STATE DIGNITARIES ATTEND MEETING

The monthly meeting of the Tenn-Tom Tri-State Industrial Support Group was held Tuesday, July 9, in the courtroom of the Tishomingo County Courthouse. The meeting was well attended in an approximate 50 people present, representing dignitaries from the three states composing the group: Alabama, Mississippi and Tennessee; along with TVA officials, representatives of the legislature and county boards of supervisors from Tishomingo, Alcorn and Prentiss.

Topics opened for discussion on Tuesday's agenda included:
1. The availability of some of the present buildings on the Yellow Creek Nuclear site for small industry on a short term lease basis.
2. The possibility of developing a major industrial

complex in our area along the Miss.-Tenn. Line, involving land in both states.

3. The possibility of hiring a full-time industrial recruiter for the Yellow Creek State Inland Port Authority.

4. The possible use of the T.V.A. Trust Fund money on hand.

The organization came into existence about a year ago with the proposed goal being to attract industry to this area and particularly to the abandoned Yellow Creek Nuclear Plant Site and the Yellow Creek Plant area Industrial Park, owned by the State of Mississippi.

WATER MISHAPS DISRUPT WEEKEND

IUKA MAN INJURED IN BOATING CRASH

An Iuka man was the victim of a boating accident during the Fourth of July weekend, which resulted in a severe neck injury, broken rib and back injuries.

David Lee Johnson, 33, of Iuka, was driving his fiberglass bass boat Saturday, July 6, down the waters at J.P. Coleman State Park at excessive speeds when a wave apparently caused the boat to flip, according to Park Ranger Glen Ray Harris.

The boat, which was powered by a Mercury 200 HP outboard motor, was traveling at a speed estimated at 70 mph when it hit a high wave in the rough waters, causing the vessel to overturn, based on reports by park officials. According to reports given by area Game Wardens, Johnson was wearing a helmet and a special protective life preserver, which possibly saved his life. "I think he (Johnson) is very lucky to be alive," stated Game Warden Royce Howle.

"If he had not had the helmet

and other protective gear on I feel that his injuries would have been much more severe."

Reports from family members indicate that after the accident Johnson was taken to the emergency room at Tishomingo County Hospital in Iuka and was transferred directly from there to Baptist Hospital in Memphis, TN, where he is awaiting official word as to the extent of his injuries. It was reported at press-time, however, that along with severe neck injuries, Johnson is also suffering from two crushed vertebrae and a broken rib.

The accident, which occurred at approximately 7:00 p.m., was witnessed by many people who were enjoying lake activities during the weekend. There were no other passengers on board the boat at the time of the accident. People who visit the lake areas are asked to watch for boats of all types traveling in the waters and to stay out of their paths during this very busy summer season.

BELMONT MAN DROWNS IN CREEK

A 35-year-old Tishomingo County man drowned Sunday in Cedar Creek near the Pogo Community in northwest Franklin County. The victim was identified as Charles Edward Humphres, of Route 1, Belmont.

A report made by Franklin County Sheriff Larry Plott indicated Humphres' body was recovered by two Red Bay divers about 11:05 p.m. Sunday, July 7.

According to the report, eyewitnesses said the victim jumped from an old steel bridge off Franklin County Road 23 into the creek. "The subject apparently jumped off the bridge, came up briefly, then went under again," Sheriff Plott said.

Divers, Danny Mitchum and Larry Harrison, both of Red Bay, were called in to assist county deputies and the Red Bay Rescue Squad personnel after the Red Bay Police Department received a call at 8:43 p.m., which reported that a subject was missing in the creek near the Pogo Community in northwest Franklin County. The divers recovered

the unidentified body approximately two hours later in about nine feet of water in Cedar Creek, Plott said.

Others joining the search team besides the divers and rescue squad members were Plott, County Investigator Dale Nix, County Coroner H.P. Atkins and Red Bay Hospital personnel.

Services for Charles Edward Humphres, 35, of Belmont, were Wednesday, July 10, at Deaton Funeral Home Chapel with Rev. Albert Hamilton officiating. Burial was in Belmont City Cemetery.

He was an employee of Jesco, Inc. in Tupelo and a member of the Baptist Church.

Survivors include his wife, Mrs. Joy Humphres, of Belmont; two sons, Charles Martin Humphres and Michael Eugene Humphres, both of Belmont; four sisters, Peggy Mears, of Dallas, Texas, Barbara McBroom, of Dothan, Ala.; Shella Spring, of Memphis, Tenn.; and Nancy Jones, of Victoria; his grandmother, Mrs. Pearl Humphres, of Red Bay, Ala.

**Food Preservation
Home Canning Tomatoes**

Tomatoes contain enough naturally occurring acids to permit canning in a WATER CANNER AT 212 DEGREES F. The term "low acid tomato" has been used in seed catalogs to describe varieties of tomatoes with a sweet, nontart taste. These tomatoes are often white, yellow or pink. Despite their nontart taste, these tomatoes are not low in acid content. The higher sugar content masks the acid flavor. However, as tomatoes ripen from green to slightly underripe to ripe to overripe, the amount of acid decreases.

To be sure tomatoes contain sufficient acid to prevent any risk of botulism food

poisoning, use slightly underripe to firm ripe tomatoes. Soft, overripe and decayed tomatoes should not be used for any home-canned tomato product. The use of soft and overripe tomatoes for home-canned tomato juice can result in a serious risk of botulism food poisoning.

**Preparing Equipments &
Tomatoes For Canning**

When canning tomatoes, get all your equipment ready before preparing the tomatoes. Wash and rinse canning jars, check the rims to be sure they are free from nicks. It is not necessary to sterilize canning jars for they will be sterilized during the heat processing. Wash tomatoes, dip into boiling water for a half a minute, and then plunge into cold water. Cut out the core and loosen the skins.

No, No, No

Raw packing or putting the raw tomatoes directly into the jar is no longer recommended by the USDA until further research can be completed to

**Green Beans With
Tomatoes**

2 cans (16 oz. each) green beans, drained
2 tomatoes, cut into 1-inch wedges
1 teaspoon salt
1/8 teaspoon pepper
2 tablespoons margarine

Combine beans and tomato wedges in ungreased 1 1/2-quart casserole. Sprinkle with salt and pepper and dot with margarine. Cover and bake until hot, about 30 minutes at 325 degrees F. Serves 6 to 8.

**Time Is Short For Crop
Acreage Reports**

"Time is getting short. Farmers who have not filed an acreage report should do so right away because the final reporting date for spring-seeded crops is July 15," Howard R. Bridges, chairperson of the Tishomingo County ASCS Committee said.

He said all farmers need to report, whether or not they participate in the 1985 acreage reduction and land diversion program. By reporting, farmers establish documentation for future crop acreage bases as well as

DISCOURAGE JUMPING UP

Some dogs are by nature very friendly and outgoing. Their owners may also encourage their pets to be sociable. However, the dog should be discouraged from jumping up on people. Although it is only a playful gesture, your guests might not appreciate a hundred pound sheepdog greeting them this way. And surely they won't thank you for the muddy paw marks on their best clothes.

The wisest thing is to discourage this behavior from the beginning. The small dog can be pushed down, nudging him with your foot. The larger one can be knocked off balance with your knee. Be ready when he starts to jump and get that knee up first. Command,

"Down!" as you push him away. It is even more effective if the dog doesn't realize "what hit him" when you knock him off balance. And he'll appreciate your praise the first time he refrains from jumping on you.

In the meantime, until your dog is properly trained, help protect your guests and small children from his enthusiasm. You'll both have a lot more friends.

quarter-peel tomatoes, place them in a sauce pan and bring them to a boil, stirring to keep tomatoes from sticking. Pack the boiling hot tomatoes into hot jars to within one-half inch of the top. Add one-half teaspoon of salt per pint and one teaspoon of salt per quart. Adjust the jar lids. Have hot water in your boiling water bath canner. Place the filled jars into the canner so that the water level is one inch over the top of the jars.

Allow two inches of water at the top of the canner for boiling. If the water boils away, add more boiling water. Begin timing when the water boils and process pint jars for 35 minutes and quart jars for 45 minutes. Remove hot jars

from canner with lifter. Cool jars upright on a clean, dry cloth or wooden boards. Check for seals the next day and store sealed jars in a cool, dry place at about 70 degrees F.

It's important to note that these processing times of 35 minutes for pints and 45 minutes for quarts replace the previously recommended 10 minutes for pints and quarts.

eligibility for different benefits if they participate in farm programs.

For price support loans, deficiency payments and other farm program benefits, producers are required to report crops and acreages planted, the uses to be made of these crops, and cropland acres to be devoted to the acreage conservation reserve (ACR).

"Time is running out for farm program participants because without an acreage report, they are not really participating," Bridges said. As of July 8, 153 farms in the county had reported spring-seeded crops. "We are still looking for about 375 farms to report their crop acres to our office."

To take the guess work out of crop reporting and obtain accurate acreage measurements, Bridges recommends that farm program participants take advantage of measurement service. The service includes measurement of planted crops, ACR, fields or subdivisions, total cropland and areas for other purposes. Fees vary depending on type of service rendered. "The measurements are guaranteed for the program year in which they are taken, and assure farmers that they are in compliance and eligible for full program benefits."

The ASCS official said accurate crop reporting is necessary before the farmer receives 1985 farm program benefits.

**Selecting
Long Distance**

AT&T officials are urging Mississippi telephone customers to make an active choice in selecting a long distance company to avoid being "randomly assigned" to a company that may not meet their needs.

AT&T spokesman Dan Daugherty said the company is launching an all-out public

information campaign to their customers know the consequences of failing to choose a primary distance company.

The Federal Communications Commission recently changed the rules on how the telephone industry should handle customers who do not actively choose a long distance company. Previously, a customer not making a choice was allowed to remain with AT&T. Now, when a customer fails to choose a long distance company during the "selection process" in his area, the customer will be randomly assigned to a company.

"If customers don't make a choice, the FCC has decided that a choice will be made for them," Daugherty said. "This arrangement is a distance roulette. He said that equal access does not necessarily mean equal quality, but that AT&T will offer the same high-quality service it has offered in the past."

"People who live in areas where there are no companies should still have an affirmative vote for AT&T," Daugherty said. "This will ensure that AT&T's high-quality service will be retained."

"We're determined to give customers that AT&T is the right choice for long distance. But more important, customers should take the initiative to make their own decision on their own rather than being randomly assigned to a service they don't want."

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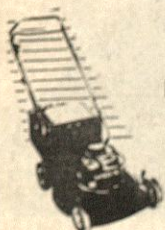
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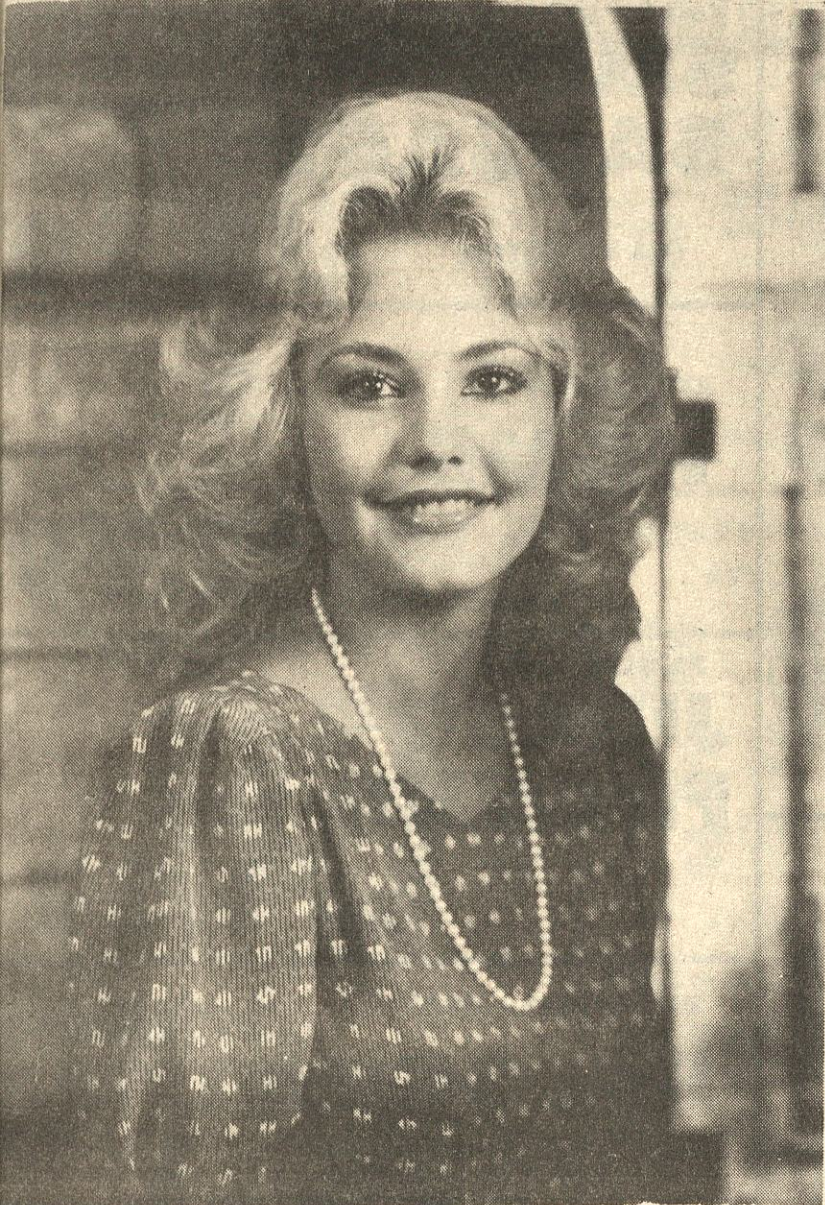

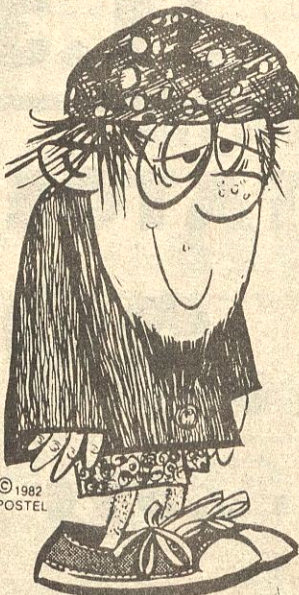

The fireworks display was the most successful one thus far. An attendance of 1200 people behind the restaurant and over 75 boats watched

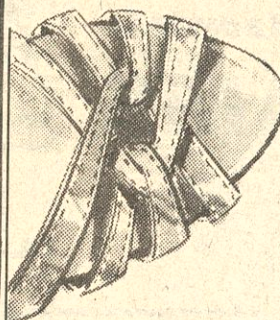

dose of bad news and a dose of good news.

The State Tax Commission reported to the Fiscal Management Board, in closing out their year, that our tax collections are somewhat below estimates. The state budget is not threatened at this time, but we could face possible budget cuts in the next few months if the trend does not change. I will continue to keep you informed about this matter.

Further complicating the state's budget picture are possible federal budget cuts and the pending federal tax reform proposals. We do not know the impact of these Congressional issues on our state but our Washington representative is closely monitoring the situation.

In light of the cloudy state budget picture, let me again promise the people of Mississippi that I will continue the frugal approach to state government that we began upon taking office in January, 1984. During the 1985 Legislative session, I vetoed bills that would have cost the state \$1 million. Those vetoes will be before the Legislature when they convene in January. I hope the vetoes will be sustained, because the state can use the money.

Additionally, we continue to maintain our position of no tax increases at this time for the state, combined with an aggressive economic development program and a hard look at state spending.

Thus far, we have called the public and the Legislature's attention to potential savings through massive government reorganization. This year, that reorganization and close scrutiny of the Medicaid program resulted in a good fiscal year for the agency. We continue to focus on spending and duplication of

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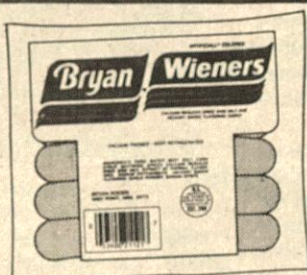

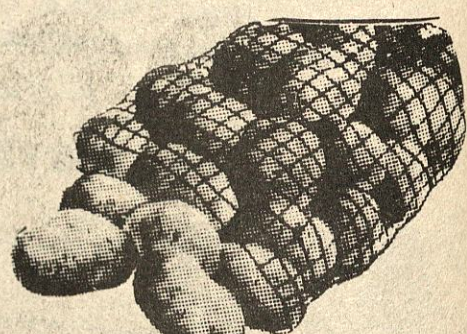

All other species are \$75.00 per one thousand seedling ordered for nursery pick-up and \$83.00 for delivery to the county.

PREHISTORIC NUTRITION

From fossil remains of food remnants, clues about prehistoric conditions, and the diets of primitive hunter gatherers living now, anthropologists have estimated the diet of our earliest ancestors. It is thought the first human beings probably ate a diet of up to 50 percent meat. But what a difference in their meat and our's today!

Domestic animals are at least 25 to 30 percent fat. Free-living, plant-eating animals, on the other hand, average only 3.9 percent fat. The composition of the fat is different too. Wild game contains over five times more polyunsaturated fat per fat-gram than does our livestock. The fat of wild animals contains appreciable amounts of a fatty acid like that found in fish—a fatty acid that helps prevent fat-clogged arteries and sticky blood platelets that promote blood clots.

Early man's plant foods were fresh and unprocessed, with more vitamins and minerals, no refined sugar or flour, a great deal of dietary fiber, and little salt. Prehistoric nutrition may have been similar to what health authorities are now recommending.

REPORT TO MISSISSIPPIANS



The joyous return of 39 American hostages from Beirut recently is cause for celebration for the entire nation; but it does not in any way represent a victory for our country. We must not forget for one minute that there are still seven Americans being held captive somewhere in Lebanon, and we cannot forget the life of our young serviceman which was so brutally taken by the terrorists who highjacked TWA flight 847.

We are all grateful to the President and all others who played a part in bringing about the safe release of the airline passengers. It is extremely difficult for our proud country to deal with such situations in which, to a degree, we all feel like hostages. There is frustration at every turn, and there is very little opportunity to control events. A calm and thoughtful approach is required, and it is essential that we speak with one, united voice. It is our duty in such times to back the President in his efforts as much as possible.

Our most immediate focus now should be on efforts to secure the release of the seven remaining hostages. I will back the President to the limit in those efforts.

We must also determine what can be done to lessen the likelihood for such situations in the future. There certainly is no clear solution, but I believe we can adopt firm policies which will give us a better opportunity to protect our people. Furthermore, we must find a way to let terrorists know that they cannot hope to gain anything from their hostile acts against American citizens. Instead, we must make it clear that we will find a way to respond and hold them accountable.

Countries which harbor terrorists and condone their ac-
tions must be made to know that we will hold them respon-
sible for terrorist acts against our citizens. We must intensify
our efforts to gather information on terrorist groups and
take action in advance which will reduce their chances of
success in terrorism.

We are the strongest nation in the world, and I believe
that with all the resources available to us we can find a bet-
ter, more productive way to combat terrorism. Meanwhile,
we must continue to pray and work for the release of the
seven remaining hostages in Lebanon.

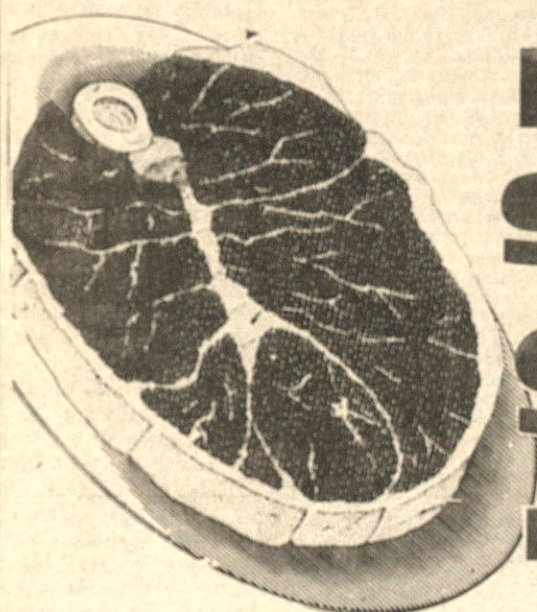
