BURNSVILLE MAN FOUND GUILTY OF MURDER

Frank Lambert, 20, of Burnsville was found guilty of murdering his father by a Tishomingo County jury after deliberating 2½ hours last

Friday. Judge Frank Russell read the verdict which was rendered by the 10-women, 2-men panel of jurors and then sentenced young Lambert to

the mandatory life in prison term.

During the course of the murder trial which got underway Wednesday,

Assistant District Attorney, Richard Bowen called 17 witnesses including the defendant's half-brother, Wayne Lambert, in whose home the

crime was committed. Frank Lambert had been living with his older brother for the past few years.

The victim, Jefferson Davis Lambert, 76, lived next door to his son's home. Testimony revealed that he died as the results of a shotgun blast to his left side. His body was found in the foyer or hallway at the Wayne Lambert residence.

Defense attorneys were Collier Carlton and Steve Farese.

John Creekmore and Richard Bowen, both assistant district attorneys, served as prosecutors in the case.

SENTENCES HANDED DOWN BY CIRCUIT JUDGE RUSSELL

Five sentences were handed down by Judge Frank Russell at the conclusion of the second week of circuit court in Tishomingo County and included:

Larry Dale Floyd—who entered a guilty plea on the charge of grand larceny—was placed under three years supervised probation with no sentence imposed and ordered to make restitution of \$600 and pay a fine of \$300. In view of Floyd's good record,

Judge Russell said he would be afforded the opportunity to keep the felony conviction off his record.

Johnny Owens entered a plea of guilty concerning the break-in of an auto and was sentenced to five years in prison, which was suspended. Owens was placed on three years supervised probation, ordered to pay restitution of \$140 and pay a \$300 fine.

Mark Jackal, charged with

possession with intent to sale marijuana, received a five year suspended sentence and was fined \$1,000. He was placed on three years of supervised probation.

Sharon Criddle Wood, who had entered a guilty plea to burglary of an automobile, was placed under three years unsupervised probation.

Tony Wood, Ms. Wood's ex-husband, was found guilty earlier in the week by a jury in connection with the same

burglary of an auto case. Judge Russell sentenced him to five years at a state prison facility. It was noted by Judge Russell that Wood had three prior felony convictions and has served two terms in prison.

All defendants on probation were instructed by Judge Russell that use of alcohol or drugs or any violation of probation would likely result in sentences in a state prison facility.

The following subjects have been selected by Iuka: Intermediate-Fire Behavior, Protective Breathing Apparatus, Rescue, and Fire Cause Determination. Other Causes-Tanker Operations and Pre-Fire Planning.

It is very important that each student bring a pencil and note pad to class. All fire and rescue personnel are especially urged to attend. Classes begin at 7 p.m. each day.

BURGLARY RING HAULTED FOLLOWING ARRESTS

A burglary ring which included the thefts at Marlin-Moore Chevrolet Inc., Kirks Tire Store, Gann's Furniture and K & R Furniture in Tishomingo County has been broken.

A lengthy probe recovered merchandise tied to a string of burglaries in Alcorn, Tishomingo, and Marshall counties in Mississippi and McNairy, Hardin, Hardeman, and Chester counties in Tennessee involving more than \$250,000 in stolen property over the last year.

Roger Dale Russell, 30, of the Strickland Community in Corinth was arrested on January 8, following the late night thefts at Marlin-Moore Chevrolet and K & R Furniture in Iuka. Russell was released following the

posting of a \$15,000 bond.

In coordinating efforts with law enforcement agencies in both states, Russell's arrest led to another and the ring of thefts was broken. Nine arrests have been made thus far.

William Earl "Billy" Burress, of Corinth, has been linked to fifty or more of these burglaries. The suspect escaped Alcorn County custody Saturday, January 25, after agreeing to make a "buy" for authorities as part of the probe. The suspect wired for sound was to buy back stolen goods from another suspect.

Warrants have been issued for Burress, according to Iuka Police Floyd Whitaker. At present he remains at large.

SHUTTLE LAUNCH ENDS IN DISASTER

Americans were shocked with disbelief Tuesday as the space shuttle, Challenger exploded 74 seconds after lift-

off sending schoolteacher Christa McAuliffe and six NASA astronauts to a fiery death in the sky eight miles out from Kennedy Space Center.

The fatal explosion might have originated in the giant external tank which turned into a fireball and destroyed the Challenger high above the Atlantic while family members and NASA officials watched in despair from the Cape.

The astronauts aboard the space shuttle Challenger had no way to escape the vehicle once it left the launch pad, a NASA spokesman said. It is doubtful any escape mechanism would have helped the crew in Tuesday's explosion.

"We will not speculate as to the specific cause of the explosion based on that footage," said Jesse Moore, NASA's top shuttle administrator. It will take a "careful review" of all data "before we can reach any conclusions."

The crew of Challenger included three trained pilots, an expert on lasers, the second American woman to fly in space, a Hughes Aircraft Corp. engineer and a Concord, N.H., school teacher flying as the first citizen in space. These included:

*Francis R. Scobee, 46, Commander of the flight and making his second space shuttle mission.

*Mike Smith, 40, Challenger's Pilot and a commander in the U.S. Navy.

*Ronald McNair, 36, expert on lasers. The Challenger mission was his second space flight.

*Air Force Lt. Col. Ellison S. Onizuka, 39, making his second space flight.

*Astronaut Judy Resnik, 36, second space shuttle mission.

*Gregory Jarvis, 41, a Hughes Aircraft Co. engineer.

*Sharon Christa McAuliffe, 37, a Concord, N.H. high school social studies teacher who was the first private citizen selected in national competition to fly on the space shuttle.

The horrifying news has brought a state of mourning to all in our county. Television sets were turned on in classrooms as students watched the actual launching of the Challenger and witnessed the catastrophic explosion. In Iuka, Mayor John H. Biggs ordered all city flags to be flown at half-mast through Monday in honor of those seven heroes.

President Ronald Reagan designated a week of mourning in honor of the seven astronauts and reaffirmed America's commitment to space exploration.

In addition to the Development Foundation, the following members serve on the Development Authority: Rilla Wiley, 1st District; Treva Belue, 2nd District; Harold Lomenick, 3rd District, and David Graham, 5th District. Members of the Development Foundation and the Development Authority serve

jointly. The members of the Board of Directors of the Foundation serve as volunteers and receive no pay for their services. 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Coyote Meeting A Success

Over 260 attended a program which was presented by Dr. Ed Hill, Professor of Wildlife, School of Forestry Resources, MSU. Greg Yarrow, Area Extension Wildlife/Forestry Specialist, helped coordinate the effort which also included a presentation on the purpose of landowner cooperatives by Pat Allen, a member of the Red Bud Conservation League.

This program is an example of efforts by the Cooperative Extension Service and other agencies in the county to

meet the educational needs of citizens.

Conservation Reserve Program

A key feature of the 1985 farm bill passed by Congress in late 1985 may be of interest to Tishomingo County farmers.

The conservation reserve part of the bill is an attempt to remove highly erodible cropland from production and reduce surplus crop production. Nationwide, five million acres of erodible land will be removed from production in 1986, with 40 million acres

removed by 1989.

In some instances, the conservation reserve program will take farmland out of production that really shouldn't be in row crop production.

A new twist in the program is that farmers will make bids to the federal government to take erodible cropland out of production.

If you are interested in taking some of your erodible cropland out of production, you submit a bid for a specified sum per acre. The land's production potential, as well as many other factors, will play in your decision on how low and how high you are willing to bid. The bid is on a per acre per year basis for the 10-year period.

The government is not obligated to accept your bid, and whether you bid is actually accepted will depend on bids from other farmers in your county as well as other factors. To reduce the possible impact agribusiness, no more than 25 percent of the total cropland in Tishomingo County or any other county can be part of the conservation reserve.

Keep in mind that the conservation reserve applies only to eligible erodible cropland. To be eligible, the land must be eroding at twice the Soil Conservation Service tolerance (T) level, which on most soils is either three or five tons of topsoil per acre per year.

The land must have been in row crops for two years during the period of 1981 to 1985.

To take part, you have to agree to keep the land you have bid on out of production

for 10 years. You will receive the amount of your bid annually, if it is accepted.

You have the option to either plant the land in trees or pastures, provided the pastures are not grazed or cut for hay at any time during the 10-year life of the program.

There will be financial help available on a cost-share basis from the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service for converting land in the conservation reserve to trees or pastures.

There will be information available soon about a sign-up period and other details. Once the sign up period is announced, you will have 10 days to sign up. All this should take place by early March.

When the sign-up period is announced, bids will be accepted at the ASCS office. Bring information on the exact fields you want to bid on, whether you intend to plant trees or pasture, the acreage of each field, crops grown in the fields from 1981 to 1985, any conservation practices used on the fields and your bid. ASCS can not accept your bid until the announced sign-up period.

Representatives from SCS and the Forest Service will be there to evaluate your eligibility, answer your questions and possibly do on-site evaluations.

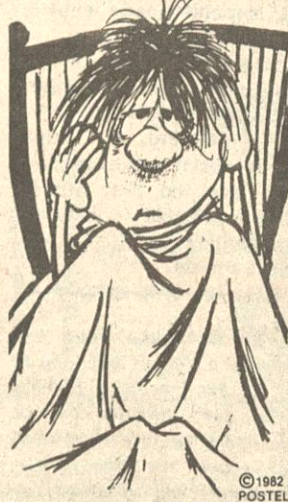

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TRUE OR FALSE

1. Food poisoning is a minor problem today since only about 5,000 cases occur each year.

2. Food poisoning isn't that serious -- after a day or two of discomfort, you're fine.

3. One way to avoid food poisoning is to taste a little bit of the suspected food and throw it out if it tastes strange.

4. You can tell when food poisoning bacteria are present because of their odor.

5. Freezing your child's meat or poultry sandwiches the night before can help keep them safe for the next day's school lunch.

6. Using a freeze-pack in your lunch bag can thwart food poisoners.

7. You can avoid food poisoning by making sure that foods are not left at room temperature for more than two hours.

8. It's a good idea to thaw foods at room temperature, because food poisoning bacteria can't live in that temperature range.

9. Food poisoning comes only from fresh milk, meat or poultry. Canned foods are always safe.

10. As long as food is in a cooler, you can leave it almost anywhere during your picnic.

ANSWERS

1. False. Despite canning and a host of other technological advances, food poisoning is still a significant problem. An estimated two million cases occur each year.

2. False. Some kinds of food poisoning, like botulism, are very dangerous. And any poisoning can be serious in children, the elderly or people who are already in poor health.

3. False. Never taste food that you think might be unsafe. Even small amounts of some food poisoning bacteria or the poisons they produce can be very dangerous. A good rule of thumb is: When in doubt, throw it out!

4. False. Most food poisoning bacteria are odorless, colorless and tasteless.

5. True. Freezing sandwiches overnight is a good way to right the food poisoners. But mayonnaise, lettuce and tomatoes don't freeze well. These can be packed separately and added at lunchtime.

6. True. A commercial freeze-pack in the brown bag or lunch box keeps the rest of your lunch colder. A cold canned drink, frozen sandwich or ice-filled plastic refrigerator dish can help, too.

7. True. Food poisoning bacteria thrive at room temperature (60-100 degrees Fahrenheit). Letting food sit out for more than two hours provides a fine opportunity

The annual tree planting event has been observed since 1975. In 1985, all 82 counties participated in Tree Planting Week.

W.R. Wimbish, chairman of the Tishomingo County Soil and Water Conservation District, says 10,000 trees will be given away to elementary school children and residents through out Tishomingo County during the observance.

People in Tishomingo County will join other Mississippians in acknowledging the many contributions trees make to their daily lives. Benefits from Mississippi's forest and wood products are essential to the economic, recreational, and environmental needs of all.

During 1985, more than 51,800 Mississippi school children at 501 schools took part in Tree Planting Week activities. More than four million trees were planted throughout the state during the five-day observance.

Mississippi is blessed with abundant forests; more than half of the state's land area is in trees. But several million acres of land best suited for growing timber, need planting or conversion from low value scrub timber to pine trees. Many of these idle and unproductive acres are in Tishomingo County.

Tree Planting Week is a good time for Mississippi landowners to check the needs of their timberlands and make plans for a forestry program that will benefit them in the future.

CARING FOR YOUR PET



Anti-Freeze Can Kill

As more and more people do their own automobile work, anti-freeze and coolant are found around more and more homes. This substance can be fatal to small pets and young children if accidentally ingested.

And it doesn't take much. Just a teaspoon can kill a small child or inquisitive pet.

Small children and pets don't know any better. The anti-freeze or coolant smells sweet-like something good to eat. So they decide to sample it. The results is always serious, many times fatal.

If you drain the old anti-freeze out of your car or truck, it should be flushed down the sewer drain since it is biodegradable. And any of the substance that has spilled onto the driveway or street should be thoroughly washed away-with no puddle for children and/or pets to get into. The same is true of coolant that might be added to the vehicle in the spring.

All anti-freeze and coolant should be stored on a high shelf-well out of the reach of children and pets. And the containers should be tightly sealed.

Remember that kittens like to climb, so a high shelf may not be sufficient to keep the container away from their playful paws. Therefore, before storing the container, it should be thoroughly rinsed off to remove any of the substance that might have gotten on the outside.

Signs of anti-freeze in-

toxication may develop within one hour after ingestion. The animal becomes depressed, reluctant to move and weak. It may show signs of vomiting, loss of appetite, excitement and convulsions. Insoluble crystals form in the tubules of the kidney, causing kidney failure with resulting uremia and death.

Successful treatment for poisoning of this type is difficult. It depends on early diagnosis so that treatment can begin at once. If you even suspect your pet has ingested some anti-freeze or coolant-even just a little-contact your veterinarian immediately.

Because the success rate of treatment for anti-freeze/coolant poisoning is not good, especially in advanced cases, prevention is most important. Properly dispose of all used anti-freeze and containers. Wash away any that might have spilled on the ground or driveway.

Don't take a chance with the life of your child or your pet. And don't take a chance with the life of someone else's child or pet. Use caution when handling and storing poisonous substances.

Presentation of Survey Available To Local Clubs

Beth Davis, left, and Rilla Willey are participating in the George McLean Leadership Conference being held in Tupelo. This is the first conference to be held and it is funded by a grant from the McLean Institute for Community Development at the University of Mississippi. The conference is designed to create and develop a wide base of leadership in Northeast Mississippi. The long-range goal is to raise the economic and cultural level of Northeast Mississippi.

The Conference began in October with a two day retreat in Tupelo and will continue during the year with day-long meetings each month held at the University Center in Tupelo. Tishomingo County has joined with Alcorn and Prentiss to complete a project to benefit the communities. Part of this project includes a survey of the county to determine what

the citizens of the county feel are the greatest needs of our area. Beth and Rilla will be contacting groups such as civic clubs, PTA, community development groups, etc. asking that members of these groups complete the survey form.

This community survey form asks the question "What do you think are the five most important needs from a list of twenty?" These issues include needs involving government, beautification, education, economic development and others. Another section of the survey asks participants to check which of ten items they would be in favor, such as increased taxes for specified goals; appointed officials, consolidation of services, and others.

The group has initiated the project in the belief that people will support and cooperate with those programs in the community that they believe to be important and significant. The McLean Conference is seeking participation from people throughout Tishomingo County. Forms will be available at the libraries and Chambers of Commerce in the area of Tishomingo, Alcorn, and Prentiss Counties. Results of the survey will

be compiled and made available to the public through the newspapers. The group plans to then seek methods of meeting the needs deemed significant by the greatest number of participants and to begin measures to accomplish these goals.

Beth and Rilla will be happy to present the survey forms at any meetings in the county that finds the survey interesting. The survey form has already been presented to the Iuka Lions Club; the Iuka Pilot Club, the Tishomingo County Development Foundation; and the Tishomingo County Economic Development Authority. The survey was presented to the 20th Century Club January 23.

The Leadership Conference was held January 22, in Tupelo and featured the theme "Attracting and Holding Industrial Jobs". Bill Barrett of the Northeast Mississippi Development office in West Point and Harry Martin of the Tupelo Community Development office.

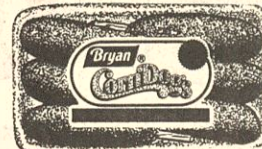

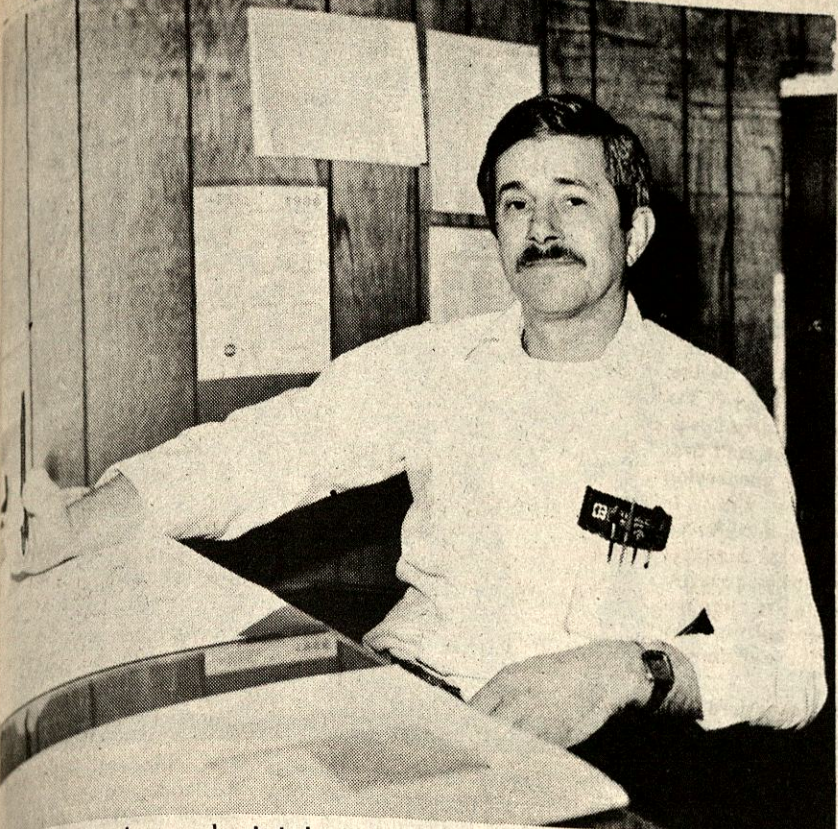

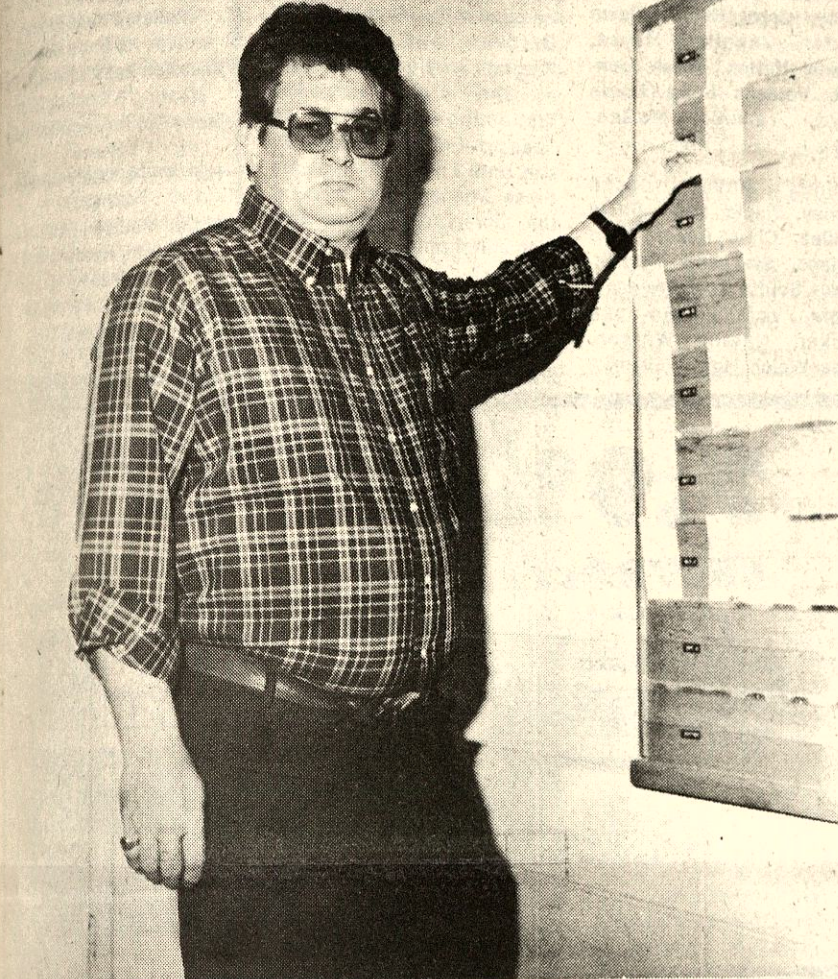

Local Buying Station Helps Swine Producers

Northeast Mississippi swine producers again have a fair and convenient market for their animals after several months with no local market. The newly formed Itawamba County Swine Buying Association recently established a buying station for area producers. The non-profit association was established after the processing plant in Tupelo stopped buying live animals last February.

When the plant stopped buying, small producers were left without a local market for their animals, said Jimmy Luther, Itawamba County Extension agent. "The added time and expense of carrying animals to a distant market or auction was putting many small producers out of business," Luther said. "That is the reason we worked so hard to establish this buying station. We want to keep producers in business."

With help from the Itawamba County Pork Producers Association, Fair Association, Development Council and the Mississippi Cooperative Extension Service, a temporary station is in operation on the ground of Fulton Grain in Fulton. A permanent station and facilities are planned. The station, which began operating last October, is open Tuesdays from 7 a.m. to 1 p.m. It is located just off Highway 78 east, across from the weigh station.

Bryan Foods buys top hogs from the association for 50 cents per hundred-weight below the highest St. Louis price for the morning they are sold. Payment is made at the time of delivery.

The station charges a 50-cent per animal handling fee which covers the cost of checks, telephone bills, postage and other expenses.

"The station is meant to help small producers," Luther said. "We are set up for the producers who generally sell less than 20 hogs at a time."

deep sky object, said Smith. Smith had a 275# telescope with lens power equivalent to a 2,000 telephoto. His reflector telescope had a 14.5 inch mirror. "After a 'relatively short' 10 minute exposure and an elaborate technical procedure, Smith got his picture." The Comet appeared last in 1910, but no amateur could dream of exposing its image because film was so slow. Back in 1910 only an observatory could get a picture. Smith's next shot at photographing the Comet will be in April.

Our astronauts at the Space Center reported their devices would not work. Mission Control told astronauts Nelson and Hawley to take long exposures of the Comet. They reported they made five different exposures but, "I'm not certain how bright they are going to be."

On February 6th, 1986, the tail of the Comet will be the longest and brightest. It will not be visible from Earth. The best view will be from Venus, 27 million miles away. The National Aeronautics and Space Administration will have a spacecraft orbiting Venus and in position of

taking pictures and obtain scientific data. The Venus Orbiter has been sending back information about Venus, Earth's sister planet since 1978. After Haley's Comet grows smaller and smaller and finally disappears from public view at the end of April 1986. Scientists will continue to gain knowledge from the visit. They may learn that which they never expected to learn. Scientists from 40 countries are cooperating in a ground and space based effort known as The International Haley watch, with the help of amateurs, such as photographer Smith. World wide they will gather more information about Haley's Comet than was collected in the previous centuries.

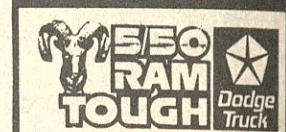

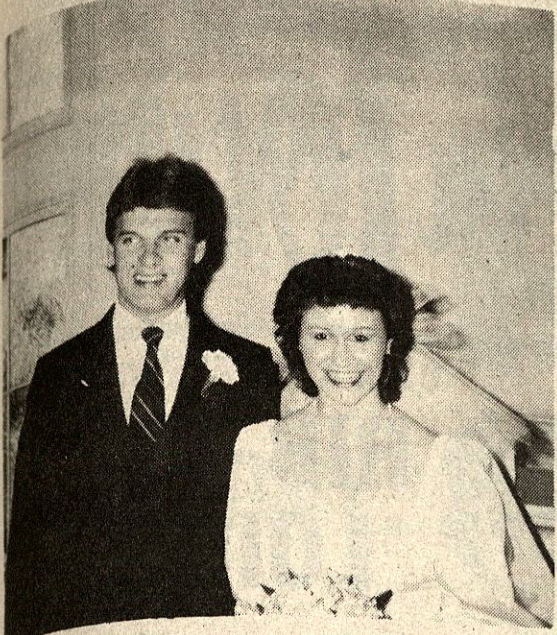

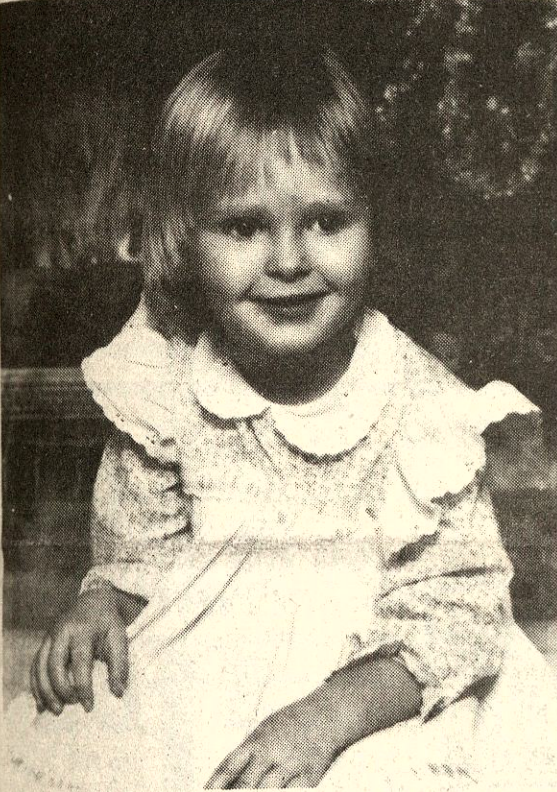

In the course of her experience the Requisite shot down four suicide planes and

assisted in destroying a fifth; sank four suicide boats, and swept mines from the waters of the Kwajalein and Eniwetok Atolls and the main islands of Japan. She also swept mines ahead of invading forces in Ormoc Bay, Subic Bay, and Lingayen Gulf in the Philippines.

Shelton Russell Soon Returns To States

Aboard the USS Henry A. Wiley Shelton L. Russell, seaman first class, Route 1, Tishomingo, Mississippi will leave for the United States soon on the destroyer minesweeper, now at anchor in Sasebo, Harbor, Japan.

The vessel participated in the Okinawa action as a radar-picket ship. Since the surrender she has been engaged in sweeping operation from Korea and the Yellow Sea to Formosa and Shanghai.

The Wiley is perhaps the only ship in the fleet credited with knocking two baka bombs from the air. She was under enemy air attack more than sixty times and shot down 17 Jap planes.

Pearl Harbor, T H T/5 Wallace Amerson of Iuka, is one of 1,360 high point army veterans whom the Navy is returning to the States for discharge aboard the USS Cape Esperance, an escort carrier of the "Magic Carpet" fleet. This ship left Pearl Harbor, January 17, and scheduled to arrive in San Pedro about January 23.

The USS Cape Esperance operated during the Pacific war primarily as a transport, carrying planes and pilots in to forward areas where they were used in the U.S. island-to-island offensive against Japan.

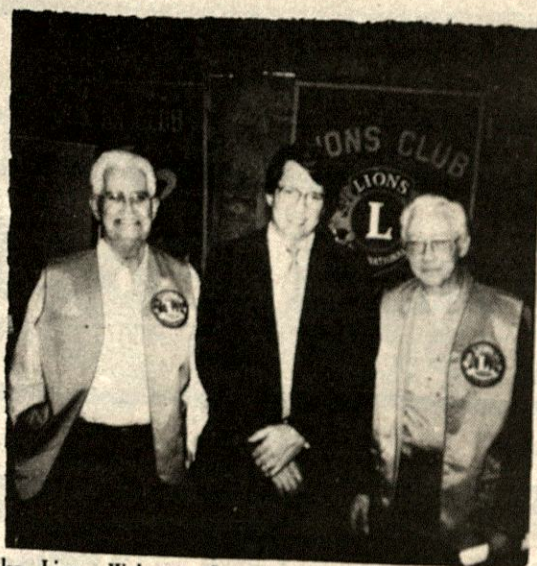

Where most parents make their mistake of initiating this discussion is after their children are already involved in drugs. That's too late! Discussion can be started as early as middle elementary, because children at this age may already have some knowledge of the drug scene. Remember, as a parent you should talk to your children before there's a problem.
