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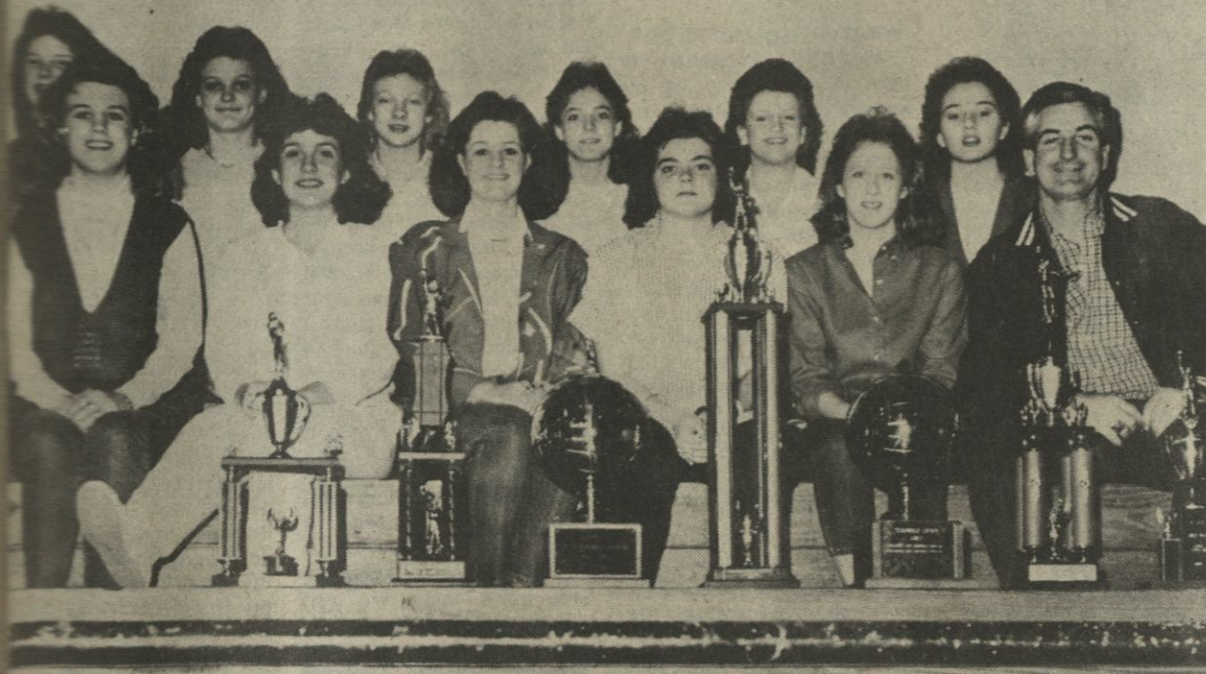

Belmont Cardinals Win State Championship Title

We got what we came after and that was to win and to win the state championship. Coach Malcolm Kuykendall said following Belmont's Lady Cardinals win from Jackson. Coach Kuykendall has led his girls to the state championship for the past four years, three of those four years Belmont won; the other, last time there, Belmont was second. The record speaks for itself. Kuykendall has been a varsity basketball coach at Belmont for four years. Prior to that, he served Pine Grove, his boys team, the state championship in 1981. His girls team at Pine Grove took first place honors in state competitions in 1981 and 1982. Overall, Kuykendall's coaching record reveals the state championship wins the past six years. Still, the Lady Cardinals are the first since Kuykendall moved to Belmont to win the district, North-Half and State

in the same year.

Semi-finals got underway Friday night in Jackson as the Cardinals went against Motley before an immense group of supportive Belmont fans. Belmont's aggressive defense and outside shooting overwhelmed Motley. Halftime score favored Belmont 33-21. The second half began with Belmont sinking five consecutive long range field goals to increase their lead to 43-25 and ending the third quarter with a 51-29 margin.

Final Score: Belmont, 61, Motley, 42. Sonya Ginn lead the scoring for Belmont with 23 points; Kim Holcomb, 18 points and Lauren McCreary placed 11 points.

Saturday night action in the final game of the 2A championship, Belmont's Lady Cardinals used their intense one on one defense and long range shooting to key a first quarter run to put Belmont out front with a 25-12 lead. South Pontotoc could never recover and trailed 39-21 at halftime.

Forging on, Belmont refused to slow the pace of the game forcing S. Pontotoc to play at a speed it couldn't handle. The end of the third period showed Belmont leading 60-34.

Belmont fans continued to cheer the Lady Cardinals on to a 83-54 victory finishing the contest... reaching their goal. Kim Holcomb finished with the game high 23 points; Sonya Ginn, 20 points; Lauren McCreary, 16 points and Tammy Rhodes, 12 points, all scoring in double digits.

Recalling Saturday nights activity, Coach Kuykendall said, "It was our night and we did everything right. We went to win and we did!" The coach attributes the success of the team to dedicated players. In his own words "The most dedicated in the State."

"This group of girls were not interested in who got the credit, they were just interested in team success," he said. He acknowledged the attitude of the parents to be that of great encouragement as well. "There has been tremendous support from the fans, school administration, the school board, and a super group of parents," Kuykendall said.

Unofficial reports indicate that Coach Malcolm Kuykendall is one of two coaches in Mississippi's history to win six state championships. Whether this proves fact or not, Belmont has earned its reputation of basketball knowledge by a

proven record of winnings.

This year's team was out to do as well as the team last year. They met the challenge and accomplished more. The record this year stood at 34-1 sporting 33 consecutive wins; last year's record was 34-2.

Congratulations, Coach Kuykendall. Lady Cardinals, we salute you!

2-Car Crash Fatal To Iuka Teenager

A late Sunday afternoon wreck on Eastport Road involving two vehicles has left one local teenager dead. Two other area men were seriously injured.

Authorities identified Garlin Thomas Bullard Jr., 17, of Iuka, to be the fatality. Those injured were identified as Benny Phifer, 22, and Jesse Ledbetter, 31, both of Iuka.

Details of the accident are still being investigated, according to Chief Deputy, Mike Kemp; however, reports indicated that Bullard was traveling alone in his 1981 Camaro heading south on Eastport Road when he met the second vehicle involved, a 1984 Caprice, driven by Phifer, northbound in a curve virtually head-on. Ledbetter was the only passenger in the second car. The wreck occurred some three miles outside Iuka. Both vehicles were totaled.

Off duty Iuka Police Officer, Ricky Cornelison was the first law official to arrive at the accident scene and alerted the sheriff's office, also requesting that ambulances be dispensed to the scene. State Trooper, Jerry Boyd arrived, followed by Sheriff Payne, auxiliary deputy, William Lambert, and other city policemen. A large crowd of motorists and spectators gathered before the wreckage could be cleared.

All three victims were taken by ambulance to the local hospital for treatment

where Bullard was pronounced dead. Phifer was later transported via air ambulance to the Elvis Presley Trauma Center in Memphis; Ledbetter was transported to the Northeast Mississippi Medical Center in Tupelo, where they both remain.

Benny Phifer was reportedly listed in stable condition, had undergone some surgery and had other surgery to be scheduled later this week. He is being treated for multiple fractures, a spokesperson said.

A family member, of Jesse Ledbetter's, reported that he remains in intensive care having undergone colon surgery with other surgery pending in the future.

Garlin Thomas Bullard, Jr. was the son of the late Garlin Thomas "Big Boy" Bullard and the late Althea Marie Clark Bullard.

He moved to Iuka in 1983 and enrolled in Iuka High School in August of that year. Junior immediately became a special person to the entire student body, faculty and administration. He was such a joy to know, always had a ready smile and a terrific sense of humor.

Although unusually burdened by circumstances not faced by the average teenager, Junior showed a great deal of responsibility for a young person and had a very positive attitude toward life.

Among Junior's honors and achievements at I.H.S. were listed: DECA Club member, two years, served as

parliamentarian and elected as DECA "Beau"; 1984-85 Homecoming Court member; and involved in the Co-Op Program.

Junior was recently promoted to assistant manager at the Sonic Drive-In and had worked at Clark's Gulf Service Station and Circus Burgers Restaurant.

Junior died Sunday, March 2, 1986, from injuries sustained in an automobile accident. He was 17-years-old and would have celebrated his 18th birthday March 15.

Services were at 3 p.m. Tuesday, March 4, at the Cutshall Funeral Home Chapel

with the Rev. Claude Prince officiating. Burial will be Friday, March 7, in Mount Emblem Cemetery in Elmhurst, Ill.

Survivors include one sister, Marie Sanders of Bloomington, Ill.; four uncles, Raymond Clark, Don Clark, Arvil Bullard, all of Iuka, and Daniel Clark, Lexington, Tenn.; four aunts, Ruby Litton, Mary Flint, both of Iuka, Ruth Crider, Rienzi and Suzie Baker, Ill., numerous cousins and scores of friends.

He was loved by all who knew him and touched our lives in a special way.

CONSERVATION RESERVE PROGRAM

Farmers in Tishomingo County who have highly erodible land should review the provisions of the conservation reserve program of the 1985 Farm Bill.

The conservation reserve program offers a chance to take eroding cropland out of production by converting it to trees, grass or wildlife areas.

If the land qualifies, a producer may receive 50 percent cost-share for establishing a permanent cover and an annual payment for a 10-year contract period.

Planting trees has always been a good investment for many producers and the conservation reserve program might improve that investment.

At the end of the 10-year contract period, participants will have a stand of trees that will produce income for many years. On most sites pine trees could be ready to thin within three to five years after the contract expires. Those trees that are thinned will

provide periodic income. Additional income could be supplied through hunting leases if the participant plants trees in combination with approved wildlife food plants. Lobolly and slash pine seedlings and direct seeding of oaks (planting acorns) are approved tree planting practices in the program. Approved wildlife planting include bi-color lespedeza, sericia, kobe, perennial clover, autumn olive, sawtooth oak, crabapples and bahiagrass.

The conservation reserve program has many benefits that could make it attractive to area producers. For more information about the program and on forestry as an investment, contact the local county Extension office.

Nonfat Dry Milk A Calcium-Rich Food

Much is being written and said about calcium these days since many people do not get enough of this mineral. Too little calcium is one cause of the increasing incidence of the bone disease, osteoporosis.

The easiest way to get sufficient amounts of calcium is to include milk or other dairy products at every meal.

If calories or fat are a concern, nonfat dry milk offers a nutritious substitute for other high-fat dairy products. Nonfat dry milk can replace whole milk (at half the calories) for drinking, cooking and baking. Whipped nonfat dry milk can be used instead of whipped cream or whipped cream substitutes.

Using nonfat dry milk in cooking is an excellent way to increase the calcium content of the total diet. This is especially important for individuals who don't care to

drink milk as a beverage.

Try one of these suggestions:
*Add nonfat dry milk powder to water in which cereals are cooked.

*Add one-fourth cup nonfat dry milk powder for every pound of ground meat before browning. Add two-thirds cup nonfat dry milk powder for every pound of ground meat when making meat loaves, meatballs or fish loaves.

*Add one-fourth cup nonfat dry milk powder to each cup of fluid milk. Add one-half cup nonfat dry milk powder to each cup of water or broth when making puddings, custards, gravies and sauces. (This may make the product slightly thicker.)

*Add one-fourth cup nonfat dry milk powder to each cup of fluid milk when making biscuits, muffins, pancakes, yeast breads, cookies and cakes. (Baked products will be firmer and brown faster. Lowering the baking temperature or reducing the amount of sugar will reduce the browning effect.)

*Add one-half cup nonfat dry milk powder when reconstituting canned soup.

*Add one-half cup nonfat dry milk powder per can of condensed soup when making casseroles such as tuna and noodles with cream of mushroom soup.

*Add nonfat dry milk powder when making mashed potatoes, using one-third cup per four servings.

Angel Biscuits

1 cake or pkg. yeast
2 tablespoons lukewarm water
1 cup shortening
5 cups plain unsifted flour
3 to 4 teaspoons baking powder
1/4 cup sugar
1 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon soda
2 cups buttermilk

Dissolve yeast in lukewarm water. Sift together dry ingredients; cut in shortening. Add yeast mixture and buttermilk to dry ingredients; knead enough to hold together. Refrigerate until needed. Roll out to 1/4 to 1/2 inch thickness. Cut with biscuit cutter and fold in half as for pocket-book rolls if desired, or lay biscuits flat and place a second one which has been dipped in melted butter on top. Bake at 400 degrees for 20

WHAT'S A WOMAN TO DO? WHAT'S A WOMAN TO DO? More than 1/2 of all women in this country get fewer vitamins, minerals, and other nutrients each day than are recommended. Poor nutrition contributes to their health problems. Here are some ways to reduce the severity of these problems.

ANEMIA—Every day women from adolescence until menopause need almost twice as much iron as men. Anemia (blood low in iron) is often the result of an iron-poor diet. Getting enough iron from foods isn't easy, which is why some women have to take iron supplements. Eating iron-rich foods with foods containing vitamin C at the same meal increases the amount of iron the body can use. The protein in meat, fish and poultry also aids iron absorption. For this reason if you take iron supplements, take them before or just after meals that include meat protein and vitamin C. And, believe it or not, foods cooked in old-fashioned cast iron draw some nutritionally valuable iron from the pan. Iron sources are lean meat, liver, liver-sausage, prunes, pinto or kidney beans, spinach and other leafy green vegetables, enriched and whole grain breads and cereals.

WEIGHT CONTROL—It isn't fair! Women generally have to work harder than men to control their weight. As a woman gets older, it is even harder because her body needs fewer calories. She will gain approximately 3 pounds per year if she eats and exercises the same after her mid-forties as she did at age 21. Yes, it is tough to control weight. Here are several suggestions that will help. FIRST, trim some calories each day. Eat smaller portions. Choose skim milk and cheese. Have more salads and use low-cal dressing. Bake, broil or steam foods instead of frying. Eat the chicken, but not the skin. Leave the butter off the popcorn, the sour cream off the baked potato, the special sauce off the hamburger.

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OSTEOPOROSIS—Prevention of osteoporosis begins during the teen years. Bones grow to their maximum strength only if a girl consumes enough calcium. The consequences of too little calcium during pregnancy and breast feeding may not be realized until later in life. Bones that have not had daily calcium replacement become fragile. The problem increases after menopause. While a woman cannot undo years of calcium neglect, an effort at any point to rebuild bones will help. Calcium is best absorbed from dairy foods. Calcium compound forms are available in supplements. Fewer tablets are needed if there is at least 200 mg of calcium in each pill. Dolomite and bone meal are not recommended because they may contain lead or other toxic substances. Calcium Sources: All types of milk, yogurt, cheese, sardines and other canned fish with bones,

and green leafy vegetables. DID YOU KNOW THAT—By her 13th wedding anniversary a married American woman has gained an average of 23 pounds? Meanwhile, her husband has gained 18—one out of every 4 women, compared to one out of 8 men, is likely to develop osteoporosis,—a woman will need almost twice as much iron during her lifetime as a man will need,—white and Asian women over the age of 65 are more likely to break bones than black women? Black women tend to have thicker bones.

and quiet. Do not attempt to induce vomiting unless instructed to do so by your veterinarian.

Know where your pet is and what your pet is doing at all times. And above all, keep poisonous substances out of the reach of your pet.

Stuffy or Runny?

Decongestants, on the other hand, seldom cause drowsiness. Examples include phenylephrine, pseudoephedrine, and phenylpropanolamine.

During March, National Kidney Month, the National Kidney Foundation of Mississippi is asking all Mississippi residents to be especially aware of the early warning signs of kidney and urinary tract diseases which affect more than 13 million

Americans each year.

Foundation officials stress that the early detection and paying careful attention to the doctor's orders are the keys to preventing treatable kidney problems from progressing to serious, life-threatening disorders which can eventually lead to permanent kidney failure. "The purpose of the Foundation's public education efforts during March is to focus national attention on the growing number of individuals suffering from kidney diseases and to underscore the dangers of diseases such as high blood pressure which are the primary causes of kidney failure," said Lucy Mazzaferro, Executive Director of the Foundation.

Statistics indicate that individuals who have high blood pressure are at an increased risk of developing permanent kidney damage and that it is vitally important that those individuals who have this disease follow rigorously their prescribed treatments. The number of new cases of kidney failure attributable to high blood pressure continues to increase each year with one of every five hypertensive individual's developing chronic kidney disorders.

The kidney perform three

vital functions for the body: clean waste materials and excess fluids from the blood; regulate the body's internal environment by removing some compounds from the blood and retaining others; and aid in regulating blood pressure and red blood cell counts.

The National Kidney Foundation of Mississippi conducts a variety of programs in research, public and professional education and community and patient services.

According to Foundation medical experts the early warning signs of kidney

disease are:
*burning or difficulty during urination,
*more frequent urination, particularly at night,
*passage of bloody appearing urine,
*puffiness around the eyes, swelling of hands and feet, especially in children,
*pain in the small of back below ribs, not aggravated by movement,
*high blood pressure.

Tax Tip

Question: I neglected to pay real estate taxes on my home for two years. This year I realized my house could be sold for back taxes and I paid all of the taxes due. Can I claim all three years' of taxes paid as an itemized deduction on my tax return for this year?

Answer: Yes. For a cash basis taxpayer, taxes are deductible only in the year in which they are paid, regardless of when they were due. If the amount of real estate taxes for the three years-plus your other itemized deductions-exceeds your zero bracket amount, it will be to your benefit to itemize.
