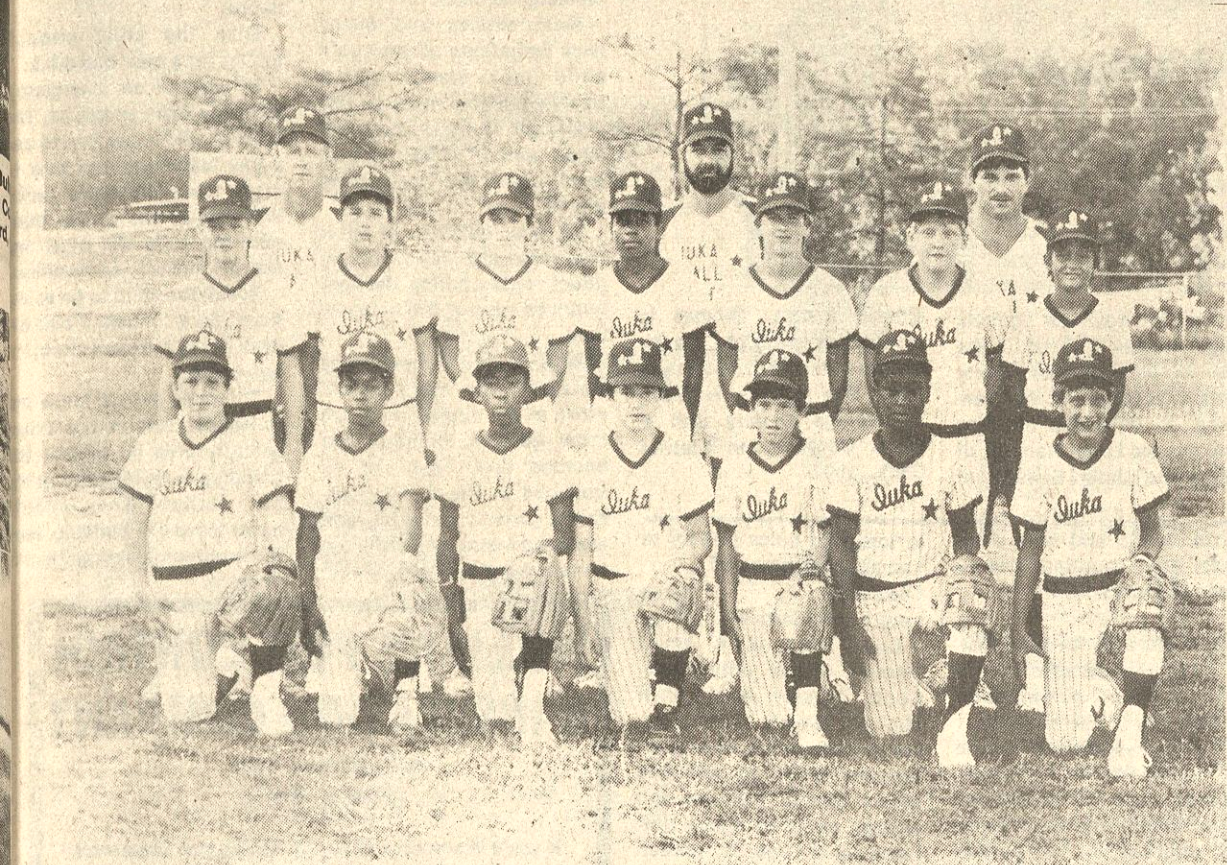

IUKA ALL STARS WIN SUBDISTRICT TOURNAMENT

The Iuka 11 and 12 year old Dixie Youth League team recently captured the title of North Half Subdistrict Champions and will now advance to the District Tournament. Flynt, and Mike Osborn. The 11 and 12 year old Dixie Youth Subdistrict Tournament games were played in Belmont after three rain delays. The first game played was between Smithville and Iuka, which ended with a final score of eight to three in favor of the Iuka team. Iuka scored an impressive five runs in the second inning with two runs being scored in the fourth inning and one run in the fifth. Leading the batting in the game was Ronald Jones, who brought in two doubles and one homerun.

Another homerun was brought in by Bernard Powell. Richy Harrelson pitched five innings, while Jason Nunley and Brian Bullard shared one inning. In the second game of the tourney, Iuka faced the Belmont team. Final runs in the game brought the score to an impressive 10 to 1 for the Iuka All Stars. Iuka scored three runs in the second inning, seven runs in the third inning, one run in the fifth inning, and nine runs in the sixth inning. Richy Harrelson led the batting with a grand slam homerun. Doubles were

brought in by Jason Nunley, Brian Bullard, Bernard Powell and Courice Dillworth. Jason Nunley pitched six consecutive innings for a no hit. He also had 16 strikeouts. The third and final game of the tournament was played between Smithville and Iuka. The final score was Iuka 11 and Smithville 2. Three runs were scored by Iuka in the first inning, one run in the second, two runs in the third and five runs in the fifth inning. Iuka's scoring was led by homeruns hit by Ronald Jones, who made two; Shaune Holiday who hit a triple, and hits made by Jason Nunley, Richy Harrelson, and Brian Bullard finished off the scoring. Pitching the final game was Richy Harrelson, who finished the game with nine strike-outs. The final game won by the Iuka team made them the North Half Subdistrict Champions, which advances them to the District Tournament to be held in Fulton.

LIGHTNING CAUSES DESTRUCTION OF OAKWOOD MANUFACTURING

A bolt of lightning, which struck a fuse panel, was the origin of a fire which totally destroyed the Oakwood Manufacturing building in Belmont Monday around 4:30 p.m., according to plant owner, Jimmy Timms. Fortunately no one was in the building at the time of the accident. All employees reportedly had already left work earlier at the usual 3:30 p.m. hour, he said, prior to the sudden summer thunderstorm.

Timms recalled being in the office area of his business, which is separate, approximately 100 yards distance from the point of the outburst of flames. "I knew something nearby had been hit," Timms said. "First thing I saw when I looked out was the building on fire," he remembered.

"The show wood type (furniture with wood-trimmed

arms, etc.) was kept in this particular area with paint, varnishes and lacquer supplies which are used on the furniture finishing," Timms explained.

Describing it as being a 10,000 square footage, concrete block, metal-roofed structure, Timms said the area which was destroyed housed some very expensive equipment and noted such items as ovens and conveyors used in the final process of finishing furniture. This building was one of three structures; one office building, two buildings for manufacturing, which make up the Oakwood Manufacturing Company located on State Line Road in Belmont.

Timms has been in the furniture construction business in Belmont for nine years. His plants employ 250 workers, he said, and specialize in living room/den furniture. The

company sells primarily to dealers in 40 different states and Canada with Timms also having an interest in the Golden Sales facility, which, too, is located in Belmont on Hwy. 25 South. He said a large portion of his dealers come to the showroom and conduct business transactions here in Tishomingo County, although he does attend markets showcasing his line of furniture products.

Timms hesitated to give an estimated figure as to the loss due to Monday's fire; however, he did state that the building was not insured.

As far as plans to rebuild, Timms appeared very optimistic. "Work started up Tuesday morning, the ground has already been dozed and clean-up efforts are well underway. Hopefully, with weather permitting, we'll have a building up by the end of next week," the

businessman said. "This time it'll be a metal building," he concluded.

Charles Waddle, Belmont's Volunteer Fire Department Chief, said a group of firemen did report to the scene of Monday's fire and remembered it as a time of being too late. "The building was too far gone when we got there, but our efforts to contain the fire to the one area were successful," he said.

HIGHWAY PATROLMAN INJURED IN ACCIDENTAL SHOOTING

A Mississippi Highway patrolman was the victim of an accidental shooting which resulted in serious head injuries.

Kenneth Green, 25, of Belmont, was accidentally shot in the left side of the head Thursday, July 18, while sitting in a new '22 caliber shot, according to reports from a Mississippi Highway patrol spokesman.

Green, who works in the Tishomingo County area, was reportedly at the home of a

fellow patrolman, Rusty Martin, on Hwy. 4 East, in Booneville, testing the firearm when he dropped the pistol while attempting to engage the safety.

The pistol discharged upon impact, sending its bullet into Green's head, lodging in his brain.

Green was immediately taken to Baptist Memorial Hospital in Booneville by Patrolman Martin and was then transferred to North Mississippi Medical Center in

Tupelo where he remains in stable condition, according to reports made by co-worker, Ralph Montgomery, also of the Mississippi Highway Patrol.

A hospital spokesman stated that a CAT scan indicated that the bullet, that is lodged deeply within Green's brain, is located in a very critical area, and therefore it is possible that no surgery will be performed to remove it at this time. The CAT scan also indicated that there was no apparent brain damage.

"Although Green's condition is serious, he is steadily improving," said officials. Green, who has been a member of the Highway Patrol force for approximately one year, is originally from the Benton County area.

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IUKA MAN KILLED IN FIREY CRASH

The body of 24 year old James Edward Michael, of Route 4, Iuka, has been shipped to Bruch Funeral Home, Kenosha, Wisconsin, for burial following his death due to a fiery automobile crash north of Holly Springs, Monday, July 22.

According to Mississippi Highway Patrol reports, Michael was driving an asphalt laden 1976 GMC

truck, registered to Cook Construction Co., of Tupelo, when the fatal accident occurred.

Witnesses to the accident said the driver apparently left the road to avoid rear-ending traffic in front of him, reports indicated. It was said the truck then skidded out of control, hit an embankment, flipped over and caught fire.

A spokesman for the Holly

Springs Fire Department said firemen extinguished the blaze and freed the driver but not in time to save him.

Information concerning the funeral arrangements for young Michael were incomplete at press-time.

He is survived by a young daughter; and his parents, Jim and Judy Michael, also of Route 4, Iuka.

Now a full time evangelist, Dr. Swimmer has served in over 450 revivals across America.

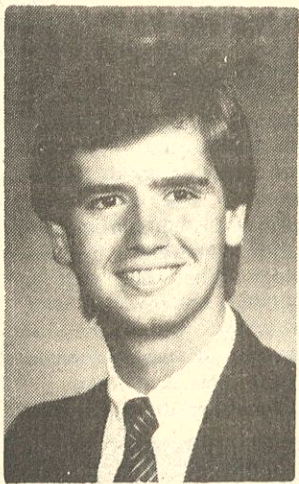

Phifer and Leroy Dean. 3. Streets & Gas Department: Chairman, L.T. Robinson; members, Cecil Phifer, John Castleberry.

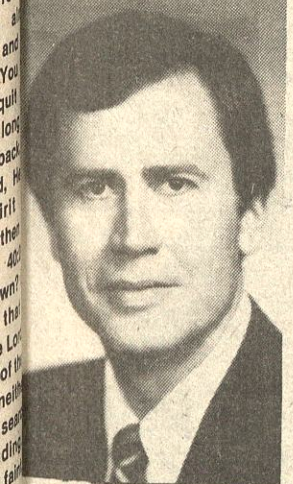
4. Police Department: Chairman, John Castleberry; members, L.T. Robinson, David Yarbrough.

WATCH SORGHUM MIDGE

Sorghum is beginning to head and bloom in some fields and with heading a new group of insect pests may appear. Several worm species, as well as the sorghum midge, may be detected. The first of this group to make its appearance and can be extremely damaging in a short period of time is the sorghum midge. Since this pest is closely associated with blooming of heads of sorghum, it may be good to look at some plant basics. Grain sorghum takes about

55 to 65 days from normal planting date to blooming. It blooms for five to 10 days. There are from 200 to 300 fresh blooms per head each day. The head begins to bloom first in the top and new blooms develop down the head. There are from 500 to 1500 grains in each head in the field. Developing grain is the site where sorghum midge is destructive.

The adult midge is difficult to identify due primarily to its small size. It is a tiny fly, gnathlike in size with a reddish coloration. The female can lay up to 100 eggs a day in the fresh blooms. The life span is short with the female living only one day and the male only a few hours. The female lays the eggs in the sorghum glume and the tiny pink to orange maggot feeds on the inside of the developing seed. Eggs hatch in about two days. The midge completes a life cycle including egg, maggot, pupa stages before becoming adults in 16 to 21 days.

Scouting for the pest takes considerable time and patience. During the bloom period, frequent field checks daily if possible, are advisable. Heads should be selected at random and observed for midge activity. The small fly can be seen as it actively flies around the head. The most effective scouting can be done around midmorning to 12 noon due to the blooming habits of the plant. Windy weather conditions will make the midge more difficult to locate and sample accurately.

Chemical control of this pest is warranted when an average of one adult midge per head is observed after 20 to 30 percent of the heads have begun to bloom. We have insecticide recommendations at our office.

Chatting With Your Home Economist

FOR QUALITY FROZEN VEGETABLES

For quality frozen vegetables get them from the garden into the freezer as quickly as is possible. Fresh, tender vegetables are best for freezing. The fresher the vegetables when frozen, the more satisfactory will be your product.

FIRST STEPS

Begin preparation of most vegetables with washing. Wash thoroughly in cold water. Lift from water as grit settles to bottom of pan.

Sort vegetables by size for heating and packing unless they are to be cut into pieces of uniform size.

Peel, trim, and cut into pieces, as directed for each vegetable.

An important step in preparing vegetables for freezing is heating, or "Blanching". Practically every vegetable, except green pepper, maintains better quality in frozen storage if heated before packing.

The reason for heating vegetables before freezing is that it slows or stops the action of enzymes. Up until the time vegetables are ready to pick, enzymes help them grow and mature. After that they cause loss of flavor and color. If vegetables are not heated enough, the enzymes continue to be active during

frozen storage. Then the vegetables may develop off-flavors, discolor, or toughen so that they may be unappetizing in a few weeks.

Heating also wilts or softens vegetables and makes them easier to pack. Heating time varies with the vegetable and size of pieces.

HEATING IN BOILING WATER

For home freezing, the most satisfactory way to heat almost all vegetables is in boiling water. Use a blancher, which has a blanching basket and cover. Or a wire basket into a large kettle, and add a cover.

For each pound of prepared vegetables use at least 1 gallon of boiling water in the blancher or kettle. Put vegetables in blanching basket or wire basket and lower into boiling water.

Put lid on blancher or kettle and start counting time immediately. Keep heat high for time given in directions for vegetables you are freezing.

HEATING IN STEAM

Heating in steam is recommended for a few vegetables. For pumpkin, sweet potatoes, and winter squash both steaming and boiling are satisfactory methods.

To steam, use a kettle with a tight lid and a rack that holds a steaming basket at least 3 inches above bottom of kettle. Put an inch or two of water in the kettle and bring water to a boil.

Put vegetables in basket in a single layer so that steam reaches all parts quickly.

Cover kettle and keep heat high. Start counting time as soon as the lid is on.

COOLING AND PACKAGING

After vegetables are heated, cool quickly and thoroughly to stop cooking.

To cool vegetables heated in boiling water or steam, plunge basket of vegetables immediately into cold water 60 degrees F. or below. Change water frequently or use cold running water or iced water. If ice is used, you'll need about 1 pound of ice for each pound of vegetables. It will take about as long to cool the food as it does to heat it. When vegetable is cool, remove from water and drain thoroughly.

To cool vegetables heated in the oven, a pressure cooker, or a fry pan, set pan of food in water and change water to speed cooling.

Pack the food into bags or other containers. A stand to hold bags makes filling easier. A funnel helps keep the sealing edges clean.

Leave head space recommended for vegetable. Seal by twisting and folding back top of bag and tying with a string or seal with a paper-covered wire or rubber band. Freeze at once. Store at 0 degrees F. or below. If bags are type that becomes brittle at low temperature, insert bag in carton for protection.

SKILLET OKRA AND RICE

1 cup sliced okra
Fat
1 pound ground beef
Salt and pepper to taste

1/2 teaspoon onion powder or 1 small onion, chopped
1 cup water
1 cup uncooked rice
Cook okra in a small amount of fat until done. Cook ground beef until slightly brown. Add okra, seasonings, onion, and water. Simmer until 30 minutes before serving. Add rice and enough water to steam rice. Cook until rice is tender. Yield: 4-6 servings.

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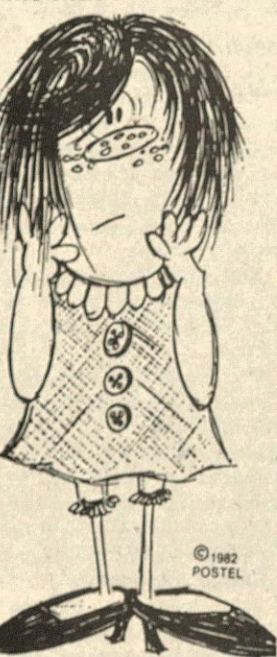
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CARING FOR YOUR PET



THE BREEDING CYCLE

Generally, bitches will come in season for the first time at around eight months of age. It is usually considered wiser, however, to wait until the second season—approximately six months later, before breeding her. It is also advisable to do so the first time before she is three years old.

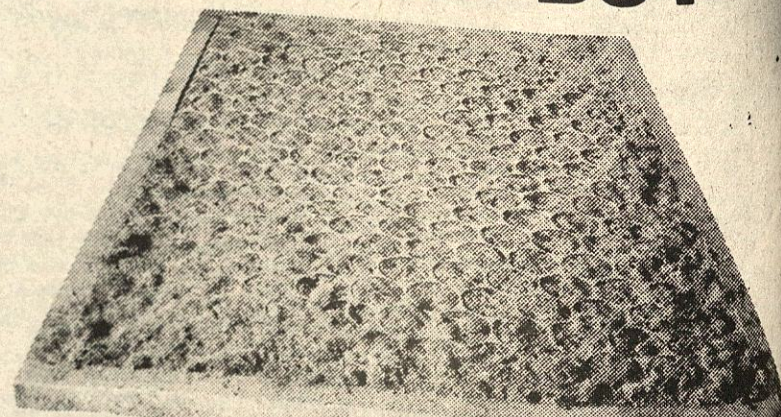
A bitch may be bred again the following season, but this presents some risk to her health. Raising a litter of puppies is a considerable drain on the dam, and time should be allowed for her to replace calcium reserves and for the reproductive system to come back to normal. Generally speaking, skipping a season would be in your

dog's best interest. She should also be bred only when she is in good health, free from any disease, as well as internal and external parasites. This is important for the puppies as well as for the dam. Contagious disease and some parasites can be passed on from her to her litter. Consequently, a thorough physical examination is recommended before breeding.

A special donation was given the association this year by Clarence Joyce in memory of his brother, Carson Joyce. Special donations are used to provide scholar-

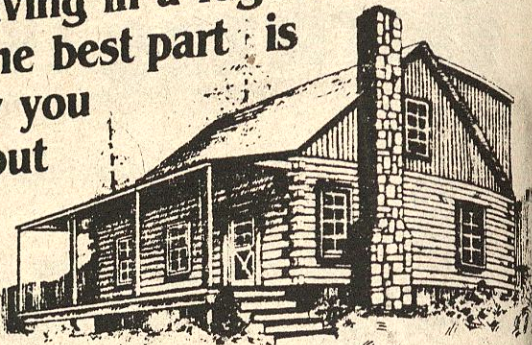

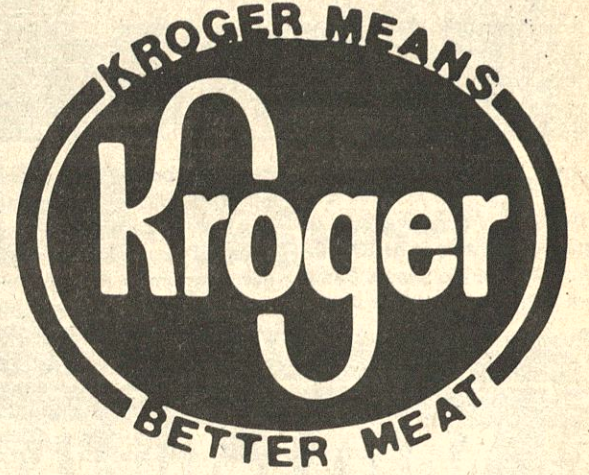

How You Can Become A Mississippi Tree Farmer

By: Brendix Glasgow

Who are tree farmers? Tree farmers are landowners who voluntarily manage their woodlands for maximum production and returns. The words tree farm, when applied to a piece of privately

owned forest land, mean the landowner has been publicly recognized for doing an outstanding job. He is managing his woodlands for the continuing growth of forest crops for commercial purposes.

Trees are a crop. While tree crops do not require intensive cultivation, there are certain practices that must be done to keep their growth rate and quality high. The basic requirements for a tree farm are: 1) The land must have been in continuous ownership for a period of one year. 2) Idle acres are planted to trees. 3) The land is protected from wildfire, insects, disease and overgrazing. 4) The land is managed for continuous crops of useful forest products. When you see a

Tree Farm sign you know the owner of the land is carrying out these forestry practices.

Why are they Tree Farmers? In the first place, tree farmers receive the cash benefits that come from keeping their woodlands in top production. Each tree farmer receives a certificate and displays a sign that announces he is contributing to the present and future well-being of his community and state by growing timber. There are indirect benefits, too. Raw materials from the forest help maintain industry. Forest industries provide jobs and tax revenue which helps maintain state and local government. Every growing tree contributes to a prosperous Mississippi.

Mississippi #1. According

to American Forest Institute, national sponsor, Mississippi, since 1955, has been number one in the number of Tree Farms in the entire United States. Tree farmers comprise an important group, vital to the continued development of this state.

How to become a Tree Farmer. Your woodland may be eligible for certification right now. If you think you qualify as a tree farmer, please contact your local Mississippi Forestry Commission representative. He will inspect your woodlands and report his inspection to the certification committee. If your woodlands are not up to par, the inspector will advise you on the management steps to take to bring your forest up to Tree Farm stan-

dards.

CALCIUM ANTAGONISTS

Only a few years ago, the "calcium channel blockers" were heralded as a scientific breakthrough in the treatment of angina, chest pain resulting from inadequate blood flow to the heart's vessels. Calcium blockers interfere with the movement of calcium within certain cells. The first available agents were *nifedipine*, *verapamil*, and *diltiazem*. It is now believed by many that calcium channel blockers may also be useful in high blood pressure as well as the following conditions:

MIGRAINE HEADACHES: There has never been a universally effective treatment for migraines. The calcium blockers may, however, decrease the frequency of attacks.

RAYNAUD'S DISEASE: Raynaud's disease is characterized by spastic constriction of blood vessels in the extremities. One calcium blocker, *diltiazem*, may reduce the severity and frequency of attacks.

STROKE: Because calcium blockers are vasodilators, it has been suggested that they may be effective in increasing blood flow to the brain, thereby preventing stroke.
