### ELECTION DAY TUESDAY THROUGHOUT COUNTY

Following in all the incorporated towns in Tishomingo County will be held Tuesday, June 4, when a Mayor and a member Board of Aldermen will be elected to serve respective municipalities. In Iuka the ballot will also carry the name of the Democratic nominee for the office of Chief of Police.

In Iuka the ballot will contain the name of John H. Hagg, for Mayor; Floyd Baker, for Chief of Police; and the following nine men will be voting for the offices of the Board of Aldermen: Roy Dean (D), Benjamin M. Jones (D), Cecil Phifer (D), Robinson (D), David A. Yarbrough (D), Aaron Bonds (D), John Hagg (I), John Hagg (I), and Bobby Hagg (I).

In the Town of Paden, the ballot will contain the name of E. Lindsey, the incumbent, for Mayor; and the

following for Aldermen: R.C. Martin, K.D. Lambert, James Trussell, Pat Stephens, and Junior Luttrell.

Appearing on the ballot in the Town of Belmont will be Earl Alexander and Haskell V. Sparks, for Mayor; for Aldermen, Clyne Pounders, J.P. Wilemon, Jr., H.A. Waddle, Braxton Credille, Jack W. George, Billy Adams, Jack Fay L. Taylor, and E.W. Wigginton.

On the Burnsville ballot, for Mayor, Bobby H. Johnson will be unopposed, as will the five men chosen as Democratic Board of Aldermen nominees: Truman South, Edward Thigpen, Mack Cummings, Doyle Rorie, and Billy Blakney.

In the Town of Golden, only one qualified for Mayor and five for Aldermen. Included are: for Mayor, the incumbent, Raymond U. Shook; for Aldermen: Hollis Long, Gene Moore, Noonan Patterson,

Addis Stanphill, and Charles Parker.



Congressman Jamie Whitten served as Master of Ceremonies at the official Memorial Day Dedication

Ceremonies of the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway held at Yellow Creek Port. Other dignitaries seated on the platform included: Governor Bill Allain; Speaker of the

House, C.B. "Buddie" Newman; Major General, John F. Wall; T.V.A. Chairman, Charles H. Dean, Jr.; T.V.A. Director, Richard M. Freeman; and a host of local

elected officials. Mississippi Highway Patrol Officials said the event, which drew the national news media, also attracted an estimated 6,000 attendees.

## DEDICATION CEREMONIES OPEN WATERWAY AT PORT

A crowd, approximated at 6,000 people by the Mississippi Highway Patrol, attended the official dedication ceremonies of the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway that were held on Memorial Day, May 27, 1985, at Yellow Creek Port, near Iuka. The warm afternoon ceremonies were the first in a week of events planned to officially dedicate the Tenn-Tom. (The official opening of the Waterway will take place on Saturday, June 1, 1985, at Columbus.)

The gala began with the arrival of a flotilla, which included over 200 privately owned boats. The port area was attractively decorated for the event with red, white and blue banners and balloons could be found throughout the area. Many arts and crafts display booths donned the port with several club and civic groups providing refreshments for the warm and weary onlookers. Entertainment was provided for the dedication by various local and out-of-town groups and covered a wide variety of interests. The highlight of the day was the arrival of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers vessel, "MISSISSIPPI", which had as passengers several state and local elected officials.

Among the state officials attending the dedication were Mississippi Congressman Jamie Whitten and Governor

Bill Allain. Congressman Whitten, who is chairman of the U.S. House Appropriations Committee, responsible for funding that helped complete the waterway, took the role of Master of Ceremonies at the event. He stressed the importance of looking forward to the future and not brooding over the past. "If the sacrifices and capital investments we make today can provide our children and future generations with a fine transportation system and adequate supplies of energy and water, we can look back with pride at our accomplishments," expressed Whitten. Governor Allain expanded on this theme by reminding everyone that they should not expect overnight success from the waterway, but look at the advantages it holds for the area in the future. Congressman Whitten referred to an article in the New York Times, which complained of the slow progress on the project. "The people of New York would give anything to have a project like this one to move this fast in their area," said Whitten.

"The completion of the Tenn-Tom marks the culmination of a dream that began with French and Spanish explorers in the 18th Century for a water route linking the Tennessee River Basin directly to the Gulf of Mexico. Its construction required the removal of half again as much earth as did the Panama Canal. More importantly, it required the cooperation of numerous federal agencies, state and local governments, and the private sector," said Major General John F. Wall, Director of Civil Works, U.S. Army Corps of Engineers.

The Tenn-Tom, which offers a shortcut of up to 800 miles from the heartland of America to the Gulf, offers benefits to shippers in approximately 14 states. The completion of the waterway after 15 years of construction is expected to provide an estimated 900 employment opportunities and stimulate the area economy by making shipping rates more competitive.

Yellow Creek Port, which opened in 1974, has greatly improved industry throughout this and nearby areas. Although its principle product is steel, other products such as grains and coal are becoming more prominent. The Port, which was built by T.V.A., cost a total of \$14 million to complete.

Among the various local dignitaries on board the "MISSISSIPPI" were Mr. Carlos Ginn, member of the Board of Directors of the Yellow Creek Port Authority, and Mrs. Ginn; Mr. D.O. Jordan, member of the Board of Directors of the Yellow Creek

Port Authority, and Mrs. Jordan; Mr. Gerald Parsons, President of the Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors, and Mrs. Parsons; Mr. A.T. Marlar, Mayor of the Town of Burnsville, and Mrs. Marlar; Mr. James Wade, Mayor of the Town of Tishomingo, and Mrs. Wade; and Mr. John H. Biggs, Mayor of the City of Iuka, and Mrs. Biggs; and Rev. Henry L. Damons, Sr. During the ceremonies these officials were seated, along with the other state and local dignitaries, on the grandstand directly in front of the Corps vessel.

At the conclusion of the dedication ceremonies at Yellow Creek, several thousand helium filled balloons were released by Congressman Whitten from a barge stationed near the grandstand. The "MISSISSIPPI", accompanied by the flotilla will travel down the Tenn-Tom to several different ports where ceremonies will take place throughout the week.

### Did You Overfertilize?

Those light and dark streak across fields that have been fertilized are costly.

Research indicates that when one area of a field is overfertilized and another is underfertilized that the total yield may be 25 percent less than if the correct amount had been spread over the entire field.

The reason for this is when

applying recommended rates of fertilizer, each increment added does not give the same amount of increase in yield.

The last increment applied will increase the yield by a smaller amount than the previous increment.

So, overfertilizing a portion of the field will give a much smaller yield increase, if any increase at all.

Streaks across fields from unevenly applying fertilizer

are often visible when applying nitrogen. But, proper application of phosphate and potash is equally important on soils that have tested low in those minerals.

Uniform lime application is especially important since lime is applied less frequently than fertilizer, the undesirable effects of improper application may exist for several seasons.

Uniform application is also important when using fertilizer containing herbicides if farmers are to get good weed control.

### Avoid Farm Equipment Theft!

With increasing activities on farms, farmers should be reminded to protect equipment from theft.

Millions of dollars worth of

farm equipment are stolen each year in the United States. Tractors, combines and other high-priced machinery are attractive targets for thieves.

Practices such as leaving farm equipment in fields overnight to help get an early start the next morning invite theft.

Precautions that prevent theft include:

--Placing machinery so it is visible from the farmstead. If this is not possible, park equipment in view of a neighbor's house.

--Disable equipment left in fields overnight. One method is to remove a distributor cap or battery. A hidden ignition switch can be installed to prevent starting the engine. Of course, always remove ignition keys.

--If possible, chain or lock together equipment left in fields or in remote buildings. Lock and chain the front and rear wheels or chain and lock equipment to a tree or other stationary object.

--Properly mark all equipment for identification and keep on inventory list that includes serial numbers and descriptions. Keep a photograph so peculiar markings are recorded on film.

### Is Carob More Nutritious Than Cocoa?

If your local health-food store has a candy counter, it probably stocks a wide variety of carob-covered goodies.

Carob, a "natural" food that tastes somewhat like cocoa, is often thought of as a more nutritious alternative to chocolate. But this is not true.

Cocoa powder has more protein, calcium, phosphorus, iron, potassium, vitamin A, riboflavin and niacin than does carob powder. And although pure cocoa has fewer calories than pure carob, the cocoa has a higher fat content.

However, the fat levels of commercially manufactured carob products often rival those of foods containing cocoa, since vegetable fats such as palm kernel oil and coconut oil must be added to

make solid carob products. Both of these oils are more highly saturated than cocoa butter.

The "natural" label that some health-food promoters put on carob candies can be confusing. Many consumers assume that "natural" is synonymous with purity, health and good nutrition. But most carob powder is no more "natural" than cocoa powder.

Nutritionally, cocoa is the better of the two. But neither should be a large part of our daily diets. While carob- and cocoa-flavored confections do have measurable amounts of some nutrients, they also provide a lot of calories. Few of us can afford those extra calories on a regular basis.

Also known as St. John's Bread or Locust Bean, carob is the fleshy pod of a certain kind of evergreen tree. It grows in the Near East, northern Africa and the Mediterranean. Some food lore experts believe that the locusts that St. John the Baptist ate in the wilderness were actually carob pods.

Chocolate and cocoa both come from the cocoa bean, which is the fruit of a tree that is native to the American tropics.

### Peanut Butter Oatmeal Cookies

1/2 cup peanut butter  
1 stick (1/2 cup) butter or margarine, softened  
1 cup packed brown sugar  
1 egg  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
1 cup sifted flour  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1 teaspoon soda  
3 cups quick cooking rolled oats  
1/2 cup hot water

Cream together peanut butter, butter, and sugar until light and fluffy. Add egg and vanilla. Beat well, sift flour, salt and soda and add to creamed mixture. Add quick oats and water and mix until well blended. Chill in refrigerator 1 hour. Shape the dough into two long forms about two inches square. Wrap each form in wax paper. Chill in refrigerator until firm. Cut into 1/4 inch slices. Bake on a cookie sheet in a 350 degree Fahrenheit oven about ten minutes. Yield: 5 dozen.

## CARING FOR YOUR PET

### RABIES IN CATS

In the U.S. skunks are the most common carrier of rabies. Bats, raccoons and foxes are also common carriers. Rabid wild animals may survive up to six months.

Cat contacts rabid animals. Rabies virus is introduced through bite wounds and concentrates in the cat's brain and nervous system.

Symptoms appear within 10-60 days (usually 14-28), depending upon the degree of exposure and location of virus entry. After clinical signs appear, the cat usually survives only five days.

The rabid cat is extremely dangerous to humans and animals, often attacking viciously

without provocation. The course of five days. A rabid cat may attack several wild and domestic animals, multiplying the danger to public health. Even death, a rabid cat can spread scavengers.

Protect your pet and others from rabies by having it vaccinated.

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
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## Strawbridge - Coker Plan June 15th Wedding Date

## B'Ville 1st Graders Prepare Book For Time Capsule

As a teacher of first graders at Burnsville Elementary School, I try to involve my students in one special project, which they will remember through the years.

After reading the newspaper article concerning the time capsule for Tishomingo County to be included as a part of the dedication and grand opening ceremonies of the Tenn-Tom Waterway, June 1, at Columbus, I chose as our special class project this year something to go in the time capsule.

It was decided that we make a book with a cover made of red poster board in the shape of a school building. As the project had to be small enough to fit into a cigar box size container, it was not an easy task for first graders to work on small sheets with narrow lines. However, with practice, each child prepared one page which included a small picture of the child, information about the family, and such details as the child's favorite foods, games, and TV shows, and what the child would like to be when he/she grows up. Each child then illustrated the pages with his art work. When the capsule is opened 25 or 50 years from now, it will be interesting to compare this information with things in that time period and to see if any of the children do become what they now want to be.

In addition to the book for the time capsule, we expanded our project with a career development lesson. We

made a large bulletin board depicting the past, present, and future as related to the Tenn-Tom Waterway. The past was represented as a dream, which is exactly what the Waterway was for many, many years. Someone had to have the idea of linking the Tennessee and Tombigbee Rivers to provide a relatively short water route from Mid-America to the Gulf of Mexico. He then shared the thought with someone else. Thus, many people began to see the feasibility of the idea. We owe tribute to these dreamers, whether they were elderly gentlemen playing checkers at a country store and discussing the idea or engineers, teachers, and lawmakers promoting the proposal. Had they not dared dream, discuss, and plan, the Waterway would never have become the reality we see today.

On our bulletin board, the present was illustrated by the actual Waterway, which travels the length of Tishomingo County on its way south. It is now time for dreams again if the Waterway is to be beneficial to our communities. Our bulletin board shows the dream resulting in wildlife preserves, nature parks, and recreational projects such as that presently planned for the Bay Springs area along the banks of the Tenn-Tom.

This is a great challenge to the educators of our area. I believe we can promote career development at all educational levels in relation to the Waterway. In the lower grades, this could be as simple as artwork depicting ways the Waterway can provide jobs. Almost every school subject offers opportunities for emphasizing the possibilities the Waterway has to benefit our people by making life more pleasant and providing employment, either directly or indirectly. We must teach respect for and wise use of our environment as we promote these dreams related to the Waterway.

The Waterway is the "Gateway" to the future of Tishomingo County on our bulletin board. Though very few people were happy to surrender their good farmland needed for construction

of the Waterway, it is possible that the Waterway may now be the answer to the economic survival of our county, which we're told is the poorest (or one of the poorest) in the state. Dreams must be dreamed, which will show ways the Waterway can provide a livelihood for our children and their children, who can no longer have the type jobs their parents had on the land, largely due to mechanized farming. If the Waterway can provide jobs, it will help eliminate poverty. We know that poverty breeds stress and stress breeds violence, which leads to physical, mental, and social problems.

If our generation thinks only of itself and does not make our children and their future our prime concern, we will not have accomplished all we should. Each generation must make sacrifices needed for the well-being of the next generation.

Recently, I saw the following article, which, I believe, should challenge each of us to keep the American dream alive and to do our part to see that the Tenn-Tom Waterway is developed in ways that will benefit our people.

### I Believe In America!

No power on earth can shake my faith in America - this land which is my home. Its beauty and its boundary are part of me. I have breathed the free wind that blows across its mountains and prairies, woods and farms. It has given me liberty to make a life in my own way - to work, to build a home and raise my children, to worship God as I see fit.

No matter how truth is twisted to selfish ends, no matter how the efforts of the nation seem to flounder, here I will make my stand. I will keep faith with those who founded it.

I am sick of wars and strife, and who is not? But there is an inner depth of my spirit that has never faltered. I will keep on, and I will do my best. And I am not alone. There are millions of others like me - quiet, sincere, determined people, willing to give all they have to keep this country free. They - and I - believe in America!

## ASCS Farm News

TISHOMINGO COUNTY FARMERS MAY IDLE 855 CROPLAND ACRES

The 1985 farm program enrollment report shows that 855 acres in Tishomingo County could be diverted from production of wheat, feed grain and cotton to the acreage conservation reserve (ACR). "The final acreage reduction and land diversion may be lower based on actual plantings," said Howard R. Bridges, chairperson of the Tishomingo County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

In addition to reducing excess crops and bringing supplies more in line with demand, Bridges said the diverted acreage will mean a tremendous savings of soil and water resources on these acres. "Farmers agree to cover their idled acres with annual, biennial or perennial grasses, legumes and small grains to protect their ACR from wind and water erosion. Residue from minimum-till or no-till practices also may be used for a protective cover," he said.

Farmers who signed up to participate in the 1985 acreage reduction programs agreed to reduce their base acreage plantings by at least 10 percent for feed grains and extra long staple cotton, 30 percent for wheat and upland cotton and 35 percent for rice. Participating producers will be eligible for program benefits such as price support loans and purchases, target price protection and land diversion payments under the upland cotton, rice and wheat programs. The sign-up period for the programs ended April 1.

According to Bridges, ACR or idled cropland must be eligible land that was devoted to a small grain or row crop in two of the last three years. "It can also be land designated

as ACR under the previous year's acreage reduction program, or land that was seeded and maintained in a permanent vegetative cover."

The ASCS official said farm program participants are required to maintain approved conservation practices on ACR land through the end of the program year. The diverted acres may not be harvested. Grazing is not authorized during the five principle growing months (May 1 through September 30). An exception to the prohibition on haying and grazing is authorized in areas where severe weather conditions reduced normal hay production and pasture development.

## Bass Club Has Record Weigh-In

King Wins

Tri-State Bass Masters, of Iuka, had an impressive weigh-in for the May tournament. More lunker size bass were caught in this tournament than in any tournament held by the club since organized three years ago.

Charles King took first place with two bass weighing 11 lbs. 13 ozs. His largest fish, which tipped the scales at 6 lbs. 8 ozs., was good enough for the lunker prize. Any time an angler can bring in fish that average about 6 lbs. each, that makes an interesting day. Other anglers who caught big fish during the May 18 tournament were: J. Wahlstrom, 6 lbs. 6 ozs.; Donnie Davis, 4 lbs. 13 ozs.; and C.B. Wheeler, 3 lbs. 12 ozs. These were just some of the larger largemouth bass. R. Coker landed a 5 lb. 7 oz. smallmouth bass.

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




