R. E. JOURDAN ELECTED TO BOARD OF DIRECTORS

R.E. (Gene) Jourdan, of Iuka,
has been elected to the Board
of Directors of the Ten-
nessee-Tombigbee Waterway
Development Council (TT-
WDC).

This newly formed national
organization includes
representatives from both the
public and private sectors
who are interested in
fostering opportunities
related to the orderly
development of the Ten-
nessee-Tombigbee Water-
way. The waterway, which is a
major national transportation
artery, opened to navigation
on January 14, 1985—nearly
two years ahead of schedule.
Mr. Jourdan, who is Vice
President of the Iuka Guar-
anty Bank, Iuka, was elected at
the first annual meeting of
the council at the Riverview
Hotel, Mobile, Ala.,
September 4, 1985.
According to Mr. Jourdan,
the TTWDC will serve as a
forum for transportation in-

terests, financiers, manufac-
turers, and governing bodies
to identify and resolve issues
and consider opportunities to
bring about full development
of the Tennessee-Tombigbee
region and expand the
economic potential for the
entire southeast.

The Tennessee-Tombigbee
Council membership
represents 17 states and a
broad spectrum of interest.

Letter To The Editor

Dear Editor:

A number of people have asked me about reasons behind the decision of General Motors to locate the Saturn automobile plant in Spring Hill, Tennessee and not in the Yellow Creek Industrial Park area, saying that they had heard that the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County had turned down the request to locate there. Some comments about "why" have included "not wanting to build a road to the site," "not wanting to have the United Auto Workers Union in the county," "not wanting to tie up all the jobs in one company, etc." The rumor even goes so far as to mention a meeting of the Mayor of Iuka, the Board of Supervisors and myself with the General Motors representative in which the vote was taken to turn down an offer to put the plant near Yellow Creek Port.

I want to say that these stories are just that; stories by someone to start a controversy, with no truth at all in them. The story that appeared in the newspapers (Daily Corinthian and Daily Journal) were based on comments made by Mr. Truitt Stockton of Corinth. He had asked the Board of Supervisors to approve a resolution which recommended turning the Yellow Creek Port and the industrial land there over to his groups' organization, the Tenn-Tom Tri-state Industrial Support Group. Since the Yellow Creek Port Authority is responsible for the Port and the property there, the Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors did not agree with him that he have control of the property. He then said that the Saturn Corporation might have been interested in the location and therefore the Tishomingo Board of Supervisors had turned down the Saturn Corporations offer to locate here. There was not such offer and his intent was to put pressure on the members of the Tishomingo County Board in order to get what he wanted.

The State of Mississippi was not in contention for the site because we did not have the necessary location, transportation system, land requirements, water requirements, gas requirements and access the market for automobiles. The land which we have in the county is too hilly and expensive to develop for a site the size needed for the Saturn plant, and there is no major city in the area with a university or college, nor do we have a major airport in the immediate area. For these very logical reasons, this part of the Mid-South was not of interest to the General Motors site investigators and the stories of the Board of Supervisors turning down the plant are completely false.

There have been two visits to the area by companies which may be suppliers for the Saturn plant and they have shown real interest in the sites at Yellow Creek Industrial Park and the Port. I expect that within the next 6-9 months when the work on the Saturn site begins, that we will see an announcement of a plant or plants by companies which will supply the Saturn Corporation locating in the area near Yellow Creek Port. It would be expected that 200 to 400 jobs would be provided by the companies that have visited and expressed interest in the area. You can be assured that the Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors is interested in industry locating in the county and providing jobs for people who are interested in working. They have worked with the Peninsula Steel Company in every way they could and will continue to look for other opportunities for the county to grow; before believing some rumor or story which comes from the convenience store, coffee shop or service station crowd, you might ask any one of the Board Members or me. I hope that this letter clears this matter up and tells those who might have heard this rumor that it is not true.

TRAGIC ACCIDENT FATAL TO YOUNG COUNTY WOMAN

The life of a young Cairo
Community woman was
taken as the result of a tragic
early morning two car ac-
cident on U.S. 72, about four
miles east of Corinth near
Glen. A second woman was
hospitalized.

Lori Prince Hendrix, 23, of
Route 2, Tishomingo was

pronounced dead on arrival at
Magnolia Hospital according
to a report made by in-
vestigating Mississippi
Highway Patrol Officer, John
Gentry.

Phyllis Stacy, 30, of Rienzi
was admitted to the hospital
suffering from lacerations to
the face and broken ribs, the

officer said.

The accident occurred
about 7:30 a.m., Gentry said,
and indicated it was possibly
weather related due to heavy
rain at that time.

Mrs. Hendrix was traveling
west in a late model Ford
Mustang on U.S. 72 when it
appeared that her vehicle slid
sideways into the eastbound
lane and hit head-on with the
1972 Ford Granada driven by
Mrs. Stacy.

Both women were traveling
alone, the report showed.
Mrs. Hendrix was thrown free
from her car in the accident,
the patrolman noted, saying
Mrs. Stacy was wearing a seat
belt.

Funeral services for Mrs.
Hendrix were held at 2 p.m.
Wednesday, September 25, at
Calvary Missionary Baptist
Church in Burnsville with
Brother Jim Jones and
Brother Terry Booker of-
ficiating. She was a member
of the Baptist Church and a
medical records clerk in the
Corinth Health Department.

Survivors include her
husband, Joe Allen Hendrix
of Tishomingo; one daughter,
Lindsey Hendrix; one son,
John Wesley Hendrix; both of
the home; her parents, Mr.
and Mrs. Harold Prince of
the Cairo Community; one
sister, Vicki Bullard of Iuka;
two grandmothers, Bessie
McGregory of Denham
Springs, LA, and Gladys Prin-
ce of Cairo.

Control Hessian Fly In Wheat

The Hessian fly was detected in Mississippi wheat crops for the first time this year. This insect historically has been a problem among Midwestern wheat growers.

Controlling the Hessian fly is complicated by the fact

that few varieties adapted for growing in the state are resistant to the insect. Also, one cultural practice that slows the insect-deep plowing—can lead to erosion problems. There are no chemicals available to control the insect.

Farmers with infested fields or within a five-mile radius of infested fields should follow these recommendations to help control the Hessian fly in Mississippi: —Rotate crops where possible. Planting wheat on the same fields every year is asking for trouble.

—Deep plow at least three inches to destroy wheat stubble after harvest. This practice is effective in stopping the Hessian fly even

though it may conflict with erosion practices on highly erodible land.

—Destroy volunteer wheat in the summer and fall. The Hessian fly thrives on young volunteer wheat that emerges after spring harvest.

—Plant resistant varieties where adapted. Disease resistance should also be considered when selecting varieties resistant to the Hessian fly.

Fall Garden Cleanup

A few steps taken now can ensure more bountiful garden yields next season. Disposing of plant debris in a fall garden cleanup is an important way to control insects, diseases and weeds next summer.

Since many insects and disease overwinter in plant debris, removing this debris can reduce the spread of insects and diseases next summer.

Cleanups also can increase crop yield and quality. They can reduce the need for insecticides, fungicides and weed killers.

CARING FOR YOUR PET

MISSISSIPPI FLEAS

(CONTINUED)

Flea fighting is a matter of strategy as well as tactics. One bath will not win the war, although adult fleas themselves are relatively easy targets for the dips, shampoo baths, sprays or powders recommended by veterinarians.

The real problem, however, is killing their small, tough eggs. Flea eggs are laid in places the pet is sure to go, such as backyards, carpets, furniture or favorite blankets—not on the pet itself. And in warm, humid climates such as Mississippi, the transformation from egg to larva to cocoon to leaping, biting flea only takes about 10 days.

The trick to winning the flea fight is to break the pest's life cycle: It is vital to treat the environment as well as the animal.

*Rely on veterinarians for professional treatment.

*Thoroughly vacuum every area the pet goes and throw the bag away immediately.

*Use a household disinfectant on washable

surfaces.

*Dust or spray cracks and crevices with a veterinarian-approved insecticide; spray or dust the yard.

*Repeat the procedures several times every 10 to 20 days to break the flea life cycle.

*Don't rely on flea collars to repel fleas. Fleas spend only about 20% of their time on the dog or cat-long enough for a meal.

*Don't mix over-the-counter flea prevention sprays or powders as a do-it-yourself cure. Certain combinations can be extremely hazardous to pets.

If all of this activity seems like overkill for such a small bug, consider this: one pair of fleas unhindered can produce as many as 222 trillion descendants in their 9 month lifetimes.

THE FABRICS

Grazing Period Opens
October 1, 1985

Tishomingo County farmers participating in the 1985 farm programs soon will be authorized to graze their acreage conservation reserve (ACR) land. The official grazing period opens October 1, 1985, according to Howard R. Bridges, chairperson of the Tishomingo County ASC Committee.

"The land must not be overgrazed," Bridges said,

"and sufficient cover must be maintained to prevent wind and water erosion."

ACR is cropland removed from production under the 1985 acreage reduction and land diversion programs. Harvesting is prohibited on the land, and grazing is permitted only during the principal nongrowing months as set by the County ASC Committee.

Bridges said the installation and maintenance of protective cover and conservation practices on the land taken out of production is required to guard against soil erosion. Program participants are required to plant certain grasses, legumes, small grains or other cover on the land, or to maintain various conservation practices as well as carrying out control measures for weeds, rodents, and insects.

The program enrollment report shows that about 10 percent, or 875 acres of

Tishomingo County cropland was diverted from production to the ACR under the programs.

To maintain program benefits, Bridges said, farmers must protect acreage conservation land in accordance with program requirements. Those who do so will be out of compliance and could face payments and other program benefits, according to Bridges.

County Committee Representatives are charged with farms to see that acreage is properly maintained.

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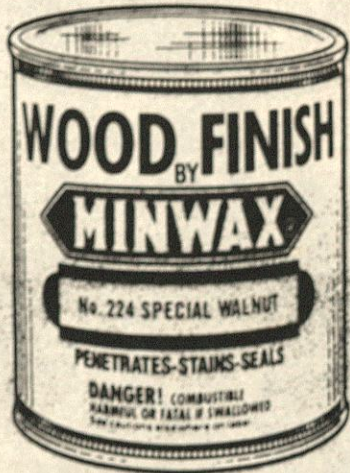
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Clinton Methodist Church Scene Of Wedding Vows

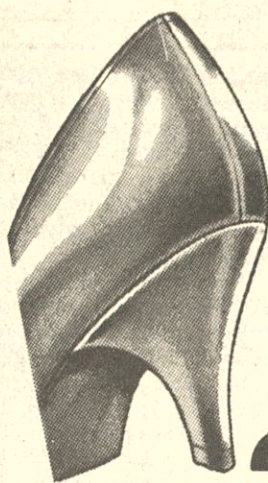

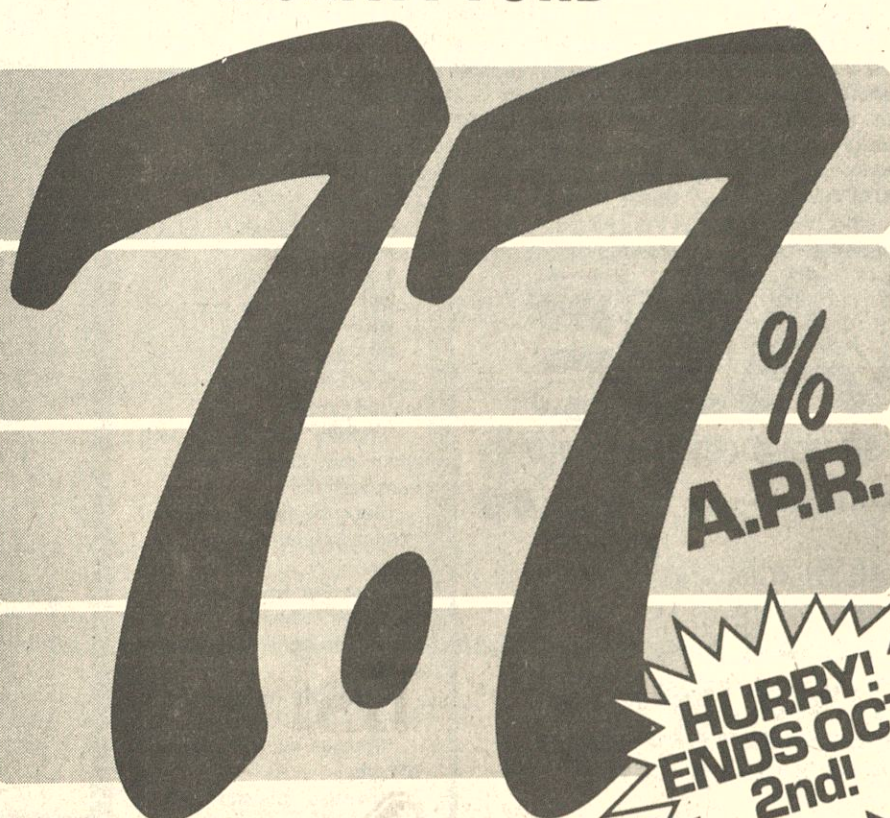

possible for us to accurately list the names. Possibly through publishing the photo, some of our readers will be able to reminiscence along with the Cornelius family.

Graduating Classes Of 1932-1939 Hold Reunion

The graduating class of 1935 of Burnsville High School met on May 10, 1985, at the Burnsville School Cafeteria for their 50th Class Reunion. The classes of 1932 through 1939 were also invited.

The class of 1932 was the first to ever graduate there and eleven graduated in that class—seven girls and four boys. Minor Rubel Nixon and Jeffie Kennedy Gray are both deceased. Seven attended the reunion, two were unable to be there. Around 130 attended and they came from far and near. Jewel Seago Shultz and Ollie Mae Gray (?) came the farthest, LaGuna Beach, California.

There were fond embraces and cameras clicked constantly. Some had not seen each other for 50 years or more. After a delicious meal, prepared by the lunch room staff, the crowd assembled and the County Superintendent of Education, Mr. Alvia Blakney acted as Master of Ceremonies. He brought us up to date on the progress of Burnsville and Tishomingo County.

Some of the teachers of the 1930's attended and Mrs. Howard (Celeste Montgomery) McLeskey gave a talk on her days of teaching there. Several gave short

talks: Dr. Robert Ford, Otha Garrett Johnson, Loyce Marlar Smith, Mozell Smith Carter, Thurman Hall, Perry White, Floyd Marlar, Ollie May Gray (?), Eleanor Richardson, Ruby Gober Densmore, and Louise Ford Pierce.

Mrs. Blanch Smith Counce was a trustee at the school during the 1930's and was introduced by her niece, Ruby Gober Densmore. Miss Blanch as she is lovingly known is 89 years young, still very active and has such a good time seeing everyone. Ruby also gave a short sketch on the teachers of that time. She recalled Prof. Jim Cumming, and praised him for his guidance, his love and devotion to education and the school. She also remembered Margaret Edmondson Bishop, Elsie Misenholder, Ruth Harrison and Flint Robinson.

It was noted that many different careers came out of the 1930 graduates—doctors, teachers, a county school supt. of education, from the 1932 class Cleston Scruggs; management, farmers, several served in the armed forces, bankers, beauticians, Sheriff of Tishomingo County, James Bishop; a highway patrolman, and one of life's most meaningful careers, homemakers.

We paid tribute to Audie Marlar, who gave so much of himself to his church, his school and community. Audie passed away in 1984. We wish to give thanks to Elaine Timbes, Mattie Faye Woodruff, Louise Ford Pierce, Floyd and

Gladys Marlar for their hours of work that it took to put it all together and to the entire class of 1935 for having all of us there and making it all enjoyable and to the principal of the school now for his warm welcome.

It was agreed that the classes of the 1930's would meet again in 1990.

The agenda consisted of Initial Assessment of the Multiply Injured Patient, Nursing History, speaker, Mrs. Janie Langurand, M.N., Assistant Professor of Nursing; Airway and Chest Injuries, Abdominal Trauma, and Neurologic Trauma, speaker, Sherry Singley, R.N., B.S.N., CCRN, Emergency Room, University Hospital; Orthopedic Trauma, Legal Aspects of Care, speaker, Jane D. Callahan, M.N., Assistant Professor of Nursing; Family Needs, Dr. Margot Hover, D. Min., Associate Director of Pastoral Services, University Hospital.

Upon completion of this course, the participants were able to:

- *Outline the initial physical assessment of the multiply injured patient;
 - *Identify the information which may be obtained from nursing history;
 - *Describe the assessment used to determine specific injuries;
 - *Plan the immediate nursing care in treating frequently occurring, traumatic injuries;
 - *Establish the priorities of nursing care;
 - *Discuss the legal aspects of care;
 - *Discuss the immediate needs of the patient's family.

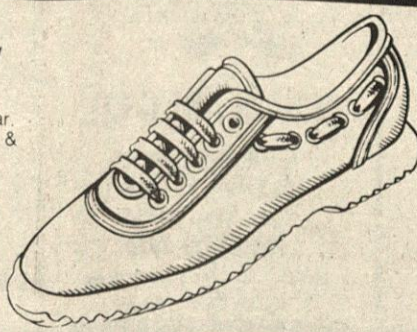

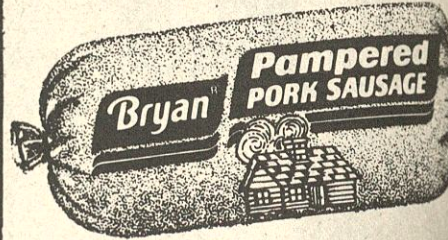



Timberline

Good forest management begins with the soil. Why? Because to a large extent the growth of trees is regulated by the soil. Some landowners believe that all soils are about the same when it comes to growing trees, but that's not true. The truth is that soils vary a great deal in their ability to grow trees.

The productivity of a particular site is measured by what's commonly called "site index". It's the average height in feet that dominant and codominant trees of a certain species will reach at a specified age. The higher the index the better the site for growing trees. If the site index of a site is known, potential yields can be determined from yield tables. This information can be used in economic analyses.

Sometimes it's impossible to get site index measurement because the trees may be too young or too old to make that determination, or there may not be any trees growing on the site. In such cases, site index can be obtained from information collected by the Soil Conservation Service (SCS).

Soil-site information is included in soil survey reports. Soils not only determine the productivity of a forest site, they also affect forest management. Soil surveys contain information that helps owners of forest land to accomplish the following:

- Interpret information on soil productivity.
- Determine erosion hazards.
- Determine equipment limitations.
- Determine planting needs.
- Plan harvesting methods.
- Locate access roads.
- Select the best methods

of preparing sites for reforestation.

--Determine the potential of soils for wildlife habitat.

Where can forest landowners obtain modern, published soil surveys? Soil surveys are available for landowners in Tishomingo County from your Soil Conservation Service.

Base your forest management program on solid ground-use soil surveys.

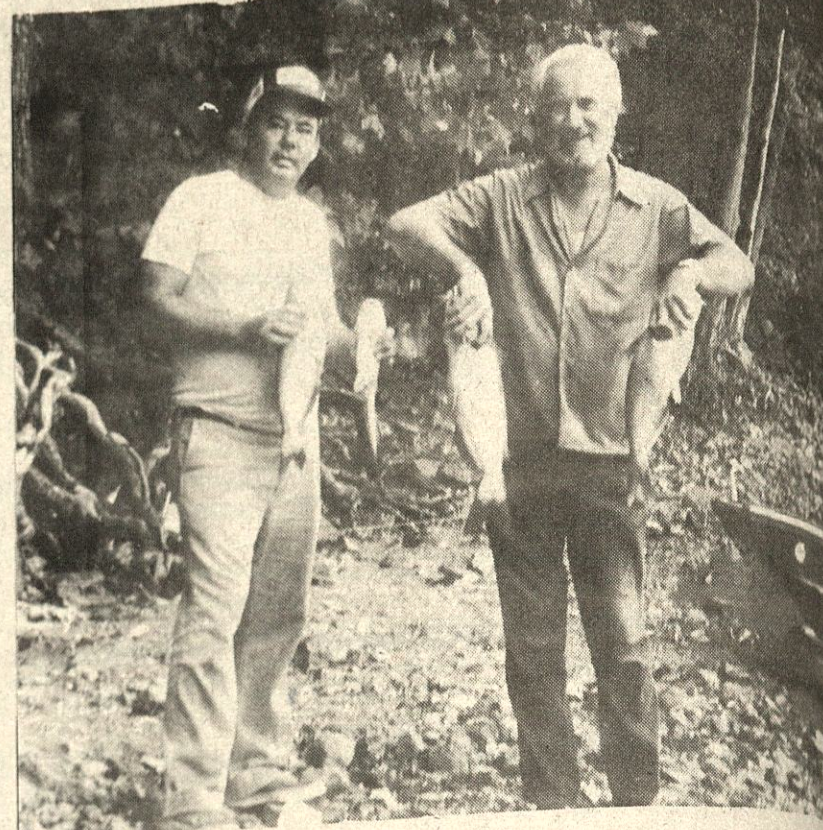

getting cramps--then drowned. None of these people were wearing personal flotation devices (PFD's). If they had, these tragic deaths could have been prevented.

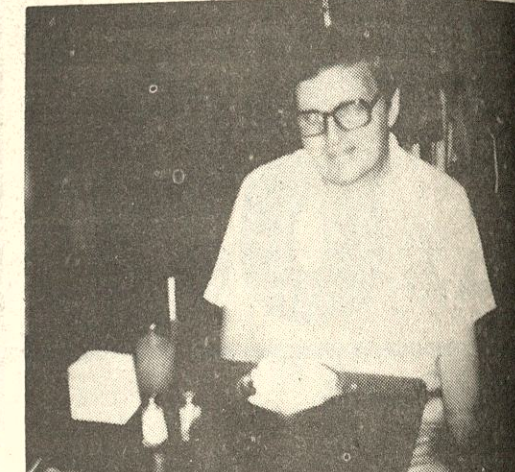
Another main problem which has already caused one unnecessary death and which has contributed to others in the past is that people get out too far in the water on floats. Before they realize it, they are in the main channel. Many of these people can't swim, and, once they see how far the current has carried them, they panic because the water is over their heads. Even good swimmers can become exhausted and drown if they panic. Once again, wearing PFD's can help save lives.

Such drownings can be prevented if people just THINK before they get in the water. Here are some water safety tips for swimmers.

1. Never swim or scuba dive alone--make certain someone is watching you.
2. Know your swimming ability. Nonswimmers should stay in known shallow water.
3. Swim only in supervised areas. Never engage in horseplay in or around water.
4. Always have adult supervision for small children.
5. Enroll in water safety classes.
6. Don't mix alcohol and swimming--drinking often leads to overconfidence and bad judgment. Alcohol also slows down reaction time and speeds up the loss of body heat, making the body more susceptible to the effects of cold water.
7. Don't hit the panic button if there is trouble in the water. Call for help--save all strength. If caught in a strong current, don't fight it--go with it. Float, tread water or change styles of swimming until rescued. Take off clothes and shoes in the water--they'll make it hard or impossible to swim or float.
8. Always wear a personal flotation device, even if you are in shallow water--you could fall in a hole.

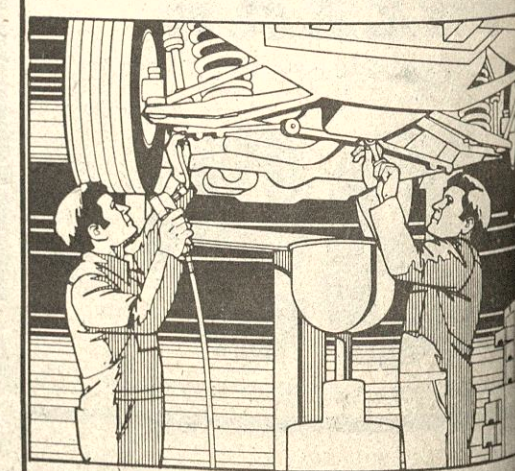

Sunscreen or Shadecloth is a specially-made, tightly woven material that not only blocks sunlight, but also keeps insects out and lets breezes in. It can be mounted in wood or metal frames which are easily removable for the winter when solar heating is desired. The frames may be placed inside or outside the window. Existing window frames may be used. Sunscreen is also

available in many widths and colors. The cost on the average house window ranges anywhere from eight dollars to fifteen dollars, depending on window size and materials used. Tennessee Valley Authority officials estimate that the money saved on one year's electric bill will more than pay for the sunscreen. For more information on Sunscreen and other shading devices, call your electric company or the TVA Citizen Action Line at 1-800-251-9242. Conservation Notes

Do you know what cool temperatures mean to a cattleman? Yes, it means winter is approaching and it causes the cattleman to automatically start thinking about planting cool season forages for their grazing and feed program. September-November 15, is the best time to plant forages such as fescue, clovers, ryegrass, wheat, oats, and alfalfa.

It is vitally important that a cattleman keep a balanced grazing program throughout the year for his livestock. It works real well if a cattleman can designate approximately 1/2 of his pastureland to summer grasses such as bermuda, bahiagrass, and kobe lespedeza and the other 1/2 of the pastureland to winter grasses both permanent and temporary grazing.

September 1-October 31, is the ideal time to plant cool season grasses. Fescue mixed with clover is the most suitable cool season grass you can plant for a permanent sod. Fescue should be planted at the rate of 20-25 pounds of tall fescue seed per acre at a depth of 1/2-1 inch. Then overseed 3 pounds of white clover seed or 8 pounds of red clover seed per acre. An application of 400 pounds of 13-13-13 fertilizer along with 1 ton of lime per acre should be incorporated into the soil prior to planting. When planting fescue, be sure to use

fungus-free fescue seed.

Planting temporary winter grazing is another way to extend the grazing season for the cowman. Small grains such as ryegrass, wheat, and oats are the best suited forages in a temporary winter grazing program. The planting dates for these forages is September 1-November 15. There are two ways to plant these forages for winter grazing. 1-The most common method used is to prepare a seedbed and broadcast the seed. 2-Another method that many cattlemen have turned to today is using a sod seeder to plant these forages into an undisturbed soil. It is ideal to sod-seed winter grazing on sloping cropland or into bermudagrass sod. Sod-seeding

can reduce soil erosion and save time when planting winter grazing.

More and more cattlemen are talking about planting alfalfa this fall. Several farmers in the county have had some success this past year in growing alfalfa. Alfalfa is a high quality forage that requires a highly fertile well-drained soil in order to produce maximum yields. A soil pH of 6.5-7.0 should be maintained on a soil where alfalfa is to be grown. The planting date is from September 1-October 15. Without a soil test apply 500 pounds of 0-24-24 along with 2 tons of lime per acre at planting time. In February or March of the first year, and each fall after establishment, apply an additional 500 pounds of 0-15-30 or its equivalent per acre. Plant 15 pounds of seed per acre to a depth of 1/2 inch.

September is the best month to apply a mixed fertilizer to established fescue pastures. Fescue pastures should be fertilized now at the rate of 200-300 pounds of 13-13-13 fertilizer per acre.

Make sure your grazing program is sufficient for your cattle operation. For more information on establishing winter forages, contact the Soil Conservation Service office today, our telephone number is 423-6272.
