mississippi was being considered as a possible site for a national TEMPORARY nuclear waste storage site. The news, according to an Associated Press report, was revealed in a Congressional Subcommittee hearing earlier in the day in Washington. Under questioning by Representative Edward Markey (D-Mass), it was reported that Ben Rusche, Director of the Office of Civilian Radioactive Waste Management, revealed that Mississippi was one of six states being considered

for what is known as a monitored retrievable storage site (MRS). The other states named are Alabama, Tennessee, North and South Carolina, and Kentucky. The news came as a total surprise to state officials.

Early the next day, March 22, Nuclear Waste Division Director John Green called Senator Thad Cochran's office about the matter and discovered that Cochran's staff also had no prior knowledge of Mississippi's consideration. The Nuclear Waste Division is now attempting to obtain a transcript of Rusche's testimony.

Monitored retrievable storage (MRS) is a concept presented in the Nuclear

Waste Policy Act to allow the Department of Energy to take charge of the nation's nuclear waste in 1998, if the first deep geologic repository is not ready to accept waste. NUCLEAR WASTE NEWS reports that Rusche stated at the same hearing that "an MRS facility should be considered an integral part of the total waste management system."

The Department of Energy's proposal for an MRS is due to Congress in June 1985.

Ginger King, a Department of Energy spokeswoman, confirmed Wednesday that the Yellow Creek Nuclear Power Plant site that was abandoned, is among 20 locations that are to be considered to hold used radioactive fuel from nuclear power

plants throughout the nation until a permanent site is found.

Ms. King remarked that Yellow Creek has been considered in the evaluation of sites to be considered primarily because it is a "Federal site which has been through an NRC process."

She explained that the Yellow Creek Project had already met certain specifications required by NRA since being approved as a nuclear producer, and is therefore suitable for revamping as a storage facility.

Ms. King said no conclusive decisions have been made by DOE regarding the location of the waste storage site and remarked that she could not emphasize "the word 'proposal' enough."

The Department of Energy's announcement, concerning the possible selection of Yellow Creek Nuclear Plant to become a nuclear waste dump site, has caused widespread alarm throughout the area with negative opinions being expressed by city residents and officials, as well as others within the county.

"TVA didn't see fit to build a nuclear plant here, and we definitely don't want their waste," asserted Iuka Mayor, John Biggs.

TVA decided it did not need the nuclear plants at Yellow Creek and stopped construction after millions of dollars

had been poured into concrete foundations and several buildings.

Mayor Biggs said that he had not been contacted by Federal officials about the proposal at press-time, stating that he and other Tishomingo County officials have been seeking ways to put the nuclear plant site to use to stimulate jobs; however, the new proposal is not one of their ideas.

"If nuclear waste is that bad, we certainly don't want it in our county," he said, and emphasized that he and other city officials would take any and all necessary and available measures to assure that Yellow Creek is not chosen for this purpose.

Taking into consideration the location of the Yellow Creek site in relation with the State Park Recreational Area, the Tennessee River, and the recently completed Tenn-Tom Waterway, Mayor Biggs said he feels establishing such a facility would be damaging to both the industrial and recreational development in the area.

"Due to fear of the possibility of Yellow Creek Nuclear Plant becoming a waste dump, it is very probable that Tishomingo County will suffer even further by the decline in our present population and discouragement to potential newcomers," the official concluded.

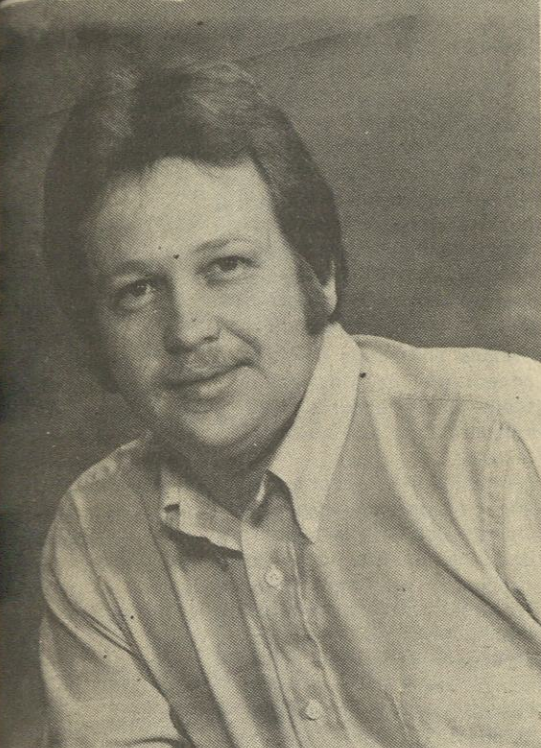


### Mayor's Proclamation

### B'VILLE MAYOR SEEKS RE-ELECTION TO POST

I wish to take this opportunity to announce my candidacy for the office of Mayor of the City of Burnsville.

First, I would like to thank the people of Burnsville, giving me the opportunity to serve you in the capacity of Mayor for the past eight years.

I would like to set the record straight for the first four years that I have served as Mayor.

In the first four years, we surfaced approximately 3 1/2 miles of city streets. We were fortunate enough to acquire 142.64 acres of land to build a city park. There was a \$40,000.00 grant approved for the park land to be used over a period of six years. The City of Burnsville

fortunate to have a cannery in the community. The three-unit area cannery, located on Front Street in Burnsville, can free of charge to the city of this area. Also, in the first four years the City of Burnsville received grants from TVA totaling \$64,399.00.

\$16,523.00 was used to build a new fire station in the city. The fire station will house up to 3 fire trucks.

\$7,500.00 was used to repave and repaint the water main.

\$11,500.00 was for a policeman salary for 1 1/2 years.

\$4,000.00 was for a new police car with police radio.

\$500.00 was to replace equipment for Police Department.

\$8,411.00 was to finance a survey for the sewer system.

\$17,965.00 was to pay off sewer debt.

The Criminal Justice Planning Committee granted the City of Burnsville \$5,121.00 for the Police Department.

The City of Burnsville received from EPA a grant of \$2,641.00 to help repair the sewer system.

The City of Burnsville was fortunate in the first four years to have cable installed in Burnsville by Multi Vision Cable Company in Dalton, Ga.

My administration for the first four years paid \$9,394.94 on the backhoe.

We also paid a note with the First American National Bank of \$5,000.00 to replenish withdrawn accounts that were borrowed June 7, 1977, 27 days before I took office on May 4, 1977.

We also laid approximately 10 miles of water line to serve people in and around Burnsville.

We are also receiving 40 miles per day for our elderly people. This program was started through the Council on Aging.

Also, in the first four years, we were instrumental in building 66 apartments for low and moderate income people.

We also spent approximately \$21,000.00 for repairs on the sewer treatment plant alone, which was too big for the city and

will never operate properly. We also spent approximately \$10,200.00 on the water well and water lines for break downs.

A note left owing of \$387,000.00 for the sewer system has yet to be paid.

There were no debts left owing by my first administration. All accounts were in the black.

And for the record, on the second four years that I have served you in the capacity of Mayor:

1. We have received \$192,466.00 also for a sewage lagoon.

2. We have also received, from the Appalachian Regional Commission, \$12,663.00 for a sewage lagoon.

3. We have also received \$105,453.00 for sewage lagoon.

4. We have also received from the Corps of Engineers \$150,000.00 to resurface 5 1/2 miles of city streets.

5. We also received from the Community Development Block Grant \$289,676.00 for a new factory building.

In the past four years you can see for the record the City of Burnsville has received \$750,258.00 in grants alone.

Plans have been made and application filed for:

1. \$600,000.00 for a new well - 6 inch water lines - renovation of the existing water treatment plant, and 51 fire plugs.

2. \$150,000.00 for a swimming pool for the City Park.

As citizens of Burnsville, you can see why we need a full-time Mayor. Without a full-time Mayor the city will not be able to obtain these type of grants. The grants obtained by the City of Burnsville involve a lot of work and people. The Mayor must be available to go to different Government agencies without advance notice. The people who control the grants set the time and place to meet with the Mayor - You meet at their convenience and not yours. It will take a full-time Mayor to accomplish progress.

If you see fit to re-elect me as your Mayor on May 14, 1985, I will work just as hard the next four years as I have in the past. I will not make you promises that cannot be kept. The only promise that I will make is to do the very best that I can for what the city has to work with. I take pride in Burnsville, and I want my sons to take pride in the City of Burnsville, also, when they grow up. I hope to see each one of you personally before the election, but if I cannot, May God bless each of you.

### TURF WEED PROBLEMS

As plants begin to green up outside on these spring days, many homeowners start paying attention to those weeds that inevitably rise in the lawn. Weed control projects need to be started now. Concentrations and instructions on use vary widely, so homeowners should READ LABELS CAREFULLY!

Many homeowners like what we call the weed and feed combination because they are easy to apply to the turf. Any of these mixtures

will control many summer annual weeds before they come up. The biggest problem with these fertilizer-herbicide combos, however, is that they are generally applied TOO LATE. Time is NEAR now for that to be a problem.

suspect that much of our non-farm population and some of our farmers in Mississippi may not know that. We're in the league with some of the more traditional farm states such as Iowa, Indiana and Kansas. We also rank as one of only five southern states in that category.

While we're on the subject, do you also know that our agricultural exports have an impact on our state's non-farm businesses as well? Economists estimate that every dollar in exports of farm commodities generates an additional \$1.05 in non-farm economic activity. That total is \$2.05 generated in such areas as transportation, financing, warehousing and production of supplies sold to farmers. Nationally, in 1983, farm exports created about \$38 billion worth of additional business in the non-farm community on top of the \$36.1 billion in farm exports.

## Chatting With Your Home Economist

A WELL-PLANNED  
WARDROBE DOESN'T HAVE  
TO COST A FORTUNE

No matter how much you spend or where you shop, think about hidden costs when you buy clothes.

Paying cash or paying the balance due on a revolving charge before the end of the month avoids credit charges. The 1.5 to 2 percent finance charge on credit card accounts doesn't sound like much, but 1.5 to 2 percent per month

on the unpaid balance turns out to be 18 to 24 percent interest per year.

Layaway plans may help you save, but the store gets the benefit of any interest on your money. If you fail to make a payment, they keep your money and the item. With self-discipline, you could put your money in a savings account, and the interest would be yours.

On costly items, take time to calculate the estimated cost per wearing. Think about how many times you'll wear the garment each week and for how many weeks per year. Then divide the cost by that number to get the cost per wearing. You'll be surprised.

A winter coat might cost \$100. If it's worn every day for five months of the year, it would cost about 66 cents per wearing. A party dress might cost \$60; but if it's only worn two times a year, the cost per wearing would be \$30. On the other hand, a pair of jeans might sell for \$12 and be worn once a week all year long. The cost per wearing would be 23 cents. The lower the cost per wearing, the better the buy.

Remember to think about the cost of care and upkeep both in terms of time and money. "Dryclean only" items cost you every time they are cleaned. Home laundry isn't free either, but it costs less than professional care.

In order to get the maximum value for your limited dollars, you may need to do a better job of planning your clothing expenditures. Contact your Extension Home Economist for a publication titled PLANNING FOR YOUR FAMILY'S CLOTHING NEEDS. This publication contains a clothing inventory and planning worksheet that is designed to help you analyze the clothing you already have, estimate your future clothing needs, and make a realistic but flexible spending plan for clothes.

GOLDEN GLOW CASSEROLE  
2 cups hot cooked rice  
10 hard-cooked eggs, chopped  
2 eggs  
½ cup mayonnaise or salad dressing

½ cup sour cream  
½ cup chopped onion  
½ cup chopped green pepper  
2 tbsp. chopped pimiento  
1 tbsp. lemon juice  
Hard-cooked eggs sliced & parsley sprig or green pepper ring and pimiento strips for garnish, optional

### PRE-MEASURE ACREAGE, FARMERS ADVISED

Farmers who use pre-measurement service prior to planting their spring crops will be guaranteed that their field sizes are accurate for the program year, Howard R. Bridges, chairperson of the Tishomingo County ASC Committee said.

He said pre-measuring is encouraged because it assures the farmer that he or she is in compliance with the acreage reduction programs, and eliminates worry over the loss of farm program benefits.

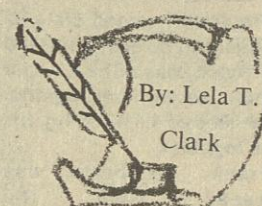
The service is offered at cost by ASCS and includes measuring, referencing and marking out fields with stakes before planting. Farmers are required to plant within the stakes that are placed when the land is pre-measured.

"We strongly recommend pre-measurement because it helps farmers plan the amount of land to devote to the acreage conservation reserve and planted acreages of program crops."

After planting, Bridges said all program participants need to certify, or report their crops and ACR land to the ASCS county office to be eligible for price support loans, deficiency payments and other acreage reduction

program benefits. Pre-measurement helps assure accurate reporting, the ASCS official stated.

### Look At Yourself When Planning Your Wardrobe

Whether planning to make or buy clothing, people want clothing that looks good on them.

Physical features such as height, build, or bone structure and skin coloring cannot be changed. But it is possible to change other physical traits such as weight, hairstyle, length of nails and skin condition. When planning their clothing, teenagers and adults should select styles, designs, and colors that will accentuate or emphasize their good features and minimize their not so good features.

Clothing lines affect a person's figure and how the clothes look on him or her. Use the design lines in clothing to emphasize good features and camouflage others. Both the silhouette of a garment, and its inner design lines are important. The silhouette lines create an outline of the figure. The inner design lines create the

actual design of the garment. They include neck lines, belt lines, decorative details, buttons or trim.

Lines can play a trick on the eye. These tricks, called optical illusions, can be used to create the desired look.

Vertical lines go up and down, derize and lengthen the figure. When used in clothing, they travel vertically, figure giving the of greater height.

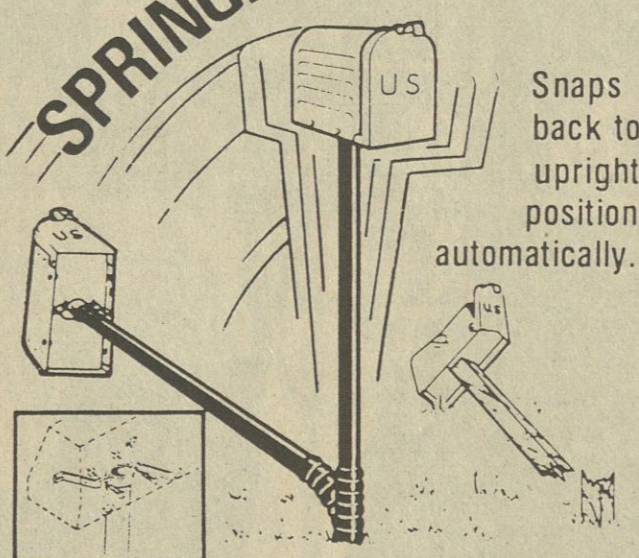

### PET ODORS

If your pet is giving off an unpleasant odor, naturally you'll want to do something about it. There is no breed of cat or dog, no individual animal, which "normally" smells bad. Either the animal is just plain dirty or suffering from a health problem.

First of all, if you've become aware of unpleasant, pet-related odors around your house, try brushing out your animal's coat. If this doesn't work, you might try brushing in one of the following dry substances - baking soda, baby powder, talcum powder, or cornmeal - all of which can help remove oils and filth which are clinging to your pet. But be sure to brush out all the powder, particularly with cats who groom themselves.

A bath with a good

shampoo is the next step. If this also fails, then it's time to consult with your veterinarian. Unpleasant pet odors are often associated with various health problems. These include infections of the mouth, ear, intestine, and other areas. Only an examination by your veterinarian will pinpoint the source of possible health problem.

## Wagons ho!

### Trek through Alabama moves at leisurely pace

WETUMPKA, Ala. — M.C. Linton says that when he retired as a truck driver in 1977 he immediately hit the road again, but this time in a covered wagon that moved slow enough to actually see something.

"I didn't have time to see the South on a truck," the 67-year-old native of Iuka said, "so you might say I'm going back to check it out from this wagon."

As Linton spoke, he looked over the rumps of his two mules at a caravan of some 220 horses and 20 covered wagons headed down the right lane of U.S. 231 toward Montgomery last week.

The caravan, which included people from as far away as Maine and Texas, had formed in the northeast Alabama cities of Boaz and Forney for the 180-mile, six-day trek to Garrett Coliseum where the Southeastern Livestock Exposition and Rodeo was going to open.

Like most of the people interviewed in the wagons, Linton said he enjoyed the slower pace that such caravans afforded. But he wasn't about to leave all his creature comforts behind.

For an easier ride over the back roads of Alabama and other Southern states he has traveled, Linton installed rubber wheels and hydraulic brakes on his homemade covered wagon.

And to ward off heat and help pass the time, he equipped "the cabin" of the wagon with a CB radio and a P.A. system.

## Mobile Health Unit Continues Screenings

The Rural Mobile Health Unit, sponsored by the Northeast Mississippi Community Action Agency, will continue conducting its screenings within Tishomingo County through April 18.

## POINT OF LAW

(Prepared by the Mississippi State Bar. Some legal rights may vary from locality to locality. Always consult an attorney when in doubt about your rights.)

Q. I have been laid off work and cannot pay my debts. I have considered filing bankruptcy, but I am afraid that I will lose my car if I do so. I currently owe \$6,500.00 on the car, but it's only worth \$3,000.00. Is there some way I can keep the car and still go through bankruptcy?

A. You have two choices. If you file a Chapter 7 bankruptcy, the person who has a lien on your car will be permitted to sell it. However, you can redeem the car by offering the creditor the \$3,000.00 market value. While you probably cannot pay the \$3,000.00 in installments to the creditor, you may be able to refinance the car through another lender. As an alternative, you may wish to consider filing a petition under Chapter 13 of the bankruptcy laws. You are eligible for relief under Chapter 13 if you

have a stable income through wages or other sources. Under Chapter 13, you may keep your car and modify the payment schedule to the lien holder so that you pay the \$3,000.00 owed over three to five years.

Q. I was adjudicated a bankrupt last year and received a discharge from all my debts. However, last month I was convinced by a former creditor to begin making payments on an old debt. Must I continue to make the payments?

A. Such an agreement is called a "reaffirmation agreement". Such agreements are enforceable by a creditor only under certain

conditions, the most important of which is that the agreement must have been approved by the court. Since it does not appear that the agreement you refer to was so approved, you may refuse to make any further payments without being concerned that the creditor may enforce the agreement in court. Any attempt by the creditor would subject him to the possibility of being held in contempt of the bankruptcy court. You may, of course, voluntarily make such payments as you desire.

Secretary at the school. Parents of children who will be five years old on or before September 1, are encouraged to register their child for the class.

### Iuka School Offers Kindergarten Class

The Iuka Special Municipal Separate School District plans to offer one state supported kindergarten class during the 1985-86 school year. The Education Reform Act of 1982 states that no more than five million dollars is to be given to all the school districts in the state for the funding of the program. Because money is so limited, the Mississippi School Districts will not be able to provide kindergarten space to all children whose parents would like to send them.

Dr. Jerry Stone, Superintendent, announces that registration for the kindergarten class will take place on school days from 8:30 - 2:30 from April 10th through May 10th at Iuka Elementary School. Parents are reminded that the child's birth certificate and immunization record must be presented at the time of registration. Only children who reside in the school district and who will be five years old on or before September 1, 1985, are eligible to register.

The State Department of Education has determined a student selection policy only for the 1985-86 school year, which our school district must follow. This policy is one which is fair and promotes equal representation of students. As directed by the State Department of Education, Dr. Stone states that an analysis of the enrollment of first grade students for the last two years was conducted with regard to race and sex. The selection of our kindergarten students will continue the same type of enrollment ratio: 43% white males, 53% white females, 2% black males, and 2% black females.

The drawing of students will be conducted on May 15th, and parents of the children selected will be notified by mail. Anyone needing additional information may contact the elementary school, 423-9290, or the central office, 423-3206.

# Exposing the myths about IRA's.

## Myth #1

You need at least \$2,000 to take advantage of Uncle Sam's tax loophole.

Wrong. You can open an IRA at First Bank with as little as \$25. Nothing says you have to wait until you've saved up \$2,000. ## Myth #4

If you're married and only one of you works, you are limited to a \$2,000 contribution.

Wrong. You may put as much as \$2,250 into two IRA's. And you can split the money any way you like as long as neither of you gets more than \$2,000.

## Myth #5

You can't open an IRA if you're already under a retirement plan where you work.

Wrong. It used to be that way. But no more. If you're a working man or woman, you can have your own tax-free retirement plan in addition to any program your employer may have set up for you. And you don't have to pay taxes on it or on the interest it earns. Until you retire.

## Myth #6

You must have made your 1984 IRA deposit within the year to deduct it from '84 income taxes.

Wrong. You have until April 15, 1985. (An extension for filing does not apply to IRA's.) And, you don't have to deposit the whole allowable amount at one time. Any deposits you made during 1984 plus any you make before April 15, 1985 can be declared on your 1984 tax return.

## Myth #7

Your employer is not permitted to contribute to your IRA.

Wrong. Your employer can even use this as a supplemental retirement plan. He can put in, say, \$1,000 and you the other \$1,000. In both cases the money is considered income that is tax-deferred.

## Myth #8

It doesn't make sense to borrow money for an IRA.

Wrong. It can make a lot of sense. Look at it this way. Say you're 35 years old and you borrow \$2,000 at 13%. You deposit it in an IRA earning 9%. At the end of one year you pay back \$2,260, but your IRA is now worth \$2,180 and, assuming you're in a 35% tax bracket, you saved \$700 in income tax. You are \$620 ahead!

## Myth #9

You have to be 25 years old or older to open an IRA.

Wrong. Anyone under age 70½ can participate as long as they earn their money. This includes children and teenagers. By 59½ you may start withdrawing your money, and by 70½ it's mandatory.

## Myth #10

Once you start an IRA with one institution, you can't move it to another.

Wrong. As long as you transfer your money directly from institution to institution, you can shift it around as often as you like. But if you move it from one trustee to you and
