

Corps Awards Contract For

Yellow Creek

The Nashville District of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers has awarded a contract for channel improvements to be performed at Yellow Creek, which is located along the Tenn-Tom Waterway in both Lauderdale County, Ala. and Tishomingo County, Miss.

The low bid of \$744,501 was submitted by the Small **Business Administration of** Atlanta, Ga., who will subcontract to N.L. Carson Construction Co., Inc., of Carthage, Miss.

The work will consist of clearing and removing debris, performing excavation work, laving stone protection, and removing a bridge.

The contract was awarded under Section 8A of the Small **Business Contract. It will** require completion within 210 calendar days after the notice to proceed is given.

County School Bus Driver Training

The first School Bus Driver Training School for the **Tishomingo County Schools** has been scheduled to begin Tuesday, June 25-26, 1985 at 8:00 a.m. at the Belmont School.

Under the present regulations each regular and substitute driver must hold a valid bus drivers certificate from the Mississippi State Department of Education to be eligible to drive a school bus for the public schools. Experienced drivers will be

required to complete the first day only for a one year renewal certificate.

Damaging winds and heavy rains swept through the county on Monday, June 17, bringing with it a tornado, which touched down Monday night between Belmont and

North Mississippi had been Tupelo Monday, but no apparent tornado warnings had been issued. This left area residents unprepared for the twister, which destroyed two

the Notlem Fabrication Co. building in Belmont and Golden Sales building in Golden. There were no injuries reported as a result of the twister.

Reports made by county law officials indicated that the storm first touched down just outside of the Belmont City Limits, where it torn down a porch at Golden Sales on Hwy. 25.

Two unoccupied mobile homes, located on Highway 366, owned by Vera Bostick, exploded as a result of the

storm Cindy Hopkins and her small child, who lived in one of the mobile homes, left their home only minutes before it was destroyed.

Wayne Milton, who rented the other mobile home, is the manager of Notiem Fabrication Co., which was also heavily damaged. Officials in Golden repor-

ted that the storm came out of the northeast, traveling

south for approximately two miles, leaving uprooted trees and downed power lines in its path. Much of the area was without electricity throughout the night.

The storm also left several minor damages throughout other areas of the county, mainly due to high winds. Total estimated damages resulting from the twister had not been determined at presstime.

The Reverend Samuel Alfred Bonds, age 83, of luka, died Friday, June 14, at **Tishomingo County Hospital** after suffering a massive stroke.

Rev. Bonds was known and loved by many, many people throughout not only Mississippi, but also Alabama and Tennessee, where he had pastored various churches for approximately 50 years. Uncountable numbers have been saved as a result of his Pleasant Grove To ministries, and literally hundreds have been baptized by Host Gospel Meeting

him throughout the years. Rev. Bonds rendered his services to this area in many different ways. He was the founder of the First United Pentecostal Church, located on North Main Street in luka, and also the Christian Fellowship Center, located off Highway 25 North, behind McBride's, where he pastored until his unexpected death.

He had also been a barber for numerous years in Corinth, Tuscumbia, Ala. and at the **Bostick Barber Shop on Front** Street in luka until he retired about 15 years ago.

Rev. Bonds was very devoted to God and his fellowman. He made a trip to the hospital at least once every day to visit the patients there. He also visited the nursing home and other people that he knew were sick or who were "shut-ins", unable to leave their homes. He made For Bible School At several visits of this type every Sunday morning before Iuka Methodist church time.

He loved everyone and gave his time freely to brighten the lives of others with his encouraging words and uplifting strength and determination. He was truly an inspiration to all who knew him and will be greatly missed. Services for Rev. Bonds

were held at 2:00 p.m. Sunday, June 16, at the Christian Fellowship Center with Rev. Jimmy McMasters officiating. Burial took place in Oak Grove Cemetery. Cutshall Funeral Home was in charge of the arrangements.



One further caution is necessary. The volatile oils in hot peppers can cause burns. When working with hot peppers, wear gloves, be careful not to touch your eyes with contaminated hands.

Special care needs to be taken when canning peppers. To prevent botulism, all lowacid foods such as meat, fish, poultry and vegetables including peppers must be processed in a pressure canner. The high temperatures reached in the canner will kill home garden weed control the Clostridium botulinum bacteria whereas boiling water bath processing tem-

peratures will not. In canning peppers it's important to start with unblemished, unbruised and freshly picked peppers. Wash the peppers carefully, remove peels, stems and seeds. Skins can be blistered in either a hot oven or even an electric or gas burner.

Pack the peeled peppers loosely into pint jars to within one-half inch of the top. Pour boiling water over the peppers and add salt as desired. Process in a pressure canner at 10 pounds of pressure for 35 minutes. If desired, peppers can be packed into halfpint jars but canning in quarts is not recommended until further research can be completed to determine the processing times.

Peppers lose their crispness when frozen and thawed. Frozen peppers are useful in cooked dishes. dishes where the texture is not important but the flavor is desirable. This is one

casseroles. To sun dry, daytime temperatures should range from 85 to 90 degrees Fahrenheit or higher. If nighttime temperatures drop to the dew point, bring the peppers Indoors. Large peppers are better if cut into halves. Remove seeds, stems and membrances, Slice or cut into cubes. Small peppers can be dried whole but should be split with a knife to speed drying. The peppers are dry when brittle.

To air dry, split peppers with a knife. With a large needle run a heavy thread through the stems of the pepper. Hang the strings of peppers in a room where the air circulates freely, High humidity may cause the peppers to spoil before they dry. This method may take as long as three to four weeks before the peppers are thoroughly dried.

To dehydrate, the oven temperature should not exceed 140 degrees Fahrenheit. Preparation is the same as for sun drying.

Store dried peppers in moisture vapor-proof packaging in a cool, dry, dark place. This will allow peppers to retain their color and pungency. Dried chill peppers can be ground in a blender and used as a seasoning. The hot varieties can be ground and used as cayenne pepper or as chill powder. The milder varieties can be ground and used as paprika.

Old-Fashioned Blueberry Sugar Cakes

1 cup sugar 1/2 cup vegetable shortening

1/2 teaspoon salt 3 eggs

2 cups flour 2 tsp. baking powder

1/2 tsp. cinnamon 1 cup milk

1 cup fresh or dry-pack frozen blueberries, rinsed and drained

Mix sugar and shortening until fluffy. Add salt. Stir in eggs. Sift flour and baking powder together and add to mixture, Add cinnamon, Add milk gradually and beat mixture for 60 strokes until dough is smooth and satiny. Dust blueberries slightly with flour and carefully fold into mixture. Spoon batter into well-greased muffin tins. filling 3/3 full. Bake in a preheated oven at 400 degrees until toothpick comes out dry, about 20 to 25 minutes. Yield 12 blueberry

final certification date for all crops is July 15, 1985. These acreages should be reported: cotton, corn, grain sorghum, soybeans, peanuts and truck crops.

Bridges said that growers not participating in the 1985 programs should report their acreages to insure future benefits and protect acreage bases.

After certification, the ASCS county office will select farms at random to verify that acreage reports are accurate and have aerial photographs available for farmers to identify their fields.

"Certification is particularly important to producers of quota crops such as tobacco and peanuts. In addition to these crops, however, all other crop acreages must be reported," Bridges said.

Spring seeded crops may be certified at any time between 8:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. at the county office in luka, MS. "We encourage farmers to certify as soon as possible after planting and not wait until the deadline date to report their acres," the ASCS official said.







BEST TIME TO SPAY KITTEN

Female kittens mature a good deal faster than males. They are capable of becoming pregnant during the first heat period -- as early as five months -- but you should not mate your kitten until she is at least one year old.

When your kitten is in heat, she becomes restless, nervous and tense. She may roll around on the floor guite a bit. And her voice can also change, becoming more plercing and demanding. But these behavioral changes are quite normal.

There is no reason to postpone having your kitten spayed unless you do plan to mate her. Many veterinarians feel that the best time to spay a kitten is at four to five months, before she has her heat period. The
