The boat, which was powered by a Mercury 200 HP outboard motor, was traveling at a speed estimated at 70 mph when it hit a high wave in the rough waters, causing the vessel to overturn, based on reports by park officials. According to reports given by area Game Wardens, Johnson was special protective life preserver, which possibly saved his life. A 35-year-old Tishomingo County man drowned Sunday in Cedar Creek near the Pogo Community in northwest Franklin County. The victim was identified as Charles Edward Humphres, of Route 1, Belmont.

A report made by Franklin County Sheriff Larry Plott indicated Humphres' body was recovered by two Red Bay divers about 11:05 p.m. Sunday, July 7.

According to the report. eyewitnesses said the victim jumped from an old steel bridge off Franklin County Road 23 into the creek. "The subject apparently jumped off the bridge, came up briefly, then went under again," Sheriff Plott said.

Divers, Danny Mitchum and Larry Harrison, both of Red Bay, were called in to assist county deputies and the Red Bay Rescue Squad personnel after the Red Bay Police Department received a call at 8:43 p.m., which reported that a subject was missing in the creek near the Pogo Community in northwest Franklin County. The divers recovered

the unidentified body approximately two hours later in about nine feet of water in Cedar Creek, Plott sald.

#### Chatting With Your Home **Economist**

Food Preservation Home Canning Tomatoes

Tomatoes contain enough naturally occurring acids to permit canning in a WATER CANNER AT 212 DEGREES F. The term "low acid tomato" has been used in seed catalogs to describe varieties of tomatoes with a sweet, nontart taste. These tomatoes are often white, vellow or pink. Despite their nontart taste, these tomatoes tomatoes, dip into boiling are not low in acid content. The higher sugar content masks the acid flavor. Cut out the core and loosen However, as tomatoes ripen the skins. from green to slightly underripe to ripe to overripe, the amount of acid decreases.

To be sure tomatoes contain sufficient acid to prevent

ouver's

poisoning, use slightly underripe to firm ripe tomatoes. Soft, overripe and decayed tomatoes should not be used for any home-canned tomato product. The use of soft and overripe tomatoes for homecanned tomato juice can result in a serious risk of botulism food poisoning.

Preparing Equipments & Tomatoes For Canning

When canning tomatoes, get all your equipment ready before preparing the tomatoes. Wash and rinse canning jars, check the rims to be sure they are free from nicks. It is not necessary to sterilize canning jars for they will be sterilized during the heat processing. Wash water for a half a minute, and then plunge into cold water.

Raw packing or putting the raw tomatoes directly into the jar is no longer recommended by the USDA until further any risk of botulism food research can be completed to



#### ASCS **Farm News**

Time Is Short For Crop **Acreage Reports** 

"Time is getting short. Farmers who have not filed an acreage report should do so right away because the final reporting date for springseeded crops is July 15," Howard R. Bridges, chairperson of the Tishomingo Coun-

ty ASC Committee said. He said all farmers need to report, whether or not they participate in the 1985 acreage reduction and land diversion program. By reporting, farmers establish documentation for future crop acreage bases as well as

for different eligibility benefits if they participate in

farm programs. For price support loans, deficiency payments and other farm program benefits, producers are required to report crops and acreages planted, the uses to be made of these crops, and cropland acres to be devoted to the acreage conservation reserve

"Time is running out for (ACR). farm program participants because without an acreage report, they are not really participating," Bridges said. As of July 8, 153 farms in the county had reported springseeded crops. "We are still looking for about 375 farms to report their crop acres to our office." To take the guess work out

of crop reporting and obtain acreage accurate measurements, Bridges recommends that farm program participants take advantage of measurement service. The service includes measurement of planted crops, ACR, fields or subdivisions, total cropland and areas for other purposes. Fees vary depending on type of service rendered. "The measurements are guaranteed for the program year in which they are taken, and assure farmers that they are in compliance and eligible for full program benefits."

The ASCS official said accurate crop reporting is necessary before the farmer receives 1985 farm program benefits.

NEW RULES

During 1984, only 15 new drugs (as chemical entities) were introduced in the United States. This was the lowest number for any single year since 1980, The U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA)-in response to growing concern from consumers and drug manufacturers-has issued new rules which may hasten the drug

Manufacturers desire to have their products available as quickly as possible in order to begin recouping research costs. Consumers having health problems not responsive to available medicines are in agreement. And we all want new drug products to be thoroughly tested and free of serious adverse effects such as birth

In the past it has taken an average of 19 months for the FDA to approve new chemical entity applications. And no wonder. The typical application averages about 100,000 pages and is not light reading. Regulations published this year may reduce paperwork by as much as 70 percent and take two months off the application process. Other changes in the process involve an improved reporting procedure for adverse

#### Matters of Health

Poison Ivy

A friend and I were exposed to poison ivy recently. My friend developed a painful rash, but I didn't. Why not?

With all the delights of summer - swimming, picnics, vacations - comes a nuisance or two, not the least of which is poison ivy.

This common wild plant, along with its cousins, poison oak and poison sumac, can cause a bothersome skin rash in sensitive individuals. The plants contain a substance called rhus oil in their leaves. stalks and roots, which produces irritation on contact with the skin.

Not all individuals are sensitive to rhus oil, and at least one prior exposure to the oil is necessary to develop sen-

WHAT DOES THE RASH LOOK LIKE?

It usually appears as clusters of small blisters or pimples on reddened skin at sites where the oil has touched the skin. It's usually intensely itchy, so constant scratching occurs. This leads to breaking of blisters, crusting and increased irritation. If not removed, the rhus oil will spread, causing more blistering. However, fluid from the blisters will NOT cause the rash to spread.

HOW SHOULD YOU TREAT POISON IVY?

The usual case of poison ivy is fairly mild and selflimited unless infection occurs or the rash is very widespread. Treatment, therefore, involves avoidance of spreading, relief from it-

If you come in contact with poison ivy, do the following:

The skin should be washed vigorously with soap and water to remove all of the oily substance. The quicker it's washed off, the less it'll be absorbed, and the less severe

Wash all clothing and other outdoor equipment that may have been in contact

-For relief of itching, oral antihistamines are effective. Some are available over the counter (for example, chlorpheniramine), and others by prescription (for example, diphehydramine hydroxyzine). Watch out for sleepiness from the antihistamine.

-Use clean cloth rags soaked in a solution of cool tap water and Burrow's solution (available without a prescription) as a compress to soothe the irritation and ease the itch. Baths and showers likewise should be cool, since heat worsens the itch.

-Cut your fingernails so skin won't be further damaged and infection spread by scratching.

-Tropical Hydrocortisone (available without a prescription in a 0.5% cream) rubbed gently into the rash relieves the inflammation and itch of poison ivy. If the rash is severe, your doctor may prescribe a more potent cortisone-type cream or short course of an oral cortisonetype medication. If home treatment isn't

bringing about improvement within 3 or 5 days, or if signs of infection develop, contact your doctor. -Learn to recognize the

culprit plant so you can avoid future contact, and keep your summertime happy and safe.

#### Carbohydrates Too Important to Eliminate From Diet

The role carbohydrates play in the American diet can be a confusing issue when trying to sort fact from fiction. The key to including carbohydrates in a wellbalanced diet is selecting a wide variety of car-

Carbohydrates exist in foods as starches: sugars, both natural and refined; and fiber, also called bulk or roughage.

The major food sources of starches, sugars and fiber are grain and grain products (such as cereals, breads, flours and pasta), vegetables (fresh as well as dried beans and peas), fruits milk and concentrated sweets such as sugar, syrups, honey, molasses, jams, jellies, candies and soft drinks.

Some of the carbohydrates found in grain products, fruits and vegetables are called complex carbohydrates. These foods contain fiber or starch along with some simple sugars. Besides supplying energy, complex carbohydrates are found in foods that contain valuable amounts of vitamins, minerals and protein. A diet containing many complex carbohydrates is also higher in fiber, making it more bulky and filling than a diet h igh in concentrated sweets.

Carbohydrates necessary in the diet to furnish a continuous energy supply for growth, physical activities and vital functions, such as heart beat and breathing. In addition, important body parts, such as the brain and nerves, prefer to obtain their energy from the simple form of carbohydrate. glucose. Carbohydrates also produce needed material in

If the diet does not contain enough carbohydrate, extra fats and protein have to be used to meet body energy needs. When protein is broken down and used for energy, muscle wasting and decreased growth in children may occur. If enough carbohydrates are eaten daily, valuable protein is spared for its most important job of building and repair.

Fats are normally used for energy along with carbohydrate. However, if the supply of carbohydrate is too low, the body begins to use extra fat for energy. This can create some hazards to health, so carbohydrate-free diets are not recommended.

There is no exact amount of carbohydrate needed daily. However, since carbohydrates are needed as a

dose of bad news and a dose of good news.

The State Tax Commission reported to the Fiscal Management Board, in closing out their year, that our tax collections are somewhat below estimates. The state budget is not threatened at this time, but we could face possible budget cuts in the next few months if the trend does not change. I will continue to keep you informed about this matter.

Further complicating the state's budget picture are possible federal budget cuts and the pending federal tax reform proposals. We do not know the impact of these Congressional issues on our state but our Washington representative is closely monitoring the situation.

In light of the cloudy state budget picture, let me again promise the people of Mississippi that I will continue the frugal approach to state government that we began upon taking office in January, 1984. During the 1985 Legislative session, I vetoed bills that would have cost the state \$1 million. Those vetos will be before the Legislature when they convene in January. I hope the vetoes will be sustained, because the state can use the

Additionally, we continue to maintain our position of no tax increases at this time for the state, combined with an aggressive economic development program and a hard look at state spending.


Thus far, we have called the public and the Legislature's attention to potential savings through massive government reotganization. This year, that reorganization and close scrutiny of the Medicaid program resulted in a good fiscal year for the agency. We continue to focus on spending and duplication of

programs at state universities and at accounting and spending practices at the State Highway Department.

We will continue to speak out on spending practices that we believe could be improved in state government. In addition, I will be making recommendations to the Legislature regarding tax and spending reform, based on findings of our private sector study committee. The soonto-be-named Constitution Commission is also expected to give us recommendations aimed at improving the services and the costs of state government. But all the news is not bad.

We are doing very well in the area of economic development. The state, just this year, has seen new industries committing to come into Mississippi, bringing with them new jobs. These industries, lured by some of the programs approved by the State Legislature, are bringing much-needed private revenues into our state. I have repeatedly told you about the industries locating along the Tenn-Tom Waterway in Northeast Mississippi. But what you may not know is that this development is occurring in every corner of the state. The recent announcement by the Navy of a fleet of ships for Pascagoula and Gulfport will help the Gulf Coast and Southeast Mississippi. A new distribution center in Brookhaven, lured by the Department of Economic Development, will provide jobs in Southwest Mississippi. And the Delta region is encouraged by the announcement that Boeing will

develop a plant in Greenville. We have all said for years that the only way for Mississippi to get ahead is through jobs for our people. We believe we are on the right

REPORT TO MISSISSIPPIANS



The joyous return of 39 American hostages from Beirut recently is cause for celebration for the entire nation; but it does not in any way represent a victory for our country. We must not forget for one minute that there are still seven Americans being held captive somewhere in Lebanon, and we cannot forget the life of our young serviceman which was so brutally taken by the terrorists who highjacked TWA flight 847.

We are all grateful to the President and all others who played a part in bringing about the safe release of the airline passengers. It is extremely difficult for our proud country to deal with such situations in which, to a degree, we all feel like hostages. There is frustration at every turn, and there is very little opportunity to control events. A calm and thoughtful approach is required, and it is essential that we speak with one, united voice. It is our duty in such times to back the President in his efforts as much as possible.

Our most immediate focus now should be on efforts to secure the release of the seven remaining hostages. I will back the President to the limit in those efforts.

We must also determine what can be done to lessen the likelihood for such situations in the future. There certainly is no clear solution, but I believe we can adopt firm policies which will give us a better opportunity to protect our people. Furthermore, we must find a way to let terrorists know that they cannot hope to gain anything from their hostile acts against American citizens. Instead, we must make it clear that we will find a way to respond and hold them accountable.

Countries which harbor terrorists and condone their actions must be made to know that we will hold them responsible for terrorist acts against our citizens. We must intensify our efforts to gather information on terrorist groups and take action in advance which will reduce their chances of success in terrorism.

We are the strongest nation in the world, and I believe that with all the resources available to us we can find a better, more productive way to combat terrorism. Meanwhile, we must continue to pray and work for the release of the seven remaining hostages in Lebanon.
