
Country Music Show

3 VEHICLE ACCIDENT FATAL TO IUKA MAN

A three-vehicle accident which occurred on U.S. Highway 25 about two miles north of Iuka claimed the life of one Iuka man and left two other drivers injured early last Friday.

Mississippi State Trooper Jan Barnett told the News that Robby Marlar, 32, the driver of a 1980 Datsun pickup, was traveling south on 25 when he apparently crossed over into the oncoming lane of traffic and was struck by a loaded northbound log truck. The logging truck, which was driven by Roy Pennington of Golden, was said to have gone out of control, then veered across the road and ran into a 1984 Buick. The driver of the car was identified to be Mrs. Pat Robinson of Route 5, Iuka. Mrs. Robinson, enroute to work, was reportedly traveling south following the Marlar vehicle when the accident took place.

The trooper's report indicated that all three wreck victims had been transported to the Tishomingo County

Hospital by the time he arrived on the scene. Pennington and Robinson both received injuries in the accident; however, Marlar was pronounced dead.

Trooper Barnett said he arrived approximately 45 minutes after the 6:45 mishap. He is assigned to Alcorn County and had quite a distance to travel when the report was made.

Robby Warren Marlar, 32, died November 22, 1985, as the result of an automobile accident near Iuka. He was a 1972 graduate of Burnsville High School, and a construction worker.

Services were November 23, 1985 at Cutshall's Funeral Home Chapel with the Rev. Russell Clouse and Rev. Danny Lovelace officiating. Burial was in Oak Grove Cemetery.

Survivors include one daughter, Olivia Brook Marlar of Iuka; his father, J.C. Marlar of Iuka; his mother, Agnes Carlisle, of Corinth; one sister, Kathy Reed of Iuka.

MAN CHARGED WITH BEATING

A Belmont man remained jailed awaiting a preliminary hearing Tuesday morning following being charged with the Sunday night beating and robbery of a Dennis resident.

Mike Winchester, 29, was arrested at his home in the early morning hours Monday by county law officials and charged with aggravated assault and robbery of Edward Allen, mid 40's, of Route 1, Dennis.

The beating victim was treated at the Tishomingo County Hospital following the incident for multiple bruises and lacerations about the head area.

Chief Deputy, Mike Kemp of the sheriff's office said the

report of the incident was made between 11:00-12:00 p.m. Sunday night. He said Winchester had apparently been visiting in the Allen home when an argument evolved between the men. Kemp said Winchester supposedly beat Allen about the head and face with steel knuckles or a small handgun (pistol) and then robbed him before departing the residence. The nature of the quarrel was undisclosed as was the amount of cash taken in the incident.

Auxiliary deputies, David Lee Johnson and Edgar Lambert assisted Kemp in the investigation, along with 3rd district constable, Tim Bivins.

Control Mice In The Home

Now that the cooler weather is here, most of us like to linger indoors for comfort. Mice and other rodents like warmer temperatures, too, and may hibernate with you if you don't take a few precautions.

Mice move in a home from grassy fields or cultivated grain crop fields. Since winter marks the harvest of such crops, mice may move indoors for a ready supply of food and water.

Once mice have moved into a home, they are difficult to get rid of and will probably multiply, compounding the problem.

The best form of control is prevention. Stop mice from entering your home by blocking any possible entry points. Nail a piece of tin over holes in your home. Cover windows and other openings with a screen. Plug or cement around pipes or wires leading

in to your home.

Even very small openings should be covered since mice can squeeze into small spaces.

If mice are found in your home, begin a control program to make your home rodent-free.

Use traps along walls and in cabinets or closets. Since mice move along the wall, set traps so the trigger is nearest the wall-right in their path.

Droppings should indicate where mice have fed. This is a good place to set a trap using a bait such as cheese, raisins, peanut butter, bacon rind or jelly beans.

The house mouse has a small range of a few feet to 25 feet. This is important to know when deciding where to place traps or poison bait.

To make your traps more effective, limit the usual food source. Do not leave food scraps around and keep all food and stored products in tight containers or closed cupboards. Remove garbage

"Holiday Treats"

Lower Soybean Production Costs

Farmers who intend to plant soybeans next year should use lime and other fertilization practices this fall to lower production costs.

Take soil samples for testing as soon as possible after a field has been combined to determine amounts of nutrients needed for the next crop.

Proper amounts of fertilizer help produce maximum yields and can reduce the unit cost of production. Incorrect fertilizer rates may limit yields or waste money.

For best results, lime should be plowed into the soil this fall. Fertilizer can be applied now except on very sandy soils or where erosion is likely.

Turkey Salad

4 cups diced, cooked turkey
4 cups diced, crisp celery
2 cups mayonnaise or salad dressing
Salt
Pepper
Lemon Juice

Combine turkey, celery, and mayonnaise. Season to taste with salt, pepper and lemon juice. Refrigerate and use as a salad or sandwich filling. Serves 8.

Turkey Patties

2 cups finely chopped or ground cooked turkey
1/2 cup mayonnaise
1 tsp. grated onion
1/2 tsp. salt
Pepper

1 cup soft, fine bread crumbs
Combine turkey, mayonnaise, onion, salt, a pinch of pepper, and bread crumbs. Mix well and shape into 8 patties about an inch thick. Roll in bread crumbs. Place one-half inch apart on greased baking sheet and bake at 425 degrees F. until heated through and browned, about 15 minutes. Place turkey patty in buttered round bun and

Feeding Birds In Winter

The beginning of fall stirs ideas of feeding the birds that will stay here or visit for the winter. There are a variety of birds that can be fed during the winter, and your preference will determine what type of feed you should use.

Most birds prefer sunflower seeds, with the black oil-type the best. White proso millet also attracts birds, so a mixture of these two is a good place to start.

Commercial mixes often contain these seeds, but if you are serious about feeding it can get expensive. You can save by buying seed in bulk and mixing it yourself. Keep your seed in a good container that mice and squirrels can't get into.

Where or how the feed is put out can be as important as what feed is used. Some birds such as juncos, white-throated sparrows and towhees feed on the ground, while hanging feeders attract chickadees and goldfinches. Suet is attractive to woodpeckers when a basket or bag is attached to a tree.

Most birds are opportunists and will take advantage of whatever you feed. It is also possible to enhance your experience with birds visiting your yard by feeding them year round.

Don't worry if you have to stop feeding for awhile. The birds won't starve. They use more sources of feed than just yours. While at home, try to keep feed in the feeders. This will keep them coming back on a regular basis.

Before buying, always try on ready-made clothing to check for fit, appropriateness of style and color, and defects in manufacture. This will help avoid a trip back to the store to return unsuitable merchandise.

When selecting patterns, fabrics, and notions to do home sewing, select everything on the same shopping trip to save fuel for transportation. You will also save time and energy.

Mortgage Loans Available

Feline Cancer Often Caused By Virus

Dogs are more likely to have tumorous growths than cats.

But those growths affecting felines are more likely to be malignant.

In 1964, a virus called the feline leukemia virus (FeLV) was found to cause certain types of cancers in cats. The virus, however, is not considered a threat to human health at this time, nor is it believed to affect other species of animals.

Lymphosarcoma (cancer of the lymphoid cells) is the most common form of cancer associated with FeLV. Currently, it is believed that most -- if not all -- tumors of this type are a result of the virus.

The leukemic forms of FeLV-related cancers -- those that involve tumors of the red blood cells and non-lymphoid white blood cells -- are less common.

While a FeLV infection does not always cause cancer, much of the research on the subject indicates that an infection of this type frequently renders a feline more susceptible to other infectious diseases.

Research also shows

that cats infected with FeLV have a high incidence of reproductive problems, including abortions, fetal resorptions and the birth of weak kittens, many of which die within a few days.

At this time, research is being done to develop a vaccine to protect cats against this virus. While some promising vaccines have been developed, it will be several years before they have been thoroughly tested and approved and become available to veterinarians.

In the meantime, making sure that your feline receives a good, balanced ration and remains in top physical condition is the best protection you can provide against FeLV.

Timberline

It is easy enough to assume that a forest, once established, will grow by itself.

This is true, of course, to some extent. But it also is true that trees, like other crops, will grow faster and produce more if given some management attention, such as removing "weeds" and thinning.

And there's just as much reason for a landowner to expect maximum production from a crop of trees, as from any other crop. The result is the same—increased profits.

The two most effective and economical management tools available to help local landowners get maximum productivity from their timber stands, are prescribed burning and selective thinning.

Prescribed Burning

Prescribed burning is the use of fire under carefully controlled conditions to accomplish one or more forest management objectives.

Among the several uses of prescribed burning in timber stands, perhaps the most common is for fuel reduction. By allowing a fire, under carefully controlled conditions, to creep slowly but steadily through a forest, the fuel (weeds, grass, pine needles, etc.) is burned away, thus eliminating the potential for wildfire in an effective and inexpensive way.

Another prescribed burning use is hardwood control. In areas suited best for growing pines, hardwoods commonly creep in and, if not dealt with, will literally "take over" a stand.

All fires in a natural environment do some damage, and prescribed burns are no exception. However, properly planned and executed, burning can accomplish many objectives at a reasonable cost and with minimum damage to the timber stand.

sticks of pulpwood in them. Among trees to be considered for removing when you conduct a selective thinning are mature trees, diseased, insect infested, defective (crooked, forked, broken top, etc.), damaged or scarred, badly leaning, non-commercial or low-valued species, and trees that may be fairly good but space is needed for better trees.

In short, each tree should be viewed separately for its chances of growing into a profitable individual stem.

Since thinning can be tedious and technical process, the advice of a forester is recommended. For more information contact the Mississippi Forestry Commission office or phone 423-9070.

FMHA Issues Loan Assistance Regulations

The Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) has issued new regulations which spell out, in detail, the various loan servicing alternatives which may be available to farmers who are having economic difficulty, according to Dan Mattox, Acting FmHA State Director.

"All borrowers are expected to pay back their loans according to a planned repayment schedule," Mattox said. "However, when that is impossible, we want borrowers to be aware of what kind of assistance may be available and under what conditions."

The servicing alternatives

available to eligible borrowers include a deferral of a portion of payments for five years, reamortizing payments over a longer period of time, restructuring the debt, or subordinating FmHA's lien position on security to another lender.

The regulations spell out how FmHA determines eligibility for various loan servicing alternatives and under what circumstances FmHA would propose to take steps to resolve delinquency or other problems.

Borrowers' appeal rights are detailed as well as FmHA's would propose to take steps to resolve delinquency or other Borrowers' appeal rights are detailed as well as FmHA's agreement to continue the release of sales proceeds until final loan servicing has been determined.

The new procedures were developed to give FmHA borrowers with delinquent and problem loans, clear, consistent and predictable guidelines on how their accounts will be serviced by the agency," Mattox said.




Two Injured, One Killed In 3-Vehicle Wreck

State Unemployment Rate Drops

Mississippi's unemployment rate dropped to 9.4 percent in October, a decrease of four-tenths of a percentage point compared to September's jobless rate of 9.8 percent, according to Mississippi Employment Security Commission Executive Cohen Robertson. Last year's October unemployment rate was 9.9 percent.

The 9.4 percent unemployment rate for the state was higher than the 6.8 percent national rate for October. MESC figures showed 107,700 unemployed and 1,034,800 employed out of a civilian labor force of 1,142,500. The initial unemployment insurance claims

totalled 20,412 in October. Forty of the state's 82 counties had unemployment rates of 10.0 percent or higher in October.

The counties having the highest unemployment rates in October were Wilkinson, with an unemployment rate of 18.7 percent; Greene, with 16.7 percent; and George with an unemployment rate of 15.6 percent.

Carroll, Rankin and Pontotoc counties had the lowest jobless rates in October. Carroll had a rate of 4.7 percent, Rankin had a rate of 5.3 percent, and Pontotoc had an unemployment rate of 5.7 percent.

Twenty-nine counties showed an increase in their unemployment rates from September to October, while fifty reported decreases. The unemployment rate in three counties remained the same.





National Adoption Week Announced

The President proclaimed Thanksgiving week, November 24-30, 1985, as National Adoption Week. The North American Council on Adoptable Children initiated National Adoption Week nine years ago.

The Mississippi Department of Public Welfare along with the Mississippi Council on Adoptable Children and several licensed adoption agencies are sponsoring through a proclamation signed by Governor Bill Allain on November 6, 1985, that the week of November 24 be recognized as Adoption Week in Mississippi.

There are 71 children registered with the Mississippi Adoption Resource Exchange. (The Mississippi Adoption Resource Exchange, created by Mississippi Law 2465, effective July, 1978, specifies that the Department of Public Welfare will maintain a Mississippi Adoption Resource Exchange Registry of all Mississippi children free for adoption as well as families who have been approved by a licensed agency with the State to adopt a child or children.) Out of the 71 children: 38 are black males,

24 are black females; one is a bi-racial male; two are white males; and seven are white females. The children are all over five years of age—with 11 children being in the 6-10 year old range, and 60 children being over 11 years of age.

The Registry includes biographical sketches and pictures of all children whose custody is held by a licensed Mississippi adoption agency. Descriptive characteristics are written for each child which includes the child's age and first name's only, (the last names are kept confidential). The registry also includes biographical sketches and pictures of families who have been approved by a

licensed adoption agency and who have given written authority for publication of this material.

In October, 1983, Mississippi started using a statewide toll free telephone number for families interested in adopting special needs children. The number is 1-800-821-9157. A Code-a-Phone is used to record messages when the office is closed.

The licensed adoption agencies that are sponsoring and are named in the proclamation signed by Governor Allain include: Bethany Christian Services, Catholic Charities, Catholic Social and Community Ser-

vices of Biloxi, Holt Adoption Program, Inc., Latter Day Saints, (LDS), Social Services and Mississippi Children's Home Society, Inc.

ASCS Says Upland Cotton Farmers Can Expect Deficiency Payments

Prospects for a very large 1985 upland cotton crop have resulted in sharply low prices this fall. The 13.5-million-bale estimate is 5 percent above last year, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

If the 1985 national average farm price is less than the 81 cents per pound target price, Howard R. Bridges, chairperson of the Tishomingo County ASC Committee said

upland cotton producers can expect to receive a deficiency payment. To be eligible, however, farmers must have participated in the acreage reduction program and accurately and timely reported their crop acreages to ASCS this summer.

Market prices for upland cotton thus far have remained below the 1985-crop federal target price of the commodity. "The farm price that is compared to the target price is an average of producer prices for each month of the 1985 calendar year weighted by the estimated monthly sales," said Bridges. He explained that the deficiency payment rate is the difference between the target and average farm prices and applies to the planted acreage and payment yield.

If deficiency payments are made, the ASCS official said every eligible upland cotton producer gets the difference between the 1985 target and average farm price regardless of his or her selling price.

According to USDA's October crop production report, Mississippi farmers expect to harvest 1,040,000 acres of upland cotton this year and produce 1,700,000 bales. Last year, 1,032,000 acres of cotton were harvested and 1,650,000 bales produced.

The report forecasts the average upland cotton yield this season at 632 pounds, 33 pounds above last year. Upland cotton exports for 1985/86 are expected to drop dramatically from 6.1 million bales last year to 3.4 million bales this year. Agriculture officials say the losses will occur because of the abundance of foreign cotton and the effects of U.S. loan rates.

If funds are available after this priority period, applications can be taken from the general low income community.

Each applicant must provide the agency with the name and social security number of each person in the household, written proof of all household income and proof that the applicant is responsible for home heating cost.

Point Of Law

(Prepared by the Mississippi
State Bar. Some legal rights
may vary from locality to
locality. Always consult an at-
torney when in doubt about
your rights.)

Q: What happens if a per-
son dies without a will?

A: If someone dies without
a will (in legal terms dies "in-
testate") the property will go
to the heirs as tenants in
common. This means that
each heir will own an un-
divided interest in each item
of property in the estate
rather than each owning a
special item of property as
set forth in a will. Land, bank
accounts and cars are all
treated as equal and are
valued accordingly.

Of course, the heirs may
agree to divide the property in
whatever manner they
choose once it is theirs.
However, this requires a
degree of cooperation that is
often missing in these
situations. If they cannot
agree on a fair division, the
heirs may turn to the court to
partition it among them. If the
court feels that it cannot
fairly divide the property into
individual shares, it will order
the property sold and the
proceeds divided among the
heirs.

If the deceased leaves in-
structions about the property
in any form other than a will
these instructions have no
legal effect. So, if you want
your daughter to have the
china and your son to have
the guns, it can only be
assured with a will.

Q: What happens to prop-
erty owned by "joint tenants?"

A: In such a case, the deed
or bank account will have
language to the effect that
they own, "...as joint tenants
with full rights of survivor-
ship..." or similar language.
This means that when the first
one dies his or her property
goes to the other, and does
not go by a will.

CHOCOLATE CREAM BANANA CAKE

2 extra-ripe, medium Dole Bananas, peeled
1 package (18.5 oz.) chocolate cake mix
2 squares (1 oz. each) semi-sweet chocolate
2 cups whipping cream, whipped
2 firm, large Dole Bananas

Slice extra-ripe bananas into blender. Puree until smooth (1 cup). Prepare cake according to package directions for 2 (9-inch) layers, replacing 1 cup water with 1 cup pureed bananas. Melt chocolate according to package directions; cool to lukewarm. Mix a small amount of whipped cream, into melted chocolate. Pour over remaining whipped cream. Fold into whipped cream thoroughly. Split cooled cakes in half through center lengthwise to make 4 layers. Peel and split firm bananas in half lengthwise. Spread one cake layer with chocolate cream. Top with second layer. Spread with chocolate cream, top with split bananas. Top with third layer. Spread with chocolate cream. Top with fourth layer. Spread remaining chocolate cream over entire cake. Refrigerate until ready to serve. Garnish top of cake with additional sliced banana, if desired. Makes 8 to 10 servings.

BANANA MOCHA CAKE

2 extra-ripe, large Dole Bananas, peeled
1 teaspoon dry instant coffee
1-1/4 cups flour
2/3 cup sugar
1/4 cup cornstarch
3 tablespoons cocoa
1 teaspoon baking soda
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 egg, lightly beaten
1/3 cup vegetable oil
1 tablespoon vinegar
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
Silky Mocha Frosting

Slice banana into blender; whirl until smooth (1 cup). Stir coffee into pureed bananas. In a 9-inch square pan, combine flour, sugar, cornstarch, cocoa, soda and salt. Blend well with a fork. Make well in center of dry ingredients. Add banana mixture, egg, oil, vinegar and vanilla. Stir in dry mixture with a fork until well blended. Bake in 350°F oven 30 minutes. Cool completely. Spread with Silky Mocha Frosting. Makes 12 servings.

SILKY MOCHA FROSTING: Combine 3 tablespoons butter, 1-1/2 cups sifted powdered sugar, 2 tablespoons cocoa and 1 teaspoon dry instant coffee until mixed. Add 2 tablespoons milk and 1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract. Beat until smooth.






