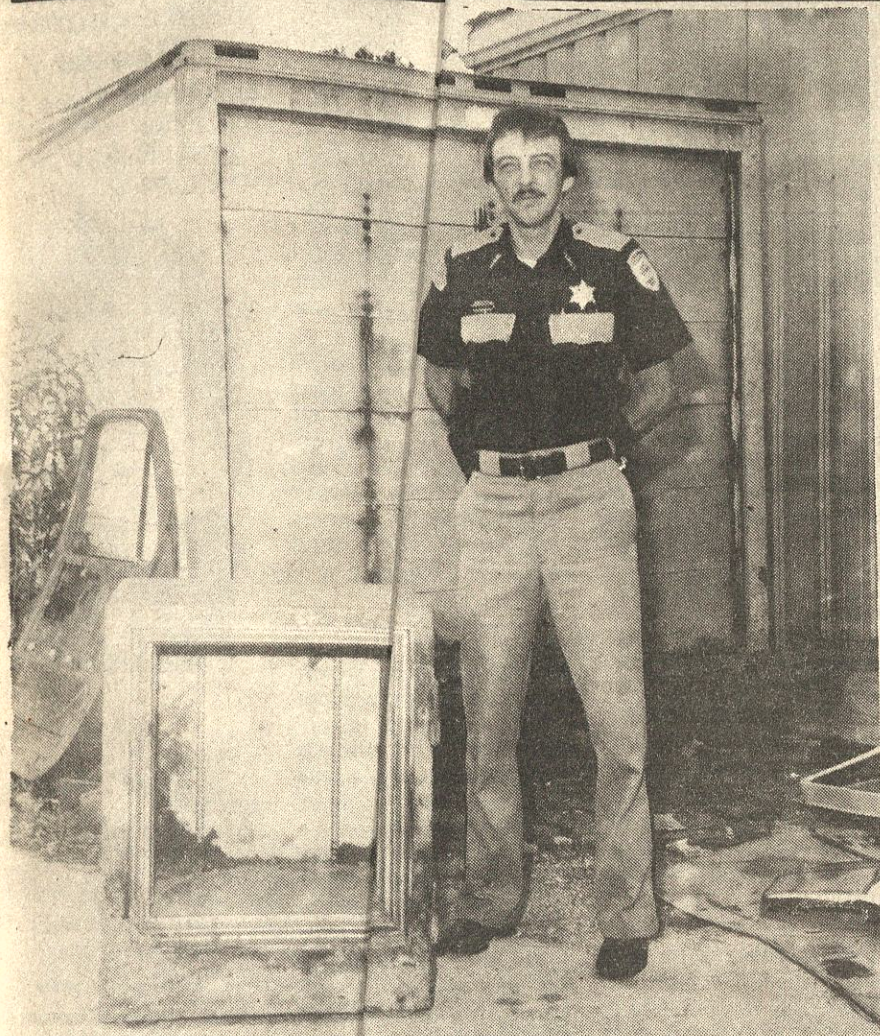

Corps Awards Contract For Yellow Creek

The Nashville District of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers has awarded a contract for channel improvements to be performed at Yellow Creek, which is located along the Tenn-Tom Waterway in both Lauderdale County, Ala. and Tishomingo County, Miss.

The low bid of \$744,501 was submitted by the Small Business Administration of Atlanta, Ga., who will subcontract to N.L. Carson Construction Co., Inc., of Carthage, Miss.

The work will consist of clearing and removing debris, performing excavation work, laying stone protection, and removing a bridge.

The contract was awarded under Section 8A of the Small Business Contract. It will require completion within 210 calendar days after the notice to proceed is given.

County School Bus Driver Training

The first School Bus Driver Training School for the Tishomingo County Schools has been scheduled to begin Tuesday, June 25-26, 1985 at 8:00 a.m. at the Belmont School.

Under the present regulations each regular and substitute driver must hold a valid bus drivers certificate from the Mississippi State Department of Education to be eligible to drive a school bus for the public schools.

Experienced drivers will be required to complete the first day only for a one year renewal certificate.

Each class will be limited to a maximum of 20 drivers.

Each driver must hold a valid driver's license, a renewal receipt, or a permit to enroll in the course.

Anyone wishing to enroll in the course but unable to attend this class may attend one of the other schools to be announced at a later date.

Anyone may take the course but taking the course does not assure one of a bus route.

Any further information needed may be obtained by calling the County Superintendent of Education Office at 423-6061/423-6062.

SOUTH END OF COUNTY HIT BY HEAVY STORMS

Damaging winds and heavy rains swept through the county on Monday, June 17, bringing with it a tornado, which touched down Monday night between Belmont and Golden.

North Mississippi had been under warnings for severe thunderstorms from the National Weather Service in Tupelo Monday, but no apparent tornado warnings had been issued. This left area residents unprepared for the twister, which destroyed two mobile homes and damaged

the Notlem Fabrication Co. building in Belmont and Golden Sales building in Golden. There were no injuries reported as a result of the twister.

Reports made by county law officials indicated that the storm first touched down just outside of the Belmont City Limits, where it torn down a porch at Golden Sales on Hwy. 25.

Two unoccupied mobile homes, located on Highway 366, owned by Vera Bostick, exploded as a result of the

storm. Cindy Hopkins and her small child, who lived in one of the mobile homes, left their home only minutes before it was destroyed.

Wayne Milton, who rented the other mobile home, is the manager of Notlem Fabrication Co., which was also heavily damaged.

Officials in Golden reported that the storm came out of the northeast, traveling

south for approximately two miles, leaving uprooted trees and downed power lines in its path. Much of the area was without electricity throughout the night.

The storm also left several minor damages throughout other areas of the county, mainly due to high winds. Total estimated damages resulting from the twister had not been determined at press-time.

SAFE DISCOVERED IN SHARP BOTTOM

Tishomingo County Deputy Donald Reno (pictured), assisted by William Lambert, recovered an unidentified safe, which had been dumped in a swampy area in Sharp's Bottom Sunday evening, after a call from the Alcorn County authorities tipped them off as to its whereabouts. The safe, which was found about 200

yard off Hwy. 350 at the Old Steel Bridge, in the northern part of the county, appeared to have been torch burned and the door had been removed, according to Deputy Reno. "The only identification marking on the safe was the serial number," said Reno. "We haven't located the owner of the safe yet, but

we do have some leads and it is under investigation." Alcorn County authorities informed the Tishomingo County Sheriff's Office that they had received an anonymous call saying that four boys, traveling in a red pick-up had been seen unloading the safe early Sunday morning. The empty, abandoned safe was found between 5:00 and 5:30 p.m. Sunday evening, and was pulled from the water by a wrecker. The identity of the four boys is also still unknown; however, investigations are continuing.

Garden Weed Control

Weed control in most vegetable gardens is not a difficult task if weeds are never allowed to get a "head start."

Several ways exist to help gardeners keep weeds from becoming a major problem.

CULTIVATION

Cultivation is still one of the most effective methods of home garden weed control. By starting a cultivation program early, weeds can usually be kept under control

It requires a half an hour a week to keep weeds under control in a 30 x 60 foot garden.

When cultivation is done it should be shallow in order to keep vegetable root damage to a minimum.

MULCH

Mulching vegetables reduces problems with weeds if it's done properly. A mulch is any material, either organic or inorganic, that's applied to the soil's

CONSERVATION EDUCATION

is important because of sheer numbers - the many millions of youngsters in school, and because they are young, they are impressionable. It is the early years that habits of thought are developed, and that attitudes are crystallized. Conservation education is important to our total public relations effort because there is an orderly way to reach school children - through formal educational channels. Children who use an outdoor conservation classroom will build a better foundation for future citizenship. Their conservation learning experiences can be meaningful only

surface around plants. Gardeners can place plastic over the soil before planting and slit it where plants or seeds are to be placed. Leaves, grass clippers and straw may be used around the plants after they emerge. Apply a layer 4-6 inches deep. Mulch not only reduces weed problems but conserves moisture. Vegetables usually do better during dry seasons when they've been mulched.

HERBICIDES

Herbicides (chemicals to control weeds) are available, but don't always fit into a home garden weed control program. It is difficult to calibrate sprayers, measure the amount of herbicide needed for a small area, and use the different chemicals needed for weed control with all vegetables.

By the time you get prepared to apply herbicides you could have killed the garden and be out doing something better. **CLEAN-UP AFTER CROP** Another way to control weeds is to keep them from going to seed. This reduces weed problems next season. **REMEMBER** Dairymen, remember the Holly Springs Field Day Friday, June 28th.

Safe Methods For Preserving Peppers

Peppers range in pungency from the sweet bell to the fiery jalapeno or serrano. There are basic ingredients in Mexican cookery and popular in other ethnic foods, adding zest to a number of dishes. Nutritionally, peppers are a good source of vitamin A and C.

When pickling or canning peppers, follow the directions carefully. Peppers preserved improperly at home have caused botulism. Never taste food that appears to be spoiled. If the contents of the jar appear gassy, mushy, moldy or have a disagreeable odor, discard the food carefully.

Boil the jar, lid and contents for 30 minutes in a strong detergent solution. If someone has tasted the questionable food, contact a doctor at once. If possible, save the jar of questionable

casseroles. To sun dry, daytime temperatures should range from 85 to 90 degrees Fahrenheit or higher. If nighttime temperatures drop to the dew point, bring the peppers indoors. Large peppers are better if cut into halves. Remove seeds, stems and membranes. Slice or cut into cubes. Small peppers can be dried whole but should be split with a knife to speed drying. The peppers are dry when brittle.

To air dry, split peppers with a knife. With a large needle run a heavy thread through the stems of the pepper. Hang the strings of peppers in a room where the air circulates freely. High humidity may cause the peppers to spoil before they dry. This method may take as long as three to four weeks before the peppers are thoroughly dried.

To dehydrate, the oven temperature should not exceed 140 degrees Fahrenheit. Preparation is the same as for sun drying.

Store dried peppers in moisture vapor-proof packaging in a cool, dry, dark place. This will allow peppers to retain their color and pungency. Dried chili peppers can be ground in a blender and used as a seasoning. The hot varieties can be ground and used as cayenne pepper or as chili powder. The milder varieties can be ground and used as paprika.

Old-Fashioned Blueberry Sugar Cakes

1 cup sugar
1/2 cup vegetable shortening
1/2 teaspoon salt
3 eggs
2 cups flour
2 tsp. baking powder
1/2 tsp. cinnamon
1 cup milk
1 cup fresh or dry-pack frozen blueberries, rinsed and drained

Mix sugar and shortening until fluffy. Add salt. Stir in eggs. Sift flour and baking powder together and add to mixture. Add cinnamon. Add milk gradually and beat mixture for 60 strokes until dough is smooth and satiny. Dust blueberries slightly with flour and carefully fold into mixture. Spoon batter into well-greased muffin tins, filling 3/4 full. Bake in a preheated oven at 400 degrees until toothpick comes out dry, about 20 to 25 minutes. Yield 12 blueberry sugar cakes.

All Tishomingo County farmers are asked to certify their 1985 planted, diversion, conservation reserve and other program acreages with the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service. "Certification is the procedure by which farmers report their program acreages to insure their eligibility for receiving the benefits of price support, deficiency payments and other farm program benefits," Howard R. Bridges, Chairperson of the Tishomingo County ASC Committee, said. In Tishomingo County, the

without a will? A. The estate of a person who dies in Mississippi without having a will is handled as follows: If there is a spouse and no children, the spouse will inherit the entire estate. However, if there is a spouse and one or more children, then the estate is divided equally among the spouse and the children.

The person making the will has the choice of naming executors to handle his affairs. An executor can be a relative, a trusted friend, a

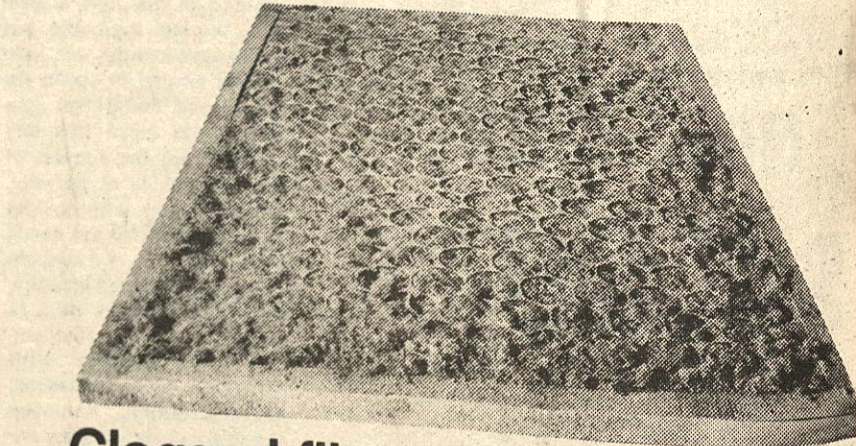

Q. My brother thinks that a will is only for those who want to set up trusts or save on taxes. I've told him the primary reason for making a will is simply to be sure of leaving his property to those he cares about and in the proportions he chooses. What will happen if he dies

final certification date for all crops is July 15, 1985. These acreages should be reported: cotton, corn, grain sorghum, soybeans, peanuts and truck crops. Bridges said that growers not participating in the 1985 programs should report their acreages to insure future benefits and protect acreage bases. After certification, the ASCS county office will select farms at random to verify that acreage reports are accurate and have aerial photographs available for farmers to identify their fields.

"Certification is particularly important to producers of quota crops such as tobacco and peanuts. In addition to these crops, however, all other crop acreages must be reported," Bridges said. Spring seeded crops may be certified at any time between 8:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. at the county office in Iuka, MS. "We encourage farmers to certify as soon as possible after planting and not wait until the deadline date to report their acres," the ASCS official said.

colors down by adding white or gray. When white is added, a bright red becomes a soft pink or a bright green becomes a soft green.

Some people are heavier than others. So are some colors. The darker colors seem heavier and deeper. In decorating, we use 'dark colors' to add weight and depth to our rooms. Dark colors usually look best if used near the floor in furniture or floor coverings. We can make colors darker by adding black.

When you are at school, you are quiet most of the day, but at recess you run and play. Just think how tiresome school would be without recess. Yet imagine how tired you would be if you had recess all day. Bright colors are like recess. We need small amounts of bright, loud colors to pep us up. In decorating these may be found in a bright flower on a printed piece of material, a picture, a sofa pillow, or the

cording of a slip cover. Think of other places you might use bright colors.

Just like people, some colors get along well... others fight. One of the easiest ways to get a good color scheme, a group of colors that get along well together, is to look at a fabric, a picture, or wallpaper. If the colors go well together in this sample, they will probably go well together in your home.

When refurbishing in your home, whether a room or the entire house, there has to be a starting point. Pinpointing this beginning, and proceeding to combine colors harmoniously could be the difference between a beautiful, distinctive color scheme and one that leaves much to be desired.

POINT OF LAW

Q. Can an officer search me or my home at any time?

A. When you are lawfully arrested, the peace officer may search you as well as your immediate surroundings, your handbag and/or

any articles you may be carrying. If the officer feels he may be in danger, he may "pat down" your outer clothing for weapons or other instruments that could cause him injury.

An officer may also search your home if he has a search warrant specifically describing the place to be searched. Before entering the place to be searched, the officer must show the warrant and give notice of his authority and purpose. However, the officer may "break in" and search a place without notice if the property being looked for could be

easily disposed of or destroyed, or if the officer feels the possibility of danger to himself while serving notice. The officer may also "break in" if he is refused admittance or if no one answers the door, and he has reason to believe no one is in the building.

Motorists Urged To Use Caution

A seal project for 4.8 miles on Mississippi Highway 30 between Mississippi Highway 25 and the Natchez Trace Parkway will get underway Friday, June 21, by Mississippi State Highway Department personnel. It was announced by District Highway Department officials.
