COUNTY UNEMPLOYMENT RATE DECLINES TO 17.8%

After a rise in unemployment in Tishomingo County in July, the number of unemployed declined at mid-August. Charles Smith, Manager of the Mississippi State Employment Service, stated that the 17.8 percent unemployment rate represented a drop of three-tenths of a percent from last month and a 0.5 percent below the estimate for August, one year ago. The civilian labor force declined at mid-month to 8,600, 240 below the July estimate and 30 below the estimate for August, 1984. The number of Tishomingo County residents employed was estimated to be 7,780, 1,000 in August, 1984. Manufacturing employment, estimated to be 2,700, rose 20 individuals from the previous month and 100 from one year ago. Individuals employed in nonmanufacturing declined at mid-month to 5,080, 130 below the July

estimate and 170 below the August, 1984, estimate. Smith also stated that the civilian labor force for the six-county area of Alcorn, Benton, Marshall, Prentiss, Tippah, and Tishomingo stood at 63,510. This represents a decrease of approximately 290 individuals from the estimate of July of this year and an increase of 2,340 over the estimate for August, one year ago. Area residents unemployed dropped 1,090 individuals from last month but climbed 1,210 over the figure for August, 1984. The rate of unemployment was estimated to be 15.2 percent for the area, compared to 16.8 percent in July and 13.8 percent in August, 1984. The number employed stood at 53,850, 800 above the previous estimate and 1,130 above the figure for August, one year ago. Manufacturing employment in the six-county area at mid-August experienced a slight rising trend.

SENTENCES GIVEN IN CIRCUIT COURT ACTION

The following sentences have been handed down by the Tishomingo County Circuit Court following the September term; *Doyle Comer-sale of marijuana-sentenced to 3 years with 3 years suspended; 5 years probation with 1 1/2 years supervised probation. Fined \$700 and ordered to pay cost of court. *Perry Mullins- entered a guilty plea (charged with grand larceny) 4 year sentence, 4 years suspended. Five years probation with three years supervised probation. Fined \$500 and cost of court. *Jessie Ledbetter and Kelly Lambert-simple assault-sentenced to serve 6 months in county jail and fined \$500 each and court cost. *James Luster and Milton Christian-sentenced in connection with the 1984 burglary and larceny at the residence of Robert F. Grisham. Luster was sentenced to five years in prison to run consecutively to a previous sentence. Christian was sentenced to three years in prison. *Ollie Collier-sale of marijuana-sentenced to three years, three years suspended. Fined \$500, cost of court and ordered to pay \$32 restitution. *William Brannum-possession of more than an ounce of marijuana-sentenced to three years with three years suspended and three years supervised probation. Fined \$500 and ordered to pay \$35 restitution. *Ricky Brown-1982 armed robbery of Roy Bolton. Sentenced to ten years in prison with five years suspended. Brown was ordered to pay \$4,100 in restitution to Bolton. *Larry Harris originally charged with murder in the 1981 shooting death of his uncle Robert Clyde Harris, entered a guilty plea to manslaughter and was sentenced to sixteen years in the state penitentiary, with eight years suspended.

Other court action included: *Jessie Ledbetter-burglary and larceny-retired to files. *Charles Ledbetter-burglary (two counts)-entered guilty plea, sentencing at later date. checks (two counts). *Melanie Hodge-burglary and grand larceny.

SPEECH THERAPY NOW IN COUNTY SCHOOL SYSTEM

Tishomingo County School System is pleased to offer the services of a speech therapist for its 1985-86 school year. Miss Kena Burgess is the district's speech therapist, she was born in Banbury, England. Her father was in the Air Force so they had the opportunity to live in various countries. In 1979, Miss Burgess graduated from Ocean Springs High School in Ocean Springs, MS. She later attended Jackson County Junior College in Gautier, MS and then continued her education at the University of South Alabama in Mobile, Alabama. She plans to continue her studies at the University of Mississippi and obtain a Masters Degree in Communication Disorders. Communication through speech is so fundamental for most people they seldom think about it. But for people with speech problems, talking can be a dreaded task. Here is how one little girl explained her feelings: I can't tell you how awful I feel. If I talk, I do wrong. It is that simple. I keep thinking I must be awful bad to have to talk like this. People keep saying, "What? What's that?" I bet I've heard that about fifty thousand times. The improvement of speech has long been an important goal of education. Defective speech interferes with communication; it causes the speaker to be uncomfortable and draws unfavorable attention. Speech problems can be of many types such as stuttering, articulation defects, voice disorders, and language delays. The Tishomingo County School System provides speech therapy for students with speech problems. The speech

therapist determines the type of speech problems the child exhibits and writes an individual educational plan to remediate the problem. For example, Cindy is a third grader with an articulation problem. The speech therapist has determined that Cindy is substituting the w sound for r; she says wabbit (rabbit), cawwot (carrot) and so on. The speech therapist plans to work on the r sound. Johnny is a ninth grader who stutters. The speech therapist has recorded the number of times he stutters within a certain length of time and plans to help him reduce the frequency of stuttering. Students receive speech therapy for twenty to thirty minutes a day and as often during the week as needed. If the student has no other handicapping condition, then he continues to participate in the regular classroom subjects. For further information about the speech therapy program in Tishomingo County Schools, contact Miss Betty Barnes at 423-6061. The Tishomingo County School System has made a commitment to serve all speech impaired students as well as all handicapped students between the ages of three and twenty-one. EUROPEAN HORNETS IN THE COUNTY

We have received numerous calls lately pertaining to the European hornet. Regular wasp and hornet sprays will work on these hornets, however, proper contact seems to be a problem.

I found the following information in the Agriculture Handbook 552, U.S. Department of Agriculture and hope it will be of interest to you.

The European hornet was introduced into the New York area between 1840 and 1860. On the basis of isolated reports the hornet occurs along the eastern seaboard from New England south into

northern Georgia and Alabama, and westward to the Mississippi River from Tennessee north into the Ohio Valley. Scattered northern populations probably exist from the Dakotas to southern Ontario and Quebec, and the wasp has been reported as far south as New Orleans.

Few biological studies have been made of this species. In Europe, the hornet builds its nests in hollow trees. Nests are also found in thatched roofs, barns, attics, hollow walls of houses, and abandoned beehives. Similar nest sites are used in North America and Duncan even reported some subterranean nests.

Mildew In Your Home

GET RID OF DAMPNESS

The best way to get rid of dampness is to dry the air. Cool air holds less moisture than warm air. Properly installed air conditioning systems remove moisture from the air by taking up warm air, cooling it (which removes the moisture), and circulating the cool, dry air back into the room.

Another way to get rid of dampness is by heating the house for a short period of time, then open the doors and windows to let out the moisture-laden air. An exhaust fan may be used to force it out.

Air in closets and other small areas can be dried by using an electric light continuously (60- to 100-watt bulb). The heat will prevent mildew if the space is not too large.

PRECAUTION: Be sure to place the light bulb far enough from clothing and other flammables to avoid the danger of fire.

REMOVE MILDEW

Clean household articles which have mold and mildew growth out-of-doors to prevent scattering of the mold spores in the home. Af-

ter brushing the mold and mildew off the household article, dry the article thoroughly. Sponge any remaining mildew with thick suds, then wipe with a clean, barely damp cloth.

Sponge rugs or carpets with thick suds or rug shampoo, then remove suds with damp cloth and dry in the sun if possible.

For mildewed wood surfaces, try a solution of four to six tablespoons washing soda to a gallon of water. Scrub well and then rinse with clear water. If this doesn't remove the mildew, use one of the following remedies: (a) Four to six tablespoons tri-sodium phosphate cleanser and two tablespoons household ammonia per gallon of water, or (b) four to six tablespoons tri-sodium phosphate cleanser and one cup liquid chlorine bleach per gallon of water, or (c) commercial mildew remover. Rinse and dry thoroughly before repainting any of the surfaces.

For mildewed siding and other surfaces, try the following:

2/3 cup of trisodium cleanser (a strong alkaline cleanser)
1/2 cup heavy duty detergent
1/4 cup chlorine bleach
3 quarts warm water

Use the solution without diluting to remove mildew and dirt. Best results are obtained by scrubbing with a medium soft brush. When the surface is clean, rinse thoroughly with fresh water.

PRECAUTION: Wear protective clothing when working with mixture.

Curried Sloppy Joes

1 1/2 pounds ground beef
1 1/2 teaspoons salt
1/2 teaspoon curry powder
1 medium tomato, finely chopped
1 small cucumber, grated
1 small onion, finely chopped
1/2 cup catsup
1/2 cup sweet pickle relish
8 hamburger buns.
Lightly brown ground beef in large frying-pan on grill at moderate temperature; pour off drippings. Sprinkle salt and curry powder over meat. Add tomato, cucumber, onion, catsup and relish and stir to combine. Cook, covered, 15 minutes. Serve on hamburger buns. 8 Servings.

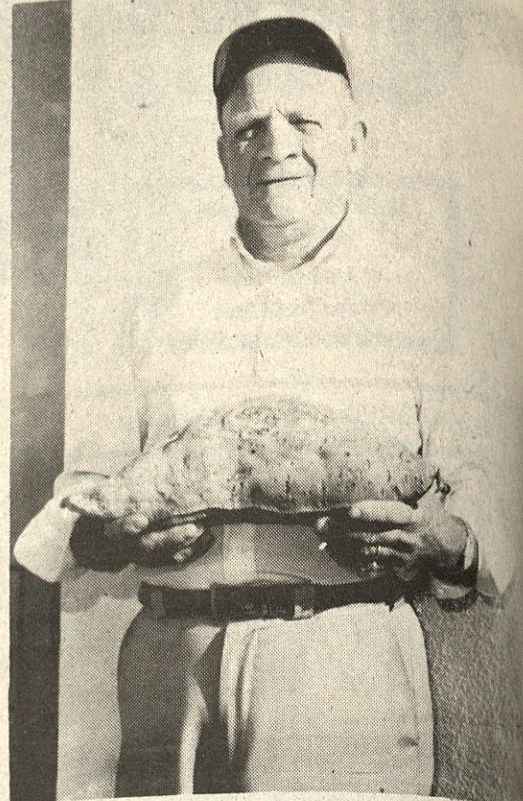

A list of the names of all known eligible persons to receive ballots in the upcoming annual ASC committee election soon will be available in the county ASCS office, reports Howard R. Bridges, chairperson of the Tishomingo County ASC Committee. Farmers will begin nominating candidates for the ASC election on October 3.

ASCS, an agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture, is responsible for farm program administration. On the local level, ASCS

operates under a farm-elected committee system. This year's elections will be by mail ballot between November 22, and December 2. Voters may also get ballots at the County ASCS office.

Anyone who meets the following requirements is eligible to vote in these farm committee elections: any individual of legal voting age with an interest in a farm as owner, operator, tenant, or sharecropper who is eligible to participate in any ASCS program.

Several general provisions relate to ASCS voter eligibility. A wife who operates a farm with her husband can vote if her name is on the deed of conveyance. Any person under legal voting age can vote if he or she runs

a farm, and a legal guardian who runs a farm for a child can vote for the child. No person can be denied the right to vote because of race, age, color, religion, handicap, or national origin.

A person may cast a ballot in any county in which he or she is an eligible ASCS voter, but he or she cannot vote more than one community in the county. If an eligible person has separate farm interests in more than one community, the same county, special election will be taken to see that one ballot is issued to the voter.

CARING FOR YOUR PET



PERIODIC CHECKUPS INSURE PET'S HEALTH

Periodic health examinations will help determine the general well-being of your family pet, and identify potential problems.

Early detection can insure prompt action which may prevent suffering-or even early death.

When your pet gets its physical, the veterinarian will note the animal's temperature, pulse and respiration rate and then examine the animal from nose to tail. The veterinarian will listen to your pet's heart and to the sound of its breathing and check its weight-much like your family physician does when you visit him.

Beginning with the nose, your veterinarian will check for discharges or irregularities and examine the nasal passages for general condition. Weed seeds or plant particles may have become lodged inside and could cause trouble.

A pet's deep, curved ear canals provide protection for the inner ear, but also provide a snug home for parasites

and infections. An animal's ear should be checked periodically.

Many conditions, such as anemia, infections and jaundice are often discovered through eye examinations. Injuries to or ulcers of the eye can also be detected during a regular health checkup.

And with pets, health is sometimes only skin deep. Your pet's skin and hair coat should be examined for their general condition as well as for fleas, ticks, other parasites, tumors, wounds and infections.

Seeing that your pet has an annual physical examination can insure that the animal enjoys a healthy life. And preventing health problems before they start is frequently easier than curing the problem.

archery season on deer, except for those who are disabled and qualify for a crossbow license.

No dogs or sidearms allowed while hunting deer during the archery season.

Bowhunters who operate a deer camp during this special season must obtain a camp permit from the Department of Wildlife Conservation in Jackson before beginning operation. The permit is free.

Resident bowhunters must have a sportsman's license, or an all game hunting and fishing license and the archery/primitive weapon permit, before hunting.

One of the most popular and versatile foods we have today is the tomato. Because it is available in so many forms, the tomato offers an extra bit of bright color, tempting flavor and nutritive value to brighten meal-time year round.

Hardly a day goes by that tomatoes aren't included in the menu. People are eating more tomatoes in processed tomato products, especially tomato juice, tomato paste and tomato sauce.

Canned tomato juice, puree, condensed tomato soup, tomato paste and canned or fresh tomatoes are often used interchangeably to make tomato sauce for spaghetti or similar dishes.

With such a wide choice available in supermarkets today, there is often much confusion among homemakers as to the differences in canned tomatoes and tomato products.

Canned tomatoes are usually peeled and packed in their own juice but may have some added tomato pulp. The higher grades have a bright color. Whole tomatoes are practically free from peel, core or other defects.

When appearance is not important, the all-purpose or mostly whole tomatoes are the best buy. These thrifty choices may be used in a variety of ways - stews, casseroles, sauces and soups.

Stewed tomatoes are pre-seasoned and ready to be used in anything from soup to salad. Cut tomatoes are blended with juice, green peppers, onions, celery and

spices.

Pear-shaped or Italian tomatoes are available either plain or with seasoning to be used for spaghetti sauce and other favorite Italian-style dishes. Most are usually priced about the same as solid pack tomatoes.

Sliced baby tomatoes are another form ready to add a little extra note to those salads, sandwiches, and meats every day of the year.

Tomato sauce is the concentrated product from either the juice of tomatoes, the partial extraction of juice or the residue left from preparing tomatoes. It has a medium consistency, light tomato flavor and a delicate seasoning blend. It is available plain or with mushrooms, onion or cheese for use with hot dogs or main dish meats.

Tomato paste is an unseasoned concentrate of tomato solids designed to add a heavier tomato flavor to pizzas, sauces and traditional Italian cookery.

Tomato puree or pulp has a more concentrated body and higher tomato solids than the sauce, but is not seasoned. It is ideal for bar-b-que and

rotisserie cooking because it clings to the meat.

Tomato catsup is the all-American topper for hamburgers, hot dogs and french fries. It may be seasoned with salt, vinegar, sauces, onion or garlic and sweetened with sugar. Higher grades are thicker than lower grades.

Chili sauce is basically chopped, crushed tomatoes with salt, spices, vinegar, sweetening, chopped vegetables and sweet pickles added.

Canned tomatoes and tomato products are in good supply. You can always stock up on canned foods because they keep their flavor, color and texture if stored in a cool, dry place until opened. Cover

unused portions in a glass or plastic container and store in a refrigerator. They can be kept in original containers if used within 24 hours after opening. Longer storage in the original can is safe, but a tinny flavor develops.

Big Weekend For Hunters

This upcoming weekend will be a big one for many state hunters. Saturday morning, Oct. 5, begins the archery season on deer which will continue through Nov. 22.

Latest figures from the Department of Wildlife Conservation suggest that as many as 40,000 hunters may take advantage of this special hunting season. Last year bowhunters harvested nearly 20,000 deer.

The bag limit during the bow season is one antlered buck per day, but not more than five during the license year. In addition, one antlerless deer may be taken, but not more than three of them per license year.

Deer taken during the archery season apply toward the overall yearly bag limit on deer.

Hunting hours during the archery season are one-half hour before sunrise until one-half hour after sunset.

Enforcement officials are reminding hunters that longbows are legal during the

REPORT TO MISSISSIPPIANS



The Senate's passage of a bill reforming our nation's immigration laws is a definite step in the right direction as we attempt to protect our own citizens who have been increasingly losing jobs to illegal aliens. It is my hope that this measure will move on through the House of Representatives and will become law soon.

Illegal aliens have been flooding the United States at a rate of up to 1.5 million per year, and some estimates now put the total number of undocumented aliens here at 12 million. Immigration accounts for almost half of our annual population growth, and our current laws have proven ineffective in controlling the flow.

Many American workers have suffered because of the laxness of our immigration laws, losing jobs to illegal aliens. We have simply not been facing up to our responsibility to protect our tax-paying citizens from this growing influx of illegal aliens which has adversely affected their ability to earn a living.

The newly passed law places a burden on employers to determine whether the people they hire are here legally or illegally. Employers who violate the law by hiring illegal aliens will be subject to stiff fines. In the past too many employees have taken advantage of cheap labor provided by illegal aliens without regard to fairness to American workers.

The new immigration law will also strengthen the enforcement of our existing immigration requirements. There will be an emphasis on criminal charges against those who bring aliens into the United States without proper authorization. Enforcing these laws is a massive job, but we are trying to give the Immigration and Naturalization Service more of what they need to accomplish it.

The bill recognizes that there is also a massive problem in dealing with the large number of illegal aliens already in this country, and provides a legal status for those who have been in the United States since January 1, 1980.

Our immigration laws remain very generous, with reasonable limits, in keeping with the philosophy of open arms which has always characterized our nation. But this law does what is necessary in giving protection to Americans who have suffered unduly from the influx of those who have entered this country without regard for the laws which we have.

Destroy," we are also fighting the drug problem in Mississippi by requesting U.S. Attorney General Ed Meese to give us more federal drug agents in Mississippi. We have only five federal agents, while Alabama has 17 and Louisiana has 38. Last year, we also asked the State Legislature for 10 additional state narcotics agents; they gave us five. We will be asking the 1986 Legislature for 10 more this year.

Finally, we are working in a Gulf States regional effort to rid our area of drug trafficking. Last year I attended a meeting in New Orleans with the Governors of Alabama, Louisiana, Texas, and Florida. At that time we began a task force of the Governors and their top narcotics bureau officials to fight the drug problem. I am pleased to report to you that this effort is working, and we have secured federal legislation as a result of our meeting that will allow the military personnel to assist in the battle against drugs.

We have a long way to go in stopping this dangerous problem, but these activities will keep reducing the drugs in our state and, thus, keep them out of the hands of you citizens, especially our young people.

Q. How can marijuana plants be recognized? (LW-Crystal Springs, MS)

A. Marijuana, known to botanists as Cannabis sativa, is an annual plant now grown throughout temperate and tropical areas of the world. In Mississippi and other parts of the Southeast its cultivation is particularly successful; farmers, sportsmen and other persons who frequent rural areas encounter growing marijuana plants with ever-increasing frequency.

Marijuana plants are most readily by their leaves having

a palmately structure. Each leaf is composed of a number of leaflets with serrated or notched margins. There are usually seven of these leaflets, but they may vary considerably and are always of an odd number.

The plant itself varies in appearance, in Mississippi it may grow to fifteen feet or more in height and may produce more than a pound of cured leaves before frost ends its life.

Diseases of the cornea—the transparent membrane at the front of the eye—are often the most painful of eye disorders.

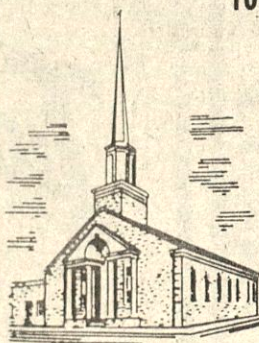

Drug Crackdown

The State Bureau of Narcotics, at my request, has begun a massive crackdown on drugs being harvested in our state, especially the marijuana crop. We are currently in the harvest season for this deadly crop, and state and local officials have begun "Operation Seek and Destroy" to stop the harvesting of an estimated 100,000 plants.

"Operation Seek and

Destroy" is a joint effort, led by the Bureau of Narcotics, to combine all the manpower of the Highway Patrol, federal Drug Enforcement Agency, Wildlife Conservation, U.S. attorney's office, Sheriff's Association, and Chiefs of Police in an attempt to locate and chop down as much marijuana as possible in this state in the next few months.

Marijuana and other drugs are causing terrible problems in our state. Over 75 percent of the inmates at Parchman were arrested in drug-related activities. Some 1,500 people a year are admitted to state mental hospitals due to alcohol and drug problems. The dangers of marijuana are not well enough known. One marijuana cigarette reduces one's reaction time by 41 percent; two marijuana cigarettes reduce reactions by 63 percent. Imagine how this would affect someone driving a car or operating dangerous equipment.

Between now and late November, our state and local law enforcement officials are looking for any marijuana fields throughout Mississippi, so we can cut them down and thereby reduce the supply of the drug in our state. We are asking all Mississippians to contact the law enforcement officers if you suspect that you see a marijuana field. The officers will then investigate the matter. With only 45 state narcotics agents in Mississippi, we must have the help of everyone to stop this threat on our society.

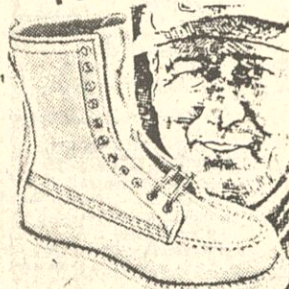

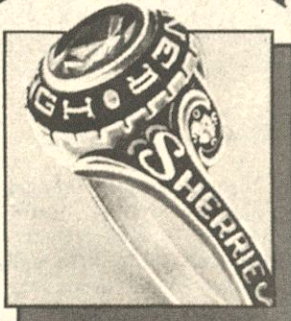

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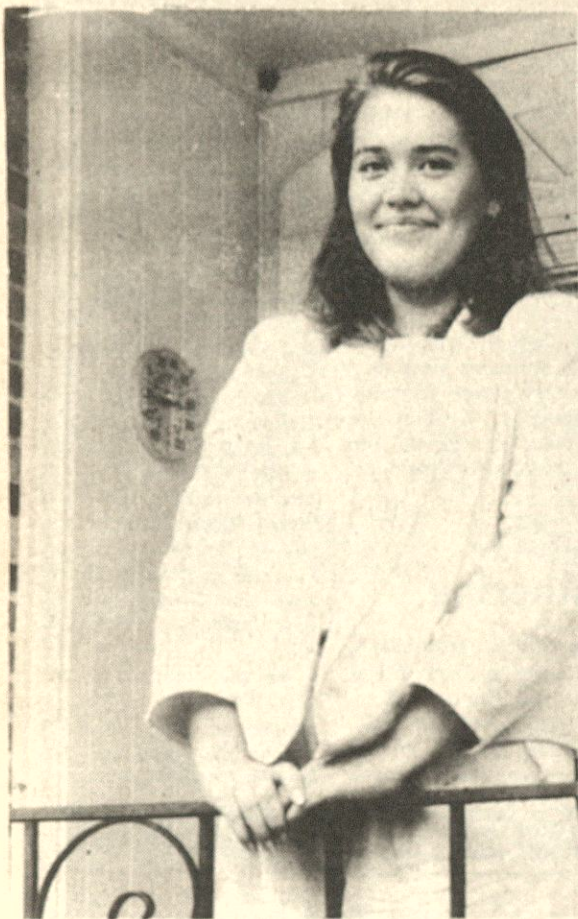
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Featuring Helena Perzon

Helena Perzon, from Boden, Sweden, had always dreamed of coming to America so, she decided to become an exchange student through the EF exchange program (Educational Foundation for Foreign Study) choosing the United States as her destination.

Helena's hometown of Boden is a city of approximately 30,000 people, located in the extreme northern part of Sweden only a short distance from the Arctic Circle. The climate there, Helena explained, is very cold with winter temperatures falling to 40 degrees below zero F. In the winter time the daylight hours become very short and in contrast, during the summer, there is only about three hours of darkness.

Helena also explained that in the area where she lives, the young people enjoy horseback riding, downhill snow skiing, ice skating, soccer, tennis, ice hockey and many other activities.

Helena is being hosted by Mr. and Mrs. Albert Keahey of Iuka. She will remain with them until June, when she will return home.

Helena's parents, Carl-Lennart and Anna-Maria Perzon, both work outside of the home. Her father is an accountant and her mother is a Psychiatrist's assistant. She has a brother, Roger, who is 8 and a sister, Rigmor, who is 10.

Among the multiple talents Helena possesses is her warm and friendly personality; however, she has other talents such as playing piano and she speaks five languages. She has been taking English since she was approximately 9 years old and speaks it very fluently. She did say that it was somewhat difficult to have everything spoken in English and that it takes a great deal of concentration.

One of the main differences Helena has noticed about the schools in Sweden and the schools here are the teacher-student relationships. "In Sweden, a student and teacher are more like good friends and there is not such a separation as there seems to be here. We call the teachers by their first

names," she said.

Other differences in school systems include that there are many subjects taken in one year, but they are not all taken each day. Also, there is no homework given each night; instead, one large homework assignment is given for an entire week so that other activities can be done in the evenings, according to Helena.

"When you reach the age of 16 in Sweden, you have the choice to either get a job or to continue on with school," Helena explained, "Most people do continue, you may then choose which course you will take and depending on the difficulty, they may last two, three or four years." Helena is presently enrolled in the four year program which consists of sciences (chemistry and physics) and mathematics. After completion of this, she plans to go on to a university.

Helena also explained that Swedish schools are more liberal in some areas than the schools here. "For one thing, we can leave school when ever we like. Also, we have no dress codes," she said. Included in Helena's interests are music (including classical and pop), horseback riding, theater, downhill skiing and wind surfing.

Like the other exchange students, Helena is here for a learning experience and should be welcomed warmly by everyone. It takes a great amount of courage to leave the comfort of ones own country and family and come to a foreign land to spend ten months of your life. So, keep Helena and the others in mind and if you are so lucky as to meet them, show them your support and do your best to make them feel at home.

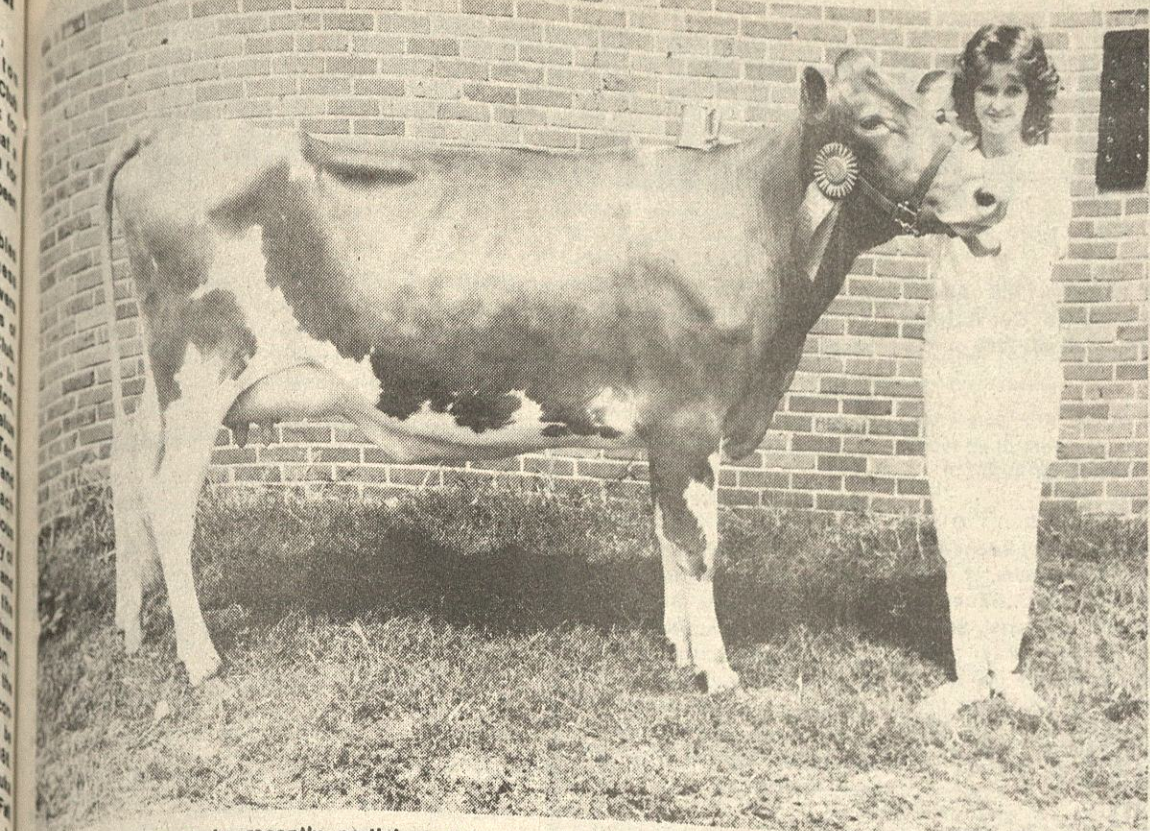

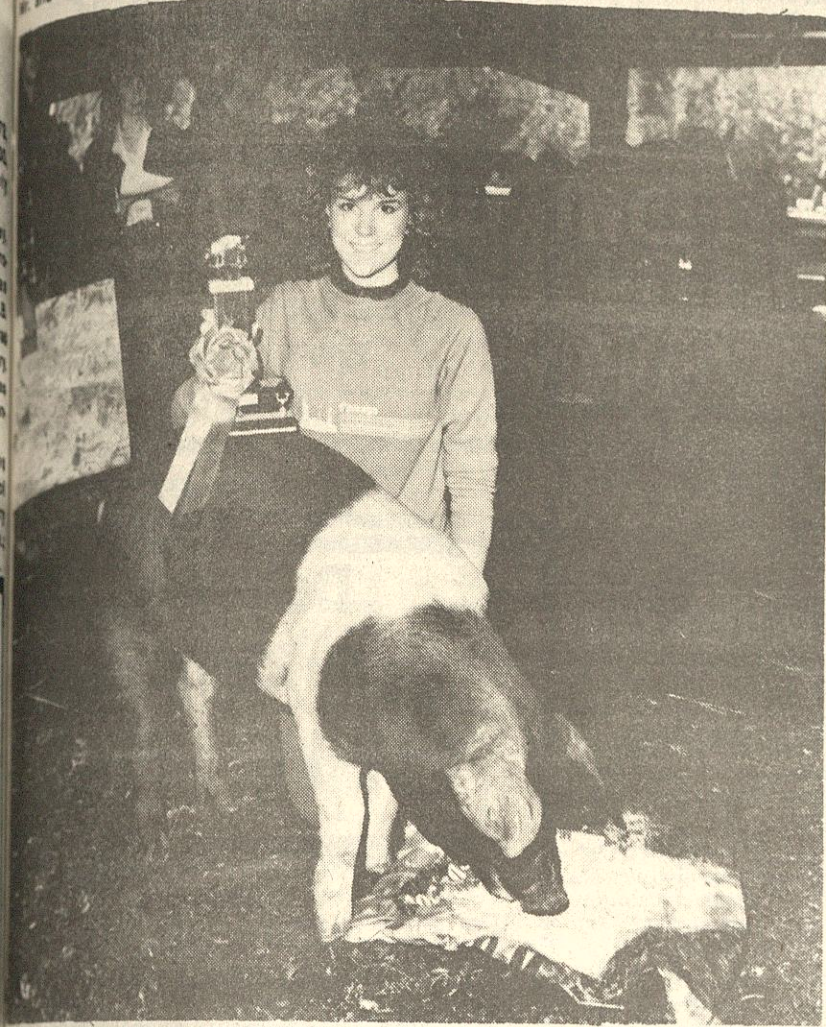

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Cooler Weather Means Time For Fruit

Have your landscape and eat it, too! While this is not the busiest season for folks who grow their own fruit at home, it is an excellent time to begin planning toward the cold days of the coming winter, when most fruit plants are set out.

Even those people who don't know a blueberry from a jube can take advantage of some types of fruit plants for the home landscape.

Muscadines and Japanese persimmons are about all there are left to harvest this time of the year, and most of the pests on other fruits are gone for the season as well. However, now is a good time to reflect back on what happened this past season, take inventory of what performed poorly, and look around for room for the newer varieties of fruits which not only produce heavily but also look good in the landscape.

While it is a fact of life that few fruits are free of growing pains, there are several notable ones which belong in just about everyone's yard or garden. These truly fine fruits are vigorous hybrids of older or native plants whose bounteous harvest can be enjoyed with a minimum of trouble, and the plants themselves possess more-than-passing good looks.

Many Mississippians have had good success with tree fruits in the backyard. Many more have had miserable luck with ungainly plants eaten up with blights, worms and problems associated with shade, poor soils and lack of pruning attention. The careful selection to site selection, the choosing of recommended varieties and proper planning and after-care can nearly always lead to success with fruit trees.

On the other hand, there are plants which may look great in the landscape yet never produce a single banana, cherry or other fruit, simply because the plants are set out in the wrong part of the world.

Some varieties of apples, pears and even peaches and pecans need specific amounts of cold temperatures to set fruit. What may do well in north Mississippi may perform poorly or not at all in the central or southern thirds of our state.

There should be no surprise, then, that the most productive and problem-free

fruit plants for the landscape and home garden are the cultivated varieties of native berry plants. Blueberries, muscadines and blackberries are top choices for home fruit production. They are heavily fruitful, resistant to most diseases, free from major insect pests, and they fit in quite well with other landscape plants. These truly fine fruits have been carefully bred for improved production and vigor, better flavor, and higher quality in storage and processing.

They each have their own quirks and needs. Blueberries are upright bushes which absolutely require generous amounts of peat moss to be thoroughly blended in with their planting soil, and they are acid-lovers, requiring no lime. In addition, they will not tolerate fertilizers the first year or so, needing only water and mulch to thrive and produce.

Muscadines, able to produce more than 100 pounds of berries per vine on just 20 feet of fence or trellis, have to be pruned severely times every winter to stay productive and under control. "Tame" blackberries, even the thornless varieties, must be planted within a sunken tub or border to keep the suckers from overtaking the rest of the landscape.

Each of these has good looks as well as fine fruit. They are available now throughout the state for the most part, and can add interest year 'round to the landscape and freezer. Others, such as loquat, quince, persimmon, pomegranate, strawberry and jube, may be used for other special effects with varying degrees of success.

The selection of a sunny, well-drained site, good varieties for your area of the state, and careful attention to the needs of each fruit are all essential to rewarding home fruit production.

Park Cabin Policy

On December 3, beginning at 8:00 a.m., and continuing through 5:00 p.m. December 15, written and telephone requests for reservations will be accepted for reservations of 7 to 14 nights.

Beginning at 8:00 a.m. on January 2, in-person requests will be accepted for all unreserved cabins for the remainder of the year. Then on January 3, telephone and written requests will be honored for cabin reservations for the rest of the year.

In past years no reservations for March through December were taken until 8:00 a.m. on January 2.

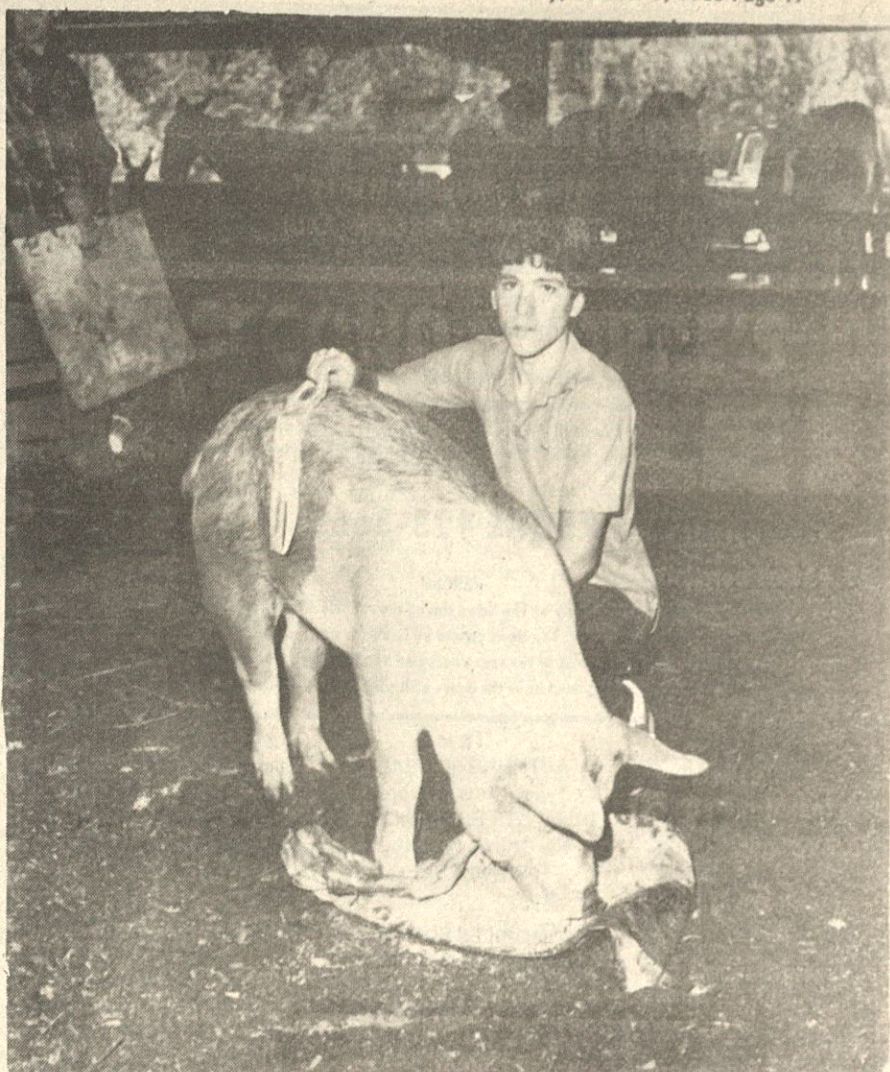
Other cabin reservation policies remain the same:

Beginning at 8:00 a.m. on October 7, reservations for January and February 1986 will be taken;

There is a three-night minimum during the heavy use season (Memorial Day weekend through Labor Day);

There is a two-night minimum during the off season (Labor Day to the Memorial Day weekend);

Maximum length of stay is 14 days with weekly extension.
