Mitchel Payne Celebrates 101st Birthday

On Saturday, February 15, Mitchell Payne, of Tishomingo celebrated his 101st birthday. Mr. Payne, affectionately called "Unc" by his family, was born February 15, 1885 to Liza Ann Payne and Dan Comer of Alsboro, Alabama. There were four other children in his family, 3 sisters and one brother, all of them now deceased.

Most of his life he lived in Alabama in the area of Cherokee and Lime Kil. He liked to fish and hunt, and enjoyed playing baseball. He remembers his grandmother, Mimi Payne well. His mother, as well as his grandmother, lived during slavery and could tell many stories relating to that time. His grandmother recalled being re-named Judy by a

white slave owner. His mother lived to be 100 years old, and his grandmother to be 106, and was blind the last 15 years of her life. He can remember before electricity and the first automobiles. The first automobile, he remembers seeing was in Iowa, where he was working in the coal mines. It was many years later though before he bought a car.

In 1920, Mitchell married Maggie Douglas. They never had any children. They owned a farm in Alabama raising cotton and corn. Mr. Payne was one of the first black men in this area to own a tractor, a "Farmall" he recalls.

After Maggie's death in 1958 or 1959, he did some traveling, visiting places

like Iowa, Wyoming, North Dakota, Chicago, Texas, Arizona, Birmingham, Memphis and St. Louis.

On January 12, 1986, Mr. Payne came to live at his present location, the home of his great-nephew, Willis and Jannette Thorne of Route 2, Tishomingo. He was planning to go into a nursing home, but the Thornes invited him to stay with them on a trial basis telling him if it did not work out he could go on to the nursing home. The situation has worked out fine for both Mr. Payne and the Thornes. He says he likes living there and feels at home.

He is able to be up and about and can care for himself. When he first came to live here he was walking with a cane, but can now walk without this aid. He is a member of the Baptist Church and loves discussing the Bible and has the New Testament scriptures on recorded tapes. He likes watching the news and sports on T.V. and usually goes to bed around 10:00 p.m. When The News asked if he thought he inherited his long life from his mother and grandmother, he replied, "I reckon so".

Mrs. Thorne tells us they are overjoyed to have "Unc" living in their home. "He's no problem," she said. "He takes care of himself, bathes and dresses himself very neat." Not a fussy eater, "Unc" enjoys all the meals Jannette fixes for the family and doesn't complain at all. "The whole family tries very hard to let "Unc" know that he is loved very much and wanted here," she said.

On Saturday, February 15, "Unc" celebrated his birthday with a party in the Thorne home. They had New Orleans Fried Chicken, cake, ice cream and everyone sang, "Happy Birthday".

Iuka High Band To Participate In Music Festival

The Iuka Chieftain Marching Band, "The Spirit of Iuka," will be participating in The Smoky Mountain International Music Festival Competition in Gatlinburg, Tennessee, on May 2nd and 3rd.

The Smoky Mountain Music Festival, in only its 4th year of existence, has rapidly grown to become one of the most prestigious musical youth events in the United States. In the past four years 169 bands from over 21 states and two Canadian Provinces have attended the competition. The Director of the Competition is Dr. Jay Julian, the Director of Bands at the University of Tennessee.

"The Spirit of Iuka" will compete for top honors in their classification in field show, as well as Best Overall Drum Major, Drum Line, and

Color Guard. The Iuka Chieftain Marching Band has already won over twenty titles this school year. This will be Iuka's first truly National Championship competition.

The Band is under the direction of Robin Wofford and is composed of 67 Members - 27 horns, 19 percussion, 14 flags, 6 rifles and a drum major. Other staff members include Lynn Tynner, Color Guard and Bobby Patrick-Horn Line.

All funds to finance this band trip will be raised with community support. Details on fund raisers will be announced later. Already tentatively scheduled is a Spaghetti Supper on Friday, February 28th, a Band Concert on Sunday, March 2nd, and a Special Band Day on Saturday, April 5th.

Day Care Accepting Applications For Admission

Tishomingo County Special Services director, Eugene Tennison, reports that the Day Care Center, located at the Vo-Tech Center in Tishomingo now has a few openings for children 3 through 6 years of age.

The Day Care Center is certified and licensed by the Mississippi Department of Public Welfare and the Mississippi State Board of Health. The center is staffed by licensed and certified teachers.

The center is funded for fifty-four children. Handicapped children are accepted for physical, emotional or social handicaps. While the center provides professional child care services, the services are highly structured, planned and presented learning activities specifically directed toward correcting any developmental delays the children may have experienced.

The philosophy of the facility is to provide for children's development in all of the major psychological processes of perceptual motor, cognitive, language, motivational and socio-emotional functioning, as well as the physical aspects of development. The center provides evaluation and assessment services in all of these areas with individual prescriptive educational plans to reach maximum development by the time they are ready for first grade.

Eastland Dies At 81

Former Senator James O. Eastland died Wednesday, February 19, 1986, at the Greenwood-Lefflore County Hospital. Reports indicated he died as the result of multiple medical problems complicated by pneumonia. He was 81-years-old.

A Democrat, he was one of the most powerful members of Congress during his 37 years in office.

T.C.D.F. Directors To Conduct Open Meeting

What is TCDF? Who is involved? What is being done to attract new jobs to our county? What can we do to improve the quality of life here? What is economic development?

The Board of Directors meeting of the Tishomingo County Development Foundation will be held Thursday, February 20, 1986, at 7:00 p.m., in the Court room of the Tishomingo County Courthouse in Iuka. This will be the first of four "Open Meetings" at which the Board will be present, the TCDF members are invited and the general public is encouraged

to attend. The earlier meeting last week was cancelled because of the ice and snow. This meeting is designed to give the public an opportunity to learn about industrial recruitment to the County; how the Foundation is organized and functions with the County, State and local towns; what the State of Mississippi provides for new business development, and how TVA's Economic and Community Development Division helps in the process.

Water Association Announces Increase

To help with the increasing cost of maintenance and with expenses incurred with the installation of our new filter plant, it will be necessary for the Holcut-Cairo Water Association to increase its rates and make some policy changes beginning April 1, 1986.

These changes are essential to insure that consumers will receive the service they deserve from our community water system. The new changes will be as follows:

1. The first 2,000 gallons of water used is \$7.50. Each 1,000 gallons of water used thereafter will be \$1.25.
2. All water bills must be paid within 60 days of the billing date (your water bill will be the only notice sent) or service will be discontinued.
3. There will be a \$25.00 reconnecting fee if service was discontinued for non-payment of a bill.
4. There will be a \$10.00 service charge on all returned checks.
5. All late water bills must be mailed to Holcut-Cairo Water or paid at Isbell's Grocery (Cairo) during store hours.

length of time. Weather conditions the day of the disappearance possibly led officials to the conclusion that Mr. James had apparently drowned. Weather conditions since that time have hampered rescue efforts.

The fisherman's boat, equipment and personal items were located late the same day. A small dog belonging to the James family had gone to the lake with him and was also found by authorities. No foul play is suspected in the incident.

Search Continues For Iuka Man

All efforts to locate the body of G.P. "Gresham" James, of Iuka, have been futile thus far; however, Fish and Game officials along with numerous volunteers still closely monitor the waters along Chalk Mine Hollow near Eastport.

Mr. James has been missing since February 4th, when he went out alone in a small fishing craft to make a routine check of trot lines. Law officials were notified when the 69-year-old failed to return within a reasonable

Seed Supplies in 1986
Soybean seed supplies
may not be plentiful for the
1986 planting season. The
supply of soybean seed was
below normal because of ad-
verse weather in the latter
part of the harvesting season
last year.

If you are not planning to
buy soybean seed, but have
saved some of your own seed
for use this season, have that
seed checked for quality.

To make sure the seed is
suitable for planting, take a
sample from the seed in
storage.

To take a sample of stored
seed, probe the seed stock as
deeply as possible to get
seed from as much of the bin
as possible. Take many sam-
ples, then mix the seed in the
samples. Send about a pint of
seed to a seed testing lab for
a germination and purity test.

Cotton supplies are plen-
tiful and may be less expen-
sive this year. Seed quality
from the mid-South is the
best in recent years.

If you are not purchasing
cotton seed and plan to use
your own, follow the same
procedure as described for
soybean seed.

Contact your county agent
for more information about
seed testing.

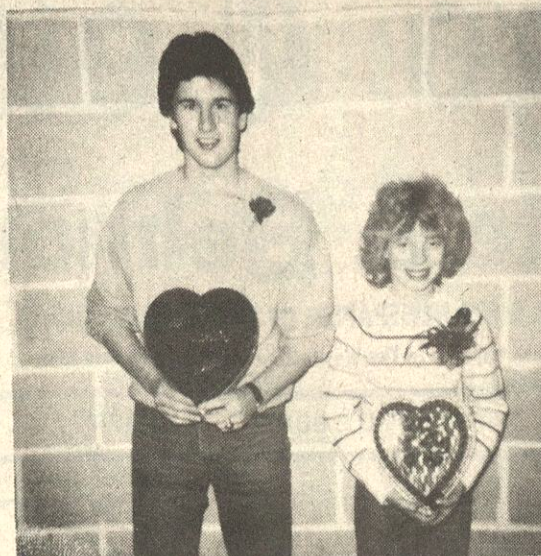

How To Spend Less
And Save More

After achieving the basic
necessities, the money you
earn helps you get the com-
forts of life either now or in
the future. They way you

saving decisions eventually
determines when or if you will
achieve financial security
throughout your life-span.
The secret to financial suc-
cess is a regular savings plan
started as early in life as
possible.

If you are having difficulty
saving, here are some
suggestions to help you have
enough left over to save.

Set up a regular savings
program and pay your savings
first. Set aside amounts for
an emergency fund, then an
IRA, followed by a fund for
purchase of big ticket items
and general savings for
financial security. Save
something each pay period.

Carefully evaluate spend-
ing decisions. Make every
spending decision on the
basis of how it will satisfy
your goals. Eliminate spend-
ing for items that have little
or no value.

Shop harder to get the
best buys. Compare prices,
frequent sales and discount
houses.

Switch to less expensive
goods and do-it-yourself ser-
vices.

Avoid the use of credit
when possible.

Perspiration Stains Damage Clothing

Perspiration is hard on
clothing. Perspiration con-
tains skin scales, soils and
salts that cause deteriorating
effects in many dyes and
fabrics. Perspiration may
cause color loss if left in
clothing too long. The misuse
of antiperspirants and
deodorants may also cause
dyes and fabrics to
deteriorate.

To clean washable fabrics
with perspiration stains spray
the stained area with a
prewash spray and launder.
If the perspiration odor or stain
remains, soak in a solution of
one quart warm water, one-
half teaspoon liquid hand-
washing detergent and one
teaspoon ammonia for 30
minutes. Rinse with water.
Then soak in a solution of one
quart warm water and one
teaspoon vinegar for one
hour. Rinse with water. Dry.
If the stain still persists,
bleaching may remove the
faint traces of stain. Use
bleach as directed on the
container label. Before
bleaching, test the dye of a
garment in an inconspicuous
section to be sure the color
will not fade.

For nonwashable fabrics,
the removal of perspiration
stains and soil is very com-
plex and best left to a
professional drycleaner.

The Coronary Care Unit is
the place to be if you have
chest pain. These symptoms-
chest pain, shortness of
breath, weakness, profuse
sweating, serve as a warning
of a pending disaster and the
need for highly specialized in-
tervention. Once admitted to
the Coronary Care Unit (CCU),
the patient is connected to a
heart monitor that con-
tinuously screens the elec-
trical activity of the heart. The
Nurse observes this electrical

activity (and the patients of
course) and reacts im-
mediately if problems occur.

The CCU Nurse is a
specialist and must con-
tinuously update nursing
skills in order to stay abreast
of current literature and prac-
tice.

Just recently, Dr. Scott
Segars inserted a temporary
transvenous pacemaker into
the heart of a patient suf-
fering acute heart block and
heart failure. This was the fir-

st time a pacemaker had been
inserted at Tishomingo County
Hospital and marked the
beginning of a new era in
patient care services
available in Tishomingo
County.

The Coronary Care Unit is
just one of many services
available to the people of
Tishomingo County at your
local hospital. The hospital is
sensitive to the health needs
of our county and will con-
tinue to provide quality ser-
vices to meet these needs.

CARING FOR YOUR PET



Many plants used to
add color and charm to
homes throughout the
year are a potential
danger to young children
and small pets.

In all, more than 700
plants, many of them
readily found around the
home, cause gastroen-
teritis if ingested. If
eaten in sufficient quan-
tities, some plants may
cause death.

Children who don't
know better, or are
teething, like teething
puppies and kittens,
tend to chew on any ac-
cessible item around the
house. To them, the
flowers are pretty,
therefore, may be tasty.

Some of the more
familiar plants that are
toxic if ingested are:
philodendron, caladium,
dieffenbachia, English
ivy, clematis, daffodil,
iris, hyacinth, elephant's
ear and azaleas. And the
list goes on and on.

Different parts of dif-
ferent plants are toxic.
Sometimes, the leaves
may be poisonous. Other
times, the bulb. In some
cases, it may be the
flower or the stem. You
should, therefore, use
caution with all parts of
the plant. Keep them
away from small children

and from curious pets.
Mature animals, like
older children, are less
likely to become the in-
nocent victims of toxic
plants. The older
children have been
taught not to sample
such things, and the
older animals seem to
know it instinctively.

When working with
plants of any kind, take
added precautions if
there are small children
and/or pets present.

If you suspect a child
has ingested a part of a
poisonous plant, or a
plant you are not certain
about, contact your
family physician at once.
If you suspect your pet
has been gnawing on a
dangerous or suspect
plant, contact your
family veterinarian.

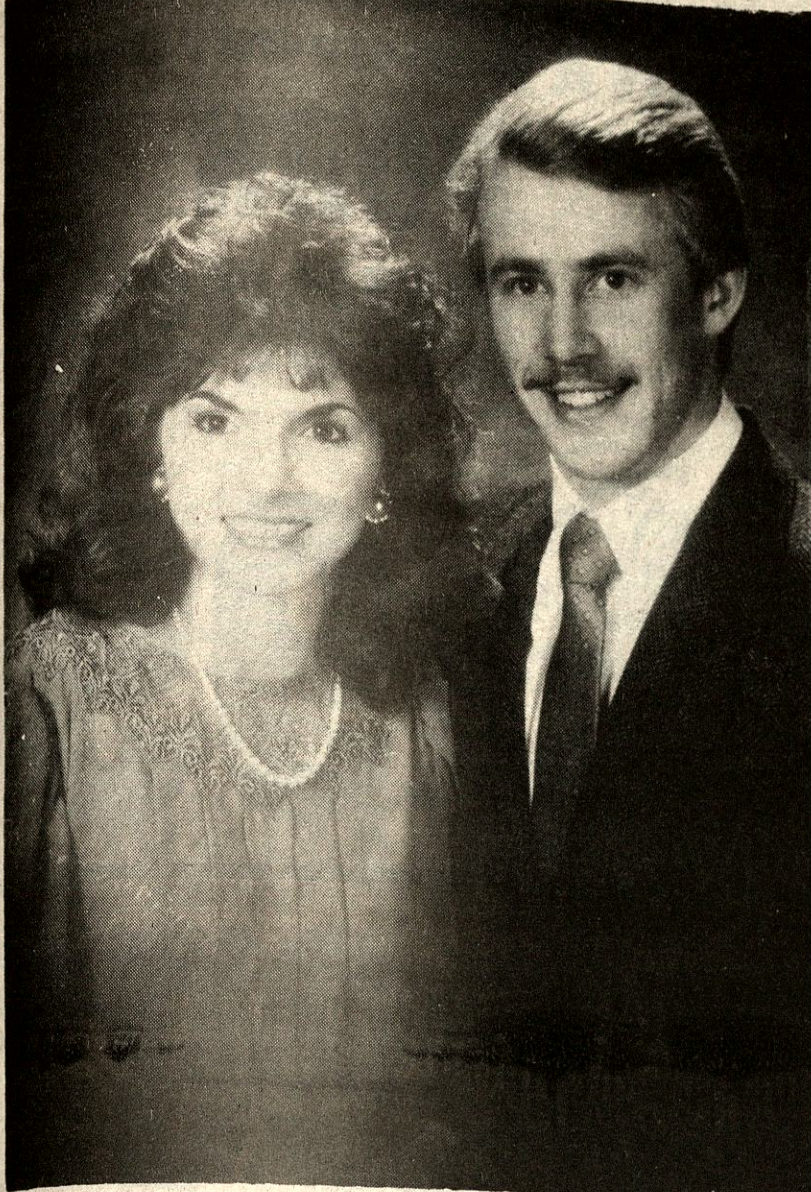

Farm Program Signup Begins March 3

"We will begin accepting applications for the 1986 wheat and feed grain programs on March 3," Howard R. Bridges, chairperson of the Tishomingo County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, said. Secretary of Agriculture John R. Block recently announced a 25 percent acreage reduction program for wheat and a 20 percent reduction for feed grains.

In addition to price support loans and deficiency payments, Bridges said farmers who sign up and comply with the acreage reduction program requirements will be eligible for land diversion payments on an acreage equal to 2 1/2 percent of the crop acreage

bases. "Farmers may request 100 percent of their land diversion payments and 40 percent of their projected deficiency payments when they sign up."

Land diversion payment rates are \$1.10 per bushel for wheat, \$.73 for corn, \$.65 for sorghum, \$.57 for barley, and \$.36 per bushel for oats. The 10 percent additional paid

diversion option for winter wheat producers is \$2.00 per bushel.

Bridges said program participants will be eligible to earn deficiency payments on the acres planted within the permitted. "Those who plant at least 50 percent of the permitted acreage to the program crop and plant the remaining permitted acreage

to a non-program crop, other than soybeans or extra long staple cotton, will be eligible to receive deficiency payments on 92 percent of the permitted acreage."

Estimated per bushel deficiency payment rates are: wheat, \$1.83; corn, \$1.03; sorghum, \$.98; barley, \$.95 and oats, \$.45.

He said winter wheat producers who reduce the acreage planted to wheat so that it does not exceed 65 percent of the farm's wheat base will be eligible to receive diversion payments of \$2.00 per bushel on an acreage equivalent to 10 percent of the wheat base.

According to Bridges, 75 percent of the advance deficiency payments will be paid in cash during signup, and the remaining 25 percent will be paid as payment-in-kind beginning April 30. "Farmers will have from April 30 through September 30 to request the PIK portion of their advance deficiency and/or diversion payments."

Farmers with commodity loans outstanding after

signup closes must redeem their loan with their PIK. Farmers who do not have commodity loans, or whose commodity loans are insufficient to meet their PIK entitlements, will be issued negotiable certificates in the net remaining monetary amount due them.

"A farmer who accepts an advance payment, and who later does not comply with program provisions must refund the amount of the advance payment with interest."

The ASCS official said contracts signed by program participants will be considered binding and will provide for liquidated damages for failure to comply with program regulations.

Further clarification of the 1986 acreage reduction programs may be obtained by contacting the Tishomingo County ASCS office. Program signup ends April 11.

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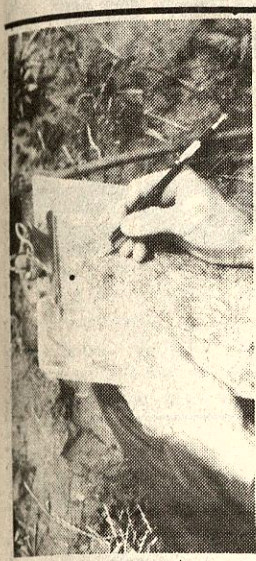
Burnsville FBLA Receives Awards

Soil Conservation Notes

By: Bobby Manley
To determine the maximum safe use for an area, something must be known about the soil. A soil survey can supply the needed information. A soil survey reveals what can be learned about a soil from field examination - how deep it is; its inherent productivity; whether it is wet or dry, sandy or sticky; how much slope it has; how badly eroded it is; if it contains salts; and other important information. The information gathered in the field is supplemented by laboratory studies.

The information from a soil survey is interpreted for many uses. Many interpretations are for non-farm uses such as road construction, home building, laying pipelines, and suburban planning. But one of the most widely used interpretations - the land capability classification - is for devising a farm or ranch conservation plan. In this classification the individuals soils are grouped according to the crops they are capable of producing and the risk of soil damage if they are mismanaged. There are eight major groups and these are designated by the Roman numerals I to VII. Soils in classes I thru III are suitable for cultivation. For more information on soil surveys and their uses, please contact the Soil Conservation Service office in Iuka.

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Childhood Nutrition

Recommended energy needs for children are 1,300 calories for ages 1 through 3 and 1,700 calories for ages 4 through 6. Between ages 11 and 18, boys are allowed about 600 more calories than girls. But both sexes, because of rapid growth, should eat about as much as young adults, and somewhat more than people over 50.

Many American children are obese, however. One way to help avoid overweight is to encourage exercise, minimize sugary, fatty desserts and snacks, and maximize the use of fresh fruits and skim milk. Even though a child begins to control his own diet in adolescence, early training will have its influence.

Like adults, children should eat mostly from the cereal, bread (preferably whole meal), bean, vegetable, and fruit groups. They may eat moderately of milk, cheese, yogurt, lean meat, poultry, fish, nuts, and eggs. They should eat less sugar, butter, margarine, and other oils. This means few candies, bakery goods, potato chips, and soft drinks.

Children should be accustomed to low-salt diets from infancy since high blood pressure is thought to begin in childhood for many people.

PUBLIC HEARING NOTICE

TVA's Power Program Reorganized

A reorganization of TVA's power program was announced today by Robert C. Steffy, Jr., whose new title will be Manager of Power.
Steffy previously held the title of Manager of Power and Engineering (Supply and Use). That organization is being renamed into the Office of Power. It will have responsibility for all of TVA's power program, with the exception of the nuclear plants and their support activities which will remain under the Office of Nuclear Power.
Major activities of Power include operation and maintenance of the fossil and hydro plants and power transmission system; conservation, solar, and energy use programs; energy demonstrations and new technology projects; power system planning, development of rates, finance, budget and cost control, and relations with the independent power distributors that market TVA power.
Under the new organization, the Office of Energy Use and Office of Power Operations, both of which previously reported to Steffy, will be eliminated. In place of those offices, Steffy has named four senior managers with years of experience in the power program to become assistant managers of power.
They are J.L. Cross, who will oversee central staff activities including budgeting, planning, and other administrative functions; R.C. Crawford, who will handle all energy use programs including conservation, distributor relations and rate design; Clem C. Schonhoff, who will be responsible for operation of fossil and hydro generating facilities, transmission and support operations; and James R. Durall, who will advise the Manager of Power and the General Manager on financial and system planning matters.
Schonhoff previously held the position of Director of Fossil and Hydro Power. That job now will be filled by Paul Wade, who has been an assistant in that division.
"This new organization structure will eliminate a layer of management and at the same time provide a more efficient and responsible top management team for the power program," Steffy said.
"The assistant managers of power are all highly qualified, proven managers who are dedicated to continuing TVA's tradition of being the best run power program in the nation."
"Additionally, changing our name to the Office of Power better reflects our traditional activities and objectives," Steffy said. TVA's power program had been organized into the Office of Power in the 1950s, but that name was changed two years ago into the Power and Engineering organization.

"All of us in the Office of Power will work with the Board and General Manager and with the Office of Nuclear Power to provide ratepayers with a reliable source of electricity at the lowest feasible cost."
The assistant managers of power bring 108 years of TVA

experience into their jobs. Crawford, who joined TVA in 1958 as an electrical engineer, has served as manager of the Office of Energy Use for the past year. He previously held positions in the Division of Transmission Planning and Engineering and as Director

of the Division of Energy Use and Distributor Relations. Cross, who has been an assistant to Steffy for several months, came to TVA in 1963 and has held a number of management jobs, including Chief of the Power Supply Planning Branch, Chief of the Power Strategic Planning Staff, and Executive

Assistant to the Manager of Power. Durall previously served as Assistant Manager of Power and subsequently as Assistant Manager of Power and Engineering (Nuclear). He joined TVA in 1961, and some of his former positions included budget analyst for the General Manager's staff, and

Chief of the Financial Planning Staff. Schonhoff has been Director of the Division of Fossil and Hydro Power since 1984. He came to TVA in 1950 and worked at Johnsonville Fossil Plant and Bull Run Fossil Plant before being named Assistant Director of Fossil

and Hydro Power in 1976. Additionally, Paul Wade, who will replace Schonhoff as Director of Fossil and Hydro Power, has 33 years experience with TVA. During his career, he has had work experience at the Bull Run, Shawnee, Johnsonville, Widows Creek and Watts Bar

fossil plants, as well as the Watts Bar hydro plant. All of these managers will be stationed at TVA's Office of Power headquarters in Chattanooga.

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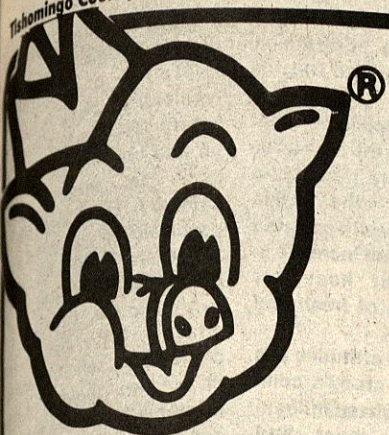

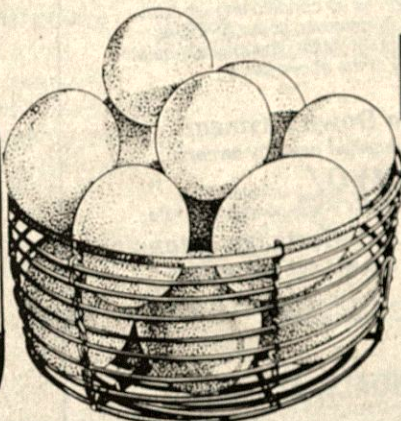
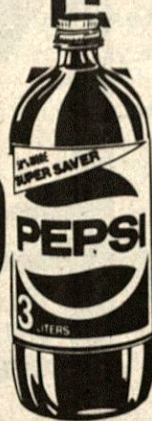

Time For Star Awards Again

The search is under way again this year. Mississippi's outstanding high school seniors and the state's most outstanding teachers are

In addition to STAR awards at the local level, area STAR Students and Teachers are identified and state STAR winners are recognized. Scholarship awards are

presented by the Council to state STAR Students and Teachers.

Now another step in the STAR Program has been taken. Last year the Council created the STAR Hall of Fame which honors teachers who receive STAR recognition for at least ten years. Three such teachers were honored last year.

More than three hundred public and private high schools participate regularly in the STAR Program. A few schools, however, still choose not to participate. You will want to encourage your school to be a part of the STAR Program, helping to assure that your outstanding seniors and their teachers received the recognition they deserve.

Consumers have always expressed a desire for quick, easy and nutritious foods. Now, results of a consumer attitude study conducted for the American Meat Institute and the National Livestock and Meat Board, show that consumer demand for con-

venience and concern about diet and health grew dramatically from 1983 to 1985.

Surprisingly, the same study showed that active, health-conscious consumers tend toward somewhat heavier usage of meat than they did two years ago.

Convenience emerged as an increasingly important issue when consumers were asked about their attitudes toward food buying and meal preparation. Thirty-six percent said they rarely have time to fix meals that take more than a half-hour to an hour to prepare, compared to 23 percent who felt that way in 1983. Twenty-five percent reported that speed and ease of preparation are among the most important considerations in purchasing food.

A significant shift in attitudes about diet and health occurred in the past two years. In 1985, 68 percent of all primary food shoppers strongly agreed on the importance of limiting fat intake

even when not for weight control, up from 57 percent in 1983.

Fifty-three percent were extremely concerned about salt in the diet, compared to 46 percent in 1983. Forty-five percent said they make a real effort to avoid high cholesterol foods, up from 39 percent.

In 1983, 34 percent said their main meal must include meat, to be really satisfying; in 1985, 28 percent felt that way. Twenty-six percent said they were considering or had already cut down on meat for health reasons, up from 19 percent two years ago.

However, 51 percent said they would buy meat more often if lower-calorie cuts were identified and they would also buy more lower-fat hot dogs and luncheon meats. Seventy-two percent said they would buy meat more often if they saw better-trimmed, leaner cuts of fresh meat in the supermarket.

Based on these findings, the researchers grouped consumers into five attitudinal

segments: meat lovers, creative cooks, price-driven, active lifestyle and health-oriented.

Despite a decline in meat consumption in the first three groups generally thought to be "pro-meat," the active lifestyle and health-oriented groups showed an increase in the number of heavy or moderate users of fresh and processed meat.

The impact of attitudes can be seen in the study's comparison of "purchase influences" for red meat and

chicken. Among positive purchase influences (variety, taste, convenience, wholesomeness, nutritional value) chicken outscored ground beef, fresh beef and pork in almost every category. Even in taste, chicken was rated equal to fresh beef and above ground beef and pork. Among the negative purchase influences (fat, cholesterol, salt and calories) chicken was perceived more favorably by nearly a two-to-one margin.

Fighting Flakes

Dandruff is *not* considered to be a serious health problem. Nevertheless, it is a bothersome condition that probably affects over half of the population. Normally skin is continually being produced and shed from the body — a new layer of skin every 30 or so days. This process occurs so slowly that we are unaware of skin being shed. But with dandruff, the scalp produces a new skin layer at a more rapid rate. Dead skin accumulates as flakes and is visible in the hair.

Although some individuals believe dandruff is associated with the presence of a yeast or bacteria in the scalp, the exact cause of dandruff remains a mystery. There is no cure, but the condition can usually be controlled. A nonmedicated shampoo may relieve mild dandruff. Moderate to severe dandruff, however, often requires a medicated shampoo which either loosens dead skin cells (salicylic acid, sulfur) and/or reduces the rate of scalp cell multiplication (selenium sulfide, zinc pyrithione). Shampoos containing coal tar may also be helpful, although we do not know how this material works. Ask your pharmacist to help you select an effective dandruff shampoo.

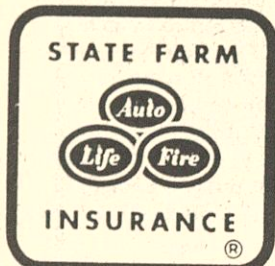
fury, open season was declared on icicles in the area. These two I.H.S. students, Johnny Sanders and Alan

In support of our youth, all parents are urged to attend this meeting.

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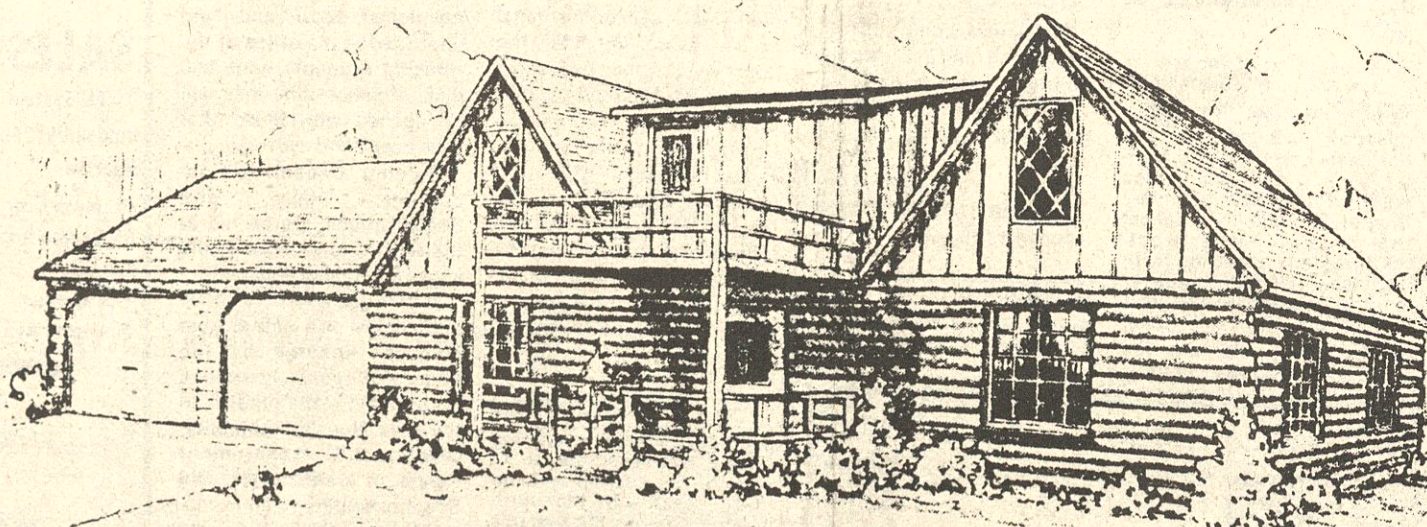
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
