

S.N.A.P. PROGRAM

In the last year many from our small community have died in car accidents. Too many. Since January 1, 1985, Tishomingo County has lost 14 people, Alcorn County has lost 8 people, and Prentiss County has lost 7 people. Over half of these were young people, tragically killed on our streets and highways. Some of these children could still be alive, according to the authorities, if only they had used their seat belts. They died needlessly. And everyone felt sorrow. And some folks took action.

The S.N.A.P. Program (Stop Needless Automobile Accidents) was created to save lives by educating folksespecially young peopleabout the life-saving value of seat belt and child car seat usage. S.N.A.P. was originally founded by several dynamic community leaders in Corinth distressed by our children's deaths. Though the program now receives federal funding, these same folks still provide advice and direction.

The people in our community need your help. S.N.A.P. is enlisting the talents and services of community leaders such as yourself in their effort to save our people.

December, because of the holiday season and its excessive traffic accidents, has been selected to be "S.N.A.P. Your Seat Belt" month. During this time, we are actively carrying out several different projects that should make our folks more aware of seat belt safety, and hopefully increase seat belt usage. These projects include a tri-county-wide

test, involving up to 3,000 students; a special Christmas card mail-out in cooperation with area banks; extra media coverage; and quite possibly the launching of our child car seat loaner program.

You are invited to become a part of the S.N.A.P. Force. Please join with Mayor John H. Biggs and other area political leaders in declaring December "S.N.A.P. Your Seat Belt!" month. The people in our town will appreciate this expression of care and concern. With your involvement and, with God's help, we can keep some of our people safe.

TISHOMINGO WELCOMES DR. STEPHEN BUTLER



Dr. Stephen Butler has been recruited by the Northeast Mississippi Health Services, and will begin practice at the Tishomingo Medical Clinic in mid Decem-

Dr. Butler graduated in 1980, and became certified in 1981. He has served one year the physicians with Replacement Services in Labrador, Newfoundland, in Canada, and 21/2 years in Labrador in family practice and emergency. The family practice included orthepedic, obstetrics, surgical assistant, as well as emergency medicine.

The city of Labrador is about the size of Corinth, Mississippi and there are no roads to connect this area to the rest of Canada. Often time, Dr. Butler recalled that patients would have to be transported by air lift services, which included helicopter, small planes and at times commercial air lines. The medical services in

Labrador are understaffed

and doctors are genuinely needed and appreciated there. Dr. Butler told The News that he had seen 13,000 patients during a one-year period while serving there.

In making his decision to locate in Tishomingo, Dr. Butler commented that he was wishing to locate in the South, preferably in a small community, where there was a genuine need for medical service. Already he has observed a closely knit community structure. He notes that the people in this area are very supportive and receptive to him.

Dr. Butler's office will be opening when his office equipment and supplies arrive and upon completion of other legal procedures. Hopefully this will be within the next two or three weeks.

The office will be located in the Tishomingo Medical Clinic across from Gatlin Pharmacy in Tishomingo.



Insects On Firewood

Cooler weather has finally arrived, and many families will light a fire in their fireplace or woodstove. When you bring wood in the home remember that insects may get in the door, too.

Although a large number of insects may be found on the wood, most of them are harmless. The insects are usually looking for food or overwintering places under loose bark or in hollow wood.

One insect can be more bothersome than others. loose bark and usually are more of a problem where wood has been stacked over a long period of time.

Beetles, termites and carpenter ants aren't likely to become established in the home through firewood because they usually leave the firewood when their colonies are disturbed.

It's easy to keep insects from entering your home on firewood, and no insecticides

Before carrying wood into the house, knock the sticks against something solid to jar the insects loose. Don't stack firewood in or against the

Stack the wood in cold areas of the house, such as the garage or unheated porch. Use any wood you carry in the house within a day or two.

Kerosene Heater Safety

Kerosene heaters can help heat a home or camphouse when cold weather hits, but they are most effective when used safely.

New safety standards. established in 1984 provide safety features that may not be included on older models. Improved guards or grills reduce the risk of accidental burns and a manual shut-off device allows for quick shutoff in an emergency.

The new labels stress the use of water-clear 1-K kerosene only as a fuel. A new wick-stop mechanism

open to the rest of the house. It is not safe to operate a kerosene heater in a confined area without the proper ventilation.

Place the heater at least three feet from flammable materials and don't use the heater in areas where gasoline, paint solvents and other flammable vapors may

Never leave an operating heater unattended or while you are sleeping. Don't let children operate or refuel the

Don't move, service or refuel the heater when it's on or still hot. Refuel the heater outdoors, away from flammable materials. Store the fuel away from living areaoutdoors, in a well-marked container, out of reach of children.

Heartworms Are

Major Canine Danger A simple mosquito bite can spell death for your dog if that bite carries canine heartworm disease.

Heartworms are parasites, carried by mosquitoes from dog-todog. They mature in an unprotected dog's heart and large blood vessels, sometimes reaching a length of 14 inches and the diameter of a pencil lead.

Heavy infestations of heartworms-or even a few heartworms over a long period of time -impair the flow of blood throughout the dog's body, causing damage not only to the heart but to the lungs, liver and kidneys as well. Heartworms can cause a slow, painful death.

If discovered ir. its early stages, the disease can be treated effectively and leave little or no permanent damage to the animal. In its later stages, however, the disease becomes more difficult to cure and frequently causes permanent damage to the

animal's health. No vaccine currently is available to immunize your dog against canine

heartworm disease. Effective preventive medication, however, is

available in liquid, tablet and chewable tablet forms. The medicationwhich prevents larvae of immature heartworms from reaching adulthood--is given daily to provide continuous protection for the dog.

If given to a dog already infected with heartworms, the preventive medication can cause acute illness. It is vital, therefore, to have your pet checked for heartworms prior to beginning a program of prevention

Heartworm disease was once confined to the coastal areas of the South, along oceans and rivers. Today, however, the disease has become a major canine health problem.

Statistics in Tennessee indicate that more than 6 percent of the dogs tested in the state for heartworms prove positive.

FOREIGN INVESTORS RE-MINDED OF AGRICULTURAL LAND REPORTING RULE

Foreigners who acquire or transfer any interest other than a security interest in Tishomingo County's agricultural land are required to report the transaction within 90 days to the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

County ASC official Howard R. Bridges, chairperson of the Tishomingo County ASC Committee said the requirement stems from the Agricultural Foreign Investment Disclosure Act and those who fail to report, or who are late in reporting face possible fines. The report provides the U.S. Department of Agriculture with the amount of agricultural land owned by foreign persons.

A foreign disclosure report must be filed when a single foreign individual, organization, or government holds a direct or indirect interest of 10 percent or more; when a group of foreign individuals, organizations, or governments, acting in concert, hold an aggregate interest of 10 percent or more;

As of December 2, 198 foreign investors had repo ted owning about 6,653 acres of Tishomingo County agricultural land.





Chatting With Your Home Economist

Pecans

Pecans are a naturally delicious, nutritious food.

Whether served right from the shell; toasted with butter, sugared, spiced or salted; mixed into salads, entrees, vegetables, desserts or served in dozens of other ways, pecans are a tasty way to add flavor, crunch and nutrition.

With so little trouble and little money, too, pecans can be added to a multitude of dishes, appetizers and snacks. Yet they always add a fancy touch, not to mention rich flavor and appealing crunch. Only a handful or so added to most recipes will do the trick.

Although pecans have been traditionally popular in pies, cakes, other sweet baked goods and desserts, they're equally delicious in casseroles, salads, sandwich fillings and vegetables. It's fun to use your imagination to see just how many different ways you can use pecans to make a dish special.

As far as researchers can tell, pecan trees have been growing for thousands of years. A relative of the walnut and hickory, pecan trees are thought to have grown wild along rivers with flowing waters, which carried them throughout much of the country

Records of early Spanish and French explorers show that American Indian tribes inhabiting the Mississippi Valley, as far north as Illinois and into Western Texas and Southern Oklahoma, knew about pecan trees long before the discovery of America.

To select nuts in the shell which are of the highest quality, choose those that are clean and free of splits. cracks, stains or holes. There is no correlation between the quality of a nut and its size.

When selecting shelled pecans. look for plump nutmeats which are fairly uniform in color and size. The best ones have a golden

brown color You may choose halves for garnishes, but pecan pieces will suit most of your needs.

They usually cost less and will save you chopping time. Pecans are long lasting and, when stored properly, hold their freshness for up to two years. This means

pecans may be purchased in quantity when prices are

You can store unshelled pecans in a cool, dry place for about six months. Unshelled pecans resist insects and aging much longer than shelled nuts. However, shelling before

all year through

storage reduces their bulk by approximately one-half. Shelled or unshelled pecans may be kept under refrigeration in airtight containers for about nine months or stored in the freezer for up to two years. Pecans are usually the

preferred nut, especially for the holidays. The reason is their full, rich flavor. Unlike some other nuts, they contribute a lot more than crunchy texture to recipes.

Pecans can be enjoyed in a wide variety of ways all year round. Don't save them only for holiday baking. Instead, keep a supply of shelled pecan pieces on hand for ready use any time for casseroles, cookies or snacks.

Pecans also make excellent Christmas gifts, plain or prepared in favorite recipes.

Scratch Cake 1/2 cup butter or margarine

1/2 cup shortening 13/4 cups sugar 1 tsp. vanilla

1/2 tsp. lemon flavoring 4 eggs, well beaten 3 cups cake flour

3 tsp. baking powder 1/8 tsp. salt 1 cup milk

Cream butter or margarine, shortening, and

thoroughly. Add vanilla and lemon flavoring and beaten eggs. Mix well. Sift together flour, baking powder, and salt. Add flour mixture and milk to shortening mixture alternating, beginning and ending with the flour mixture. Pour in 3 well-greased and floured round or square 8inch cake pans. Bake at 375 degrees F for 25 to 30 minutes. Cool on cooling racks. Frost with Lemon Frosting. Makes one 3-layer 8inch cake.

VARIATION: Add 2 squares of melted chocolate to milk and use 2 teaspoons less of butter or margarine.

Lemon Frosting 21/2 cups powdered sugar

14 cup melted butter or margarine 1/8 tsp. grated lemon rind

14 cup lemon juice 1 tbsp. cream or evaporated

Combine all ingredients

and beat until smooth. If to thick, add a little more cream or milk. If too thin, add a little more powdered sugar.

What is a comet? No one knows exactly what comets

fragments. Scientists believe that in the cold darkness beyond the planets, Halley's Comet looks like a gigantic "dirty snowball" about three miles across. As it approaches the sun, solar heat vaporizes the ice into glowing gas. Dust coming off with the gas spreads out to form a luminus cloud or coma that grows as the comet approaches the sun. Gas and dust blown off by a "wind" from the sun stream out in a tail, which grows longer and brighter as the comet moves faster toward the sun.

Astronomers estimate that the head of Halley's Comet will expand more than 30,000 times to 100,000 miles in diameter. It's tail should extend 50,000 miles. From earth the comet may appear as long as 40 moons side by side.

selves will dim the happy Christmas season by causing accidents and injuries.

The Mississippi State Medical Association offers some simple tips for selecting toys that will help insure a completely happy Christ-

*Beware of small toys that can be swallowed, flammable toys, and toys with rough or sharp edges. *All electric toys should be

purchased with safety in mind. Look for the UL (underwriters Laboratory) label on the cord and on the toy it-

*Avoid toys made of lead or colored with lead-based paints. You're unlikely to encounter these today, as the dangers of lead poisoning are now well known. But it's wise
