

Did You Overfertilize? Those light and dark streak

across fields that have been fertilized are costly. Research indicates that

when one area of a field is overfertilized and another is underfertilized that the total yield may be 25 percent less than if the correct amount had been spread over the entire field.

applying recommended rates of fertilizer, each increment added does not give the same amount of increase in yield. The last increment applied

Soil Conservation Service Mississippi has only one native species of deer - the whitetail. This is the same deer that is a native to most of the Eastern United States. Bucks in Wisconsin may weigh up to 300 pounds, in Florida as little as 70 pounds. The average Mississippi buck will weigh from 160 to 190 pounds. Is Carob More Nutritious Than Cocoa?

If your local health-food store has a candy counter, it probably stocks a wide variety of carob-covered goodies. Carob, a "natural" food

that tastes somewhat like cocoa, is often thought of as a more nutritious alternative to chocolate. But this is not Cocoa powder has more

protein. calcium, phosphorus, iron, potassium, vitamin A, riboflavin and niacin than does carob powder. And although pure cocoa has fewer calories than pure carob, the cocoa has a higher fat content.

However, the fat levels of commercially manufactured carob products often rival those of foods containing cocoa, since vegetable fats such as palm kernel oil and coconut oil must be added to

make solid carob products. Both of these oils are more highly saturated than cocoa butter

The "natural" label that some health-food promoters put on carob candies can be confusing. Many consumers assume that "natural" is synonymous with purity, health and good nutrition. But most carob powder is no more "natural" than cocoa

Nutritionally, cocoa is the better of the two. But neither should be a large part of our daily diets. While carob- and cocoa-flavored confections do have measurable amounts of some nutrients, they also provide a lot of calories. Few of us can afford those extra calories on a regular basis.

Also known as St. John's Bread or Locust Bean, carob is the fleshy pod of a certain kind of evergreen tree. It grows in the Near East, northern Africa and the Mediterranean. Some food lore experts believe that the locusts that St. John the Baptist ate in the wilderness were actually carob pods.

Chocolate and cocoa both come from the cocoa bean, which is the fruit of a tree that is native to the American

Peanut Butter Oatmeal Cookies

1/2 cup peanut butter 1 stick (1/2 cup) butter or margarine, softened

1 cup packed brown sugar 1 egg 1 teaspoon vanilla 1 cup sifted flour

1 teaspoon soda 3 cups quick cooking rolled oats 1/2 cup hot water

1/2 teaspoon salt

Cream together peanut butter, butter, and sugar until light and fluffy. Add egg and vanilla. Beat well, sift flour, salt and soda and add to creamed mixture. Add quick oats and water and mix until well blended. Chill in refrigerator 1 hour. Shape the dough into two long forms about two inches square. Wrap each form in wax paper. Chill in refrigerator until firm. Cut into 1/4 inch slices. Bake on a cookie sheet in a 350 degree Fahrenheit oven about ten minutes. Yield: 5

In the U.S. skunks are the most common carrier of rabies. Bats, raccoons and foxes are also common carriers. Rabid wild animals may survive up to six months.

Cat contacts rabid animals. Rabies virus is introduced through bite wounds and concentrates in the cat's brain and nervous system. Symptoms appear within 10-60 days (usually 14-28), depending upon the degree of exposure and location of virus entry. After clinical signs appear, the cat usually survives only five days.







In Mexico the team will



ASCS **Farm News**

TISHOMINGO COUNTY FARMERS MAY IDLE 855

CROPLAND ACRES The 1985 farm program enrollment report shows that 855 acres in Tishomingo County could be diverted from production of wheat, feed grain and cotton to the acreage conservation reserve (ACR). "The final acreage reduction and land diversion may be lower based on actual plantings," said Howard R. Bridges, chairperson of the Tishomingo County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

In addition to reducing excess crops and bringing supplies more in line with demand, Bridges said the diverted acreage will mean a tremendous savings of soil and water resources on these acres. "Farmers agree to cover their idled acres with annual, biennial or perennial grasses, legumes and small grains to protect their ACR from wind and water erosion. Residue from minimum-till or no-till practices also may be used for a protective cover," he said. Farmers who signed up to

participate in the 1985 acreage reduction programs agreed to reduce their base acreage plantings by at least 10 percent for feed grains and extra long staple cotton, 30 percent for wheat and upland cotton and 35 percent for rice. Participating producers will be eligible for program benefits such as price support loans and purchases, target price protection and land diversion payments under the upland cotton, rice and wheat programs. The sign-up period for the programs ended April 1. According to Bridges, ACR

or idled cropland must be eligible land that was devoted to a small grain or row crop in two of the last three years. "It can also be land designated

as ACR under the previous year's acreage reduction program, or land that was seeded and maintained in a permanent vegetative cover."

The ASCS official said farm program participants are required to maintain approved conservation practices on ACR land through the end of the program year. The diverted acres may not be harvested. Grazing is not authorized during the five principle growing months (May 1 through September 30). An exception to the prohibition on haying and grazing is authorized in areas where severe weather conditions reduced normal hay production and pasture development.

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


